REPORT OF TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

The committee appointed at town meeting, March 14, 1944, to collect material for a continuation of the town history, has held one meeting and organized. The scope of the proposed book was discussed at length, and a list of subjects submitted and assigned to the several members. Already, a substantial amount of work has been done, and some of the material is now in its permanent form.

Charles E. Ayers has resigned from the committee, owing to his absence from town.

The question has been asked: What can be of interest now for such a book, and what can be found to put in it? In the fifty-seven years since the present history was published, the town government, the churches and the schools have continued in unbroken line; in addition, every organization now active in the town has been created, and many others have risen and flourished and been disbanded. Research in the records of some of these now-forgotten societies has discovered much that is amusing and interesting, and brings to life again the men and women of a generation ago, when Fitzwilliam was a larger and more active place. Many business industries have come and gone, many of the old houses have changed owners, thus bringing population changes, old roads have been re-opened and others abandoned, and the town's part in three wars is to be written.

Because of the many changes in Fitzwilliam since the existing history was published, this committee feels that it will be of interest and value to try to present in the proposed book some description of the several neighborhoods as they once were, when houses stood where cellar-holes are now, and mill-wheels turned beside ponds long since gone. To this end, the committee will be glad of whatever

help can be given by anyone who has knowledge of the old districts, or has records or family papers which may be of aid.

None of the appropriation of \$50 made by the town for the use of the committee has been spent, as the expenses to date have been small and have been met by the individual members.

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Fitzwilliam for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, which has been made by this Division in accordance with the vote taken at the annual town meeting. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts of the board of selectmen, treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, road agent, trustees of trust funds, Depot Park commission, treasurer of the Elliot Institute, library treasury and village district.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedules A and B)

Comparative statements showing the Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes assessed during the ten year period ending December 31, 1944, are presented in Schedules A and B.

Balance Sheets, January 31, 1944, December 31, 1944:
(Schedule D)

During the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, the Net Surplus of the town was reduced from \$5,292.65 to \$4,312.37, a decrease of \$980.28. This decrease in Net Surplus resulted principally from:

(1) Reduction of assets occasioned by use of Cash Surplus of \$3,000.00 as estimated revenue in the 1944 budget and tax rate calculation.

(2) Which was partially offset by a net budget surplus for the year of \$1,918.06.

Revenues, Appropriations and Expenditures:

(Schedules C and C-1)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, are included in Schedules C and C-1. As indicated by the budget summary in Schedule C-1, a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,778.00, and a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$140.06, resulted in a net budget surplus for the year of \$1,918.06.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials who are charged with the custody of and who receive or disburse public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from the depository banks.

TAX ACCOUNTS

The tax warrant for the levy of 1944, of Collector Lolie R. Pierce, was audited and balanced as indicated by Schedule F. Activity in the warrant for the levy of 1943 was also checked as noted in Schedule F-1.

Tax sale accounts were examined and the activity therein for the fiscal year is indicated in Schedule F-3.

TOWN CLERK

Motor vehicle permits and dog licenses issued by the town clerk during the year were examined. All funds received from these sources were properly accounted for through remittances to the treasurer of funds on hand:

CONCLUSION

It was noted that the recommendations made in last year's audit report have been carried out and the financial accounts and records of all town officials examined were found in good condition and in accordance with prescribed methods.

In compliance with the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, this report or a summary of its essential features should be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the town for the assistance rendered and information furnished while engaged in making this audit.

TWO OUTSTANDING GIFTS TO THE LIBRARY

The Fitzwilliam Town Library Trustees feel particularly grateful for two substantial gifts given the Library during the past year.

Mr. William F. Perry of Keene has given the Trustees, in trust, securities of a present value of about \$3,200 as a beginning of a fund to build a fireproof addition to our present library building. The money must be held until a sufficient amount is given or raised to accomplish the purpose.

One of the great needs of our library has been some place where things of historic interest, old heirlooms, town records, etc., can be displayed and stored without the menace of loss by fire or otherwise. People who have such things do not like to give them to the town under present conditions, knowing that there is no safe place to keep them.

