

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen wish to submit the following report for the year 1984.

This report is really about the status of undertakings completed, those still underway and those requiring future consideration. We feel in many ways the year could be classified as uneventful. Projects completed include: 1) The realignment of the curbs and paving of the sidewalk on the south side of Main Street; 2) the raising of the storm drains and replacement of the drainage pipes at the east end of Main Street; and 3) the reconstruction and paving of Highland Avenue.

Projects initiated this year which are ongoing include: 1) the establishment of a committee to study the accessability of public buildings and various programs to the handicapped. This committee will be making recommendations on what modifications or changes will be needed to best meet the needs of the handicapped of our community; and 2) the reactivation of the Conservation Commission which has been diligent in performing their duties.

Looking to the future we wish to go on record as supporting the "Downtown Feasibility" proposal which has been recommended by the Revitalization Committee. We feel it presents an excellent opportunity to look at this area of Town with the idea of improving its appearance and use. We hope that this would eventually lead to receipt of Federal Grant monies to upgrade some of the buildings in this area. We reported last year that we expected the Appeal Hearing on the Route #3-11 By-pass would be heard in the fall. We were informed that the State and Federal Highway Departments had been given until January 2nd, 1985 to submit their briefs. We were given three weeks to respond with our brief and this was prepared by our attorneys. The last word we have is that the appeal will be heard in the Spring. We are still optimistic that we will prevail and that the judgement could result in reimbursement to the Towns of some of the monies we have expended.

We are again asking the support of the taxpayers in our efforts to improve the streets and sidewalks. We have increased the reconstruction portion of the 1985 budget by \$5,000.00 over the \$15,000.00 appropriated last year. Hopefully this will allow us to meet this need at an accelerated pace.

The financial position of the Town continues to be a positve one, as indicated by the Report of the Treasurer. This can be attributed to the efforts of our department heads keeping their expenditures under budget and an increase of revenues received by the Town. The use of the semiannual tax billing has also been a contributing factor, in that is allows for the management of funds more beneficially.

We are pleased to dedicate this Town Report to Donald P. Cyr as a way of thanking him for his many years (25) of faithful service to the Town.

We also want to express our thanks to our Town employees and to the members of the various boards and committees, it is only through their efforts and hard work that the business of the Town can be accomplished. If we are to applaud anyone for a successful 1984 we must direct it to them.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Masonic Hall on March 12, 1985 at 10:00 a.m., to act on the following subjects.

1. To choose one Selectmen for a term of three years. One Treasurer for the ensuing year. One Road Agent for the ensuing year. Three members of the Budget Committee, two for a term of three years and one for a term of one year. One Park Commissioner for a term of three years. Trustee of Trust Funds, one for a term of three years. Two Sewer Commissioners, one for a term of three years and one for a term of one year. One Library Trustee for a term of one year.

And on the 16th day of March 1985 at 10:00 in the Forenoon at the Winnisquam Regional High School, To act on the Following Subjects:

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund to include Principal and interest, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a setoff against appropriations for the following purpose and in the amount indicated herewith. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a street light, pole PSNH 65-69, located on School Street at an annual cost of \$107.00. (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or another Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations, gifts or property that might become available prior to next Town Meeting.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the paved portion of a road, with proper turn around, located off Lancaster Hill Road and being the Road described in the Frank G. Sprague subdivision, approved 2/12/80 by the Tilton Planning Board.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to waive interest charges amounting to less than \$1.00 on property tax accounts.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action on Article #18 of the 1979 Warrant, which read. "To see if the Town (School District) wishes to exclude from its Social Security Plan, services performed by Election officials or election workers for each calendar year in which the renumeration paid for such services is less than \$100.00 per year." Passed unanimously.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee, and pass any vote in relation hereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53-A, for the purpose of joining together towns and cities in a joint and cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner which will meet federal and state regulations and for the economical and efficient recovery of energy from said solid waste disposal. The Cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the "Concord Regional Solid Waste/ Resource Recovery Cooperative". A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the warrant and is available at the town offices during normal business hours. The Board of Selectmen is specifically authorized on behalf of the Town (a) to execute and deliver the cooperative agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents, and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purposes of the cooperative agreement; (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative agreement; and (c) to take action relative thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to Zoes J. Dimos and James C. Katsekas those lands and/or associated rights in which the Town holds an interest and which are located within the project boundary of the Clement Dam Hydroelectric Project.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the reports of its officers and agents.
 - 15. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SECOND SESSION, MARCH 17, 1984 at Winnisquam Regional High School

