The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 to accept Trunk Line maintenance.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for State Aid maintenance.
8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Central road, so-called, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for Town Highways, the sum of \$200.00 for this purpose.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to accept Federal Aid.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trunk Line Aid for Construction.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to resurface the road between the State Aid Project at John Tuttle's and Furber's Corner.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to co-operate with the State in Pine Blister Rust Eradication.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairs on the Town Hall.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to license dance halls, and charge a license fee sufficient to cover expense of police.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have the main roads, including the stage lines, through the Town of Northwood ploughed out during the winter with some approved power plow, the width and depth ploughed to be sufficient to accommodate the traffic.

17. To hear the report of the committee appointed at the last annual meeting, to investigate the matter of establishing a town forest in the Town of Northwood. To take any necessary action in regard

to said report and see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to carry out the recommendations of the committee.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in excess of the amount required by law for the Northwood Public Library.

19. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money to replace temporary loans.

22. To see if the Town will vote to discount 2 per cent. on all property tax paid on or before August 1st.

23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all other purposes.

Inspection carried on by the County Blister Rust Agent, Mr. Barraclough, during the period in which control work was carried on as well as at other times during the past year, brought to light the fact that wild currant and gooseberry bushes are very abundant throughout the town and as a consequence infected pines were found to be very numerous. Already in many areas throughout the town Blister Rust is becoming serious and every effort should be made within the very near future to continue control work in order that the spread of Blister Rust may be checked.

We are enclosing herewith a map of your town, upon which has been indicated the area covered to date. In case there is any further information regarding the work of the past season which is desired by the Board of Selectmen, or any other person in the town, we would be glad to supply it to the best of our ability.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Northwood:

There are towns in New Hampshire having a larger population and boasting of more wealth than Northwood, but it is doubtful if any town in this state has a more progressive Woman's Club than is found here. Last year, the Harvey Lake Woman's Club conducted a dental clinic for the benefit of our school children. The following facts indicate the amount of work done.

The majority of the parents paid for the work done. In needy cases, the Woman's Club met the expense for the service rendered. This clinic was one of the best things for the health of our school children we have ever had in Northwood. Full credit should be given to the Woman's Club for fostering this work. Plans are being made to have another dental clinic this spring. Doubtless all parents will gladly avail themselves of the opportunity to have their children's teeth given needed attention.

Another project carried out by the Woman's Club was the installation of play ground apparatus in the school yards. At the Narrows School, a volley ball court was laid out and a net put up. A giant stride was erected and teeter boards were constructed. The equipment of the Narrows School was duplicated at the Ridge School. At the Mountain School teeter boards were put in place.

Hanging around, telling smutty stories, and carving pictures in the out buildings, used to be favorite pastimes, years ago, during the periods when school was not in session. There is no better way to keep children out of mischief, than to keep them doing something on the play ground. With the apparatus that our schools now have, the children can spend their time during the recess period and the noon hour in real play, which is profitable as well as enjoyable.

The most important factor in the whole school system is the teacher. She alone merits the credit when our schools attain a high standard of efficiency. Northwood is fortunate in having teachers who, through experience and training have become proficient. To the teachers belong the praise for the excellent work being done in our schools at the present time.
