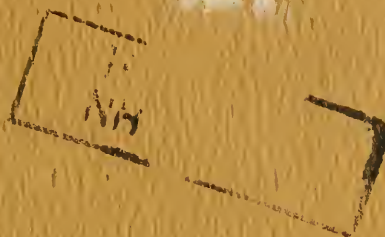

HANCOCK 1976

This will be remembered as the Bicentennial year. The events planned by our town committee were well chosen to involve nearly everyone in the meaning of the national celebration.

Main St. was most impressive with its array of flags fluttering in front of every home. Bicentennial committee members Robert Fogg and Merton Knowles installed ground poles for all who purchased flags.

Ninety-four year old Earl Otis painted his own 1776 flag on his Depot St. garage door.

Highlights of the three-day July 4 celebration included a memorable "History of A Nation" parade led by a pipe and drum corps directed by Parker Starratt, historic skits, a town militia, a colonial breakfast and church service and a town picnic at the camp property.

A Bicentennial book, "Prelude to 200 Years," was published by the history committee in time for July 4. The history contains material relating to Hancock prior to 1890.

And, the region's first bicentennial baby, Megan Graham Kelley, was born July 4 to Margot and Daniel Kelley, North Rd.

Throughout the summer, tours of the church and old cemetery were conducted, concerts and a lecture were held at the Town Hall. A fall harvest supper at the Vestry and husking bee at the Valley Farm concluded the special festivities.

The thanks of the town go to general chairman, Robert Fay; Barbara and Edward Burt, chairmen of July 4 activities; Gloria Neary, chairman for the Fall Harvest Festival; and the countless committee members and workers.

The year began quietly, particularly for those within hearing distance of the town clock. A broken striker hammer, which kept the clock silent for nearly three months, was repaired through the combined efforts of clockkeeper Robert Fogg and nearly a dozen townspeople.

Russell Meikle was the recipient of the first Perley Dunbar award from the Sportsman's Club. And, in January, Rev. Alan Schroepfer was given approval by the Church to attend a seminar in Switzerland for three weeks.

February was considerably busier, with a six-way race for tax collector and a five-way race for Selectmen gearing up for the March election.

Word was received that the long-awaited soil maps were finally ready for the town.

Ruth Ellen Healey, a PMS 8th grader, won a world's junior sled dog championship at Laconia this month.

The town report had a new look, an outgrowth of a town affairs forum discussion. An insert contained information concerning town government, "things worth knowing about", a municipal calendar and a guide to the town meeting process.

Gavels made by Merton Knowles of wood taken from a piece of the original Paul Revere bell were presented to former town moderators Karl Upton (1948-1966) and John Wilbur (1967-1974) and to the town.

In April, the town clerk and tax collector moved to a new office in the town building, redecorated by custodian Joe deBrava.

Michael Cass was appointed Acting Police Chief to fill the position vacated by Bruce Skinner.

Eastern Appraisal Co. began the job of reevaluating all properties in town, starting in May.

That month, Bertram Manning celebrated his 85th birthday; Judy Blood was

honored at McGill University for outstanding participating and sportsmanship in intramural sports; Cathy Graham received her graduate degree in deaf education and highest honors awards; Tara Garland, an honor student at UNH, was a guest at the president's dinner; and the elementary school ended its year with a musical presentation and picnic.

In June, the Camp Guild property was formerly dedicated the Norway Pond Nature Preserve.

Candice Newcomb left for a two year teaching position with the Peace Corps in Morocco.

Monadnock Music held its first Hancock concert and fund raising event, a talent auction, during July. That same month, Richard Amidon was elected president of the Depot Association, a volunteer non-profit Corp., chartered by the State. A successful auction and numerous donations began the fund for starting the restoration project.

Hancock defeated the Peterborough Micros in August to win the Crotched Mountain Junior Little League championship. Coaches Almon Senechal and Bruce Kierstead and the team members were grateful to the Men's Club and Sheila Adams for their contributions towards purchasing trophies and pictures, respectively.

Members of the Youth Group spent a week biking on Martha's Vineyard.

The Old Home Day Committee did its job well, as always. In a special ceremony, townspeople paid grateful tribute to Merton Knowles and Robert Stewart with the formal dedication of the Recreation area in their names.

And, in August, twelve year old Sue Mathewson was the second place winner in the State junior division of the Governor's Essay Contest on "Our N.H. Horticultural Heritage".

Philip Avery was named Road Agent, following the retirement of Everett Adams after 26 years of service. Adams was honored by friends and townspeople at a retirement party at the John Hancock Inn in September.

That month, Howard and Doris Rogers celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary.

