ABOUT THE COVER

The many stone walls in the cover picture are typical of those which inspired Plaistow poet Harry Elmore Hurd to write "To Be New Hampshire Bred," *from which the lines of the quotation were taken.

The house was built in 1776 and the cover picture of it was reproduced from the original painting, made about 1800 and still standing on the old fireplace mantel. It is today the home of the Roswell Glovers, passing to them from a Sleeper who had acquired it from the builder, a Pollard.

It is one of only a dozen Revolutionary and Colonial homes remaining in Plaistow.

TOWN WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Pollard School in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the sixth of March, next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation to taxes.
5. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$19,500.00) to cover the cost of both exploratory and test well work to prove in well sites for a municipal water supply. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to construct a parking lot of approximately 6300 square feet, (located between Town Hall and Pollard Avenue, no trees will be cut). (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be set aside and added to the Special Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a new Police Crusier for the Police Department. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to be set aside and added to Special Reserve Fund for the future purchase of new and improved equipment for the Fire Department. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a sixteen (16) grave lot to be known as the Veteran's Lot at the Cemetery, located on Elm Street.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the amount of the Greater Salem Mental Health Association. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Thirteen Thousand, Seven Hundred and Five Dollars (\$13,705.00) towards the start of creating a tax assessing map for the Town of Plaistow, and authorize the withdrawal of Thirteen Thousand, Seven Hundred and Five Dollars (\$13,705.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) to conduct Halloween Parties for all the children of Plaistow. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
14. To see if the Town will vote to increase the size of the Plaistow Conservation Commission from Three members to Five members, and to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one new member to serve for a period of three years and one for a period of two years.
15. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the use of salt and similiar chemicals on the highways within the Town except for dangerous intersections and extreme road conditions as designated by the Selectmen or Road Agent.
16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:
"No herbicide or pesticide shall be used by the Town of Plaistow along public rights of way, easements and water courses, except as may be approved by the Plaistow Conservation Commission."
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to increase the Tax Collectors salary from \$3,500.00 to \$4,000.00 annually. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the moderator to appoint a committee of five citizens for the purpose of making plans for the celebration of the 225th Anniversary of the founding of the Town of Plaistow in 1974.
19. BALLOT STATEMENT

"Are you in favor of adopting the following amendment to the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Plaistow: To rezone the following described area from residential district to a commercial district: The area beginning from the present commercial district opposite Evans Avenue on the east side of

Main Street approximately 500 feet along Main Street to Pollard Road thence running easterly 300 feet along Pollard Road and thence running northerly approximately 500 feet to the easterly border of the Existing commercial zone". (not recommended by the Planning Board)

20. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action of the March, 1954 Annual Town Meeting wherein the voters passed the following article:

Article 10 "To see if the Town will vote to elect by ballot one police officer in the Town to be designated as Chief of Police; said office to appear on the Ballot of the Annual Town Meeting in 1955 and each subsequent year".

21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law:

"No person shall burn out-of-doors any garbage and household, commercial, or industrial waste materials".

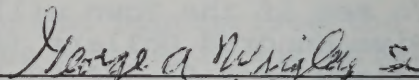

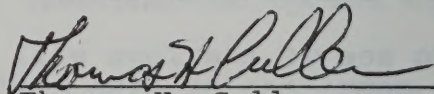
23. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other officers and committees heretofore appointed.

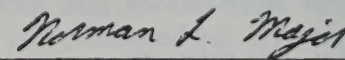
24. To transact any further business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The total valuation of the Town after revaluation by the State Tax appraisers amounted to \$43,971,715.00. The Town closed the year with an unexpended balance of \$50,705.73.

There were 435.5 veterans exemptions and six total disabled exemptions for a total of \$25,375.00. Fifty three elderly exemptions were granted for a total valuation exemption of \$257,809.00.

Work on the Cemetery addition this year included the completion of the section in the rear of the properties on Elm Street as well as the grading of the center section. The Board of Selectmen this year hope to complete the grading of the lots in the new section of the Cemetery.

