Hancock Paul Revere Bell

The Paul Revere bell on the cover was sketched by Cindy Amidon. The following description of the Hancock bell is from Historic Bells of New Hampshire, by Eva A. Spear . . .

The original meeting house at Hancock was destroyed by fire the year before church and state separated. In 1819, the Congregational Church and the town combined to build the beautiful edifice that both still occupy. The storied steeple is a copy of the designs of Elias Carter of Connecticut Valley fame and in its belfry hangs bell number 236 on the stock book list. The illustration offers many points of observation for the reader. The conspicuous yoke of oak is banded with strips of iron and turns at the axis in a groove in the oak beam of the frame.

A mechanic called attention to the square or four sided nuts that hold the bolts of the iron bands, a contrast to the six sided nuts of later introduction. The staples that were cast above the shoulder of the Revere bells are characteristics that were changed to a simple form of headstock.

The bell weighs 1,166 pounds and bears the trademark, "Revere & Son, Boston, 1820." Number 236 seems to prove that the bell at Effingham was cast before the Hancock bell, but was not purchased until 1821; that is, a year later.

Summary of Minutes of 1975 Town Meeting

- Article 1 Parker Starratt and Harry Casler were unanimously elected to serve as auditors for the year ensuing. Howard Rogers was unanimously elected to serve as sexton for the year ensuing.
- Article 2 It was voted the town accept the budget in the amount of \$134,376.00 for estimated town expenses, and the necessary sum for county tax, deduct the revenue and credits, and raise the balance on taxation.
- Article 3 It was voted the town authorize the selectmen to appoint a commission consisting of five members to oversee the development of the Camp Guild property for conservation and recreational purposes; the commission to consist of a member of the Conservation Commission, a member of the Recreation Committee and three members-at-large to represent the taxpayers. The commission is to serve for a period of three years.
- Article 4 The town voted to authorize the selectmen to dispose of the Camp Guild buildings as recommended by the Study Committee. It was noted that all buildings, including the depot would be handled this way.
- Article 5 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for use of the Town History Committee.
- Article 6 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Water Reserve Fund.
- Article 7 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the Fire Hose Reserve Fund.
- Article 8 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 to continue to implement the recommendations of the Dump Study Committee to establish a sanitary landfill operation for the town.
- Article 9 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$995.76 to be supplemented by \$6,638.43 from the state for the town road aid program for this year.
- Article 10 The town authorized the selectmen to withdraw \$2,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as set-

- offs against appropriations for miscellaneous repairs and alterations required to meet safety and fire regulations in the high school building.
- Article 11 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Conservation Commission, this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Commission or to be added to by gifts of money.
- Article 12 The town authorized the moderator to appoint a committee of three Hancock residents with the authority to modernize the town's bookkeeping and accounting system, including, also, facilities for storage of all town documents and records as required by law, subject to the approval of the selectmen.
- Article 13 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$550.00 for the Recreation Committee, this sum to be put in the Tennis Fund, unused funds to accumulate from year to year.
- Article 14 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the Hancock National Bicentennial Committee, this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Committee or to be added to by gifts of money.
- Article 15 The town voted to raise and appropriate \$520.00 to support the mental health program of the Monadnock Mental Health Service.
- Article 16 The town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,143.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.
- Article 17 The town voted to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.
- Article 18 The Article requesting the selectmen accept Prospect Hill Extension as a town road failed.
- Article 19 The town voted to authorize the selectmen to accept Carriage Hill Road as a town road based on plans approved by the planning board if and when the selectmen are satisfied that all provisions of the town subdivision ordinances have been met.

- Article 20 The town voted to accept that portion of Route 202 which was abandoned when the highway was relocated, only that portion of the road between Tannery Hill Road and Route 123.
- Article 21 The Article requesting an appropriation of \$706.52 as the town's share for studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission failed.
- Article 22 It was voted the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Library Capital Improvement Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the library trustees or to be added to by gifts of money.
- Article 23 The town voted to authorize the selectmen to acquire a strip of land 25 feet wide by 82 feet long, adjacent to and easterly of the present town library, from Thomas T. Pond, Jr. and Cynthia Pond to be used for library purposes; said acquisition to be by negotiation, purchase and/or eminent domain, and that the sum of \$3,800.00 be raised and appropriated to pay for the cost of the same.
- Article 24 The town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of eight monitors for the fire department.
- Article 25 The town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to defray the cost of purchasing two dry hydrants to be placed on Half Moon Pond for added fire protection to surrounding properties.
- Article 26 The town authorized the selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Dept. of the Army Corps of Engineers to raise approximately 350 feet of Link Road; cost on said project to be paid for by the United States Army Corps of Engineers directly to the Town of Hancock; said work to be done by a local contractor, subject to the approval of the selectmen and road commissioner.
- Article 27 The Article requesting \$100.00 for the Monadnock Regional Bicentennial Committee failed.
- Article 28 The town voted to postpone, indefinitely, any consideration of the Article concerning conveying any rights the town may have regarding the Old Reservoir, to Robert English.

- Article 29 The town voted to accept from Robert English an easement giving the town the right to install, maintain and repair the water line and access road running from Juggernaut Pond to the chlorinating station on Kings Highway.
- Article 30 The town authorized the selectmen to borrow up to \$75,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 31 The town voted to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds: John C. Davidson, Frank Bramley, Charles Rollins, Lester B. Fogg, Edward R. Parise, and Keith R. Burke; and the following Library Memorial Fund: Albert Lyon.
- Article 32 The town voted to accept the reports of the auditors and committees heretofore chosen, as printed in the town report. Also, brief reports concerning the Camp Guild purchase, the highway Payloader purchase, the tax map, the Jean E. King property, and recycling were given by William Rockhill. Thanks were extended to Mert Knowles and Robert Stewart for their work in the recreation area.
- Article 33 The town authorized the selectmen to appoint a committee of seven members to study the needs of a new fire station for the fire department and to investigate a possible site for the building and to report back at the next town meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the second day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and, upon approval by the voters at that time, to postpone consideration of the balance of the Budget and Warrant until Saturday, the sixth day of March next at 1:00 p.m. in the afternoon.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for the use of the Town History Committee and to authorize the withdrawal of any necessary funds from the Town History Capital Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Water Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate nine hundred eighty-four dollars and eighteen cents (\$984.18) to be supplemented by six thousand five hundred sixty-one dollars and twenty-three cents (\$6,561.23) from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for this year, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to twenty-eight thousand dollars (\$28,000) to be repaid over a five-year period to purchase a new dump truck for the Highway Department, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw two thousand dollars (\$2,000) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, these funds to be used for necessary repairs and renovations to the Town Office Building and the Town Hall in the interest of safety and health, or take any other action relating thereto.
 - 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the

