



## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING March 10, 1936

Two Hundredth and Fifth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the tenth day of March, A.D. 1936, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, Charles Wentworth; one Selectman for a term of three years, Albert D. Littlehale; a Town treasurer, George D. Stevens; a Collector of Taxes, Arthur Stewart; two Auditors, Clement Moran, Harry P. Woodward; and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years. (Charles H. Pettee)
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

Fifth Class Road Maintenance. (\$471.42)

- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (\$6,000.00).
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (See budget).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act. (Voted)
- 7. To see if the Town will adopt the policy that all roads, to be accepted in the future as public roads, shall have a minimum width of forty-five feet. (Voted)
  - 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept a section of

road leading off Madbury Road at a point between the property of L. W. Hitchcock and that of E. P. Robinson and extending past the property formerly owned by E. J. Rasmussen, thence turning left at a right angle and continuing past the property of C. L. Martin. (Voted with provisions.)

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the continuation of Strafford Avenue as far as the residence of Clark L. Stevens. This road to be approximately 135 feet in length. (Voted with provisions.)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to have street lights installed on the State Road between Durham and Newmarket, the number and location of such lights to be decided by the light company and the Board of Selectmen.

Petitioned by John S. Reardon and nine other legal voters. (Tabled.)

- 11. To se if the Town will vote to close a section of Road known as Bunker's Lane between the Madbury line and the property line of William A. Maillard. (Voted down.)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$146.83. (Voted.)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control. (\$200.00.)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to set aside from our present surplus the sum of \$1,500.00 to enable the Board of Selectmen to accept W.P.A. asistance in widening and surfacing the Durham Point road. (Voted.)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to use the bond issue of ten thousand dollars voted for sewer construction in connection with W.P.A. assistance, for town construction of sewers, in case satisfactory

arrangements cannot be made with W.P.A. authorities in regard to the work. (Voted.)

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. (Voted.)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. (Voted.)
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

1 per cent if paid on or before August 1. (Voted.)

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1937

Two Hundredth and Sixth Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham in Tuesday the ninth day of March, A. D. 1937 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
- 3. To vote upon the following resolution adopted by the General Court and approved on February 18, 1937; Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?
- 4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,770.00 to obtain State Aid on the following:

State Aid Construction (See approved item in the budget)

- 5. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget)
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (See approved items in the budget).
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of the White Pine Blister Rust control.
  - 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$146.83. (See budget).

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Budget Committee to act as the Town Planning Board and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to pay for any necessary expense in connection therewith. (See budget).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to install street lights between Durham and the Newmarket line, the number of lights to be decided by the Light Company and the Selectmen.

Petitioned by Clarina Boucher and eleven legal voters.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to install two street lights on the third and fifth of the five new poles set recently on the northern end of Madbury Road.

Petitioned by James A. Funkhouser and nine other legal voters.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to continue the hydrant line up Madbury Road a reasonable distance.

Petitioned by R. R. Starke and thirty-two legal voters.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the present right of way extending from Main Street past the Gorman Block and the Franklin Theater to the Brook.

Petitioned by H. I. Leavitt and nine other legal voters.

14. To see if the Town will modify the present article pertaining to the charges for plowing snow from private drives, lanes, etc., shall be plowed as soon as possible and charges made as listed herein:

Length 165 feet—500 feet 500 feet—1000 feet Over 1000 ft.

\$1.00 per storm \$2.00 per storm \$2.00 per storm plus 10 cents per aditional 100 linear ft. per storm Petitioned by Russell S. Harmon and nine other legal voters.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payments of taxes as follows: 1 per cent if paid on or before August 1, 1937.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

February 1, 1937.

To the Town of Durham:

A total of 5,329 volumes were added to the combined library collection during the year. According to existing records this is the largest number added in a single year in the history of the library. This figure includes 115 books purchased from the Durham Library Association funds and 155 from funds appropriated by the town for its public library. The major portion of the town funds were expended for juvenile books, as has been the policy during the past few years. Durham Library Association funds were used largely for the purchase of the lighter type of fiction. The total library collection, University, D.L.A., and D.P.L., is 88,924 accessioned volumes.

