### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the president and trustees of the Frost Free Library, the librarian submits the following report for the year ending Oct. 10, 1928.

The library has been open 102 times with a circulation of 5,327 books, 3,410 of which were adult fiction, 1,525 juvenile fiction, 215 adult non-fiction, and 177 juvenile non-fiction. The total circulation of magazines was 3,694.

One hundred and one new books have been added during the year, 52 adult and 49 juvenile. Eighty-nine were purchased from the library fund and twelve were donated by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Webb, who have been very thoughtful in remembering the library.

Taylor was the examining physician, assisted by Mrs. L. Hasham, R. N., of the division of maternity and infancy. They were assisted by Miss Ruth Hemenway, R. N., Miss M. A. Philbrick, R. N., and Miss E. J. Burke, R. N. A committee of the Marlboro Woman's Club, Mrs. John Harris and Mrs. Frank Wiswall served tea to the mothers and milk and crackers to the children. The general committee consisted of Mrs. Nellie Erikson, Mrs. Ruth Pratt, Mrs. Henry Frechette and Miss Grace Richardson. Mrs. Sadie Hart and Mrs. Marie Frechette had charge of transportation.

Thursday, May 10th, "Bill" Bartlett gave his famous lecture on "Health" at Town Hall to the school children under the auspices of the Marlboro Woman's Club.

We had two tonsilotomy clinics, patients being transported by Mr. Chas. Brown. Miss Frances Cushing has very generously used her car when necessary to take a sick pupil home.

The local Red Cross chapter have assisted financially in supporting our dental clinics, and the American Legion and Ladies' Auxiliary in our welfare work. We are also indebted to the Marlboro Fire Department for the use of their rooms for the pre-school clinic.

The staff of the local telephone office very courteously aid in rendering prompt service to our calls.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlborough :

I submit herewith my sixth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Our legislators at Concord are striving to find some avenue by which they may lighten the burden of taxation.

We heartily co-operate with them in so far as it does not cripple our educational institutions.

As the printing of reports is costly, I shall emphasize the word *brevity* in my remarks. My statements will be general rather than specific and given to details.

President Hoover has stated concisely the philosophy of our educational system in the following words: "Racial progress marches upon the feet of healthy and instructed children. There should be no child in America that is not born and does not live under sound conditions of health; that does not have full opportunity of education from the beginning to the end of our institutions; that is not free from injurious labor; that does not have every stimulation to accomplish the fullest of its capacities."

These promotions were based on regularity of attendance, daily rank, examinations and standard tests.

### TEACHERS FOR YEAR 1928-1929

Two changes were made in our teaching staff this year.

Miss Geneva Jean Howe having resigned as music teacher to accept a position in the Keene schools, Miss Ruth Hutchinson, a graduate of Keene Normal, was elected as music teacher.

Miss Ruth Bragg having accepted a position in the Keene schools, Miss Norma Atwood, a graduate of Keene Normal, was elected for the Wallace school.

Our teachers are alert to their responsibilities and responsive to the highest welfare of their pupils.

Each teacher is deserving of an individual encomium; but adhering to the text I started with, I will simply say that for every one hundred cents expended for teachers, Marlboro gets one dollar's worth of service.

Our greatest handicap is the over-crowded conditions of our school rooms. The seating capacity of the high school is taxed to the limit and three of the grade rooms have forty-five or more pupils. Also three of the grade teachers are teaching two grades.

If these conditions continue, I believe it would be reasonable judgment that the town take some action to relieve the situation.

## GRADUATION

The Marlboro High School held its graduation exercises in the Marlboro Town Hall on the evening of June 15. The activities consisted of exercises at eight o'clock followed by a reception and dance held by the members of the graduating class. The following were the graduates: Allison Coutts, Henrietta De Mange, Elizabeth Hackler, Ivah Hackler, Carol Lang, Marion Lawrence, Dorothy Tonseth, Ethel Whipple, Siami Wiinikka.

Six members of the class have entered higher institutions of learning. Ethel Whipple and Ivah Hackler are at the University of New Hampshire. Henrietta De Mange, Elizabeth Hackler and Dorothy Tonseth have entered hospitals for training. Marion Lawrence is studying at a business college in Worcester.

## MARLBORO HIGH SCHOOL

Headmaster Bissell reports the following data:

"The following is a brief report of the activities in Marlboro High.

"The number enrolled in the High School is more than ever before, the number is seventy. Two years ago the registration was fifty-four so the number of pupils is steadily increasing.

"Enrollment by classes:

"The Junior High is smaller than last year due to a small seventh grade. The number enrolled is forty-eight.

"There are two courses offered in High School namely the Commercial and Classical. The Commercial takes up the study of shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping, etc. The Classical course takes up the study of Latin. There are 46 enrolled in the commercial and 24 in the classical.

## SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

"In the past year the usual public speaking contest was held as well as the production of a drama in the Town Hall. On the eight major holidays of the year, programs appropriate to the occasion were given at the school. These programs were both musical and dramatical and included original papers and essays. The new activities consist of a French Club, the purpose of which is to interest the students in a more common use of the French language, and a Junior High Dramatic Club which has been formed to create an interest in the art of impersonation. An orchestra has been organized in school which is a welcome addition to our school activities.

## ATHLETICS

"The basketball season of 1927-28 was not a success as far as the games won and lost was concerned but the team was being developed for another year. The boys and girls teams finished in the lower half of the league standing.

"The baseball season of 1928 was not very successful, the team finishing in last place in the Monadnock League. The players were new at the game but learned rapidly and were playing close games at the end of the season.

"The basketball season of 1928-29. In the Monadnock League Hollis High was added and Peterboro dropped leaving six teams in the league. Marlboro High boys team is at present in second place. In the district Keene High and Marlboro High are tied and a game will be played at Keene on the Normal School floor to see which team will represent the district at the University of New Hampshire tournament.

"The Girls' Team is playing good basketball. Their standing in the league is 4th place."

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To the Superintendent of Schools:

On recommendation of the school examining physician, Dr. L. G. Hildreth, eight pupils were taken to the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene and had tonsils removed. All pupils were examined and parents notified in writing any physical defects found.

Feb. 17, 1928, the third annual clinic for pupils under average weight was held in the office of the school building, 9 a. m.-3 p. m., by Dr. R. B. Kerr, Manchester, N. H., chest specialist, assisted by Miss Mildred Gage, R. N., county T. B. nurse, and Miss Henrietta Demanche as secretary. Dr. Kerr reports a tremendous gain in general and physical condition of pupils examined. The first clinic held, 70% of pupils enrolled were under average weight and 30% were of normal weight and today conditions are reversed, with 30% under average and 70% are up to normal.

Owing to one of the more modern health slogans "Visit your dentist twice a year" we are putting the idea into force by having Dr. G. A. Danforth conduct two dental clinics during the school year. During the spring clinic 246 students had dental work done, 16 adults availed themselves of the opportunity and 8 pre-school children. In September 47 students had work done, 13 adults and 1 pre-school child. There were 63 extractions, 184 fillings and 5 treatments. The nurse was in attendance 162 hours during dental clinics; 41 hours weighing, measuring and assisting school doctor.