The business meeting of the 1984 Town Meeting was called to order at 10:08 a.m. by the moderator, Mr. Michael Baker. Reverend William Humphrey of the Tilton-Northfield United Methodist Church was called upon to offer the invocation. A moment of silence was observed in memory of the late William M. Lawrence, Sr., a dedicated citizen of Tilton who gave so much to the community.

Mr. Baker then introduced the deputy moderator, Alexander Mac-Gregor, the Board of Selectmen, Budget Committee and the Town Clerk. The area for the working press, visitors and non-voters was designated and all were welcomed to this session of the Town Meeting.

Instructions were given as to the running of the meeting. Since the complete warrant was read at the election on Tuesday this procedure was dispensed with and each article was taken up in order.

The Town Clerk was called upon to read the minutes of the Tuesday election. Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. deSousa that the minutes be accepted, motion carried.

Article #2 Motion was made by Mr. Randall, seconded by Mr. Feener that the Town vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund to include Principal and interest, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a setoff against appropriations for the following purpose and in the amount indicated herewith. Administration - \$70,000.00 and Highway \$5,000.00. Motion passed with unanimous vote.

Article #3 Motion by Mr. Strauss to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$12,000.00 for the purpose of reimbursing certain sewer users for the cost of connecting to the new sewer system, motion seconded. After lengthy discussion the motion was defeated.

Article #4 Motion made by Mrs. Davis, seconded by Mr. Rutherford that the Town authorize the Selectmen to transfer the balance of \$585.24 from the Town Garage Building Fund to the General Fund. Mrs. Davis explained that this was balance left in fund. Motion was passed unanimously.

Article #5 Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. deSousa that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or another Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b. Motion passed unanimously.

Article #6 Motion made by Mr. Bowler, seconded by Mr. deSousa that the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations, gifts or property, including real property that might become available prior to next Town Meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

Article #7 Motion by Mr. Randall that the Town vote to accept the Budget of \$921,942 and pass any vote in relation thereto, motion seconded. Motion made by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Bowler that Town Officers Salaries portion of budget be amended to increase the salary of the Trustee of Trust Funds by \$300.00. After discussion by Mr. Rutherford who explained the background of trustees salary and

reply by Mr. Randall for the Budget Committee as well as comments from Mr. Dodge, a former Trustee of Trust Funds, the question was called. The amendment was defeated. Questions were raised regarding the damages & legal expenses and what was covered in this category. Comment made that records should be kept of fixed assets. A breakdown of new equipment was requested which included a new file cabinet, typewriter, work table and key cabinet under the Administrative Dept., a cruiser, typewriter, radio equipment for Police Dept. and a backhoe-loader, lawnmower, sidewalk plow and sand spreader for Highway Dept. Motion by William Lawrence, Jr. seconded by Terry deSousa that \$1,999 be raised for Old Home Day, this amendment was passed unanimously. Police Chief George Prescott then came before assembly to represent his budget. After explaining the position of the Tilton department with relation to other departments in the range of salaries and fringe benefits the Chief asked that a motion come from the floor to amend the police department budget by increasing \$25,433. Motion by Mr. D'Amore, seconded by Mr. Rutherford that the budget be increased under the police department by \$25,433. The breakdown to be as follows: \$18,228 for salaries, \$2,597 for retirement and \$4,608 for Blue Cross-Blue Shield. After considerable discussion the vote on this amendment was passed. Mr. Dodge made a motion to amend budget to increase the portion of Town Budget relative to administrative expenses to cover the cost of payment of Blue Cross-Blue Shield equal to other town employees. After brief recess this figure was equated to the amount of \$2,660. After discussion of this amendment it was passed unanimously. The vote on the amended budget figure of \$952,034 was passed unanimously.

