

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To elect one selectman for three years.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900 to accept Trunk Line maintenance.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for State Aid maintenance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1, of the Revised Statutes on a section of the Central road so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for Town Highway work the sum of \$200 for this purpose.

9. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or hire to accept Federal Aid for construction.

10. To see if the Town will vote to hire a tractor snow plow, and set aside from the amount received by the Town from the tax on automobiles the sum of \$1,000 for this purpose.

11. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a five-ton tractor snow plow, of the Mead-Morrison type. That the money to pay for same be hired by the town and that the money received each year by the town from the tax on automobiles be applied on the note until the note has been paid in full.

That a committee of three be elected to purchase said tractor plow.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to co-operate with the State in Pine Blister Rust eradication.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in excess of the amount required by law for the Northwood Public Library.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the care of cemeteries, as provided by Chapter 30, Laws of 1925.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a Municipal Court.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money to replace temporary loans.

18. To see if the Town will vote to discount 2 per cent. on all property tax paid on or before August 1st.

19. To see if the Town will vote to return to the Highway Agent System and elect three highway agents.

20. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot System to be used at all town elections.

21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all other purposes.

Dear Sir:---

In accordance with the terms of an agreement executed between the town of Northwood, and the New Hampshire Forestry Commission, we are submitting a report of White Pine Blister Rust Control work performed in your town during 1925.

As we believe you and your townspeople will be interested in knowing more of Blister Rust, there is enclosed herewith two circulars recently issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the State Forestry Department. The State publication contains a statement of all control work performed from 1917 to 1924 inclusive. The addition of the 1925 eradication work indicates that a total of 1,587,158 acres have been examined, and that 19,537,775 currant and gooseberry bushes destroyed therefrom.

Since our last report to your town much has been discovered, not only throughout this state, but in others as well, in connection with the extent of infection on white pines and the damage it is capable of causing. In view of these facts, which are too numerous to set forth herewith, the Department feels it would be neglecting its duty if it failed to urge a continuance of this work until all the pine areas of your town have received equal protection.

There is attached to this letter a financial report indicating the expenditures made in your town during 1925 in the eradication of currant and gooseberry bushes. Should there be any information of special interest to you which is not contained in this report, we shall be pleased to further advise you upon request.

We would also suggest that this report be read at town meeting, and such sections as seem advisable included in the annual report of the town.

Gentlemen :---

As requested, I have made an examination of the books and records of the Town of Northwood, for the year ended January 31, 1924, and respectfully submit the following:

I find that the books are kept according to requirements of the New Hampshire Tax Commission and are very neatly and accurately set up.

The Town Clerk should be provided with proper book for recording records of dogs licensed in the town.

Please note comments under tax collectors relative to the advertising and sale of property for taxes. It is my opinion that your collectors should get the delinquents cleaned up and out of the way before Town meeting and I know that the State Commission look with disfavor upon dilatory methods of Collectors in handling this matter. Again nothing is to be gained by extending time to the limit.

As I talked with you when at your office, it is my opinion that your Town Clerk should be provided with proper safe in which to keep the current records of her office, in case of fire the Town records are too valuable to take any chances with. Again there should be provided at your Town Hall suitable vault for the storage of the records of past years. This would not mean a great outlay and might be worth many times its cost. A reinforced concrete or a brick addition built either to the East of your office or inside of the Town house would not be a very expensive proposition. The Town should take deeds for all property purchased by it for taxes, and in case taxes for subsequent years have been paid by the owners, demand for payment of taxes paid by the town should be made and in case of refusal of payment suit should be entered to enforce payment. Where proper notice has not been given to mortgagee the town will be unable to enforce claim against such mortgagee, but can hold against owner and with Tax Collector's deed on record a clear title can not be passed.

In closing I wish to thank all the Town Officers for their aid and co-operation during the audit of the books of the town.

The Collectors should turn in to the Treasurer all Interest collected monthly as other collections are, instead of once a year. The Town should have the funds accounted for in full.

It has not been the practice of the Collectors to note date of payments nor has it been the practice in some cases to note amount of discount allowed or amount of interest collected. The Town auditors should insist on this information being given in full, otherwise there is no way of knowing true amounts collected or allowed as discounts. A collector can under the present method, play favorite with his friends and if so disposed penalize those not in his favor.

While the law allows a Collector until July 1, to prepare and advertise property for sale for non-payment of taxes, he should not allow the matter of collections to hang fire six months, but should advertise and sell so as to have the lists cleaned up before the Town Meeting in March. There are always some taxpayers who allow payments to drag and the Town should have the use of its money. Advertise and sell early.

I have examined the accounts of Oscar F. Cox, Collector of Taxes for the year 1924, and find the same to be correct.

It has not been the practice of the Auditing Committee to examine the books and records of the Town Clerk. I find that the Town Clerk handles Town funds on an average of over two thousand dollars and while the Town is fortunate in having a very efficient clerk, the accounts should be examined and reported as well as all other officers handling Town Funds. The Clerk has turned over to the Selectmen amounts collected as dog licenses and automobile fees less the amount allowed as the Clerk's fees. The full amount received by the Clerk should be accounted for and appear as receipts by the Selectmen. The Selectmen, should draw their warrant in favor of the clerk for any amounts due her thus showing a completed record.

