

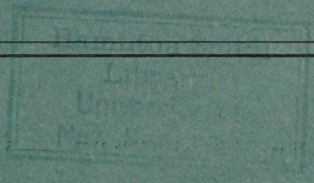

Warrant for Annual Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session, 1905.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the J. A. Tarbell library in addition to that required by law.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial day.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of street lights at South Lyndeboro, or act anything thereon.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes beside the highway, or act anything thereon.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the control of pine blister rust, to be spent in cooperation with the state, or act anything thereon.
9. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, or act anything thereon.
10. To see if the town will vote to instruct the

Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at time of taking inventory April first.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to buy fire fighting equipment, or act anything thereon.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for installing electricity in the J. A. Tarbell Library, or act anything thereon.

14. To see if the town will vote the necessary amount of money to install electric lights in Citizens' hall, the Lafayette Artillery Company agreeing to pay \$100.00 of the installing cost, or act anything thereon.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount of money necessary to buy a new road machine, or act anything thereon.

16. To see if the town will vote to close the following roads subject to gates and bars: the road leading from Harry Richardson's cow pasture bars down the mountain to John P. Proctor's corner so-called; also the road leading from the poplar trees on the French road so-called by the No. 8 school-house site to the road leading from Lyndeboro Center to Francestown, or act anything thereon.

17. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeboro:

I submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

School Organization

Schools opened last September with but one change in the teaching staff. Miss Florence Kidder, after several years of faithful work at the North School, resigned to accept a position in Mont Vernon. In her place we secured Miss Velma Call of Derry, a graduate of Keene Normal School with four years teaching experience. She is doing excellent work. The work in all the schools continues to be satisfactory.

The closing of the Centre School is unfortunate in many respects, but it is neither financially economical nor for the best educational interest of the children to maintain a school of three pupils with no prospect of an increase in the number.

The enrollment is smaller than last year in all of the schools. The per cent of attendance was remarkably good through the fall but has been diminished by an unusual amount of sickness since the Christmas vacation.

The Supply of Trained Teachers

For two or three years the two state normal schools have trained a sufficient number of new teachers in the two-year courses to fill the vacancies occurring in the elementary grade and rural schools, and enough more in the three-year courses to supply the demands of the junior high schools, with a surplus each year large enough to provide a healthy competition.

There is still an inadequate supply of new teach-

ers trained for senior high school positions. About 150 such teachers were needed in the state this year. The University of New Hampshire supplied about 35 of these, and the normal schools for the first time graduated classes in the four-year courses, providing 17 high school teachers. The balance was drawn from other states and was made up of teachers with brief experience and of inexperienced college graduates, in nearly equal numbers.

Supervision

As shown in the statistical report following, I have been able to use a larger proportion of time in school room visits than in some previous years, increasing the number of recorded visits from 76 to 83. A small part of this time and a considerable part of the time required for office work was occupied with a testing program, which included oral reading tests in the first three grades, silent reading tests in the middle grades, and the Stanford Achievement Tests in reading, arithmetic, language, spelling, science, and history. The Stanford Tests were given in October and May last year and in January, 1929.

The results of the three series of tests throughout the supervisory district were tabulated and compared with the published standards for a general comparison. Then pupils who stood particularly low were noted, and the teachers were advised as to which needed special attention and in what subjects. The series of three tests indicate a general advance and the January tests show all of the grades to be up to standard and some as much as 12% above standard. This is a general statement for the whole district and does not mean that every grade in every school is above standard.

Last October a standardized test in silent read-

ing was given throughout the district in grades four to nine, and the results were handled in the same manner as indicated for the Stanford Achievement Tests above. The test was given in order to have a more accurate measure of the reading abilities of these grades than we had at the time I discussed the silent reading program in my last annual report. It was the first attempt at a comprehensive measuring of silent reading abilities so no comparison can be made that will show the amount of gain or loss. Results showed that all the grades tested were somewhat below standard. They provide a basis for determining what remedial work is required for the pupils or grades who were found to be especially low, and also a basis for comparison when the test is repeated later in the year.

Medical Inspection

The required medical inspection was made in October by Dr. Hinds who reports as follows:

Finances

Comparison of the proposed Budget for 1929-1930 with last year's estimate shows a reduction in teachers' salaries because of the closing of the Centre School; a reduction in the estimate for fuel because of the large amount of fuel on hand and contracted for at the present time; and an increase

in the cost of transportation due to the closing of the Centre School.

Under estimated revenue, there is a small increase in state aid and an increase in dog license fees but we are not sure that there will be any elementary tuition and we have not so large a balance in prospect at the close of this school year as we had a year ago.

Of the additional sums recommended, the \$75 for new equipment is to cover additional blackboard at the South School to replace some that is poor, and a set of maps for Johnson Corner. The largest increase in any item is that for high school tuitions. Our estimate last year was \$1200 but the cost is about \$1400. Only one of our high school pupils will graduate this year and there will probably be seven to enter high school next fall.

I appreciate the continued support and loyalty that is manifest in the school organization and among the people of the town.