Motion by Mr. deSousa, seconded by Mr. Bowler that a recess be called. Motion defeated.

Article #8 Motion by Mrs. Davis, seconded by Mr. Rutherford, that Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed, by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. After brief discussion this article was passed with unanimous vote.

Article #9 Mr. Hebert made a motion to see if the Town would vote to accept a road known as Dunlop Drive, located off Lancaster Hill Rd., motion seconded. Mr. Tilden of Dunlop Drive rose to present the case of the residents of this road. After lengthy discussion a division vote was called for. The vote of the affirmative was 28, negative vote was 41. Motion defeated. Mr. Dixon made a motion to have this article

reconsidered, motion seconded. Vote on reconsideration was defeated.

Article #10 Mr. deSousa made a motion to pass over this article relative to a parking ordinance, seconded by Mr. Rutherford. Chief Prescott came before assembly to explain that an ordinance has been prepared and the selectmen have the authority to enact this. If Selectmen enact this ordinance they will be able to correct and adjust as needed without having to wait for next Town Meeting. Copies of proposed ordinance have been available in the Town office for perusal. The vote on this article to pass over was in the affirmative.

Article #11 Motion by Mr. Gengras, seconded that article relative to electing an overseer of the poor be passed over. Motion carried unanimously.

Article #12 Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. deSousa that article #12 be passed as written in Town Report. Motion passed unanimously.

Article #13 Motion by Mr. Bowler, seconded by Mr. deSousa that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Motion passed unanimously.

Article #14 Motion by Mrs. Davis that the reports of officers and agents as printed in the Town Report for 1983 be accepted, motion seconded. Mr. Al Gengras rose to amend the report of the Trustees of the Hall Memorial Library. There were several typographical errors in report. The corrected report is attached to these minutes and Mr. Gengras read over the corrections. This amended motion was passed unanimously.

Article #15 Mr. William Lawrence, Jr. made a motion to have the Town Moderator establish a committee to study alternatives for police services and report back before the next Town Meeting. After some discussion the motion was defeated.

Mr. James Dodge made a motion to re-establish a committee to study the feasibility of an administrative assistant and that said committee report their findings before Jan. 1, 1985. The committee to be appointed by the Moderator. Minimum qualifications for administrative assistant to be degree in business administrative, motion seconded. After discussion this motion was passed.

Article #16 Mr. Bowler rose to thank Mrs. Elizabeth Davis for her term as selectman and her contributions to the Town. A rising vote of thanks was given to Mrs. Davis.

Reminder was given of the T-N Fire District meeting to be held on Mar. 19.

Mr. Mills asked that anyone who did not fill out questionnaire on Conservation Commission do so. He explained that there is now an active commission and they are looking for input from the townspeople.

Motion by Mr. deSousa, seconded by Mr. Rutherford that meeting adjourn. Meeting adjourned at 1:26 p.m.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Tilton Tilton, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Tilton, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1983, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Tilton, New Hampshire at December 31, 1983, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accouting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Tilton, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

I thought we had a busy year in 1983 but that was nothing compared to 1984. Half of the year we were short three police officers yet we handled 903 more calls for service this year for a total of 3,975 requests for police action.

Last year (1983) we prosecuted 619 people in the Laconia District Court and only 17 were found not guilty or had the cases dismissed by the Court, and a total of \$29,215.00 in fines were levied. This year (1984) we prosecuted 731 people at the Laconia District Court and had 19 defendants walk out without being found guilty of at least one charge. This amounted to an impressive figure of \$40,897.00 in fines levied. This should give you an idea of how active we were. We presently (as of January 1985) have Court trials scheduled into the middle of April.

