

1986 has been another year of population growth and our tax base has increased due to 66 single-family homes and the Scribner Road apartment houses project. This has resulted in only a 42¢ per thousand increase in our tax rate. When the condominium project on Bean Hill Road is completed it will also affect the tax rate.

The engineering on our existing stump dump closing has been completed and we hope to finish that project this year. Our new facility located at the Carr Pit on Sargent Street is also in the final stages of being completed.

This has been a very busy year for both the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment. The Selectmen can never thank enough the members of these boards, including the Budget Committee, for their dedicated service to the Town of Northfield.

This summer the State of New Hampshire will receive bids and award the contract for the construction of the new bridge on Cross Mill Road. Hopefully the project will begin in 1987.

An independent study of the needs of our Police Department was made this year. When the study was completed, with the cooperation of Chief Paul Leary, some changes were instituted in Police policy.

The new fire station on Park Street has been completed, a job well done, thanks to a tremendous effort by the committee members, Firewards, Chief Harbour and everyone in the fire department.

Again, the Board of Selectmen wishes to express its gratitude to all the elected officials, town employees, committee volunteers and residents for their help during 1986.

Warrant For the Two Hundred and Seventh Annual Town Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Northfield Town Hall the tenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers and School District officers for the ensuing year. And on the fourteenth day of March next at ten of the

clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawals from Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as set-offs against the amount indicated, or take any action thereon:

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey to the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council a portion of the Northfield Pines Recreation area being an area described as follows:

"Commencing at a point 60' from the right field corner of the existing base-ball field; thence northerly along Summer Street 200 feet, more or less; thence westerly 280 feet, more or less; thence southerly 200 feet, more or less; thence easterly 280 feet, more or less to the point of beginning."

Containing 1.31 acres, more or less. No more than 12 large pine trees shall be removed from the conveyed area. (By Petition)

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to establish a Capital Reserve Reevaluation Fund; also to include the sum of \$25,000.00 which was appropriated in the 1986 budget.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to establish a Capital Reserve Bridge Fund.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Capital Reserve Bridge Fund the amount of \$19,500.00 to replace the Oak Hill Road Bridge.
 - 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-c

which authorize any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 for the purpose of installing opening windows in the meeting portion of the Town Hall. (By Petition)

9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 466:30-a which make it unlawful for any dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such. (By Ballot)

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Revitalization Association Fund. (By Request)

11. To see if the Town will vote to increase the term of the town road agent from one year to three years, beginning with the term of the town road agent who shall be elected at next year's regular town meeting.

12. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,680.00 to

purchase a computer for the police department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to act as franchising authority for a cable television system franchise under RSA 53-C.

14. To see if the Town of Northfield will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a town administrator. (By Petition)

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget submitted by the Budget Committee, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept, receive and expend any Federal or State funds that may become available to the Town within the fiscal year 1987.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayments of taxes and authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to discount by 2% any amount in taxes due when said taxes are paid within 30 days of the date of billing.
- 19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that may be acquired through the Tax Collector's deeds.
- 21. To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting. The polls shall close not earlier than six of the clock in the evening.

Auditor's Report On Financial Presentation

March 24, 1986

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Northfield Northfield, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Northfield, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1985, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Northfield, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1985, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents, including the supplemental schedule of Federal assistance, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Northfield, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

In the past year, the Cooperative has been working with Signal Environmental Systems in monitoring and assisting the effort of permitting for the proposed resource recovery facility in Concord. The project requires obtaining over twenty-five local, state and federal permits and approvals. At present, two permits are outstanding and these are expected to be granted in 1987.

In December, 1986, the New Hampshire Supreme Court ruled on an appeal by Public Service of New Hampshire of the project's power rate filing determined by the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). The court ruling confirmed the PUC procedures, allowing the resource recovery project to proceed.

In 1987, it is anticipated that the permitting will be completed, the project will be permanently financed, and construction of the 500 ton per day refuse to energy facility will be initiated.

Annual Report of the Northfield Police Department

The Northfield Police Department answered 4,119 calls for service in 1986. A breakdown of activity is submitted and follows this report.