The first public hearing on a discussion draft of a proposed Master Plan for the town was held by the Planning Board.

The Harris Center celebrated its sixth birthday in October, conducting programs throughout the year such as wildlife walks, an animal day, trapping, summer school, nature photography, public transportation and a winter carnival, in conjunction with Sargent Camp.

In November, members of the Grange met to promote renewed interest in their organization; Susan Barber addressed a gathering in California on early childhood education; Mr. and Mrs. John Evans celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary.

85 percent of Hancock's 873 registered voters turned out for the national presidential election. While Ford was the big winner locally, Jimmy Carter was elected to the presidency.

Townspeople had a chance in December to say whether they wished to accept \$361,000 in Federal funds for a town services building. They agreed 166 to 95 to accept the monies, should their application be approved.

Various local clubs and groups continued to conduct programs both for the betterment of the community and personal growth.

The Woman's Club began its "home-life projects", giving members a change to learn such skills as basic auto mechanics, the rudiments of electricity and crewel embroidery.

Two new 4-H groups were formed, the "Cow, Chow, Chicks" and a forestry group. Under the guidance of Lawrence Hayes, the forestry group planted several hundred evergreen seedlings around Juggernaut Pond.

The Guild, under the chairmanship of Natalie Cass, Barbara Caverly and Janet Jespersen, put out an alumni newsletter. The newsletter contained information about the activities of all Hancock high schoolers who graduated during the last four years. Guild members also sponsored an election day fair, at which all local organizations were invited to participate, and continued to operate the successful Thrift Shop.

The town affairs forum continued to meet throughout the year, with discussions concerning such topics as school budget, Bicentennial plans, taxation, police protection and the use of the former camp property.

The Fire Dept. conducted a successful 200-ticket lottery to boost their equipment fund, while the Ladies Auxiliary compiled and sold a cookbook for the same purpose. The ladies were also the winners of the grand prize in the Old Home Day parade with their crepe-paper floral fire hat fashioned on a frame over a VW. Six members of the department participated in a flammable liquids course at Meadowood Training Center. Member Joe Garcia's quick action in giving mouth-to-mouth resuscitation saved the life of 18-year old Donald Allgood when an early morning fire damaged their home in October.

Outstanding art exhibits continued throughout the year at the library, arranged by Sally Hamilton. A variety of local talents were displayed, including those of Hilary Feldstein, Augusta and Ann Dillon and Janet Bleicken. A special Bicentennial exhibit was also held at the horsesheds in July, under the chairmanship of Grace Way.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Another year and the task of putting, in the form of a brief report the "happenings" of twelve months. We, in the town of Hancock are most fortunate to have people who will work so hard as members of the committees do. Special thanks to the Fire Station Study Committee, Architect Peter Garland and Selectman Jack Roper for their efforts on the application for federal funding of a "Town Services Building". We find that our application ranked 32nd out of 108 with only the first twelve being awarded grants.

Reappraisal of all properties will be done in May. Soon afterwards a directory will be published showing the before and after values, and public hearings will be scheduled. One major point about reappraisal seems to be misunderstood by many, the town still needs only so much money to function and all reappraisal will essentially do is redistribute the tax assessment.

The case of the King land next to Norway Pond is still open. Superior Court was scheduled for January 21, 1977. However, Mrs. King and her attorney asked that the case be heard at a later date, probably in May.

We have the reassurance of Jack Summers Inc. that the long awaited tennis courts will be given "top priority" and completed as soon as conditions allow. Mr. Summers was plagued by equipment, internal, and then weather conditions which caused last year's completion date to pass. We still have a binding contract and the town is well protected by the payment schedule built into the contract.

Our board has had the task of analyzing two of the towns departments in depth. After 26 years of faithful and untiring service to the town Everett Adams resigned as Road Agent. After writing a job description for the position and interviewing applicants our board unanimously approved Phil Avery (What a first year for anyone!). Bruce Skinner, Police Chief, chose to resign shortly after last years Town Meeting.

A year of study has now helped finalize our plan. We have had excellent results using local men, with Mike Cass as Chief, and the cost figures versus coverage prove it. Additionally, the department has been able to meet all challenges and maintain excellent rapport with townspeople. We have appointed Edward Coughlan as full-time chief with an intensive training program in July.

Last year our report ended with a statement of concern (increasing the tax base by other than residential). This year a new concern. Hancock isn't unique in the demands placed upon those holding office. Each year with increasing local, state, and Federal regulations, and a more interested and inquisitive public, the hours needed magnifies. Of real concern is the matter of "continuity of policy and action". Detailed records certainly help. However, only those who have been personally involved have the feel of the situation. The town, and particularly the selectmen, are fortunate to have Barbara Caverly as both Treasurer and Secretary to the Selectmen. She, in essence, is the continuity of the office with her years of experience and fantastic recall.

