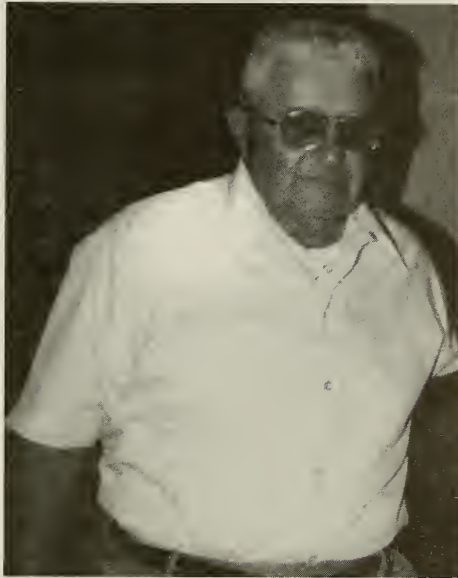

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Greenfield saw a substantial slow down in its' growth as did much of the state. This has resulted in a direct effect toward our tax base with only \$967,974. in new assessments this last year as compared to over One and a-half million the previous year.

This year we are hopeful that the town will be completely revaluated and this is referenced in Article #21 of our town warrant. Also for your consideration is a new recreation building at Oak Park. It has become quite apparant that the Town Hall has outgrown many of the customary functions held there and the State Fire Marshall has indicated that the Town Hall has inadequate storage for the various materials and furniture used by the patrons of the Hall. The last large money article to be considered this year, is a new dump truck for the Department of Public Works. The present one is a 1976.

Sharon Gordon, after a years absence from the Board, was elected selectperson for a three year term.

The Board of Selectmen would like to take this opportunity to thank the many people who volunteer numerous hours to the Town on the Rescue Squad, Budget Committee, Fire Department, Planning Board, Board of Adjustment, Fairgrounds Committee Conservation Committee, Recreation Committee, Trustees of Trust Funds and Library Trustees. And of course, a thank you to all our elected and appointed oficals. Greenfield is a stronger and better community in which to live thanks to their unselfish gift of time and devotion to duty.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Town Journal

The year began auspiciously with Greenfield resident Judd Gregg inaugurated as New Hampshire's 94th Governor.

Greenfield entered the age of automation when voters at Town Meeting approved a software package for the tax collector and treasurer. The purchase of a new cruiser for the police department brought heavy debate, but passed. Townspeople applauded the efforts of the fire department; over \$11,000, was saved on the purchase of a new rescue vehicle through aluminum can contributions and fund raising.

Town Offices saw the addition of Rachel Rooney to the staff. This Bennington resident began her job as town secretary in March.

The Recreation Committee was busy organizing a variety of programs and trips. Through the New Hampshire Rural Arts Council, juggler Andrew Schwartz came to the Town House in January. Dudley Laufman, musician and dance master performed in February. Trips included a shopping spree to Quincy Market, a journey to Portsmouth's Water Country, travel to Gloucester's Waterfront Festival, and a fall cruise on the "Mount Washington" across Lake Winnepesaukee. A special thank you to Carolyn Woodbury for all her hard work.

Spring saw the traditional sign-up for Little League, the Cub Scouts' Pine Wood Derby, Rabies' Clinic and Town Clean Up Day.

Clubs helped townspeople weather the long winter, and kept them socializing all year. The Historical Society held work bees for the cataloguing of historical papers and sponsored many interesting programs. The Sportsmen's Club held a delicious game supper: barbeque bear, cajun venison and moose spaghetti sauce. Delicious! The Harness Drawbar Club gave several demonstrations for the Town.

In April, Rural Route carrier Clayton Brown retired after 21 years of faithful service. We'll miss you Brownie!

Following the Memorial Day Parade, the Playground Committee sponsored an old-fashioned ice cream social.

The theme for this year's Historical Fair was the 1920's. It was a grand opportunity to share Greenfield photos, documents and memorabilia.

Members of the Conservation Commission cleared a trail through the Fleck Conservation Area on the South Francestown Road. Take time to visit this special place.

Fireworks came later this July: Bob Hope and his wife Dolores visited Greenfield, staying with friends and owners of the Greenfield Inn, Vic and Barbara Mangini.

This was the "Year of the Young Reader" and Librarian Velma Stone offered many enticements for town readers. The conclusion of the Summer Reading Program "Read Around the World" was the Little Red Wagon's musical variety show.

The highly successful Oak Park Festival was moved to August. Activities included a road race, parade, concert by the Amherst Band, a barbershop quartet, chicken barbeque, bake sale, craft fair, games, hayrides, a display of old tractors, and a dance. Kudos to all the hard-working members of the committee.

According to tradition, both the Greenfield Women's Club and the Women's Fellowship held well-attended fairs. • The Harvest Fair and

Snowflake Fantasy were enjoyed by all.

In anticipation of the Town's 200th Anniversary, a bell concert was held. The Cathedral Bell Ringers of Norfolk, Massachusetts entertained in October.

