In Memoriam

NORMAN L. DIONNE

May 26, 1916 - August 9, 1996

Norman was a life long resident of Rollinsford. He worked in the local mills, shoe shops, and Janco. Norman was a member of the Rollinsford Fire Department from 1949 to 1965, retiring as Deputy Chief. Dedicated to the department, even after retirement he continued to go to the station on Sundays to offer his help and friendship.

OVID R. VIEL

August 23, 1919 - January 5, 1997

Born in Rollinsford, Ovid was owner of Viel's Dairy on Roberts Road. Ovid was appointed judge of the Municipal Courts for the jurisdictions of Dover, Durham, Somersworth and Rollinsford from 1955 to 1989. He had also served as a Selectman, a member of the Budget Committee, and a member of Parks and Playgrounds. Most recently, he was a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and a Cemetery Trustee.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We are proud of the cost-effective services that the Town Municipal Government delivered to the residents of Rollinsford in 1996. Despite record snowfalls early in the year and a record twelve inch rainstorm in the fall, local government quietly and efficiently delivered basic public services. With little fanfare, the snow was plowed, the fire alarms were answered at all hours, the police quickly responded to domestic disturbances and motor accidents, the Town Clerk registered many new vehicles and collected a record amount of auto registration fees, the Tax Collector cleaned up several outstanding tax bills, the Transfer Station accepted record amounts of recycled materials and the Animal Control Officer maintained good order in the dog community. All of these things were done without any increase in the municipal tax rate (actually it declined for the fifth year in a row).

After losing a tax exemption case with the Housing Partnership in Strafford Superior Court, the Selectmen appealed the case to the State Supreme Court. The Supreme Court ruled in favor of the Town's position that the Housing Partnership did not qualify for a tax exemption as a non-tax charitable organization. As a result, the Town will now receive approximately \$50,000.00 for back taxes and interest. Furthermore, one source of future erosion of our tax base has been eliminated.

The Town is in sound financial condition - unpaid property taxes are low, the remaining Town long-term debt of \$20,000.00 will be paid off in 1997 and we have growing reserves.

The proposed 1997 budget represents our continued effort to hold the line on taxes while maintaining basic services and improving the Towns infrastructure.

The operating portion of the 1997 budget represents overall, a 'hold the line' position. In general, salary increases were \$1,000.00 for full-time employees, \$500.00 for half-time employees, and three percent for other hourly employees. Although health insurance costs for the JY Plan were scheduled to increase 17% in 1997, the police and highway employees agreed to switch to the 'Managed Care' health plans which actually resulted in a decrease in 1997 health insurance costs.

The proposed capital items in the 1997 budget address several investment issues facing the Town. However, the use of reserve funds, surplus, and expected revenue from land sales will enable the Town to undertake these activities without any increase in municipal taxes. The list of capital items recommended for 1997 include:

Increasing the capital appropriation for road paving and renovation from \$25,000.00 to \$35,000.00. Rising paving costs together with the indepth road renovation approach calls for this additional spending.

Installation of sewer lines and a pump station to serve the mini-industrial park off Jesse Doe Road. The \$40,000.00 estimated cost would be funded with revenue from land sales and surplus funds.

Adding \$25,000.00 to the equipment fund to provide for future purchase of police and fire department equipment. The equipment fund balance on December 31, 1996 was \$55,400.49.

Adding \$10,000.00 to the Fire Station building fund. This fund had a balance of \$15,286.50 on December 31, 1996. This reserve fund is for adding two bays to the Fire Station in the future.

Adding \$20,000.00 to the Land Trust Fund. This fund had a balance of \$36,296.00 on December 31, 1996. This fund is to be used to purchase land on land easements for conservation, recreation and other public uses.

Purchasing a 1998 police cruiser for \$24,000.00 with money to be transferred from the Town Equipment fund. This appropriation will enable the Town to place an order in 1997 for delivery of a cruiser in 1998. Auto manufacturers require that order be placed before the end of 1997 for 1998 delivery. (Approval of this Aritcle will have no impact on 1997 tax rate).

Reevaluation of Town Real Property will be funded with a \$40,000.00 appropriation. Currently, the Town's assessment ratio is .59 and the coefficient of dispersion is .24. Any coefficient of dispersion above .20 is considered a signal that current assessments are becoming unfair and need to be updated. The reevaluation will be financed with \$20,000.00+ from the Reevaluation Trust

fund and \$20,000.00+ from current taxes.

The \$21,000.00 appropriation for a general utility tractor will provide a tractor that can be used to move materials at the Recycling Center, sweep Town streets, and for general highway use. The Selectmen propose to fund this tractor with funds to be taken from the Hydro-Reserve fund. (High rainfall in 1996 gave the Town a windfall gain for the Hydro-Reserve fund).

The current police facilities in the Town Hall have been inadequate for several years. It has been proposed that new police quarters be constructed in the Town Hall basement or in a new police building that might be constructed on Silver Street where the Town Highway Building is currently located. A special Building Committee and the Historic Commission recommended that a professional, feasibility evaluation be undertaken to determine whether renovation of the existing building or a new police administration building is most appropriate. The proposed building feasibility would be funded with a \$12,000.00 appropriation.

The Fire Department is requesting an emergency backup generator for which \$5,000.00 is requested.

The parking problem at the Town Hall would be addressed by providing off-site parking in the area. An appropriation of \$10,000.00 is requested to provide authorization for steps to option and/or buy land for parking.

The Board of Selectmen appreciate the great contributions made by all the unpaid volunteers who staff the standing and special committees in Rollinsford. Likewise, the Town's employees deserve a word of appreciation for their continued effort to serve the residents of Rollinsford. Finally, help keep your local government responsive and cost effective by attending the School District Business Meeting on March 8, 1997 and the Town Business Meeting on March 11, 1997.

MANAGEMENT LETTER

Town of Rollinsford - As of December 31, 1996

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Rollinsford for the year ended December 31, 1995, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure. However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be reportable conditions under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town of Rollinsford's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the general purpose financial statements. The matters noted are only those that came to the auditor's attention, and, had the auditor's procedures in internal control structure related matters been more extensive, other matters might have been noted.

Bank Reconciliation

The treasurer reconciles the bank statements monthly. Once reconciled the ending balances were not compared to the cash accounts in the general ledger on a timely basis. A series of voided checks were voided twice and not detected until year end. Some adjustments for service charges, return checks or transfers within the investment account were posted.

It is recommended that once the treasurer has reconciled the monthly bank statement, it is compared to the general ledger and any adjustments be posted within the proper month.

Cemetery Payroll

Employees of the cemetery are paid twice a year. The hours worked by each employee are turned in to the supervisor. There is no evidence of a review or approval for payment by the supervisor or trustees.

It is recommended that the trustees or supervisor review and approve the hours worked for each cemetery employee.

Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain records of general fixed assets such as property and equipment with a life expectancy exceeding one year. The recording of fixed assets would fulfill the need to provide for physical dollar value control, and establish accountability for general government capital expenditures over the year.

With the recording of fixed assets, the related depreciation could be determined on an annual basis for the purpose of measuring the total cost of governmental services and evaluating the efficiency of programs. This was recommended in the prior year report.

A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be reportable conditions and accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above. However, none of the reportable conditions described above is believed to be a material weakness.

This report is intended for the use of management and the State of New Hampshire, Department of Revenue Administration. However, this report is a matter of public record, and its distribution is not limited.

QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified that the polls will be open from 10 A.M. to 7 P.M. at the Rollinsford Town Hall, on Tuesday, March 11, 1997 to bring in your ballots for the Town Officers to be elected in Article I and to bring in your ballot for Article II through Article V, and to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 15, 1997 to act on the budget and other Articles in the Warrant.

ARTICLE I.