total sum of seventeen thousand eight hundred eighty dollars (\$17,880) for the reappraisal of the Town of Hancock as ordered by the State of New Hampshire. This sum to be raised over a two-year period; twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) to be raised and appropriated by this article and the balance of five thousand eight hundred eighty dollars (\$5,880) to be entered in the 1977 Budget by the Board of Selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Conservation Commission, or take any other action relating thereto, this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Commission or to be added to by gifts of money.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) for the Hancock Recreation Committee to match the \$7,000 that the Committee has raised for the construction of a new tennis court, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the Hancock National Bicentennial Committee, this sum to be expended by the Committee or to be added to by gifts of money, or take any other action relating thereto. Proposed by the Hancock National Bicentennial Committee, Robert S. Fay, Chairman.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred twenty dollars (\$520) to support the Mental Health program of the Monadnock Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand three hundred eighty-one dollars (\$1,381) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This local request for financial support is based on a \$1.30 per capita formula, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer of the Town of Hancock to transfer seven thousand seven hundred twenty-three dollars and fifty cents (\$7,723.50) presently in the Balance Held in Reserve for the Sanitary Landfill to the budget for the operation of the Sanitary Landfill for the ensuing year, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to pay a salary to the Town Clerk, in addition to statutory fees now retained; also, to authrize the Board of Selectmen to consider the Town Clerk's salary as a budget item in future years, or take any other action relating thereto.

- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Library Trustees or to be added to by gifts of money, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousad nine hundred ninety-one dollars and twenty cents (\$1,991.20) to reimburse the Library Improvement Reserve Fund for the additional expense in acquiring the 25 foot by 82 foot strip of land on the east side of the Library lot, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer to transfer the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) from the Balance Held in Reserve for the Library Study Committee to the Library Improvement Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate four thousand three hundred sixty-four dollars (\$4,364) to purchase a new police cruiser; said sum to be acquired by the withdrawal of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, with the balance of one thousand three hundred sixty-four dollars (\$1,364) to be raised by taxation, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate six hundred eighty-one dollars (\$681) for our share of the cost of membership in the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred twenty-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$722.16) as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Seletmen to appoint a Fire Station Building Committee of seven members for a one-year term; and to see if the Town will raise and apporpriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for expenses incurred by this study committee, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept Prospect Hill Extension as a Town Road based on plans approved by the Planning Board, if and when the Selectmen and Road Agent are satisfied that all provisions of the Town Sub-division Ordinances have been complied with, or take any other action relating thereto.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a conservation area the reserve area of 7.472 acres, with access roads, located on Prospect Hill and known as Sugarbush Park, as shown on the subdivision plan entitled Prospect Hill Project Davis Pasture dated September 30, 1968, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a conservation area the reserve area of 3.824 acres on Carriage Hill Road, known as lot number 16 on the subdivision plan entitled Carriage Hill dated December 2, 1968, and revised June 24, 1971, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to modify the purpose, membership, and procedures of the Hancock Town Advisory Committee as established under Article 20 of the 1950 Town Meeting, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to designate as a scenic road under the provisions of RSA 253:17 that part of the Willard Pond Road leading from Route 123 to the Hancock-Antrim Town Line, or take any other action relating therto.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to approve the restoration of the Hancock Depot by the Hancock Depot Committee as a community center; the building to remain on Town land and no Town money to be used, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to change the fee rate of the Town Tax Collector, the new rate to be one-half of one per cent (½ of 1%) of all revenues received (Real Estate taxes, Resident taxes, Yield taxes, Bank Stock taxes,) or take any other action relating thereto.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 31. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 32. To hear the reports of auditors and committees here-tofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



Town Reports

Selectmen's Report

A Selectmen's Report is undoubtedly one of the most anticlimatic to be given. When considering the time and efforts involving this Board, during the past year, then trying to capture it into this report is certainly going to be a task.

The Camp Guild matter did keep our Board busy, how to dispose of the buildings through sale and demolition. Initially we accepted closed bids on all saleable cabins. This Board agreed that the closed bids received were far below the inventory value which we established. A gavel-banging public auction did yield the town \$3,090.00. Our special thanks to the Hancock Fire Department and members who volunteered to level the unsold buildings. The Depot itself was given special consideration, and we will await the Town's decision on the warrant article.

We are again asking for Revenue Sharing money to be spent on Town buildings. Our Town is very fortunate to have such buildings, therefore, we hate to see them fall into disrepair. Last year we had installed a completely new electrical service in the Town Office Building. We also had installed emergency lights to comply with State regulations, and all hallways are lighted.

Last year's Town Meeting established a bookkeeping and recordkeeping committee. It appears that an updated system is certainly needed and the "one-write" method has the most promise. When adopted all checks will be written by the Town Treasurer. In addition to the time saved, this system will give a much more detailed statement of payments.

The Town, English, Eaton Brook, Old Reservoir and Hancock Historical Society matter was resolved during the past year. The Town has acquired a right-of-way from Juggernaut to the chlorinator over the land of Robert English. In return, the Town has surrendered any claims to Eaton's Brook and the old reservoir. We wish to thank Mr. English for his cooperation, considering this matter has been unresolved for over twenty years.

Other completed matters include the installation of a dry hydrant at Boston University Sargent Camp, and the rebuilding of Link Road to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' specifications.

This Board wishes to thank the Landfill Study committee for their efforts in converting our Dump into a landfill op-

eration which complies with State regulations. Their careful planning and raising of money have allowed this Board to ask that the \$7,723.50 held in reserve be transferred toward this year's operational expenses.