As you may recall last year at Town Meeting I told you that four of my Officers had decided to seek employment elsewhere do to the low wage scale in Tilton. One Officer went to the New Hampshire State Police, one to the Concord Police Department and two to the Laconia Police Department. They all went to larger Departments with greater abilities to pay higher wages. As a result you took strong positive action to improve the Police wages in Tilton. This resulted in attracting experienced police officers. They are as Follows:

ROBERT H. TERHUNE: Bob graduated from Holderness School in 1979, and attended Northeastern University College of Criminal Justice from 1980 to 1981, he then transferred to St. Anslem's College Criminal Justice Program graduating with a Bachelor Degree in Criminal Justice in 1984. Bob has served as a part time Officer in the Towns of Meredith and Gilford and the City of Franklin. He graduated from the New Hampshire Standards and Training Police Academy graduating on November 16, 1984, with awards as the top candidate. He represented us well. Bob is the son of Dr. and Mrs. E. Robert Terhune of Franklin.

RICHARD P. PAULHUS: Dick graduated from Bishop Brady High School, The New Hampshire Cadet Police Academy, The New Hampshire Standards and Training Academy for Part-Time Officers and the New Hampshire Standards and Training Academy 67th FullTime Officers Academy all in 1983. Dick served as a full-time Officer in the City of Franklin before coming to Tilton. Dick is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Paulhus (owners of Paulhus Pharmacy of Franklin).

JAMES P. CURRAN: Jim enlisted in the United States Marine Corp in 1965 and was honorably discharged in 1969 as a Sergeant after serving a tour of combat in Viet Nam. He is a certified Corrections Officer from the Massachusetts Department of Corrections where he was employed prior to moving to New Hampshire. Upon moving to New Hampshire he became employed as a full-time Officer for the City of Franklin where he attained the rank of Sergeant. He was certified by the New Hampshire Standards and Training Council as a Full-Time Police Officer, Firearms instructor and intoximeter operator. Jim also completed the FBI advanced Firearms School. Additionally Jim has numerous certificates in the use of the Police Canine, particularly in the field of drug detection. Jim lives in Franklin with his wife Rose and their 8 year old daughter Jodi.

ADAM E. ROY: Adam graduated from Merrimack Valley High School in 1980 and St. Anslem's College Criminal Justice and Sociology programs in 1984 with a Bachelors Degree. In addition to his educational background, Adam has been a dispatcher for the Merrimack County Sheriff's Department, Special Officer in Bristol and Franklin and a Correctional Officer at the Merrimack County Corrections Center. Adam also interned at the New Hampshire Attorney General's Division of Consumer Protection and Anti-trust in Concord. Adam will attend the full-time Officers Academy in the spring. Adam is the son of Chief and Mrs. Aime Roy of Webster.

Because of your continued support and the resulting attraction of qualified professional Police Officers, the Tilton Police Department is now recognized as one of the most effective and professional Departments in the County and surrounding area. This is particularly evidenced by my election as the Chairman of the Belknap County Chief's Association for 1984.

I'm indebted for your support and I will endeavor to continue providing you with the best police service I can.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

After the delays and extra work caused by the flooding during May and June, summer work progressed more or less on schedule.

Work accomplished included; School Street and Pleasant Street; drainage work and repair catch basin. Park Road & Route 3, Peabody Street; repair outlets from catch basins. Cedar Street; repair catch basin. Westwood Drive; clean ditch, install new basin and culvert. Jacob Road; clean ditch and replace culvert. Highland Avenue, Manville Road; install new basins, culverts and ditch. All catch basins were cleaned.

In a joint effort with the State of New Hampshire Highway Department, we worked to drain sidewalks on Route 3, replaced culverts on; Lancaster Hill Road, Pleasant Drive, Calef Hill Road and Colby Road and improved the drainage on Main Street and School Street.

Road work included, Highland Avenue; stabilize base and chipseal. West Street; finished paving. Pest House Road; grade, shim and seal. Pleasant Street; shim and pave. Maple Lane; grade and seal. Lancaster Heights; seal. Silver Lake Road; seal.

The curbing on the south side of Main Street was reset and the sidewalk was based and finally the finish coat of pavement was applied. The Gas Co. did the paving outside of the curbing.

