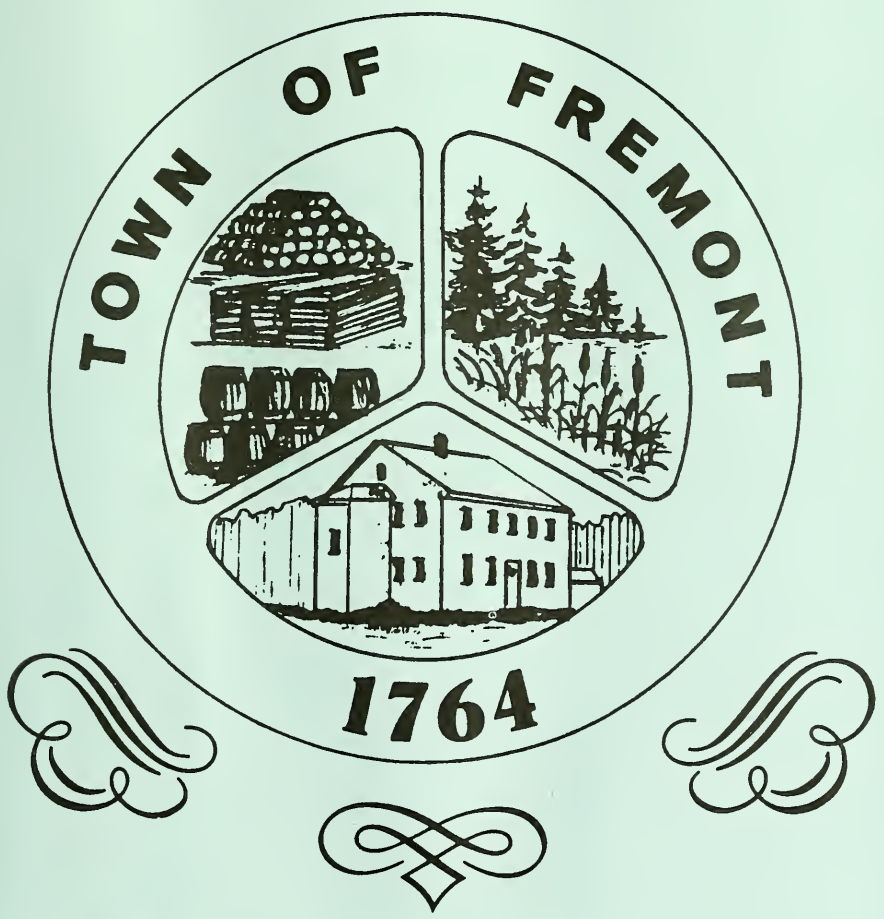

Warrant for Town Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fremont Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday the Twelfth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,276.00 (One Thousand two hundred seventy-six dollars) for the support of The Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program Inc., a private non-profit, anti-poverty agency.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400 (One Thousand four hundred dollars) for the support of the Newmarket Health Center.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 (Three Hundred Dollars) for the support of the Exeter Mediation Program.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,816.00 (One Thousand eight hundred sixteen dollars) for the support of the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,010.10 (One Thousand ten dollars and ten cents) for the support of the Rockingham Planning Commission. This Commission is a voluntary association of Communities in Rockingham County. This Commission will be used as a source of information for the Planning Board.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 (Three Thousand dollars) for use by the Planning Board for additional professional planning and supplies.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400.00 (Three Thousand four hundred dollars) for the installation of a fire alarm system in the Town Hall.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 (One Thousand seven hundred dollars) for the purchase of Computer equipment to be used by Town Officials.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 (Four Thousand dollars) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Police Cruiser.

Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund (Article 6, 1984) \$4,000.00

11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

Riverside Drive Area Fire Sub-Station - Added to Capital

Reserve Fund (Article 7, 1982) \$5,000.00

General Government Buildings 563.00

\$5,563.00

12. On Petition of ten (10) legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$630.00 (Six Hundred Thirty dollars) to assist Rockingham Child & Family Services, a private, non-profit organization, to continue to provide counseling services for individuals and families of Fremont. This \$630.00 represents the prorated uncollected amount for services already rendered last year to 13 residents for a total of 70 sessions.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five thousand dollars) for the sealing of Roads.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand dollars) for work to be done on Riverside Drive Area Roads.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 (Ten Thousand dollars) and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from Current Surplus and use said sum as a setoff for the following item:

General Government Buildings \$10,000.00

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,499.90 (One Thousand four hundred ninety-nine dollars and ninety cents) to be paid to the Town of Kingston Landfill for the purpose of complying with state directives for monitoring the use and condition of the landfill.

