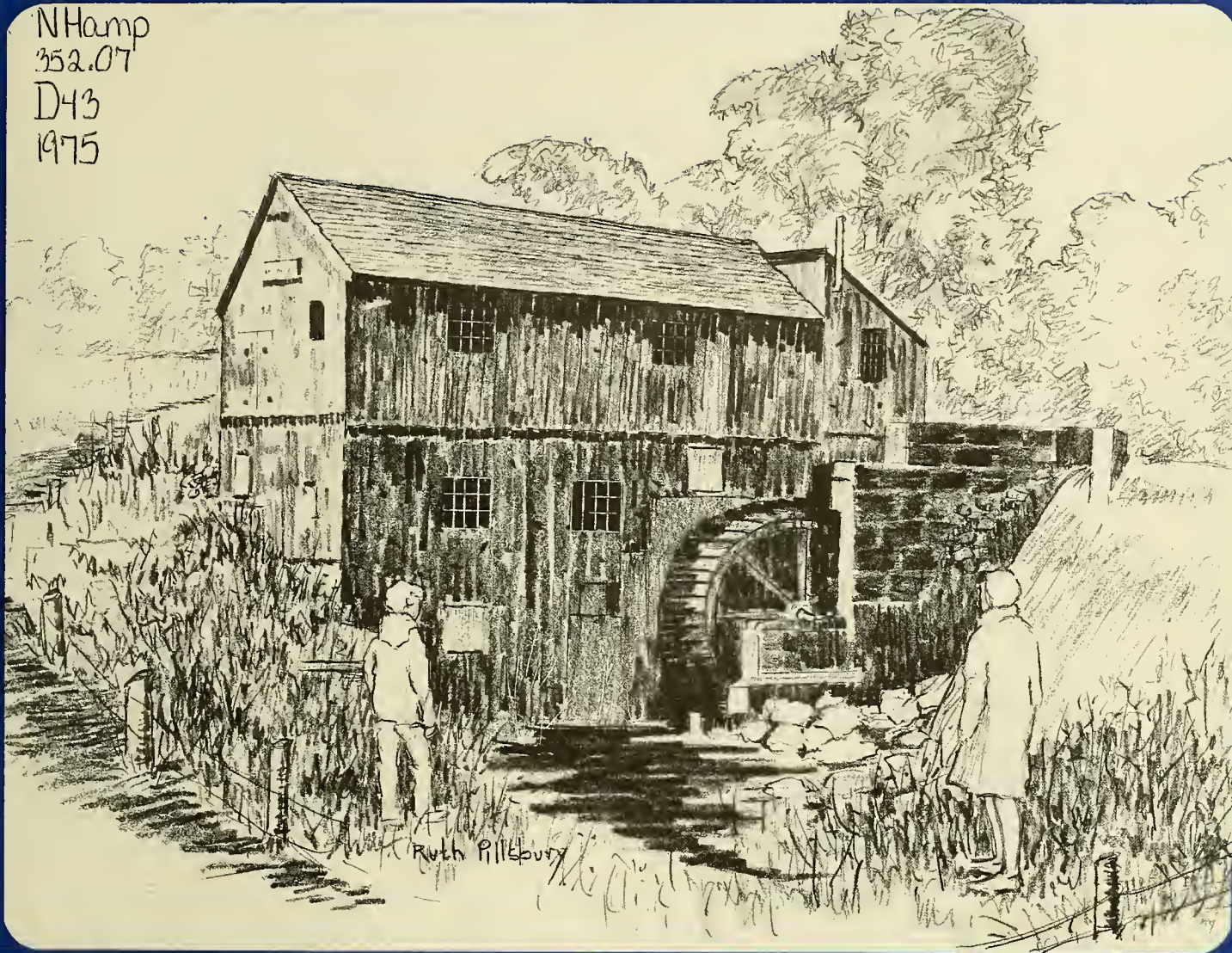

## SELECTMEN'S LETTER

The year 1975 was one of considerable accomplishment which was overshadowed by the revelation, in November, that the Town and the Water Department had made payments for materials not received of over \$138,000. during the past four years. The effect of these transactions is reported in *Note A*, to the financial statements, appearing at the end of the Budget Details of this Town Report. We have approved several improvements to the existing internal control procedures which require more independent checking of transactions prior to payment in order to reduce the possibility of such occurrences in the future. In addition, we are proposing bonding of all employees in order to provide additional protection to the Town.

In June of 1975, the Town began using its new two million gallon water tank. This tank provides an important increase to the storage capacity of the water system for fire protection and peak water system needs.

The main sewer pumping station, which was destroyed by an explosion in 1972, has been rebuilt and is now in operation. This facility provides us with an effective means for disposing of septic tank truck wastes as well as improving the operation of the municipal sewer system.

In 1975 the Assessor with two Manpower Program supplied assistants reviewed all properties in the Town to ensure that the information we were using for establishing assessments was accurate. While the program was not universally popular, it enabled us to ensure that properties in the Town are fairly and equitably assessed at a cost which was far less than a complete outside revaluation.

The Board of Selectmen has approved the organization of a Public Works Department which will include the operations of Town Engineer, Highway, Water and Sewer Departments under a Director of Public Works. We believe this reorganization will result in more efficient operation of these departments which have many common functions.

The Selectmen's proposals for 1976 have as an objective maintaining a reasonable level of Town services and providing for the future needs of the Town without over burdening the taxpayer. If adopted, the budget as proposed by the Board of Selectmen and the Recreation Commission would result in a *Town portion of the tax rate* which will be somewhat increased over 1975, but will still be lower than the Town portion of the tax rate in 1970.

We have proposed an ambitious road program which includes two 1975 projects which were not done; rebuilding North Shore Road (Beaver Lake) and improving the intersection of Broadway and Crystal Avenue. In addition, we are proposing continuing rebuilding Tsienneto Road, major drainage improvement work on High Street plus considerable sealing and routine maintenance. In order to provide the engineering support required to accomplish this level of activity, we have proposed the permanent addition to the Town staff of an Engineering Assistant and Secretary. These positions are currently being staffed by Manpower Program supplied employees.

The Town's sewer treatment plant does not provide the quality of treatment required to meet State and Federal regulations. In addition, the existing load plus the outstanding commitments on the system will use the entire capacity of the treatment plant.

Accordingly, we are recommending approval of Phase II of the Facility Plan which is the design of the treatment facilities to provide the required quality of treatment and the capacity to meet the Town's future needs. Federal and State aid will cover 95% of the cost of this project.

The town retains its rights to recovery of additional funds by appropriate legal process. At this time, it is not possible to determine what, if any, additional funds may be recovered. Accordingly, no provision has been made in the financial statements for future recovery.

 To see if the Town Meeting will vote to require that all Derry Town Departments, Officers, and Commissions shall operate within limits of Line Item Budgets, precisely as voted at the appropriate town or public meeting; and, further, that there shall be no deviation from these Line Item Budgets, except for good cause, and only after approval by the Town Budget Committee, following an advertised Public Hearing, or take any other action thereon.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of going to this Article say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Article 20 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 20. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, including Town Road Aid Plan apportionment A and Town Road Aid Plan apportionment B, for building and repairing bridges, for police department, for the Derry District Court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of Town Officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of Town buildings, for support of the libraries, for State and County taxes, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurses Association, for the Greater Salem Mental Health Clinic, for regional associations, for the Federal governments in the control of insect pests, for ambulance service, and for all necessary charges arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MRS. CASTEN: I move we adopt the Article as read.

MR. GORMAN: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The motion has been made by Mrs. Casten to adopt the Article as read, and seconded by Mr. Gorman. Is there any discussion?

MR. PORTER: According to the vote the other night, on election day, you all voted a fifteen thousand dollar top for your officials. In this article you have your Police Department. How can you set up a budget, are you going to cut men down that you hired three or four years ago? There are a number of people here in the Town under the impression that with the vote, which was misleading, it was ambiguous, on that Article No. 10, where they set the salary to \$15,000. I would agree perhaps that is sufficient. But when you hire people for \$18,000 or \$17,000, you have steps. I will admit that I am a labor representative in the sense that I am the president of a local union in Manchester for municipal employees. I don't believe you need a labor union down here, and that is a funny thing for a labor man to say, but this Town can't get along without them, perhaps, but if you are going to cut your help down on a vote, and I don't believe the townfolks really understood exactly what they were putting in. Now, if you are going to cut your Chief, if you are going to cut your Parks and Recreation man for what you hired them for, I don't think this Article can pass. You can't make a budget until you know whether you are going to cut them down or not cut them down. How can we vote on it?

Thank you, Sir.

THE MODERATOR: Mr. Gerrish, do you want to answer that? I don't know the answer. I had nothing to do with the Article.

MR. GERRISH: First of all, I can't answer Mr. Porter's question.

MRS. DIMARZIO: If I understand it, why is it \$15,000, is that it?

THE MODERATOR: That is correct. In other words, he is saying, "How come . . ."

PROCEEDINGS

*(Articles 1 through 12 – By Ballot)*

*(At 1:05 p.m. the meeting was called to order and the rules of the meeting were read by the Moderator. The following ensued:)*

THE MODERATOR: We have disposed of the first twelve articles, and I will take up Article 13, unless it's your pleasure that I take up some other article before that.

Article 13 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 13. By Petition: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the purpose of defraying the expense of the American Revolution Bicentennial celebration in Derry and pass any vote relating thereto. (It is anticipated that the celebration will produce income to offset the above appropriation.)**

What is your pleasure on that Article?

Mrs. Casten moved to accept Article 13 as read.

THE MODERATOR: A motion has been made by Mrs. Casten that we accept the Article as read. Do I hear a second?

MR. GORMAN: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Is there any discussion?

Question moved.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. Do you understand what the question is? All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Article 14.

**ARTICLE 14. By Petition: Shall the Town prohibit the drinking of any and all liquor and alcoholic beverages (as defined in RSA 175:1) on the MacGregor Park property and the MacGregor Library property located north of East Broadway.**

I wish to point out that this Article has already been adopted by ballot under Article 8, Article 8 expanded it to include Hood Park, but I think we ought to have a vote on this Article since it is in there.

Mr. Porter moved to adopt the Article as read.

MR. HOBBSCH: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 14 as printed will say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Mr. Gerrish has moved that we go to Article 20, which is the budget Article.



saying, this was not from the Budget Committee. We had nothing to do with it. But I will say this to you, it was an Article that was put in by petition, such as any other Article, such as the Budget Committee being elected, which is a fine thing. I think people acted wisely in that area, and as far as this is concerned, there is no way whatsoever that it can be brought up on the floor, or raised, because it was an Article that was put in by petition, voted by the townspeople, and obviously most of them thought it was fair, or they wouldn't have voted it in. Now it doesn't mean that we think it's fair, and it doesn't mean you think it's fair, but when the people vote on something by ballot, there is nothing you can do about it short of another Town Meeting. That's it. You can't raise it from the floor, nor can you raise any Article that the Budget Committee did not put any money in for.

MR. PORTER: What I would like to ask, why was it written this way? There is nobody in their right mind . . .

MRS. DIMARZIO: You will have to ask the Selectmen, because they put it in.

MR. GERRISH: I can't answer your question straight, but I believe the Article was by petition to start with, which means, by law, we must put it in. I think the fault and the answer to your question will come out, and what I would like to do at this point is propose an amendment to Mrs. Casten's motion, and the amendment is that this meeting discuss the Selectmen's budget, line by line, which is the traditional way we talk about the budget, and I think if we go at it that way, perhaps we can get through it as quickly as ever.

MR. PORTER: In other words, have a line budget?