To bring in your ballots for:

- One (1) Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for three (3) years,
- Town Clerk for one (1) year,
- Town Treasurer for one (1) year,
- Chief of the Fire Department for one (1) year,
- Three (3) members of the Budget Committee for three (3) years,
- One (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for three (3) years,
- One (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for two (2) years,
- One (1) Trustee of the Rollinsford Library Trust for three (3) years,
- One (1) Cemetery Trustee for three (3) years,
- One (1) Cemetery Trustee for two (2) years,

ARTICLE II.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

The first proposed amendment would eliminate the present allowance of use by special exception for mobile home parks in the industrial zone and eliminate the existing incorrect reference to section 8.21 noted under the table of Principal Uses - Residential #A.11 - Mobile Home Subdivision.

ARTICLE III.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

The second proposed amendment would revise the zoning map to create two new districts titled Old Salmon Falls Zoning District and Mill District and make revisions to the existing Commercial 1 District. The intent of the change is to create an area that will preserve the desirable and unique characteristics of the Old Salmon Falls Village. The general area will include parcels on: the west side of Front Street, Main Street from Front Street to Locust Street, Railroad Avenue, Foundry Street from Church Street to South Street, South Street, Second Street, Third Street, Fourth Street, Washington Street, Franklin Street, Church Street, Pleasant Street and the area between the Salmon Falls River and Front Street. Changes will be made to the following sections of the zoning ordinance:

SECTION 1: Purposes, Authority & Scope, Conflict of Laws, Validity, Severability - subsection 1.1 - purpose statement.

SECTION 3: Zoning Districts - subsection 3.1 General and subsection 3.2 General purpose of each district.

SECTION 5: Uses, Lots, Structures and Site Improvements That Do Not Conform To The Current Ordinance - subsection 5.4 - Nonconforming lot subsection 5.5 - Nonconforming Site Improvements.

SECTION 6: Use Regulations - subsection 6.9 Table of Use Regulations.

SECTION 7: Land Space Requirements - Table 7 - Lot Land Space Requirement Table.

SECTION 8: Special Provisions - subsection 8.1 - Apartments, Multiple or Attached Dwellings, two-family Houses and Duplexes.

ARTICLE IV.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

The third proposed amendment would require that all excavations conform to RSA 155-E (Local Regulations Excavations).

ARTICLE V.

“Shall we adopt the uniform elderly exemption from property tax? The optional exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 74 years, \$10,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 79 years, \$15,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$18,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$24,000.00, and own net assets not in excess of \$60,000.00 excluding the value of the person’s residence”.

ARTICLE VI.

To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE VII.

“Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 79-A:25-a to account for revenues received from the land use change tax in a fund separate from the general fund? Any surplus remaining in the land use change tax fund shall not be part of the general fund until such time as the legislative body shall have had the opportunity at an annual meeting to vote to appropriate a specific amount from the land use change tax fund for any purpose not prohibited by the laws or by the constitution of this state. After an annual meeting any unappropriated balance of the land use change tax revenue received during the prior fiscal year shall be recognized as general fund revenue for the current fiscal year.”

ARTICLE VIII.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum equal to all revenues in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) that may be received from the Hydro Electric Plant to be placed in the Town’s Hydro Electric Fund (The first \$50,000.00 or any lesser amount that may be

received will be used as offset against Town Budget Expenditures).

ARTICLE IX.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) and withdraw the same from the Land Trust Fund to finance land survey and related expenses that may be incurred in assisting private land owners who donate Conservation Easements and/or participate in the Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP).

ARTICLE X.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) for ongoing street repaving and road drainage renovations.

ARTICLE XI.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) to be added to the Town Equipment Reserve Fund previously established. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE XII.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Fire Station Building Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XIII.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) for a complete revaluation and authorize the withdrawal of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) is to come from general taxation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE XIV.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) to build up to 400 feet of roadway and utilities on Town Land (Lot 2-14-1). The fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) would be derived from sale of subdivided land from Town Lot 2-14-1.

ARTICLE XV.

To see if the Town will appropriate twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000.00) to purchase a new police cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000.00) from the Town Equipment Fund to pay for it.

ARTICLE XVI.

To see if the Town will appropriate twenty-one thousand dollars (\$21,000.00) to purchase a utility tractor with front end bucket and sweeper for use at the transfer station and for use on town streets and parks.

ARTICLE XVII.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to withdraw forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000.00) from the Hydro Reserve Fund to finance the purchase of the utility tractor and equipment and other appropriations in the 1997 budget.

ARTICLE XVIII.

To see if the Town will appropriate twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) to finance a feasibility study of renovating the Town Hall and the cost of constructing new facilities at another site to provide facilities for the Police Department and Town Administrative Offices. The findings of the feasibility will be presented at the 1998 town meeting.

ARTICLE XIX.

To see if the Town will appropriate forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) to construct sewer lines and a lift-pump station to provide future sewer service to the mini-industrial park and future highway facilities at the transfer station. (revenue to fund this construction will come from lot sales in the mini-industrial park and surplus funds).

ARTICLE XX.

To see if the Town will appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to purchase a generator to provide emergency power at the fire station.

ARTICLE XXI.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) to be added to the Land Trust Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XXII.

To see if the Town will appropriate ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to purchase land for use as parking for the Town Hall should appropriate land become available, and to authorize the withdrawal of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Land Trust Fund to pay for the land purchase.

ARTICLE XXIII.

To see if the Town will vote to purchase lots (Tax Map 10-14 and Tax Map 10-15) for twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000.00) and abatement of all outstanding taxes and interest. (This is the former Redman Club property adjacent to Water Street ROW). The building currently has no frontage on a town street. As owner of the property, the Town will be able to combine the ROW property and adjacent land to create two new lots that will conform with most town zoning. Since the Town already owes approximately three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) to the property owner for land taken to layout Jesse Doe Road, the additional appropriation required to purchase this land is nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000.00). The Selectmen propose to finance the nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000.00) with a transfer from the Hydro Reserve Fund, therefore, there will be no increase in the 1997 tax rate due to this purchase.

ARTICLE XXIV.

To see if the Town will vote to withdraw nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000.00) from the Hydro Reserve Fund to pay for the purchase of Lots 10-14 and 10-15.

ARTICLE XXV.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred forty-six thousand, four hundred fifty-eight dollars (\$746,458.00) which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special or individual articles addressed.

ARTICLE XXVI.

To see if the Town will vote to close Cross Street between Second and Third Street to motor vehicle traffic, and to construct a pedestrian walkway in the right-of-way area and landscape the area using volunteers who are interested in the project.

ARTICLE XXVII.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder, the surplus equipment and vehicles in the Highway, Fire and Police Departments.

ARTICLE XXVIII.

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Our manning has maintained around 25 members all year. Of these 25 people there are 8 full-time firefighters who volunteer their time to the department. Also, we have 2 paramedics and 9 EMT's

In the department we have 3 state certified firefighter instructors who have set up training schedule and classes for the members. They have set aside one Sunday a month for mandatory training for the department.

All persons that join the department are required to become state certified firefighters within one year. We have had one firefighter, Jen Raymond, Rollinsford's first female firefighter take it upon herself to go to the highest level of training in the State (level 3). On a sadder note Rollinsford lost a dear friend this year with the passing of Dep. Chief Norman Dionne. Norman served the town for 16 years and even after he retired he was always at the station on Sunday mornings helping out or just sharing his friendship with us. He is and will be missed.

I have many people that I would like to thank for their help, some of whom are Roger Perreault, Arthur Osbon, Paul Ayers, Roger Michaud, Harold Foss, Tom Lebel, and Jani Mulligan.

I would like also to thank all the towns people, town officials and other town agencies who have helped out and supported the department this year. But mostly the men and women of the department who have supported me and made my job easier and the town a better and safer place to live.

Our goals for 1996 were to increase the fund balance of the trust through volunteer effort and fund raising, and to promote community involvement and interest in a library and reading.

Before the end of the school year in June, the RLT sponsored the Little Red Wagon, a non-profit children's theatre group from the University of New Hampshire, to perform for the Rollinsford Grade school. Our thanks to Wentworth Greenhouses, Inc., for their generous donation.