The Law requires Trustees of Trust Funds to keep proper record of all funds in their keeping and render an account of all receipts and disbursements, and to submit their books to the Town auditors. I find that this matter has not in the past received the attention of the auditing committee. Investigation shows that the Trust Funds are invested in the Note of the Town and that the note is renewed year after year. It seems that it would be good business for the Town to make some provision to liquidate this indebtedness by creating a Sinking Fund and by appropriating a small amount each year, say \$500 minimum, in time wipe out this liability.

I find that on page 24 of the Town report that the Selectmen paid John G. Towle as Trustee of Trust Funds interest \$73.76 and on page 23 there were disbursements on account of cemeteries \$232.00. As above

stated the Trustees should keep sufficient books of accounts to show total receipts of interest and disbursements, also any additional funds received during the year and purposes for which trusts were created.

I examined the books and records of Walter C. Chesley, Town Treasurer, and found them correctly cast and properly vouched. As his report is set up in detail in the Annual Report for the year ending January 31, 1925, it seems to me to be unnecessary to reproduce here as it would increase the cost of the report for the year ending January 31, 1926, and would not furnish any additional information.

The books of the selectmen were examined, vouchers checked and found to be in proper form. I wish to state that the methods in use in keeping time of men employed on the roads both on new construction and maintenance are very perfect for the protection of the town and it would be hard to devise a better internal check than that in use. I have not set up a report in detail as there would be nothing gained and the additional cost of printing would be quite an item.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Northwood:

WHERE WERE OUR PUPILS BORN? Born in Northwood, 42%. Born elsewhere in U. S., 53%. Born outside the U. S., 5%.

HOW LONG IS OUR SCHOOL YEAR?

Northwood schools were in session 172 days last year. The elementary schools of New Hampshire had an average school year of 174 days. If we are to give our pupils as many days of schooling as the average boy or girl in New Hampshire receives, two more days should be added. This could be done with no more expense by having two less "no-school" days.

HOW ARE OUR HEALTH PROBLEMS BEING SOLVED?

This year we have joined with Nottingham and the Districts of the Epping Union in employing a school nurse. Besides the work of inspection, she follows up the cases where physical defects need treatment. Nearly three-fourths of the expense of the nurse is refunded to us in state aid, so with very little added cost we profit from the services of a trained and experienced nurse.

Miss Lillian S. Mackintosh is our present nurse.

Tribute should be paid to the Harvey Lake Woman's Club for again sponsoring a dental clinic for our school children. The dentist devoted 63 hours to the work in Northwood, during which time 58 individuals received treatment. While the parents paid for most of the actual work done, the clinic was made possible by the Woman's Club who paid for the rental of the dental outfit, the assistant, and incidental expenses. This amounted to over \$70.

The Woman's Club of Northwood in large measure takes the place of a Parent-Teachers' Association.

IS OUR ATTENDANCE RECORD SATISFAC-TORY?

The average per cent. of attendance of 92.10 is about the same as our record for the past few years, but is over two points below the state average of 94.24.

The total of 481 cases of tardiness for the school year 1924-5 is the poorest showing made in Northwood in a long time. The previous year there were only 189 tardinesses reported, and that was not as good a record as the state average. This low standing is a matter demanding serious consideration.

First: Because the state law says that children shall attend school "during all the time the public schools are in session." If a pupil is absent for the first ten or fifteen minutes of a session, he is not there all of the time, hence the State law has been violated.

Second: A pupil who is tardy in reaching school, is acquiring a very undesirable habit.

Third: Such a large number of tardinesses has a demoralizing effect on the whole school.

This record can be improved only with the cooperation of the parents, so I am urging them to exert every means possible to have their children reach school promptly and thus help improve our tardiness record.

WHAT IS THE CONDITION OF OUR SCHOOL TOILETS?

At both the Ridge and Narrows schools it is often necessary for the pupils to walk through snow or mud and to be out in all kinds of weather in order to go to the toilets. The toilets are of the antiquated, fly breeding kind, not having sealed vaults. In the toilets there is not adequate privacy for the pupils. A number of justifiable complaints have been made by parents about the undesirable features found in our present toilets. In very few homes would toilets be tolerated which had as many objectionable features as are found in our school toilets.

Many school districts are now using chemical toilets. These are installed so as to be accessible without going out of doors. They are free from objectionable orors, privacy is assured, and other evils of the old style toilets are curbed. Installing chemical toilets is a matter well worth the consideration of the voters of this school district.

COE'S ACADEMY

The registration at Coe's Academy is usually in excess of fifty pupils. Of this number thirty or more are residents of Northwood.

The average cost of instruction in the public academies of New Hampshire last year was \$157 per pupil. The average cost of instruction in Coe's Academy was \$104 per pupil. The town of Northwood paid only \$70 per pupil last year for this instruction, and is paying \$80 per pupil this year. It is clear that Northwood is paying far less than the actual cost of instruction, and nothing for the use of the plant, its equipment and maintenance. This is called to your attention that you may appreciate the real service that Coe's Academy renders this town.

The tardiness record at the academy last year was just twice as large as the average tardiness for all of the secondary schools of the state. The fact that the pupils live an average distance of 2.8 miles from the academy may be a partial explanation of this poor record could be made if the parents of all pupils attend-

ord could be made if the parents of all pupils attending the academy, would consider it of supreme importance to have their children start from home early enough to reach school before the opening time.
