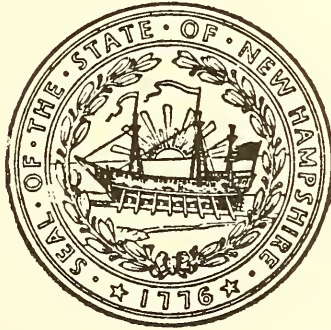

SELECTMEN'S LETTER

The Bicentennial year of 1976 was a productive one for the Town of Groton. Some of the discord of past years was put behind us and our townspeople grabbed on to the bicentennial spirit and through broad participation in Old Home Day indicated there was a great deal of pride in the town of Groton. We are a town with a proud history of support for the principal of this country and a determination that the American way of life will always be able to be enjoyed right here in Groton. In this bicentennial year it was easy to sense our townspeople wanted to put past problems behind us and to begin working together as a town on the problems we will face in the future.

The town planning board has done a lot of work preparing recommendations for this years town meeting. Your selectmen have worked with this group and feel it deserves the thanks of the townspeople for the many hours it has spent preparing recommendations that your selectmen feel will help guarantee that Groton will remain the fine place to live that it is today.

1976 was the year that Groton was revaluated. We would like to thank the townspeople for the assistance and understanding they showed to the people of Eastern Appraisal. We will be getting our tax maps this year, and after seeing the excellent job they did on revaluation we are confident you will be pleased with them. We have paid them \$10,803.62 and still owe them \$6,296.38 which will be paid when everything is finished and we are completely satisfied. The price of \$17,100.00 for which this work is being done is an excellent one and our townspeople deserve credit for their foresight in approving this work at our special town meeting. In another year as the state deadline draws closer the town would have had to spend almost twice the 17,000 to get the same thing done. After talking to many townspeople we feel most are satisfied that their new evaluation is a fair one.

This years deficit of \$2,957.39 was brought on because only 9,200 of the 17,100 encumbered for the revaluation was budgeted by the town. So in fact we are in excellent fiscal shape having behind us an expensive project which most towns have still to face which will cost them considerably more then we spent.

The question of what to do about town roads is still with us. We have budgeted an amount similar to last year to continue patching our roads. We are unsure how long we can continue this process before major work will be necessary. We are equally unsure that the town can afford the hundreds of thousands of dollars it would cost to sub-

stantially re-do our roads. We would like some input from our townspeople on this matter.

We would like to thank all our town officers, election officials, police officers, road agent, and road crews for the excellent jobs they have done this year.

In conclusion we feel strongly that this has been a good year for the town and that with the continued cooperation of the townspeople Groton can realistically look forward to continued progress in the future.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Groton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at North Groton Town House in said Groton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at three of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give a two percent discount of payment of taxes paid within 15 days after the tax collectors mailing date.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of or administer any real estate acquired by tax collector's deeds.
5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to State and Federal Disaster Money.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the following to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund: a. \$2,500 for new truck and sander.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$285.55 and the State will contribute the sum of \$1,903.60 for Class IV and V construction.
9. To see if the Town will continue plowing driveways at the fee of \$25 per driveway exempting residents on Social Security or receiving elderly exemptions.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$7,500 for the sealing and repair of town roads.
11. To see if the Town will vote to make the following changes in

salaried and hourly workers.

- a. Road workers from 2.75 to 3.25.
- b. Road Agent from 3.00 to 3.50
- c. First and Second Selectmen from 400.00 to 800.00
- d. Chairman Selectman from 500.00 to 900.00
- e. Town Clerk from 200.00 to 400.00
- f. Town Treasurer from 300.00 to 500.00
- g. Secretary from 400.00 to 600.00
- h. Ballot clerks from 2.25 to 2.75
- i. Supervisors from 2.25 to 2.75
- j. Moderator from 2.75 to 3.00

k. any other salaried or hourly workers at the rate of 2.75 with the exception of tax collector who is at 1% of the warrant.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$80 for the continuance of the Baker River Audio Visual Center established by Federal Grant in 1974.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$330 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency.

14. To see what action the Town will take on the dump after June 1, 1977 and vote to make appropriation for same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Revenue Sharing Fund all monies available for the purpose of reducing the Summer and Winter maintenance appropriation.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,957.39 to cover deficit.

17. To see if the Town will vote to re-name the Groton School House the Groton Civic Center and make appropriation for repair to the eaves, roof, plumbing, and necessary minor repairs. (submitted by Planning Board).

18. To see what action the Town will take on Planning Board proposals as follows:

- a. Minimum house lots:
 - 1. size-2 acres

2. 100 ft. min. road frontage
3. no subdivision
4. no buildings 50 ft. from all boundaries, incl. roads
- b. Building permits required
 1. alterations of existing buildings
 2. apertinent structures
 3. new buildings
 4. 1.00 charge
 5. issued by Planning Board
 6. \$500 fine for failure to comply
- c. Roads:

STREETS

Definitions

A. **Street** - Includes street, avenue, boulevard, road, alley, highway, and other way, exclusive of driveways serving not more than two adjacent lots.