HANCOCK TOWN ADVISORY COMMITTEE

At the 1976 Town Meeting the Advisory Committee, consistent with its more active role, presented voters with a detailed report of warrant article recommendations, which were distributed with the Town Report. Also included was an estimated cost chart that explained the degree to which each warrant article would increase the tax rate. A goal of the Advisory Committee, to provide advance information, was thereby fulfilled.

We have now completed our first year under the new by-laws which the town had previously approved, thus modifying the purposes, membership and procedures of the Advisory Committee.

In compliance with these newly adopted by-laws, the Committee called a Public Hearing in November to take under advisement the acceptance of possible federal funds for a Town Services Building. In order to provide voters with advance information, the resulting recommendations and findings were published in the local newspapers and posted in several places prior to the Special Town Meeting. It is significant that the report regarding the Town Services Building included both majority and minority opinions; it was a hot issue, debated at length, and the Committee felt that both sides should be presented.

Members of the Advisory Committee now participate as observers in the preliminary departmental and general budget preparation process. The efforts of the Selectmen to include the Advisory Committee in this procedure are appreciated, as is the cooperation of other town officials.

The primary responsibility of the Hancock Town Advisory Committee is to provide information, recommendations and assistance to the officeholders and voters of Hancock. Committee members are open to your suggestions regarding how we might better fulfill this responsibility.

SUMMARY OF MINUTES
of
1976 TOWN MEETING

Article 1—Harry Casler and Wallace Ensor were unanimously elected to serve as auditors for the year ensuing. Howard Rogers was unanimously elected to serve as Sexton for the year ensuing.

Article 2—It was voted the Town accept the Budget in the amount of \$144,296.75 for estimated Town expenses, and the necessary sum for County Tax, deduct the revenues and credits and raise the balance by taxation.

Article 3—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$500 for the use of the Town History Committee.

Article 4—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for the Water Reserve Fund.

Article 5—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$984.18 to be supplemented by \$6,561.23 from the State for the Town Road Aid Program.

Article 6—The Town authorized the Selectmen to borrow up to \$28,000 to be repaid over a five-year period to purchase a new dump truck for the Highway Department.

Article 7—The Town authorized the selectmen to withdraw \$2,000 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be used for necessary repairs and renovations to the Town Office Building and the Town Hall in the interest of safety and health.

Article 8—The Town voted to raise and appropriate the total sum of \$17,880 for the reappraisal of the Town of Hancock; \$12,000 is to be raised and appropriated by this article and \$5,880 to be entered in the 1977 Budget.

Article 9—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$500 for the Conservation Commission.

Article 10—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$7,000 for the Hancock Recreation Committee to match the \$7,000 that the Committee has raised for the construction of a new tennis court.

Article 11—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$2,000 for the Hancock National Bicentennial Committee.

Article 12—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$520 to support the Mental Health program of the Monadnock Mental Health Service.

Article 13—The Town of Hancock voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,381 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

Article 14—The Town authorized the treasurer of the Town of Hancock to

transfer \$7,723.50 presently in the Balance Held in Reserve for the Sanitary Landfill to the budget for the operation of the Sanitary Landfill.

Article 15—The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to pay a salary to the Town Clerk, in addition to statutory fees now retained, and to authorize the Selectmen to consider this salary a budget item in future years.

Article 16—The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund.

Article 17—The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,991.20 to reimburse the Library Improvement Reserve Fund for the additional expense in acquiring the strip of land on the east side of the Library lot.

Article 18—The Town authorized the Town Treasurer to transfer the sum of \$500 from the Balance Held in Reserve for the Library Study Committee to the Library Improvement Reserve Fund.

Article 19—The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$4,364 to purchase a new police cruiser; said sum to be acquired by the withdrawal of \$3,000 from the Revenue Sharing Fund and the balance of \$1,364 to be raised by taxation.

Article 20—The article, requesting money for our share of the cost of membership in the Monadnock Region Association FAILED.

Article 21—The article, requesting money for the town to join the New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, FAILED.

Article 22—The Town authorized the Selectmen to appoint a Fire Station Building Study Committee of 7 members for a one-year term; and, raised and appropriated \$1,000 for expenses.

Article 23—The Town authorized the Selectmen to accept Prospect Hill Extension as a Town Road if and when the Selectmen and Road Agent are satisfied that all provisions of the Subdivision Ordinances have been complied with.

Article 24—The Town voted to accept as a conservation area the 7.472 acres located on Prospect Hill and known as Sugarbush Park.