The Board of Selectmen wish to express their gratitude to Mr. Frank Esty for filling in as acting Chief of Police.

At the present time plans are to use TRA money from the years 1972 and 1973 to correct a bad road condition on Dauntless Lane.

The year 1972 has seen continued growth in our commercial area as is evident by the new construction along Route 125. The State Industrial Development Commission continued to show prospective industrial clients available land in Plaistow in conjunction with the Town Industrial Commission.

The renovation of a section of the Fred Rand Hall into a reading room for the Library and a conference room for use by Town Committees is completed.

After meeting with representatives of twelve engineering firms certified by the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board selected the firm of Fenton Keyes Associates to conduct the Water Feasibility study as voted at the 1972 Town Meeting. The geophysical work performed in Plaistow indicates eight potentially productive areas as sites for water supply wells.

The Annual Town Election will be held on March 6th at the Pollard School. The Town Meeting will be on March 7th at the Timberlane Regional High School.

Residents are reminded to be sure and complete their Real Estate Inventories, as an abatement may not be requested if this has not been complied with. Veterans must have their permanent blue card on file with the Selectmen, and are reminded that although the card is permanent, each year application is made at the bottom of the regular Real Estate Inventory. Anyone knowing an elderly person, seventy years or older, please remind them that their applications must be applied for each year in order to be eligible. All forms must be completed by April 15th.

The Selectmen wish to thank the many people who have served on the various boards, commissions and committees for the many hours given of their time in serving the Towns best interest.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1972, many changes took place within your Fire Department, which have made for a more efficient organization. The most important change was the purchase and installation of the radio alert alarm system. It consists of a base transmitter and 38 receiving units; one for each fireman. Each call is transmitted, and alerts all firemen to the location and type of emergency. The new alarm system was put into service for the first time on October 1, and provides Plaistow with one of the most comprehensive alarm communications systems in the area. The use of this modern system has drastically reduced response time and has permitted us to institute a system utilizing company response for minor problem calls. This has reduced costs while increasing efficiency. It is extremely flexible, and many far reaching advantages will be realized from its proper usage. Many thanks to the Plaistow Firemen's Association and Women's Auxiliary, the "False Alarms" for their generous monetary contributions which made the purchase of a complete system possible.

For many years, the fire calls have been handled by an answering service in Haverhill. On December 1, this service was sold, which necessitated our changing to another answering service. Deep gratitude is extended to Mrs. Marie Robertson and her operators, who for many years have so ably served the townspeople of Plaistow. We wish her well in her retirement. The new answering service is extremely well qualified to handle your emergency calls, and in addition, provides us with area radio coverage which has already proved invaluable.

Another important change is in the organizational structure. Each elected Fire Engineer has been given administrative responsibilities, in addition to his line duties. An Inspector and Training Instructor have been appointed from within the Department to assist the officers in these areas.

An adequate water supply is essential for fire-fighting purposes, and we are continuing the program of installing dry hydrants at strategic locations. Thanks are extended to Mr. and Mrs. Allan MacKenzie and Mrs. Robert French for making it possible to install a dry hydrant at the corner of Massasoit Boulevard and West Pine Street. Thanks also to Mr. Robert Rauh for permitting the installation of a water hole and dry hydrant on Lower Road. These two hydrants installed this year afford greater protection in these areas.

The number of calls answered by your Department increased 30% over 1971, but our losses have been substantially reduced. Nationally published statistics show that 80% of all fires can be prevented. We must strengthen our inspection program and enforce existing state laws, and adopt the proposed occupancy permit, in order to provide for the safety of persons who occupy our buildings.

We have worked on a two-fold program of fire suppression and fire prevention. Relative to fire suppression, many men have attended Fire School at Fitzwilliam, and all firemen are currently enrolled in a fire-fighting course conducted by certified state instructors. In addition, we have initiated a program of pre-planning for response to fires. In the area of fire prevention, we have inspected many homes and businesses, and have worked with the Building Inspector, and Planning Board. We have recommended the adoption of an occupancy permit, and the numbering of all buildings in town. We have recommended to Timberlane Regional School Board the installation of a fire-alarm circuit, and development of a water hole on Line Brook.