It was a year marked with controversy. The first half of the year passed without a full time chief of police. Legal action prevented Chief "Skip" Lane from performing his duties. He was to leave the town's employ in good standing. Acting Chief John Rzasa also resigned. Carl Driggers, appointed Chief in June tendered his resignation in November. He cited interference from Selectman Charles Burrage. This resulted in crowds of concerned citizens attending the weekly selectmen's meeting. This healthy participation in the democratic process generated more interest in town activities. We look forward to an end of these difficulties, and a positive beginning for 1990.

Marjorie Aiken rode her bicycle on her 80th birthday while Spud Fleck was honored by Schoolchildren. The young thesbeans of the Greenfield School surprised their play director on her four-score birthday.

Greenfield welcomed many new babies this year, and mourned the passing of friends Phil Magoon, Leon Hanson, Herman Hadley, Jeanne Warren, Maggie McAllister, Lloyd Tewksbury, Evelyn Coville, Lillian Johnston and Jarvis Adams II.

One of the coldest Decembers in memory saw the town prepare for the holidays and button up for the long winter.

TOWN WARRANT

Town of Greenfield
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield in the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Meeting House in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, to act on the following subjects. The polls will be open at the Town Meeting House from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Article 1A: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 1B: To vote by ballot on four proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, one proposal regarding old age property tax exemption, and one to establish a special non-lapsing fund.

Zoning Ordinance Amendments

AMENDMENT NO. 1

In the Zoning Ordinance, replace paragraph I.3e in SECTION III with the following two paragraphs:

e. Special Provision. No wetlands may be used to satisfy minimum lot size requirements except in the Rural/Agricultural District where wetlands may be used to satisfy up to three (3) acres of the lot size requirement. In any district, wetlands may be used to satisfy all but 50 feet of the frontage requirement.

f. No septic tank or leach field may be located, constructed of enlarged closer than one hundred twenty-five (125) feet to any wetland, wetland soils, well, body of water, watercourse, intermittent or otherwise.

AMENDMENT NO. 2

In the Zoning Ordinance, amend paragraph H of SECTION II by adding the following sentence:

For the purpose of setback requirements, swimming pools are considered to be permanent buildings.

AMENDMENT NO. 3

In the Zoning Ordinance, In SECTION VII, change the first sentence to read as follows:

The Board of Adjustment shall consist of five (5) regular members and at least three (3) alternate members, all to be appointed by the Moderator after the adoption of this amendment, as the terms of the present members expire.

AMENDMENT NO. 4

In the Zoning Ordinance, In SECTION III, paragraph B, delete:

"Thence easterly along the south side of Forest Road to the Northeast corner of the Library property". In its place, insert the following: "thence easterly along the south side of Forest Road to the northeast corner of the lot now (1989) owned by G&M Trust; thence southerly:"

AMENDMENT NO. 5

"Shall we adopt [RSA 72:43-h (c)] optional adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? The optional exemptions, based on assessed value , for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$20,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$40,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, 60,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000 excluding the value of the person's residence."

AMENDMENT NO. 6

"Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict revenues from Oak Park user fees to expenditures for the purpose of Oak Park Recreation Building? Such revenue and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Oak Park Project fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue."

Town Meeting will recess until 7:00 P.M. on Friday, March 16, 1990 when Article 2 and the remaining articles of the warrant will be acted upon.

Article 2: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, standing committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer and convey property acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 4: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as are necessary to defray Town charges in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by Town Meeting, money from the state, federal, or governmental unit, or private source which becomes available during the year.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept legacies and gifts given the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or group of individuals.

Article 7: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) toward a recreation building at Oak Park and authorize the withdrawal of Eleven thousand, six hundred, fifty-five (\$11,655) plus interest, from the cash reserve fund known as Otter Lake Fund created for that purpose, Eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) from donations and the balance of Thirty thousand, three hundred, forty-five dollars (\$30,345) to be raised by the town. Also, to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a building committee for this purpose.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey to Wayne LeBlanc a right of way or easement over an existing road or cart path from land that Wayne LeBlanc presently owns and is shown as Lot 44 on the Tax Assessor's map of the Town of Greenfield to State Route 136, a public way, said right of way or easement to run over Lot 43 on the Tax Assessor's map and as further shown on a plan of land surveyed by Donald Duval, said Lot 43 being presently owned by the Town of Greenfield.

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of One hundred fifty-three thousand, four hundred ninety-five dollars (\$153,495) for the support of the Department of Public Works to be allocated as follows:

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease agreement for the purpose of leasing a John-Deere road grader for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen thousand, five hundred, four dollars (\$14,504) for that purpose.

(Majority Vote Required)

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) to be used solely in sealing approximately three (3) miles of previously tarred roads in the town.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-two thousand dollars (\$62,000) for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Department of Public Works complete with sander and plows and to authorize the withdrawal of Thirty-three thousand, fifty-nine dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$33,059.57) plus accrued interest from Capital Reserve Funds created for that purpose and the balance of Twenty-eight thousand, nine hundred, forty dollars and forty three cents (\$28,940.43) to be raised by the town.