17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the Principal and accrued interest to the date of withdrawal, the Capital Reserve Fund established by Act of the Town Meeting held on March 11, 1980, and as amended on March 10, 1982 for the reconstruction of Bridge Number 096/095 on Sandown Road, to provide funds for the reconstruction of the guard

1 railings on the Scribner Road Bridge located at Turner's Pond.

Hand Vote (2/3 Vote Required for Passage)

18. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the Town deems necessary.

19. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

20. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question, "Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Town zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?" Underlined sections represent changes to existing wording and brackets represent omission of words or phrases.

ARTICLE IV

Section 2.

Every building lot shall have a minimum lot frontage on Federal, State and Town Highways of 150 feet provided that where lots are located on exterior side of a curving street a shorter front dimension shall be permitted, provided that the average width of the lot measured across its center shall be 150 feet. Building lots on which multiple family dwellings are located shall have an additional frontage of 20 feet per family unit when less than 5 family units and 40 feet per family unit when 5 or more family units, i.e. 150-20 multiplied by the number of family units or 150-40 multiplies by the number of family units. **No lot line shall be less than 100 feet, and each lot shall have no less than four lot lines.**

Section 7.

At least 3/4 acre of contiguous land of every lot, laid out for residential use (after the adoption this amendment) shall be buildable land with soils dry enough (to permit) **for** installation (and use of facilities for disposal) of sanitary waste(s) **disposal facilities** and shall not have slopes exceeding twenty percent. **Wetlands, as described in this zoning ordinance are excluded as buildable land.** To facilitate determination of the existence of sufficient buildable land, reference should be made to USDA soils maps where indications are given of soil types, ledge conditions, slopes, (height of) water table, and permeability of soils or by individual lot testing. (of area in question.)

21. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question, "Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?"

ARTICLE IV

Section 8 (NEW)

During excavation of test pits for percolation, there will be two (2) town officials present. These individuals may be any of the following: Members of the Board of Selectmen, Conservation Commission, Planning Board, or the Building Inspector.

Section 9 (NEW)

All sanitary disposal systems (septic tanks, leach fields, etc.) shall have no portion within twenty (20) feet of any lot line, or within one hundred (100) feet of any wetland or water supply.

22. To see what actions the town will take by ballot on the following question, "Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board to omit ARTICLE IV - A Declared invalid by the N.H. Supreme Court?" To control the growth of the Town in a manner not to create an excessive economic impact on its capacity for providing the expanded services required to support such growth, the following restrictions are established:

Section 1. The number of building permits to be issued for new dwellings shall be limited annually to 3% of the number of dwellings in the town at the start of each calendar year.

Section 2. These permits shall be issued based on date of application, except that not more than three (3) permits may be issued per developer or within a subdivision in a calendar year.

Section 3. Building permits for non-dwelling construction, expansion, alterations or replacement of existing dwellings are not affected by this article.

23. To see what action the town will take by ballot on the following question, "Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?"

ARTICLE IX (NEW)

WETLAND AND WATERSHED PROTECTION DISTRICT

A. Authorities and Purpose

1. Establishment of this ordinance is in accordance with the authority vested in the Fremont Planning Board by the voters of the Town of Fremont, N.H. on March 11, 1947 and the authority vested in the Conservation Commission by the voters of the Town of Fremont, N.H. on RSA 36:19-29; RSA 36-A:1-6.

2. Purpose. In the interest of public health, convenience, safety, and welfare, the regulation of the District are intended to guide the use of areas of lands draining into wetlands, rivers, brooks, ponds or water supply areas; to control building and land uses which would contribute to pollution of surface and ground water by sewage; to prevent the destruction of watershed areas and wetlands which provide flood protection, recharge of ground water supply, and augmentation of stream flow during dry periods; to prevent unnecessary or excessive expenses to the Town to provide and maintain essential services and utilities which arise because of inharmonious use of watershed areas and wetlands; to encourage those uses that can be appropriately and safely located in this district.

B. Administration

1. Administration of the provisions of this ordinance shall be coordinated with the Fremont Conservation Commission through the designated commission member represented on the Fremont Planning Board. Responsibilities of said member shall be consistent with RSA 36:0 and RSA 36-A:2-3.
2. To the extent possible, the Watershed Protection District shall, through the Planning Board, maintain close coordination with surrounding watershed districts and regional watershed authorities.