Article 25—The Town voted to accept as a conservation area the 3.824 acres on Carriage Hill Road known as lot number 16 on the subdivision plan.

Article 26—The Town voted to modify the purposes, membership and procedures of the Hancock Town Advisory Committee.

Article 27—The Town voted to designate as a scenic road that part of the Willard Pond Road leading from Route 123 to the Hancock-Antrim Town Line.

Article 28—The Town voted to approve the restoration and subsequent upkeep of the Hancock Railroad Depot by the Hancock Depot Committee; the building to remain on Town land and to be used for appropriate community activities con-

sistent with Hancock Ordinances. The financial responsibility for this project will be assumed by the Hancock Depot Committee.

Article 29—The Town voted to authorize the selectmen to change the fee rate of the Town Tax Collector the new rate to be $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 percent of all revenues received from Real Estate taxes, Yield taxes and Bank Stock taxes and 30 cents for each Resident tax collected.

Article 30—The Town authorized the selectmen to borrow up to \$95,000 in anticipation of taxes.

Article 31—The Town voted to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds: Christopher Adams, James M. Burt, Kenneth E. Kepner, Lester W. Phelps, Winifred Robinson, Claire E. Smith, George A. Ward.

Article 32— The reports of the auditors and committees were accepted as printed.

Article 33—A motion that the selectmen take whatever measures necessary to assure that any requirements for a new fire station be studied in conjunction with the building needs of other town departments PASSED.

A motion to have the moderator appoint a committee to draw up guidelines for appointed positions and committees FAILED.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and, upon approval by the voters at that time, to postpone consideration of the balance of the Budget and Warrant until Saturday, the twelfth day of March next at 1:00 p.m. in the afternoon.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for the use of the Town History Committee, or take any other action relating thereto; this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the committee or to be added to by gifts of money.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate nine hundred seventy-nine dollars and nineteen cents (\$979.19) to be supplemented by six thousand five hundred twenty-seven dollars and ninety-six cents (\$6,527.96) from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for this year, or take any other action relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw five thousand dollars (\$5,000) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, these funds to be used for electrical repair work in the Town Hall and necessary repair work to the town buildings, or take any other action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Conservation Commission, or take any other action relating thereto, this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Commission or to be added to by gifts of money.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Library Trustees or to be added to by gifts of money, or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for the purchase and installation of a sand spreader for the Town Highway Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred fifty-four dollars (\$554) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto. This sum is based on the formula of seven percent (7 percent) of the Rooms & Meals Tax funds distributed to the Town by the State of New Hampshire in 1976 (\$7,925.10), but not to exceed the funding received from the Town in 1976.

10. To see if the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire will appropriate the sum of one thousand six hundred seven dollars (\$1,607) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This local request for

financial support is based on a \$1.35 per capita formula, or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred twenty dollars (\$520) to support the Mental Health program of the Monadnock Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town; or take any other action relating thereto.

The commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:53, Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Hancock.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred nine dollars and twenty cents (\$809.20) as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes; or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town of Hancock will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the support of the Monadnock Region Committee on the Arts, or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to have all dogs in the town of Hancock be subject to restraint and under control of the owner at all times; or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to designate as a scenic road under the provisions of RSA 253:17, that part of Depot Road from the Kassarian land to where it is closed subject to gates and bars, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a seven member committee to study the building needs of the Police, Highway, Fire and other departments; the term of this committee to be one year. And, to see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the expenses incurred by this study committee; or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the extension of the water line along Longview Road, about two thousand feet, to the so-called Bartlett place. One-half of the sum is to be raised by taxation and the remaining one-half to be borrowed for a period of ten years with the users being equally assessed for the principal, interest and any other costs incurred in the installation of this line. All users will be required to pay tap-on fee, water rent and to be bound to the agreements with the water department, per regulations dated February 12, 1963.

19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) to purchase and install fire alarm systems for the Town Office Building, Town Hall and Fire Station, or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the people of Hancock:

Nineteen seventy-six saw a big change in the Hancock Police Department with the resignation of Bruce Skinner. Taking over as part-time chief a week after Town Meeting and the recruiting of two new men along with the regular duties of setting up a department kept me quite busy. With the training of two men and final appointment as Chief our department settled down to the busiest year ever with a 15 percent increase over last year in calls and responses. The largest area of growth again this year was burglary and larceny. The police continue to check vacant properties and patrol regularly but without the help of all the people we are unable to be everywhere at once.

There were over 230 calls last year. The following is a breakdown of police matters. Because of the lack of records for the first three months, this shows only the last nine months of 1976.