Over the years, individuals have donated books to the RLT, with the hope of seeing them used in a town Library. Mr. Peter Quinn of VXI Corp., has kindly allowed us to store them in unused office space. Heavy spring rains caused severe damage to the space, and the committee was forced to move them to the town hall. Rita Connelly of VXI, and two volunteers: Josh Hale and Alex Smith helped us with the herculean task.

On June 29th, we sold orange juice at the So. Berwick Strawberry Festival and gathered interest from Rollinsford residents in having a story hour or reading hour sponsored by the RLT. On August 10th, we held a very successful book raffle at the Rollinsford Family Fun Days, which the local chapter of the American Legion puts on every year. Thanks again to the Legion members who lent us a table and helped with the raffle. Stroudwater Books of Dover, donated a ten dollar gift certificate and a pledge of support for future fund raising events and have been very helpful with their expertise.

In September we made a proposal to the Selectmen to utilize the meeting room space in the Town Hall for a weekly story hour for 4-7 year old residents of Rollinsford. To promote community involvement and education, we also proposed having a guest speaker from the town, each month, hoping to begin an introduction to the workings of local government and responsibility. Our proposal was accepted, and we held the first Story Hour on October 5th. Our first guest speaker, Chief Robert Ducharme, talked to a rapt group about Halloween safety and also gave a wonderful talk and demonstration of the police cruiser. In November we were honored to have the chair of the Board of Selectmen, Mr. Edward Jansen, to explain the function and workings of the board. In December, Cathy Ladisheff from the Center for Wildlife, brought Sophie the owl; Mel, a merlin falcon, and Bud the turtle, to talk about the wild denizens of Rollinsford. Twenty-three children came to story hour that day, and brought food donations for the non-profit center.

Story hour continues every Saturday, from 10 A.M. - 11 A.M. with the current session ending February 22, 1997. We will take a short break for the month of March, and resume April 5 - May 3, 1997. Our thanks to Mr. Roy, and the RGS Library which has offered to lend books to volunteer readers and has been extremely supportive of story hour.

The Rollinsford Library Trust Committee meets the second Tuesday of every month in the town hall meeting room.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ROLLINSFORD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board granted one minor lot line adjustment (Application of Ted Zelle), two minor subdivisions (Applications of Robin Aikman and Bryan & Catherine Wentworth), five site plan reviews (Applications of Shop-N-Save, Rick Twombly, Clear Water Artesian Well Co., Inc. and two to Bio-Gro/Ovid & Andrew Viel), two home business site reviews (Applications of Tim Swisher and Joanne Osborne).

A major emphasis of the Board this past year was the need to update the economic section of the Town master plan. Based on input from the public as a result of Civic Profile, the Stewardship Program and Public forums conducted over the past three years work on the plan has proceeded. A final approval of the revised economic plan is expected by the board in the near future.

Zoning Ordinance change proposals directed at the revitalization of the Old Salmon Falls Village area were recommended by the Board. Again with public input, from Civic Profile and Stewardship the board has acted to prioritize the redevelopment of this unique area of the Town. Changes proposed are directed at returning the village to an area of compatible residential and retail uses while preserving and enhancing its unique characteristics. Further review of this area will continue during the coming year.

The Planning Board also received notification of the successful application for a grant from the New Hampshire Department of Transportation Enhancement Program to install a combination sidewalk and bicycle path on Main Street from Prospect Street to General John Sullivan. This \$57,500.00 project will be funded with a \$46,000.00 grant from the Federal government with the balance coming from Town funds or services. Based on continued Federal funding this work is scheduled to be done in 1999. This project will develop a major connecting link within the overall plan to improve the safety and promote the use of bicycle and pedestrian ways within the town.

The Rollinsford Planning Board is fortunate to have a dedicated volunteer group of talented individuals who realize what a special place our town is and who sees the potentials that exists to enhance it while moving into the future.

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL AND RECYCLING

The year 1996 has been another good year of operation with the average tonnage per month of solid waste going out for disposal being at 55 tons.

This average reflects the continuing efforts that are being made to add to the list of items that can be accepted for recycling.

Magazines and books, including telephone books, have diverted nearly 8 tons from the annual waste stream at a saving to the Town of nearly \$400.00 even though we did not receive anything for them.

Scrap metal revenues were \$1,270.00 for the year. Somewhat less than in prior years, mostly due to price, however we are hopeful that this revenue will increase in 1997.

Revenue from the taking in of asphalt shingles was just under \$800.00, however most of that, if not all, will be needed to properly dispose of or crush and reuse these shingles. At least they did not have to go to a demolition materials processing center at a substantial expense.

The efforts of all residents of the Town of Rollinsford who participated in the recycling process are commendable and are very much appreciated by all.

Recycling continues to be one of the most cost effective means of contributing to the reduction of environmental pollution while at the same time contributing to the over all effort to keep the taxes of the Town a low as possible.

1996 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ROLLINSFORD HISTORIC COMMITTEE

The past year proved another busy one for the town historic committee. Much of its effort was focused upon the fate of the Town Hall. Members worked with those of the municipal building committee to determine the best course for the Town to take: whether to construct a new municipal facility or to renovate the existing town hall. One member, Historic Committee Chairperson Lucy Putnam, presently serves on both committees. Competitive estimates for a feasibility study to assist in making this important decision have been submitted by two architectural firms with expertise in historic building renovation.

Because the Rollinsford Town Hall remains the earliest of the four surviving town halls in the State designed by 19th/20th century Dover architect Alvah Thurston Ramsdell, input was sought from the N.H. Division of Historical Resources. Nelson Lawry, historic preservation liaison, assisted by member Laura Ingle, arranged for a tour of the other Ramsdell town halls in New Durham, Alton and Wakefield, which was attended by ten town officials: all three selectmen and representatives from the municipal building and historic committees, the police department and the planning board. Mr. Lawry presented a slide show on this tour to members of the public.

Committee members set up a booth at the American Legion's Family Day in August. Marc Couture provided souvenirs for attending children: a piece of leather upon which a figure of the child's choice was machine-stamped at the booth and holed for a key chain. The most popular one for girls was a kitten; that for boys a skull & crossbones. Also, the booth included a display on leather and shoe making. In November, members Lucy Putnam, Kathleen Shea and Peter Michaud led a river walk for the students of Mrs. Dolan's and Mrs. Barrett's 4th and 5th grade class at Rollinsford Grade School, to dovetail with the local history being studied at that time.

Among other projects, Marc Couture gave the brace of Dahlgren naval guns in Morton Park a third coat of black paint and cleaned up the small Carpenter Cemetery on Sligo Road. He and volunteer David Barry secured the wooden panels in the clock tower of the Town Hall, one of which had been damaged.

Following an inquiry from a Berwick resident, the historic committee became aware that the bronze plaques once mounted in the town hall, memorializing the Rollinsford men who had served in three of its wars, are missing. Several long-time residents were contacted, to no avail, and a wider search is now in progress to locate these essential testimonials to the Town's military history.

The committee has formalized its guidelines for accepting and preserving historic photographs, and Peter Michaud has begun the preservation-by-reshooting of certain photos of particular significance to Town history, including a few from the George Nutter collection. A new public lecture series sponsored by the committee will begin in February 1997.

LAMPREY REGIONAL COOPERATIVE

In 1996, we experienced many changes to the Lamprey Regional Cooperative. The Lamprey Regional Cooperative completed the interior demolition of the building in Durham. The building has been cleaned and certified by the Department of Environmental Services. The Landfill in Somersworth was completely capped on November 15, 1996. We are now awaiting certification from the State.

One significant issue that is still remaining concerns the disposition of the old incinerator building at UNH. This could have a financial impact on our member communities.