C. Definitions

1. Wetlands. Wetlands shall be those areas having standing water seasonal high water within one foot (1') of the surface, and upon which grow or are capable of growing, characteristic wet site species of plants. Said areas shall be determined by on-site inspections and tests. Land areas designated as wetlands shall comply with the provisions of Section E.
2. Watershed Protection Area. Watershed Protection Area shall mean an area of land surrounding designated wetlands for the purpose of controlling building and land uses which would contribute to the pollution of surface and ground water, and preventing the destruction of watershed areas and wetlands which would provide flood protection. Land areas designated as Watershed Protection Areas shall comply with the provisions of Section E.
 - a. Watershed Protection Areas-Permanent flowage (rivers, brooks, streams, and ponds) shall include all lands within 150 feet of the mean annual high of Exeter River, Piscassic River, Loon Pond, Turner's Mill Pond, Poplin Pond, Red Brook, Brown Brook, and other streams to be named.
 - b. Watershed Protection Area-Intermittent flowage; any brook, stream, or pond having flowing or standing water for six (6) months of the year shall include all lands within 100 feet of the center line of said brook or stream, and 100 feet from the mean annual high of said pond.
 - c. Watershed Protection Area-Wetlands; shall include that land area within 100 feet of any designated wetland.
 - d. Watershed Protection Area-Slope factor; when areas abutting watershed protection areas have excessive inclines of 12% or greater, an additional 100 feet of depth shall be added to said area.

D. Test Procedures (Subdivisions Regulation)

Soil testing procedures shall be subject to the prior review, approval and on site inspection by the Planning Board or its designate. Such procedures shall be conducted by, and at the expense of, the landowner/subdivider. A complete record of the tests shall be submitted to the selectmen and placed on file with the Planning Board.

E. Uses Permitted

Any of the following uses that do not result in the erection of any dwelling or building in public or private use of alter the surface

configuration of the land may be permitted in this district consistent with state and federal wetland regulations:

1. Forestry, tree farming, within the limits of RSA 224:44a.
2. Agriculture, including grazing, farming, truck gardening, and harvesting of crops, except that mink farms and piggeries shall not be included in this district.
3. Drainage ways, streams, creeks, or other paths of normal run-off water.
4. Water impoundments and well supplies.
5. Wildlife refuge.
6. Open space as may be permitted by subdivision regulations and other sections of this ordinance.

F. Special Provisions

1. No waste disposal system may be located closer than one hundred feet (100') to any wetland.
2. No waste disposal system may be located within a watershed protection area.
3. Wetland and watershed protection areas shall not be used to satisfy minimum lot area and setback requirements, but may be included in the total lot area.

G. Special Exceptions

The Board of Adjustment, after proper public notice and public hearing, may grant special exceptions for the following uses within the district, the application for such uses having been referred by the Board to the Planning Board for site plan review, the Conservation Commission, the Health Officer, and Building Inspector and reported upon by all four prior to the public hearing or thirty (30) days have elapsed following such referral without receipt of such reports.

1. Recreation, including golf courses, parks (but not an amusement park) boating, fishing, landings, picnic areas, and any non-commercial open-air recreation use, provided that there are adequate provision for disposal of waste products and for parking.
2. Dredging, filling, drainage (in compliance with the RSA 149:8a) or otherwise altering the surface configuration of the land; streets, roads, and other access ways and utility rights if essential to the productive use of land if so located and constructed as to minimize any detrimental impact of such uses upon the wetland and watershed protection areas.
3. Proper evidence to this effect shall be submitted in writing to the Board of Adjustment and shall be accompanied by the findings of a review by the Rockingham County Soil Conservation Service District of the environmental effects of such proposed use upon the wetland and watershed protection area in question.

24. To see what action the Town will take by Ballot on the following question, "Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning

Board?" Underlined sections represent changes to existing wording.

ARTICLE X (previously Article IX)

Section 1. The ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting and when such amendment has received a public hearing which hearing has been advertised and given a legal (10) Ten days notice to conform to present RSA 675.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

25. To see if the Town will vote to open ^{OLD} Ridge Road for a distance of 500 feet (Five Hundred Feet). This portion of road now being closed subject to gates and bars beginning at the now Colin J. & Kathleen E. Ambler property on the North end and running Southerly for said 500 feet (Five hundred feet) to the property line of Maurice and Nancy Boyd et-al Tax Lot 4-3. *Passed*

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to be the issuing authority for Sand and Gravel permits under RSA 155-E:1 III (a).