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty-two thousand, seven hundred and nine dollars (\$42,709) for the support of the Recycling Center to be allocated as follows:

Article 14: To see if the Town of Greenfield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand, six hundred, twenty-two dollars (\$5,622) for the purchase of a horizontal baler, waste oil furnace, furnace ducting, and thermal insulative strips for the Wilton Recycling Center. This is also to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept grants from the Governor's Recycling Grants Program in the amount of Two thousand, eight hundred, eleven dollars (\$2,811) for the purpose of purchasing the above mentioned equipment with the balance of Two thousand, eight hundred, eleven (\$2,811) to be raised by general taxation. This appropriation is contingent upon receipt of State funds and the matching appropriation by the other municipalities participating in the Wilton Recycling Center. The total sum of purchase, including Greenfield's share, will be Forty-seven thousand, six hundred, thirty-five dollars (\$47,635).

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen thousand, seven hundred dollars (\$17,700.) for the support of the Fire Department to be allocated as follows:

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.) to be used to purchase new personal protection gear for the Fire Department.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.) to be set aside into a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of Fire Department equipment.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-two thousand, one hundred dollars (\$52,100.) to support the Police Department to be allocated as follows:

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of reconstruction of the Meeting House roof and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight thousand, five hundred dollars (\$8,500.) to be placed in this fund and designate the Selectmen as agents to expend.

(Majority Vote Required)

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five thousand dollars (35,000.) for a complete revaluation of the Town in 1990 and to authorize the withdrawal of Twenty-seven thousand, eighty-five dollars and fifty-one cents (\$27,085.51) plus accrued interest from cash reserve funds created for that purpose and the balance of Seven thousand, nine hundred, fourteen dollars and forty-nine cents (\$7,914.49) to be raised by the Town.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Two hundred,Thirty-one thousand,four hundred fifty-five dollars (\$231,455.) for the operation and maintenance of Town property, and any other charges arising within the Town as proposed:

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.) for a new Picket Fence for the cemetery.

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven thousand, four hundred dollars (\$11,400.) for the support of the Recreation Department. Nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.) for the support of Recreation programs and Two thousand, four hundred dollars (\$2,400) for a life guard at Sunset Lake Beach. Four thousand, two hundred dollars (\$4,200.) to be raised through taxes and seven thousand, two hundred dollars (\$7,200.) to be raised through fees and charges. (Submitted by the Recreation Committee)

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply the following Educational Tax Credit proposal in its considerations of tax abatements.

Beginning September 1, 1990, any owner of real estate in Greenfield, New Hampshire, who pays for any grade 1 through 12 Greenfield student-resident all or any part of the actual educational expenses of any public or non-public school which legally fulfills the State of New Hampshire compulsory attendance laws, shall be eligible, pursuant to RSA 76:16, to receive an abatement of real estate taxes from the Town of Greenfield in an amount, dollar for dollar, not to exceed 50 percent of the cost per pupil of the public school from the previous year. (Submitted by Petition)

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to study the following Educational Tax Credit proposal and report on its findings to the 1991 Town Meeting:

Beginning September 1, 1991, any owner of real estate in Greenfield, New Hampshire, who pays for any Greenfield student-resident all or any part of the actual grade 1 through 12 educational expenses of any public or non-public school which legally fulfills the State of New Hampshire compulsory attendance laws, shall be eligible, pursuant to RSA 76:16, to receive an abatement of real estate taxes from the Town of Greenfield in a reasonable amount to be determined by the selectmen. (Submitted by Petition)

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990, as Earth Day 1990, and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment."

Article 28: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

MARCH 14, 1989

TOWN ELECTIONS

Meeting was called to order by Acting Moderator, Steve Payne, at 10:00 a.m. to act on Article I of the warrant - election of Town Officers for the ensuing year, also Article IB to vote on six proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Planning Board and proposals by the CONVAL School Board.

Polls opened at 10:00 a.m. and closed at 7:00 p.m. after which the ballots were counted, 303 ballots were cast, three of which were absentee.

Ann Geisel led the pledge of allegiance to the flag. Prayer by the Rev. Dan Osgood. Moderator read the warrant. Checklist was read by Cheri McDaniel, Supervisor of the Checklist with 754 names. Moderator announced absentee ballots to be opened at 3:00 p.m.

Article 1 Election of Officers fo the Town of Greenfield, NH.

SELECTMAN FOR THREE YEARS - Sharon Gordon had 240 votes, therefore elected for the ensuing three years. (8 write ins)

TOWN TREASURER FOR ONE YEAR - Dorothy D. Hilton had 280 votes, therefore elected for the ensuing year. (1 write in)

FIRE CHIEF FOR ONE YEAR - James Conway had 284 votes, therefore elected for the ensuing year. (1 write in)

OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE FOR ONE YEAR - Diane Naylor had 193 votes, Cheri McDaniel as write in had 80 votes, therefore Diane Naylor elected for ensuing year.

LIBRARY TRUSTEE FOR THREE YEARS - Murlyn D. Miner had 282 votes, therefore elected for the ensuing three years.