We have made some progress toward our goal for a Regional Transfer and Recycling Facility for the communities that have decided to remain in the Lamprey Regional Cooperative into the future. We experienced a delay in our project due to the demise of our administrator, Patrick Genest. However, we seem to be back on track as the year ended.

At this time, I would like to thank all of the communities for their cooperation with the closure of our Waste-to-Energy plant in Durham and the Landfill in Somersworth.

Rollinsford Water & Sewer District

I & I Project: The District has completed the first year of its project to eliminate Infiltration (leaky pipes) and Infiltration (direct connection of ground water sources to the sewer system) into the sewer collection system. During recent heavy rain events, the treatment plant was able to handle the inflows and did not violate except during the "Unnamed Hurricane" in the fall. Rollinsford, though, fared better than other communities which were flooded or suffered catastrophic losses of treatment process. The District will continue its I & I Project in the next year by installing flow meters in the collection system to find and eliminate other sources of groundwater infiltration.

Water Tower & Lines: The District completed and placed on-line its new 750,000 gallon water tower and associated water lines. With this new tower and the lines, water supply and fire protection capacity of the town is probably assured for at least the next fifty years.

Treatment Plant improvements: Peter Hellfach, the plant operator, has provided significant leadership in updating the treatment plant's capacity to treat waste water on a cost effective basis. The plant has added a process to aerate recovered sludge from the process which will make the system more efficient and the outflow cleaner. In addition, many mechanical improvements have been made to update antiquated equipment and badly neglected maintenance.

Well Improvements: Building a new water tower would have no value if the District did not have adequate clean and safe drinking water supplies. During the past year, the District refurbished its primary water producer, the General John Sullivan Way well and added pumping controls to the Porter wells. With these additions and improvements, the District can continue to enjoy a plentiful supply of safe drinking water and fire protection in the most severe conditions.

Plans for 1997. Building on the progress made in the past, the District intends to continue its process of addressing improving and maintaining the water and waste water systems in the District. Although no major projects are planned for the next several years, the Commissioners are committed to continuation of updating, repairing and improving the vital infrastructure under its control. In the coming year, the District will attempt to reduce I & I even further, improve the efficiency of its drinking water capacity and begin a process of addressing some of the long overdue regular maintenance needed by both the water and waste water systems with the District.

The Commissioners wish to make special note of Peter Hellfach's outstanding contribution to the operation of the District. As the chief operator of the District, he has continued to provide invaluable leadership in cost-effective improvements to the systems under our control. Sadly, Peter has been advanced by HTA to a new position and has been replaced by Jack Hladick. We look forward to working with Jack to continue the progress started by Peter.

The inhabitants of the Rollinsford Water & Sewer District qualified to vote in District Affairs met on March 26, 1996 at 7:00 p.m. at the Rollinsford Grade School in the Town of Rollinsford to act upon the following subjects. Edmund Jansen was the Moderator. Mr. Jansen called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

1. To choose by vote the necessary Officers of said District as follows:

A. MODERATOR — Verne Crosier nominated Edmund Jansen. Edgar Ross seconded the nomination. There were no other nominations. Edmund Jansen was elected Moderator.

B. CLERK - Verne Crosier nominated Gailann St. Hilaire. Edgar Ross seconded the nomination. There were no other nominations. Gailann St. Hilaire was elected Clerk.

C. TREASURER - Verne Crosier nominated Linda Caron. Edgar Ross seconded the nomination. There were no other nominations. Linda Caron was elected Treasurer.

D. COMMISSIONER to serve until the Annual Meeting of the District in March 1999. Kenneth Shorey nominated Dennis St. Hilaire. Verne Crosier seconded the nomination. There were no other nominations. Dennis St. Hilaire was elected Commissioner to serve until the Annual Meeting of the District in March 1999.

2. To hear reports of the present officers.

Ken Shorey gave a brief report about the District's water project. The pipes to the Tower and Main St. and the repaving of the roads will begin soon. The estimated completion date is July 1, 1996. It will take a while to fill the new tank because the summer is the heaviest usage. The old tank will be removed after the new tank is on line and working well. The District will be replacing 530 feet of 2 inch water line with an 8 inch line on General John Sullivan Way and will put in a new hydrant. Ken also thanked Verne for all the financial work he has done and Peter Hellfach, Superintendent, for all his help and hard work.

Verne gave a brief report about the sewer system. While televising the sewer lines (Beccarris Dr., Partridge Lane, Pine and Prospect Sts.) the District found violations. Televising will restart at the next significant rain storm. Any one with concerns or questions are urged to call the District Office for further information.

Violations have to be corrected this year. The aeration system in the sludge tank should be completed in the spring or early summer. The District is also refurbishing the clarifier.

3. To see if the District will approve the operating budget of \$407,600.00 attached and proposed by the Commissioners for the year 1996. (approved by the Budget Committee)

Verne reviewed the budget. Verne made a motion to accept the budget. Ken seconded it. All were in favor. The budget was accepted.

4. To see if the District will authorize the Commissioners to negotiate the exchange title owned by the District as described in the Town's Tax map as lots 2-16 and 2-17 with the Town of Rollinsford for land owned by the Town for the following purposes:

A. A fee interest is a 300 foot by 300 foot "footprint" under the proposed water tower (ownership in lieu of lease), and

B. A fee interest in a one acre plot around an existing (but not connected) well currently located in the so-called Scoutland property north of the transfer station and an agreement that the Town will abide by State law not to permit building or other well hazards within 400 feet of the well head, and

C. A fee interest in an additional plot of land one (1) acre plot within the so-called Scoutland Conservation area for use as a future well development site. The specific site of this second well site is expected to be located near Scoutland Road, probably within 1000 feet of the existing capped well in Scoutland. The specific site will be determined by ground water availability and will be subject to mutual agreement by the Commissioners of the District and the Board of Selectmen, and

D. The Town grant rights of way between any of these current or proposed wells and the water tower or any practical water system connection point over Town land as shown on the plans of easements as agreed by the District Commissioners and the Board of Selectmen, March, 1996.

Verne Crosier made a Motion to amend Article 4, Section A which currently reads:

"A fee interest in a 300 foot by 300 foot "footprint" under the proposed water tower (ownership in lieu of lease)"

To read:

"A fee interest in a "footprint" not to exceed 22,500 square feet, as indicated on a design by Hoyle-Tanner Associates, the engineering firm for the District". So as to be consistent with the similar articles and motions made at the Town Meeting on March 23, 1996. Ken Shorey seconded the motion. Verne Crosier made a motion to accept as amended. Dennis St. Hilaire seconded the motion. The motion was accepted.

5. To see if the District will authorize the Commissioners to withdraw funds from its savings account in the event the 1996 expenditures exceed the 1996 receipts.

Ken Shorey made a motion to accept. Verne Crosier seconded the motion. The motion was accepted.

6. To see if the District will authorize the Commissioners to withdraw funds from its capital reserve accounts for the purpose so designated for these capital reserve accounts should the need arise.

Verne Crosier made a motion to accept. Edgar Ross seconded the motion. The motion was accepted.

7. To authorize the Commissioners to apply for and/or receive and spend any State or Federal funds in the furtherance of the Districts purposes.

Verne Crosier made a motion to accept. Edgar Ross seconded the motion. The motion was accepted.

8. To see if the District will approve the additions, deletions and/or changes to the ordinances of the District as submitted by the Commissioners.

There were no additions, deletions and/or changes to the ordinances.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

There was no further business. Verne Crosier made a motion to adjourn. Edgar Ross seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 7:14 p.m.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATIVE UNIT NO. 56

The 1997-98 Rollinsford School District budget represents a continuation of existing programs at the Grade School. The Board does propose to increase the time for Music and Art instruction so the teachers may have more direct contact time with the students. Costs for out-of-district placement of Special Education students continue to rise in our budget from year to year and are beyond our control as State and Federal laws must be followed. These costs are a source of concern for the Board, and we will continue to look at ways to keep them as low as possible. As in the past, the Board has chosen not to offset budget increases, due to Special Ed increases by cutting any more deeply than we have to into other academic accounts.