The fence was replaced at the Grange Road Cemetery and the six other cemeteries plus the Island and the Winter Street Monument were mowed on a regular basis, approximately every two weeks.

Quite a bit of work was done for the Sewer District, including a new manhole at Winter Street and Park Road and a new manhole and sewer main, approximately 220 ft. on Peabody Street.

Rubbish was collected regularly with only a few delays because of Holidays or storms. Approximately 25 tons of rubbish is collected each week by the Town's crew or 1,300 tons per year. The Town should be considering recycling in the near future. This would work very well with the new Resource Recovery Station planned for Concord.

YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM 1984 ANNUAL REPORT

The Youth Assistance Program had a successful year in 1984. We continue to work closely with the three police departments, the schools, the Recreation Department, Twin Rivers Family Resource Council, the New Hampshire Court Diversion Network, the state Youth Workers Association, the state Division of Children and Youth Services, and other agencies.

We served 146 children and youths in 1984: 63 from Northfield, 61 from Tilton, and 22 from Sanbornton. There were 21 court diversion cases, six less than the previous year. We have had a slow but steady decline in court diversion cases since 1979, when we had 92 contracts.

YAP had some personnel changes this past year. Jean Moreau Munsey resigned as program coordinator in June, due to the arrival of her baby and her desire to work with her husband in his new business. Diane Erwin, who worked with us previously and was back from two years in the Peace Corps, replaced Jean in July. Diane became a full-time nursing student and left us in January, 1985, to devote her time to her studies. Jean and Diane served us in excellent fashion, and we wish them all the best.

We are very fortunate to have Martha Douglass of Sanbornton with us as program coordinator. Martha has lived locally for several years, has two children in our schools, and started her duties the last week in January. She has already expressed many ideas for programs, and I'm sure that by the time this report is published many YAP programs will be in full swing.

Three board members resigned in 1984, Cindy Kurahara and George Vaillancourt because of new jobs and Jack Maurath due to increasing time pressures. YAP thanks Cindy, George, and Jack for their dedicated service and wishes them good fortune.

We welcome as new members of the board Maurice Bowler, Betty Conlon, George Janas, Sharon Hill, Richard Robinson, and Steve Tallo. Sharon is *chairperson*, Paul Leary is *vice-chairperson*, Betty Davis, *treasurer*, and Vincent Smith *secretary*. Other board members are Charles Chandler, Rose Ciarpella, Mariann Clark, Tom Fulweiler, Dusty Nielsen, and Dick Smart.

We continue to provide a broad range of services for children and youth, including counseling, court diversion, and various programs and activities. One such program involves matching a child with an adult volunteer who would spend three hours a week with the child. If you are an adult with some time who would like to make a meaningful impact in a child's life, we'd like to explain the program and its possibilities to you.

Our deepest thanks to all who have volunteered their assistance to YAP. Our success depends on this, and we really appreciate it.

HALL MEMORIAL LIBRARY Public Library for Tilton and Northfield 1984 Annual Report

This past year's activities at the library included free films shown each Wednesday afternoon throughout the year, and sometimes shared with the first-graders at Union Sanborn School. Story hours were also continued, with songs, games and stories offered preschoolers on Mondays at 11 A.M. or Tuesdays at 12:30 P.M. on an ongoing basis. Class visits were made by fourth graders of USSchool, also other groups brought by interested teachers, the Hand-in-hand Kindergarten, parents of the Headstart Program and others. On May 2, the library hosted a group of local librarians of the Scrooge and Marley Library District with a program on book review tools. The Tri-Library Book Review Group continued to meet monthly at the Hall Memorial, Sanbornton or Belmont Public Libraries, respectively and in turn to review current fiction and non-fiction. Thanks to Richard Blais of the Concord Monitor, an article about this group appeared in the December 13 issue of that paper. The librarian attended a February 24 meeting at the Legislative Building in Concord on the need for public buildings to provide access to the handicapped citizens. Although our lovely brick and granite building does not lend itself to ramps, nor our crowded interior space for wheelchairs, we continue to seek ways and means of enabling and welcoming all our citizens to the library services. The librarian also attended the Spring Conference of the New Hampshire Library Association at Colby College on June 5, along with other librarians from all over the state.