It is very much hoped that other gifts for the same purpose will follow this splendid beginning, so that by the time building conditions permit we shall be able to build our much-needed addition.

Our other outstanding gift during the past year has been the promise of a collection of paintings from Mr. William J. Whittemore of New York, and these have already commenced to arrive.

Mr. Whittemore is a member of the National Academy and the American Water Color Society, and some of these paintings are his work and some by other artists, all of national reputation. Both of Mr. Whittemore's parents were natives of Fitzwilliam.

In these days of paternalism in government, it is refreshing to look back and study the history of our library:

The original building was given by Mr. Daniel E. Bradley in memory of his grandparents, who lived in this house

for 75 years. Very fittingly, this Daniel Spaulding homestead housed the first Fitzwilliam public library and Daniel Spaulding was the librarian.

Look through the list of those who contributed toward remodeling and furnishing the building. Look at the names of the contributors of Trust Funds for Library use. They are all the names of men and women who felt Fitzwilliam had done something for them, and they, according to their means, wanted to do something for her. Most of them are from families outstanding in Fitzwilliam's past.

How much finer that our library's needs should be financed by people with their hearts in the town, rather than by an outside source like the Carnegie Foundation.

Another gift given the town, although not in the province of the library, is of such outstanding value to the town that it should be mentioned.

It is the memorial to Calvin B. and Julia E. Perry, given by their son, Mr. Walter G. Perry, and it provides free hospitalization in the Elliot Community Hospital to needy Fitzwilliam residents.

This fund now amounts to about \$13,000. It has been administered so quietly and efficiently and without fanfare that many people do not realize the wonderful work it is doing.

No finer gift was ever given Fitzwilliam than this.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The third year of our participation in World War II has brought a slight change in the trend of our reading. As the day of victory draws nearer our patrons are eager to know more about the post-war plans and the countries which, by air miles, are our neighbors.

Two years ago we made application to the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace for an International Mind Alcove. There were many on the waiting list ahead of us, so our application was not granted until last September. The particular purpose of the I. M. A. is to assist readers to gain a wider knowledge of the peoples of the world and thereby a larger interest in them. It was felt that the purpose for which they were given would be served best, if the books came in small installments four times a year until a hundred books have been received. In this way the most recent books are available. Our first installment of four books may be found in a special section marked "International Mind Alcove" and each book bears a bookmark of identification. If you are interested in a better knowledge of the peoples and conditions in Africa, Japan and China and beyond victory, don't miss these books.

On June 12-13 I was able to attend the 55th annual meeting of the N. H. Library Association at St. Paul's School, Concord. Over 100 librarians attended this conference and received many helpful and inspiring suggestions. A panel discussion on "New Hampshire Libraries and Demobilization" gave a picture of the problems which will be faced in the post war period and offered suggestions as to how librarians might help. The emphasis was on vocational trends.

Mr. Arthur Plante, for the seventh year, has very kindly helped in the distribution of books for the people at the Depot and Laurel Lake. "Thank you" does not adequately express our appreciation for this service.

Having had many changes in the hours on which the library is open, at last we have decided on what we hope to be permanent hours for your better accommodation and less confusion: Wednesday, 3.00 p. m.—6.00 p. m. and Saturday, 3.00 p. m.—6.00 p. m.

The school teachers have borrowed several collections of books from the State Library in Concord to use in their school rooms. If you want a book that we do not have, we will be glad to get it for you. Did you know we subscribe to twenty-four magazines that you may borrow?

Thank you for your cooperation in making our Town Library a vital part of our every day life.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Fitzwilliam:

I herein submit my second annual report as superintendent of schools.

The issues that confront the American school system in general have become much more acute since my last report. The teacher shortage, the scarcity of materials, and the lack of home supervision of pupils are now serious problems. Despite these shortages the Fitzwilliam district has been able to make some improvements. I believe that some revision in the classification and assignment of pupils is desirable under the present conditions. The following recommendations for your immediate and careful consideration suggest a variety of plans for improving the educational opportunities of all the pupils in the district.