27. On a petition of 26 voting residents of Fremont to see if the Town will vote to suspend the issuance of new sand and gravel permits in the Town of Fremont until a comprehensive study of the economic, ecological, environmental, aesthetic, health, welfare and safety impacts and effects on the inhabitants of the Town caused by the operation, existence and maintenance of such sand and gravel pits is completed. Said study is to be conducted by a committee consisting of four (4) members appointed by the Board of Selectmen, four (4) members appointed by the Town of Fremont Planning Board and (1) one member appointed by the School Board. Said members shall be appointed no later than April 30, 1985, with written evidence of their appointment furnished by the appointing authorities to the Town Clerk. The Committee shall hold its initial meeting no later than May 15, 1985, at which time it shall complete its study and submit a report to the Annual Town Meeting, Town of Fremont, in March 1986. Said report shall contain specific recommendations for the adoption and implementation of ordinances and procedures governing the issuance of permits and supervision of sand and gravel operations in the Town of Fremont.

28. On a petition of 28 Voting residents of Fremont to see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to petition for a declaratory judgment in the Rockingham County Superior Court to determine who the proper issuing authority is, within the Town of Fremont for Sand & Gravel permits. *defeated.*

29. On Petition of 19 legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to observe Fremont's 225th Anniversary in 1989, and authorize the Selectmen to establish a 225th Committee before May 15th, 1985, to consist of seven (7) members. The Committee will be responsible for formulating plans and fundraising events for said observance.

30. On Petition of Twenty-seven (27) legal voters:
To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 32:2 which will enable the voters in the Town of Fremont, NH to vote for Budget Committee Members. Said election will take place in March 1986.

31. To see if the Town will vote to establish a study Committee to explore the feasibility of changing the present system of designating residences, etc. by RFD and Box numbers. A system whereby each residence, etc. on a Road or Street has its own number on that road or street (ec. 10 Sandown Rd., 35 Main St.). The Committee to consist of the Postmaster of Fremont, The Chief of Police, the Fire Chief, the head of the Rescue Squad, the Chairman of the Planning Board, the Chairman of the Selectmen and the Representative from Fremont General Court. Each local official may be represented by a substitute and any other may attend meeting of the Committee. The Committee shall elect a Chairman and a Clerk from its members and shall report its findings and recommendations to the 1986 Town Meeting.

32. On petition of 13 resident voters of the Town of Fremont, to see if the Town will vote to grant a discount of two (2) percent on property taxes if paid within fifteen (15) days from date of tax bill.

33. On petition of fifteen (15) legal voters:
To see if the Town will vote to designate Scribner Road from Main Street (Route 107) to South Road as Scenic under the provision of RSA 231:157, 158 for purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Fremont. *defeated*

34. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the paved section of a certain street named Ridge Road located in Poplin Acres Development from Charles K. and Louise M. Rowe, the present owners. The requested road to be accepted is approximately 788 feet in length. *deed*

35. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the paved section of a certain street named Ann Lane located in Poplin Acres Development from Charles K. and Louise M. Rowe, the present owners. The requested road to be accepted is approximately 1,228 feet in length. *deed*

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds at Public Auction. *deed*

37. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes. *deed*

38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

NOTE: In accordance with RSA 39:2A adopted at the March Town Meeting of 1972 the first session of the Town Meeting for the choice of Town Officers for the ensuing year will open on March 12, 1985 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 7:00 in the evening. The second session for the consideration of the remainder of the warrant articles will be held at the Fremont Town Hall on Wednesday, March 13, 1985 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening.

Fire Department Report

To the Selectmen and Residents of Fremont:

The loss of control of the Town's rate of growth has started to show in the amount of fire related calls in the last part of 1984.

The request for oil burner inspections and courtesy inspections of wood burning devices and chimneys, has really manifested itself. However, many oil burners have been installed without the necessary permit to install with the follow up permit to operate. Failing to obtain these permits could affect your insurance coverage in case of fire or smoke problems.

The first year of operation of our 7600 gallon tank truck has reflected in the amount of mutual aid calls this Department received. In 1983 we saw 8 out of Town calls and in 1984 we received 28 calls for assistance to other towns. It is a valuable piece of equipment.