The budget also shows an effort by the School Board to bring up the compensation levels for our non-certified support staff in an effort to be more competitive with surrounding districts. These individuals are essential to the operation of the school and they deserve to be paid at the proper level. This is the beginning of this upgrade and hopefully the Board can achieve its goal within two or three budget years.

The Board has negotiated a one year agreement with the Rollinsford Teachers association which represents a 2.7% salary increase and 1/2 step for those on step 1-8. Those who are above step 8 get \$100 per year working in the district as a longevity payment. There were no changes in health insurance or dental insurance.

This is my last report as a member of the Rollinsford School Board. My years on the Board have been enjoyable and I would like to thank the administration, staff, volunteers and all of the tax payers in the Town of Rollinsford for their continued support of our children. We can all be

proud that our kids perform well academically, athletically and socially. As a community, we truly understand that "It takes a whole village to raise a child".

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - 1996

If you haven't stepped inside of a public elementary school lately, you don't realize just how much excitement you are missing!

Each day, Rollinsford Grade School is full of eager, excited and well behaved children ready to be taught by a skilled, dedicated, and caring staff. This educational community is further energized as a result of many volunteers who devote time on a regular basis to classrooms, the library, the office and other areas or programs.

We now have 100 hours each month, compliments of Ultranet, of a full access ramp to the information super highway. An excellent Acceptable Use Policy has recently been drafted by a committee of volunteers and approved by the school board. Students are surfing the Internet

regularly and it is exciting to see their enthusiasm and research skills grow stronger every day. The Internet is also available to the community during the two evenings each month that the library is open. Feel free to stop by and check it out for yourself.

The Strategic Planning Steering committee has launched two Action Teams this year. The first is studying scheduling options to the elementary level along with the length of the school day and the school year. The second is drafting a definition, guidelines and log sheets for an elementary community service program. The outcome of such a program will be children who become responsible citizens taking greater responsibility for their world. In doing this we expect our children will also feel proud of their accomplishments and contributions.

Special needs is an area of concern that we are closely examining. We carefully review each and every case while asking ourselves just what is necessary in order to provide each child with services that address their documented educational handicaps. While this is an area that we have little control over, we do scrutinize all of our options before making final team decisions.

Our fifth grade test scores on the California Achievement Test (11/96) placed our non-coded students in the 82nd percentile. This means that our students, as a group, scored better than 82 out of every 100 fifth graders who were tested. On the New Hampshire Educational Improvement and Assessment program our third and sixth grade students are moving in the desired direction as fewer students are achieving at the Novice Level and more are achieving at the Advanced and Proficient Levels.

I know that I speak for the entire school when I say just how much we will miss our outgoing board members, Kris Ebbeson and Jay Whitehouse. Because of their devotion to the board and making good educational decisions for children, Rollinsford is a better place! They are outstanding examples for all of us as to what good community service is all about! We wish them only the best!

While we are not a perfect school, I am confident that if you ask anyone who is truly involved in their child's education at Rollinsford Grade School, they'll tell you that they're pleased with the quality of their child's experience. We take our profession seriously and know that we are charged with a great responsibility because...We Touch The Future Every Day...We TEACH!

MINUTES OF THE ROLLINSFORD ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MARCH 9, 1996

The meeting was called to order at 9:10 a.m. by Moderator, Joseph Caouette.

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district. School Board Chair, \$300.00; School Board Member(s), \$500 (two (2) at \$250 each); Moderator, \$50; District Clerk, \$50; Treasurer, \$400; Census Taker, \$155; Supervisor(s) of the Checklist, \$45 (three (3) at \$15 each) for a total of \$1,500.00. Motion was made by R. Wasson, seconded by C. Dionne to accept as read. No discussion. Voice Vote, Motion Passed.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Motion was made by A. Laliberte, seconded by B. Cleary to accept as read. No discussion. Voice Vote, Motion passed.

Mr. Jansen asked if there were any reports.

A. Sollee reported for the Grade 7-12 Alternative Education Committee. The Committee was appointed in September 1995 by the School Board to investigate options. The six options investigated were reported on January 1996, to the School Board. The options are:

1. Make no changes with Somersworth with respect to AREA Agreement.
2. Withdraw from the AREA Agreement with Somersworth with intention of renegotiating a simpler contract with Somersworth.
3. Withdraw from AREA Agreement with Somersworth and keep Somersworth as the school of record.
4. Send Rollinsford students, 9-12 to Dover. Dover would not have room for grades 7 & 8.
5. Send Rollinsford students, 7-12 to SAD No. 35 School District.
6. Return grades 7 & 8 to Rollinsford Grade School.

The Committee at this time recommends Rollinsford withdraw from the AREA Agreement with Somersworth and choose one of the outlined options.

The Auditors report is on page 66 of the Town of Rollinsford, 1995, Annual Report.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Motion was made by T. Wasson, seconded by G. Flynn to accept as read. J. Whitehouse reported that the same auditors were used, Plodzick and Sanderson. Voice vote, motion passed.

4. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forth coming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof. Motion was made by S. Thomas, seconded by N. Dionne to accept as read. It was pointed out that this is beneficial to the Town. Voice vote, motion passed.

5. To see what sum the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the taxes in the Town. The budgeted is amount \$2,077,332.00. Motion was made by A. Laliberte, seconded by D. Knowles to accept. Voice vote, motion passed.

6. Non-binding Straw Vote - Assuming there is a viable option, would you be interested in pursuing alternatives to the present AREA Agreement with Somersworth? Motion was made by G. Flynn, seconded by T. Lebel to discuss and take a non-binding vote on the question as read.

A discussion took place concerning some of the viable options. A. Sollee further discussed the report of options her committee presented to the School Board and community. P. Connolly pointed out that the AREA Agreement is a 28 year old agreement. It was originally a 20 year contract with automatic yearly renewals. It is time to review the options available. Somersworth will be considering a 5.3 million dollar renovation project and now is the time to consider other options. E. Jansen, J. Whitehouse, D. Corliss, B. Cleary, T. Lebel, K. Fewell, C. Spencer, M. Kelley and R. Wasson all voiced their opinions concerning the issue. Motion was made by A. Laliberte, seconded by R. Gray to move the question. Assuming there is a viable option, would you be interested in pursuing alternatives to the present AREA Agreement with Somersworth. Voice vote. Unanimous. Motion passed.

7. Discussion of the following: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the School Board of the Town of Rollinsford?" (The vote on this article will be by official ballot at the polls on Tuesday, March 12, 1996.) A motion was made by R. Wasson, seconded by P. Connolly to open the floor for discussion of this article. No discussion. Voice Vote, motion passed.

L. Putnam pointed out this would effectively bring to an end the Town Meeting format we are familiar with. This article should be given serious consideration by all and she would recommend voting against it.

E. Jansen agrees that consideration does need to be given to make provisions for people who have a bonafide reason for not attending the Town Meeting, to allow them to have a vote. This will have a serious impact on a sacred institution and he would also recommend voting against it.

C. Spencer voiced his opinion that this would allow people who for one reason or another cannot attend the town meeting, or the person who feels intimidated at a town meeting to have his vote count. He would recommend voting in favor of this article for this reason.

J. Caouette voiced his concern with this article. The intent is good. People who are unable to attend the town meeting should be able to have their vote, however, if people do not hear the discussions concerning the issues before they make a vote they may not be able to make an informed decision. Also, if this is passed how will it effect the Special School District meeting that will need to be called if Somersworth does vote in favor of the \$5.3 million bond for the high school.

Diane Gorrow attorney for the district replied if the article passed with 60% of vote at the polls on 3/12/96 it will take effect immediately and any future meetings would be subject to official ballot at polls.

H. Foss, D. Corliss, R. Wasson, P. Connolly, Mr. Salvati all voiced questions and concerns with this article. The pros and cons were discussed.