MR. GERRISH: I would like to discuss the budget as the budget details are printed in the Town Report, and I think we will get the answer to your question and the others coming up.

THE MODERATOR: Mr. Tompkins seconded the motion. Is there any discussion on the motion to amend?

MRS. DIMARZIO: I will say, so that we don't get into the same fiasco that we got into last year, that you're going to have to, whether you like it or not, act on the Budget Committee's budget. You can raise it, or lower it or throw it out, or do whatever you want with it, but you cannot act on the Selectmen's budget. The Budget Committee's budget is the legal budget for the Town of Derry.

MR. MODERATOR: I am not taking any ruling from Town Counsel. We are going to take up the Budget Committee's budget. I don't care what Town Counsel rules.

Now, any discussion on the amendment? And I might add, as far as that Article 10 goes, I will read it to you people.

**"Article 10. By petition: Do you favor a ceiling of \$15,000 per annum on each and every town official's salary?"**

The mere fact that you voted to favor doesn't mean it is binding on the Selectmen. If it had read: "shall", the Selectmen would be bound with the \$15,000 salary; then and only then would they be bound. Now, that's my opinion, and you can take it for what it's worth.

MR. CHARLES ZELL: Mr. Moderator, if that is true, at least I have heard by word of mouth from some of the officials of the Town that this decrease in salary has already taken place, and so it isn't a question of whether or not the Selectmen will do what the petition claims it should do, I think it is a fact that it has already been accomplished. Is that true or not?

MR. GERRISH: It is true that we have reduced the salaries of those Town officials to \$15,000 on advice of counsel, at least pending the outcome of this meeting.

MR. ZELL: Then we have already taken action, is that correct? Action has already been taken, but it can be reversed at this meeting?

MR. GERRISH: That is the advice that we have.

MR. ZELL: Counsel says that the Town Meeting could reverse this?

MR. GERRISH: I believe that is correct. Louie, is that correct?

MR. SOULE: Absolutely.

MR. ZELL: Would you mind telling us how to do that, Sir?

THE MODERATOR: Once again, I am going to disagree with Town Counsel. It cannot be reversed. I ruled. I checked the law last year; I have done it before. I respectfully submit to you that it cannot be reversed. This vote cannot be reversed. It's binding, but, however, my feeling is the mere fact that you favor it is not binding on the Selectmen.

All right, we are on the amendment that we take up the budget item by item, as we have in the past. Does everyone understand the question? It's on the amendment. I am going to, if we take it up item by item, we are going to take up the Budget Committee's budget. What the amendment is is that we take up the budget item by item on the Selectmen's budget, and I am going to rule that even if it's passed, that it's illegal. We are going to take up the Budget Committee's budget. If you want to amend your motion to take up the Budget Committee's budget, I will let you do so. You can withdraw your amendment.

MRS. CASTEN: Is it not true that even if we do vote for this, you have already decided, I am just making a comment right now, that we are going to take up the Budget Committee's budget? However, that does not, does not limit the Selectmen to making a motion to up the Budget Committee's budget by a certain amount of money, and that can be passed, is that correct? After this motion has been taken off the floor?

THE MODERATOR: That is correct.

MR. GERRISH: I don't agree with Mr. Stancik that we can't take up the Selectmen's budget, but I think that if we stay here much longer arguing about the difference, that it will get dark. I suggest that we take his suggestion of discussing the Budget Committee's budget. There are some amendments that have to be made anyway, and I think they can be proposed just as well in the Budget Committee's budget as in the Selectmen's budget.

THE MODERATOR: I agree with you. Will you withdraw your motion?

MR. GERRISH: Yes.

THE MODERATOR: Mr. Gerrish makes the motion that we take up the Budget Committee's budget, item by item. Mr. Tompkins seconds it. Any discussion? The question has been moved.

All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote, and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I asked the Moderator if he would allow me about three minutes to try and put the budget in perspective, if we can.

The budget was prepared by the Selectmen and the Town Manager with an objective to try to avoid any tax rate increases on the Town's portion of the taxes. We are attempting to maintain the existing level of services and increase the rate of road improvements. In addition, we want to continue developing the new sewer treatment plant, although perhaps a little more slowly than originally proposed. The Selectmen's budget, I hope we will eventually get to, if taken as a whole, would produce a tax rate of about \$10.37, as contrasted to \$10.54, which was last year's Town tax rate. There will be some motions to amend the budget as it goes along. I am sure many of you have read in the paper that the Town employees have gotten themselves together and did, in fact, come to the Board of Selectmen, asking for various changes in their pay plans, et cetera. As a result of this,



their spokesman spoke to me last night and agreed that the Town employees would accept the Board of Selectmen's proposal, which consisted of to adjust the pay scales of Town employees by twenty-five cents an hour, or ten dollars a week for salaried people; agreed to increase slightly the weekly insurance benefits while they are sick; agreed to increase the Town's contribution to the dependent cost coverage in the Blue Cross plan by one dollar per week, previously it has been one dollar per week; and it was agreed to change the carrier of the health plan, that is the accident and sickness plan that we have, from a private carrier to the Blue Cross plan.

Now, the cost of these things, as contrasted to what's already in the Selectmen's budget, is approximately \$16,000 a year.

Additionally, we will be recommending the postponing of Phase II Sewer Treatment Plant design for one year, and the conditions that we now have with our discharge permit with the EPA require that by June, 1976, we begin design, which is what Phase II would do. We feel that we can postpone any action on it at this Town Meeting, and it would result in a short delay in the final outcome, which is a new sewer plant, but it may well be postponed this year.

I am told by the Recreation Department that they will wish to change their budget slightly, and we moved the lighting improvements requested at Buckley Field.

There will be some other corrections, one of which is a calculation error in the budget, \$12,500. We believe that the land acquisition that was proposed at \$10,000 can be changed to \$3,000.

In addition, the Budget Committee, as a result of some advice that had been received after the budget was prepared, has asked and wants to include the expenditures and revenues from the Town's trust funds in this budget. Now, the expenditures amount to about \$50,000, which will be offset with revenues of the same amount. These will appear in the Alexander-Carr and related budgets.

And the last thing, we have, as you know, manpower kinds of programs going on; we will be asking that the amount in the budget be increased by \$42,000 for those which will be entirely offset by Federal funds of the same amount.

(Whereupon the Moderator proceeded going through the budget, item by item, beginning with the Town Officers' salaries.)

MR. GERRISH: I would move that the total be raised to \$98,638 for Town Officers' salaries.

THE MODERATOR: Mr. Gerrish has made a motion that the total amount proposed be upped to \$98,638 over the figure proposed by the Budget Committee, which was \$96,296. Did anybody second that?

MT. HOBBSCH: Seconded.

(Discussion ensued on whether to take up the Budget Committee's budget or the Selectmen's budget.)

MRS. DIMARZIO: I am only going to make note of the fact that in this budget, what we did was on salaries, we gave those on step, we allowed them to go through their steps, and those not on step, we gave them a 5% increase. Now, on the monies here, by the Selectman's budget, I also want to make note of the fact that in that Warrant Article, again, I repeat, it had nothing to do with us, but I am afraid you are going to have to more or less keep faith with the voters by keeping it at \$15,000, and by looking at those salaries you will see how far they exceed, some of them, the \$15,000. Now, until something can be done about it, I think you ought to keep it there, because you can always come back to the Budget Committee and ask for more money if that is the will of the people, but in accepting that \$98,638, I am probably beating a dead horse, you will probably vote it in, but you are allowing

this X amount of dollars to be spent by the Town Officials, whether they spend it or not, we won't know until the end of the year, but it makes that much more money to play around with and that much more money on your tax dollar.

THE MODERATOR: Any further discussion on the motion?

MR. ZELL: If this motion is passed, I would like to know if Town Counsel would state whether or not, if this motion is passed, either one, either budget is passed, whereby two of the salaries would exceed the limit as voted at the Town election, whether the salaries as listed here in either budget would be adhered to, or would they revert to the \$15,000 ceiling?

ATTORNEY SOULE: Whether we like it or not, this is a New England Town Meeting. That's what we're doing right now. People are sitting and discussing various sums of money that might or might not be appropriated. You are going to consider other matters. That is what a New England Town Meeting is all about. You're going back to the Seventeenth Century. That's what you're doing here today.

What happened election day is that the Selectmen, and it is my fault, if you want to attribute fault to it, the Selectmen put on the ballot the question as to whether or not there should be a \$15,000 limitation on salaries. RSA 39:3 requires that Selectmen, if presented with a petition with an Article with at least ten signatures, insert that Article in the Warrant. Now, it clearly did not belong on the ballot. However, that's where these ten people wanted it. In view of the existing statutes, the Selectmen felt compelled, morally as well as legally, to do it. We knew it had no effect, but that's what we were told to do; we did it.

Now, what we're doing here now, and it is clear as a bell, and you have done it from time immemorial, you have voted a budget on the floor of the Derry Town Meeting for operation of the Town, the amount of money that you will need to operate. It's not for me, I am a foreigner here, it's not for me to say whether you give the Town Manager and the other people \$15,000 or \$19,000. I am not going to get into that. It's not my job. You wouldn't want me to speak on that. I am saying that this is the time and place where, since the Seventeenth Century, people such as yourselves in various towns throughout New England, decided how much money they are going to appropriate for the purpose of running the Town.

Now, even assuming, which isn't so, believe me, but even assuming that the vote on March 4th or 5th, whatever the election day was, limited people to the salary of \$15,000 within this Town, and the Selectmen were willing to accept that vote, at least until today, as has been pointed out, the people, because of prior arrangements, were getting more than \$15,000 prior to that vote and were cut back to \$15,000 because the people of Derry had spoken. It said they wanted it limited to \$15,000. Incidentally, I agree with Joe in that it was probably an advisory thing rather than a direction, an absolute direction, but forget that for the moment. The point is that they didn't want to go against the wishes of the townspeople of Derry, because you said you wanted a \$15,000 limit, but it is also clear that one Town Meeting cannot bind another. This is just as much a Town Meeting as was your election on March 4th or 5th, whatever the date was, and you people have just as much right to talk and speak here and decide as any Town Meeting in the past has.

I wrote a brief once and it give, I think, the essence of Town Meetings, and I think it is germane to the issue, and I think it's attributable to Derry. I read the newspaper, and so I know a little bit about Derry. It's a poem by a fellow by the name of Trumbull. He was a Seventeenth Century poet, a New England poet, and I think you will see that it is applicable to the Town of Derry.



"The Town," it's talking about a Town Meeting now, a New England Town Meeting, where people come like you come here now, to discuss and argue the Town's problems, and it reads this way: It's entitled "The Town."

"The Town, our hero's scene of action,  
Had long been torn by feuds of faction,  
And as each party's strength prevails,  
It turned up different, heads or tails;  
With constant rattling, in a trice,  
Showed various sides, as oft as dice.  
As that famed weaver, wife to Ulysses,  
By night her day's-work picked in pieces,  
And though she stoutly did bestir her,  
Its finishing was ne'er the nearer;  
So did this town with ardent zeal  
Weave cobwebs for the public weal,  
Which when completed, or before,  
A second vote in pieces tore.  
They met, made speeches full long-winded,  
Resolved, protested and rescinded;  
Addresses signed; then chose committees  
To stop all drinking of Bohea teas;  
With winds of doctrine veered about,  
And turned all Whig committees out.  
Meanwhile our hero, as they head,  
In pomp the Tory faction led,  
Still following, as the 'Squire should please,  
Successive on, like files of geese.'"

The point is that this points out the turbulence of Town Meetings and what happens at Town Meetings, arguments and so forth. It's what it is, and it's what we are doing here today. You people have the authority to act on this budget. Whatever you want, you're going to vote on it.