In response to the petition to have the Town reappraised, the State Department of Revenue Administration studied the Town during May and June. Their report basically was a comparison of assessed values vs. the sale price of comparable properties. On July 5th we were ordered to Concord to appear before the Dept. of Revenue Administration "to show cause why the Town of Hancock should not be ordered reappraised." The facts were established by their report, and we did agree that wide variances in property assessments do exist. We also discussed the mechanics of reappraisal, who is responsible, when it must be done, and who would do the job.

On July 9th we received a letter from the Board of Taxation which stated they "found that the Town of Hancock is improperly and unequally assessed to such a degree that a revaluation of all properties is necessary." Their original time schedule (reassessment done by November, 1976) could not be met as reappraisal firms refused to bid on such short notice. Later we found that the Board of Taxation would "suspend" their order if the Town showed its good faith by appropriating the necessary funds at Town Meeting. Hours of study and research convinced our Board that Eastern Appraisal Company, Inc. of Portland, Maine was best qualifed to handle the job. Their work will start soon after Town Meeting and will be completed in May of 1977.

In closing, we are greatly concerned over what we describe as a shrinking tax base. The cost of doing business (school, Town, County) is increasing at an alarming rate. This, together with substantial population growth (particularly school age) is proving that the building of single-family homes alone cannot generate the extra tax base needed. None of us want to see the character of the Town changed, however, methods to increase the tax base are essential. Hopefuly, the Planning Board Master Plan Study Group and other Town bodies, together with the Selectmen, will develop a workable plan to promote a growth in selected industrial and commercial property.

Legislative Report

As this is being written, it is not certain that there will be a special session of the General Court. Thus, the nearly 200 bills assigned to committees for interim study may never be reconsidered by the full legislature. It is interesting to note that of the 1,374 bills considered during the 1975 session, 504 were enacted.

My committee, Environment and Agriculture, has one bill in study. It would increase the land transfer tax to provide funds for acquisition of open space land by the towns. Of the 46 bills assigned to it, the committee studied, amended where desirable, and saw through to enactment 17 bills (one which improves administration of the current use taxation law; the others dealing mostly with agriculture, including forestry, animal and bee disases, and labelling of dairy products).

We lost in the House two favorably reported land-use bills and a good bill to eliminate non-returnable bottles and cans. A beneficial waste management bill and one setting up a coastal zone management plan were vetoed by the governor. A bill to control siting of petrochemical plants in an attempt to solve the growth problems inherent in the possible location of an oil refinery in the state is in interim study in the Senate.

The new laws directly affecting the towns — their elected and appointed officers, staff and various boards, and their procedures — are too numerous to summarize in this report. Aside from the question of the fairest distribution of the costs of education — local or statewide — there is another class of statute, mostly humanitarian and desirable, creating exemptions for some persons, that, because of our resistance to state sales and/or income taxes and our consequent great dependence on local property taxes, shifts even more of the burden onto the average taxpayer — particularly taxpayers in the poorer towns with lower average incomes and more calls for exemptions.

Among such new statutes is legislation that 1) provides an exemption from real estate taxes for residential improvements made to assist a handicapped resident; 2) permits totally and permanently disabled persons to apply for a tax lien on their real estate (thus providing no tax return at present); 3) liberalizes the property tax exemption law for the blind; 4) liberalizes the qualifications for eligibility for veterans' property tax exemptions; 5) increases real and personal property tax exemptions for veterans' widows and disabled veterans; 6) permits towns to make appropriations to maintain the poor by local administration and by funding public or private non-profit cor-

porations; and 7) permits local option to expand the partial exemption on real estate taxes for the elderly.

Another law permits local option to adopt tax exemptions for realty equipped with solar heating or cooling systems. I firmly believe the unfair, overloaded town property tax structure must be relieved by a statewide income tax. An equitable reimbursement by the state to the towns for state-mandated taxes lost or expenses incurred in order to reward or assist their deserving citizens would result in a fairer tax system.

I welcome questions, comments, criticism and advice.

Advisory Committee

The Town Advisory Committee was established by the 1950 Town Meeting "... to make recommendations on all articles of the Town and School Warrants requiring an appropriation of money..." Recommendations on other articles were optional. "The Advisory Committee shall consult with the Selectmen, School Board, and other town officers and departments as to the cost of government, revenue anticipated, and services performed, in order that its recommendations may be decided upon intelligently." Also, the Committee "... shall hold a public hearing at which interested parties may appear and be heard." Recommendations of the Committee "... shall be printed in the Town Report." Committee membership includes six persons appointed by the Town Moderator plus one member each from the Selectmen and School Boards.

The recommendations of the Committee were to be non-binding on the Town and strictly advisory. The purpose appears to have been to provide voters with recommendations 1) based on a detailed study of all factors, and 2) independent of any official or department position. Over the years, however, Committee activity diminished. In the absence of indepth study, its budget recommendations were hastily developed and of questionable value. The public hearing became a first presentation of the proposed budget.

The present Advisory Committee has attempted to operate in accordance with the guidelines established in 1950. This has included earlier and more detailed study of budget proposals, some changes in the public hearing, and presentation of its recommendations prior to Town Meeting. Some of the guidelines

and responsibilities of the Committee appear either difficult to implement or outdated. Although there is merit to the advisory function, we believe the voters should have the opportunity to reexamine the Committee's structure and guidelines. As a basis for discussion, voters at the 1976 Town Meeting will be asked to consider a warrant article which would continue the Committee with some modifications. The article will suggest: 1) A twofold purpose, first to provide information and recommendations to voters on all money related warrant articles and second to provide advice and counsel to Town Boards, Departments and Committees on request; and 2) That the Selectmen's representative become ex officio without vote. This change would prevent the possibility of deadlocked votes and emphasize the independent status of the Committee; and 3) Several procedural changes to make Committee functions and activities more appropriate.

The Hancock Town Advisory Committee can assist voters and officeholders by providing information and recommendations. The Committee members welcome opportunities to discuss ways in which this can be best accomplished.



Hancock 1975

It is appropriate, as our nation prepares for its Bicentennial celebration, that Hancock focused attention on its own historic characteristics early in the year. Mindful of the need to preserve its heritage, the townspeople voted in March to establish an historic district along Main St., to reflect elements of our cultural, economic and architectural history.