A. Laliberte assumed duties as moderator to allow J. Caouette to address the group.

J. Caouette pointed out it is rare for the moderator to take the floor, however, the Town Meeting format is democracy in progress. Dialogues that are important concerning current issues take place. People in Rollinsford have always conducted their town meeting in a civil manner. NH is unique. Mr. Caouette feels very strong about his type of government. He would hate to see us divorce ourselves from the town meeting process.

C. Spencer stated that a major change is needed to insure everyone has a vote.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. With no additional business, a motion was made by C. Spencer, seconded by R. Wasson to adjourn. A. Sollee thanked the Somersworth Middle School students for offering their babysitting services. Voice vote, motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 10:49 A.M.

**ROLLINSFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT SPECIAL MEETING
APRIL 13, 1996**

1. The meeting was called to order at 9:06 A.M. by moderator, J. Caouette.

ARTICLE 1. Shall the sending district, Rollinsford, agree to be obligated for further bonded indebtedness approved by the Somersworth School District, the receiving district?

Mr. Caouette announced that the vote would be done by secret ballot. Tellers appointed were: S. Thomas, D. Thomas, C. Dionne, L. Larkin, R. Gray, B. Schanck, J. Gitschier and H. Gitschier.

The article was read and it was declared the meeting was properly called and posted.

Motion was made by D. Gibbas, seconded by S. Thomas to discuss and vote on the article as read.

It was explained that a NO vote would mean to pull out of the AREA Agreement and explore options.

A. YES vote would leave the AREA Agreement as it exists.

A. Sollee asked for an explanation of the vote.

J. Whitehouse explained that since the City Council in Somersworth has approved a \$5.3 million bond for renovations to the High School, Rollinsford may vote to be indebted for the 10% Somersworth would receive if we continue with the agreement. A NO vote means we do not want to be subject to the bond indebtedness. A YES vote means we agree to be responsible for the 10% if we decide to leave the AREA Agreement.

We are currently subject to bond indebtedness for various Middle School projects until 2010 when the last of the bonds expires.

It was pointed out that a NO vote would not have a direct effect on future tuition rates. The tuition formula is spelled out in the AREA Agreement and that would be used until 2010. Sound insured value of the building is one of the factors spelled out to determine tuition rates.

Tuition would likely increase no matter what the final vote is since renovations will increase the sound insured value of the building and student capacity with the renovations will decrease, raising the per student figures.

The ballot box was inspected by moderator, J. Caouette and the polls were announced open at 9:19 a.m.

At 10:10 a.m. the polls were announced closed and tellers started to count.

A total of 205 votes were cast. 137 is the required total for passage. 15 votes were yes, 190 votes were no. J. Caouette announced that NO, the sending district, Rollinsford, will not be obligated for further bounded indebtedness approved by the Somersworth School District, the receiving district.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:29 A.M.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Rollinsford School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1996. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Rollinsford School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Rollinsford School District as of June 30, 1996, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Rollinsford School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

ARTICLE II

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

The first proposed amendment would establish two definitions in section 2 of the Ordinance and establish a new section, section 8.24, to govern the use of biosolids, or human waste sludge, on agricultural lands. The amendment would be further implemented by a new section of the Rollinsford Rules and Regulations Governing Site Plan Review to set limits for the time and manner of stockpiling and spreading biosolids and would require a site plan review for the use.

ARTICLE III

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

The second proposed amendment would establish two definitions in section 2 of the Ordinance and recodify section 8.20 of the Ordinance regarding "home occupations," to give greater freedom for homeowners to engage in some kinds of home based occupations without requiring them to obtain site plan approval from the Board and would establish a new category, called "home Business" in the Ordinance with improved guidelines for processing applications for site plan approval of such businesses.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

The third proposed amendment would modify section 8.12 of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance by the addition of a provision to consider the impact of each proposed use on the aesthetic characteristics of the zone in which it is located. This section of the Ordinance would be further modified by the elimination of the "floating zone" (a commercial or industrial use sited on a five acre or larger parcel within a residential zone) for parcels fronting on, or with direct access to Route 4. Thus the Board believes that it is necessary to perform further study of the use of the floating zones along this corridor as recommended in the 1989 Master Plan update, the 1994 Community Stewardship Project Report and in an open meeting that the Board conducted with citizens of Rollinsford in September 1995.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Fire Station Building Reserve Fund.

Brenda Cleary, seconded by Denise Knowles moved to accept as read. Charlie Putnam wanted to know how long we have had the reserve fund and how much money is in it. Mr. Jansen replied that the fund was established at the 1995 Town Meeting, and it has \$5,000.00 from last year. The total for this project is probably \$75,000.00 plus or minus for the proposed two additional bays. Article XII passes. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XIII

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Revaluation Reserve Fund.

Motion to accept as written made by Charlie Dionne, seconded by Mrs. Wasson. Mr. Wasson wanted to know what is in the fund now and what is the objective to get to. Mr. Jansen explained that this fund was also established in 1995 and has \$10,000.00 which was appropriated last year. He believes that the Board of Selectman in 1997 will recommend that the Town give authorization to go ahead with the revaluation next year, which will probably be \$40,000.00 plus or minus. Article XIII carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XIV

To see if the Town will appropriate \$15,000.00 to build up to 400 feet of roadway and utilities on Town land (Lot 2-14-1). The \$15,000.00 would be derived from sale of subdivided land from Town Lot 2-14-1.

Ovid Viel moved to accept Article XIV, seconded by Richard Wasson. Lucy Putnam asked if we had buyers, Mr. Jansen said that this exact Article was voted on last year, but the Board felt it had expired with 1995. They have talked with possible buyers, but they can't guarantee that lots will be sold, but if they don't get a buyer, they won't build the road. Ayes carries (voice vote)

ARTICLE XV

To see if the Town will appropriate \$22,000.00 to purchase a new police cruiser.

Motion to accept as read made by Denise Knowles, seconded by Larry Larkin. Selectman Albert Dionne asked that he be allowed to respond to the article which appeared in the newspaper. He explained that every two years the town places an order for a new cruiser. This year Chevrolet has stopped making cruisers, and Ford did not increase production, making a shortage of available cruisers, and our order was refused. They checked with a Massachusetts dealer that we had purchased from in the past, and all of the 1996's were taken, but he did have a couple of 1995 leftovers. The board then discussed if they should purchase the left over 1995 or repair the 1992 cruiser which has about 135,000 miles on it, and is in need of an engine and has already had three transmissions which were warranted. The Board felt it was best to purchase the 1995 and tried to put a deposit on it until today's meeting, but the dealer had other towns interested in it and would not accept just a deposit. Mr. Dionne said that the Board believes with the shortage of cruisers, that if the meeting decides not to keep this cruiser, there will not be a problem selling it. The 1995 was \$3,000.00 less than a 1996 and has a longer warranty. The Board checked with the New Hampshire Municipal Association before making the purchase and was told that because they have purchased cruisers every two years in prior years (since at least 1988) it was reasonable for them to make this purchase. (RSA 32:13 II)

Carlton Spencer said that he was very upset about this which seems to be an underhanded trick.

He checked with other towns and their cruisers have over 200,000 miles, maybe we should put \$5,000.00 into a new engine if the rest of the car is in good shape. He felt we should be able to run over 200,000 miles and other parts of the country use medium size economy cars, why don't we, we should buy a smaller car. People should voice their opinion before we buy it.

Mr. Jansen explained that the price of the 1995 was \$20,300 with a three year warranty, the lower prices of adjacent towns probably do not include an extended warranty. The \$22,000.00 appropriated includes cost of changing equipment, and putting on decals, plus cost of cruiser. The 1994 still has another year warranty. Mr. Jansen said that the Board felt that saving \$3,000.00 plus having a 100,000 mile warranty on the 1995 instead of the 75,000 mile warranty on a 1996, if they could find one, was in the best interest of the Town, but again they will sell it if the people don't want it.