A total circulation of 47,448 volumes was recorded during the year for books taken for use outside the building. This includes a circulation of 3,491 for juvenile books. It is believed that the new location for the school will be reflected in a further increase of use of library books by children.

- 4. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. (M. Gale Eastman)
- 5. To see if the School District will vote to continue to use a check-list at future meetings. Voted.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1935 - 1936

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I take pleasure in presenting my eighth annual report. When I wrote my report a year ago we expected to enter the new school in September 1936, but since Durham seems to be founded upon a rock we were not able to make good our promise. We did, however, start school in September with an organization which needed little change when we finally did move in to begin work on January fourth. Miss Marjorie Whytock, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College, with ten years' experience in the schools of Stratham and Greenland, was secured for Grade Two, Miss Dorothy Chamberlaine was transferred to Grade Five from Grade Two. These were the only changes in our teaching personnel, with the exception of cadets. The Manual Training is still carried on at the College Shops under Professor Batchelder's supervision. The departmental system has been extended to take in Grade Six and the Junior High School is now taught as follows: Principal Guy Clark teaches Mathematics for Grades 6, 7, and 8 Science for Grades 7 and 8 and B and C subjects (B and C subjects, so called, include Music and Drawing when not taught by special teachers, Assembly, Physiology and Health Habits). Miss Mitchell teaches History to Grades 6 and 8, Commercial Geography to Grades 7 and 8 and the rest of the Sixth grade subjects. Mrs. Maxam teaches English and Spelling to Grades 6, 7, and 8. Miss Rachel Carron, Cadet, teaches French to Grades 7 and 8. Mrs. Dorothy Wilcox teaches Practical Arts to the girls of Grade 7 and 8, assisted by Miss Martha

Thayer, Cadet. Mrs. Wilcox also serves as substitute teacher throughout the system.

This year no federal funds are available for free milk distribution but the Knights of Pythias is supplying eight bottles per day. Many of the parents are purchasing milk as in the past. At present it is being furnished by Hayden's Dairy Company of Dover, but the University will provide it after February first. It is pasteurized and chocolate milk furnished at the same price as whole "white" milk, 3c per half pint bottle.

The report of the Nurse accompanies my report. The Sons of the American Revolution did not furnish Good Citizenship medals last June, so none were awarded. The Parent-Teacher Association could encourage Citizenship and Scholarship by providing trips during the summer, or at other times, to historical sites or museums. Encouragement of this nature is of more value than medals or prizes.

When the playground at the new school has been graded the playground apparatus will be moved from the old site and I hope that more apparatus can be added. Whatever equipment could be used from the old building was moved into the new. Some money will have to be spent for new furniture to satisfactorily equip the new school. Some things are need immediately. For the first time our enrollment, as you will see from statistics, exceeds two hundred, including Packer's Fall School. Mr. Wilson continues to teach music and Miss Rov teaches Art. Both teachers make weekly visits to the village and every fortnight to Packer's Falls, where the school consists of twenty-one pupils in the first six grades. Mrs. Elsie Fisher continues as their very efficient teacher. The operetta "Paganini" was successfully given last spring by the village school. Probably no operetta will be given this year but some other musical program may be arranged.

- The testing program this year consists of the use of the Detroit First Grade Intelligence Test in Grade One. The Otis Group Intelligence Test in Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 and

the Metropolitan Achievement Tests in Grades 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8. These latter tests cover the "fundamentals" so-called and are well standardized. We are now working on them and complete returns are not available at this time. It appears, however, that the schools will maintain satisfactory standards.

The Building Committee and the School Board have given freely of their time and effort to bring to completion a fine modern school building, planned for service for many years to come. The Parent-Teacher Association has encouraged their efforts and is ever ready to be of assistance, as it was when we moved into the new building. We here publically express our appreciation to those persons who loaned their trucks and gave their services when the moving was done. I, personally, commend Principal Clark and the teachers who assisted so ably during the Christmas vacation in settling the rooms. The opening was done without break or friction. The schools enjoyed a delightful Christmas party in the new play room at the close of the fall term. The past year has been a busy one for all concerned with the construction of the new building, but everyone is glad to have had a part in the undertaking.

I appreciate the continued support and cooperation of School Board and Teachers.
