CLUSTER DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE AND STANDARDS

In order to encourage the sound use of land, and to encourage the preservation of open and undeveloped land areas within the Town of Tuftonboro, the Town of Tuftonboro hereby adopts the following standards and regulations, to be collectively known as the "Cluster Development Ordinance":

A. Concept.

The concept of this ordinance is to create standards which will allow for a more flexible approach to the design of residential home sites within the Town of Tuftonboro. Contemplated forms of ownership would include "condominium" and "planned unit development". In the case of condominium conveyance, the provisions of New Hampshire RSA 356:b "Condominium Act" shall be incorporated into this ordinance when and where applicable. Where condominium conveyance is contemplated, the applicant shall provide a sworn statement by the applicant or by his counsel, to the effect that all applicable provisions of N.H. RSA 356:B shall be complied with in the subdivision's documentation. In the event of the planned unit development (sometimes known as "zero lot line" development) all legal documentation concerning the proposed development (including the declaration, by-laws, restrictions if any, and proposed deed form) shall be presented to the Planning Board for review by the Board and legal counsel for the Town of Tuftonboro prior to the completion of the review process.

B. Lot and building requirements for residential dwelling unit developed under the provisions of this section.

1. **Lot Size**—Other than as provided in Article III, Section S, the

minimum lot size for parcels of land submitted to the provisions of this section shall be 4 acres in the waterfront zones and 8 acres in the non-waterfront zones. It is the intention of this paragraph to ensure that adequate land area exists for a development consistent with the concept of this ordinance. The Zoning Board of Adjustment may, with the recommendation of the Planning Board, consider an application for special exception to consider the development of a smaller sized parcel of land in either zone.

2. Density—Within Zone 1, and non-waterfront lots within Zone 2, there shall be a minimum of one (1) acre of net developable land for each dwelling unit. Within Zone 3, and waterfront property within Zone 2, there shall be a minimum of three quarter ($\frac{3}{4}$) acre of net developable land per dwelling unit.

3. Net Developable Land—Net developable land shall be computed by subtracting from the gross total contained within a development, all wetlands as are defined in the Tuftonboro Wetlands Ordinance, all exposed ledge, and all land with a slope which exceeds twenty-five percent.

4. There shall be a maximum of Four (4) dwelling units contained within any one (1) residential structure.

5. The minimum frontage along Lake Winnepesaukee, Dan Hole Pond, Lower Beech Pond, or Mirror Lake, shall be one hundred fifty feet (150') of straight line shore front for the first two (2) dwelling units and twelve and one half feet ($12\frac{1}{2}$ ') of straight line shore front for each additional dwelling unit, if any, over two (2).

6. For any parcel where the acreage density standard and waterfront density standard result in a differing number of potential units, the more restrictive standard shall apply.

7. Lots not fronting on Lake Winnepesaukee, Dan Hole Pond, Lower Beech Pond, or Mirror Lake shall have a minimum of two hundred feet (200') frontage on a public road, or on a roadway designed and constructed in accordance with Tuftonboro roadway standards.

8. Residential units developed under the provisions of this section shall have a minimum setback of one hundred feet (100') from any lake or pond; thirty feet (30') from a road sideline or road right-of-way line; and twenty-five feet (25') from the exterior sidelines (all boundaries other than waterfront and roadfront boundaries) of the parent tract being submitted to the provisions of this ordinance. There shall be no minimum setback for residential units from interior boundary lines established by the provisions of a planned unit development-type subdivision, provided however that a right-of-way setback of thirty feet (30') shall be adhered to in the event that internal driveway rights-of-way are created; further, in no case shall any two residential structures be less than thirty feet (30') apart.

9. There shall be a minimum of two parking spaces provided per residential dwelling unit. Within the waterfront zone there shall be no parking within one hundred feet (100') of the waterfront. Provisions shall be made for adequate drainage of parking areas and all

other facilities within the development. The applicant may be required to prove the safety and suitability of parking area layout and access as may be presented on plans.

10. Sewage disposal systems which service four or more dwelling units shall be designed by a professional engineer licensed by the State of New Hampshire

1. Final approval by the Planning Board of any proposed cluster subdivision shall be preceded by subdivision approval from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

12. Provisions shall be made within the Declaration, By-Laws, Homeowners Association Rules & Regulations or other documents acceptable to the Planning Board, which will ensure the sound management of the common lands dedicated to the provisions of this section. "Sound Management" includes, herein, utilization of land based on recommendations of the County Soil Conservation Office, or the Town Conservation Commission or the County Forester, or a land use plan prepared by land use consultants and approved by the Homeowner's Association. The goal of management of the common land is to provide any of the following:

- a. Woodland with open-space recreation facilities such as cross country ski trails, hiking paths.
- b. Managed woodland (for contiguous common areas of more than 10 acres).
- c. Open meadow or pasture area.
- d. Waterfront activity areas such as swimming and boating.
- e. Other uses as may be approved by the Planning Board.

