Dedication

The Town of Deering would like to dedicate this annual report to William J. Dumais and Carroll E. Greene. Both men exemplify what community spirit is by their extraordinary service over so many years.

William Dumias was born in Lembroke N.H. in 1907. He served as a deputy fire warden and helped to establish the first fire station in Deering. He also served as police chief here in town as well as an officer in Hillsborough. Mr. Dumias was chairman of the Old Home Day Larades and was Santa Glaus for many school and civic organizations.

Garroll Greene was born in Newbury, Vt. In 1901. For twelve years Mr. Greene was Deering road agent. He has served as selectman, civil defense warden, fire warden and as a special police officer. Once, while out plowing roads, Mr. Greene helped the state police capture two escaped convicts.

Both of these men served this community during a time when only a few hundred people lived here, resources were limited and their "Yankee ingenuity" was a highly prized commodity. They understood that a town is more than just lines on a map. A town is where people work together for the common good. Bill Dumias and Garroll Greene will both be remembered as men who gave their time and talents selflessly to the Town and people of Deering.

Over the past three years Deering has put into place a new budget and accounting process where each department submits expense and budget requests under the same code system used by the State. Combined with the new external audit and the cut/add policy this has led to a much tighter financial picture.

The Selectmen voted to discontinue the mailing of Inventories as it was found not to be cost effective. A more efficient method of issuing building permits and tracking of construction should provide similar results while being less of a burden to taxpayers.

This year the Town boundaries with Henniker and Weare were perambulated by Joe Misiolek and Ed Naile respectively, along with representatives from each neighboring Town.

Selectmen's secretary Shirley Hare is retiring this year and the Board wishes her well. May collecting Social Security be sweet revenge for having to fill out all of those forms each week. Good Luck in the future Shirley!

We would like to thank all the various Board and Committee people who put so much time and effort into everything they do. Volunteers are the key to small town government.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen Town of Deering, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Deering, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1996, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of Town officials. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards; Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the provisions of Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-128, "Audits of State and Local Governments." Those standards and OMB Circular A-128 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by Town officials, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As more fully described in Note 1, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Account Group, which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

As described in Note 1, the Town has recognized tax revenues of \$277,591 in the General Fund which were not received in cash within sixty days of year end as required by generally accepted accounting principles (GASB Interpretation 3). Town officials believe, and we concur, that the application of this accounting principle, which would result in a decrease in the undesignated General Fund balance from \$144,105 to (\$133,486), would give a misleading impression of the Town's ability to meet its current and future obligations.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the general purpose financial statements of the omission described in the third paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Deering, New Hampshire as of December 31, 1996, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its

non-expendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated April 24, 1997 on our considerations of the Town of Deering, New Hampshire's internal control structure and a report dated April 24, 1997 on its compliance with laws and regulations.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Deering, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

Deering Conservation Commission (DCC) Annual Report 1997

The DCC has had a very successful year. We continued our ongoing programs including the Wood Duck Restoration Program, Lay Lakes Monitoring, stream monitoring, and annual roadside cleanup. But our most rewarding achievements were noted in one ongoing program and two new undertakings.

The DCC has annually sponsored conservation campers, with support from the Deering Fish & Game Club and the Deering Association, for many years. It was last year that the duration of this sponsorship came full circle. The two campers which were sponsored last year both had parents who had also attended Conservation Camp! Hopefully, this program will continue to be sponsored and a third generation of Deering youth will have the opportunity to learn about the importance and enjoyment of New Hampshire's natural resources.

The DCC's hard work and determination resulted in the completion of the redesign and rehabilitation of the picnic area, beach, and boat launch on Deering Reservoir. The area was completed in May, just prior to the swimming season. The area substantially reduces the potential for accidents, while providing increased recreational usage for citizens of the Town. We hope that the citizens of the Town, who utilize this area, will help us in monitoring it for appropriate usage and keeping it clean. If this area is to remain as attractive and functional as it currently is, we all need to work to keep it that way. It's our area, lets enjoy it!

The final accomplishment was that of completing a conservation easement on a large parcel of undeveloped land in central Deering. The DCC worked for over a year to walk the land, map the boundaries, and draft up an easement document suitable to the Town of Deering and the owners of the land. This easement demonstrates the ability of the DCC to aid the citizens of the Town in protecting their land from future development at little to no cost.

