NOTICE

Please Read

To Dog Owners:

- All dogs over three months of age must be registered by May 1st.
- Legal rates: Males \$6.00, Females \$6.50, Neutered Males \$3.50, and Spayed Females \$3.50.
- Rabies Certificates required for registration.
- Failure to register makes owners liable for \$1.00 penalty **per month** after June 1st. It's the **LAW!**
- Owners are liable for free running dogs. If in doubt, check the state statutes RSA:466. The Penalties are severe.

To PROPERTY OWNERS:

- The law provides that those who do not return their inventory forms by April 15 not only lose their right to appeal their taxes **but are now subject to a fine of not less than \$10.00 but up to and not over \$50.00.**

To those REGISTERING VEHICLES:

- Resident Taxes must be paid in order to register a vehicle.
- In order for a husband to register a vehicle, he must pay both his and his wife's Resident Tax. **IT'S THE LAW!!**

To those BUILDING NEW OR MAKING CHANGES:

- The Town Building Code requires permits to construct or remodel any building. There are exceptions. Check first with the Selectmen.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1982

Like many small towns Cornish is growing. In 1982 building permits were issued for nine new dwellings and two mobile homes. Numerous garages, outbuildings, additions to existing structures and a few barns were erected. While there was no sudden rash of new constructions, the growth has been orderly and consistent with the patterns of past years.

Highway Department

The early part of 1982, with all too frequent heavy snow storms, put a real strain on personnel, equipment, and the budget. To partially compensate for the budgetary drain Highway Agent, Harold Morse, cut the regular work week from forty hours to thirty two.

The big project of the year was the construction of a new bridge just east of Gap Road as it joins Center Road. The diameter of the water course as it runs through the ninety-foot bridge can only be appreciated by walking through it at low water. This project was carried out entirely by the local highway department. Had it been done by the state as is often the case in other towns, the cost would have been many times greater.

The major purchases made this year included a new articulated Gallion Grader, and a heavy-duty sander. The wisdom of these investments will become more evident as they are used on town roads. The speed with which highways can be ditched and graded in the summer, plowed in the winter, and sanded, have contributed to the overall efficiency of the department.

The major problems which have surfaced during the year are the same as face many other highway departments. The cost of equipment maintenance, repairs, and fuel are staggering.

The Chevrolet pickup now in service was purchased in 1977. The cost of repairs is now very high and there is a lot of "down time". The vehicle should be replaced.

T.R.A., Gas Subsidy, and Duncan monies have been spent on Center Road. The road surfaces on the three bridges installed in 1981 and their approaches were black-topped this year.

Overview

Customarily the Selectmen meet as often as necessary with department heads, including the Chief of the Fire Department, Police Chief, and Highway Agent. Frequent conferences occur with chairmen of the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Conservation Commission, Solid Waste Study, Recycling, Road Naming Committee, and others. The Computer Study Committee met with the Selectmen in December.

Each Friday evening with a few exceptions, and Monday forenoons the Selectmen have made themselves available to meet the public and more often when necessary. Frequently evening meetings were required.

The Town officials and police were involved with authorizing and policing the Claremont Triathlon Relay Race last August. The problems involved not just Cornish but Plainfield as well. After several meetings with proponents of the race and officials of Plainfield, differences were resolved to the extent that policing of the event was provided at no cost to the community.

More lately court related orders involving expenditures end up on the desk of the Selectmen for payment. These vary from juvenile delinquency problems to adult alcoholic rehabilitation situations. State and Federal funds have been reduced to where a greater and greater burden is falling on the local taxpayer.

As land becomes more valuable property owners have become more concerned about their real estate assessments. The Selectmen give freely of their time to inform those who make inquiries. Hardly a day goes by without at least one inquiry.

The Selectmen have made a point to keep abreast of new developments affecting the government of Cornish by attending informational and training meetings. One which contributed to the knowledge of not just the Selectmen was a series held at Lebanon, jointly sponsored by the N.H. Municipal Association and the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council. In attendance with the Selectmen were members of the Conservation Commission, Zoning Board of Adjustment, and Planning Board.

This report is of necessity quite brief. However it should be said here that the Selectmen sincerely appreciate the interest and cooperation they have received, especially that of Stephen P. Tracy. We also want to give special thanks to Paul Tewsbury for making it possible to have the new Edminster Cemetery picket fence painted. The time and talents of committees, boards, and individuals have helped immeasurably in making Cornish a good place to live.

WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Cornish, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Cornish on Tuesday, the 8th of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Articles 1, 2 and 3 of the Warrant will be acted upon at 10:00 a.m. Voting will be by official ballot and checklist, and the polls will be open for this purpose and will remain open from 10:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at which time the polls will close.

At 1:00 p.m. the business portion of the meeting shall act upon Article 4 through 22.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. A. Are you in favor of the Amendment #1 as prepared by the Planning Board for the Town of Cornish Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amendment #1 provides for establishment of a Flood plain District (Zone F) in order to comply with federal law and qualify for the National Flood Insurance Program.

B. Are you in favor of the Amendment #2 as prepared by the Planning Board for the Town of Cornish Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amendment #2 deletes "home occupations" as a permitted use in the Rural and Residential District (RR) and Residential District (R) and instead makes "home occupations" an allowed use in both RR and R districts only by approval of the Board of Adjustment as a special exception.

ARTICLE 3: **By petition.** To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Cornish and to the health and welfare of the people of Cornish. These actions shall include: 1 -Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990; 2-Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the NH Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

ARTICLE 5: By petition. Shall the Town of Cornish withdraw from the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District as provided by Article VI-2A of the Agreement?

ARTICLE 6: By Request: Shall the Selectmen appoint a committee consisting of one member from each of the following bodies: Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Finance Committee and Resource Recovery Committee, to study a preliminary solid waste reduction proposal made by the Resource Recovery Committee and to report on this study to the Selectmen by July 1, 1983; and shall \$300.00 be appropriated for this purpose, with unused funds returned to the General Fund?

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$31,000. for the purchase of the 76 acre Anne Davidson property abutting Town House Road and Parsonage Road, such sum to be raised by the issuance of bonds or notes, the face amount not to exceed \$31,000., under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NHRSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Cornish, for a term not to exceed 10 years, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies together with any donations received by them for the purpose of such purchase, which the Selectmen are hereby authorized to accept, and together with any federal and/or state grants and Conservation Commission Capital Reserve Fund available to or received by the Conservation Commission for such purpose.