BUDGET COMMITTEE FOR THREE YEARS - (vote for two) Eugene Mitchell had 207 votes, Joseph Loconti had 50 write in votes, and Victor King had 49 write ins therefore Eugene Mitchell and Joseph Loconti elected for the ensuing three years. (20 write ins)

PLANNING BOARD FOR THREE YEARS - (vote for two) Jarvis M. Adams, III had 261 votes, Steven Seigars had 200 votes, Christopher Williams had 80 votes, therefore Jarvis Adams, III and Steve Seigars elected for the ensuing three years (8 write ins)

TOWN AUDITOR FOR ONE YEAR - (vote for two) 9 write in votes for Irene Russell, 7 write in votes for Tina Goodwin. (17 write ins)

SCHOOL MODERATOR FOR ONE YEAR - Harvey Chandler had 245 votes.

The CONVAL School Board Proposals were sealed and will be picked up to be counted on Monday March 20 at CONVAL.

Meeting adjourned at 7:00 p.m. at which time ballots were counted, to reopen Friday night at 7:00 p.m. on March 17, 1989 for Town Meeting when Article II and remaining articles of the warrant will be voted on.

Meeting reopened at 7:05 p.m. on March 17, 1989, Girl Scouts presented the colors and led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Richard Buswell, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, presented a plant to Marjorie Aiken for her years of devotion to the Town. Marjorie declared this her 61st Town Meeting. Moderator, Peter Hopkins continued by listing the house rules: 1. For those who wish to smoke, please leave the Hall, try not to disturb the meeting. 2. We will follow Warrant as printed unless change made now. 3. People who wish to speak to an article, please rise, state your name and speak your piece, and please stick to the issue. 5. Speak once on an article and not again until everyone who wishes has a chance. 6. Ask that we not pass over an article, all articles should be brought up. 7. Any amendments to articles are to be written and given to the Clerk so that we are sure they are written in the minutes correctly. 8. Should assembly feel Moderator has made an incorrect ruling, this can be changed by vote of the assembly. Moderator recognized our State Representative, Eleanor Amidon from Hancock.

Meeting continued by Moderator reading the State of the Ballot and proceeding with Article 2, followed by rest of the articles in the warrant.

Article 2 - Moved and seconded to hear reports of agents, auditors, standing committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto. Sharon Gordon stated there is to be a meeting on next Monday evening at 7:30 p.m. at the Elementary School to discuss building program before school meeting on Wednesday. Gene Mitchell asked what if anything had been done regarding the auditors recommendations, Richard Buswell stated that Tax Collector has started closing out his account and would eventually be closed. Deposits have been on a timely basis. Library accounts have been straightened out, sick leave and vacation time is being studied and will be straightened out. The form will be put into the personnel files. Cemetery funds will be taken care of, cash maintenance is being worked on or instituted in timely manner. In other words all are being worked on or already instituted. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 3 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require or take any action relative thereto. Gene Mitchell asked about properties that have been deeded to town, what they intend to do with them. It was explained that some are very small pieces, not really notable lots which they feel at this time it is better for the Town to keep than to sell. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 4 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as are necessary to defray Town charges in anticipation of taxes or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 5 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will authorize the Selectment to apply for, accept and expend without further action by Town Meeting, money from the state, federal, or governmental unit, or private source which becomes available during the year or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 6 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept legacies and gifts given the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or group of individuals or take any action

relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 7 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to execute a contract among the towns included with the Contoocook Valley School District which provides for the establishment of comparable practices and procedures among the towns relative to the valuation of real estate for real estate assessment purposes or take any action relative thereto. It was explained this article put in as a guide line related to article #6 voted on in the proposals regarding CONVAL, suggested that the word "direct" be replaced by "authorize". Amendment voted in the affirmative. Article 7 as amended vote in affirmative.

Article 8 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000) toward the purchase of additional computer hardware for the Tax Collector/Treasurer's Office and software to complete the accounting and tax billing programs or take any action relative thereto. Question regarding our voting last year \$9,000 for all the software needed for general ledger and tax collector why the additional now. Adele Gagnon, AA, said that the \$9,000 was an estimate and that the actual cost was \$11,000 so of the \$5,000 being asked for now will be to cover \$2,000 on software already received and \$3,000 for hardware unit for the Tax Collector's Office. It was suggested that we get on line with what we have with the Tax Collector and the Selectmen's Office using the same terminal and expand possibly next year. John Buford asked for a detailed list of what is being purchased. Adele presented this list, question also asked if justification for expansion brought on by computer company or the town office. Robert Geisel stated he needs his own pc to share with the treasurer and that all the bills will be on the computer for this coming year. Amendment proposed to read \$2,000 owed on software and hold off on hardware for another year. Discussion ensued/are we currently paying someone else to prepare bills and what is the cost? Answer \$700. It was established that the present terminal is portable and could be moved from office to office that that presently use is approximately 3 hours daily for the Selectmen's office. Vote on the amendment by show of hands - Yes 43, No 45. Amendment failed Vote on the article as printed, vote in the affirmative.

Article 9 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-eight thousand dollars (\$28,000), for the purchase of a new rescue truck and authorize the withdrawal of Ten thousand twenty-five dollars and thirty-six cents (\$10,025.36) plus accrued interest from Capital Reserve Funds created for that purpose, Five thousand (\$5,000) from donations and the balance of Thirteen thousand (\$13,000) to be raised by the Town or take any action relative thereto. Amendment: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,000 for the purpose of purchasing a new rescue truck and authorize the withdrawal of \$10,025.36 plus accrued interest from Capital Reserve Funds created for that purpose, \$11,636 from donations and aluminum recycling and the balance of \$6,339.00 to be raised by the Town." Amendment voted in the affirmative. Article voted in the affirmative.