With continued activities in these areas, we hope to be able to provide a more efficient department, and a safer environment.

I would like to commend our men for their outstanding teamwork and enthusiasm in their unselfish dedication to the preservation of lives and property of our citizens. I would also like to thank you the public, for your continued support.

REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

PLANTING:

This year, as in past years, the town financed the planting of trees along our roadsides to help offset the tree loss resulting from disease, age, and damage. This year's planting consisted of ten maple trees plus ten flowering trees.

SPRAYING:

Following the advise of the State Entomology Department, the only chemical applied by the town in 1972 was a dormant spray of roadside elm trees for control of the Dutch Elm Disease. This spraying is applied in early spring to minimize damage to wildlife. The chemical used is not a "hard" pesticide in that its effect is not cumulative.

INSECT PROBLEMS:

The only major insect problem incurred in 1972 was that of the "Fall Webworm". Although often confused with the Gypsy Moth, the Fall Webworm is relatively non-damaging to trees despite the fact that it is very unsightly.

TREE REMOVAL:

In addition to tree removal work accomplished by the State Highway Department and Exeter and Hampton Electric Company, the town removed sixteen dead or damaged trees this past year. Nine of these trees were along State roads while the remaining seven were along Town roads.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Ammendments to the Zoning Ordinances of the Town, as proposed by the Planning Board, were voted favorably at Town Meeting. These included additions to Article 5 (stables and two family dwellings), adoption of N.H. RSA 36.19A (non residential site review) and adoption of Building Codes.

A \$10,000 appropriation for a water feasibility study was voted by the Town. The Board of Selectmen, working jointly with the Planning Board, undertook an extensive, interview screening program. From a list of 33 engineering firms, 10 were invited for interviews. A second series of interviews were conducted with 3 of these firms selected as most suitable for the Town's water study. The engineering firm of Fenton G. Keyes Associates, Nashua, N. H., was chosen and contracted to make the water feasibility study.

Non-residential site approvals, totaling 11, were granted.

There were no subdivision approvals granted during the year. However, activity in subdivision planning was substantial. One major subdivision was delayed due to severe surface water and drainage problems. Several site visits were conducted by the board during the year, relating to these difficulties. At the close of the year, subdivisions effecting approximately 100 lots were pending approval.

Acute interest to the Planning Board, and the Town, is the projected population figures spelled out in the comprehensive planning report submitted by the Southern Rockingham Regional Planning District Commission. Plaistow, by 1980, is expected to attain a population of 6700. In 1970, we were 4712. At the end of 1972, we were 5135. We have approached 21.3% of the projection on 20% of the time. This indication of steady growth demands that we adhere to sound, critical planning procedures.

REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Public hearings were held on the last Monday of each month during the year. Executive sessions and meetings for purposes of making inspections were held at other times as were deemed necessary. There were no changes in board membership during the course of the year but there were additions. These were in the form of alternates. In October the following alternates were appointed by the Selectmen: John A. Palmer, Edward D. McKenzie and George W. Colby. With these alternates available to us it is unlikely that we will have to cancel any of our hearings at the last minute as we have had to in the past.

Another significant development during the year with regard to the functioning of this board was the defeat at the polls of the Planning Board's proposed amendment to Article 7 paragraph 1 of the zoning ordinance. This amendment would have disallowed anything but industry in an industrial zone, a situation which this board did not favor. The other amendments which were passed, especially the adoption of the Boca Basic Building Code will be of great help to us however. This is mainly because of it's comprehensiveness. In the past many difficult decisions have been left up to the board of adjustment simply because there was no ordinance to cover it.

The printed forms will be available again this year for applying for a hearing. They are available at the Selectmen's Office, from the Building Inspector or from the Secretary of this board.