The Department is still looking for persons interested in assisting others by becoming Association members as the openings occur.

Training is still a problem within the Department. We will try again in this Spring to start with the basics. It is to the advantage of the recruits to train with the older members on pump operations and such.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the men and women of the Department for their labors and the Ladies Auxiliary for their assistance in the past year.

As you may know, this winter has been a very mild one compared to others. If this weather continues, there will be a good deal of money left over in the winter budget.

This year I have asked for a warrant article to be put in the Town Report. In this article I have asked for the town to appropriate \$5,000.00 to be spend in the Riverside Drive Area. This money would be used for tarring, cutting brush and grading roads. In the past few years we have wanted to have the roads in the Riverside Drive Area surveyed, so work could be started. Last year the roads were surveyed. These roads have been a problem for years and I would like to see something done this year. The people who live in this area have been so far cooperative and I do hope they continue to do. Please come to the town meeting and express your opinion.

Once again, my thanks goes to the men who help on the roads. A lot of the credit should go out to them, as they are the ones who help me keep the roads plowed and sanded through the winter months. Many thanks go out to people who have supported me through the year as Road Agent.

Report of the Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000. fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000. fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

Police Department Report

1984 has been an active, but frustrating year. Since 1980, incidents have doubled. From 1983 to 1984 a remarkable 20% increase in reported incidents. Being a part time Police Department, this increase as other years, have stretched our Department thin. The loss of one officer was also attributed to a heavier work load on the remaining Personnel. During the year it was determined that additional personnel must be hired, in order to spread the work load out, as police work is not the prime source of income for the entire department. In June I advertised for applicants. Eight applicants were received, in July a screening board interviewed all applicants. The three top qualified, two females and one male were recommended to me. In September, their names were submitted to the Board of Selectmen, for appointment to the Department. To this date, none have been appointed. If activity continues to rise, with our additional personnel, this town could conceivably loose other officers.

Hundreds of hours were also spent in lengthy investigations, resulting in convictions. Many hours were also spent in patrolling, as visibility is number one in crime prevention. Without the assist of concerned citizens, arrest and convictions may not have taken place. My thanks to all.

The New Hampshire police standards and training council has made it mandatory for all police officers, full or part time, to be certified with hand guns in 1985. To be an effective police department, training, schooling and updating the department is a must. This is available most of the year for this department.

In closing, I would like to thank my police officers for their excellent work and dedication to the Town.

Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

1984 marked the seventeenth year that the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association has provided professional and caring health services to the residents of the Exeter area. From 1958 to mid 1967 the Exeter VNA employed one nurse who visited within the town of Exeter only. Seventeen years later, the Exeter Area VNA is providing skilled and therapeutic services to a population of over 40,000 in twelve towns. The caring and the warmth are still very much evident as the staff provides many more services with up-to-date skills and competence. The Agency has increased from one nurse to a staff of thirty-one, including therapists, nutritionists, physicians and nurse specialists.

16,352 units of service were provided by EAVNA staff during 1984, seven days a week and twenty four hours a day. The EAVNA provides Home Care today that meets the increased and frequently technical needs of its clientele as hospitals are discharging patients "quicker and sicker". People are now in need of health services at home that before were thought to be only possible in a hospital. The EAVNA staff is skilled and current in its knowledge and abilities.

The services provided in 1984 by programs are:

CARE OF THE SICK - 12,343 visits - These include home and office visits by nurses, aides and therapists.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH - 1,474 units of service - includes home visits and clinic services.

ADULT HEALTH - 2,535 units of service - includes Blood Pressure Screenings, Foot Care, Sugar and Iron, Health Risk Appraisals, Diphtheria and Tetanus, Flu Protection, Health Teaching and Nursing Assessments.

The Agency continues to provide a clinical setting for Home Health to students from area schools and universities.

The shift of health care from hospitals to home and community, which began a few years ago, is proving to be cost effective and preferred by many.

School District Meeting

March 12, 1984

The School District Meeting for the Town of Fremont opened at 8 p.m. at the Laurence Pettengill Hall, Ellis School on March 12, 1984. Mrs. Maureen Buhrman, Moderator, read the official School District Warrant.

Article I

To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mr. Leonard Bonagura, School Board Chairman, moved that the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen be accepted as printed in the School District report.

Seconded by Robert Wines, School Board Member.