Finally, the common land dedicated to this section shall be restricted by permanent covenant from further subdivision or inclusion in land areas for unit density computation for any subdivision other than the original subdivision of which the common land is a part.

(EXPLANATORY NOTE: The following revisions are required in order to incorporate the "Cluster Development Ordinance and Standards" in the Zoning Ordinance).

ARTICLE 1 B. DEFINITIONS:

Add: "CLUSTER DEVELOPMENT. Any subdivision involving more than two dwelling units wherein land owned in common is created and is or may be owned by more than two parties, and which either (a) creates lots smaller than one acre in the waterfront zone or smaller than two acres in the non-waterfront zones or (b) is submitted to the condominium form of ownership."

From definition of "Residence" delete: "and condominiums"

ARTICLE III. GENERAL PROVISIONS:

Add the following preface to III M, N, O, and Q: "Except as is provided for by the "Cluster Development Ordinance,"

Add: "S. Any pre-existing, lot that can support a duplex residence without a zoning variance and without waiver by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission will be allowed up to two (2) dwelling units. The Planning

Board shall, under the provisions of this paragraph, have the right to require New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission approved septic system design and subdivision plans prior to approving any application utilizing a pre-existing lot. Further, the Planning Board shall, under the provisions of this paragraph, have the right to require construction of said approved septic system as a condition of approval.'

ARTICLE IV:

Add the following preface to IV B1: "Except as is provided for by the Cluster Development Ordinance."

ARTICLE V:

From V A 3., delete the word "condominiums"

Delete all of V A 3a.

Delete all of V B2, including V B2a through i.

ARTICLES VII THROUGH XVI:

Cluster Development Ordinance and Standards to be Article VII; Existing Articles VII through XV to be renumbered VIII through XVI.

3. Shall the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for Expanded Elderly Exemption on real estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident of 80 years of age or older a \$20,000 exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets not in excess of the value specified in RSA 72:43-c, III, that is, assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000; provided that the exemption shall be based upon the assessed value of the real estate?

4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the purchase of a Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund with the balance plus interest coming from the Capital Reserve Fund for Police Cruiser, these funds were voted in the tax years 1984 and 1985 and withdrawn from Revenue Sharing. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the purchase of protective clothing for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) for Fire Hose and authorize the withdrawal of the amount for this purchase from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for Road Signs and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) for a new furnace and chimney for the Town House and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Hundred Eighteen Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty-three Dollars (\$118,883.00) to be used for the purchase of a Fire Truck, as approved by the Budget Committee; and the Selectmen to borrow One Hundred Eighteen Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty-three Dollars (\$118,883.00) and to issue notes to be repaid from taxes in the fiscal years 1986 and 1987. And further, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars to pay interest on said notes for the fiscal year 1986.

10. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild Five Hundred Fifty Feet (550) of the Wawbeek Town Road from the Wawbeek Garage area to the Beach. This article placed on the Warrant by Petition.

11. To see if the Town will vote to widen, remove stumps, replace culverts, gravel and tar Cross Neck Road on Tuftonboro Neck and further to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$14,450.00) for this purpose. This article placed on the Warrant by Petition and was not submitted to the Budget Committee for approval.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept certain roadways as Town Roads, beginning at Dow Road and terminating at said Tupeck Property, as shown on a Plan of Land in Tuftonboro, N.H. designated as "Property of Henry and Caroline Tupeck and approved by the Tuftonboro Planning Board on Sept. 22, 1972, and recorded at Plan book 77, Page 60 of Carroll County Registry of Deeds." This article on the Warrant by Petition and has the approval of the Selectmen.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road a certain private way known as Harvest Lane, as shown on a plan entitled "Plan of Land in Tuftonboro, N.H. belonging to Richard E. & Norma E. Auger dated May 17, 1978, and which plan was duly approved by the Tuftonboro Planning Board on Dec. 15, 1978, recorded with the Carroll County Registry of Deeds in Book of Plans 43, Plan 34." This article on the Warrant by Petition and has the approval of the Selectmen.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1986 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A-5.

15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 261:157-a; which would waive the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who was captured and incarcerated for 30 days or more while serving in a qualifying war or armed conflict as defined in RSA 72:28, IV and who was honorably discharged, providing the Town Clerk with satisfactory proof of these circumstances.