The DCC will continue to work to protect and preserve the natural resources of the Town of Deering in 1998. We have a large quantity of work and can always use a helping hand. The Police Department saw a few changes in 1997. Officer Christopher McCabe and Officer AJ Williams were hired to fill two vacant part-time positions within the Department. They have had a positive impact on the Department, and have made a positive impression with the community.

I have included the Activity Report and the Mission Statement for the Department again this year. The Activity Report should be used to show you, the community, the nature of the Department's activity throughout the year. The Report should not be used to compare numbers from year to year, but rather to highlight areas of concern in our community. Looking at the report, you will notice that the burglary rate has gone down over the last several years. This reduction in burglaries can be attributed to the proactive presence of the Police Department around town. The statistics also show a rather dramatic increase in the number of domestic disturbances over last year. Unfortunately, this unsettling trend is a problem that all Police Departments in New Hampshire and across the country are facing.

I think this year is the first time in the History of the Police Department that the Operating Budget has been less than the previous year. And, as I promised, the Department has reached its manpower goal to fulfill the on-duty patrol coverage that is needed to take us safely into the new millennium. I do not expect the Town to need more coverage than what is now being provided. Having the proper coverage that the Town requires has reduced call-outs significantly over previous years. Also, having a full compliment of officers who are familiar with the Town and its people have made for a stable and effective Department that is better able to serve the needs of our community.

I would like to thank all of the residents of Deering for their support over the past year, and I ask for your continued support in 1998. I must also include a special thanks to all the area business that contributed to the kids Cops Card program, it was a great success. The Department can not accomplish the mission with which it is charged unless the community it serves supports us and involves itself with the problems we face. We must all work together to keep Deering the unique town that it is. The door to your Police Department is always open to you, feel free to come in and talk to us.

I would also like to thank all the members of the Police Department for their support and dedication to the community and the Department.

Deering Fire & Rescue Annual Report - 1997

The Deering Fire & Rescue Department Mission Statement

The Deering Fire & Rescue Department, comprising of personnel, apparatus and equipment, will be a well trained, high profile and progressive department, with the goals of protecting life and property and rendering care to the residents of Deering and our neighboring towns when called upon at a moments notice.

You're awakened from a sound sleep as if by a bucket of ice water thrown on your face as ten loud, high-pitched tones from your pager fire off in rapid succession, shattering the stillness of the night. "WYC727 - the tone is for the Deering Fire & Rescue. Respond to...." the radio voice announces & you hope it has not awakened everyone else in the house, although you know full well it has.

You bolt upright, groggily trying to get dressed as quickly as you can. You fumble in the dark for your shoes & swiftly glance at the clock. 2:10 AM glows eerily in the darkness as you listen for the location & nature of the call for help. You hustle out into the cold, dark night & while driving to the station, you do a quick run-through in your head, trying to gird yourself for the physical & emotional onslaught yet to come.

Your routine, and that of your loved ones, is suddenly & dramatically changed.

If 1997 was anything for the Deering Fire & Rescue, it was a year of changes.

We lost Kevin LeBlanc as Chief, who left the Department due to conflicting obligations. Kevin served the Town and the Department admirably and will be missed. We wish him well in all his future endeavors.

The number of emergency calls to the Department rose dramatically from 28 in 1996 to 39 in 1997, an increase of 39%. Also, the severity of the types of calls increased as well, including the first civilian casualty due to fire in recent memory, Carroll Greene, Sr. That loss was felt deeply by the members of the Department and our condolences go out, once again, to the Greene Family. It is ironic that Mr. Greene was the father of one of our former members. Carroll Greene, Jr.

Another loss was felt by the Department in the passing of one our early members, William J. Dumais. Mr. Dumais was a driving force behind the organization & erection of the first Fire Station in Deering - Company 1 on Old County Road. Mr. Dumais, and that building, will always hold a place in the hearts & minds of all members of the Deering Fire & Rescue, past, present, & future.