1986 was a busy year for the Police Department. We had a 44% increase in activity over 1985. We added a fifth officer to give Northfield twenty-four hour coverage. We lost a Sergeant to another town, and had another officer leave. It has been a hectic year training three new officers, and still trying to give the people of Northfield the coverage and services they deserve.

As part of the Police Department's effort to keep abreast of changes and training in law enforcement, our officers completed many training sessions, advanced school, and seminars at the New Hampshire Police Academy in Concord, and at other agencies in New Hampshire and Maine during the past year. They are as follows:

Hall Memorial Library Report Public Library for Tilton and Northfield 1986 Report

Many newcomers to the library in 1986, frequently called to ask "Where are you?" Yes, we are on the Northfield side of the river, at Park and Elm Streets, across from the Union Sanborn Elementary School. We serve both Tilton and Northfield as their public library, receiving funds from both towns.

For ten months of the year (Sept.-June) the library is open nine hours a day on weekdays, with a short day on Saturdays (11:00 a.m.-2 p.m.). Summer months, July and August, the library is open five hours a day Monday through Thursday, and 11:00 am.-2 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Regular Story Hours for pre-schoolers and Free Film programs for all ages are held throughout the year.

Children's books, including the special books for pre-schoolers, are very well-used. Adults appreciate the flow of new books, including many best-sellers, the up-to-date encyclopedia, *Current Biography*, and *Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature* (backed up by seven-year-old collections of *Newsweek, Time, U.S. News* and others). We are fortunate in being able to participate in the state-wide inter-library loan system, and the State Library reference department augments our smaller collection. Cook, how-to, history, art and poetry books provide a moveable feast.

During the first quarter of 1986, New Hampshire authors were emphasized, partly due to the librarians' presentation before the Lakes Region Chapter of the NHRTA in Meredith on January 20. Four authors who were emphasized at the meeting and in the library exhibit were: Donald Hall of Danbury, poet laureate of New Hampshire, critic, baseball fan, and author of the ever-popular *String Too Short To Be Saved;* Tomi DePaola of New London, author-illustrator of such children's books at *Strega Nona;* Elizabeth Yates of Peterborough, who writes for older children and adults, noted for her spiritual insight and generosity as well as for her talent; and Morgan Llywelyn, author of *Lion of Ireland* and other Celtic tales, formerly of Intervale.

The high point of the second quarter was the Robert Cormier Open House at the library on April 29. Only the cooperation of six other libraries and the N.H. Council for the Humanities made this opportunity possible. Nancy Conklin of Tilton School spearheaded the meetings, preparing for this visit, and Barbara Powers was co-hostess. Visitors came from some distance to hear the famous young adult author (*Chocolate War* and *Beyond the Chocolate War* are among his books). Cormier answered questions, autographed books, and provided the sixty or seventy who met him at the library with an unforgettable experience.

During the summer a large dinosaur dominated the entrance hall, inviting children to take part in the summer reading program: *Books Are Big Fun!* Over twenty did enthusiastically read and make reports, making them all winners. On August 20 they enjoyed an ice cream party with games, prizes and sharing unusual book reports.

The last quarter provided the "new" time for the annual book sale, held

at the library on October 18. Camille Tolme and other "Friends of the Library" staffed the tables. Marjorie Wentworth of the Poetry Society of New Hampshire provided an eye-catching display to turn our thoughts to Poetry Day (October 15) and Stephen Randall of the Northfield Historical Society brought in an impressive exhibit of *Women at Work*, based on the oral history project by older Warner women recalling a way of life that has radically changed. What stories some of *our* citizens could tell!

The first display of the season was Hummel figurines in January, along with a book on the subject. Marie Tavares organized a display of Native American handicraft in March. *The Friendship Grange* exhibit was lent by Marion Houlihan in April. Arline Sheehan's second grade *Young Authors* had a display of their original books in June. The Christmas tree donated by David Cheever from his Bean Hill lot and the Tilton-Northfield Garden Club's beautiful Christmas wreath made by Clara Hardy added to our holiday cheer. Much appreciation is due all the above, and everyone who contributed to making the library a pleasant and inviting place.