ARTICLE 8: By petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to defray the costs of providing health insurance for the employees of the Cornish Highway Department.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$16,000. for the purchase of a new 4-wheel drive 1 Ton Truck cab and chassis with dump body and equipped with a 9-foot all power snow plow to replace the present Chevrolet Pickup truck, the Chevrolet pickup and plow to be a trade-in towards the purchase; and to authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000. from the Revenue Sharing Fund under provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000. from the New Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, and the difference between the balance of the purchase price and the trade-in allowance on the Chevrolet pickup and plow to be raised by the issuance of bonds or notes, under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Cornish, for a term not to exceed the useful life of the equipment.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000. and authorize its withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund under provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by the Second Session of the 94th Congress to make the sixth payment on the note due on the International Truck.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000. and to authorize its withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund under provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by the Second Session of the 94th Congress, to make the 1983 Cornish Landfill Service payment to the City of Claremont.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar year in which the remuneration paid for service is less than \$100.00. (This means that any town election official who earned less than \$100.00 during the town's fiscal year would not have Social Security withheld from his/her earnings.)

ARTICLE 13: **By request.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and restoration of the Dingleton Hill Covered Bridge and Blacksmith Shop Bridge.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,288.75 to assure ambulance service for the people of Cornish.

ARTICLE 15: **By request.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Community Youth Advocates, Inc. in order to assure continued services and counseling for the young people of this community.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,074.00 towards the support of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept and expend on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds for general town purposes, including but not limited to disaster relief or CETA, in excess of the money appropriated by the Town which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all gifts or other funds received from miscellaneous sources, as the Selectmen shall determine to be advisable.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer property acquired by Tax deed.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 21: To hear the reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

MINUTES OF CORNISH TOWN MEETING MARCH 9, 1982

(820 registered voters on Check List; 356 Republicans, 238 Democrats)
(683 ballots printed, 365 unused, 318 regular used, plus 10 absentee)

The Selectmen certified the back of the Warrant. The Supervisors of the Check List signed both "In" and "Out" Check Lists and swore to the Town Clerk that all names therein were in order. Ballots were counted by the Ballot Clerks: Adel Bayliss, Clara Weld, Pauline Monette, and Alternate Marion Stone. Polling booths were readied for use.

At 10:00 a.m. Peter H. Burling, Moderator, opened the polls and proceeded to read the entire Warrant of 26 articles. Residents started voting on Articles 1 and 2.

Park Grange served a boiled dinner at noon and hash and hot dishes with pie at evening.

Merilynn B. Bourne was deputised as Assistant Moderator for the day.

At 1:00 p.m. the Moderator brought the business meeting to order with the Salute to the Flag of the United States and a moment of silent prayer. Mr. Burling then gave honor to Nic Leyds, and Hugh Wade read a Resolution for our 1982 Town Meeting: The Town of Cornish wishes to record by this vote of thanks its gratitude to the late Nicolaas A. Leyds for his numerous services to the Town, to which he freely devoted so much of his time, energy, forthrightness, and business acumen for the benefit of his fellow townsmen.

The Town wishes that a copy of this resolution be sent to Mr. Leyd's widow, Mrs. Maria Leyds, and that it be printed in the Town Report for 1982. H.M.W.

Jan. 25, 1982

Hugh Wade moved the above resolution be accepted by the Town, supported by Michael M. Yatsevitch. It was voted on unanimously in the affirmative.

The Cornish Meetinghouse is in need of more monies to match an amount by Federal Grant that Cornish may receive. Donald Saunders spoke about this and pointed out the display on the west side of the Town Hall with diagrams and pictures to tell the story of the project to be undertaken to further get the renovations completed.

Peter Burling then introduced the Selectmen, the Finance Committee, the Assistant Moderator, the Town Clerk, and the Ballot Clerks. He told of some of the parliamentary procedures. He announced that those winning another year or years in the election, members of special committees or boards, should be sworn in within six days of today's election or upon being so notified.

In going through the articles of the warrant, the Moderator will pass over 3(r) to act on Article 7 first; the same on 3(u), 3(z3 and z4).

ARTICLE 3 (a): Helen Lovell moved, Bunny Barker seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$12,500.00 for Town Officers' salaries. This was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3 (b): Jill Edson moved, George supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$9,000.00 to pay Town Officers' expenses. This was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(c): Myron Quimby moved, Stan Colby supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for Election and Registration. Ruth Rollins spoke on people getting their names on the Check List, and on re-registering every ten years to update Check Lists. Motion voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(d): Stephen Tracy moved, Charles Aiken supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$15,000.00 for expenses of Town Hall and other buildings. Questions were asked re so great an amount -- the Cummings Cemetery toolhouse must have new floor and roof - a \$2,000.00 bid -motion voted on, in favor.

ARTICLE 3(e): Fred Sullivan moved, Michael Yatsevitch supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for expenses of reappraisal of property and updating tax maps. This was a vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(f): \$1,526.00 for Town Officials' Insurance was raised and appropriated upon motion of Helen Lovell seconded by Isabelle Barker. (We have a NH Municipal Association policy).

ARTICLE 3(g): Cheston Newbold moved, Myron Kuhre supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$11,256.00 for the Police Department. Susan Chandler moved an amendment, seconded by Dan Poor, to reduce the amount of \$11,256.00 by \$2,056.00 -- the amount for the radar equipment. Donald Wenz recommended eliminating the speed trap mechanism. Jim Lukash reported on Cornish accidents over past year, and told of his experiment when borrowing the speed mechanism, in the village of Cornish Flat, and also on Town House Road near the school. He said constables could pick speeders up, but without the proof of their speed, they could do nothing about it. Someone remarked all present were herewith warned, so there'd be no more drivers exceeding the speed limits, and thus no need for radar! Bob Howard spoke against the speed trap. Clara Weld spoke up in favor of our police work in town and wished to thank our constables publicly for their help on her break-ins. A number of other remarks were made; then a vote was asked for on Sue Chandler's amendment -- reduce to \$9,200., and it was a vote in the affirmative.

Matt Tinker moved an amendment to the amendment -- to raise the amount from \$9,200.00 to \$9,700.00 (\$500.00) for enough to go toward equipment such as warm jackets to go with their uniforms, seconded by Peter Storrs. This was voted on in the affirmative, after being approved by the Finance Committee.

The main motion as amended to \$9,700.00 for expenses of the Police Dept. was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(h): Charles Aiken moved, Scott Kearns supported, motion to raise and appropriate \$11,745.00 for the Fire Department. Nate Cass thanked the Fire Dept. Auxiliary for the amount given the Fire Dept. The motion was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(i): Stan Colby moved, Cheston Newbold seconded, \$300.00 to be raised and appropriated for the Planning Board. This was voted on, in favor.