We also experienced the loss of one of our front-line pieces of apparatus: 84M2 - a 1962 International pumper that served all the residents of Town, and particularly those residents in the area of Airport Road, which is where the pumper was stationed. 84M2 served the Town well for many, many years until the costs for maintenance & repair became too much to bear, not to mention that the pumper was so old that there is no way that it could have been upgraded to meet current NFPA standards. The area known as West Deering is a densely populated area and deserves adequate fire protection, which will be hampered by the loss of this truck. We are hopeful that the residents of Deering will see fit to approve the Warrant article that authorizes the purchase of a new pumper truck to bring the fleet up to the level that would afford the best possible fire protection that we can give to you.

In a more positive vein, several members of the Department have undergone, and are still undergoing, additional training to strengthen not only their personal skills, but the skills of the Department as a whole; again, the ultimate goal being the best possible fire protection & prevention affordable to the residents of Deering. Deputy Chief Andy Anderson, Captain Brian (Ace) Card, Firefighter Mark Vorhees and myself all successfully completed the NH Fire Standards & Training Commission Career Level Certification Course, bringing the number of Career Level Certified members to 5 and the total number of Certified Firefighters to 10. This will bring to the Department even higher levels of standards and professionalism. Congratulations to all.

The Department of Fire & Rescue has also jumped into the computer age with the development of it's website. The site is feature-rich with information about the Department, fire prevention information, links to other sources of fire & rescue-related information, and is loaded with sounds, graphics and photographs. It was designed and is maintained by Lt. Bob Pragoff and can be accessed through the Town of Deering website (http://www.state.nh.us/localgovt/deering.htm) or on its own at (http://www.geocities.com/Baia/6382/index.html).

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) recently released the national fire statistics for the United States for the year 1996 which are as follows:

There were a total of 1,975,00 fires reported, of which 578,00 were structure fires (equating to one every 55 seconds), 413,00 motor vehicle fires and 983,000 outside property fires. There was a residential fire every 74 seconds and a motor vehicle fire every 76 seconds. Total property losses amounted to \$9.406 billion, with 85,500 fires committed by arsonists. Deaths related to fire amounted to one death every 105 minutes with 4,990 civilian deaths and 25,550 injuries. These figures prove that fire is a serious problem, even with the training, equipment & technology available today. Due diligence is required on the part of every citizen to keep the fire threat low. Install smoke detectors in your home & test them regularly. They do save lives. Establish fire drills in your household so that everyone knows what to do to exit safely. Have your heating system checked regularly (to avoid exposure to deadly carbon

monoxide fumes). Keep fire extinguishers handy & accessible. Before kindling a brush pile, contact the Forest Fire Warden for a permit. This is required when there is no snow cover. Failure to do so could result in a brush fire that could spread to your home or other structure. It could also make you liable for the costs to the Fire Department to put the fire out. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact any member of the Deering Fire & Rescue. We'll be more than happy to help you with any fire prevention assistance you might need. One more thing: Please put your house number in a spot that can be seen from the roadway. We can't help you if we can't find you.

In closing, I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to all members of the Deering Fire & Rescue for their hard work, dedication & support during the past year, and to the other Town Officials and every resident of Deering, I extend my sincere thanks. Together, we can work to make Deering a fire-safe place to live.

Deering Rescue Report

During the last year our calls were up from the year before. We had a total of 126 calls. The breakdown of our calls is as follows. We had 41 Medical emergencies, 30 Trauma, 39 Cardiac, 2 Miscellaneous and 14 call in aid of the Fire Department. We also respond mutual aid to our surrounding towns of Weare and Hillsboro occasionally.

We recently procured Paramedic Protocols for our ambulance with Concord Hospital. Currently we have 11 members on the Rescue Squad. We have 1 Paramedic, 3 EMT-1's, 3 EMT's and 4 First Responders and 1 Driver.

The Ambulance is currently running well, but we are looking toward getting a newer ambulance in the near future. Through a lot of hard work and a lot of hours of paperwork we now have a Non-Profit status. We received our Tax Exempt number in late December.

As always we still continue with training to help us serve you the Community better. We would really like to take this opportunity to extend a warm welcome to you to visit the station and see the ambulance and meet the members of the Squad. You are very important to us as you help us to keep the ambulance running and help us keep it stocked in supplies with your donations and support.