Due to the limited number of pupils scheduled for enrollment in grade nine next year and the small enrollments at the other schools it seems that some consolidation is advisable for the duration, at least, or until the enrollment increases.

The pupils scheduled for high school next year will probably be better prepared when they graduate if they study all four years in the same school.

A study of the following tables shows the enrollment trend and indicates the total number of pupils to plan for, by grades, in the schools next year.

The large difference between the number of pupils enrolled and the number promoted does not determine the number of pupils retarded. Sixteen pupils became non-members during the school year.

The following plans suggest systems of classifying pupils in order that there may be a minimum number of teachers and grades with a maximum of individual attention per pupil. This organization should tend to lower costs as well as increase efficiency of instruction.

In each case the pupils of different ages tend to be separated. This plan usually promotes better habits and attitudes in the social and competitive contacts that must be made.

PLAN A

Grade 9 pupils to attend a regular four year high school.

Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 located in the Junior High school building. Two teachers employed.

Primary rooms grades 1, 2, 3 and 4 maintained at the village and Columbian schools with one teacher at each building.

PLAN B

Same as Plan A except Grades 1 and 2 would be maintained at one building and Grades 3 and 4 at the other. This would double the recitation time per pupil and the teachers could concentrate on the preparation for two grades instead of four, with about twelve instead of twenty-four classes per day.

PLAN C

Maintain the plan suggested in Plan B in one building with two teachers.

PLAN D

A combination or variation of the above plans.

The proposed legislation concerning a minimum salary of \$1200.00 for teachers must be considered in planning the budget for next year. I think that four or five teachers, as provided in the previously mentioned plans would do more efficient work than is possible under the present system which requires seven. The problem of providing transportation for pupils would require a consolidation of routes. The net cost of transportation and teachers to the district is determined in part, by the state aid allotment on these two items. The additional necessary costs of transportation due to consolidation would probably increase the amount approved for this item. I believe only five teachers are approved for state aid in the Fitzwilliam district at the present time.

A comparison of the proposed estimates as included in this report indicate an annual net saving of over three thousand dollars if budget number one is adopted. The decision by the voters on articles 9 and 10 in the warrant will determine which budget should be accepted.

There are numerous projects, including visual education, recreational activities, club work, assembly programs, school lunches to provide for diet deficiencies and situations involving civic responsibilities that are adaptable to centralized schools. More time in the classroom is available for music, health and administrative supervision.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR FOR FITZWILLIAM

Mr. John Frye,
Supt. of Schools,
Marlboro, New Hampshire.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Music as an educational activity has a far reaching influence. It demands fine discrimination in tone, in shading, and in quality. It demands an adequate memory often exercised on a complex and involved whole. It demands a degree of accuracy in performance that is comparable for exactness with nothing less than an involved mathematical operation; and beyond the operation it forever makes for artistic form. It demands self-government to a degree that no other art can approach. Every physical process—breathing, enunciation, tone control, tone-gradation,—is forever required to be brought under a degree of centralization in order that an immediate and perfect response may be realized.

To summarize the teaching of Music: The children have by training and study (1) learned an art, (2) learned the process of voicing it, (3) produced an artistic result through intellectual mastery expressed by the body. For in this expression the physical body is the musical instrument and the indwelling spiritual self is the performer.

So with this thought in mind the Supervisor of Music has endeavored, through the weekly visits to the several schools, to do all that is possible to help the Fitzwilliam boys and girls to learn about Music and its many opportunities.

Music study in the grades is progressing well. A definite course of study is being carried out and with the elimination of much unnecessary theory more time is available for the study of sight reading, rhythms, and interpretation.

The work in the early grades centers about rhythm, staff work, rote songs, and the clearing up of so-called

monotones. In the upper grades advanced reading, tone work, two and three part songs, and appreciation are being taught.

More interest in Music work is evident in the Junior High School. At the beginning of the year the response was very poor but we are happy to report a keener desire and response for music is forth coming.