B. **Right-of-Way** - The total width of street that will accommodate the construction, adequate drainage, and proper maintenance of a roadway.

Street Requirements

1. Approval of general development Street Plan should be required before allowing construction of small integral phases of the plan.
2. Streets shall be logically related to the topography so as to produce suitable lots and reasonable grades.
3. All streets named without duplication nor bear phonetic resemblance to the names of existing streets within the town.
4. Grades - maximum grade of 10%
5. Subgrade Preparation - All loam and other yielding material shall be removed from the roadway and replaced with suitable fill material. All boulders and ledge shall be removed to a uniform cross sectional depth of not less than 12 inches below the subgrade and replaced with gravel.
6. Right-of-Way - Shall not be less than 50 ft. in width and may be required to be more if warranted in the opinion of Planning Board.

7. Drainage - Surface water shall be disposed of by means of culverts of sufficient capacity at water courses as determined by standard hydraulic design methods and by construction of the longitudinal - storm drainage system whenever required to relieve water in the ditch sections. Construction in accordance with N.H. Standard Spec. 1969 Sects. 603 and 604.

8. Gravel Base - All streets shall be constructed with a minimum of 12 inches of gravel per N.H. Standard Spec. 1969 Sect. 304.

9. Asphalt Surface - The asphalt surface may be Bituminous Surface Treatment, Spec. Sec. 410, or Hot Bituminous Pavement, Sect. 403, as required by Planning Board. The minimum width shall be 20 feet.

10. Gravel Surface - In unusual cases of low traffic volumes where the Planning Board feels an asphalt surface is not required the total usable roadway width shall be a minimum of 28 ft. so that the ultimate design may be a 20 ft. asphalt surface with 4 ft. gravel shoulders.

11. Gravel Shoulders - A 4 ft. gravel shoulder, equal to the base course depth shall be constructed adjacent to 20 ft. asphalt surfaces.

12. Dead End Street - Shall not be more than 1000 ft. in length with a designed turning area at the closed end. This turning area may be of circular shape with a minimum radius of 50 ft. from the center to the outside edge of the right-of-way.

13. Bridges - On stream crossings of 10 ft. or more span, the structure shall be designed to H 15 - S 20 loading (AASHo Spec.). The minimum roadway width shall be 24 ft.

14. Construction Supervision - Construction of the street, drainage facilities, sidewalks, curbs, and all other elements of the street must be done under supervision of and with the approval of the Planning Board or their designate.

19. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Groton's Bicentennial Committee is pleased to have sponsored many community-oriented projects in 1976. Following is a summary of its activities.

Early in the spring clean-up work began on two of the town's cemeteries. The Kimball Hill and Bailey Hill cemeteries, both in the woods, and well off main roads, were cleared of many years accumulation of brush and debris, stone walls were rebuilt and tombstones straightened.

Signs were made to mark each of the town's five biggest cemeteries, Punch and Hall's Brooks, the Town Pound, the Town House and Muster Ground, and School #9. All materials and labor for the signs were donated.

A one-thousand dollar grant was received from federal bicentennial monies, and was used, with a matching amount raised by the town, to do renovations on the Town House. The building was rewired, chemical toilets were installed, the heating system was improved. After a thorough cleaning, the interior was repainted, and new window shades installed.

The town's first Old Home Day in nearly forty years was held on August 21. Several hundred persons attended the event which featured a historic display and performance by the New Chester Fyfe and Drum Corps, the Capt. Henry D. Dearborn Muster Company, and the children who participated in the summer workshop.

In addition, Mrs. Jean Ray represented Groton on the Newfound Area Bicentennial Committee, which helped coordinate area activities.

NEWFOUND AREA BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

The Newfound Area Bicentennial Committee has been meeting monthly since May, 1975 to plan and carry out appropriate events and projects commemorating the two hundredth anniversary of the American Revolution in six area towns: Alexandria, Bridgewater, Bristol, Danbury, Groton and Hebron. The focus of the Bicentennial has been Heritage (recalling the past); Festival (celebrating); and Horizon (planning for the future). Projects of the Area Committee have intentionally reflected these national aims.

5. sale of Newfound Bicentennial tea tiles
6. purchase of four new drums for the Newfound Fife and Drum (children's group)
7. support of colonial ball, March 27

During the past year we have had advice from the North County Council and N.H. Highway Dept. in preparing this first step. We have also watched films that emphasized the need for a land use plan.

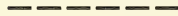
Land use planning benefits the community in several ways and gives the community an objective and legally recognized foundation on which to have land use ordinances and regulations.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.