Article 10 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One-hundred sixty-one thousand seven hundred and fourteen dollars (\$161,714) for the support of Public Works or take any action relative thereto. Question: How come the overdraft this year? Answer had to lease a grader when our old one broke down, we knew we were taking a chance when a new one was voted down last year. Loader maintenance seems rather high, why not buy a new one like the police cruiser. Why not establish a schedule for equipment rather than just repair and be caught short. Budget Committee hopes to get all on a schedule. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 11 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) to be used solely in sealing approximately three (3) miles of previously tarred roads in the town or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 12 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$15,750) for the support of the Fire Department or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 13 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease agreement for the purpose of leasing a John-Deere road grader for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for that purpose or take any action relative thereto. (Majority Vote Required) This article needs a simple majority. The lease would be for 5 years and then we can own it for \$1. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 14 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-nine thousand four hundred fifty dollars (\$49,450) for the support of the Police Department or take any action relative thereto. Moved to amend the total to \$61,450, the item Cruiser and radio maintenance of \$2,500 be raised to \$14,500 increase to cover cost of new cruiser already received. Explanation: The old cruiser died and a replacement was temporarily sought. The old one was scheduled to be replaced next year anyway and by buying now we got a \$2,000 discount. The Budget Committee is recommending we accept this amendment and set aside Article #19 to be considered next year. Bill Kemp stated they could go to the State and buy a wrecked vehicle for \$1 and replace motor of old cruiser with motor from wrecked vehicle. Discussion continued about amount of down time this would mean for cruiser, what to do for the possible 10 days it would take to get this work done. Amendment made to replace engine at \$2,000. It was determined that old cruiser was a 1985 and had 74,000 miles on odometer which is considered a lot for a cruiser. The Item of Salary for Police Chief was questioned, what is status of our Police Chief, Selectmen stated that John Rzasa is Acting Chief until such time as Court Case is settled, and that we should keep the Chief's salary at \$25,300 so that it would be there in case we get a full time chief. Returning to the amendment on the floor to vote on the amended figure of \$54,350 which would cover addition of \$2,500 for replacement of engine. The Budget Committee recommended we go with new cruiser rather than repair old one. Vote on amended article making total \$54,350 by show of hands. Yes, 50; No, 58. Amendment failed. Discussion resumed on purchase of new vehicle - asked why not get a 4 wheeldrive vehicle that would be better in all kinds of weather, it was explained that other town who had this type of vehicle for their cruiser had not had good luck with them. John Rzasa volunteered to look into possibility of selling old cruiser. Vote on article amended to total of \$63,850, to cover purchase of new cruiser. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 15 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Five thousand one hundred dollars (\$45,100) for the support of the Recycling Center or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 16 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen thousand seven hundred twelve dollars

(\$14,712) for the support of the Stephenson Memorial Library or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 17 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the purchase of a new recycling truck or take any action relative thereto. This would be just a cab and chassis, the old one is all rusted out. Voted in the affirmative.

Article 18 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) for the repair of the Meeting House roof and for the exterior painting of the building or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 19 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of reconstruction of the Meeting House roof and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500) to be placed in this fund and designate the Selectmen as agents to expend (Majority Vote Required) or take any action relative thereto. It was suggested during discussion of Article 14 that we pass over this article for this year since we had to buy a new cruiser and next year double the amount to be put aside, Gene Mitchell felt that we should vote on it rather than wait until next year and ask for double the amount. Vote to pass over the article was defeated. Vote on the article as printed. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 20 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will authorize the exchange of town property located at Route 31 South for a parcel of land located at Zephyr Lake and authorize the Selectmen to sign any deed to effectuate the deal or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by the Selectmen) The land in question is a gravel bank which is no longer used, the Selectmen felt by appropriating the land on Zephyr Lake there could be more parking spaces off the road near the beach. It was the consensus of the people who live near the area that very few townspeople use this beach and the overflow only happened occasionally when the State Park was full and this was from out of State people. If there could be regulations to keep our beaches for townspeople only then we might be more in agreement. These properties can't be traded or sold unless favored by Town. Vote in the negative.

Article 21 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be set aside into a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of Complete revaluation of the Town or take any action relative thereto. We need to be revaluated because now we are considered to be only about 30% of evaluation and State says we have to be reevaluated. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 22 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be set aside into a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of Department of Public Works equipment or take any action relative thereto. Tentively earmarked for a new dump truck definitely would be used only for Public Works Department. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 23 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) for the purchase of additional hose and fittings for the Fire Department or take any action relative thereto. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 24 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Bicentennial Committee for the mailing of two (2) newsletters and administrative costs or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by the Bicentennial Committee) Vote in the affirmative.

Article 25 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) for the replacement of four (4) Department of Public Works doors to insulated ones or take any action relative thereto. No figures on savings to be realized by this replacement. Vote in the negative.

