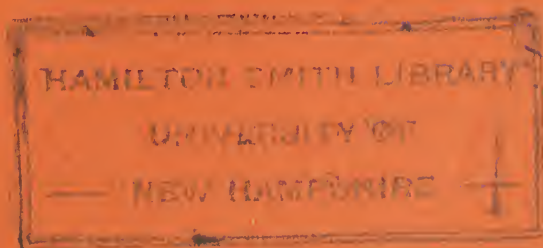

A TRIBUTE TO "THE OLDEST MAN IN TOWN"

Mr. Moderator :

It is my desire at this time to offer a brief, impersonal tribute to that oft forgotten personage in our midst, "The oldest man in town." It is also my desire to offer a personal tribute to that "oldest man" whose name has just been stricken from our official "check list."

On last Saturday, March 6, the friends and neighbors of Samuel Runlett, Jr., gathered at his late home to pay their last respects to this quaint and venerable character of our town. Mr. Runlett, or "Sam" as everyone called him, was born in Durham, October 5, 1850. He spent his boyhood here and for a number of years cruised on the Mathes barges between Durham and Boston. In November, 1871 he was married to Ellen M. Morrison. Four children were born of this union, three of whom, Harold, Eugene and Sarah, survive. The mother died on May 31, last.

While not a politician, Sam always took an active interest in the affairs of the town. The writer scanned the Annual Town Reports for the past 70 years and found the name of "Samuel Runlett, Jr.," posted in numerous capacities. He was Town Clerk from 1880 to 1887 he was a member of the School Committee in 1882; he was Town Auditor in 1885; he was a Selectman from 1886 to 1889; he was Overseer of the Poor in 1888; he was Road Agent in 1889; and again in 1896; he was Clerk of the School District from 1900 to 1903. He ran a general store near where the present Faculty Club stands from 1900 to 1912, and he was Village Postmaster from 1914 to 1922.

Sam was not a particularly loquacious man, but he was well read and posted on the topics of the day. He had a very keen sense of humor, and his fund of anecdotes, his reminiscences, his witticisms and his homely philosophy always proved interesting and convulsive to his listeners. A

former pastor in Durham, in speaking of him, once remarked, "People don't quote Scripture in Durham, but instead quote Sam Runlett."

Sam Runlett was always a friend of the University, of its faculty and of its students. Both of his sons and son-in-law are numbered among its alumni. Less than two weeks ago a man who had been a student here forty years ago said to the writer, "Well, how is old Sam Runlett?"

As the old citizens of our community travel down the road in the twilight of their careers, the rest of us may well pause occasionally with reverence and veneration and pay a tribute to these worthy characters who by their deeds and examples have helped to make our town a better place in which to live. It is fitting that we do this.

Some thirty odd years ago, The Boston *Post*, recognizing the sturdy and sterling qualities of these "elder statesmen" bequeathed to each of the towns in New England a gold-headed cane to be carried by the "oldest man in town" during his lifetime. To Sam Runlett fell the honor of carrying this "post" cane for eight years. It is for this honor to Sam Runlett and to all previous and succeeding men who have already or who may later attain the distinction of being "the oldest man in town" that this tribute is offered.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1937

Two Hundredth and Sixth Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the ninth day of March, A. D. 1937 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.

3. To vote upon the following resolution adopted by the General Court and approved on February 18, 1937: Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,770.00 to obtain State Aid on the following: State Aid Construction. Voted.

5. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. Voted \$4,000.00.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. Voted \$10,927.00.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of the White Pine Blister Rust control. Voted.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$146.83. Voted.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Budget Committee to act as the Town Planning Board and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to pay for any necessary expense in connection therewith. Voted.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to install street lights between Durham and the Newmarket line, the number of lights to be decided by the Light Company and the Selectmen. Tabled.

Petitioned by Clarina Boucher and eleven legal voters.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to install two street lights on the third and fifth of the five new poles set recently on the northern end of Madbury Road. Tabled.

Petitioned by James A. Funkhouser and nine other legal voters.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to continue the hydrant line up Madbury Road a reasonable distance. Tabled.

Petitioned by R. R. Starke and thirty-two legal voters.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the present right of way extending from Main Street past the Gorman Block and the Franklin Theater to the Brook. Voted with provisions.

Petitioned by H. I. Leavitt and nine other legal voters.

14. To see if the Town will modify the present article pertaining to the charges for plowing snow. Upon request, private drives, lanes, etc., shall be plowed as soon as possible and charges made as listed herein:

Length

165 feet—500 feet \$1.00 per storm

500 feet—1000 feet \$2.00 per storm

Over 1000 ft. \$2.00 per storm plus

10 cents per additional 100 linear ft. per storm. Voted.

Petitioned by Russell S. Harmon and nine other legal voters.

15. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. Voted.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. Voted.

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payments of taxes as follows: 1 per cent if paid on or before August 1, 1937. Voted.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Voted.

Voted to print a tribute in the 1938 report to the "Oldest Man in Town" and that a picture of Sam Rundlett be printed and that a copy of this tribute be sent to the Rundlett family.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 8th, 1938

DURHAM, N. H.