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 80:52-a; to authorize the collector of taxes to accept payments in prepayment of taxes.

17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt written Welfare Guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 requires the Town to adopt written welfare guidelines prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of the full text of the proposed guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to erect a recreational tennis court and backboard for the residents and guests, estimated cost Forty Thousand to Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00 to \$45,000.00). This article on Warrant by Petition and does not have the approval of the Budget Committee.

19. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Tuftonboro and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan. This article on the Warrant by Petition.

20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to assist the Carroll County Family Planning and Pre-Natal Program (Family Planning Center). This article on the Warrant by Petition and was not submitted to the Budget Committee for approval.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Lot 62, Tax Map 69-2-62, Hidden Valley.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefore, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Four Hundred Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty-seven Dollars (\$412,787.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the cost of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The second session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator Roger Wingate at 7:30 P.M. with the Salute to the Flag followed by Prayer offered by Rev. Wilmer Potter. The Moderator announced the results of Balloting for School and Town Office.

Rollins; Road Agent, Reginald C. Colby; Budget Committee for Three Years, Daniel B. Lewis; Trustee of Trust Funds 3 years, Doris Scheck; Library Trustee 3 years, Carol Truebe; Library Trustee 1 year, Marsha B. Hunter; Auditor, Robert N. Spencer, Sr. Officers to be sworn in at a late date: Budget Committee, Charles F. Berry; Library Trustee, Christie V. Sarles; Auditor, John P. Bolton.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.), for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefore, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

Motion was made by Donald Linnell to adopt article 2 as read, seconded by Thad Coleman. Under discussion P. Campbell, L. Hall, C. Rogers all suggested that taxes be on a semi-annual basis. Article 2 was approved by a show of hands and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.) to pay interest charges on the Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.) borrowed in 1984 for the purpose of revaluation; said notes to be paid from taxes in the fiscal year 1985.

Motion was made by Jacquelyn Rollins and seconded by Dan Lewis to adopt Article 3 as read. Vote in the affirmative by show of hands and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to affirm, alter or annul the following ordinance enacted during the past year, by the Selectmen, on October 29, 1984:

"No person shall on Property of the Town of Tuftonboro distribute any

campaign materials, electioneer or engage in any other activity which affects the safety, welfare and rights of the voters of the Town of Tuftonboro; except within that area or areas so designated by the Board of Selectmen."

It is the intention of this ordinance to limit interference with the voter's entering and leaving the Town House.

Motion was made by Dick Lester and seconded by Lib Coleman to adopt article 4 as read. Bill Keyes moved to amend article 4 with a penalty clause added, "A fine not to exceed \$100.00 for a violation of this ordinance which will inure to the general fund of the Town of Tuftonboro." Amendment was accepted in the affirmative with a show of hands. The article as amended was voted in the affirmative with a show of hands and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the Police Department Cruiser Fund. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Gordon Thayer and seconded by Betty Campbell to adopt article 5 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.) from The Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for Protective Clothing for the Fire Department. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Clint Morgan and seconded by William Rollins to adopt article 6 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800.) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the use of the Fire Department in the following manner: a Boat Trailer, and one half of the cost of a recorder and base station at the Wolfeboro Fire Department Dispatch Center. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Earl Hobart and seconded by Jay Scheck to adopt article 7 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to accept in the name of the Town gifts or donations which may inure to the Town during the years; said sums to be placed in Special Accounts to defray normal Town expenses as may be outlined by the donor and acceptable to the Board of Selectmen. In the event of an unspecified gift, monies will be applied to highway maintenance and reconstruction.

Motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by William Rollins to adopt article 8 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1984 and 1985 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

Motion was made by Jay Scheck and seconded by Ralph Kirshner to adopt article 9 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 10-A. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate for, and enter into an option to purchase, real estate to be used for a Town Beach; Any option shall be conditioned on a vote of the Town at an Annual or Special Town Meeting. This article is on the Warrant by petition.

Motion was made by Richard Detwiler and seconded by Nancy Moulton to adopt article 10-A as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 10—b. If Part A of this article passes, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.) as option money.

Motion was made by Richard Detwiler and seconded by Tom Franco to adopt article 10-B as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Three Hundred Ninety-eight Thousand Three Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$398,330.) as recommended by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the cost of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

Before reading this article the Moderator explained corrections to be made to Budget items—one error and two omissions. None of the corrections affected the bottom line figure. Motion was made to adopt article 11 as read with the addition as voted in Article 10-B; thus moving to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Ninety-nine Thousand Three Hundred Thirty Dollars. The motion was made by Williams Rollins and seconded by Wilmer Marlatt. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Under this article to adjourn; Dick Lester wanted to commend the new Moderator for a well run meeting. Mention was made under this article for a night of recognitions for three long term Town Officers: Richard Lester, Moderator 20 years; Ethelwyn Steadman, Tax Collector 20 years; Walter Smith, Road Agent 35 years.