Article 26 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) for the use of replanking the Cavender Road Bridge or take any action relative thereto. Discussion followed considering fixing the bridge or road or both. The bridge has been vandalized and is unsafe for foot traffic, and could present a real legal problem if not repaired or torn down. Residents near bridge would like to have a foot bridge at least because in mud season they can park on the other side (Hancock's side) and walk across to get home. The road is a problem and should be fixed. Article voted in affirmative.

Article 27 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One-hundred ninety-five five hundred ninety-one dollars (\$195,591) for the operation and maintenance of Town property, Social Security, Town Officers Expenses, Debt Service, Insurance, Planning Board and other charges arising within the Town as proposed or take any action relative thereto. Discussion concerning increase in Town Officers expense attributed to Town Clerk and Tax Collector's fees and expenses having increased however increase is offset by collections. Amount of legal fees questioned, this is due to law suits involving the Town and also explained that we are using Council more, boards needing to have legal limitations defined. Clerical help up substantially explained as being due to Administrative Assistant being new to job and getting adjusted, also the great number of phone calls and interruptions asking for information all of which is time consuming. Suggestion offered that a time be allocated specifically for questions so that time could be better organized. A new clerk has been hired to alleviate the situation, she will be working 20 hours a week for \$6.00 an hour. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 28 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven thousand four hundred dollars (\$11,400) for the support of the recreation department. Nine thousand dollars (\$9,000) for the support of recreation programs and two thousand four hundred (\$2,400) for a life guard at Sunset Lake Beach. Four thousand two hundred (\$4,200) to be raised through taxes and Seven thousand two hundred (\$7,200) to be raised through fees and charges or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by the Recreation Committee) Vote in the affirmative.

Article 29 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,800) for work to be completed at Sunset Lake Beach and Zephyr Lake Beach and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Cash Reserve Fund known as Otter Lake Fund for the purpose of parks and recreation or take any action relative thereto. Carolyn Woodbury, Chairman of the Recreation Committee expressed desire to see monies from this fund go toward Oak

Park rather than have it being used toward maintenance of the beaches and proposed an amendment to the article to omit "to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Cash Reserve Fund known as the Otter Lake Fund" money to come from taxation. Vote on the amendment by show of hands. Yes 39, No 54. Amendment defeated. It was explained work to be done was dead trees had been cut down at Zephyr Lake Beach and stumps needed to be removed and additional sand was needed at Sunset Beach. There was some discussion as to who determined that the trees were in fact dead and if they would consider replacing them, issue not resolved. Vote on the article as written by show of hands. Yes 63, No 35. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 30 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's Representative to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund or deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the State and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) Apparently this article submitted in several towns for vote. Discussion ensued, mention made that this would not necessarily mean that roads would be clean, and that NH apparently is only state that does not have a bottle bill. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 31 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Land Fund and transfer twenty (20%) percent of all future Current Use Taxes to this fund. (Submitted by petition) This article asking for 20% of penalty charged when land taken out of current use, anticipating using these monies to acquire conservation land that may come up for sale it seems for this purpose the funds would be matched by State. Questioned as to how much this would possibly involve, it was determined that in the past 4 years we have realized \$12,700 in current use tax change, 20% of which would be \$2,540, no definite figure for future. Amendment proposed that we change 20% to 50% for 1989. Vote on amendment in the affirmative. Vote on article in the affirmative.

Article 32 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Planning Board to review the Site Plan Review Regulation as permitted by RSA 155E and submitted herewith or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) David Hedstrom, Chairman of the Planning Board says Greenfield has already adopted RSA 155E and has reviewed it. This article is more extensive than State requirements, not sure it is valid. Jerry Adams proposed an amendment to read: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Planning Board to review the model excavation regulation as developed by the Hillsboro County Conservation District as permitted by RSA 155E and submitted herewith. Vote on amendment in the affirmative. Vote on article as amended, affirmative.

Article 33 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town of Greenfield will vote to budget 10% of funds allocated for widening or straightening a scenic road for the purpose of hiring a civil engineer to review the plan in relation to the scenic roads designation or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) Members of the Scenic Road Committee feel we should have plans before cutting trees or moving rock walls. It was suggested that we have enough expert people without hiring outside help. Another suggestion was to form a highway committee to think through problems before having expansion. Vote on article by show of hands.

Yes 34; No 82. Article vote in the negative.

Article 34 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to limit vehicles in excess of a gross weight of six tons to a speed of twenty miles an hour on town scenic roads and to post those roads to that effect or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) A paper was read in support of this article quoting statistics regarding safety hazards about ability of heavily laden trucks to stop on gravel roads going beyond this speed also noted if these heavily laden trucks went more slowly there would be fewer pot-holes. It was quoted that according to RSA 265:63 that Selectmen can only decrease speed limits to 30 miles an hour, and that without scales our ability to enforce this would be impossible. Vote in the negative.

Article 35 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to permit the transport of sand, gravel, loam, or rock on town roads only during the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday excluding holidays or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) Felt not legal to prevent people to make a living. Town ordinance says 7-7. Vote in the negative.