ARTICLE 3(j): Mike Yatsevitch, seconded by Jill Edson moved to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the Z.B.A. Without comment this was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(k): \$100.00 for Animal Control which formerly has been called "Dog Damage", was voted, by motion of Charles Aiken, seconded by Matt Tinker. The Town Clerk and Constables were thanked for their efforts in collecting every dog license in town - as far as they knew. Fred Sullivan said when he was Selectman we made an all-out effort and were successful in collecting all of them.

ARTICLE 3(l): Upon motion of Shirley Sullivan, seconded by Joyce Aldrich, the Town voted to raise and appropriate \$6,000.00 for Workman's Compensation Insurance.

ARTICLE 3(m): Ruth Rollins moved, Bob LaClair seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$100.00 for Civil Defense. This was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(n): Bunny Barker moved, Nancy Newbold seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the Conservation Commission. This was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(o): William Monette moved, David White supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$550.00 for Unemployment Compensation Insurance. This was so voted.

ARTICLE 3(p): John Rand moved, Polly Rand seconded, that Cornish raise and appropriate \$100.00 for use of the Health Dept. This was so voted.

ARTICLE 3(q): \$100.00 was voted for Vital Statistics upon motion of Shirley Sullivan seconded by Vera Kuhre.

ARTICLE 3(r): (taken up later)

ARTICLE 3(s): Ricky Poor moved, Helen Lovell seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 for Visiting Nurse. Pat Harford was present and spoke of the nursing they do and how to contact them if there is need of their services. The motion was voted in favor.

ARTICLE 3(t): Fred Sullivan moved, William Monette seconded that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,300.44, to go with the State share of \$8,669.57 for Town Road Aid (T.R.A.). This was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(u): (taken up later)

ARTICLE 3(v): Charles Aiken moved, Andrew Leonard seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Street Lights. Fred Sullivan said there were but 12 street lights in the village. He had been to see the Granite State Electric Co. -- \$76.68 for old lights; \$70.20 for the light in front of fire station and highway garage, which he proposed we keep, and have the rest removed. The Electric Company said they could not remove the rest. Fred asked what they'd do if Cornish voted not to pay them. They answered -- they'd take out our lights! Fred amended the motion to an amount of \$350.00, seconded by Charles Aiken and this was voted on in favor. Then original motion as amended, was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(w): Bill Monette moved, Sue DeFoe seconded, that we raise and appropriate \$3,862.21 for the Cornish Library. This was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(x): Cheston Newbold moved, Matt Tinker seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 for the Welfare Dept. This was voted on, in favor.

ARTICLE 3(y): \$200.00 for Memorial Day expenses was voted by the Town, on motion of Bill Monette, seconded by Myron Kuhre.

ARTICLE 3(z): Hollis Boardman moved, Sharon Atwood seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 for the Cemetery Dept. This motion was voted in the affirmative. Bob LaClair said he had checked on the old gravestones that Hollis had repaired -- an excellent job!

ARTICLE 3(z1): \$3,000.00 for Damages and Legal Expense was voted on, in favor, by the Town upon motion of Mike Yatsevitch seconded by Stan Colby.

ARTICLE 3(z2): Bill Monette moved, Myron Kuhre supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$9,000.00 for Employees' Retirement and Social Security. This was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3 (z3): and 3(z4): (taken up later)

ARTICLE 3(z5): Shirley Sullivan moved, Charles Aiken seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$18,000.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans. Carol Fitch reported on the percentages - going down. We are doing better. Following a couple of questions that were answered by Michael Yatsevitch, the motion was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3 (z6): Harold Morse moved, Robert Bladen seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund for new highway equipment. This was so voted.

ARTICLE 3 (z7): Peter Decatur moved, Sharon Atwood seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for equipment for Fire Department. This was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(z8): Nancy Newbold moved, Ricky Poor seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for the Conservation Commission. There were a number of comments - some thought this Fund was big enough for time being, etc. It was voted on, too close to tell. A standing vote -- Yes 78 No 79. It was a vote in the negative.

ARTICLE 3(z9) Mike Yatsevitch moved, Stan Colby seconded, that the necessary amount for County Taxes be raised and appropriated. This was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4: Sally Wellborn moved, Ellen Ballard seconded, that the Town request members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress calling for a joint United States-Soviet Union nuclear arms freeze. Sally spoke in favor of this; a few others commented; then it was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5: Barbara LeMere moved, Jill Edson seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 to assure ambulance service for the people of Cornish. Susan Chandler moved an amendment to lower amount by \$700.00 -- thus \$3,800.00. This was supported by Sharon Feeney. Representative from Golden Cross spoke, reporting on the rates. Lew Gage spoke for Windsor Ambulance Service. A long discussion followed. One suggestion was to raise enough money and leave it up to the Selectmen which service, or both. The amendment was finally voted on: Yes - 89; No - 90. It was a vote in the negative. The original motion was then voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6: Ruth Rollins moved, Dan Poor seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 and authorize its withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund under provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by the Second Session of the 94th Congress to make the fifth payment on the note due on the International Truck. This, with very little discussion, was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3 (z3): Mike Yatsevitch and Myron Quimby moved to pass over this article. This was so voted.

ARTICLE 7: Fred Sullivan moved, Stan Colby supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 and to authorize its withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund, under provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by the Second Session of the 94th Congress, to make the 1982 Cornish Landfill Service payment to the City of Claremont. This was voted on, with little comment, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(r): It was moved and duly seconded to pass over this article as Article 7 provided for it. This was so voted.

ARTICLE 8: Upon motion of Bob Bayliss seconded by Vera Kuhre, the Town voted to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to assure service by the Cornish Rescue Squad, Inc.

ARTICLE 9: Michael Yatsevitch moved, Charles Aiken seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$100,000.00 for the purchase of a new grader and attachments, to replace the present LeTourneau grader, such sum to be raised by notes or bonds in the full amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33.1 et seq.) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds for such terms not to exceed the useful life of the vehicle, and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take any other action as may be in the best interest of the Town.

General discussion followed. It was brought out that this motion should include the trade-in of old grader. A number of questions were asked, and comments made. Harold Morse stood and presented figures on horsepower, amount of wheel drive, etc. Bob Bayliss, Bob LaClair, Milt Jewell, and others made several comments. Paul Queneau also commented -- definitely in favor of buying new at this time.

Dan Poor moved an amendment, supported by Polly Rand, that the Town raise and appropriate up to \$100,000.00 if they sell or trade in the LeTourneau Grader toward the purchase price on the new grader, and including the submission of any and all purchasing contracts to the Finance Committee for review before completion of the final deal. This amendment was voted on in the affirmative.