Motion was made by Ken Graigue to adjourn meeting seconded and voted by voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 8:15 P.M. with approximately 110 residents in attendance.

Report of the Highway Department 1985

In 1985 many road improvements were completed. The entrance to Federal Corner Road was rebuilt and new drainage was added. Union Wharf and Federal Corner Roads were resurfaced with hot top. Crushed gravel was spread on Dame Road, Eaglemere Road, and Northline Road. Camp William Lawrence Road was widened in several places and crushed gravel was also added. Approximately 200 feet of culvert pipe were replaced on town roads, several dead trees were disposed of, and rocks were removed from the surface in several places on Ledge Hill Road. The Dan Hole Pond Road section of Tufonboro was patched, resurfaced, and the ditches cleared.

Approximately 980 yards of sand have been spread on icy and snow covered roads. The highway department has added another power sander to expedite the sanding procedure. Plowing crews continue to maintain town roads for the convenience of safe travel.

My personal thanks to all who again have worked the long hours to keep Tufonboro's roads open for transportation.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

The Tuftonboro Fire Department responded to a total of 139 calls for assistance during the calendar year 1985. These calls represent the Department's responses in providing fire protection and emergency medical services to the residents and guests of the Town of Tuftonboro.

In 1985 the Department responded to 110 emergency calls.

The volunteer organization operates seven pieces of emergency apparatus from stations in Melvin Village and Mirror Lake. During the spring, summer, and fall seasons, the Department's Fire Boat is moored at Pier 19 in 19-Mile Bay.

Approximately 20 active members comprise the duty roster of the Department. Emergency calls are dispatched via radio from the Wolfeboro Fire Department.

Regular Departmental meetings are the first and third Thursdays of each month at 7:00 P.M. The First Responder Team meets the fourth Thursday evening of each month.

During 1985 major equipment purchases included the receipt of a boat trailer for use with the Department's Fire Boat. Also purchased were newer firefighters' turn-out coats for members of the Department.

Unexpected major repairs to the Department's large tanker/pumper unit has kept the Officers busy with coordination of the project to replace the 1,500 gallon tank on the vehicle.

Officers and members of the Department have attended area fire and emergency medical training courses during the year.

Continued work is in progress towards the replacement of the 26-year-old Engine 3 which is housed at the Mirror Lake Station.

I would like to thank the following agencies for their assistance during 1985: the Wolfeboro Fire Department, the Tuftonboro Police Department, and other area emergency services for their cooperation.

Activity Report of First Responder Team

During the calendar year of 1985, the Department's First Responder Team handled 73 calls for assistance with the Town of Tufonboro.

A comparison of calls since the Team's inception in July of 1982 is as follows:

Presently 9 members of the Department are trained as either Emergency Medical Technicians or First Responders and are equipped with emergency medical supplies to respond directly to the scene of an incident to provide stabilizing care until the arrival of area ambulance/rescue units.

During the past twelve months, members have been active in taking emergency care training offered throughout the area, as well as completing a First Responder Refresher training program held during this past spring.

Additional oxygen equipment has been added to the inventory of medical equipment as well as blankets and additional medical supplies.

Continued cooperation between the First Responders and the Lakeside Ambulance Service of Wolfboro, the Wolfboro Rescue Squad, Wolfboro Fire Department, and staff of Huggins Hospital in Wolfboro, as well as other area agencies has contributed to the proper emergency care of 76 people treated by the Team in the past year.

I would like to thank the above services, as well as the Officers of the Tufonboro Fire Department for their cooperation and assistance throughout 1985.

Planning Board Report

In 1985 the Planning Board met 24 times and approved 7 conventional subdivisions for a total of 20 lots, re-approved a 44 lot subdivision, approved one 12 unit condominium development and one 2 unit condominium conversion and approved 14 boundary line adjustment plans.

In addition, the Planning Board adopted Chapters 6 and 7 of the Master Plan and had the Master Plan printed. Copies are available for purchase at the Town House.

The Board held two public hearings on revisions to the zoning ordinance regarding manufactured housing and mobile homes. The revisions were voted in at a Special Town Meeting. The Selectmen presented the Board with their request for revisions to the zoning ordinance regarding condominiums and cluster development. The Board will hold a public hearing in January 1986 to consider these prior to March 1986 Town Meeting. The Board has written a first draft of a new application form and procedure. We expect to complete this early in 1986 and then continue working on revisions to the zoning ordinance.