Pride in our public library has long been a tradition. A certificate of merit for meeting the qualifications for membership in the state-wide developmental program was accepted by librarian Doris Rogers as another demonstration of that tradition.

Looking ahead, the library began making plans for the addition of more floor space. A model of improvements was built for display by trustee Ted Wells.

A number of important decisions were reached during the year. Several land subdivisions were approved and a variance was granted to O. D. Mathewson to build a milkhouse. Perhaps one of the most far-reaching decisions was the ruling in March by the Board of Adjutsment, killing an earlier decision to allow the building of condominiums along Rt. 123.

That same month saw the retirement of Selectman William Rockhill, after four years of service, and the election of two new members to the board, Ernest Adams and William Weston, Jr.

With the coming of spring, implementation of the recommendations of the Camp Guild Study Committee were begun. In light of the low written bids received by the selectmen on the first attempt at sale of the buildings not sold by moderator Dick Amidon were burned by the Fire Dept. for training sessions.

The first public occasion to use the camp property came in the fall when the ball field was the site for "Bob Fish Day." In honor of the retiring rural mail carrier, nearly 100 townspeople gathered for a potluck picnic. With nearly three decades of service, Bob retired his position to substitute carrier Foster Avery.

A later statement by the Camp Guild Committee encouraged such use of the property, so long as it be with "restraint,

responsibility and a respectful caution consistent with its being a natural or wilderness area."

The beginning of a town affairs forum in mid-year involved townspeople in what may well become a new tradition. The forum offers an opportunity for public discussion and communication of constructive ideas and opinions on the concerns of local government and town affairs.

Town business continued to progress. In May, Harrison Kendall was appointed by the selectmen as the first building inspector. Sanitary landfill operations began in July, after only a brief delay. That same month, the State Board of Taxation ordered the town to undergo reassessment. With state approval, reappraisal was posponed until 1976.

Late summer saw the planning board, with the assistance of a group of interested citizens, undertake the task of beginning to formulate a master plan for the town.

Involvement in town government by the people has always been necessary to insure its survival. With such concerned individuals and groups we are more than doubly blessed.

Four members of the Fire Dept. were honored at a retirement dinner at the John Hancock Inn in February: Bob Fish and Charles Gleason for 36 years of service; Everett Adams for 32; and Dick Amidon for 16.

Lesley Amidon was named to the Dean's List in her first year at Westbrook College in Portland, Me.; and Judy Blood began her third year of nurse's training at McGill University in Montreal.

Tony and Peg Brown took over operation of the ski tow and cross-country trails at Sargent Camp, assisted by local instructors Marcie Tripp, Susan Burke and Bunny Stoykovich.

A varied display of art talent continues to grace the walls of the library, thanks to the untiring efforts of Sally Hamilton. One such example of local talent was the August exhibit of a new resident, Grace Way.

All seemed to move to the tune of this year's Old Home Day celebration. The events of the day offered something for everyone — a craftsman's alley, a melodrama, barbershop quartet, sing-a-long and old-fashioned games.

A 50th wedding anniversary was celebrated by the Nelson Ingalls in July and Eric Strombeck was ninety years young in November.

Twelve-year-old Tim Belville traveled with his mother to the International Special Olympics held in Michigan in August, bringing home a bronze medal in the softball throw and placing sixth in the 220.

Within the community at large, townspeople continued to busy themselves in service projects of varying types. Local people volunteered at the elementary school, sharing their skills in such things as needlepoint, knitting, skiing, cooking and woodworking.

Others, like Joan Kunhardt, Barbara Vose, Gert Sheldon, Eleanor Amidon, Mortimer Cleveland and Nancy Ketchum spoke to Guild members of their work as volunteers at the Monadnock Community Hospital.

Members of the Fire Dept. trained in Red Cross First Aid under the direction of Dr. Robert Bailey, and several took part in a course in structural fire fighting at Meadowood.

Youth group members ran a number of events, including a pancake breakfast, a square dance and a milinery shop.

Cecil Lyon was asked to help find homes for Vietnam refugees in the area.

A blue ribbon study committee of the long-range goals of Conval schools was appointed, with Dick Amidon named chairman.

Summer Thing sponsored a driver education course for 30 students, as well as several bicycle trips and youth programs.

Little League coaches Al Senechal and Bruce Kierstead were pleased to see the Hancock team make it to the Crotched Mt. League play-offs, although they were unsuccessful in their bid for a crack at the championship.

But, lest we forget, nature too has her traditions. In August, a baby loon was born at Willard Pond, the first seen there since the hotly disputed reclamation in 1969. Perhaps the occasion should serve to remind us that we, too, are a part of that intricate web of life.

THINGS WORTH KNOWING ABOUT

Ambulance — Emergency ambulance service is available to Hancock residents at no charge. The town appropriates money in its budget to cover its share of this areawide service. Call Keene Mutual Aid (1-352-1100). The ambulance, staffed by trained volunteers, is dispatched from Peterborough.

Assessing of Taxes — All real and personal property liable for taxation is appraised and the taxes are assessed against such property as of April 1. That means if you build a new house in April, you will not pay any taxes on it until the following April.

In mid-March you will receive an inventory form to complete and return to the selectmen. It is very important to answer the questions fully and return the form by April 15. Failure to file forfeits the opportunity to appeal.

All appraisal work is performed by the selectmen and appraisal records are public documents, available for inspection during normal office hours. The town tax map is also open to inspection.

Resident taxes are also assessed as of April 1. Proof of payment of this tax is required to register motor vehicles, hold operator's licenses, and obtain hunting and fishing licenses. Failure of the selectmen to list one's name as of April 1 does not excuse a person from paying the tax.

Persons who are veterans of the several armed conflicts are eligible for a \$50 exemption on their real estate tax bill if they are also residents as of April 1.

Building Permits — The town requires that a building permit be obtained prior to inception of any improvement project, including new construction and additions. An additional permit may be required if you live within the historic district; in some cases (painting, re-roofing, etc.), where no building permit is required, a permit from the Historic District Commission may still be required. If you are in doubt as to whether or not a permit is needed, consult the selectmen or the building inspector.

Camp Guild — In 1974, the Town of Hancock voted to purchase about 15 acres bordering Norway Pond which had formerly been used as a summer camp. A Commission to oversee the development of the property for conservation and recreational purposes was established by Town Meeting in 1975.

