



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THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rindge, in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rindge on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of the selectmen, overseer of the poor, town treasurer, town clerk, and reports of all agents, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and act in any way relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for the construction of Class 2 roads, known as Fitzwilliam road, and raise and appropriate, or set aside for the purpose the sum of \$1,654.00, or will accept State Aid for Class 5 roads, known as "Town Road Aid" and raise and appropriate, or set aside, for said purpose the sum of \$909.23.

5. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see what method the Town will adopt to collect taxes.

7. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a section of the road between Rindge and Squantum beginning at the East end of the Contoocook Inn road, so called, passing over Sherwin Hill to Jaffrey line, or act in any way relating thereto. 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one half of any necessary sum to be expended on the South side of roof of the Town Hall Building, or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, and Road Agent to purchase an up to date snow plow for the Town tractor, raise and appropriate a sum of money for said purpose, or act in any way relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to reopen and maintain Danforth road, so called, including the bridge, leading from Middle Winchendon Road, for approximately one half mile to where old buildings formerly stood, or act in any way relating thereto.

11. Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

12. To see if the Town will make any changes in the fire equipment, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to install a new heating system in the Ingalls Memorial Library, or act in any way relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars to care for the Common at West Rindge.

15. To allow bills of charge.

In Memoriam

MARY LEE WARE

The overshadowing event of the past year is the loss of our long time friend and benefactor, Miss Mary Lee Ware, who passed away on Jan. 9th, 1937. For fifty-three years her interest, encouragement, and generosity has fostered the growth of our library facilities, stimulating our cultural and educational activities as well as offering wholesome recreation through the medium of books.

It was in 1884, that Miss Ware initiated her first library experiment, with a collection of 140 books, placed in the home of Mrs. Charles Sawtelle, Mrs. Sawtelle acting as librarian. The books were circulated free of charge among residents of West Rindge only, a community at that time comprised of forty-five homes. The stock of books was increased from time to time and an additional service was established for the benefit of the "residents in the west part of the town," in the form of a "home library." This was a collection of twenty books maintained at the home of Mrs. Vernon Bean and changed for a new supply as the use of the books made it desirable. In 1887 the privilege of borrowing books was extended to the community at Rindge Center and later to East Rindge.

After twelve years of careful and efficient administration of the main West Rindge library, it became necessary to change the location of the books, since Mrs. Sawtelle was leaving town, and they were placed in a room in the lower floor of Deacon H. E. Wetherbee's home where they have remained to the present time. Miss Eva Butterfield became librarian in 1896 and continued her work for three years, when Mrs. Herbert E. Wetherbee began her long and faithful service of 33 years, terminated in 1932 by her last illness.

In 1895, the fine new library, Ingalls Memorial, was given to the Town and that naturally became the central library, with West Rindge serving as a branch. Miss Ware was chosen as one of its first trustees and generously extended her time and interest to include its welfare in her support of the literary culture of the town. She served as trustee for 38 years and upon her retirement was appointed by the Town as trustee emeritus, never wearying in her efforts for the success of both libraries. The expenses of the West Rindge library have been met entirely from her private resources and she has been most generous in her gifts to the Center library, of books, magazines, and her very latest, a stereoscope with a picture library by the aid of which one may enjoy a travel trip around the world.

Several years after the opening of Ingalls Memorial Library, she planned and executed the idea of a museum in the second story of the building, and it is to her generosity that we owe the very fine bird and animal collection on exhibit there, the folios of pressed wild flowers native to Rindge, also a collection of Indian relics and hand work, as well as many antiques which she gave and collected from the older townspeople for the preservation of articles illuminating to our town history.

In recalling these steps in the progress of our libraries, we seek to acquaint our newer residents with the deep debt of gratitude, which we owe to our late benefactor and to record in the minutes of this report our acknowledgment of, and profound sense of appreciation, for the inestimable service and the rich heritage which her life has given to our community.

In attending district and state library meetings, your librarian is becoming more and more convinced of the fact, that we are a fortunate small town community, to possess such well equipped libraries as serve our literary and educational desires. Few of the towns of our size, in this part of the state, have such extensive opportunities for those of a literary bent.

In speaking of outside library contacts, it seems an opportune time to mention the secretary of our Public Library Commission, Miss Dorothy Annable, who has been so progressive in her plans for our libraries and so untiring in her efforts to encourage and inspire all of us to higher standards of efficiency. Also we are not allowed to forget that we own a State Library, for Miss Thelma Brackett, the librarian, is continually keeping us awake to the opportunity for borrowing books there, which might be too rare or expensive for us to own.

The book circulation for this library has been good during the past year, although we hope to increase it to a still higher figure. Now that we are recovering from the expensive job of recataloging, which was accomplished several years ago, we anticipate a larger supply of new books, and this will no doubt attract more readers.

In August, on Old Home Sunday, we again kept open house, and enjoyed visits from a large number of our home-coming guests. The visitors to the museum have numbered 130, aside from the children and nearby residents whose visits are too frequent to be recorded.

Miss Ware's influence was so much interwoven with the life of our library, we can hardly close this report without mentioning how much we shall miss her, although the evidence of her interest here will speak to us from every turn in our library activity.