We would like to use this opportunity to Thank you for your continued generous support, as always it is greatly appreciated. The survey forms we have sent to you are as always a great help not only to us but to the fire department as well. If there is a fire it lets them know where you will meet and if they look there and find someone missing it is very easy for them to know they have to look for them. All the medical information that we receive is considered helpful and strictly confidential. If you have a rescue call at your house we look at the book and see if you have any allergies or medical problems. It lets us have the equipment ready that we will need to bring in the house to treat the problem.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S 1997 ANNUAL REPORT

In 1997 47 burn permits were issued as follows:

- 2 Outside Incinerators
- 30 Campfire/Cooking fires
- 25 Brush burning permits

1997 was another dry year for the Fire Service. For approximately 4 weeks we rescinded all burning permits and stopped issuing new permits due to State rated class 4 fire danger days. Class 4 days are when the fire danger is high and class five is the highest danger level.

In 1997 we had 4 forest fire calls.

One on Reservoir Drive (possibly due to a discarded cigarette). One for an illegal burn that was improperly extinguished with sand. This fire smoldered underground and surfaced days later and burned approximately 4 acres of fields and wooded areas that were close to buildings and could have been much worse if not contained with the help of the Deering Highway Dept. and Mutual Aid from the Hillsborough, Weare, Stoddard, Antrim and Henniker Fire Departments. The responsible party was required to reimburse the fire departments that responded to this call. Keep in mind anyone who kindles a brush fire with a permit or not, that gets out of control will be responsible for reimbursement of all costs including damages to land or property.

We also received 2 calls for mutual aid to Weare and Antrim.

Please remember State Law requires a burn permit for all outside fires, including outdoor fireplaces and campfires.

Burn permits are free. Contact any Deering Forest Fire Warden, Hillsboro Emergency Dispatch Center or the Deering Town Hall.

Solid Waste Transfer Station Site Evaluation Committee

The Deering Site Evaluation Committee presented a report to the Selectmen on November 5th. This report was the culmination of 6 months of activity, including field visits and meetings three times a month, on average. It included an overview of the Committee's work to date, a list of site evaluation criteria, and a discussion of appropriate sites, along with pertinent information for each parcel. The goal was to recommend sites suitable for a transfer station to the Selectmen so they can execute option agreements to hold the properties off the market in preparation for two warrant articles for voters to consider at the 1998 Town Meeting. One would call for negotiation of a fixed-price, fixed-duration contract with Hillsboro, and the other would call for the construction of a Deering transfer station on one of the recommended sites.

The Committee considered a number of objective physical and environmental factors in determining whether individual sites are appropriate for a transfer station. A Site Evaluation Criteria scoresheet assessed the physical characteristics of a location: lot size and shape, topography and surficial geology, surface waters and subsurface aquifers, and access to utilities. Other site attributes were nearby residences, conservation or historic properties, and ease of access from different ends of town.

Working with an initial list of 56 town-owned and privately-owned lots in Deering, members carried out site inspections of the 9 most promising properties in order to evaluate them according to the criteria. For these 9 parcels the Committee gathered information from town tax records, realtors, and town maps, and listed the major pros and cons for each parcel as a potential transfer station site, to aid the Selectmen in their decision process. Fairness to all ends of Deering was a challenge in looking for a site, so the report also included a map that showed the location of the parcels relative to where people live. From these 9, the Committee developed a final list of 3 sites, ranked in order of preference, for the Selectmen's consideration.

The Selectmen decided to keep the report confidential until February 1998, and as of the end of January '98 had not commented or taken any action on any of the recommended sites. As a result, the Committee has prepared a general warrant article for transfer station site purchase leaving specific site selection to the voters, and plans to present its findings at the Budget Hearing in February 1998. The Committee has also requested information from the Selectmen on Deering's share with respect to any changes in Hillsboro's solid waste costs and revenues, and hopes to present these numbers to the voters for comparison purposes. The Committee urges careful consideration of the fairness and equity of the formulas used for allocation of capital costs, operating expenses, and long-term liability between Deering and Hillsboro in any future contract for solid waste disposal.