1985 has been a year of transition for the Planning Board. Members James Duncan and Charles Allard resigned from the Board and member Susan Weeks' term expired. The Selectmen appointed new members Catherine Smith, Lyle Cheney and Fenton Varney and appointed Susan Weeks as an alternate. It takes a great deal of time and effort for new members to learn all the rules in existence and for all members to keep up with changes in the State laws and court decisions, as well as acting on applications brought before the Board.

Report of The Board of Adjustment

The Board held eleven hearings during 1985. Nine of these cases concerned requests to build with insufficient sideline setbacks, seven were approved. One case involved an application for a special exception to build in an area considered a wetland and this was approved by the Board. The eleventh case was a continuation of the Pak 2000 case. This request for a special exception to expand their facilities was granted by the Board, but several residents did not agree with the Board's decision and the case was appealed to Superior Court. A decision has not been made in this case so Pak 2000's expansion and purchase of adjacent town land is on hold.

The Pak 2000 case represents a point that needs to be emphasized. If a request for a variance is made the Board has considerable latitude in arriving at a decision, but if the case calls for a special exception the Board can only decide if the case satisfies the conditions which have been set forth in the zoning ordinances.

Report of the Trustees of Trust Funds

Four Trust Funds are administered by the Trustees. For specific amounts of income and expenditures, we refer you to the annual financial report.

Annual earnings of the Shepherd Scholarship Fund are awarded to students in the Town who plan to further their education beyond high school. This year, six students benefited and payments were sent to the Financial Aid Office of the institutions of their choice, to be credited to either tuition or other direct college expenses. Payments are made semi-annually and the entire interest earned on the Shepherd Certificates of Deposit is paid. These scholarships are available only to students in the first and second year of their post-high school education.

Cemetery Trust Funds interest income is used for general maintenance, grass cutting and trimming through the growing season.

The Tomb Fund for the benefit of the Tufonboro Library is a matching fund, with equal amounts of money appropriated by the Town, for the purchase of additional books, periodicals, etc. Payments to the Library Trustees are made quarterly.

Late in 1984, the Charles W. Davis Fund, formerly administered by an attorney, was taken over for administration by the Trustees. This fund was established several years ago on behalf of citizens over seventy in Tufonboro. There were seven worthy recipients in December 1985.

Report of Tufonboro Free Library — 1985

The Tufonboro Free Library, under the able direction of Library Administrator Ruth Bauer, circulated 5,890 books and periodicals in 1985, and added 622 new books for adults and children, and 1 magazine subscription to the collection. The Library has also recently started an Audio Cassette collection, with an initial purchase of 30 cassettes for our patrons' enjoyment. The total Library collection now numbers 8,468 books, 30 audio cassettes, 10 magazine, and 3 newspaper subscriptions.

The active volunteer program developed by the Library Administrator is a vital asset to the Library. Frederick Bauer, Maura Donovan, Lois Drowne, Stacey Hunter, Marjorie Preston, Florence Sawyer, Robert and Rebecca Spencer, and Heidi Williams contribute about 57 volunteer hours per month. Their efforts have been recognized as outstanding by Governor John Sununu, and the Trustees take this opportunity to thank each one of them, again.

The Trustees are also grateful to Diane Harrington and Ann Hunt, who volunteered their time to run the Library's weekly summer reading program during July and August. Over 100 children participated. In addition, Laurie Smith again entertained primary grades at the Library last spring, with stories and puppets.

A reading and discussion group for adults was organized this fall, and now meets regularly at the Library, under the sponsorship of the Friends of the Library. The Friends' annual Book & Bake sale, which has supported purchase of current encyclopedias, was again a success.

A major gift from the Suzanne B. and George E. Slye Trust Fund enabled the purchase of a copier for the use of the library staff and patrons. Two mobile book stacks for children's picture books were purchased with the generous annual contribution from the Hurlburt Charitable Trust Fund. These alleviate the crowded shelves in the children's section, and provide a welcoming place for smaller patrons to browse.

The 1985 book budget was substantially augmented by the annual gift of the Hikers, a bequest from the estate of Dorothy Buhler, and many individual contributions from both long-time and new library patrons.

At the Trustees' request, the Library's growing space needs and constraints were formally evaluated by a NH State Library consultant, who provided written recommendations for temporary space-saving measures.

The Trustees also completed a revision of the Tufonboro Free Library Policy, in order to reflect both the newly-mandated standards of New Hampshire's Statewide Library Development System, and the changing needs and interests of our community.