(Thereupon discussion ensued concerning why voter checklists were not used.)

MR. CUTTER: Point of order on Article 10. I thought we passed over that, and I thought the ground rules said something to the effect that we would not reconsider anything when we moved on to the next Article. We did go through eleven, twelve, and we talked on thirteen, and we got up to twenty. Are we reconsidering Article 10?

THE MODERATOR: No, we are not considering Article 10. We are considering Article 20.

COLONEL PEARSON: Based on Town Counsel's ruling on Town Meetings being able to change the results of a voted ballot, a Warrant Article that was voted in by ballot, does this mean that we can re-elect Selectmen and change the other Articles that we voted in?

THE MODERATOR: First of all, let me point out to you, this is not another Town Meeting. This is a continuation of the Town Meeting of March 4th. This is not another Town Meeting, and I also want to point out to you, I read off the statute when we went through the procedure before we started, and I am going to read it off the you again.

RSA 40, and I am taking it right out, passed in 1971, it's still the law, it states: "Questioning a Vote. When another vote other than by ballot declared by the moderator or other officer presiding shall immediately and before any other business is begun, be requested in writing or orally be seven or more of the voters present. The moderator or officer presiding shall retake the vote by secret or Yes or No ballot."

Now, you cannot question anything that's already been voted on by ballot. I don't care what Town Counsel says. It says right here, "Other than by ballot;" that's the law. This is the State law.

However, I want to point out to you, it's my opinion that Article 10 was strictly advisory, because it said, "shall," it didn't say, "must." So, therefore, I think it's within the province to consider this Article the way the motion is made, and I so rule. I said, "favor," it didn't say, "shall." I said it had to be "shall." Then they would have been bound, and that would have been my ruling.

FROM THE FLOOR: Would it be in order to come up with a resolution at a later point in the meeting that the Selectmen not be bound by the passage of Article 10?

THE MODERATOR: No. Because I already told you that you cannot, that it has been passed, and you cannot reconsider it.

FROM THE FLOOR: I am not suggesting that it be reconsidered. I am suggesting that they not be legally bound to comply with it, other than as a suggestion, not as a request.

THE MODERATOR: That's my opinion, and I think you could make that later on.

MR. ROULEAU: I would like to find out just by a hand vote how many people there are in this hall right now here that make \$15,000 to \$20,000 a year, just by a hand vote.

THE MODERATOR: You're out of order. I'm sorry. There is a motion on the floor, and we are not going to have a vote until we dispose of it.

MRS. CASTEN: I move the question and urge everyone to vote, "Yes."

THE MODERATOR: The discussion isn't over yet. I don't think we have had adequate discussion.

(Thereupon discussion ensued on whether to take up the Budget Committee's budget or the Selectmen's budget.)

THE MODERATOR: Let me point out, it is not illegal to raise the budget. Anybody can raise the entire budget by ten percent, other than bond issues. He is not saying that we are going to adopt it. That's, in effect, what he is doing, but he is saying, "I want to raise the proposed budget that was proposed by the Budget Committee to \$98,638," but he can do that. It's not illegal. Again, let's look at it this way here, Ladies and Gentlemen' I did research. I did research on case law and there was no Supreme Court decision that I could find in New Hampshire, I couldn't find a Supreme Court decision in any other state that would give me a real clue, only the New Hampshire Supreme Court would be the one that would be binding as far as we are concerned, I could find no constitutional law. The only statutory law I found is the one that I read to you, RSA 40, section b.

Now, it is not logical to say that a handful of people can come in and say, "Well, I'll outvote 3,151 people." That isn't logic. Logic says no. This is the only thing that I am going to tell you, but I still feel that Article, the way it was written, was strictly advisory, and it is not binding on the Selectmen.

MRS. FREY: I have a question. It doesn't have to do with the budget, exactly. If that Article was not written correctly to force the Selectmen to adhere to the \$15,000 ceiling, then the Board of Selectmen will not—it is not necessary to increase the Board to five members. That was written the same way, and so was the one about the elected Budget Committee. Are those mandatory or not?

THE MODERATOR: In my opinion, they're not.

ATTORNEY SOULE: The Articles in respect to the Budget Committee and with respect to the number of Selectmen being increased from three to five, followed the statutory language. The statutes say if you want that, if you want a five-member Board of Selectmen, that the Article be put in on the ballot in the way we put it in, and it is clearly binding. The statute says so. The reason that the ballot vote, on election day, the reason the \$15,000 item



is not binding is because the statutes didn't say that that belonged on the ballot, as did belong on the ballot the five-member Board of Selectmen. The point is, and I am not going to—I am perhaps intruding a little bit in going beyond whatever little welcome I might have here, but I'd like to point out that it is a basic concept of Town Meetings that the only items to go on the ballots are those items which are prescribed to go on the ballot by the State Legislature. Zoning questions, do you want to rescind—do you want to do away with the Planning Board; it used to be that bond articles had to go on the ballot. The State Legislature said those things went on the ballot. When these things are not prescribed on the ballot, they belong essentially at the delivery at Town Meeting, and that's why the vote we had election day was advisory. It didn't mean anything, and we are not doing what we should do. You have got to raise money here, whatever amount it is, and I think you ought to go ahead and raise it, whatever the amount is.

THE MODERATOR: Anybody else have any discussion? This is the final speaker.

MRS. DIMARZIO: No. I, I think that what the gentleman in the bleachers was trying to bring out was the fact that, he asked how many made \$15,000, is the fact that what the Budget Committee considered when we took these salaries, I am not talking about the \$15,000, was the fact that there are quite a few people here in the Town who are not employed, and the unemployment, as far as I am concerned, can't go on too much longer, or that will run out, also.

Secondly, I disagree with Town Counsel, as I have in many areas. What he is saying now is that we don't have a Town Engineer, possibly, and we still have the same Budget Committee, possibly, and we don't have to have a five-man Board. Now, I think that we have to go by what Town Counsel is going to rule. He said one meeting doesn't bind another, so this meeting doesn't bind the other one. I am confused on the rulings here.

THE MODERATOR: The question on the floor is to increase the proposed Budget Committee's budget from \$96,296 to \$98,638, and the question has been moved.

Now, does everybody understand the question? All right.

All those in favor, say, "Aye;" those opposed "No."

The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Now, what is your pleasure on this item at this time? It has been increased to \$98,638. You voted for the increase. If you want to vote to adopt, somebody make the motion.

Mrs. Casten so moves, and it is seconded by Mr. Hobsch, that we adopt this amended budget figure of \$98,638.

MRS. DIMARZIO: I call for a secret ballot.

THE MODERATOR: All right. Nobody supported her, and there must be seven people if you want to vote by secret ballot.

MRS. DIMARZIO: I withdraw it.

THE MODERATOR: All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote, and I so declare.

(Whereupon the Moderator continued to go through the budget, item by item.)

MR. ROULEAU: I would like to make a motion to reduce the \$10,000 under "Selectmen's Office Expenses" by \$2,000.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion?

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: I think we have had adequate discussion. We are going to go to the question to reduce the item by \$2,000. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Noes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. MITCHELL: I move that we increase the amount of Town Officers' Expenses by \$2,340, so that the new total would read, \$82,760.

Seconded by Mrs. Frey.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion on the motion? No discussion. All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

(Whereupon the Moderator continued to go through the budget, item by item.)

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we accept Election Expenses as printed.

MR. MACGREGOR: Seconded.

(Discussion ensued.)

FROM THE FLOOR: Mr. Moderator, all we did on Town Officers' Expenses was vote on the amendment. We never voted to approve the total budget figure.

THE MODERATOR: You're right. Let's go back to that amount.

Mrs. Dimarzio, will you withdraw your motion?

MRS. DIMARZIO: Yes.

THE MODERATOR: Mrs. Frey, will you withdraw your second?

MRS. FREY: Yes.

THE MODERATOR: All right. Does anyone make the motion that we adopt that Article under Town Officers' Expenses as passed, \$82,760?

MRS. HEMEON: I so move.

Seconded by Mr. Mitchell.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. We are going to vote on the question to adopt the Town Officers' Expenses as amended to \$82,760. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Now, Mrs. Dimarzio, do you want to make a motion to adopt item 3 as printed, \$2,375?

MRS. DIMARZIO: I so move.

MR. MACGREGOR: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: All right. All those in favor of adopting that item as printed, say, "Aye;" those opposed, "no." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

(Whereupon the Moderator continued to go through the budget, item by item.)

JUDGE PILLSBURY: I would like to move we increase the amount of \$24,740 under "Municipal Court" to \$33,030.

MR. KORBY: Seconded.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. Does everyone understand the question? The question is, as I understand it, there was a motion made by Judge Pillsbury and seconded by Mr. Korby, to increase the appropriation of \$24,740 under Item 4, to \$33,030. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

JUDGE PILLSBURY: I move we adopt the appropriation of \$33,030.

MR. KORBY: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

(Whereupon the Moderator continued to go through the budget, item by item.)

MR. GERRISH: I would like to move that this item under "Town Hall and Other Town Buildings" be increased to \$46,514.

MR. TOMPKINS: Seconded.



(After discussion, the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will not entertain a motion to adopt this item with the increase.

MR. GERRISH: So moved.

Seconded by Mrs. Casten.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Social Security and Retirement.

MR. GERRISH: I would like to move that this item be increased to \$51,845. The extra \$245 is necessary to pay the Social Security on the additional overtime.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: All right. The motion has been made to increase this item to \$51,845. Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will not entertain a motion to adopt the amendment.

Mr. Gerrish so moved.

Seconded by Mr. Gorman.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is the Police Department.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

MR. GERRISH: I would like to make the motion to amend this item to \$322,917.

THE MODERATOR: All right. The motion has been made to increase that item from \$312,167 to \$322,917. Do I hear a second on that?

MRS. HEMEON: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Is there a motion to adopt it as amended;

Mr. Gerrish so moved.

MR. PORTER: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

(Whereupon the Moderator continued to go through the budget, item by item.)

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Forest Fires. What is your pleasure on this item?

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we adopt the item as proposed.

MR. THERIAULT: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. WILSON: I move we adopt Article 10 as printed.

MR. MACGREGOR: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Any discussion on that item under Insurance?

MR. GERRISH: I would like to amend that item to increase the amount to \$56,736. This is the additional insurance coverage that I spoke about earlier this afternoon.

MR. MACGREGOR: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The

amendment is adopted. I will not entertain a motion to adopt it as amended.

MR. GERRISH: So move.

MR. THOMPSON: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Planning and Zoning.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

MR. GERRISH: I move this item be amended to increase this item from \$9,552 to \$10,343.

MRS. CASTEN: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of the amendment say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. THERIAULT: I move we adopt the amendment.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Damages and Legal Expenses.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we accept Item 13, \$21,000.

MR. GONYER: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Civil Defense.

MRS. CASTEN: I move we adopt this item as printed, \$1,200.

MRS. JOHNSON: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: All right, the question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "no." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Health Associations.

MR. MACGREGOR: I move the item be adopted as printed.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Vital Statistics.

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we accept the item as printed.

Mrs. Dimarzio withdrew her motion and made a new motion to insert the item 16-2, "Trust Funds" in the amount of \$30,792. Seconded by Mr. Gerrish.

(Discussion ensued.)

Mr. Hobsch moved the question.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any further discussion? If not, I will put it to a vote. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will now entertain a motion to add the \$500 and adopt the figure of \$30,792, making a total of \$31,292 under this item.

MR. HOBSCHE: I so move.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will not move on to the Sewer Department.

Mr. Wilson moved to dispense with the reading of this item.