George Baker asked why we hear of suggestions every year by the auditors and year after year nothing is changed. The Moderator called on the Superintendent who explained that the School Board was discussing the recommendations with the Superintendent's office. One other point that he made was that the ticket arrangement suggestion for the lunch program was not needed because of the familiarity of lunch officials and pupils.

The Moderator called for the vote. Passed by voice vote.

Article II

To see if the District will vote, under the provisions of RSA 198:20-b to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the 1984-1985 school fiscal year, provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

Robert Wines moved that the District vote under the provisions of RSA 198:20-b, to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the 1984-1985 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

Seconded by Leonard Bonagura. Passed by voice vote.

Article III

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the purpose of financing special education, said amount to be a deficit appropriation.

Leonard Bonagura moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the purpose of financing special education, said amount to be a deficit appropriation.

Seconded by Robert Wines.

Mr. Bonagura explained that several new special education cases that the Board had not planned on caused this figure to be placed in the warrant.

The Moderator called for the vote. The vote not being clear, a hand vote was taken. Yes, 38. No, 35. Article III passed.

Article IV

To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Robert Waddell moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$792,888 for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Seconded by Robert Wines.

A motion was made and seconded to consider the budget line by line.

The Moderator read the School Board budget as printed in the Town Report, and upon questions from the floor, different parts of the School Board's workshop budget were read by Mr. Waddell and Mr. Bonagura. Mary Stiner, Budget Committee Chairperson, was asked to explain the items in the budget not approved by that Committee. Those items totaled \$3,355.

Allan King questioned the School Board on what the \$11,000 increase in teachers salaries was based on and asked if each teacher was providing the best possible instruction in his classes.

Mr. Bonagura replied that the salary increases were negotiated increased and an agreement had just been reached with the teachers.

No other discussion forthcoming, the Moderator called for the vote. The School Board's Budget figure of \$792,888 was passed by voice vote.

Article V

To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Robert Waddell moved to adjourn. Seconded by Robert Wines. Motion passed by voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

Superintendent of Schools' Report

This report will focus on two issues which are of great importance to your school district; (1) program of studies, and (2) teacher salaries.

The New Hampshire Department of Education has recently adopted new standards for secondary schools. Basically, these standards will only influence Fremont as the receiving schools find it necessary to increase tuition charges to meet the new mandates. It is expected that there will be a modest tuition increase at each of the receiving high schools.

The Department is now considering revised standards for elementary and junior high schools. Ellis School should stand up fairly well in terms of new requirements. Over the last few years, the school board, with your help, has instituted a complete school program. Youngsters in grades 1-8 are offered total academic course loads in the basics, plus, art, music and physical education on a part-time basis. Your school has two special education programs, and a Chapter I (federally funded) program to serve students with a variety of special and/or remedial needs. One area that will undoubtedly demand attention when new standards are developed is the library. There is need to enlarge the collection of books and materials.

Ellis School teachers have worked hard to improve the basic subjects, while increasing work in the areas of writing and computers. Class sizes are generally conducive to individual attention. There is always an on-going need to review and improve the learning activities offered to Fremont students. All parties will continue to work towards this end.

According to outgoing U.S. Education Secretary T.H. Bell, the average salary for teachers in New Hampshire, which ranks 44th in the 50 states, was \$16,549 for the school year 1983-84. The average in Fremont was \$14,096 during the same period. Given the small size of the Fremont faculty, it is difficult to draw conclusions from this information; however, it is clear that an escalation of the teacher shortage could effect Ellis School.

Over the last two years there have been many reports on the status of American Schools. All of these reports have documented a teacher shortage and called for higher teacher salaries. Fremont and the other SAU 14 school districts had difficulty filling vacant teaching positions only to back out for better paying jobs several weeks later. In some cases, we had only two or three candidates for a position. The Fremont principal worked very hard to find qualified people for each opening. This task will become even more difficult in the summer of 1985.

In December 1984, the New Hampshire Board of Education adopted a report which in part states; "In order to attract highly qualified college and university graduates to the profession of teaching, salary and working conditions must be on par with what top qualified graduates are paid for jobs which require comparable training and have like levels of responsibility." This statement would suggest starting teachers' salaries at least in the high teens. The starting salary for Fremont teachers in September 1984 was \$10,800.