Article 36 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to restrict the gross weight of vehicles on town "scenic roads" to 33,500 lbs excepting that the Board of Selectmen may grant a temporary permit waving his restriction under special conditions or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) Amendment proposed: To see if the Town will vote to restrict the gross weight of vehicles on Town "scenic roads" to 33,500 lbs. excepting Town or emergency vehicles, fuel oil trucks, public or private school buses, garbage and trash removal trucks and vehicles making a single trip pick-up or delivery excepting that the Board of Selectmen may grant a temporary permit waving this restriction under special conditions. Vote on amendment negative. Vote on article negative.

Article 37 - Moved and seconded to see if the Town will vote to require that the Planning Board hold all necessary public hearings relative to work on a designated "scenic road" before any funds are appropriated or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by petition) It was explained this only involves cutting of trees or moving rock walls. Consensus was that it would be most difficult to have foresight to hold these hearings before Town Meeting monies are voted. It was explained this would not include an emergency repair job to be done. Vote on the article, negative.

Article 38 - Moved and seconded to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Velma Stone proposed, "That Greenfield consider for the future a total budget to be voted at Town Meeting rather than line item department budgets as other towns in the area." The majority of assembly felt they would rather continue as is. Amendment defeated. Thanks were expressed to Richard Buswell outgoing Selectmen for 3 years of service to the community. Move to adjourn.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION
ANNUAL REPORT

Your commission enrolled in the Lay Lake Testing Program sponsored by the NH Water Supply and Pollution Control Division. This is a program designed to involve private citizens in the process of monitoring the physical and chemical properties of local lakes. We concentrated our efforts on Sunset and Zephyr Lakes because the State monitors Otter Lake because of the State Park interests. This effort resulted in three trips out on each lake to collect samples which were then transported to the Water Supply and Pollution Control laboratories for testing. We have not yet received a report on the results.

We also attended workshops associated with our work. This involved trips to: the Harris Conservation Center in Hancock, Fox State Forest in Hillsboro, Harrisville and Concord. The subjects of these workshops included wetland protection, ground water evaluation and protection, forestry in the presence of wetland and streams, the mitigation process in wetland protection, new State laws regarding excavation and Town Forest establishment and management.

We have worked closely with the Zoning Board of Adjustment, on those appeals involving the Town's Wetland District Zoning Ordinances. In a related area with the NH Wetlands Board, we have made it a practice to respond to all applications for Dredge and Fill Permits originating in Town with appropriate recommendations to the Wetland Board.

The maps associated with the Water Resource Protection Plan has been a continuing process. We are still waiting for data and maps from the US Department of Interior, but we have reached a point where we can start writing the text that will accompany the maps of part of the Protection Plan.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All of these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State law (RSA 224:27), no person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

In order to eliminate false alarms, it is advisable to notify your local fire department whenever you intend to do any outdoor burning.

Violations of RSA 224:27 are a misdemeanor and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression costs (RSA 224:28 and RSA 224:36).

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in the Concord and Chesterfield areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford, New Hampshire.

PLANNING BOARD

The Board's principle administrative task for 1989 was the adoption of a Capital Improvement Plan. The purpose of this plan is to show how, when, and at what cost the town intends to expand its facilities and services to accomodate the projected increase in population and housing growth. With assistance from the Southwest Region Planning Commission, a partial Capital Improvement Plan was adopted. Missing from the plan were the projected costs of road improvements. A town road committee, appointed by the Selectmen, has the responsibility of determining these costs which will be added to the plan in 1990.

At the March Town Meeting, voters approved two amendments to the zoning ordinance which clarified the boundaries of the Business and Village Districts. The voters rejected a petitioned amendment to the Water Pollution Control Regulation.

The Board considered and approved four subdivisons consisting of a total of 12 lots. Also considered were four site plan reviews, three of which were approved. The fourth received partial approval.

This year the town helped 6 families which consisted of 8 adults and 6 children. These families received aid for: Public Service, New England Telephone Company, prescriptions, food, rent and heating fuel just to name a few.

The fuel Assistance Program was used by some families again this year as was Operation Santa Claus.

I would like to thank the Unitarian Church of Peterborough for the use of their food bank, St. Patricks Church in Bennington for their food baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas time. I would especially like to thank Reverend Osgood and the Union Congregational Church of Greenfield for the help they have extended to the residents of Greenfield.

WILTON RECYCLING CENTER
Article for Town Report, 1989

The Recycling Center underwent several changes this year in the midst of our ever-busy operation.

Pat Johannesen took over as manager upon the resignation of Rebecca Secrest. Rebecca and her predecessor Patty Moore have started their own recycling consulting firm. We wish them the best of luck!

An addition was built onto the office to provide a little breathing room.

A wood chipper was brought from the town barn in order to chip our brush, rather than burning it. We hope to start composting chipped brush in the spring, thus improving our composting operation and hopefully producing a more saleable product.

The Recycling Center experienced a drop in income this year from last at a total of \$34,019.24. The reason for this drop is due to a major drop in prices for recyclables.

Aluminum cans are only bringing in \$.37/lb. as compared to \$.58/lb. just six months ago, and we are now paying to ship our paper instead of seeing any income from it.

The good side of this coin is that so many people are recycling now that the market is being flooded, hence the drop in prices. Although this might not seem to be good news financially speaking, it shows that more and more people are taking the solid waste problem seriously.