Conservation Commission — Hancock's eight member Conservation Commission is appointed by the selectmen for three-year terms to oversee a variety of activities, including carrying

out educational programs, acquisition of scenic easements, scenic and ecologically sensitive lands and other property, and identifying and protecting valuable natural resources. Among its noteworthy achievements in past years are its publication of a town map and supervision of the tree cutting project at Juggernaut Pond, the town's water supply.

Current Use Assessment — Also called "land use" or "open space," the Current Use Assessment Law permits owners of farm and forest land to apply for reductions in their appraised valuations. The law is quite detailed but is intended to encourage the preservation of open space and prevent its conversion to more intensive use. Application forms are available from the selectmen; filing deadline is April 15.


Dogs — Dogs in Hancock must be licensed by May 1. Fees payable to the town clerk are \$2 for males and spayed females, \$5 for open females; kennel licenses are available to persons who keep several dogs. Prior to applying for a license, the owner must have the dog vaccinated against rabies and present proof of such immunization. Note: Dogs kill deer during heavy snow months; please help prevent this by keeping track of your dog.

Fire Permit — All landowners should be mindful of strict laws relating to burning brush, leaves and other materials out-of-doors. At most times of the year a written permit from the town forest fire warden is required; citizens would be well advised to check with him before doing any burning.

Fire Protection — The Volunteer Fire Dept. is supported by town appropriation as well as fund raising activities by members of the department and contributions by townspeople. Membership is open to residents, 18 years or older. Training sessions are held every Tuesday night. A study is currently under way to consider a new location for the fire house.

Historic District — At the 1975 Town Meeting, citizens approved the Historic District, which generally includes the Main St. area. A Commission has been appointed to enforce the intent of the Ordinance which is to preserve and safeguard the heritage of the town. Anyone buying property near the Main St. area should find out if he is in the District and become familiar with the restrictions which apply to this area. Residents in the District should apply to the Commission for certificate of approval whenever they consider making changes in their property.





Land Subdivision — Hancock has specific regulations affecting the subdivision of land. Any person contemplating selling any of his real estate in the town should become familiar with the subdivision ordinance, copies of which are available at the town office. (Landowners should be aware that the term "subdivision" doesn't simply mean a place with a group of small lots and houses. Under N. H. law, subdivision means any act which makes two or more tracts where one existed previously.) All subdivisions in Hancock are subject to approval by the town planning board.

Old Home Day — Hancock's annual "togetherness" day, usually the third Saturday in August; a time for reminiscing, making new acquaintances and renewing old ones. Highlights of the festivities are a parade, games and athletic contests, a band concert, craft exhibits, chicken barbecue, and a dance. No commercial sales or exhibits are permitted. The program is under the direction of a self-perpetuating committee of Hancock residents.

Ordinances — The following town ordinances are available at the selectmen's office: Hancock building ordinance, land subdivision control regulations, Hancock historic district ordinance, zoning ordinance.

Police — Police protection is afforded the town of Hancock by the combined efforts of the local police force, the state police, and the county sheriff. The local police force consists of one full-time officer and three special officers.

Recreation Facilities — Town Beach: Located in village at Norway Pond, the beach is for the use of Hancock residents only, and their guests. Children under the age of 10 must be accompanied by a person 13 or older. The beach is staffed by lifeguards and a Red Cross swimming instructor for approximately 8 weeks during the summer. Hours and rules for use, posted at the beach, are strictly enforced.

Town Recreation Area: Located on the grounds of the old high school, School Street, the area includes a ball field, tennis

courts, skating rinks and shuffleboard court.

General rules governing use of these areas are: All persons using the area must conduct themselves in a manner to avoid injury to other persons or damage to the recreational facilities and equipment. Rules for the use of specific areas are posted at each area or available from any member of the Recreation Committee. There is a 10:00 p.m. curfew at both the beach and recreation area.

Roads Subject to Gates and Bars — These are roads and/or sections of roads for which the town owns the right of way but

for which the town is not liable for maintenance. These roads are open to the public, but persons using them do so at their own risk.

Sanitary Landfill — Located approximately half a mile north of the village of Hancock on Route 137. Burning is prohibited, and brush, stumps or car bodies are not accepted. For disposal of latter, see dump attendant.

Soil Map — A report of a survey conducted by the Dept. of Agriculture Soil Service indicates the classifications and characterizations of soil in the town of Hancock and the suitability of the soils for various purposes. Report, data sheets, and interpretive maps available at selectmen's office.

Taxation — The town levies various taxes directly, and receives taxes collected by the state on behalf of municipalities. Direct taxes include: the real estate tax on buildings, land, mobile homes and certain other categories of real property; the yield tax on timber and wood products at time of cutting; the resident tax which is a flat \$10 tax assessed against everyone age 18 to 64; and the National Bank stock tax.

Taxes collected by the state from local persons and remitted to the town include the interest and dividend tax and the savings bank tax, which is paid by the banks but is based on the home town and size of a person's deposits. Taxes of which the town receives a share after having been collected by the state are the business profits tax; meals and rooms tax; and highway subsidy, which is derived from the gasoline tax. The town also receives federal tax money in the form of revenue sharing payments.

HANCOCK GUIDE TO TOWN MEETING

Many new people in Hancock have questions about how the Town Meeting is run, and even old-timers sometimes get mystified by the complexities of parliamentary procedure. The Town Meeting at its best is democracy in its purest form. But the Meeting can't be at its best unless all the participants know the rules — what they can't do, and more important, what they can do to exercise their rights as town citizens. This brief guide is a summary of the most important facts and rules about Town Meeting. It is meant to be an introduction for newcomers and a quick reminder for everyone else of what we will be doing when we come together early in March.

WHAT IS THE TOWN MEETING?

The Town Meeting is the legislative branch of town government. As a registered voter of the town you fill the same role in the Town Meeting as your Congressman does in Washington. You authorize town expenditures and decide on the laws or ordinances by which the town is governed. The Town Meeting derives its powers from the state of New Hampshire, and it cannot do anything that is inconsistent with state or federal law. But that still leaves plenty of freedom, since the state has given the town more than 140 different powers in the form of "enabling acts." Among other things, the town can elect its officers, approve or regulate their actions, and direct them to take special action. It can raise, borrow, and spend money. It has significant control over the town's roads, sewers, cemeteries, garbage, police, fire protection, dogs, and parks. It can adopt

building codes and zoning ordinances to control quality of structures and types of land use. For other examples of what the town can do, look at the Town Meeting warrant in any town report.