Your supervisor understands that there is some consideration concerning the consolidation of the schools. This would be a very desirable change for the improvement of music teaching. The several classes are now very small and more enthusiasm and better response would result in larger groups. A recommendation is made to have all the pupils in grades one, two, and three, meet in one class and the pupils of grades four, five, and six, in another class. It is hoped this recommendation will receive consideration and some change will be made for another year.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Fitzwilliam on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To hear and act upon reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen.

Art. 2. To allow accounts against the Town.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a Highway Agent for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.

Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year; to choose one Trustee to have charge of the Trust Funds.

Art. 5. To elect Trustees for the Town Library or take any action thereon.

Art. 6. To elect one Selectman for three years.

Art. 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 9. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting the streets, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for oiling Town roads.

Art. 11. To raise and appropriate money for repairs of Town Highways and bridges and determine the amount.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of T. R. A. roads and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$334.15, the State to give \$1,332.77.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to help maintain a District Nurse for the ensuing year, the same to be expended under the direction of the Fitzwilliam District Nursing Association, or take any action thereon.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the general care of the Fitzwilliam Cemeteries and determine the amount.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and maintenance of the Fitzwilliam Town Library and determine the amount.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of books for the Fitzwilliam Town Library and determine the amount.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the use of Fitzwilliam Village Precinct, for the care of the Common and sidewalks.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the general care and maintenance of the Depot Park, the same to be expended under the direction of the Depot Park Commission.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85 (1-100th of one percent of the assessed valuation), for the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125 to be used for the observance of Memorial Day, the same to be expended under the direction of the Patriotic bodies.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit of town accounts

made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and appropriate the sum of \$50 to cover the expense of such audit.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to reconsider the article passed in 1944 relating to the price of cemetery lots.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to remove the cast iron fountain on the Common and sell the material for junk, and grade and seed the place where it stands.

March 14th, 1944

Meeting called to order at 9.20 a. m., by the Moderator, Fred R. Boyce, when the warrant was read.

Art. 13. Voted to accept State Aid for construction of T. R. A. roads and to raise \$333.19, the State to give \$1,322.77.

Art. 14. Voted to raise \$900 to help maintain a District Nurse.

Art. 15. Voted to raise \$400 for general care of Fitzwilliam Cemeteries.

Art. 16. Voted to raise \$550 for the care and maintenance of the Town Library.

Art. 17. Voted to raise \$200 for the purchase of books.

Art. 18. Voted to raise \$300, the Commissioners to be allowed to build sidewalk down the hill, starting at the L. D. Barnes and Son store, \$150 to be used for this purpose.

Art. 19. Voted to raise \$50 for general care and maintenance of the Depot Park.

Art. 20. Voted to raise \$85, the Town's proportionate share of expense of Monadnock Region Association's advertising campaign.

Art. 21. Voted to raise \$125 to be used for the observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 22. Voted to raise \$100 to use thereof as much as may be necessary to meet emergency defense expenses.

Art. 23. Voted to have the Town audit by the State Tax Commission and appropriate the sum of \$50 to cover the expenses of such audit.

Art. 24. The following resolution presented by Mr. Parker was passed as read; Resolved: To see if the Town will raise price of lots in the Pine Grove Cemetery, for residents, \$20 and non-residents, \$100. For 45; against, 2.

Art. 25. The following resolution presented. Resolved that \$300 be raised to cut off corner on road below home of Frank Angier. Rising vote for the passage of this resolution, 51; against, 0.

Art. 26. Voted to pass this article as read with the following resolution presented: Resolved that Article 26 relating to the continuation of the Town History be accepted and that the following committee be named to have charge of the project, in accordance with the provisions of this article: Marguerite Kimball, Edith W. West, Clarence M. Damon, Charles E. Ayers. The Committee to have the right to name its own Chairman, and it is further provided that the Selectmen shall fill by appointment any vacancies which may occur in the committee membership.

Art. 27. Mr. Parker presented the following resolution which was passed: Resolved: that the Board of Selectmen be empowered to obtain a tablet as roughly outlined in sketch. And the sum of \$150 be raised and appropriated for the work.