In addition, the market will have to adapt to this flood by producing more businesses able to handle recycled materials. At this time we can hope to see prices for recyclable materials improve.

This will all take some time to come around, so be patient and know that all your efforts are helping to change this very major problem of cleaning up our environment.

The staff at the Recycling Center want to thank you once again for your continued support and enthusiasm. Our program could not work without you!

GREENFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

ANNUAL REPORT

As most of you know, I have resigned^r as your Police Chief. However, before I leave I would be remiss if I did not communicate to the future Chief some thoughts and concerns relative to law enforcement and how it can affect a small town like Greenfield. Secondly, I would like to address the citizens of Greenfield relative to the on-going controversy that I have inherited and my observations since being appointed Chief of Police in June of 1989.

Law enforcement today has a major problem, namely drugs. In some cities, it has turned whole Police Departments into armed encampments with most of their resources being expended to combat drug-related offenses. A number of smaller communities are following suit. Just one example of this is the changeover from six-shot revolvers to multi-shot 9mm semi-automatic pistols in even the smallest communities of New Hampshire! The notion that every stop is to be considered a felony stop, without exception, is often heard throughout the state. Some officers are taught that after a motor vehicle stop, the officer should unsnap the strap covering his/her weapon and approach the stopped vehicle with a hand resting on the weapon, presumably ready to draw and fire. Pat-down searches are used increasingly in New Hampshire to search for weapons, drugs and other contraband, particularly on youthful motor vehicle offenders. Some law enforcement officers believe the most important tool they have is their gun.

This situation has evolved from reactions to very real concerns, especially in the high crime areas of New York City, Miami, Boston, Los Angeles, etc. The occasional over-reactions of the smaller, rural police departments may be in part due to the frustrations of viewing the sometimes futile attempts of the larger departments' continued efforts in fighting the effects of drug-connected crime.

The real issue today in law enforcement is in **knowing how to react to the minority in order to protect the majority, and not in reacting to the majority because of the actions of the minority.** Law enforcement cannot remove the responsibility to use good judgment and common sense in their relations with the public. Officers must have the intelligence and proper training to determine when a situation has escalated to the point of using a greater degree of enforcement. When that is warranted, the officer must use it quickly and decisively in order to obtain the desired result. Standard operating procedures are valuable, but they are not intended to replace the officer's most valuable weapons, good judgment and common sense.

The police officer must be aware of the legislative intent of the law and must have the wisdom to know the difference between legal and moral application of the law. Law enforcement should not be blamed for the current drug epidemic in this country. It can only react to society's ills and must not feel frustrated or over-react to situations that it cannot control. When in doubt, we must fall back on the Constitution, the original "Standard Operating Procedure", and reread the 4th, 5th, and 6th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution and Article 19 of the N.H. Constitution.

Law enforcement must remember that the ability to prepare and execute a proper affidavit and warrant is more important than amassing a closet full of automatic weapons at the station. In other words, it must get back to basics, i.e., judicious enforcement and effective deterrence, using the resources which are affordable to the community.

In order to be effective, it is the responsibility of law enforcement to communicate with and educate the community on its attainable and realistic goals and objectives. I know that Greenfield is very receptive and most willing to support the future Chief and that it is eager to have a long-lasting, stable relationship that will assure continuity of the Police Department.

To the citizens of Greenfield, I would like to take this opportunity to address the well-publicized controversy surrounding my resignation, which served to add fuel to other town conflicts that had occurred prior to my arrival in Greenfield.

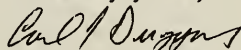
My resignation read, in part, "for reasons detailed during Executive Session of the Board of Selectmen on November 2, 1989, those being the constant interference and continual undermining of my position as Police Chief and the functions of this department by one Selectman, I find it necessary to resign." As a result, an enormous reaction occurred, not only in the town of Greenfield, but in the press and surrounding communities as well. This reaction was most evident at the subsequent weekly Selectmen's meetings.

I would like to thank the citizens of Greenfield for their outpouring of support for my actions during this controversy. However, from my vantage point, I was witnessing something far more important than the controversy itself. It was evident that out of this had evolved awareness, excitement and involvement by the citizenry and it was having a very positive effect in Greenfield. New leaders were emerging who, until now, had largely kept silent on town issues. Now, they were demanding accountability and responsiveness of their elected officials that will not only have a lasting effect on the remainder of their terms, but will also have an effect on future contenders for the office.

We sometimes take democracy for granted and frequently think that our vote doesn't count. But, as Eastern Europe, which has been governed by Communist dictators for decades, has now recognized, the opportunity and freedom to vote must be exercised by everyone in order to elect officials responsive to the majority's needs. In the same spirit, the excitement born from controversy in Greenfield can have a long-lasting positive effect on the community only if its citizens remain attentive through awareness, active involvement, by encouraging qualified candidates to run for election, and most importantly, by voting.

In conclusion, I would like to thank you again for the opportunity to have served you. I know that if you give your future Police Chief the same kind of support that I received, you will be rewarded three-fold. I feel very fortunate to have been among you for almost nine months and will fondly cherish the memories it has brought me.

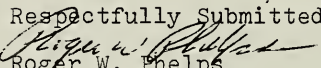