Ballot Question: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Hillsboro-Deering Cooperative School District? (Yes - 212 No - 77)

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to amend the Deering Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations to update the Deering Floodplain Ordinance to include the definitions of "Historic structure", "new construction", "substantial damage" and "violation", to amend the section on "Variances and Appeals" and include requirements for subdivisions having land designated as "Special Flood Hazard Area". The Federal Emergency Management Agency has mandated adoption of this amendment so that the Town will remain in compliance with the National Floodplain Insurance Program. (Yes - 258 No - 76)

ARTICLE 3. It was voted to amend the Deering Zoning Ordinance by adding one new section entitled, "Shoreland Protection Ordinance", which creates an overlay Shoreland Protection District covering all land within 250 feet of Deering Reservoir (Lake), Dudley Pond, the Contoocook River and the Piscataquog River from the outflow of Deering Reservoir to the Weare Town line, and establishes standards for the subdivision, use and development of these lands. The provisions of this ordinance, except for adaptations to meet special conditions in Deering, are already in effect under the Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act of 1991 with respect to Deering Reservoir and Dudley Pond. In particular, this Section clarifies the setback requirements for new construction in the District. (Yes - 241 No - 87)

On Saturday, March 15, 1997, at 9:00 a.m., Mr. Charles Levesque, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag. This was followed by Chairman Mike Hays delivering a moving tribute in honor of Gilbert M. Misiaszek, a member of the highway crew who recently passed away. This was followed by a moment of silence. Chairman Hays then presented a plaque, which had been awarded to Gil by the New Hampshire Municipal Association for his heroic actions in saving a life, to the Misiaszek Family.

It was voted to accept the Moderator's rules under which the meeting would be run. The highlights of which were that only registered voters may speak unless the body decides otherwise. All speakers would identify themselves and all remarks should be addressed to the Moderator. All amendments will be in writing and there will only be one amendment at a time. Motion to restrict consideration can happen at anytime after an article is voted on and several articles can be restricted from reconsideration at any time after the articles are voted on. To overrule the Moderator on a question of procedure requires 1 person to stand and question a ruling. Then the majority of the body must vote to overrule. To question the ruling of the Moderator on the outcome of a vote requires 7 voters.

ARTICLE 4. After discussion on the 911 Report it was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officials, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1996.

ARTICLE 5. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700,443 for general municipal operations.

and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town charges for the year 1997.

ARTICLE 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350. as Deering's share of the Adult Literacy Program a/k/a Project Lift.

ARTICLE 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,520. for the purchase of computer hardware and software for the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. for a road study and report to the Town with plans for upgrading gravel roads and bringing paved roads up to acceptable standards.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,571. for the following:

1.	Crushed Gravel	\$ 16,000.
2.	Dust Control for Longwoods Road,	
	2nd N.H. Turnpike, North Road	12,377.
3.	Upgrade of Culverts at 4 sites	12,470.
4.	Construct a Pole Barn	2,724.

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86,404. for the reconstruction and paving of 1/2 mile of Clement Hill Road.

ARTICLE 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000. for the painting of the bridge over the Contoocook River in West Deering. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3, VI and will not lapse until the bridge is completed or in three years, whichever is less. (Grant Funds available \$64,000 - Net cost to Town \$16,000.)

ARTICLE 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,250. for the purchase of a Police Cruiser Video camera and Recorder. (State Grant available in the amount of \$2,125.)

ARTICLE 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. to:

- Appoint a Solid Waste Transfer Station Site Evaluation Committee.
- Undertake necessary studies to ensure the suitability of any recommended sites.
- 3. Allow the Selectmen to execute an option agreement on any selected site.

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Deering, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$15,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$20,000; for a person 80 years of age or older

\$25,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$22,000 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$30,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. (RSA 72:39-B).

ARTICLE 15. It was voted to deposit 50% of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (The Land Use Change Tax) in the Conservation Fund with an annual limit of \$20,000 in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25 II.

ARTICLE 16. It was voted to accept, as a class 5 road, Ridgeview Road in the Deering Green subdivision.

ARTICLE 17. Under this article the following suggestions and/or statements were made:

- 1. Michael Hays was thanked for a job well done as Selectman.
- 2. A thank you to Donald MacLeod and Galen Kilbride for their handling of the remote microphones during the Town Meeting.
 - 3. The Moderator thanked all who worked at Town Meeting.
 - 4. The Budget Committee was commended for their fine work.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:40 p.m.