MRS. CASTEN: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I move that this item be increased to

\$71,800. This is the Selectmen's proposal plus the \$900 to cover the additional overtime.

MR. MACGREGOR: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare. I will now entertain a motion to adopt as amended.

Mr. Hobsch so moved.

Mr. Gerrish seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Care of Dump.

Mr. Wilson moved to dispense with the reading of this item.

Mr. Gerrish seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I move that we approve this item at \$27,731.

MRS. CASTEN: Seconded.

(Discussion ensued.)

Question moved.

THE MODERATOR: All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will now entertain a motion to adopt as amended.

MR. GERRISH: I so move.

MR. HOBSCHE: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now go on to Highway Maintenance.

Mr. Wilson moved to dispense with the reading of this item.

MR. MACGREGOR: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I would like to move that we approve this Article at \$196,631. This is one thousand dollars more for overtime.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will now entertain a motion to adopt as amended.

Mr. Wilson so moved.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any further discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor of adoption say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Street Lighting.

MR. THOMPSON: I move to adopt the item as printed.

MR. WILSON: I seconded it

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Highway General.

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we adopt the item as printed.

MRS. HEMMON: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Town Road Aid.

Mrs. Casten moved to accept the item as printed.

Mr. MacGregor seconded the motion.

THE MODERATOR: Is there any discussion? All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Libraries.

Mrs. Sabella moved to adopt as printed.

Mr. Barka seconded the motion.

THE MODERATOR: Is there any discussion? All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Old Age Assistance.

Mr. Barka moved to adopt as printed.

Seconded by Mr. Hobsch.

THE MODERATOR: Is there any discussion? All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Public Welfare.

Mr. Wilson moved to adopt as printed.

Mrs. Casten seconded the motion.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Land Acquisition.

MR. GERRISH: I move at this time we take up Article 15 under this item.

MR. THOMPSON: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Article 15 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the acquisition of land and/or easements west of Fordway near or adjacent to the Town dump, Fordway Wellfield, and sewer lagoons.**

What is your pleasure on this Article? Mr. Gerrish moves that we accept it as printed with an amendment.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

MR. GERRISH: I would like to move that the sum be set at \$3,000 for this Article.

MR. HOBSCHE: Seconded.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting the amendment say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I would like to make the motion that we adopt as amended.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now move on to the Recreation Department.

MR. WILSON: I move we dispense with the reading of this item.

MR. ZOLLA: Seconded.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

Mr. Cox moved that \$3,500 be included in the Recreation budget under 28-46, Senior Citizens, matching funds for their bus.

Seconded by Mrs. Dimarzio.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. The question is to increase that item by \$3,500. Does everybody understand the question? All right. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. MACGREGOR: I would move that we raise the total amount to \$77,873 for the Recreation budget for the year 1975.



THE MODERATOR: That's adding the \$3,500 in.

COL. PEARSON: Seconded

(Discussion ensued.)

MR. GERRISH: There are two trust funds involved here that I think we ought to get in. I am suggesting that we take them together. One of them is under 28-82 for the Alexander-Carr Playground, \$15,839. The next one is 28-83, a new account, MacGregor Park, \$2,770. I move these items be added to the Recreation budget.

MR. BARKA: Second it.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: This is on the amendment to adopt the two items, and the question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

(After the discussion the following ensued.)

MR. COX: Let me go through it once more, and I will try to go slow so that we can all understand it.

The original proposal by the Recreation Commission was \$138,836. That was after they talked to the Selectmen and had agreed to take some \$25,000 out of land acquisition to apply it towards the lighting project. Since that option is no longer available to us, the Commission has agreed to postpone the lighting project for another year, which is \$35,000 less than the \$131,836. Now, that comes out to \$96,836. The amendments that have been made since then are in addition to that amount. Thirty-five hundred dollars for the Senior Citizens, and \$15,839 for the Alexander-Carr Playground and \$2,770 for MacGregor Park.

THE MODERATOR: As I understand it now, there is a motion on the floor, but what Gerry is getting at, taking your budget figure proposed by the Selectmen, subtracting \$35,000, would give you \$96,836. Then you have the amendment to add \$3,500 and add your two items, that of \$15,839 and \$2,770, and come up with the figure of \$118,945.

MR. COX: Right.

THE MODERATOR: Mr. MacGregor, you made the motion; do you want to withdraw that motion?

MR. MACGREGOR: No, I do not want to withdraw that motion.

THE MODERATOR: Your motion is to adopt the figure of \$96,482, which consists of the figure proposed by the Budget Committee of \$74,373, plus the \$3,500 amended, plus the \$15,839 and the \$2,770.

MR. MACGREGOR: That is correct.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: I have gone back three or four times, and if you want to start all over again, you can vote it down, but let's get on with it.

Does everyone understand the question? All those in favor, say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Noes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

THE MODERATOR: Now, we will start all over again.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

MR. GERRISH: I would like to make a motion that we amend the Recreation budget to \$118,945.

MR. ZELL: I second it.

MR. WILSON: I would like to move this for a ballot vote.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: Before we proceed any further, I want the record to show that my understanding of the motion is to adopt the proposal of \$97,836, which means that Item 28-71, School Fields - Capital Improvements, be cut down \$35,000 to leave a figure of \$6,800, and then we are going to add the \$3,500

that was amended, and then we are going to add the item 28-82, \$15,839, and Item 28-82, \$2,770.23, the last two items being Trust Fund items, so that we come up with a total figure of \$118,945.

Now, does everybody understand where we are?

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: Mr. Wilson asked for a ballot vote. There have to be at least seven people to request it.

(Whereupon seven or more people requested a ballot vote.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. We will have a ballot vote. At the present time the motion is to adopt \$118,945, as proposed by Mr. Gerrish in his motion.

Now, if you want to adopt another budget, you can vote this down and then come back with another amendment.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The vote is on whether you are going to adopt the budget of \$118,945 for the Recreation Department that we painfully went through and whoed each item and what category you were going to vote on. If you don't understand that, there is nothing that I can do to make you understand.

(Ballot vote.)

THE MODERATOR: The result of the ballot vote is as follows: Yes - 129; No - 82; Total - 221.

The "Yesses" have it. It is a vote, and I so declare. The budget for the Recreation Department is \$118,945.

The Moderator then moved to the next item in the budget, Water Department.

MR. GERRISH: I want to point out to you that in the figure proposed by the Selectmen that there is a typographical error in the amount, and if you want to change it, it should read "\$170,870."

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we accept the figure of \$168,920 proposed by the Budget Committee.

MR. WILSON: Second it.

MR. GERRISH: I move we amend it to \$170,870.

MR. HOBSCHE: Second it.

THE MODERATOR: Mr. Gerrish made the motion to amend it to \$170,870, seconded by Mr. Hobsch. Any discussion?

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare. I will not entertain a motion to adopt this item as amended.

MR. GERRISH: I so move.

Seconded by Mr. Hobsch.

THE MODERATOR: If there is no further discussion, we will put it to a vote. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote, and I so declare.

The motion has been made by Mr. Gerrish to move to Article 16. Do I hear a second?

MRS. CASTEN: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Article 16 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to retain the Town's membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.**

What is your pleasure on this item?

MR. GERRISH: I move we adopt the Article as printed.

MR. BRODIE: Second it.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: I think we have had adequate discussion. The motion is to adopt Article 16 as printed. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare, and Article 16 is adopted.



The Moderator then moved back to the budget beginning with Regional Associations.

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we accept the item of \$5,232 for the REgional Associations.

MR. BARKA: Seconded.

Mr. Paine moved to amend the figure by adding the figure of \$9,500.

MR. BARKA: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion on the motion to add \$9,500? All right. We will put it to a vote. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will now entertain a motion that we adopt the \$5,327 figure as had been amended.

MR. GERRISH: I so move.

Seconded by Mr. Brodie.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

The next item is Matching Funds.

MR. WILSON: I move we accept it as printed.

MR. BARKA: I second it.

Affirmative vote.

MR. MACGREGOR: I would like to make the motion that this meeting adjour at six o'clock and reconvene at seven thirty this evening.

(No second.)

THE MODERATOR: Colonel Pearson made the motion to accept the items of 31-1 through 55-35.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. Let's take them one at a time, beginning with Headstart.

What is your pleasure on that item?

MRS' DIMARZIO: Headstart has been transferred to the school budget.

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we accept the 38 series as printed.

MR. THOMPCKINS: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The motion has been made and seconded that we accept the 38 series, Payments on Debts. The Headstart item has already been taken care of. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote, and I so declare.

The next item is Interest on Debts. Will someone make the motion to amend that misprint?

MR. GERRISH: So moved.

Seconded by Mr. MacGregor.

THE MODERATOR: All those in favor of correcting that misprint, so that the item will now read "\$45,454" say "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will now entertain a motion to accept that item as amended.

Mrs. Dimarzio so moved.

Seconded by Mr. Gerrish.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Interest on Temporary Loans;

MR' GERRISH: I move to accept the item as printed.

Seconded by Mr. Barka.

Affirmative Vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is emergency Employment.

MR. GERRISH: I move we amend this item to \$45,000. This will reflect the Manpower programs now going on, plus those we

believe will come along during the year.

MR. BARKA: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: We will now move on to the Conservation Commission. That item is dead because the Budget Committee did not recommend it and it's not in the State's budget.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Post Office Building.

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we accept the next two items, 44-1, Post Office Building and 45-1 Capital Reserve - Town Land.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Parking Lots, which is Article 24. I will now entertain a motion to go to Article 24.

Mr. Gerrish so moved.

Second by Mrs. Dimarzio.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: Article 24 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw a sum not to exceed \$10,000 from the Capital Reserve Parking Lot Fund and expend the same for the purpose of developing and paving parking lots, and pass any vote relating thereto.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MR. MACGREGOR: I move we accept the Article as printed.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. Any further discussion? All those in favor of adopting this Article as printed say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now go back to the budget, Highway Subsidy. Mr. Gerrish moved to accept item 47-I, Highway Subsidy and item 48-I Treatment Plant Design Phase I, as printed.

Seconded by Mr. Wilson.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Treatment Plant Design Phase II, which is a Warrant Article. The Selectmen wish to withdraw that Article, and we will allow them to do so.

I will now entertain a motion to strike the figure of \$210,000 under that item.

Mr. Wilson so moved.

Seconded by Mr. Barka.

Affirmative vote.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. The next item is Ambulance.

MR. MCGRATH: I make the motion to increase Article 50-I, Ambulance, from the present \$105,304 to \$112,720, which will reflect the increase in Retirement Insurance Benefits, which the other town departments have received, and twenty-five cents an hour increase on fifty-six hours, which the Ambulance personnel work.

Seconded from the floor.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of the amendment to this Article say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Noes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I move that we accept the figure of \$110,569 under this item.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. The question has been moved. All those in favor of the amendment to increase the figure to

\$110,569 say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

(After discussion, the following ensued.)

MR. GORMAN: We have not voted to adopt 50-1. We only voted on the amendment.

THE MODERATOR: All right. We will go back to Article 50-1 as amended.

MR. GORMAN: I move to adopt the article as amended.

Seconded by Mr. Gerrish.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next item is Bicentennial Celebration. This is a Warrant Article that has already been passed.

We will now go to Revenue Sharing.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

Mr. Katsakiores made the motion to remove \$50,000 from the Revenue Sharing account and apply it to any particular budget, the Police Department budget, and the \$50,000 to be expended at the will of the Selectmen, at the wishes of the Selectmen, for these articles that are represented under Article 23.

Seconded by Mr. Wilson.