In Hancock the annual Town Meeting occurs in two parts. Election of officers by ballot takes place on the first Tuesday in March and the Meeting to discuss other business convenes on the following Saturday. Special Meetings to consider urgent business at other times of the year may be called by the selectmen or by petition of 50 or more town citizens. Special Town Meetings are an extra expense to the town, however, so they are not called unless absolutely necessary.

THE WARRANT

The warrant is the schedule or agenda for the Meeting. It is a "warning" to all citizens telling them the time and date for the Town Meeting and what items of business or "articles" will be discussed. The state requires that all townspeople have sufficient notice of the Meeting so that they can inform and prepare themselves for discussion and voting. Therefore it sets forth strict requirements about posting and publishing the warrant well in advance of the Meeting. (If the selectmen don't post the warrant properly, they can be fined.) For the same reason, no new item of business that has not been "duly warned" can be acted upon at the Meeting. The townspeople can amend articles of the warrant or make detailed changes such as altering sums of money in the budget. But they can't bring up something totally new that wasn't on the warrant in some form. The last article on the warrant may refer to "any other business which may legally come before the meeting," but the only legal motions allowed at that point are resolutions of thanks to town officials, or other gracious speeches.

HOW DO ARTICLES GET ON THE WARRANT?

The selectmen or other town officers put most of them on, since they know what decisions must be made to keep the town running smoothly — a new snowplow is needed, or the state has ruled that the old dump must be closed. Articles on the budget or on other financial matters are written in consultation with the town's advisory committee. The planning board may submit articles related to such things as zoning or subdivision ordinances.

Any ten qualified voters of the town may submit to the selectmen an article for insertion in the warrant. It must be presented at least 35 days before the Meeting date. The selectmen are obliged to include such voter-originated articles on the warrant, as long as their content doesn't violate state law. They are usually distinguished on the warrant with the notation: (by petition).

WHO'S THAT GUY UP FRONT?

He is the town moderator, the presiding officer of the Town Meeting. He is like a friendly traffic cop, trying to keep the traffic of ideas, suggestions, and resolutions flowing smoothly until a consensus is reached. The state gives the moderator a great deal of power. He can make the rules by which the meeting is run, and he can even change them as he goes along (although they are not required to, most moderators use Robert's Rules of Order as a guide). He can decide whether a motion is in order and whether the "ayes" or "nays" have won in a voice vote. He can order disruptive people to be thrown out of the Meeting. No one can speak at the Meeting unless he or she has been recognized by the moderator.

There are only two things limiting what a moderator can do in the conduct of a Town Meeting. He cannot violate any state or federal law. And he can be overruled by the majority vote of the citizens. If you disagree with a moderator's decision, you can challenge it, after recognition, by saying, "I appeal from the decision of the chair." Then the moderator must ask the entire Meeting to sustain or counteract his judgement.

CONDUCT OF THE MEETING

The moderator is required to read the entire warrant at the beginning of the Town Meeting. Then he proceeds through the warrant, article by article, until the people have acted in some way on each one. Before discussion of each separate article the moderator usually reads it again and then says to the Meeting "What will you do with this article?" At this point a proponent of the article (usually designated in advance by the selectmen) rises, says, "I move that . . .", followed by the exact wording he would like the resolution to have, and hands a written copy of the resolution to the town clerk. If the motion is seconded, the moderator gives it to the meeting for discussion and action.

At this point you as a qualified voter of the town have many options. You can:

• ask a question about the resolution

• offer your opinion about it (the moderator is entitled to limit the time allotted to each speaker)

• suggest a change or amendment to the resolution

- move to table the resolution or to postpone it until a future time
- move to refer the matter to a committee, town officer, or some other body for further study

• "call the question," or ask that the discussion be ended, and the matter be put to a vote.

VOTING

When discussion of an article is ended, the moderator puts the resolution to a vote. Only qualified voters of the town are al-

lowed to vote. There are five methods of voting, and the moderator may choose which to use. They are:

- voice vote (the quickest and most often used)
- show of hands
- standing vote (the proponents stand and are counted, and then the opponents)
- division of the house (the "ayes" move to the moderator's right, the "nays" to his left, and each side is counted).
- ballot vote (in cases of an extremely close vote or one where secrecy is desired, votes are written on slips of paper and given to the town clerk for counting. Each voter must be checked against the town's checklist to ensure that he is indeed a qualified voter in the town. This voting method is very time-consuming and rarely used. However, if 7 citizens ask for a ballot vote on any issue, the moderator is required to conduct one.)

In general, a majority vote is required to pass any resolution. If the vote is an exact tie, the motion is defeated unless the moderator votes to break the tie.

ADJOURNMENT

When all the business on the warrant has been transacted, the moderator will call for a motion to adjourn. Anyone can make an adjournment motion at any time during the Meeting provided it is in order; and like any other motion, it must be passed by a majority vote. On rare occasions, a Meeting will not be adjourned, but will be recessed until a later date, in order to consider tabled resolutions. Each Meeting is considered a separate body, ending at its adjournment, and thus no Meeting can stipulate procedure or rules for a subsequent Meeting.

HOW CAN I REGISTER?

To participate in the Town Meeting, you must be a registered voter in Hancock. To register, you must either appear at a meeting of the Supervisors of the Checklist or fill out an application for registration at the office of the Town Clerk.

The supervisors give notice of their meetings, usually held two or three times preceding elections and town meetings. You may register up to 10 days before an election. When you appear to register, they will ask you to complete a simple questionnaire. If you are unable to appear at a supervisors meeting, you may fill out an application at the town clerk's office. This will be passed on to the supervisor who will place your name on the checklist. In either case, bring your birth certificate or a passport.