Because of the increase in the number of chimney fires, we would like to recommend that everyone burning wood in either a stove or a fireplace have their chimney's checked and cleaned once a year.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT SPECIAL SESSION 1976

In the "off year" of 1976 the Legislature met at the call of the Governor to consider a single piece of legislation and then, as ruled constitutional by the Court, continued its Special Session for a total of ten legislative days to consider and act upon other matters of pressing importance to the people of New Hampshire. It should be noted that when the ten days of this session are added to the seventy legislative days of the 1975 Session the total, eighty days, is considerably less than the 90 days allowed by the Constitution for a regular session and 15 for a special session.

Perhaps there was too much haste. I believe annual sessions of possibly 45 days each, each spread out to give more flexibility and more time for committee work and consideration of important and complex legislation, would provide more efficient use of the 90 days permitted each biennium.

The Environment and Agriculture Committee, of which I am a member, held hearings on, studied and reported to the House a number of bills of which three were enacted into law:

One, SB15, extended the final reporting date for the Solid Waste Study Committee to conclude a complete plan for solid waste disposal. Two, SB43, revised the Pesticides Control Law and was passed although a minority of the committee, including me, felt that it should have further (interim) study because of the very limited time we had had to consider such a lengthy bill. Three, HB25, granted an extension in time on dump burning in certain hardship cases if not violating established air quality standards.

The committee has had in interim study a bill to recompense towns which have lost a large part of their tax base due to the 1977 Session. A bill handled by another committee but of interest to agriculture, SB19, made a supplemental appropriation to cover expenses of the Agriculture Department in distributing its very-important-to-farmers weekly agricultural market bulletin.

Two bills together, HB10 and HB30, allowed the state to gain \$2,658,024. in federal funds by simply transferring state funds between the community mental health centers, the Division of Mental Health and the Division of Welfare.

HB21 appropriated money to continue renovations at the New Hampshire Hospital in 1976 instead of holding off until the 1977 session and probable higher costs.

HB24 provided for the completion of Phase II of a state building program to consolidate many state activities now renting scattered space. The controversial "bunker" was eliminated before passage. SB44 established, over the Governor's veto, a Legislative Utility Consumers' Council and provided for a Consumer Advocate, an attorney, to aid the Council and appear in any proceeding concerning consumer-utility matters and for public hearings before fuel adjustment charges are set for the next month.

SB22 authorized, among other projects, a \$241,500. bond issue to fund the Mt. Monadnock- Gap Mountain development project. HB4, the Legislature's response to the Governor's call for a one day special session, is a carefully studied compromise between the previous statute and its repeal. It maintains mandatory coverage for mental illness but treats it like any other illness, relates benefits to present policy benefits and requires a sizeable reduction in the mental health portion of the premium.

I have noted above as briefly as I could a few of the 59 new and-or revised

statutes produced by the special session, those that were of particular interest to me and those that I consider to be of considerable importance to the state and to my district. I will be happy to discuss any of these or others with any constituent and I want to repeat my statement of last year that I welcome questions, comments, criticism, and advice from you.

MONADNOCK REGION ASSOCIATION REPORT

The Monadnock Region Association was founded in 1934 when representatives from twenty-four towns in Southwestern New Hampshire first met and formed the organization.

The objectives of the Association today are much the same as they were in 1934.

We believe in tourism and recreation for the residents of the region and for the many visitors who enjoy coming here. The tourist industry in New Hampshire is a \$450 million dollar business and over 32,000 New Hampshire people are employed in tourist related jobs. The Monadnock Region Association is the only association or group expressly charged by the State of New Hampshire with the responsibilities of recreation and tourism in the Monadnock Region.

In 1976 the Association distributed over 120 thousand folders and brochures about the Monadnock Region to potential tourists and travelers to our area. Tourists paid the State of New Hampshire 14 million dollars Rooms and Meals tax in 1976. Over 5½ million dollars of this was redistributed by the State to all New Hampshire towns and cities. Every town and city in the Monadnock Region received a share of this tourist tax revenue according to population.

The Town of Hancock received \$7,925 of these funds in 1976.

The Monadnock Region Association also strives to improve the industrial climate in the area. We know that there can not be jobs for our young people if there are not shops, plants, and warehouses where they can work. In the Region there are many good companies that provide clean, well-paying jobs and they don't make smoke or pollute the streams. We seek to help other firms like these to locate in the Monadnock Region.

Also we want to maintain and preserve our natural resources, our mountains, our forests, our fields and our wild birds and animals so that they can be enjoyed by those who live here and by the visitors who come to the area now and in the future.

Our interests in recreation and tourism, in industry, and in conservation, haven't changed greatly in 43 years.