Of course the big question is HOW? Where will the money come from? What is the role of collective bargaining? Unfortunately, there are no answers to these questions. The teacher salary crisis, which has resulted in a grave teacher shortage, will only be resolved by the cooperative efforts of

the state legislature, local school boards, taxpayers and teachers. There is no "quick fix". There is, however, a need for action. The first action is to provide the necessary dollars to fund the Collective Bargaining Agreement which the Board and Teachers Association ratify. At this writing the bargaining process is not complete. Hopefully, an agreement will be reached prior to District Meeting.

Assistant Superintendent's Report

Special education in Fremont continues to provide a major service of quality to the school and the community. Over the past two years as I have worked with the special education staff, I have always been pleased with the quality of programs and the high level of competence and responsiveness of the special education staff.

During the past year, the Special Education Section of the New Hampshire Department of Education conducted a comprehensive on-site evaluation of the special education programs in all of SAU #14's school districts. We are very proud to report that the evaluator was very impressed with the improvement in the quality of special education programs and services in SAU #14 in general and in Fremont in particular. Everyone involved in special education is to be commended for the favorable outcome of this evaluation.

I would like now to write of the budget process. I feel that the budget process in Fremont has gone well in the past two years. The preparation of the annual school district budget is a complex procedure involving teachers, principals, central office administrators, school board, budget committee and ultimately you, the voters. The entire process requires much time, study, conscientiousness, understanding and a concern for the welfare of the children of Fremont on the part of all concerned. There have been and always will be inevitable disagreements but, in Fremont they are dealt with constructively and in an atmosphere of respect of one party for the other. I should also point out there has been agreement on the vast majority of issues. I believe that the success of this process speaks well for the people of Fremont and its public officials.

School Board Report

The 1984-85 school year has witnessed some events presaging continued progress and rededication to efforts to improve education for all students in Fremont. This emphasis and direction is attributable to the professionalism of the staff of Ellis School and of the School Administrative Unit. But, more importantly, it depends for its continuity and vitality upon the direct and expressed concern, involvement and voluntary efforts of parents and others from the community who take the time and make the effort to find out what is happening in the school and then, rather than shirking responsibility, as many unfortunately do, expressing their concern, rather than aimlessly complaining, and coming forward appropriately with problems and suggestions; then putting forth the effort to achieve resolution of problems and implementing action.

This report is not meant to suggest that everything is problem-free in Fremont. Difficulties remain to be resolved in all areas — particularly budgetary. Expenditures for special education are disproportionate to the means of a town with Fremont's resources. The Board is committed to containing costs in all areas of the school programs consistent with the legal obligations of the school district. No easy solutions are achievable. This does not suggest that with the patience and commitment of all concerned, that the quality of education in Fremont can not only be continued but may be improved without catastrophic increases in costs.

Principal's Report

In this, my second annual report as principal of the Ellis School, I offer the following:

During the past year the staff of the Ellis School engaged in the preparation of organized curriculums in all subjects. The Language Arts and the Mathematics Curriculums have been completed. The Social Studies Program has been upgraded by the purchase of a new series of textbooks. This was accomplished by the reviewing of numerous textbook series and the final selection by the staff of the Scott Foresman Social Studies Series. This means that the Ellis School has complete textbook series with continuity of skill development from grade one to grade eight in Reading, Math and Social Studies.

The Writing Process is being used in several grade levels and Mrs. Bernier continues to develop the writing skills of our students in grades five, six and seven. She is also coordinating this program with Miss Sullivan, Mrs. Robinson and Mrs. Bassett.

Our students have participated in such activities as Young Authors, Spelling Bee, Prize Speaking as well as Basketball and Softball. Mary

Wines won the Spelling Bee and represented her school at the regional level.

Computer classes were scheduled on a regular basis this year and both eighth graders and seventh graders participated in these classes. Children in the lower grades were given opportunities to use the computers placed in their classrooms. Through the use of block grant funds, further additions will be made to the equipment available to our students.

Physical education classes were taught by Mrs. Estey, a trained physical education instructor. Emphasis in the program will be on physical development and conditioning. Basic skills in a variety of sports will be taught.

The Playground Committee of the Ellis School, headed by Pat Gaulin, is working to raise funds to purchase the materials to build a coordinated set of playground apparatus. These items have been selected by the committee as being appropriate for the Ellis School children and will blend into the play area of the school grounds. Existing equipment will be integrated into the overall plan.

I would like to thank the staff, parents and students of the Ellis School for their contributions to our school this year. I would also like to express my appreciation to the School Board and Mr. Cross, our Superintendent of Schools, for their support to our efforts on behalf of the children of Fremont.