The Summer Reading Program, Rainbow Readers, began as school closed on June 20 and culminated in a party at the library for all participants on August 23. All twenty-three active readers are considered winners, while special awards went to Merdith and Ethan Banks, Beth McCarthy and Damon Mills. This program was coordinated with the television series, Reading Rainbow.

The Annual Library Book Sale, sponsored by Camille Tolme and the Friends of the Library, was held July 14, 16 and 17 at the Community Room of the Iona Savings Bank and continued on a sale table at the library for another month. Profits of over \$500 are earmarked for the replacement of a wooden section over the entrance with glass, adding light to the library's entry hall and beauty to its appearance without detracting from the architectural integrity of this historic building or causing heat loss in the winter.

Along with such realia as puzzles, puppets and games, the library this year offered four Polaroid cameras, lent by that company, for circulation to adult patrons. The library houses Northfield Historical Society archives and receives the quarterly of the N.H. Historical Society, thanks to the NHS's membership as of 1984. A Monday evening program of the well-known poet and Poet Laureate of New Hampshire, Donald Hall, was among the Northfield Historical Society's most interesting meetings for library patrons as for all others who attended on June 4.

Six sections of new steel book shelving were installed by the trustees, while a narrow book truck and audiovisual cart, with shelves, were also added to the library. Shelving in the basement is planned to accommodate the books and records used only occasionally. Donations destined for our next book sale are also stored there. More gift books than ever were added this year, thanks to the Mary Ellen Osgood Estate and the New Hampshire State Library Bookmobile gift of several hundred books from their last loan (the Bookmobile no longer operates).

Library displays included books made by children, a rock and fossil collection, shell collection, Hummel figurines, exhibit of school artwork and toy animals. A beautiful balsam Christmas tree was cut and put up in the library by the Tolme family, thanks to Ruth Gorrell's generosity. The T-N Garden Club again graced the library entrance with an attractive holiday wreath by Clara Hardy. Thanks are due to those who contributed books, efforts and interest to the Hall Memorial Library in 1984—and to all patrons devoted to the library and its continued use.

TILTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The major purpose of the Tilton Conservation Commission stated in RSA 36-A, is to help protect and encourage the proper use of local natural resources, protect watershed areas, conduct research on use of local land and water areas, coordinate local unofficial conservation groups, establish an index of open space and wetland areas, and to provide a plan for the proper use of these areas.

Of the six (6) major goals set by the Commission last year, the review and investigation of dredge and fill permits and the monitoring of proposed plans of the Corps of Engineers regarding the dredging of the Winnipesaukee River have been the main areas of concern for this past year. Considerable correspondence between the TCC and the NH Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, The Wetlands Board, The Water Resources Board, and the Corps of Engineers has transpired and is available in our new file cabinet for reference and review.

The results of the TCC Questionnaire circulated at Town Meeting last year indicated not only an interest in conservation matters, but support and encouragement for the proper use of our local resources. With specific reference to the town acquiring land for recreational purposes, the questionnaire showed that:

84% favored the town having a Swimming area/town beach

64% felt we should have Picnic Areas available

62% would favor a boat access on Lake Winnisquam

49% would like to see Nature Trails/Bike trails

71% felt that there were historic sites/buildings in Tilton that should be preserved

and that better than half those responding (53% and 51% respectfully) felt that Tilton should preserve some area for recreation and wildlife.

Also of interest to the TCC was the response to land and water polution problems within Tilton. 40% of those responding felt that we do have problems in need of attention and only 26% felt that there were no problems.

Tilton is a member of the N.H. Association of Conservation Districts and members of the TCC attended and participated in the Annual Meeting held in Concord on November 3, 1984.

Conservation Commission meetings are held on the **second** Thursday of every month, in Town Hall, at 7:00 p.m., and the public is encouraged to attend.