Following much more discussion pro and con, Milt Jewell moved another amendment, seconded by Matt Tinker, that the Town raise and appropriate \$65,000.00 toward the purchase of a new grader and attachments, such sum to be

raised by notes and bonds to be paid off in a period not to exceed six (6) years, and to determine the rate of interest thereon, to replace the present LeTourneau grader, and to withdraw \$25,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund, and to authorize the Selectmen to trade in or sell the present LeTourneau grader, toward the purchase price on a new one, and to take any other action as may be in the interest of the Town. This amendment was voted on in the affirmative.

The main motion, as amended, was voted on by paper ballot: Yes 159; No 31. It was a vote in the affirmative by more than a 2/3 vote -- about a five to one.

ARTICLE 3(u): Bob Bayliss moved, Milt Jewell seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$105,000.00 for maintenance of Class V highways and bridges, this sum to be reduced by gas subsidy from the State. This motion was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3(z4): Mike Yatsevitch moved, Myron Quimby supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$5,125.00 for interest on Long-term Notes - for five-year payout on grader note @10%. After a couple of comments the motion was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10: Ed Lawrence moved, Dale Rook supported, that the Town raise and appropriate \$8,200.00 to purchase a new hopper sander for the Town Highway Dept. Harold Morse explained he could get one, with chain feed, for \$5,000.00. Matt Tinker moved an amendment to change amount to \$5,000.00, supported by Ellen Ballard. Amendment was voted on, in the affirmative. Then the main motion, with \$5,000.00, was voted on, in favor.

ARTICLE 11: Cheston Newbold moved, Polly Rand seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$2,400.00 to purchase a new tractor mower with a blade for the Cemetery Dept. and to trade in the existing tractor mower towards the purchase, using \$1,000.00 to be withdrawn from the Upkeep of Cemeteries Reserve Fund, the balance to be raised by taxes. This was voted on, in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12: Ed Lawrence moved, John Rand supported, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in a Police Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of law enforcement Vehicles. Quite a bit of discussion, pro and con. Finally it was voted on: Yes - 79 No - 49. It was declared a vote in the affirmative by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 13: Fred Sullivan moved, Ellen Ballard seconded, that the Town of Cornish accept the provisions of Sections 1 to 10 inclusive of Chapter 53-B of the Revised Statutes annotated, providing for the establishment of a Regional Refuse Disposal District, together with the Towns of Acworth, Charlestown, Croydon, Goshen, Grantham, Langdon, Lempster, Newport, Plainfield, Springfield, Sunapee, Unity and Washington, and the City of Claremont, and the construction, maintenance and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen, and shall the Town enter into said agreement as an interlocal agreement pursuant to R.S.A.-A for said purposes? A number of questions and comments were given, and responded to, among them, Donna Higgins said against the motion: "They've our children -- they've got our best and now they want our worst!" This motion was finally voted on by paper ballot: Yes - 95 No - 48. It was declared a vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14: Polly Rand moved, Jill Edson seconded, a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$660.00 for Wheels Around Windsor, for Cornish residents. This was so voted.

ARTICLE 15: Dale Rook moved, Bob Ballard supported, that Cornish residents raise and appropriate up to \$1,000.00 to provide labor and equipment to haul fill to the Rescue Squad Building location. This was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16: Support for the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council in amount of \$1,042.50, after being moved and supported by Stan Colby and Charles Aiken, was turned down. It was a vote in the negative.

ARTICLE 17: So also, Cornish share of \$322.00 of the cost of supporting the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Ass'n was voted on in the negative - after motion made by Cheston Newbold, seconded by Matt Tinker.

ARTICLE 18: As there was no sum of money given for the Town to raise and appropriate for purpose of acquiring computer equipment or services for handling the Town's fiscal and other records, Dan Poor moved a committee be set up to study this and bring results to next Annual Meeting. This was seconded by Ellen Ballard and so voted.

ARTICLE 19: Edna Guest moved that the Town require the Selectmen, except in emergency situations, to call a public meeting between the Road Agent and all landowners whose property adjoins any stretch of town road where road work is planned that may affect roadside vegetation, drainage or topography -- this meeting to be held at the Selectmen's Office. Bruce Tracy supported. Edna spoke in favor as the one to request the article. Caroline Storrs also commented. The motion, after a few further remarks, was voted on, by standing vote: Yes - 56 No - 34, and was declared to be a vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 20: Linda Fellows moved, Bruce Tracy seconded, that Cornish raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to be used for the support of Community Youth Advocates. Wells Chandler spoke strongly in favor. Clara Weld and Bob Howard were also in favor. It was brought to a vote and unanimously voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 21: Pete Decatur moved, Shirley Sullivan seconded, to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept and expend on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds for general town purposes, including but not limited to disaster relief or CETA, in excess of the money appropriated by the Town which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire. This was voted on, in favor.

ARTICLE 22: The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all gifts or other funds received from miscellaneous sources, as the Selectmen shall determine to be advisable, on motion of Polly Rand supported by Cheston Newbold.

ARTICLE 23: Ellen Ballard and Sheila Jackson moved to authorize the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer property acquired by tax deed. This was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 24: Shirley Sullivan moved, Fred Sullivan supported, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. This was voted on in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 25: Peter Burling reported a committee should have been appointed to make a survey of all existing Cornish bridges. He will appoint such a committee. It was reported each Town Report was printed at a cost of \$3.14! Ruth Rollins moved to accept all reports as printed in the Town Report, seconded by Dan Poor. This was voted on, in favor.

ARTICLE 26: To transact any other business: electing of Fence Viewers. Polly Rand and Cheston Newbold moved the same be elected: Fred Sullivan, Edwin Lawrence, Caroline Storrs, Katherine Kibbie, and Robert Hilliard. This was voted on, in favor.

Electing of Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber: Clara Weld and Charles Aiken moved the same committee be elected: Jesse Stone, O-ville Fitch, William Monette, Fred Weld, James Neil, and Ehrhardt Frost. This was voted in the affirmative.

Hog Reeves for 1982: The three Selectmen; Doug and Betty Miller; Sherrie and Bob Bulkeley; Lynn Tinker; Sheila Jackson; Mary Boyle, and Bill Cable; Susan and Peter DeFoe. These were elected by vote.

Matt Tinker thanked everyone in town for the support given to him and his family.

Ricky Poor moved to adjourn the meeting, supported by Peter Storrs. 9:25 p.m.

POLICE DEPARTMENT 1982

1982 has been another year of progress for the Cornish Police Department. Officer Philip Osgood has completed his certification from the NH Police Standard Training Council. Now all three of our police officers have completed their certification.