TOWN LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

Hancock was saddened by the death on March 9th of Dr. Richard S. Eustis. His outstanding service for twelve years as a trustee of the Town Library and his leadership as the chairman contributed greatly to our high standing among the small libraries of the state. A fund has been started by the Eustis family and friends to provide money for the purchase of books in his memory. At the close of the year this fund had reached a total of \$978.00.

Among other generous gifts to the library this year was a check for \$100 from the Jensen Foundation and a large collection of valuable books from Frank and Thelma Mason. Many smaller but welcome gifts of books, money, records, pictures, etc., have been received and are gratefully appreciated.

The customary items of upkeep such as slate roof repairs, boiler inspection, landscaping, snow removal, etc., were disposed of as they appeared.

Alterations in the Middle Room were started on June 20th. The purpose was to increase the facilities of the room for public use and to provide a more efficient work area for the staff. The work was performed outside of library hours and although the tearing out of plaster walls necessitated continuous clean-up operations, there was a minimum of interference with the normal functioning of the library. The Middle Room was essentially complete and ready for display on Old Home Day, August 14th.

Another improvement this year has been the installation of an underground 1000 gallon oil tank adjacent to the driveway on the east side of the building. This will permit removal of the existing tanks from the basement and make available much needed space for shelving and storage of inactive books.

Other acquisitions include two small book cases for the Stack Room, an electric typewriter, a new heavy duty vacuum cleaner and a delayed action switch for the entrance lights.

Our excellent staff remains unchanged and harmony prevails.

REPORT OF THE TOWN BUILDING STUDY COMMITTEE

At the 1976 town meeting the selectmen were authorized to appoint a committee to study the needs of a new fire station and its possible location. By an amendment from the floor this committee was also asked to study the needs of the Highway and other departments.

The committee asked for recommendations from the heads of the Police, Highway, and Fire Departments as to what their future needs will be. We also invited these people to one of our meetings to get a better understanding of their needs. The following is a summation of our findings.

When studying the present fire station, we found a number of problems:

1. Poor access — There is a twenty (20) foot right of way between Burt Manning's house and the Hancock Cash Market. During week days this right-of-way is often blocked by delivery trucks unloading, or by store patrons parked in the entrance to the driveway.

2. There are two trucks parked behind one sixteen (16) foot door and one truck parked behind a nine (9) foot door causing for very tight quarters.

3. There isn't any office space for the Fire Chief.

4. Some equipment is now stored in a private garage.

When studying the present Highway Department, we also find a number of problems:

1. No running water.

2. No toilet facilities.

3. No office space for the Highway Agent.

4. The Highway Department has three dump trucks, two loaders, and a pickup truck. The present building will house the two new Mack dump trucks, the older of the two loaders, and the pickup by crowding them in behind three doors. This leaves the new loader and one dump truck outside subject to weather and vandalism.

5. There is no security for tools.

6. There is not adequate room for proper maintenance of the vehicles. In fact, the new loader will not fit into the present town barn.

When looking at the Police Department, we also found some problems:

1. There isn't any place to secure evidence. The Chief's office, evidence locker, and interrogation room are one and the same.

2. There isn't any place to keep the police cruiser under cover.

3. When taking a prisoner into the police station, it is necessary to climb stairs. This is not in compliance with the N.H. Police Chief's recommendations.

We also found that the Water Department doesn't have any office space except what is in the homes of the water commissioners. This is also true of the Civil Defense office.

Through the years there has been discussion about the seating capacity of the present town hall. The seating capacity is approximately 250 persons, which isn't a quorum of the registered voters of Hancock.

The foregoing information is what was found when taking a look around the different departments that make up the town of Hancock. Now, let's see what could be done to improve these conditions, starting with the present location of the fire station which is located on 0.29 acres of land. To expand to the left as we face the front of the building is out of the question because of the severe drop-off. To expand to the right would cause the purchase of land from Burt Manning. Even if the present facility were expanded, there would still be an access problem. There is also the possibility of purchasing a right of way onto Hosley Road but this

necessitates the purchase of much land at a considerable cost if it is even available. Even if it were available, coming out on the top of Sand Hill would create another safety problem with this blind entrance onto Sand Hill. All of which says that the fire station should be relocated.

The Highway Department sets on about 3 acres of land which is located below the flood plain. This area is adequate for stockpiling gravel, patch, etc. Also for the outside storage of snow plows and other such equipment. This area is not suitable to house all the needs of the Fire Department and the Highway Department. We could add on to the present town barn so that there would be room to house all of their equipment and to provide an office for the Road Agent, but this would require the extension of the water main so that there would be running water and toilet facilities.

The town owns a piece of property along the Bennington Road in front of the dump, which is also below the flood plain and it is a long, narrow piece that would require considerable fill to be acceptable.