The routine inspection of each pupil's scalp, teeth, vision, skin, posture and general hygiene began with the opening of the school year. Defects found as follows:

A chest clinic was conducted by Dr. R. B. Kerr, at the center school Oct. 23. Forty-one pupils and three adults were examined. Follow-up visits were made to the homes of those found to have any trouble and the care and treatment carefully explained to them.

Fifty-one school visits were made since last report. Treatments in school 9. Sixty-three home visits were made following up defects, explaining how to care for communicable diseases and encouraging parents to take advantage of the opportunity offered through the clinics for the treatment and correction of their children's defects.

The beneficial results obtained from using Cod Liver Oil and milk, furnished through the schools the past few years, is seen in the improved health of the children. This added nutrition, aside from its benefits to the children, has been profitable to all of us in its educational value. With the removal of defects, leaving them free to gain, and good nutrition, we have watched the children regain their health.

It is important that growing children have plenty of milk as it is especially needed to supply Lime for the growth and development of teeth and bones. The teeth are more dependent on proper nutrition than any other factor. A balanced diet which contains adequate amounts of vitamins A, C and D must be given if we are to obtain best results. Cod Liver Oil is the best source of A and D vitamins. Oranges, tomatoes and raw cabbage are rich in vitamin C.

In addition to good nutrition the teeth must be kept clean. As soon as several baby teeth appear they must be watched carefully and if through carelessness or oversight a cavity appears it should be filled immediately.

It is high time that mothers "cry down" the old myth, that baby teeth are unimportant, just a makeshift until the permanent teeth come. Baby teeth are the natural guides for the permanent teeth when they come. The so-called "six year molars," upon which not only the whole permanent set but the actual shape of the face, the mental and physical welfare of the child depend, are often lost, most parents thinking them temporary teeth do not trouble about them.

The first teeth neglected or removed too soon will spoil the appearance of the permanent set and should never be removed without the advice of your Dentist. Much suffering, both mentally and physically would be prevented if teeth were properly cared for from early childhood.

I thank the school officials, teachers, organizations, parents and pupils for their help and interest in support of the health work.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

I submit herewith my nineteenth annual report, it being the thirty-third in the series under union supervision.

The enrollment of the Rindge schools for the first twelve weeks of the school year 1935-1936 was seventy-four, as compared with ninety-one for the same period last year and ninety-seven for the same period two years ago.

The only change in teachers occurred in the primary room at Rindge Center, where Miss Marjorie Carver of Troy, a graduate of Keene Normal School, was chosen to succeed Mrs. Hazel Gilbert. Mrs. F. Emily Stebbins has continued her work as music supervisor, taking in this year all the Rindge schools.

Miss Margaret Harris has been retained as school nurse, and has given careful attention to the health of the pupils. Her report should be carefully examined by all those interested in the health program of our schools.

The work of all the schools has been carried on most effectively. With schools no larger than those now in operation in Rindge considerable time is available for individual work, and there is every indication that this work is being faithfully carried out by all the teachers.

Among the improvements secured during the present year should be mentioned the movable desks secured for the primary school at Rindge Center. The old desks were past their usefulness, and we were fortunate in being able to equip this room at this time.

It was at first decided to secure the ordinary school desks and chairs, but upon further consideration it was decided to secure furniture of the movable type. This type of school desk is particularly desirable for primary grades, and as the desks secured were of the heavier type they do not possess the objectionable features found in the lighter types of movable desks used in many schools.

The standing of the Rindge schools can best be determined by the scholarship of its graduates. The fact that the graduates of the Rindge grades have frequently appeared, and still are appearing, on the honor rolls of the Murdock and Conant High Schools is ample evidence of the preparation of these pupils for secondary education. The per capita cost of maintaining three school buildings for less than seventy-five pupils is larger than it would be to maintain a consolidated school if we had a building suitably arranged to care for the pupils of the entire town. For several years interested citizens have considered the desirability of erecting a community building that would house such a school. With government grants available for such a purpose it would seem worth while to give the matter serious consideration.

I believe that the Rindge schools like those of other progressive communities have departed from the traditional undemocratic procedure and unsocial atmosphere that existed in many schools in the past, when teachers felt it their duty to rule as sternly as dictators. In those days children were taught to be silent, except when called upon to recite, and then they were not allowed to report their own experiences or to express opinions.

Modern education approves of "projects and activities" as a direct form of preparation for the responsibilities of citizenship. While pupils are engaged in such enterprises they are learning facts and skills better than ever before, because they are learning in situations where group effort is united on problems they wish to solve for a purpose they know and value.

Teachers find that a curriculum based on social experiences solves many problems of discipline and backwardness. When teachers participate in the development of group enterprises with their pupils, they tend to become more effective workers with their associates in the school and with their fellow citizens.

The citizens of Rindge have shown a keen interest in maintaining good schools, realizing that modern schools cost money, but they also realize that their children are entitled to the best that they can afford.

I desire to thank all who have so generously supported the school department in our efforts to maintain the best possible school system in the town of Rindge.