In 1982 the Police Department was forced to change dispatch services as our work load was becoming too great for the Claremont Police Department to handle because of its own growing dispatch requirements. Our police are now being dispatched by Valley Dispatch Service. Valley Dispatch is owned and operated by Golden Cross Ambulance Service. This service provides you with a 24-hour emergency phone where you may call for all police matters -- no longer just life threatening emergencies. We were able to keep our same 543-0535 emergency number that was used at Claremont Police Department. Valley Dispatch also provides your Police Department with a Pager Service so that any emergency is received by the officer on duty regardless where he is at the time of the page.

For the second year the Police Department has aided the Town Clerk in collecting taxes on every reported dog in the township. It's not an easy job!

As in the past years the Police Department appreciates the confidence and support given by the community and the town officials, as we are part-time and can give only our best effort in your behalf.

CORNISH FIRE DEPARTMENT 1982

The Fire Department responded to 83 calls in 1982, of which 24 were chimney fires.

Cornish received mutual aid 5 times and responded to 20 mutual aid calls to surrounding communities.

Numerous pieces of equipment and hose were purchased at a cost of \$5,063.00. The money being raised by firemen from bingo games and other fund raising projects do help keep taxes down and provide a well-equipped and well-trained fire department.

The Ladies Auxiliary bought an all-purpose saw with extra blades for the fire department at a cost of \$807.75.

Thanks to Harold Morse and the highway crew for putting a shallow well in at the Fuller pond on Parsonage Road for a year-round water supply at the fire station.

I would like to take this time to thank Duane Allen for his tremendous contribution to the town over the last 9 years he has served as fire chief. This department has come a long way with Duane as Chief, both in equipment and training to make the Cornish Fire Department a well organized and well trained fire-fighting unit.

The department is currently trying to raise money to replace the fire station on Parsonage Road, which is in need of extensive repair, is extremely hard to heat, and is inadequate in size.

**REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER**

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the NH Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

**1982 REPORT OF THE
CORNISH RESCUE SQUAD**

1982 completes our ninth year of Emergency Medical Services to the towns of Cornish and Plainfield. This has been a better year so far as medical emergencies are concerned.

We had a total of III calls during the year. These included Auto accidents, medical emergencies in the home, mutual aid to Windsor and Claremont for fires and Ambulance coverage. Injuries at the Cornish Fair was down about 10% over last year.

Our expenses for the year was held down to \$5,000. This does not include the new Rescue Station. We anticipate a budget of about \$6,000. for the coming year. The fund raising project for the new station brought in a little better than \$13,000. Every cent is being used and we are about 98% finished. We plan to hold an openhouse this Spring so that everyone can see how their donations were used.

The Cornish Rescue Squad would like to thank each and everyone who donated money, labor, equipment and vocal support to make this building more than just a dream. Thanks Folks.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT 1982

Throughout 1982 the Cornish Conservation Commission has continued to devote itself to the maintenance and improvement of the quality of Cornish Community life through its interest in the preservation of the town's natural resources. Some of the highlights of our past year's activities are as follows:

In the last nine months, the Conservation Commission has participated in a state wide acid precipitation monitoring project organized by the NH Association of Conservation Commissions. Acid rain readings in Cornish have varied during the months of March through November from pH of 3.3 to one of 5.0. The pH of "normal" rainfall measures about 5.5. The average pH of precipitation in Cornish this year has been approximately 4.1--forty times more acid than normal.

At the Cornish Fair the Conservation Commission showed four films, two of which addressed the Acid Rain problem, one which focused on the impact of growth and change in NH and one which described the ecological importance of wetlands. The Commission also displayed a bulletin board featuring important information about Acid Rain, including our town's acid precipitation test results and suggestions for citizen action.

Earlier in the year, the Conservation Commission sponsored another successful "Green Up Day." We are working on methods to improve the project in 1983.

Ricky Bleazard and Denise Toman were selected by the Commission to attend the Youth Conservation Camp sponsored by the Society for the Protection of NH Forests. The Cornish Fair Association paid their camp expenses.

In the fall and early winter months, the Conservation Commission attempted to purchase for the town approximately 70 acres of woodland, fields, and wetland along Town House Road and the southern part of Parsonage Road, using funds from the Cornish Fair Association, its own Capital Reserve Fund and a government grant. The land would be used by the school and town's citizens for ecological studies and recreational activities, and by the Fair Association for parking and display booths. Unfortunately, the Conservation Commission could not obtain grant money this year. The Cornish Conservation Commission feels this is a worthwhile project to pursue and will resubmit its application for matching funds from D.R.E.D. in 1983.

Last year's Town Report mentioned that the Conservation Commission had been discussing the possibility of presenting a "Conservation Award" to a Cornish citizen or organization that is involved in exceptional conservation practices, and whose work might not be recognized elsewhere. Outstanding conservation practices which would be honored might be evident in one or more of the following areas: the improvement or preservation of agricultural lands, open space or wetlands; the intelligent management of forest resources; the practical application of energy conservation technologies, or the promotion of well planned community environmental projects.

This year the Conservation Commission would like to present this award to the Cornish Fair Association. We feel the Fair Association has demonstrated consistent support for environmentally oriented community projects and acted in an ecologically conscientious manner when planning its own projects.

The Cornish Conservation Commission welcomes any interest that the town's citizens might have in its affairs. The public is invited to the meetings held monthly. Questions can be directed to any of its members.

1982 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WINDSOR REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The WRVNA is a non-profit agency offering skilled nursing care to the ill and/or elderly residents of Windsor, West Windsor and Cornish. The staff of three part-time nurses, working under physician referral and guided by a Medical Advisory Committee, coordinate skills with existing health and human services to insure greatest possible benefit to clients without duplicating effort or expense.

In 1982, nursing visits for Windsor numbered 2,025, for West Windsor 250, for Cornish 323, totaling 2,598. Attendance at our 24 free screening and "flu" clinics totaled 859, bringing the total number of patient contacts to 3,457.

For the first time in our history we are facing a deficit (almost \$9,000.00) in our projected 1983 budget. This comes at a time when our Governing Board feels that our towns and our clients could ill afford an increase in either fees or allocations. We have felt compelled to fund-raise, knowing it will dilute gifts to local agencies and facilities, and have set before ourselves the task of critically evaluating our operation.

One consideration before us is the question of whether or not to re-organize - to become certified - to meet government criteria to be eligible for medicare, medicaid and Blue Cross/Blue Shield reimbursement. We have avoided this in the past, first because it significantly increases the cost of home health (in Burlington it costs \$42.00 for a nursing visit - our fee is \$6.00), and second because we worry that government criteria would not yield the best service to our communities.