(Discussion ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of the motion made by Mr. Katsakiores say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Noes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Mr. Gerrish made the motion that we take up Article 23, which involves this Revenue Sharing item.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: Article 23 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the revenue sharing fund and the revenue sharing surplus established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated below and further, to authorize the Selectmen to take any other actions hereon:**

So that there will be no question, I will now entertain a motion to adopt the Revenue Sharing figure of \$248,300.

Mr. Gerrish so moved.

Seconded by Mr. Barka.

Affirmative vote.

MR. GERRISH: I move at this point to adopt the total budget figure of \$2,621,064.

MR. HOBBSCH: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GORMAN: I now move that the Town reconsider the adopted budget figure of \$2,621,064 and hope you vote "No."

MR. BARKA: Seconded.

THE MODERATOR: Any discussion? The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Noes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we accept the Revenue Items as corrected.

MR. FERLAND: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: We will now take up Article 17, unless somebody wants to take up some other Article.

Article 17 reads as follows:

**To see if the Town will accept the offer of 6.25 acres of land from Gilbert Hood at the northeast corner of Perley and Peabody Roads bounded on the north and east by Coburn Road for the future development of municipal buildings and to develop plans for its use within three years as well as commence development of the property within six years.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we accept the Article as printed.

MR. WILSON: Seconded.

(Discussion ensued.)

MR. GERRISH: I move to amend Article 17 to read as follows:

**"To see if the Town will accept the offer of 6.25 acres of land from Gilbert Hood at the northeast corner of Perley and Peabody Roads bounded on the north and east by Coburn Road for the future development of municipal buildings."**

Seconded by Mr. Barka.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The amendment is to drop that part of the Article that says, "and to develop plans for its use within three years as well as commence development of the property within six years."

The questions has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

I will now entertain a motion to accept the Article as amended.

Mr. Gerrish so moved.

Seconded by Mr. Wilson.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: All right. The question has been moved. All those in favor say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now proceed to Article 18. Article 18 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available to the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we adopt the Article as printed.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded. Affirmative vote.

MR. KIERSTAD: I move we take up Article 31 at this time.



MR. ZOLLA: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: Article 31 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town of Derry will authorize the New Hampshire Housing Commission to operate a Leased Housing program in the Town of Derry.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

Mr. Brodie then read the following resolution and made the following motion:

Proposed Motion Re Article 31

Derry Annual Meeting, 1975

WHEREAS, there is a serious shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations at rents which Elderly and Low-Income persons can afford and that such persons are forced to occupy substandard dwelling accommodations; and

WHEREAS, The General Court of the State of New Hampshire has enacted Chapter 204-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated establishing the New Hampshire Housing Commission; and

WHEREAS, Section 9 of the Act provides that the Commission shall not operate without the consent of the local authority of a municipality; namely, the Town of Derry Housing Authority; and

WHEREAS, said Section 9 provides that consent of the local authority be given for each project; and

WHEREAS, said Section 9 provides that the provisions thereof shall not apply to any locality unless the local authority has, by resolution approved the application of such provisions to such locality; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 8 of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the United States of America, acting through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development is authorized to enter into Annual Contributions Contract with public housing agencies pursuant to which such agencies may enter into contracts to make assistance payments to owners;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is moved as follows:

THAT the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Derry for a period of five (5) years commencing on the date of execution of the Annual Contributions and Contract.

THAT the application of the provisions of Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, to the Town of Derry Housing Authority is approved.

THAT said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, under Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof; (a) existing standard housing (b) rehabilitation housing; (c) newly constructed housing; the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed one hundred (100) units.

MR. TOMPKINS: Seconded.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 31 as amended say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Standing vote requested from the floor.

THE MODERATOR: All right. All those in favor will stand and be counted.

(Standing vote.)

THE MODERATOR: The total in favor is 74.

Those opposed will now stand. It's obvious, the Yeses have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MRS. CASTEN: I move we take up Article 28.

MR. MCDERMOTT: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: Article 28 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MRS. CASTEN: I move we adopt this article as printed.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next Article is Article 21. Article 21 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at a public auction any real estate acquired through deeds from the Collector of Taxes or as reimbursement for assistance furnished to citizens, providing that in the case of tax deeded real estate the previous owner, or his or her heirs, if known, or its successors or assigns in the case of a corporation, shall have first opportunity to purchase the same without requirement of a public auction, and pass any vote relating thereto.**

What is your pleasure on this article?

MRS. DIMARZIO: I move we adopt Article 21 as printed.

MR. HOBBSCH: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: The next article we have is Article 22. Article 22 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer under the provision of RSA 33:7, as amended, to borrow, in anticipation of taxes, such sums as are necessary for the operation of the Town, and to set the rates, effect the issuance of notes, and to otherwise negotiate for the sale of notes to be paid within the present fiscal year.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MR. GORMAN: I move we adopt the Article as printed.

MRS. DIMARZIO: Seconded.

Affirmative vote.

THE MODERATOR: We will now go to Article 25. Article 25 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to designate as Town Forest the parcel of land known as Tax Map 6-102 located on the Olsen Road at Hubbard Hill, being 25 acres, more or less, presently the property of the Town; said Town forest to be managed by the Conservation Commission as open space for residents of the Town of Derry.**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MR. HOBBSCH: I move we accept it as printed.

MR. MITCHELL: Seconded.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 25 as printed say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now go to Article 26. Article 26 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to prepare an application for the Community Development discretionary fund Block Grant program of the Housing and Community development Act of 1974 (Public Law 93-383.)**

What is your pleasure on this Article?

MR. TOMPKINS: I move we adopt this Article as printed.

MR. BRODIE: Seconded.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 26 as printed say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now go to Article 27.

MRS. CASTEN: I move we adopt Article 27 as printed without reading.

MRS. SABELLA: Seconded.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 27 as printed say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Noes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

MR. GERRISH: I have been pressed into service to read Article 29. Article 29 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 29.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution:

**WHEREAS,** certain areas of Derry are subject to periodic flooding from brooks, lakes and streams, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

**WHEREAS,** relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

**WHEREAS,** it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floor plain areas having special flood hazards; and

**WHEREAS,** this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, 156A.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests the Town Engineer, or other appropriate official, with the responsibility, authority and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and Local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify

flood plain or mudslide areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.

3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

What is your pleasure on this Article?

Mr. Quimby moved to adopt Article 29 as printed.

MR. GERRISH: Seconded.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 29 as printed, say "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

Mr. Quimby moved to adopt Article 30 without reading.

Seconded by Mr. MacDonald.

(After discussion the following ensued.)

THE MODERATOR: The question has been moved. All those in favor of adopting Article 30 as printed say, "Aye;" those opposed, "No." The "Ayes" have it. It is a vote and I so declare.

We will now go to Article 32. Article 32 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 32.** To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Are there any committees to report?

(Negative response.)

THE MODERATOR: Article 33 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 33.** To appoint any necessary committees on any article embraced in this Warrant.

I don't think there is any such animal today.

Article 34 reads as follows:

**ARTICLE 34.** To transact any other business that may lawfully come before this meeting.

Is there any further business to come before this meeting? If not, all those in favor of moving to adjourn will stand.

(Whereupon, at seven twenty-five p.m. on March 15 1975, the Annual Town Meeting for the Town of Derry was adjourned.)

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# REPORTS OF DEPARTMENTS AND COMMITTEES

## TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

The biggest change for the year 1975 was moving the Town Offices to the corner of Crystal Avenue and Broadway in the remodeled old U.S. Post Office. While these quarters are anything but spacious, it did provide a more convenient and increased lobby area for the public. The separation of the Town Offices and District Court also eliminated the hallway crowding on court days and allowed the expansion of the District Court into a more adequate office area. Now a second Courtroom and two attorney-client conference and waiting rooms are also available. Later in the year the Selectmen allowed the Chamber of Commerce to use one of the front offices for a food stamp issuing office and the other was turned over to the Rockingham Community Action Program for an office for their programs in the Derry Area.

The Town staff has not been increased in 1975 although the Humane Officer position was made a full-time job as of April 1st. Emile Bienvenue's retirement as Building Inspector brought to a close a long and distinguished career in public service for this former Selectman. The Town Manager appointed James Daley to succeed Mr. Bienvenue in May and Jim already has made his mark assisting builders and citizens alike to meet the standards of the Town's B.O.C.A. code.

In order to try to increase Town services without new personnel, the Town turned to the Federal Government's Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (Manpower Title VI & II) and filled seven jobs as follows:

1. A custodian's helper at Town Hall
2. A carpenter at the Highway Department
3. A laborer in the Highway Department
4. A Secretary in the Town Engineer's Office
5. An Engineering Associate to help the Town Engineer
6. & 7. Two Assessor trainees in the Assessor's Office

These latter two Manpower employees were used to inspect every parcel of property in Derry to ensure that the buildings and improvements shown on the tax card were the same as those on the property.

The Town Engineer's Secretary and Engineering Associate positions added under the Manpower program in 1975 represent the first full staff assistance for the Town Engineer since he was hired in December 1972. It is hoped that these positions can be absorbed into the Town's budget in 1976. Additional Title I

Manpower work experience trainees have been employed by the Town in the Water Department, Recreation Department and Highway Department. A \$15,275. summer youth employment program using Manpower funds put over 39 local youths to work for public agencies for up to 234 hours during the summer. Considerable worthwhile maintenance was accomplished as was recreation program supervision. In addition, these disadvantaged youths received the minimum wage for their efforts. The Town Manager serves as the Chairman of the Rockingham Stratford Manpower Planning Advisory Council.

The Highway Department's major projects included the total rebuilding of the section of Pond Road from the Beaver Lake dam to Chester Road; the reconstruction of English Range Road from its intersection with Bypass No. 28 to Pingree Road; the completion of improvements to a section of Warner Hill on the back side (eastside) of the summit; and the reconstruction of an additional section of Tsienneto Road using some Town Road Aid funds. A smaller hazard elimination project was completed on Fordway extension, 38,000 feet of deteriorated Town roadway was rejuvenated using a heater scarifier; 44,000 feet of roadway was sealed and 4,800 feet of roadway was overlaid with hot top. The improved riding surfaces on these roads greatly benefited motorists and the maintenance effort also protected the roadway surface from winter damage as well as extended the life of the pavement.

The Water and Sewer Department continued its program of replacing old water lines to eliminate dead ends and reduced sized sections of water main in order to improve water service pressure and fire flow within the Town's water service area. An example is the elimination of three dead end water lines on Oak and Grove Streets with a tie in between those lines and the six inch main in Birch Street. Another project was a new 8' cast iron pipe in Rollins Street from Franklin Street to Hood Park with a further extension down Manning Street for future connection to Broadway. The Water crew also continued its program of replacing old meters with new ones and adding outside readers. They also worked in the fall to replace galvanized pipe services from the main to the corporation stop at the property line with copper pipe. The old galvanized lines have developed leaks that are costly in terms of lost water and expensive repairs. After an odor problem in the spring caused by a toxic discharge, the



Town's Sewage Treatment Lagoons have operated well the rest of the year. The work on the new main Sewer pumping station progressed well in 1975 and the station should be fully operational before the March 1976 Town Meeting.

The Town Manager spent a lot of time working with the State's Office of Industrial Development in an effort to publicize the availability of industrial sites in Derry. With the help of the State's personnel we have had contacts with a number of potential industries. A Professional and Industrial Association was formed in Derry in 1975 and this group is working to promote industrial development in Town. They sponsored and financed the sign at the entrance to the State's Derry Industrial Park on Route No. 28. The Town Manager works closely with industrial building owners and their representatives to try to locate space for new industries which want to rent space.