While we were in the middle of our studies, word of a Federal Project through the Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration, through the Local Public Works Capital Development and Investment Program reached us. There was \$10 million to be distributed in the state of New Hampshire. After attending a meeting in Concord to hear the explanation of this project, the committee along with the selectmen decided that with the expertise in the town of Hancock, we could meet the criteria and be able to submit the application by November. Some of the things that we had to be able to do for this application were to have all the necessary permits in hand, the town had to have clear title to the land, and we had to be able to break ground within 90 days after the money was to be awarded to the town.

Peter Garland took the requirements that had been worked up for the different departments and came out with a preliminary plan and drawing of the building. In his initial plan there was provision for a 60 by 80 foot bay area which provided four bays for the Fire Department and two bays for the Highway Department. Adjacent to this area was provision for a radio room, a shop area, a meeting room with a removable partition so that this could be used to supplement the main bay area for use as town hall space. By parking the apparatus outside, this would allow seating capacity for about 700 persons. There was also a kitchen, toilet facilities, and a boiler room on the main floor. This takes care of the space for the Fire Department, the Highway Department, and the extra space needed for town hall space.

We had to have a location to place this building. In the town of Hancock there just isn't much space that is suitable to build a fire station. We looked at the hockey rink but this would be too crowded; it would cause a traffic problem on School Street, and would also remove a large portion of the recreation area. Another area is where the present grammar school is, but the school is there for a while yet to come. This left the land at the corner of School Street and the Bennington Road. By placing the building back about 80 feet from the Bennington Road and close to School Street, we are able to have a walk in entrance to the second floor, making an excellent place for the Police Department. Peter Garland provided a partial second floor with space for a garage and two offices for the Police Department. This would allow enough extra room to provide office space for the Water Department, Civil Defense, and the Road Agent.

If this description sounds familiar, it is because this is what has become known as the Town Services Building. By now, as most of you know, this committee has held a hearing to discuss the needs of this type of building; the Advisory Com-

mittee has also held a hearing, again to determine the needs of this type of building; and we have held a town meeting to allow the selectmen to accept and expend the federal funds that were applied for if we should be lucky enough to receive them.

Whether or not we get the federal funds for this building, the fact still remains that the present fire station, highway barn, and the present police facility are not adequate for the growing needs of Hancock.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board held 18 meetings in 1976, including hearings on subdivision applications and on proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

Nine subdivision applications were approved. Most were of minor nature. One, relating to land on Depot Road, involved five lots.

Five meetings were devoted to preparation of the Town Master Plan. A discussion draft of the plan has been completed, with the help of a number of interested townspeople. It is expected that the Plan, after minor revisions, will be officially adopted early in 1977.

The Zoning Ordinance was amended by vote of the town in March to define a Floodplain and Wetlands District. This action is a part of the town's recognition of the efforts of the Federal Government to provide protection against flood damage in hazardous locations. A related amendment was made to the Hancock Building Ordinance.

The Planning Board has proposed two amendments to the Zoning Ordinance for consideration at the 1977 Town Meeting. One amendment is for clarification of the existing requirements. The second deals with provisions to allow apartments and condominiums in all zoning districts, subject to certain limitations regarding the sizes and characteristics of the buildings and sites.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT
Annual Report: 1976

In place of the customary reporting on the three appeals heard by the Board during 1976, this space will be used to summarize the purposes and operation of the Board of Adjustment. We hope that this information will make Board procedures more understandable to the general public and particularly to those who may make appeals.

The Board of Adjustment is one of four government functions required in a system of zoning. The **Planning Board** has the primary responsibility for proposing the ordinance and any amendments. The **Town voters**, at the annual Town Meeting, enact and amend the zoning ordinance. The **Selectmen**, through the Building Inspector, enforce the ordinance. The **Board of Adjustment** hears appeals and administers special provisions of the ordinance. Each of these components has its own functions and may not perform those of any other group. As an example, the Board of Adjustment may not do anything which would have the effect of changing or amending the ordinance.

Most of the Board's work consists of hearing two types of appeals. The first type is the **Exception**. When the ordinance specifically provides for Exceptions, the Board must decide if they apply to a particular situation and if so, assure that provisions made by the voters are applied. Only the voters can establish Exceptions and related conditions. As an example, the Town has granted the authority for light industry to be located in the rural and agricultural zone under special conditions.

The other type of appeal is a **Variance** which is a relaxation of the strict interpretation of the ordinance if certain conditions are present. These conditions are quite specific but do allow for Board judgment. In exercising this judgement, however, the Board must be particularly careful not to violate the spirit and intent of the ordinance.