We take this opportunity to thank our citizens for their votes, donations and memorial gifts, and Mt. Ascutney Hospital and Health Center for providing office space, telephone facilities, consult service and professional support. All residents are invited to attend our monthly Governing Board meetings. For more information, call us at 674-6711.

Our library services now include receiving Large Print Books from Fiske Free Library in Claremont.

We were able to keep expenses down by receiving donations of kindling, loam, grass seed, the use of a tractor, a timer switch for the outside switch, the recaning of a child's chair, a stainless steel plate for the fireplace and a scrap book for historical pictures. It is a good feeling when towns-people are willing to give a helping hand to us. Thank you.

We have attended a number of library conferences and have learned of many new ideas for improving library services.

A Film Program has been started with Sue Perakis as the coordinator. Films are being shown the first Monday of every month from 6:30 - 8:00 P.M. Everyone is welcome - The movies and popcorn are free!!

REPORT OF THE CORNISH MEETINGHOUSE

1982

The Cornish Meetinghouse has continued to be actively used by a number of local organizations this year. In addition there have been various functions and activities held there, including the traditional Memorial Day Ceremony.

The Cornish Meetinghouse Committee has been very busy this year raising funds for Phase II of the Restoration Project. Cornish has been approved for 50% matching grant from the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service of the United States Interior Department for the \$20,000 project. Contributions so far have totaled \$5,465 not including a \$1,500 commitment yet to collect from a charitable trust. The Committee is working hard to raise the balance of \$3,035 needed to make up the \$10,000 required.

Phase II of the Restoration Project will include chimney repairs, roofing, flashing, heating plant modifications, electrical work, and some carpentry and insullation to create a more usable ground floor area. A room will be created to securely house some of the items owned by the Cornish Historical Society. In addition, there will be interior painting and the repair and painting of some exterior trim. The donated architectural service of Steve Tracy has been invaluable in both planning and execution of the work to be carried out.

For some individuals, the smiling Wheels driver may be the only friendly contact during the day.

During the year 1982 the daily average of delivered meals to Cornish varied from five to seven, and many Cornish residents came to the Stoughton House for dinner and Senior Center activities. Among other activities, during this past year, Cornish seniors have participated in Ceramics, Ice Cream Socials, Birthday Parties, Blood Pressure checks, Bus trips and a Flu Clinic.

The Wheels Around Windsor car is a familiar sight on the roads of Cornish, whether transporting Cornish seniors or delivering meals to home-bound individuals. Wheels Around Windsor's pledge for 1983 is to continue and expand services for Cornish's older citizens.

CORNISH RECYCLING COMMITTEE

We estimate about the same amount of recyclable material collected as in previous years. 20 - 30 tons. Rather than filling valuable landfill space, this material is put back into usable products.

Our market prices reflect a depressed economy and for that reason we store our newspaper, sold steel and glass for transportation costs, and sold 589 pounds of aluminum at .10¢/lb.

TO BE PROFITABLE WE NEED VOLUME. Increased volume of aluminum in the Upper Valley has made it financially feasible for Clark Distributors to come from Keene to the Upper Valley Plaza to buy aluminum cans. Beginning in January we will be paid .20¢/lb.

This past spring a shed to hold aluminum, steel, and paper was built for the school as part of an educational program on saving resources and landfill.

Our thanks to those who use the center and to those who maintain it weekly. For newcomers, the Cornish Recycling Center is located 1/2 mile North of Cornish Flat on Rt. 120.

SULLIVAN COUNTY REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT OF ACTIVITIES

The Claremont City Council and the voters of all fourteen towns in Sullivan County adopted the District Agreement at March 1982 town meetings. The powers, duties and liabilities of the District are vested in the District Committee. The District Committee is comprised of representatives, appointed by the City Council and Boards of Selectmen, from each member community. The District Committee held its organizational meeting on May 6, 1982. Alston Barrett, Acworth, was elected Chairman and Abraham Hunter, Lempster, was elected Vice Chairman. The Treasurer of the City of Claremont was appointed Treasurer. Susan Laskoske was appointed Secretary. Additional meetings were held on August 12, October 14 and November 15, 1982.

To date, the District Committee has concentrated its activities on continued development of the NH/VT Solid Waste Project. The NH/VT Solid Waste Planning Committee, comprised of the District Committee and its counterpart, the Board of Supervisors of the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties Solid Waste Management District, met bimonthly during the past year. Efforts have been directed towards sufficient development of the Project so that key information will be available to the member communities by mid January, 1983. Summarized below are the major activities that the District has been working on:

- (1) A search for a private firm willing to design, construct, finance, own and operate an energy recovery facility has been completed. Clark-Kenith, Incorporated, Atlanta, Georgia was selected and will submit a detailed proposal on January 7, 1983. The proposal will include a per ton disposal fee bid, or price per ton, that Clark-Kenith proposes to charge the District for acceptance of the solid waste at an energy recovery facility owned and operated by Clark-Kenith.
- (2) A land disposal site has been selected in Newport, adjacent to the Claremont/Newport town line. Over 40,000 dollars in hydrogeologic and engineering work will be completed on the site by the first week in January, 1983. Drilling of test wells and the hydrogeologic assessment have been completed to date. The site has been shown to have favorable hydrogeologic conditions for land disposal. Positive discussions with State regulatory agencies have been held. Preliminary design and cost estimates for use of the site either as an ash disposal site or regional landfill are being finalized.
- (3) The NH/VT Interstate Solid Waste Compact has been approved by the United States Congress and signed into law by the President. This allows the two Districts to move forward towards cooperatively developing the Project.
- (4) A draft transportation analysis has been completed. Cost estimates for construction and operation of transfer stations, where necessary, and transportation of the waste to Claremont have been developed. These costs will be combined with Clark-Kenith's bid, ash disposal costs, and estimated District administrative costs to provide each community with the projected 1985 total costs for participation in an energy recovery facility.
- (5) A two week weighing survey was conducted at area landfills during June and September, 1982 to confirm solid waste quantities.
- (6) A proposal was solicited and received from Resource Recovery Systems, Incorporated, Branford, Connecticut to operate a glass and can recycling facility in conjunction with an energy recovery facility.
- (7) A draft environmental assessment of the proposed energy recovery facility has been completed and is available to interested parties.

(8) Negotiations with Central Vermont Public Service Corporation (CV) ended with a final offer from CV which the Project considers unacceptable. A petition has been filed with the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission (PUC) requesting the PUC to establish a long-term rate. A hearing has been scheduled for February 11, 1983.

(9) Preliminary discussions have been held with communities outside of the District with respect to joining the District. Three New Hampshire communities have expressed some interest.