Historic District Commission

Library Trustees

Because of a letter dated Aug. 30, 1974, notifying us that the privately owned driveway adjacent to the library could no longer be used for library purposes, we reported to the 1975 town meeting our serious concern about access to the rear of the building and sponsored an article in the town warrant authorizing the selectmen to acquire a narrow strip of land on the east side of the Library for that purpose.

After two meetings with the land owner, seeking an amicable settlement, we were advised by letter that any further negotiations must be referred to our respective counsels.

The article for the land acquisition having been adopted at town meeting, we continued efforts to negotiate in good faith and to avoid litigation. The town offered to purchase the land for the total amount set by the town appraiser, namely, \$3,471. The efforts to negotiate broke down in June, and finally, upon advice of town counsel, the eminent domain procedure was invoked and the property was taken on July 18, 1975.

Meanwhile, a public hearing was held on July 1, 1975, for the selectmen to consider the petition to acquire the property. The library trustees were present to explain the need for the additional land. At the conclusion of the hearing, the owner's attorney presented a written proposal to sell the land in question

for a lump sum of \$5,000, an amount arrived at by a second appraiser retained by the owners.

After this offer, the town counsel recommended a compromise settlement which was subsequently rejected. Because legal expense was mounting rapidly, the library trustees and the selectmen agreed that the matter should be resolved as quickly as possible, and the town counsel was authorized to accept the \$5,000 offer.

Concluding the matter, on Dec. 22, 1975, the town counsel advised that a stipulation had been filed with the Superior Court stating that the parties have agreed the total damages to be paid shall be \$5,000. The Library will pay from the reserve fund the difference between the amount appropriated and the actual cost. Reimbursement for the additional cost will be requested by an article in the 1976 town warrant.

Another parcel of land on the north side of the library lot was owned by Willard G. and Pauline E. Watson. To straighten an existing jog in that property line and to facilitate work on the rear wall of the old library building, the Watsons generously volunteered to give the town a narrow strip of land running the full length of the library lot. The deed for this land was executed on Dec. 2, 1975. Such cheerful cooperation is much appreciated.

Pursuant to the recommendations in the library space committee report presented to the 1974 town meeting, the trustees prepared a master plan corresponding with the report's principal conclusions, among which the eventual requirement of about 600 square feet of additional floor space was chief. This plan anticipates construction of a second floor in the old building over what is now referred to as the middle room and the stack room. A careful budget estimate has been prepared and, at 1975 prices, the total cost of this project would be about \$50,000. A scale model of the proposed work is on display in the library.

One purpose of the master plan is to delineate the facilities needed in the future to ensure that short-range objectives coincide with the ultimate scheme. The space committee cited the most pressing short-range objectives as, 1) more space available in the middle room for library patrons to read and study; and 2) more efficient arrangement of work space for the librarians. We have a detailed plan with specifications for the middle room alteration and have assurance that the work can be accomplished for under \$4,000.

We had hoped to complete this improvement in 1975, and had accumulated sufficient funds for that purpose. However, access to the rear of the library building was essential, and al-

though we eventually obtained that access, the price demanded and the additional expense through prolonged legal negotiations prevented us from making a commitment to that end. We regret the postponement of this much needed improvement.

In addition to the land acquisition, we can report some

minor accomplishments:

- 1. The walls and ceilings of the front rooms were repaired and painted, and the panels for exhibition of art were covered with new burlap.
- 2. New evergreen shrubs were planted against the front wall.
- 3. The book drop was relocated inside the front door, with an access slot provided in the door panel so that books may be returned when the library is closed.
 - 4. The library signs were rearranged and refurbished.

5. A new set of by-laws has been adopted.

There has been no change in the library staff this year. The librarians have cheerfully adjusted to many unavoidable emergencies. The Hancock library is one of the finest small town libraries in the State of New Hampshire — a well deserved reputation, due primarily to the excellence of our staff.

The accompanying reports of the librarian and the treasurer indicate that we are maintaining a healthy and vigorous

facility.

As of October 1, 1975 the library hours were changed, and are as follows: Tuesday and Thursday 1 to 7 P.M. and Saturday 1 to 5 p.m. These hours will continue throughout the year.

The library is exceedingly grateful for the many gifts of

excellent books and records.

Planning Board

The planning board held 21 meetings in 1975, including hearings on subdivision applications and on proposed amendments to the zoning and building ordinances.

Six subdivision applications were approved. All were of minor nature.

The proposed amendments to the zoning and building ordinances, for consideration at town meeting, deal primarily with the establishment of a floodplain and wetlands district. This is a further step in the action initiated by the 1975 town meeting to qualify Hancock under the federal flood insurance program.

The board has begun work on a master plan for Hancock, as required by state statutes. Seven of the board meetings were devoted to this effort, which will continue in 1976.

Fire Station Study Committee

We have met regularly during the past several months. The following points will substantiate the unanimous recommendations of this committee: that Hancock does need a new fire station facility.

1. Our local fire insurance rates are determined by the fire insurance underwriters. In order to maintain our current rate, we must conform to their recommendations. First line equipment (pumper etc., not the tank truck) should not be more than 20 years old. This necessitates the purchase of another truck in about ten years.

2. We depend upon the Mutual Aid Program. In order to maintain this very beneficial reciprocal situation, Hancock must be able to provide service at the high standards expected by other participating towns.

3. Storage for this equipment is important. A minimum of 6000 sq. ft., which includes lavatory space, an assembly room, radio room and room for the forestry fire fighting equipment is indicated.

4. The current location does not provide for these needs at this time, nor can it be expanded economically.

- narrow driveway from fire station

- parked vehicles are a frequent hazard

Too small — 3 trucks now use space meant for 2 trucks (1260 sq. ft.)

- downstairs area small and inefficient (396 sq. ft.)

We have discussed possible sites on town-owned property and the areas are as follows:

- 1. Bennington Road and East end of School Street
- 2. Elementary School area (Common ground)
- 3. Town property at East end of Dump Road
 4. Area by the town barns at Bennington Road

4. Area by the town barns at Bennington Road

The advantages and disadvantages of each of these sites can be enumerated, but the preference of the Committee is #3.

It is the conclusion of the Fire Station Study Committee that we need a new Fire Station. The F.S.S.C. recommends that the Selectmen appoint a Building Committee of at least 7 members to consider the recommendations of this committee and to make specific recommendations as to: building size & type, site evaluation and financing by March 1977.