Mr. Wasson asked what the plans were for the old cruiser, the Board said it will be sold. Nelson Lawry had two questions, why did Chevy stop making cruisers, and why was this 1995 left over. Selectman Dionne said he had no idea why Chevy has decided to stop making cruisers, and it probably took a little time to locate the few left over 1995's. The town was lucky enough to be one of the first to find out when they were located. This cruiser has the same equipment it would have if we ordered one.

Larry Larkin, a member of the budget committee, spoke that during budget preparation this was discussed. He felt the decision to purchase the car saved the town \$3,000.00 and captured a better warranty. It was Mr. Larkin's opinion that these three Selectmen are cheap, and don't spend money unless they have to and should have the support of the Town.

Verne Crosier, seconded by Gwen Dodier, moved to terminate debate. Motion to terminate, carries. Vote on Article XV as read is taken, Article carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XVI

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend up to \$25,000.00 for the Town's share of upgrading the Church Street railroad crossing. (The State Department of Transportation proposes to expend up to \$225,000.00 to upgrade this crossing with the Town sharing costs at an amount not to exceed \$25,000.00).

Motion made by Richard Wasson, seconded by Nancy Dionne to accept as written. Selectman Ed Jansen clarified that this Article would be a add on to the budget, as it did not go through the budget committee process, the Board had forgotten about it. The State came to them in November, and said they had money to upgrade crossings in Rollinsford and if it did not get done in 1996 the Town goes to the bottom of the list, and it won't get done for a few years. They want to rebuild the crossing and move the signal lights, putting in new lights and upgrade crossing approaches. Currently the lights are set back originally designed for two tracks. The State will pay for 90% with the local municipality coming up with 10% and this could go up to \$250,000.00, so that's why the Board put the \$25,000.00. The money will come from the DOT, Amtrak and the railroad, and the town. The Board thought that maybe the town could do some of the work, and they would like to have a sleeve put under the track for future water and sewer connections, while the track is dug up.

Marc Couture said that the railroad rebuilt the Rollins Road crossing a few years ago, and the town did not put in money for that, and the railroad has not been very cooperative with the town in the past, so he didn't feel we should spend the money. Nelson Lawry agreed with Mr. Couture, and stated that the railroad is a profit making organization and he felt it was incumbent to the railroad to protect its own crossings, and he doesn't understand how the town gets into this

at all. He thought it would be interesting to know how much Amtrak and the railroad are putting in.

Mr. Jansen wanted to clarify that it is the DOT that is concerned with the crossing, they have a road division and a railroad division. This crossing has been on a list for several years and has finally reached the top. Federal money is available through the DOT to do it, the railroad will not do it, as several have said they should, and if we refuse this Article the DOT will go somewhere else with the money.

Mr. Viel asked what would be the cost of the sleeve. Water and Sewer Commissioner Verne Crosier said cost per sleeve would be between \$8,000 and \$12,000 depending on length, and there would have to be two. The Water and Sewer District would buy them, because they would own them.

Lucy Putnam said she was very worried leaving this Article as written with \$25,000.00 because the DOT could come in and say you appropriated \$25,000.00 and we are going to take it. Mrs. Putnam moved to amend the Article to read, "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend up to \$10,000.00 for the Town's share of upgrading the Church Street railroad crossing, with the condition the Town be allowed to install utility sleeves for the Water and Sewer District." (The State Department of Transportation proposes to expend up to \$225,000.00 to upgrade this crossing with the Town sharing costs at an amount not to exceed \$10,000.00). Denise Knowles seconded the amendment. It was felt the Town should negotiate some services, such as hauling gravel.

Brenda Cleary moved to terminate discussion on amendment, seconded by Ovid Viel. Motion carries. Vote taken on amendment, vote carries. Article XVI as amended is voted on. Vote carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XVII

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell industrial lots from Lot 2-14-1 and Lot 2-14-2.

Motion to accept made by Denise Knowles, seconded by Gail Flynn. No discussion. Ayes carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XVIII

To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommended 1996 Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

Denise Knowles, seconded by Howard Hammond, moves to accept as written. Mr. Jansen reminded that the previous action has increased the budget by \$10,000.00. The moderator stated that the budget figure of \$840,721.50 must be increased by \$10,000.00 for a new figure of \$850,721.50, because of action taken on Article XVI.

Fred Barry requested bottom line of the police budget. Mr. Jansen said that figure was \$245,792.07. Mr. Barry moved not to fund by that amount of money the Police Department budget. Carlton Spencer seconded the motion. Mr. Barry discussed that we have no control over the police department, the legislature has given the Selectmen the power to appoint special police. When you appoint you can hire and fire at will. He purposed taking out this money, putting perhaps a \$150,000. for the Selectmen to hire special police. Several spoke in favor of the police department. Motion made and seconded to terminate discussion on amendment, motion carries. Vote on amendment is defeated.

Moderator resumes discussion on the budget of \$850,721.50. Bridget Ordway asked what the

Municipal Building feasibility was. Mr. Jansen explained it was put in to give the committee which has been formed to study the needs of the police department whose current facilities are inadequate and too small, a little money to perhaps come up with some options for either a new building or renovations of the Town Hall.

Mr. Wasson asked for explanation on cemeteries, we spent \$300 last year and appropriated \$8,500 this year. Mr. Jansen explained the State revised RSA's on cemeteries and we are trying to comply with them. One part was to elect three trustees, which we did on Tuesday. The budget now goes through the budget process so that is why we budgeted \$8,500, we don't really know what we need, this may be too much, but we have five cemeteries. No further discussion of budget.

Moderator explained the vote will be on an amendment to Article XVIII which will read, "To see if the town will vote to accept the recommended 1996 Budget as amended to read \$850,721.50." He repeated that this will be the Article to be voted on, we discussed the purposed budget, which had been increased by \$10,000.00 because of the vote on Article XVI. Amended budget of \$850,721.50 carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XIX

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement to exchange title for the following parcels of property with the Rollinsford Water and Sewer District:

1. The Rollinsford Water & Sewer District will transfer title and the Town will accept approximately 13 acres of land (tax map lots 2-16 & 2-17) which represent excess land not required by the Rollinsford Water & Sewer District.

2. In exchange for the 13 acre parcel, the Town will grant to the Rollinsford Water & Sewer District the following,

a. A fee interest in a 300 foot by 300 foot "footprint" under the proposed water tower (ownership in lieu of lease),

b. A fee interest in a one acre plot around an existing (but not connected) well currently located in the so-called Scoutland property north of the transfer station and an agreement that the Town will abide by State law not to permit building or other well hazards within 400 feet of the well head,

c. A fee interest in an additional one acre plot within the so-called Soutland Conservation area for use as a future well development site. The specific site of this second well site is expected to be located near Scoutland Road, probably within 1000 feet of the existing capped well in Scoutland. The specific site will be determined by ground water availability and will be subject to mutual agreement by the Board of Selectmen and the Water & Sewer Commissioners.

d. That the Town grant rights of way between any of these current or proposed wells and the water tower or any practical water system connection point over Town land as shown on plan of easements as agreed by the Rollinsford Water & Sewer Commission and the Rollinsford Board of Selectmen, March, 1996.