Art. 28. Voted that the polls be kept open until 3.30 p. m.

The Town meeting was dissolved at 12 noon.

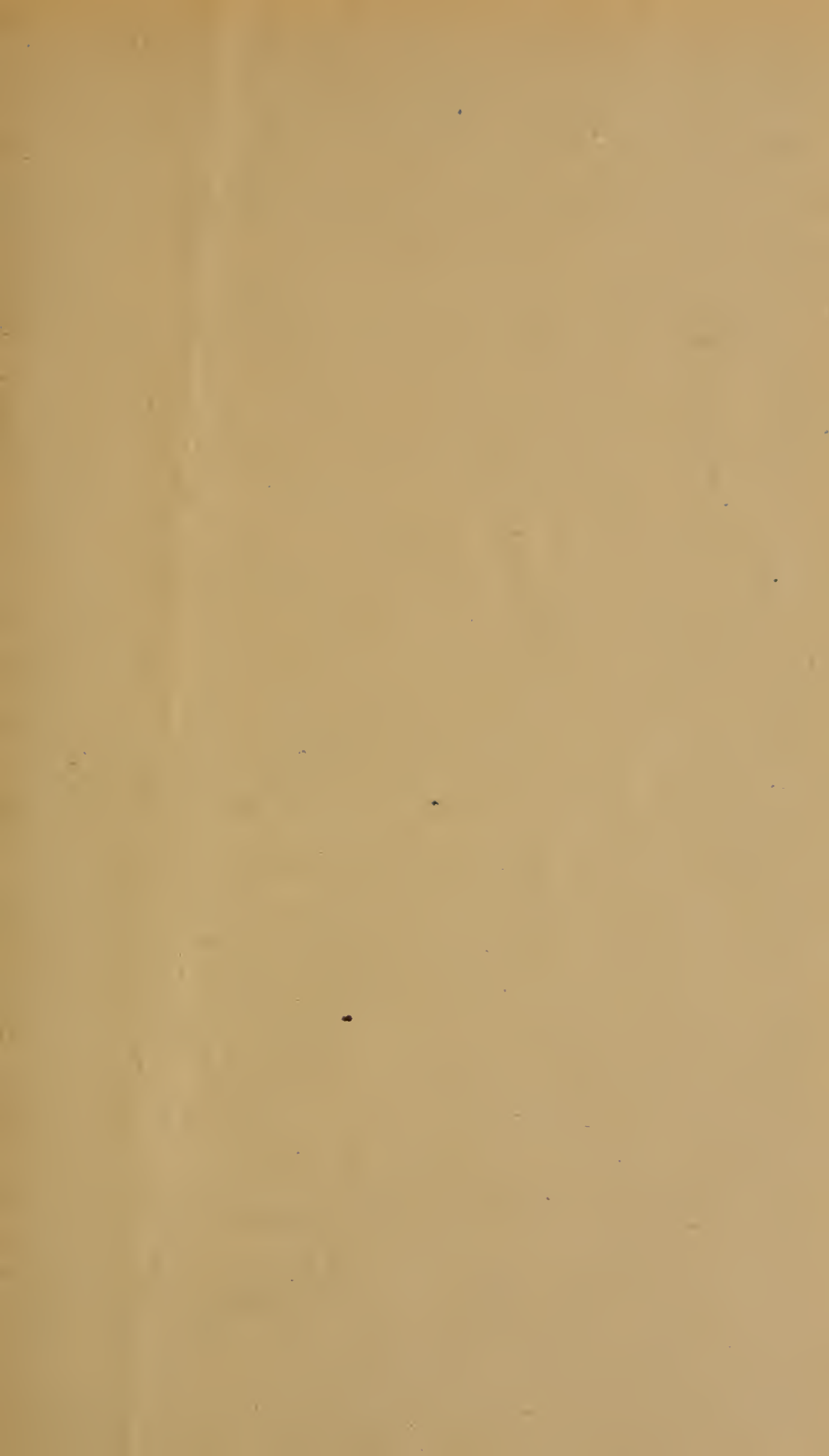

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