History Committee

During 1975, the history committee held regular meetings at the library on the second Monday afternoon of each month.

Most of the efforts have been directed toward compiling a bicentennial book which we hope to have on sale by the summer of 1976. Entitled, A Prelude to Hancock's Second Hundred Years, it will contain excerpts from various papers about the town's early days. Many of the writers are grandparents and great grandparents of present residents. Included also will be pictures, maps, and a cover designed by committee artist, Eleanor Amidon, as well as condensations of the work of our present researchers.

Besides researching and writing, several committee members have been guest speakers at meetings of such local organizations as the Woman's Club, the Guild, and the A.A.R.P. Listeners have enjoyed Lewis Tuttle's fascinating "Hancock Railroads"; Mary Hibbard's interesting talk, "From Indian Trail to Super Highway"; and Doris Rogers' book review which previews our coming bicentennial contribution.

Marjorie-Tuttle has been invaluable as typist, saving many fading, hand-written treasures from extinction. At present, she is researching the story of the John Hancock Inn.

Each paper which has come to us from the past, as well as the committee's own work, has been multi-copied on a Zerox machine kindly loaned to the selectmen through the thoughtfulness of Victor Stoykovich. A copy of each paper has been placed in the history room file and in a labeled box in the town library reference section. Other copies have been retained for use in excerpting portions for the book.

The library file has already proven useful. It was in this that Dorothy Starratt discovered the incidents and people for the melodramas with which the Youth Group entertained an

enthusiastic audience on the eve of Old Home Day.

In answer to our calls for help, we have had several volunteers. Marie Fogg has been busy digging for details of early stores; Ann Moller is working on the history of Hancock's post offices; Icy Lent has contributed many hours to condensing papers to manageable length, and Lillian Foster is streamlining the railroad history.

We are also grateful for volunteers such as Nancy Ketchum and Else Cordelle, who are patiently waiting for the committee to complete the "dummy" so they can begin typing stencils on the history room's new electric typewriter and running off the final pages on the mimeograph. These machines, purchased with funds set aside by the town for history committee expenses, are available for the use of other local groups.

Police Department

To the People of Hancock:

Crime throughout New Hampshire increased in 1975 and Hancock was no exception, although it did not jump anywhere near the State percentage level. The major increase was about 30% basically in two areas, burglary and larceny. In some cases the individuls have been caught and brought to trial, but in many cases they are not because no suspects were seen in the area. The police will continue to check property as often as possible, but I would like to ask your help by keeping alert and notifying us of any suspicious incidents. With your cooperation and support, the Police Department will do its best to keep crime to a minimum.

Zoning Board of Adjustment

During 1975, the Board held four public hearings on applications for variances from sections of the town zoning ordinance, Two hearings were held on a request by Hancock Homes, Inc., to build condominiums instead of previously approved apartment units. In the absence of evidence that a change in the type of ownership departed from the spirit and intent of the zoning ordinance, the request was granted.

At a re-hearing in response to citizen petition, it was announced that the earlier approval of the apartment complex had been in error, thus rendering the condominium project invalid. Since the building permit had been voluntarily surrendered and cancelled, no further action by the Board was necessary.

The Board heard requests by Wayne Hutchins and Gerald Kneely to move and sell gravel. Both requests were denied on, the basis of insufficient information.

A hearing was also held on a request by Owen Mathewson to place an existing milk house closer to a road than the required setback. Since no alternative to the proposal was found, the request was approved.

Camp Guild

The Camp Guild Committee held six meetings in 1975. The committee supported a request by the Hancock Depot Committee that the railroad depot not be razed, pending an effort to obtain restoration funds.

Plans are under way to remove remaining hazards and obstacles from the camp property. This work is being done under direction of the selectmen.

Working from the study report, the committee has sought to work out details of land use. The townspeople should use the land, but with restraint and caution consistent with its being a natural or wilderness area. Adherence to this guiding principle would mean rules and regulations could be kept to a minimum.

The committee recommends that family picnics be allowed, as long as the "take out what you take in" rule is strictly adhered to. It further suggests that the easterly 5.9-acre peninsula area be for picnics and walking only, leaving the remainder open to relatively tranquil family-oriented recreation. Organized sports in general would be discouraged. Fires, camping and motorized vehicles would be prohibited.

The complex question of swimming at the camp beach has been discussed at length. In the best interests of the town and its people, the committee reluctantly advises against permitting swimming. Some of the reasons are:

· Hancock is particularly fortunate in having three swim-

ming areas.

· There would almost certainly be an exodus of youngsters to the unsupervised beach, undermining discipline at the present beach and creating hazards common to all unregulated waterfronts.

• The town could suffer serious legal-financial conse-

quences in the event of a swimming disaster.

• A decision to institute a second supervised waterfront would mean an additional tax burden.

Final decision rests with voters and selectmen, as the committee's function is advisory.

A special word of thanks is due all who have given time and effort on behalf of the camp property, particularly the members of the fire department who burned the remaining buildings.

Finally, the committee invites suggestions for a new name for this area. "Camp Guild" is neither historic nor consistently pronounced.

Recreation Committee

1975 has brought this committee to the final stage of our Master Plan for the Old High School Recreation Area. This committee has coordinated over the past several years the following activities in the first two stages: leveling, reloaming and reseeding of the ball field, building of a shuffleboard court, establishment and maintenance of a hockey rink and pleasure skating rink with lighting and the refinishing of the gym floor. These projects are greatly indebted to funding from the Guild and the Town and the constant care and maintenance provided by Mert Knowles and Bob Stewart.

Our final stage is the building of a new tennis court and we have raised approximately \$7,000 to that end, in hopes the Town will match our funds for the construction of a new court.

Our programs this year include tennis lessons for both adults and children, a beach program with swimming lessons

for the children of Hancock, a Little League Baseball team run by Al Senechal, Mac Allgood and Bruce Kierstead that saw fifteen youngsters place second in their league and a Farm League under the direction of Ed Coughlan, Dr. Benoit and Kerry Cote which helped 35-40 youngsters learn and enjoy the fundamentals of baseball. The shuffleboard court has a new fence, installed by Jules Pickering and is enjoyed by many of the townspeople.