In summary, the District Committee should be able to make a decision on continued development of an energy recovery facility or regional landfill during January, 1983. Either facility could be operational by 1985. Total estimated costs, based on site specific engineering data and contractor bids will be available to the participating towns and cities by January 20, 1983.

REPORT OF THE NH/VT SOLID WASTE PROJECT - 1982

The work of the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District is detailed in the following report. Together with its counterpart in southern Windsor County, Vermont, the District is trying to arrive at the most feasible and economical method of disposing of solid waste, at the same time complying with Federal and State Regulations.

Our aim is to present the fullest possible information so that the voters can make an intelligent decision on this vital question.

CORNISH PLANNING BOARD 1982

The Cornish Planning Board had a moderately busy year in 1982. Three major sub-divisions were approved as well as four minor sub-divisions and one annexation.

In December the Board amended the sub-division regulations to comply with changes in state laws.

Amendments have been prepared and hearings held on changes in the Zoning Ordinance concerning Home Occupations and the establishment and acceptance of Flood Plain Regulatory Zones as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. This last is necessary, if the town is to qualify under the Federal Flood Insurance program.

Board member Helma Bretton resigned and she and her husband have moved to Pennsylvania.

COMPUTER FEASIBILITY STUDY COMMITTEE

This committee was formed in compliance with a motion passed at the March, 1982 Town Meeting. The purpose of this committee was to study the feasibility of acquiring computer equipment or services for handling the Towns' fiscal and other records. The committee talked with various local town officials and the head of the State Department of Revenue Administration to assess what part of the town records could be handled with a computer. The current methods of operation of the different departments were reviewed. Data on different types of computer equipment was reviewed by the committee.

It is the opinion of the committee that there are two areas that would immediately benefit from a computer via a reduction in manhours. These areas include the General Ledger and management of the Trust Funds. It is estimated that approximately 500 hours are required a year for entries into the General Ledger. It is the committees' opinion that this time could be cut to 100 hours a year with a computer. The committee believes that the 100 hours a year required to manage the Trust Funds could also be reduced to approximately 25 hours. These reductions are in time, not cost.

No sufficient reduction in time over the present method of operation could be determined in the functions of the Town Clerk or Tax Collector's duties. However, the tax bills currently being processed by a private computer firm could be taken over, if practical and/or economically feasible. The committee also feels that a computer could be beneficial to the bookkeeping function of the Road Agent.

It is the concensus of the committee that one major benefit of a computer would be quick access to budgetary information upon request by an inquirer. The same quick access would also reduce the hours needed by selectmen to manage the towns fiscal and other records. However, the committee believes that for a computer to decrease the manhours mentioned above, a person familiar with such operation should be hired. The reasoning being that if such a person was not retained then the savings in manhours would be negated by an inexperienced operator.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Since a person familiar with computer operation and key-boarding is essential to the efficient operation of a computer and since the information to be placed in the computer must be organized in a particular manner the committee recommends that such a person be hired in advance of purchasing such equipment. This would give the person time to become acquainted with the information that would be stored on the computer and organize the information for computer processing.
2. A computer system that is small but capable of increasing its capacity by adding on compatable equipment, be purchased. Computers that would meet this recommendation are priced in the \$3000 to \$8000 category.
3. The committee does not feel that it can make a recommendation as to the number of hours this job would require.

Gentlemen:

Enclosed please find a petition signed by ten (10) registered voters of the Town of Cornish to put an article on the 1983 Town Warrant to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Community Youth Advocates (CYA).

As you know, the State is presently attempting to reduce the population at the Youth Detention Center in Manchester, and thus, forcing the County and Towns to look for alternative placements and services for youths formerly provided by the State. In addition, the depressed economy has most adversely impacted upon the youth in this area, whether it be in the home, in school or in seeking employment.

CYA provides services and counselling to all youth, but our most significant impact is with the problem youth. We have a close working relationship with the police, the schools, the courts and other social agencies. We attempt to work with the youth and their families in the community.

In many cases, the placement of a youth in a group home is not a solution to the problem, but merely an expensive stop gap method necessary to ease the strain on the family community. Group homes do certainly serve a valuable purpose, but they are expensive and should be used only after efforts in the community or family home failed.

For the year 1982, we have active files on five youths from Cornish who have either had problems at home, or in school or with the law. Out of these five youths, we believe two were likely candidates for placement outside of the home at great cost to the Town of Cornish. We are happy to say that in part due to CYA's intervention, these youths are still in their homes. We are not always successful, but we always try.

The placement of just one youth in a group home for (60) days will cost the Town of Cornish far in excess of the amount of our request. Support of CYA will assure that the needed services and counselling for youth will be available at a local level. CYA is a local program, staffed by local people, dependent upon local funds to meet local needs.

We urge your support, and invite you to our offices at 36 Tremont Square, in Claremont, anytime to answer any of your questions, and to inspect our financial records. Our offices are only open during the day Monday through Friday, but our services are available upon request twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week, at the above telephone number.

March 6, 1982

At the annual meeting of the School District of the Town of Cornish, N.H., held on March 6, 1982, Frances A. Ackerman and Lorraine Lawrence were sworn in as ballot inspectors by Moderator Peter H. Burling. Also sworn in were Supervisors of the Checklist, Ruth G. Rollins and Leland E. Atwood. The Moderator then swore in Merilynn Bourne as Assistant Moderator.

The meeting was opened by the Moderator at 10:00 a.m. After declaring a quorum present, the Moderator then opened the polls and read the Warrant. Assistant Moderator Merilynn Bourne swore in Sheila Jackson as ballot inspector.

ARTICLE 1.

Moderator - Peter H. Burling was elected for the ensuing year with 123 votes.

School Board - Joan N. Baillargeon was elected for a three-year term with 118 votes. Also, Ellen A. Ballard was elected for a three-year term with 107 votes.

Treasurer - Lorraine Lawrence was elected for a one-year term with 122 votes.

School District Clerk - Kathryn Patterson was elected for a one-year term with 124 votes.

Auditors - Mary Thibodeau received 20 write-in votes; Edna Guest received 19 write-in votes; Kay Kibbie received 18 write-in votes; and Donald Powers received 12 write-in votes. Mary Thibodeau and Kay Kibbie were elected as Edna Guest and Donald Powers declined to serve.

ARTICLE 2.

Ruth Rollins moved that we accept the reports of Committees, Agents, Auditors or Officers as printed in the Town Report. Kay Kibbie seconded. The suggestion was made that the number of students be included in the report. The motion passed.