Motion to accept made by Mr. Wasson, seconded by Larry Larkin. Selectman Ed Ross moved to amend 2-a to read a "fee interest in a 150 foot by 150 foot "footprint" under the proposed water tower (ownership in lieu of lease). Ovid Viel seconded the motion. Water and Sewer Commissioner Verne Crosier, who said he didn't read the blueprint scale right and got the footage needed all wrong, asked Mr. Ross if he would accept a change in that amendment to read "a fee interest in a "footprint" as indicated on a design by Hoyle Tanner Associates, the engineering

firm for the district." The district wants to put a fence around the new water tank and it has to be positioned in such a way, that trucks and other vehicles can get around it. Mr. Ross said he would agree with the change as long as it did not exceed the square footage of 150 by 150, which Mr. Wasson said was 22,500 square feet. Mr. Viel, who seconded the motion to amend, said he agreed with the change. The Moderator asked that Mr. Ross restate his amendment. Mr. Ross asked that 2-a be amended to read "a fee interest in a "footprint" not to exceed 22,500 square feet, as indicated on a design by Hoyle Tanner Associates, the engineering firm for the district." Ovid Viel the maker of the second to the amendment had no objections. Vote to accept amendment carries. (voice vote)

It was explained there is a capped well about 25 feet off the Scoutland Road, which was drilled about ten years ago. It's a proven well, and what the water district is trying to do is connect all the elements, so that as water supplies and demands change they can connect these wells and provide for the town. There is another well which was drilled several years ago, so there are two capped wells in Scoutland.

Charlie Putnam stated that he thought Scoutland was overseen by the conservation Commission, and had concern that another town board was granting a legal interest in another town agency to go and dig for water. Mr. Crosier answered that if you want to preserve Scoutland as a conservation area the best thing you can do is dig municipal wells and then there can be virtually no encroachment in that area.

Mr. Jansen showed on a map, which was available to those present, what parcels would be exchanged.

The moderator said because it was a long Article, unless someone objected he would not reread it for the vote. There were no objections. Vote on Article XIX as amended carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XX

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate with the N.H. Department of Natural Resources and the Federal Government to transfer the conservation easements on Tax Map 2-14-2 to Tax Map Lots 2-16 and 2-17. (This transfer will enable the Town to develop or sell industrial land from Tax Map Lot 2-14-2).

Larry Larkin, seconded by Richard Wasson, moved to accept Article XX as written. Selectman Dionne explained that this Article is tied in with Article XVII which would allow industrial lots sold from Lot 2-14-1 and Lot 2-14-2. The problem is with Lot 2-14-2, which when purchased twenty or twenty-five years ago, it was purchased with Federal money and there is a conservation easement on this land. We have taken land out for Jessie Doe Road, we sold land to Mr. Walter Stewart to help make his parcel a conforming lot, and we have used land for the transfer station, and we are going to put the new water tank on it. We don't know how much more we can do to this land and still have it designated conservation land, so we have two plans, one of which we hope will be acceptable to the State and Federal Government. One plan would be to take all the little pieces left and swap it for the 13 acres approved in Article XIX, or take the 66 acres in conservation easement and swap it for 66 acres of Scoutland, which would put a conservation easement on Scoutland, especially the water front area, which would protect it from future development. Scoutland is around 100 acres. Mr. Dionne moved to amend Article XX to read "transfer the conservation easements on Tax Map 2-14-2 to Tax Map Lots 2-16 and 2-17 or a portion of Tax Map Lot 2-13". Mr. Jansen seconded the motion.

Charlie Putnam voiced concern that this Article came up very late in the town meeting process, and that all boards involved did not have adequate time to fully study all aspects of this Article. The terms of one conservation easement versus another conservation easement, could

have impact on future town meetings, what our children could do to those parcels. Lucy Putnam stated she thought Scoutland was already a Conservation area, and not buildable. Mr. Dionne answered it's designated that way through our zoning. This proposal would place a Federal Conservation Easement on it. Vote on amendment carries. (voice vote) Article XX as amended carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XXI

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following the public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require pursuant to RSA 80:80.

Motion to accept Article as read made by Ovid Viel, seconded by Armand Laliberte. Nelson Lawry stated that this Article lists a number of "or's" what determines the alternatives of how the land will be disposed of? Mr. Jansen answered that this is the same Article we have voted on for a number of years, the wording was written by an Attorney for the NH Municipal Association, which is accepted by most towns. No further discussion, ayes carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XXII

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder, the surplus equipment and vehicles in the Highway, Fire and Police Departments.

Brenda Cleary moved to accept as written, Tom Lebel seconded the motion. No discussion on Article XXII. Article carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XXIII

To see if the Town will vote to urge our representatives to the General Court of New Hampshire and the United States Congress to pass laws reforming electoral campaign financing, thus returning the political process to the will of the people and encouraging the participation of candidates with great ability and limited means. Measures to accomplish this may include but not be limited to the following:

1. Sharp limitations on all forms of contributions to candidates, including soft money contributions (contributions to political parties);
2. Maximum spending limits per election linked to geographic and demographic makeup of each state and district, such as \$1.00 per voter;
3. Sharp limitations on all forms of spending to influence elections, including independent expenditures;
4. Sharp limitations on contributions to and spending by political action committees; and
5. Remedies, such as free broadcast time, postal subsidies, and democratic (public) financing, to balance inequities between credible candidates, incumbent and challenger, rich and poor. (by petition)

Richard Wasson moved, seconded by Ovid Viel to accept as written. No discussion. Ayes carries. (voice vote)

ARTICLE XXIV

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. No other business discussed. Meeting adjourned at 11:35 A.M.

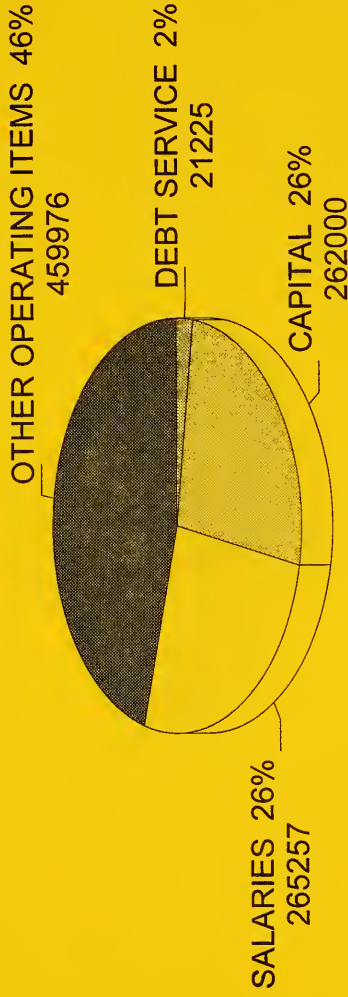

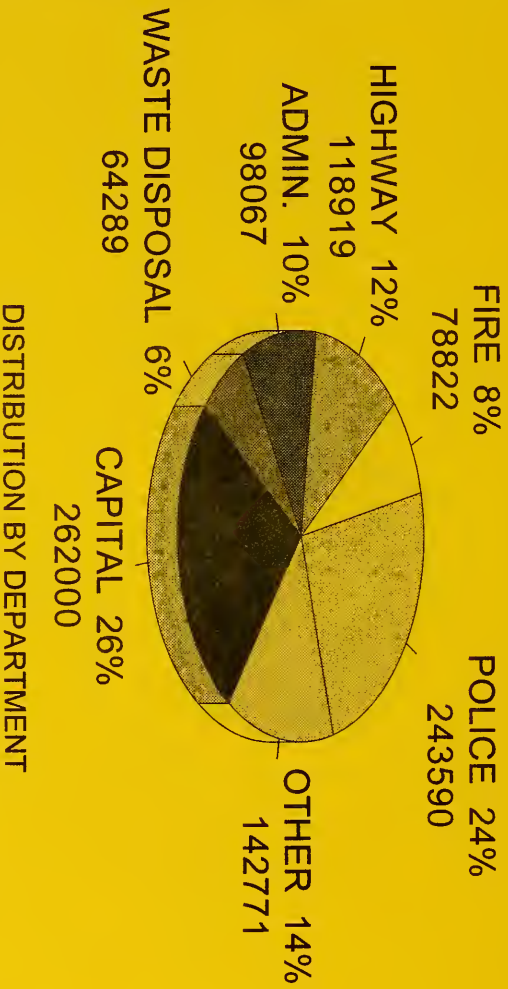
PROPOSED 1997 ROLLINSFORD BUDGET CAPITAL AND OPERATING CATEGORIES
