You, as taxpayers, are paying \$34.70 on each one thousand dollars of your valuations and this is divided as follows:

This administration stated at the last election and again at the beginning of this year that it could not reduce the 1968 tax rate but promised to hold the line and to stop unnecessary spending.

This we believe has been done as the city administration costs are up only 23 cents. The extra amounts we have spent this year for pay raises, equipment costs and extra street repairs have mostly been absorbed by economy and careful budgeting, as you can see.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

of John Shaw, *Mayor* in the year 1953

Gentlemen of the City Council:

Rochester is classified as an industrial City and in this type of City the theory is that a given amount of industry supports a given amount of families and that these families in turn produce a given amount of commercial volume. Industry, as you will notice, is the base or foundation of our municipal structure. Also in municipal taxing as in business there are heavy profit and low profit items meaning that you do not give back in cost of services to the heavy profit items as much as you give back to low profit ones. For instance, industry is called a heavy profit item and small housing a low profit one. When these two are in the right proportion in a community, that community's economy is in balance.

To me, good government is nothing but good taxation, and good taxation is taxation only to the lowest possible amount necessary for economical services.

We all know that Rochester is an especially fine community. We have many fine churches, schools and institutions and we would like to be a happy and prosperous people. It is a privilege to live here but we must so run our municipal affairs that we are not asked to pay too much for this privilege.

RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE ON ZONING

PARCEL I

Beginning at the present Industrial II zone at a point which is 200 feet northwesterly from the center line of Eastern Avenue on the Northwesterly side of said Eastern Avenue and running Northeasterly on a line which is 200 feet Northwesterly of and parallel to the center line of said Eastern Avenue to the Spaulding Bypass; thence turning and running in a Northwesterly direction along the Spaulding Bypass a distance of 800 feet; thence turning and running Southwesterly on a line parallel and 1,000 feet distant from the center line of Eastern Avenue to the present Industrial II zone; thence turning and running in an Easterly direction along the Northerly side of the present Industrial II zone to the point of beginning, from its present classification of Agricultural and Business II to the classification of Industrial II and that the Zoning map be changed accordingly.

PARCEL II

Beginning at the present terminus of the Residential II zone on the Northwesterly side of Eastern Avenue and running in a Northeasterly direction along the center line of Eastern Avenue to the Spaulding Bypass; thence turning and running in a Northwesterly direction along the Spaulding Bypass a distance of

200 feet; thence turning and running in a Southwesterly direction on a line which is parallel and 200 feet distant from the center line on Eastern Avenue to the present Residential II zone; thence turning and running in an Easterly direction along the present terminus of the Residential II zone a distance of 200 feet to the point of beginning from its present classification of Agricultural to the classification of Residential I and the Zoning Map be changed accordingly.

PARCEL III

Beginning at the present terminus of the Residential II zone on Eastern Avenue and running Northeasterly along the center line of said Eastern Avenue to the Salmon Falls Road; thence turning and running in an Easterly direction along the Salmon Falls Road a distance of 200 feet; thence turning and running on a line parallel and 200 feet distant from the center line of Eastern Avenue to the present terminus of the Residential II zone; thence turning and running in a Northwesterly direction along the Northeasterly side of the present terminus of the Residential II zone a distance of 200 feet to the point of beginning from its present classification of Agricultural to the classification of Residential I and that the Zoning Map be changed accordingly.

The City Council shall, beginning in January 1960, biennially on the first weekday after January first, elect by ballot and majority vote, for a term of two years, the following officers: City Clerk, City Solicitor, City Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Manager of City Hall Auditorium, and five Deputy Chiefs of the Fire Department, one of whom shall be from Gonic, one from East Rochester, two from the permanent Firemen at the Central Station, and one from the Call Firemen at the Central Station. The Chief of the Fire Department, the City Accountant, and the Commissioner of Public Works shall be elected for an indefinite term but may be removed from office upon the filing of charges, in writing, against them with the Mayor and City Council, and members of the Fire Committee or the Committee on Public Works, as the case may be, and public hearing upon said charges before a regular or specially called meeting of the Council, at least five days' notice having been given the Chief of the Fire Department or the Commissioner of Public Works, as the case may be, or the City Accountant, prior to said hearing and then only by affirmative vote of eight members of the said Council.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council of Rochester, N. H.

I submit herewith my report of the activities of the Department of Public Works for the year 1967.

During the first part of the year and the last two months of the year it was necessary to Salt and Sand the highways and remove snow.

Surface drains were cleaned in the Spring and Fall and the locations marked to locate the drops during the snow season as necessary.

Shade trees were sprayed and some trees were set out. In the Fall the leaves were collected until snowfall.

Our Street Sweeper was out each day and our country roads were graded regularly.

We repaired sidewalks on Wakefield St., Hanson St., North Main St., Portland St., Knight St., Main St., and Autumn St. in East Rochester and on Church St. and Main St. in Gonic.