The Town Manager serves on the State Park Department's Frost Homestead Committee which worked to get the Homestead renovated and open to the public in July 1975. The State Park's crew did a good job restoring the home to its 1900 floorplan. Some 1,000 visitors toured the home over the summer to view the turn of the century style furniture, wallpaper and fixtures that were collected and placed in the home by the State and the Committee.

At the direction of the Board of Selectmen, the Town Manager worked with consultants for the Nutfield Heights non-profit Corporation to develop a Housing Assistance Plan for the Town. This plan for rent subsidized housing units was submitted to the H.U.D. area office in the fall and recently approved. It is required to establish the need for the additional elderly housing units that Nutfield Heights plans to apply for in Derry. The Derry Housing Authority also submitted an application for 30 units of rent supplement housing for low income families through the State Housing Commission. No decision has been received from H.U.D. on that application.

Throughout the year the Town Manager works closely with the Town's insurance broker to ensure adequate coverage and proper processing of insurance matters. Because of changes in rates and the steady increase of the value of Town-owned buildings and equipment, insurance costs are on the rise. Some insurance rates are tied to payroll expenditures which also keep increasing. For these reasons it is important to keep a constant eye to ways to reduce the Town's exposure to insurance claims and to get the lowest possible premium rates available. Several premium rebates were received in 1975 due to low claims experience in prior years.

The Town Manager assists Overseer of the Poor, Selectman Ernest Gaines in the administration of Town Aid to those residents of a year or longer who fall on hard times. This involves frequent contacts with the State Welfare and Food Stamp certification office in Salem since the Town has no caseworker and no one trained for this work. Temporary assistance is given to those who are between jobs or waiting for food stamps or other assistance from the State Division of Welfare.

Employee relations is an important part of the Town Manager's job and will become more so now that New Hampshire has adopted a law that provides for the organization of collective bargaining units by groups of 10 or more Town employees. The uniform administration of personnel policies between Departments and the handling of collective bargaining sessions will become a significant portion of the Manager's responsibilities. In 1975 the Town changed over to a Blue Cross/Blue Shield health insurance program. This conversion involved meetings, memos and considerable clerical effort.

The Town Manager represents the Town with several state and

regional organizations such as the New Hampshire Industrial Agents, the New Hampshire Municipal Association and the New England Municipal Center. These organizations have semi-annual, quarterly or bi-monthly meetings with programs that can benefit the Town.

While the Town Manager doesn't attend all these meetings, he did speak on a panel at the fall N.H.M.A. conference; is on the steering committee for the N.E.M.C. Human Services Demonstration project and was moderator on a panel discussion on computer usage in local government co-sponsored by U.N.H. and the New Hampshire Municipal Association. The Town also participated in the Pinkerton Academy Career Day / Job Fair in the spring.

Basically the Town Manager must be a jack of all trades who can keep a multitude of projects and programs going for the Town under the direction of the Board of Selectmen and with the assistance of the Town Officials, Department Heads and Town employees. Individual and group efforts on behalf of the Town, by paid and unpaid Town officials, have been outstanding in 1975. The degree of dedication to "getting the job done" has made the job of Derry's Town Manager most rewarding in spite of the numerous setbacks and frustrations that are inherent in such a position.

We did act as a distributor for seedling trees sold by the State Forestry Dept. We plan to do this again as this is a good way to help replace some of the trees that are lost each year.

We passed a resolution opposing the sub-division of significant wetlands into residential lots but we have not yet completed the listing of significant wetlands.

We looked into three Dredge and Fill applications although we missed three others due to the short time allowed for response.

In the coming year, we hope to complete the significant wetlands inventory and create a 'mini-park' along Bever Brook between Birch Street and the B&M railroad bridge.

# WARRANT FOR 1976 TOWN MEETING

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in town affairs:

Voters in District No. 1 are hereby notified to meet at the Veterans Memorial Hall in said district, and voters of District No. 2 are hereby notified to meet at the East Derry Fire House in said district, on the second day of March, 1976, at seven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the articles required to be voted on by official ballot (Articles 1 through 6). By vote of the Selectmen, the polls for the meeting will remain open from seven o'clock in the forenoon until eight o'clock in the afternoon, and as much longer thereafter as the Town, at the opening of the meeting, may vote.

All voters are further notified to meet at one o'clock in the afternoon on the thirteenth day of March, 1976, at the Grinnell School Auditorium to act on all other articles in this warrant.

### ARTICLE 1.

To elect Selectmen, Budget Committee Members, Library Trustees, Trustee of the Trust Funds, and other necessary Town officers.

### ARTICLE 2.

By Petition: Do you favor the continuation of the Town Manager plan as now in force in this Town?

### ARTICLE 3.

By Petition: To see if the Town of Derry will vote to rezone to retail business the area 200 feet back on either side of Rte. 102 from Pond Road to English Range Road on Chester Road, by amending Article I, Section 1.100, and adding Section 1.190.

*(The Planning Board disapproves adoption of this amendment.)*

### ARTICLE 4.

By Petition: To see if the Town will vote to change the zoning classification of the following described land from general residence zone to retail business zone, said land being described as follows: Tax Map 30, Lots 101, 102, 103, 104, 105, 172, 173, 174, 205, 206, 207, 208. These lots include all land which borders on the Northerly and Southerly lines of East Broadway from the intersection of Rte. 28 (Crystal Avenue and Birch Street) Easterly to Marlboro Street and Park Avenue.

*(The Planning Board disapproves adoption of this amendment.)*

### ARTICLE 5.

By Petition: To see if the Town of Derry will vote to amend the Zoning Map and Zoning Ordinance by changing the zoning classification of the following land from Residential to Retail Business; Beginning at the intersection of Wyman Street and West Broadway, thence running in a Southwesterly direction on a line parallel to West Broadway and following along the Northerly side 200 feet back, as far as the Londonderry border, designated by a stone marker, which takes in an area of frontage on West Broadway of approximately 900 feet more or less.

*(The Planning Board disapproves adoption of this amendment.)*

### ARTICLE 6.

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for

expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident sixty-five years of age up to seventy-five a five thousand dollar exemption; a resident seventy-five years of age up to eighty, a ten thousand dollar exemption; a resident eighty years of age or older, a twenty thousand dollar exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least five years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than seven thousand dollars or combined income with spouse of less than nine thousand dollars; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of thirty-five thousand dollars.

### ARTICLE 7.

By Petition: Do you favor the continuance of the office of Town Engineer as presently existing?

### ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, including Town Road Aid apportionment "A" and "B" for building and repairing bridges, for the police department, for the Derry District Court, for hydrant maintenance, for street lighting, for salaries of town officials, for the expenses of the town buildings, for support of the libraries, for state and county taxes, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for the Greater Salem Mental Health Clinic, for the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission, for playground purposes and for band concerts, for participation in state and federal programs, for ambulance service, and for all necessary charges arising in said town and pass any vote relating thereto.

### ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction and convey any real estate acquired through deeds from the Collector of Taxes or as reimbursement for assistance furnished to citizens, providing that in the case of tax dedeed real estate the previous owner, or his or her heirs, if known, or its successors or assigns in the case of a corporation, shall have first opportunity to purchase the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

### ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer under the provisions of RSA 33:71, as amended, to borrow in anticipation of taxes such sums as are necessary for the operation of the Town, and to set the rates, effect the issuance of notes, and to otherwise negotiate for the sale of notes to be paid within the present fiscal year.

### ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the revenue sharing fund and the revenue sharing surplus established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated below and further to authorize the Selectmen to take any other actions hereon:

**ARTICLE 12.**

By Petition: To see if the Town will apply for a Community Development Block grant under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, and should such a grant be made, that a percentage of the funds be used to reduce the number of substandard housing units in Derry.

**ARTICLE 13**

To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Park and Recreation Commission. Henceforth, the Park and Recreation Commission's functions to be exercised by the Board of Selectmen.

**ARTICLE 14.**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw a sum not to exceed \$10,000 from the Capital Reserve Parking Lot Fund and expend the same for the purpose of developing and paving parking lots, and pass any vote relating thereto.

**ARTICLE 15.**

To see if the Town will vote to permit the town's ambulance service to participate in a mutual aid assistance program with area towns and cities which can provide mutual aid assistance in return.

**ARTICLE 16.**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw a sum not to exceed \$13,000. from the ambulance Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new ambulance.

**ARTICLE 17.**

To see if the Town will vote to either (1) discontinue the following highways, or (2) discontinue as open highways and make subject to gates and bars the following highways:

- (a) That portion of Hemlock Spring Road from the Auburn Town line, southerly 1100 feet.
- (b) The highway leading from Tyrell's Corner northerly to the Londonderry Turnpike.
- (c) That portion of Madden Road from the Londonderry Town Line, easterly 300 feet.
- (d) That portion of Gamache Road from a point 2100 feet easterly of Kendall Pond Road to Fordway Extension.
- (e) That portion of the old Poor Farm Road from Bowers Road to the present westerly end of pavement on Strawberry Hill Road approximately 1100 feet southwest of the intersection of Strawberry Hill Road and Windham Road.
- (f) All parts of the old Poor Farm Road between Windham Road and Silver Street, that are not within the present right-of-way of any other approved highway.
- (g) That portion of Miltimore Road from Frost Road, northerly, to a point 1000 feet south of the southernmost intersection of Craven Terrace and Miltimore Road.
- (h) The highway leading from a point on the Old Chester Road about 90 feet north of East Derry Road, northeasterly to a point on Young Road about 500 feet southeast of the intersection of Old Chester Road and Young Road.

(i) The highway leading from five corners at the intersection of Beaver Lake Road, Old Chester Road and Cross Road to its intersection with Adams Pond Road and Walnut Hill Road.

(j) That portion of Mill Road from Island Pond Road, southerly 3600 feet.

(k) The highway which leads from a point on Kilrea Road approximately 2800 feet easterly of the intersection of Kilrea Road and Stark Road to a point on Mill Road approximately 2800 feet northeasterly of the intersection of Mill Road and Stark Road.

(l) Jackman Road from Drew Road to the abandoned railroad near Leavitt Brook.

(m) Sheldon Road from the abandoned railroad near Cunningham Brook to Willard and Gail O'Brien's driveway approximately 3000 feet south of the intersection of Sheldon Road and Hampstead Road.

(n) The highway leading from a sharp curve on Drew Road approximately 1750 feet northeast of Drew Brook, easterly to the Hampstead town line.

(o) Hall Village Road from Walnut Hill Road, northerly to the Chester town line.

(p) Waterman Hill Road from Walnut Hill Road, northerly to the Chester town line.

(q) The highway leading from the intersection of Damaron Road and Walnut Hill Road northerly to the Chester town line.

**ARTICLE 18.**

By Petition: To see if the Town will vote to acquire by purchase or eminent domain the land and buildings owned by the John B. Sullivan Family Trust, this property being known as Map 5, Lot 46, on the Derry Tax Maps, and to fund such acquisition by appropriating \$25,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund and by authorizing the Selectmen to apply for, negotiate, and do all things necessary to obtain and expend therefor funds from Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, U.S. Dept. of Interior, the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and/or other charitable federal and state agencies.

**ARTICLE 19.**

By Petition: To see if the Town of Derry will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$50,000 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the acquisition of land and/or buildings which will be used as a "Lasting Reminder" of our Bicentennial as park property for public uses. Said fund to be administered by the Trustee of Trust Funds and to pass any vote relating thereto.

**ARTICLE 20.**

By Petition:  
 WHEREAS, the Town of Derry is having serious problems with its sewer system; and  
 WHEREAS, the rapid addition of many units of apartments over a short period of time will severely aggravate the sewer system problems; and  
 WHEREAS, the taxpayers of the Town of Derry will be required to fund the massive improvements to the sewer system brought on even more rapidly by the uncontrolled increase of apartment buildings;  
 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby requires that the Town of Derry or any agent thereof, shall not issue building permits for more than twenty-five individual apartment units to any one person, group, or corporation, or for any one project, in any one calendar year, except the Nutfield Heights elderly housing project is specifically



excluded from this restriction.