Two Hundredth and seventh Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the eighth day of March, A. D., 1938 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Delegate to the Constitutional Convention, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee, for a term of three years and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of two years.

3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-eight hundred and twenty-six dollars (\$2826.00) to obtain State Aid on the following: State Aid Construction on Durham Point Road. (See approved item in the budget)

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget)

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (See approved items in the budget.)

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$146.83. (See budget.)

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to install street lights between Durham and the Newmarket line, the number of lights to be decided by the Light Company and the Selectmen.

Petitioned by Clarina Boucher and nine other legal voters. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to continue the hydrant line up Madbury Road a reasonable distance. (See budget.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the federal constitution by the state June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen. (See budget.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue street lights on the Dover Road from Coes Corner to the Madbury town line. (Inserted by vote of the Budget Committee.)

11. To see if the Town will authorize the appointing of three men to be known as the Sewer Commission of Durham, said board to have full control of laying out, constructing and administering the sewer system of Durham. One commissioner to be appointed by the board of selectmen for a term of three years; one commissioner to be appointed by the budget committee for a term of two years; and they to appoint one member for a term of one year. Hereafter, one member to be elected in Town meeting for a term of three years.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be used by the sewer commission to pay for surveying the Town and laying out a complete sewer system and other necessary expense connected with their office.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the offer of the Durham School District, and hold future meetings of the Town at the New School Auditorium.

14. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the Town will allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows: one per cent (1%) if paid on or before August 1, 1938.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

February 1, 1938

To the Town of Durham:

During the past year a total of 5,164 books were added to the library collection. This number includes 123 volumes purchased from funds provided by the town for the benefit of the Durham Public Library, and 135 from funds provided by the Durham Library Association. 48,631 volumes were circulated during the year for use outside the building, including town and college use. The total book collection of the combined libraries is now 93,959 volumes.

At the present date the additions and alterations to the library building, authorized last spring by the University Board of Trustees, are practically completed. Two new wings, 40 x 70 feet, have been added to the building. Extensive alterations and remodeling on the interior of the old building have completely changed the functions of a great part of it. New reading rooms have been provided on the basement and main floors. Most important to the younger generation of the town is the change in the juvenile room, which has been more than doubled in size. Plans are under way to refurnish this room with new and adequate equipment. Additional stack space and area for open shelf books will provide much better facilities for making library material available to the public. The old building, erected in 1907 by a union of funds provided by Hamilton Smith and Andrew Carnegie, served the needs of the town and college for 30 years, but is being overshadowed by present developments and the extreme need for expansion. The greater library will continue its cordial relationships with the townspeople of Durham.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 1936 - 1937

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I have the honor to present my ninth annual report.

The teaching force for 1937-38 is the same as reported last year and the same departmental system is being followed. Miss Alma Roy resigned as Art Supervisor and Miss Janice Newton of Concord was secured to take her place. Miss Newton is a graduate of Concord High School where she excelled in Art and of the Massachusetts School of Art. She devotes one day a week to the work, including a visit to Packer's Falls once a fortnight. The enrollment remains about the same. Packer's Falls has no first grade and is a smaller school than usual. See table of Statistics. Sixty-two pupils are attending Dover High School and three attending Newmarket High School. This is the largest number ever to attend secondary schools.

We are fortunate to have a principal who knows how to use his hands as well as his head and who is willing to devote so much time to equipping the assembly room with stage and play apparatus. Dancing and music lessons are given here by outside parties but who are directly responsible for the use of the hall to the school authorities.

When our playground is properly graded there will be excellent play space. As I write these words the pupils are enjoying fine and safe sliding.

Free milk is being furnished to the children who need it and cannot afford to buy it about the same number of bottles is being purchased by parents. The milk is whole, pasteurized and furnished by the University Dairy. The Lions Club has sponsored a Dental Clinic. See the report of

Miss Dorothy Kavanaugh, the School Nurse, which accompanies my report.

In October we used the Detroit First Grade Intelligence Tests for Grade one, and the Otis Group Intelligence Tests for the Junior High School Grades. The Metropolitan Achievement Tests are given to grades 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 at the middle of the year and the Standard Graduation Tests to the eighth grade in June. The results so far have been satisfactory and the tests help the teachers in their grade placement. Principal Clark with the cooperation of the Superintendent and Teachers has worked out a modern system of reporting to parents. The system appears to meet the approval of the parents and we hope that it gives them a more complete picture of the work of the pupil without its being a picture of a "candid camera" type.

It is a pleasure to work with a cooperative and willing corps of teachers. We all acknowledge the continued support of the School Board and thank them for it.

The Lions Club deserves a great deal of credit for the fine work that it has contributed toward the needs of our children. It has sponsored a dental clinic for the children for several years.

A Toxoid Clinic was held in the spring of 1937 and many of the pre-school children were given the Toxoid Treatment.

As in the past, free milk was distributed among the children who needed extra nourishment other than that provided for at home.

I was very pleased with the hearty cooperation given me by the parents this past year, in particular in having

their children's defective teeth, eyes, and throat corrected.

The home visits which I have made during the year have brought me into closer contact with the parents, thus enabling me to get these fine results.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, Teachers, Parents and others for their helpful cooperation during the school year.