State law determines the manner in which appeals are to be handled and also provides guidelines for all Board action. Townspeople wishing to make either type of appeal should become acquainted with these rules and with the ordinance before applying. Board members are always willing to discuss these matters prior to any formal application and to supply relevant material as available. Once formal application is made, however, the Board must balance the request of the applicant with the wishes of the voters as expressed by the zoning ordinance.

NORWAY POND NATURE PRESERVE

Five meetings of this Committee were held during 1976. At its meeting on June 8 the Committee approved changing the name from Camp Guild to "Norway Pond Nature Preserve." In the Town Report of 1975, suggestions for a name for the property were asked for, and later, a notice was put in the local press asking for suggestions for a new name. Since no responses were received, the Committee agreed upon this name as being consistent with the original stated use of the property as a natural or wilderness area.

Also at the June 8 meeting, Robert Strombeck resigned as chairman and Thelma Babbitt was asked to serve. In September Wallace Tripp resigned from the Committee because of his heavy work load and the Selectmen appointed Terry Benoit to serve the rest of his term.

Thanks to the valiant efforts of Ed and Barbara Burt and their helpers, the property was cleaned up in time for the fourth of July Bicentennial Celebration. Families gathered for picnics around the edge of the field at noontime. The field had been mowed and many old-fashioned games were arranged for all ages. This was followed by a dedication of the property when the new name was formally presented. Plans for the Nature Preserve were outlined and a walk around the trails was enjoyed by a good many persons. It was a delightful occasion. Since that time, a sign has been purchased and installed on the property by Robert Strombeck and Wallace Tripp.

At the invitation of the Depot Restoration Committee, the NPNP Committee met with them on August 17 and learned of their plans to move and restore the Depot. Our Committee hopes to work closely with this group as their plans for use of the old Depot move forward.

In September we were fortunate to have an offer of a day's work by a dozen college age students from the Dynamy Workshop of Worcester, Mass. These young people tore down an old shack, took down electric wires hanging from trees and shored up the steep gravel bank which was already severely eroded. The students did this in exchange for a chance to learn about the Town History and plans for the future of the town. Following a picnic lunch Mary Hibbard and Lewis Tuttle fascinated the young people with stories of the town's historical background and described how the town is planning for its future.

A Town Forum was held on September 16 to discuss whether swimming should be allowed off the Nature Preserve. This subject had been brought to the attention of the Committee at its July meeting and it was felt we should try to learn as best we could how people in general feel about this subject. After carefully reviewing the discussion at that Forum, and especially taking into account the plan for expanding the existing Town Beach, the Committee continues to recommend that swimming not be allowed off the Nature Preserve property.

At its October meeting, the Committee discussed the advisability of joining with others interested in having Depot Road designated as a "scenic road." After considerable discussion, the Committee sees no objection to this.

On November 7, Almon Seneschal, Robert Strombeck and Thelma Babbitt worked on shoring up the trails along the steep banking. About two-thirds of the steepest part is completed and plans are to finish it in the early spring. Notice of the work day was put in the local papers. The Selectmen asked Harold Stout if he would mark the dead or dying trees needing to be cut. This was done and

arrangements have been made to have these trees removed before next spring in exchange for the wood.

A barrier has been installed to restrict motor vehicles from going beyond that point. This is its only purpose. This Committee strongly urges all residents to use the Nature Preserve often and asks that all suggestions for improvements be relayed to the Committee.

The beach program was quite successful with Leslie Amidon Cass as our new Water Safety Instructor and Christine Bell as Head Life Guard.

The tennis lessons under the instruction of Tammy Vezina and Sara Wenigman had many children participating this year.

The Recreation Area which has gone nameless for so many years was named "The Knowles-Stewart Recreation Area" for the endless hours of volunteer work done by Mert Knowles and Bob Stewart. The plaque hangs in the Town Office building.

The gym now has a reservation chart to avoid conflicts of time, new basketball nets and rims and new lighting.

The Hancock Little League under the direction of Bruce Kierstead and Al Senechal were the Crotched Mountain Junior League Champions with an impressive 14-3 record.

Since last spring, the Hancock Recreation Committee did some extra research on tennis courts and found that if Hancock were to put in two courts at the same time, we could have the second court for \$5,200. If we were to wait a few years, it would cost between \$10,000 and \$15,000 for the second court. Since all of us on the committee felt it was in the best interest of Hancock's taxpayers and tennis players, we decided to go ahead and put in the two tennis courts. Jack Roper and Bruce Kierstead were kind enough to advance the extra \$5,200 to be paid back by future donations. Work on the courts was begun this year and should be completed by early summer 1977.