The above resolution is intended to restrict the number of individual dwelling units constructed in any apartment project, except the Nutfield Heights elderly housing project, to a maximum of twenty-five per year.

ARTICLE 21.

By Petition: The Selectmen shall not appoint an individual to any Town Board or Commission who has economic interests which will be in substantial conflict with the proper exercise of the official duties and powers of that office.

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent town meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such federal, state or other assistance as may be available for municipal purposes including but not being limited to the design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system as provided in RSA 33:7-b and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$297,000 for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. S1251 et seq.) and will qualify the town for federal funds, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33U.S.C. S1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 252 thereby authorizing the Selectmen to perform duties and exercise powers over sidewalks and sewers.

ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take any and all such action as may be necessary to acquire whatever easements and lands as are required to comply with NPDES Permit No. 0100056, initially issued by the Environmental Protection Agency on April 9, 1975, under the provisions of P.L. 92-500, with an expiration date of June 1, 1977. Further, the Selectmen are hereby authorized to employ whatever statutory provisions, including RSA 31:92-a, as are deemed necessary or desirable in order to secure the easements and lands required for the project.

ARTICLE 26.

WHEREAS, that there continues to exist within the state a serious shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations at rents which elderly and low income persons can afford, and that

such persons are forced to occupy substandard dwelling accommodations; and

WHEREAS, the General Court of the State of New Hampshire has enacted Chapter 204-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated establishing the New Hampshire Housing Commission; and

WHEREAS, RSA 204-A:9 provides that the Commission shall not operate without the consent of the governing body of a municipality; namely, the Derry Town Meeting; and

WHEREAS, said RSA 240-A:9 provides that consent of the governing body must be given for each project; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the United States of America, acting through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, is authorized to enter into annual contributions contracts with public housing agencies pursuant to which such agencies may enter into contracts to make assistance payments to owners;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Town Meeting and the Town of Derry as follows:

That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Derry.

That said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, under Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof: (a) existing standard housing 30 dwelling units; (b) rehabilitated housing 20 dwelling units; (c) newly constructed housing 100 dwelling units; the total number of dwelling units authorized by this and all previous authorizations shall not exceed 150 dwelling units.

ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to remove the sum of \$25,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund for improvements to the Adams Memorial Building and place it in the Town's general fund.

ARTICLE 28.

To hear the reports of Town Officers, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 29.

To appoint any committee necessary on any article included in this warrant.

ARTICLE 30.

To transact any other business that may lawfully come before this meeting.

## 1975 TOWN ENGINEER REPORT

During the first half of the year the Town Engineer continued to work without assistants, the 1975 Engineering budget being cut by Town Meeting to about one half of its 1974 amount. In April, authorization was granted to obtain certain surveying and drafting work using a private company. A secretary trainee was provided by the Federal work program CETA in June, and the position was made more permanent in October. In July, a part-time trainee was likewise provided and in September an Engineering Associate was provided. The wages of all 1975 Engineering Department assistants were paid for by the Federal Government at no cost to the Town except for expenses. The Town Engineer spent considerable time during the year to obtain approvals for this Federal assistance, to train the personnel and to justify, to critics, their need. Additionally, obtaining help this way did not allow the Engineer to make realistic plans for future work nor to set goals or objectives due to staff uncertainties. An Engineering Department filing system was initiated and hopefully will be completed by March 26, 1976, the effective date of my resignation as Town Engineer and Public Works Director.

As in previous years, very little of the Town Engineer's time was spent on Civil Engineering duties (getting things built, to serve a purpose over a desired length of time, at the least cost). Too much of Derry's "building" is done and too many of our "engineering" decisions are made by reflex or impulse rather than by Engineering investigation.

The 1975 Road Program was completed except for the four projects that required substantial engineering investigation. Only one of these four reached more than 15% completion although survey and base plans for the other 3 are nearly complete. These have been added to the 1976 Road Program but face a similar fate because of the refusal of the Budget Committee to approve anything in the way of additional engineering funds. If these jobs are to be let for bids as planned, engineering plans and specifications must be prepared.

The Road Program projects substantially completed are the reconstruction on Tsienneto Roads (surface to be "remixed" in the spring), Pond Road, English Range Road, Fordway Extension and Warner Hill Road; the hot top overlays on North Main Street, South Main Street, East Derry Road and skim overlays on Cemetary Road and Lawrence Road; the sealing on Old Chester Road, Damaron Road, Drew Road, English Range Road, Pierce Avenue, Pingree Road, Frost Road, Beacon Hill Road, Beaver Lake Road and North Shore Road (B.L.); a substantial amount of routine maintenance and experimentation with the heater scarifying technique. The heater scarifier was used on most roads before being sealed and on all roads before the permanent hot top overlay was placed. Highland Avenue, Wall Street and a short segment of North Main Street were heater scarified for smoothing effects without additional treatment or overlay.

The State Highway Department has completed survey for base plans on the Federal Aid Urban Project at Ross Corner and preliminary design should be forthcoming.

A system for monitoring highway project costs was initiated this year and will be continued with refinements. Other work for the Highway Department included taking and evaluating bids for hired equipment and labor; obtaining and evaluating bids for machinery and making recommendations on purchases and payments; making road, bridge and drainage inspections, revising the Town road map twice and miscellaneous field work. For the Road Agent and Building Inspector, 64 Driveway Plans were approved, 7 were rejected, 8 construction approvals were issued and 6 construction approvals were withheld.

The Road Inventory was continued at Town and Federal cost to the point where valuable information is catalogued by the inventory work should be continued for a few more years to obtain additional field data and to try to recover more Town Road records that have become lost or obscure. The road inventory work has produced, for easy access, records of roads discontinued since 1827 when Derry was incorporated. We now have inventoried and listed Town maintained roads stretching a total distance of more than 102 miles.

In April, regular review of subdivision applications by the Town Engineer was discontinued due to time limitations but special services continued. Five escrow releases were processed including inspections and obtaining easements. One requested release was denied resulting in negotiations with abutters for a settlement. Five escrow estimates were prepared and two were posted. Substantial time was spent redesigning substandard road designs submitted to the Planning Board by Surveyors and negotiating with interested parties to resolve these. In 5 cases, attempts were made to have road work completed by developers or with escrow money and 3 of these were successful. After April, reports were made to the Planning Board only upon request and as problems arose.

The recycling pit main structure at the Landfill was completed by contract and 3 of the 4 wing walls have been added by Landfill employees. The paper collection end is in interim operation and the glass end will be activated after the thaw.

Miscellaneous services were provided upon request to the School District, Recreation Commission, Sewer & Water Department, East Derry Fire Department, Police Department and Board of Selectmen.

The 1976 Road Program has been planned including preliminary cost estimates and assistance was provided for preparation of the Highway and Sewer Department budgets. The 1976 Engineering budget proposed to the Town Manager included the present Engineering Associate and Secretary along with a new surveyor and a new draftsman, a staff considered by the Town Engineer to be an absolute minimum to accomplish the Engineering tasks planned for this department for 1976. Hopefully sooner, rather than years later, the Town will realize that, with respect to adequate professional civil engineering services, the cost of the service is far less than the cost of neglect. This should be evident to most tax payers by now.

Between now and the date of my resignation in late March, I will attempt to tie down a lot of loose ends so that your next Town Engineer has his starting point well defined. I urge the Town to give him its support so that he can provide a more valuable service than I have been allowed to give you.

### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

With the exception of August, the Derry Planning Board met on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month during the past year. The Board heard a total of 103 plans, 63 preliminaries and 40 finals. This amounted to an increase of 76 lots approved for building throughout the town. The Board also held two public hearings for building lots on designated scenic roads.

During the month of June, Louis Martin was appointed to replace Craig Schnell on the Board and Carolyn Johnson was appointed to complete the one year term of former chairman, Thomas Communale who resigned.

The Planning Board has continued to be represented on the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. The delegates are Frederick Tompkins, Howard Dearth, and Benjamin Newell. In addition, the Planning Board has been involved in the preliminary hearings conducted by the Town's engineering consultants regarding a new sewer treatment plant on Beaver Brook and other alternative methods of treating sewage.

### DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY

A jump in our circulation for the past year has more than given evidence that your Library is serving the public to the best of its ability, both service-wise and budget-wise. The increasing population has also been a factor as shown by the large number of new registrations for the year.

The major project was the painting of the outside of the Library which makes for a much more attractive looking building.

### DERRY POLICE DEPARTMENT

We consider ourselves a service organization. Most of our police work, and the work of any police department, is in the area of rendering service to our residents and those non-residents who utilize our community and its resources. In fact, approximately 85% of all our time is spent in rendering assistance in other than enforcement areas. Over 100 people call our communications desk within an 8-hour period to request assistance and/or information of one sort or another. This does not take into account the people the officers meet on the streets or highways, or those that walk into our facility.

The department is presently staffed by 24 sworn personnel who are assigned to three 8-hour shifts per day, 365 days per year. This figure has remained unchanged since 1973, although crime and service demands have increased.

I would like you to know where your police department stands with respect to the surrounding community departments. Communities used for this comparison include those which are located within a 16-mile radius of Derry, but do not include any communities within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Communities within the radius were chosen for the reason that we all share similar problems due to our geographical location and the highly transient populations. If any comparisons are to be made, this is, in my opinion, the best way it can be done.

The average number of police officers per 1,000 population in the area is 1.7. Derry stands below that, with 1.5 police officers per 1,000 population. Police departments within the same area investigated 41.8 serious crimes per 1,000 population; the Derry police investigated 49 serious crimes per 1,000 population, a total of 784 for Derry. By serious crimes, I specifically refer to homicide, rape, armed robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and auto theft. The Derry Police cleared 217 of these



serious type crimes, or 27.7% which is above the national average. For crimes of a less serious nature, such as disorderly conduct, simple assault, intoxication, vandalism, etc., we investigated 1,079 and cleared 697 for a percentage of 64.6%.

The maximum salary for a Derry police officer is \$184.00 per week. The area average is \$195.67 maximum per week. A relatively simple analogy would be that we have fewer police doing more for less.

As always, we are here to serve and stand ready to be of assistance whenever we can.

## DERRY VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

During our agency's fiscal year of July 1, 1974 - June 30, 1975, a total of 2,798 visits were made to Derry residents by our nurses, physical therapist, or homemaker, home health aides. This is 546 more visits than last year.

The breakdown of our home visits were as follows:

Nursing visits to the ill - 1040  
Public health type visits - 580  
Physical Therapy visits - 295

In addition 752 H/HHA visits and 131 visits to supervise the aides were made which provided a total of 1,809 hours of assistance to patients through this new program. This was the first complete year of this service. At the present time our agency requests county and federal funds to provide this service which benefits town residents.

Our public health "no fee" visits increased from 462 to 580 this year. These included visits to newborns and their mothers and visits to do general health teaching and assist people with referrals to health or social agencies.

Also, during this year, our agency was pleased to begin offering immunization clinics in Derry. It has been a goal for some time and is a response to a need we have observed and to requests and inquiries received from local residents over a period of time. A total of 375 immunizations were given to Derry residents in the first three clinics.

Of service to elderly residents were our screening clinics conducted monthly at Nutfield Heights and K of C Hall and St. Luke's Church where 576 clinic visits were made.

## CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

Most of our activities have been in the field of setting up a new Emergency Operating Center, such as building petitions, information boards, map boards, rearranging our lighting, putting together a communications room for police and fire, and installing their equipment. We had 36 training sessions, mostly in the film category.