New sidewalks were constructed at the housing for the elderly and the roads were hot topped.

A large culvert was installed on the Estes Road replacing a bridge, a culvert was installed on the Old Ten Rod Road and one on Chamberlain Street. Many culverts were repaired in the outlying sections. The bridge was repaired on the Gilbert Road and we repaired and widened the Little Falls Road Bridge. We have improved the road and ditch lines on the Estes Road, Betts Road and Hussey Road and hauled gravel. Dry Hill Road was improved and surface treated.

We resurfaced Franklin St. from South Main St. to Chamberlain St. and installed three drops to take care of the water.

Haven Hill Rd. was widened and gravelled and the Tibbetts Rd. was widened and gravelled and the culvert extended. A culvert was installed on Four Rod Road. We also replanked the bridge on the England Road.

We built 900 ft. of road to the Industrial Site, installed culverts and surface treated the road.

Dust oil was applied on unsurfaced roads as in years past using 7,900 gallons for this purpose and many of our streets were treated with asphalt.

Water Main extensions were completed on Maple St., Gonic, Salmon Falls Rd., Autumn St., Juniper St., Susan St., the Industrial Site off the Milton Road, Pine Lane, Claire St., and service mains were replaced on Union St. in East Rochester, Pearl St., Stillings Court and Felker St. in Gonic using 576 ft. of 10", 1,743 ft. of 8" and 3,236 ft. of 6" Cement Lined Cast Iron Pipe as well as 481 ft. of 2" and 294 ft. of 1½" Cement Lined Pipe.

We installed seven new hydrants making a total of 463 in the system. Seventy-one new services were installed and twelve services relaid.

Bushes were cut at the ponds and the screens were cleaned regularly. Monthly samples of our water were sent to the State Board of Health and we receive reports of the continued high quality of our water.

We have repaired 97 water meters in our shop which were removed from service, completely overhauled and tested then reinstalled.

I take this opportunity to thank our Mayor, members of the Public Works Committee and City Council for their assistance and consideration of our problems, also the employees of this department for their loyalty and assistance. It is this kind of cooperation that is assisting us in making Rochester a progressive city.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1967.

There were 391 alarms in the City of Rochester in 1967, which consisted of; 102 box alarms and 289 still alarms. These include 34 car or truck fires, 18 engineer's calls, 27 brush fire calls, 16 false alarms in Rochester, 3 in East Rochester and 7 in Gonic. There were 10 chimney fires, 20 grass fires, 19 oil burner fires, 59 property fires, 53 miscellaneous calls, 29 smoke scares or honest mistakes, 45 first-aid, accident or emergency calls and 34 second alarms or calls for more help. There were 11 permanent men's calls in Rochester and 6 no school signals transmitted this year.

Nine of the above calls were out-of-town calls for assistance from Rochester. There were 21 fire calls in East Rochester and 25 fire calls in Gonic. These are all included in the above figures.

There were 225 ambulance calls from June 1 to December 31, 1967. These consisted of 48 accident calls, 124 emergency calls and 53 transfer, or convalescent cases.

The total number of calls answered by the Fire Department was 616. There were 391 fire calls and 225 ambulance calls.

The year 1967 proved to be a very busy year with educational projects and programs.

An intensive study regarding the AREA School concept was made with the result that Strafford, Wakefield, Barrington, and Rochester voted to accept the AREA school which will be situated in Rochester. In January a reading workshop for grades 1 - 5 was held for all elementary teachers sponsored by the Economy Company. Elementary teachers from Somersworth and Farmington were invited to participate in this workshop.

A Vocational Rehabilitation program for the mentally retarded, physically handicapped and emotionally disturbed child was started in Rochester. This program is co-sponsored by the Federal Government and the State of New Hampshire, and Rochester was chosen as the first city in the state to conduct this program.

The Spaulding High School Band, under the direction of Miss Sandra Lucian, had the honor of winning the All Eastern Band competition. This is the first time in 50 years that New Hampshire has been so honored.

In August the bid for the new East Rochester School was awarded to Curran and Cossette to construct the building. Warren H. Ashley of Hartford, Conn., is the architect. This school will be occupied for the beginning of school in September, 1968.

It has been recommended by the State Department of Education that we should be working toward having courses in art and a teacher-librarian for the Junior High School.

I wish to extend to the School Board, the City Council and members of the new East Rochester School Building Committee, my sincere appreciation for their fine cooperation and the many long hours that they devoted to the task of carrying through their responsibilities with foresight and conviction in what is good for the children, school personnel and citizens of their community.

The PTA have been most helpful, as have the numerous civic and social organizations, the fire department, police department and highway department, also the cooperation of the Rochester Courier, The Foster's Daily Democrat, Manchester Union Leader and radio stations WWNH and WTSN.

I wish to commend all school personnel for their cooperation, devotion to education and the assistance they have given me.