After the Moderator explained the printer's errors, there was discussion of the budget with comments and questions from Fred Sullivan, Charles Aiken, Donna Therrian, George Aldrich, Edna Guest, Shubael Butterfield, Susan Chandler, Ruth Rollins, Scott Kearns, Dan Poor, Richard Waldo, Jill Edson, Bob LaClair, Andrew Leonard, Kay Kibbie, Michael Yatsevitch, Joan Baillargeon, and Ellen Ballard.

It has been another year of progress for the Cornish School system. A highly competent staff continues to work effectively with students and parents to obtain sound academic achievement. Morale remains high - there is a spirit of motivation that encourages everyone to do their very best.

The work of Livia Alexion and Linda Patch helped immeasurably to make our program a quality one. We wish for them the best of health and much success in their new endeavors. By internal reorganization, the reassignment of Caroline Storrs and Linda Fellows, and by securing the services of nurse Joyce Gogan; we have maintained stability and our quality stature.

It's with pride that a 1983-84 budget which increases less than one percent is presented for your consideration. If it were not partially for fate this situation could have been a complete reversal. Our sister community of Unity will consider an increase of 24%—nearly all of which is caused by new and unexpected costs in the special education account....Two years ago I warned voters of SAU 6 that such cost increases were imminent due to changes in New Hampshire laws.

At this time I reprint, with permission of the author, an open letter to our newly elected Governor. This letter merits your time, thought, and perhaps some kind of action.

Dear Governor Sununu:

I am writing as Chairperson of the Unity, NH School Board to call your attention to the inequities created for many towns by the legislative change which requires towns to accept nearly total financial responsibility for the education and care of handicapped youngsters. Larger towns and cities having a fairly broad tax base are able to carry this burden with little difficulty, but small towns unlucky enough to have several handicapped children have discovered that this could very well cripple the entire educational effort for the town.

Unity, having won a positive appropriation vote at the 1982 Annual School District Meeting, was faced with the problem of having two families with handicapped children move into the Town during the summer. Since the school budget had literally no slack in it, the School Board was forced to petition the Superior Court for permission to hold a second school appropriation meeting for the purpose of asking the Town for additional funds to take care of the costs of the new handicapped children. The citizens of Unity, already facing frightening real estate tax bills, refused to appropriate the funds that the law dictates must be provided. Few options were available to the School Board, and the one chosen was to seek a directed judgment from the Superior Court. This matter is still pending.

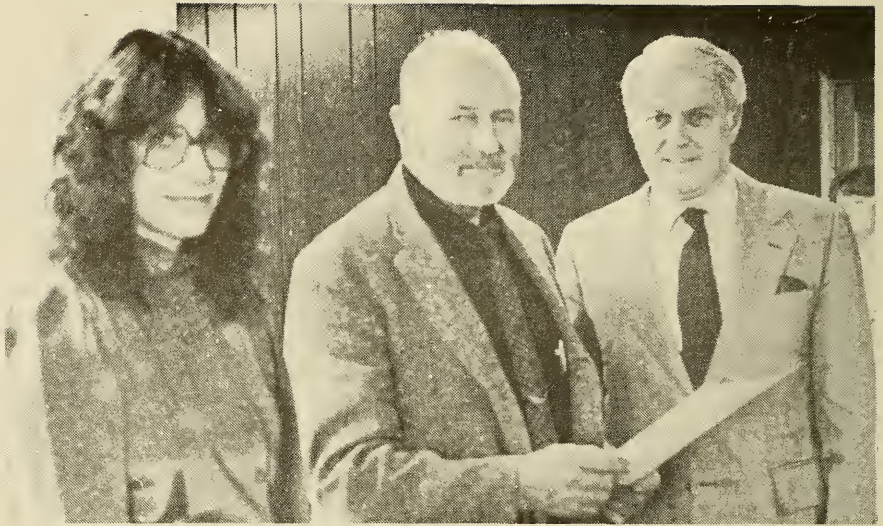
As you must realize, all of this is having a very divisive effect on the Town and in the end all education in Unity will suffer. Money for the education of special children should be provided to the cities and towns by the State as it was done in the past. We know, of course, that the money for this purpose must come from all cities and towns, but distribution by the State is much more equitable system than we now have. As matters stand now, towns having a disproportionately large number of handicapped children discover that a very significant fraction of the entire school budget must be expended for the benefit of a very few. This also has the ugly side effect of creating totally unreasonable animosities directed by some toward the families of special children.

There were probably reasons for the Legislature to change the method of funding for the handicapped but it is very difficult to see the logic in it from Unity's point of view.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

To the Citizens of Cornish:

During the 1981 - 1982 school year I checked all the students for pediculosis and scabies at the beginning of the school year and periodic inspections were done as needed. The incidences of either of these infectious diseases was very low.

All the students were weighed and measured for height and these results were recorded on their permanent health records.

The children were all screened for vision and hearing. One hundred and ninety-three students were given the vision test with four students being asked to seek an eye doctor's evaluation. Of the one hundred and ninety-three tested for hearing two were asked to seek further help.

Of the twenty new students in first grade all had completed their required immunizations and had had their physical exams prior to entering school.

I offered guidance and instruction in the area of personal health and hygiene.

I was able also to provide in the class help on dental health, personal hygiene, growth and development, and drugs and alcohol use.

The students and staff at Cornish School are terrific and I appreciated them. Thank you for letting me serve you.

Cornish Kindergarten, Inc.

CORNISH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CORNISH, NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE CORNISH SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF CORNISH:

The Cornish Kindergarten, Inc. is in its sixth year of offering a pre-first grade education to Cornish children. This year fifteen students are enjoying and benefitting from the kindergarten program which includes language arts, math, science, social studies and art. The class meets five mornings a week in a classroom provided by the Cornish Elementary School. We thank the Cornish School District for providing the space.

The school is taught by Herrika Poor. This year, because of the number of students, the Kindergarten Board decided to hire a full time aide. Nancy Newbold assists Herrika Poor every day. Once every other week, the children benefit from a music hour taught by Susan Miller of Norwich.

The Kindergarten is a cooperative. This means that apart from the monthly fee of \$35.00, parents are expected to assist in the classroom, provide snack for the children, maintain the classroom and its equipment and fund raise. The latter activity is a year round concern. Revenue from our projects - a Cornish Fair booth, float and baked goods table; an apple cider sale - we picked, pressed and bottled; a Christmas toy party and Tupperware party; a Christmas bazaar and raffle (there are still many grapevine wreaths and Christmas ornaments available); and, a sale of paring knives - has supplemented tuition to maintain the program, provide field trips to two plays at Hopkins Center and to support the music program. This year, for the first time, the Kindergarten is providing one full and one partial scholarship.

An Open House in the spring will welcome all children interested in attending the Cornish Kindergarten next September.