We have a Citizen Band Radio Club, who has signed up with Civil Defense and has participated in all the training sessions. This group has increased from 6 to 52 members in 1975. Beside attending all training sessions, they have had 6 radio drills and 1 field drill in 1975.

The activities of the Ham Operators are as follows:

ARRL\* - Field Day, at Alexander-Carr playground. Totally portable communications exercise, including no use of commercially generated electricity or permanent antennas.

ARRL - Simulated Emergency Test; simulated emergency traffic (message) handling exercise from hqts.

BEAVER LAKE DAY - Total communications provided with portable and mobile radios.

CD NETS - Weekly nets are held on amateur and CB frequencies.

### RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The increase in the amount of leisure time available to the public is reflected in our efforts to try to provide an increase in programs and facilities to meet the demands of the citizens for those leisure time pursuits. Although the energy crisis seems to have passed, the recreating public has remained closer to their homes in quest of recreation activities so that the increased costs of travel and commercial recreation will not take a bigger portion of their personal budget.

\$118,000.00 was the inflated budget for Recreation and Parks for 1975, but this figure includes all of the income from user fees, concessions and trust funds which do not come out of the taxpayers pocket. The fact is, the amount of tax funds used is 3.7% of the towns' budget but only 1.5% of the total tax dollar. Probably the best bargain most people enjoyed the entire year.

Discussion over the departments' policy of getting some of their projects worked on, was hot and heavy for a while, but the end result is a savings for the people who pay the taxes. Anyone can see the amount of unexpended funds, which the town put into the general funds as a result of our judicious spending habits. Most of the participating public seem to agree with the methods used and the saving attitude.

The key word for 1975 is "increase". It appears we not only spent more, but received more and dispensed more than any other time in our history. The single fastest growing activity in the entire program is tennis. Our citizens have tennis-mania. The reservation system, which we utilize allows a maximum number of people to utilize the facilities to their capacity. We provide over 450 hours of court use in addition to lesson time for more than 800 people. Although we can not discriminate in the use of



the tennis courts which federal funds paid for, about 85% of the participants are residents of the Town of Derry. Much of the success for this activity has to go to Bev Gorman, instructor, who has provided the knowledge and skills for most of the players involved in the sport at this time. Some may argue this sport takes a lot of space for a few people, but it should also be remembered that it is also a lifetime sport which may be played by an individual most of their life span as opposed to team sports which are generally limited to the few prime years a person has for physical excellence.

It is fortunate the department has been able to hang on to their "top notch" employees without them, we would not have the quality programs or facilities which we enjoy. Even though they may be sometimes criticized and berated, the entire staff has been loyal and above reproach in meeting their responsibilities. This group includes Don Ball, Diane LaPlante and Jack Gannon (who is no longer with us). Many times they serve the public without a thought of selfishness or being reimbursed for extra effort over extra hours along with the donations of time and money they make for the good of the community.

Volunteers are the backbone of our programs and in some instances facilities. No program succeeds like the ones where groups of volunteers sit down and discuss a program and then with proper leadership go out and give of themselves to the youngsters of this community. What better example can our children have, than those modern day patriots? We want to publicly say "Thank You" to all those folks . . . you know who they are, for making possible the high quality programs in our town, through the many ways which people use to help.

Our department also utilized the availability of "free help" by the way of SPEEDY and CETA programs as well as COLLEGE WORK STUDY. Those programs are funded by the federal government and the actual cost of the town is nil. The Rockingham/Stafford County Manpower Office is responsible for placement of most of these workers. The University of New Hampshire is responsible for the Work Study personnel. Both programs are work training in nature and we strive to supervise each so that we mutually benefit from a positive work experience.

Year around workers included Peri Deraps, Karen Paradis, Edward Conyer, Gary Geraldo and two others who left the program to enter the job market; Christopher Ervin and Bernard Trager. We also picked up another from Vocational Rehabilitation, Scott Paris. Summer employees under the SPEEDY program helped on the parks and playgrounds in July and August only. They include: Karen LeBlanc, John Fayle, Stacy Cassel, Nancy Snow, Susan Beaulieu, Donna Willey, Kelly Sampson, William Bergan, Rebecca Gurley, Cindy Smart, Tracy Bisson, Donna Quincy, Edward Mansur and Colleen Brown. Our work study student helped us with the gymnastics and girls basketball, as well as the Alexander-Carr Playground during the summer. The other regular summer employees included: Gail Little, Lee Abbott, James Tagalakas, Mike Fayle, Greg Monty, David Cino, Bryan Lister and Marie Abbott. On the waterfront we had Claudia Ketchum, Susan Roemer, Craig Staples, Lisa Geissenhainer, Kevin Dennehy and Carol Madden with the special swim programs.

A special "thank you" to the folks who have allowed us to use their own private facilities for public recreation events and special programs in their own homes and pools. All of our handicapped participants join us in thanking the following families who have made it all possible for them. We wish to thank Mr. and Mrs. Michael Boutot and Mr. and Mrs. John DeLorenzo of Derry, Mrs. Katherine Tris of East Derry and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Scanlon of Jamica Plain, Massachusetts.

Our list of activities continues to grow as the demand for special interest activity rises and more special events are added to the list of existing programs. Representative of this condition is: the Turkey Trot, a joggers road race held around Thanksgiving time and the Old Fashioned Sleigh Races, which were horse drawn sleighs racing for fun and trophies. Other activities include tennis for everyone, men and women's volleyball, men and women's basketball, boys and girls basketball, teenage basketball, an expanded flag football for boys, a new one hand tag football league for men, fitness, yoga, belly dancing, Crafts for Senior Citizens, co-ed gymnastics, slo-pitch softball (hosted the ladies state tourney for the first time), grasshoppers and lady bug baseball for young boys and girls, special events such as: Memorial Day Parade, Easter Egg Hunt and Band Concerts.

For those who are not yet aware of it, the Recreation/Parks office is now located in the West Side Community Center at 39 West Broadway and everyone is encouraged to visit us and see how far the renovations have gone in the building. The town for the first time expended some tax funds in the building, for emergency lights, exit lights, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. The operating expenses as well as the continuing renovations is still being done by donations of clubs and individuals, especially the *Community Closet*, some on private property, but mostly on public land or in public buildings. Many of the activities are held in the school buildings and on school property. The recreation/parks commission and the school board have agreed to continue their policies of mutual cooperation and will study the possibilities of future agreements, which will benefit the citizens of our town. Other town departments have also been most cooperative and we in turn, have tried to reciprocate. This year the water, sewer, highway, police and fire departments all played a part in helping us provide reasonable recreation for those who chose to participate.

Like everyone else, we do not have a bed of roses. Some recurrent problems plague us year after year, one of those is the broken glass, which we find in all of the park areas and our maintenance crews are continually cleaning up glass as well as other debris generated by the on going vandalism in each area. Some of our other problems are: the absence of a public shooting range, the lack of funds to complete renovations at the West Side Community Center and apathy on the part of many toward the entire recreation outlook.

Good things have occurred as well; the programs are better attended than ever, the Bicentennial spirit has improved our community experience, prospects for the future include expanded facilities, indoor programming and with some luck . . . groups such as the Jaycees will complete the painting of the outside of the Community Center.

Recreation means different things to different people, but it appears more individuals are recognizing recreation as a basic human need. With the increase in available leisure hours a lot of folks are becoming more selective in the type of activity they choose for their leisure time. Each person has their own way of enjoying leisure and we have become more involved in that enjoyment during the past year.

Constructive criticism is always welcome and we try to answer all questions pertaining to our operation with candor. If we are unable to meet everyone's demands please forgive us, we are doing the best we can with what we have to work with. Our entire staff is dedicated to serve the public.

## WARRANT FOR FIRE DISTRICT MEETING

To the Inhabitants of the Derry Fire District Qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Engine House in said District on the second day of March, 1976, at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

### ARTICLE 1.

To choose all necessary District officers for the year ensuing.

### ARTICLE 2.

To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

### ARTICLE 3.

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Ninety-Two Thousand, Five Hundred and Seventeen (\$392,517) Dollars or any part thereof, by taxation or otherwise, to meet payments of principal and interest on debts of the District; for salaries of officers and agents of the District; and for all other necessary expenses arising in said District, and pass any vote relating thereto.

### ARTICLE 4.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the Fire Commissioners to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes of the municipal year in which such loans are incurred and made payable therefrom by such and pass any vote relating thereto.

### ARTICLE 5.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the Fire Commissioners to establish a capital reserve fund, or to place in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds any monies that may be donated to the District, made available to the District, or not spent by the District from the monies appropriated for the previous year.

### ARTICLE 6.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the Fire Commissioners to send men and equipment to other towns and cities in the immediate vicinity if requested to do so, in accordance with R.S.A. 154:24, and pass any vote relating thereto.

### ARTICLE 7.

To see if the District will vote annually by an article in the warrant to authorize the Fire Commissioners to establish a contingency fund to meet the expenses that may arise during the year. Such fund shall not exceed one per cent of the amount appropriated exclusive of capital expenses and amortization of debt by such village district during the preceding year. A detailed report of all expenditures from the contingency fund shall be made by the Commissioners and published with their report.

### ARTICLE 8.

To transact any other business which may lawfully come before such meeting including the appointment of any committees on any article embraced in this warrant.

The polls for the election of officers of the District will remain open from 7:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. unless the District at the opening of the meeting, votes to keep the polls open until a later hour. It is planned to take up the remaining articles in the warrant at 7:30 p.m. on March 22, 1976.

**REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN  
AND DISTRICT CHIEF**

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

## 1976 WARRANT

Derry, New Hampshire

February 5, 1976

To the inhabitants of the East Derry Fire Precinct as defined in Chapter 315 of the laws of New Hampshire, 1935, qualified to vote. Voters in District No. 1 and District No. 2 are hereby notified to meet at the East Derry Fire House in said district on the 2nd day of March, 1976 at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the articles required to be voted on by Official Ballot, and to meet at eight o'clock in the afternoon on March 31th, in the East Derry Fire House to act on all other articles in this warrant.

1. To elect a Fire Ward for three years, Precinct Clerk for one year, Auditor for one year, and a Moderator for one year.

2. To hear the financial report of the Treasurer.

3. To hear the Clerk's report.

4. To see if the Precinct will authorize the Board of Fire Wards to negotiate the purchase of a new Fire Pumper and the sum not to exceed \$65,000.00 (sixty-five thousand dollars) and to authorize the Fire Wards to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$65,000.00 (sixty-five thousandsdollars) by the issuance of notes of the Precinct payable over a period of seven years, the same to be expended under the direction of the Fire Wards in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33, New Hampshire revised statute, annotated 1955, and any ammendments thereto.

5. To see if the Precinct will authorize the Board of Fire Wards to withdraw funds, plus any interest from the Capital Reserve Fund and said monies to be expended under the direction of the Fire Wards in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 35, New Hampshire revised statute, annotated 1955, and any ammendments thereto, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Precinct will authorize the Board of Firewards to hire the present two manpower firemen, if Rockingham/Strafford Manpower contract agreement cannot be renewed and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To determine and fix the salaries of the Precinct officers or agent of the Precinct.

8. To see what sum of money the Precinct will raise and appropriate for the East Derry Fire Precinct the same to be expended under the direction of the Fire Wards.

9. To see if the Precinct will authorize the Fire Wards to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on the negotiable note or notes of the Precinct, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the Precinct will vote to authorize the Fire Wards to send men and equipment to other towns and cities if requested to do so, in accordance with R.S.A. 154:24, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting including the appointment of committees.