REPORT OF THE
SOUTHERN ROCKINGHAM REGIONAL PLANNING DISTRICT COMMISSION

In 1972, the Southern Rockingham Regional Planning District Commission, which is composed of the member Towns of Hampstead, Kingston, Plaistow, Salem and Windham, engaged in various aspects of regional planning.

The five member-towns with a population of 33,145 persons represents some 84.9 percentage of the total regional population. By reaching this representation plus other conditions established by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Region was certified for area jurisdiction. A minimum area population percentage of 75 percent in the member towns must be met if the Region is to be certified. In order to receive many Federal grants the Region must be certified for area jurisdiction and comprehensive planning. In June 1972, the Region was certified in both areas after it submitted its initial Regional Plan of Development. Certification means that the Region has been able to answer in a satisfactory manner a series of questions and requirements established by Congress and/or HUD. Due to the certifications received in June 1972, which must be renewed in July 1973, all Towns in the Region were eligible to receive Federal grants. In June 1972, the Town of Salem received a water grant of some \$288,000. Grant requests are now pending for the Towns of Plaistow and Salem relative to open space acquisition or development for park purposes. Other Towns are urged to work with the Region to obtain Federal grants if this is their desire. Non-member Towns of the Region will not receive HUD grants for water and sewer improvements.

As part of the area jurisdiction approval, the Region is eligible to conduct A-95 Review and Comments. This means that all requests for Federal grants by Town, County, State or Federal agencies within the Southern Rockingham Region must be submitted to the Regional Commission for their review and comment prior to State or Federal action. An adverse regional commission comment can be the basis for a rejection of a community's grant request.

The Regional Commission is continuing its work of developing a Regional Plan and will have the open space component completed by June 1973. Other aspects of the plan will be up-dated so that necessary certifications can be continued. The introduction of revenue sharing will not eliminate those Federal grant programs most needed in the Region, such as water and sewer grants. The Region has made available to all member communities the services of its consultant, who works with selectmen, planning boards and conservation commissions on problems facing their Towns. In 1973, the Region will hire a full-time Regional Planner in order to maintain its eligibility for Federal regional planning funds. In Federal fiscal year 1973 the Region, which is now a member of Sub-State Planning District Number Six by Executive Order of Governor Peterson, will receive \$28,000 in Federal planning grants and \$4,000 in State

planning grants. Thus, even while it has increased the volume of planning work and assistance coming out of the Region, the cost to the member communities is approximately one-half of the 1972 budget request. Monies not used in 1972 have not been requisitioned by the Regional Treasurer. For 1973, the Region requests a continuation of the 75 cents per capita for each Town based upon the 1970 Federal Census. It is anticipated that the Region will only need some 35 to 40 cents of this per capita amount, but it is necessary to request the entire amount since Federal funds have a tendency not to arrive on time, or the possibility always exists that they may not be forthcoming in any given year.

The Regional Commission believes that regional planning in the Southern Rockingham Region is progressing at a satisfactory pace. That it is meaningful and productive since it permits member communities to plan together, exchange information and to discuss mutual development problems. At the same time, it offers an opportunity to provide Federal grants to those Towns that elect to go after them. The Regional Commission believes that even greater advances in regional planning will occur in 1973, with the availability of a full-time professional planner.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Plaistow Conservation Commission was established in March, 1972 by vote at the annual Town Meeting. There are three members on the Commission although it is hoped this will be increased to five at the 1973 Town Meeting.

A grant of \$75.00 was received from the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commission (NHACC) to be used as "seed money". Sixty five dollars was used to pay the 1972 dues to this association by the Plaistow Conservation Commission.

Most of the efforts of the Plaistow Conservation Commission to date have been directed towards establishing goals for the group. Meetings were held with other conservation commissions, the executive secretary of the NHACC, the Soil Conservation Service, and interested townspeople. Considerable effort was extended towards pursuing the possibility of using the town-owned land on Mt. Misery to create a "Town Forest" for Plaistow. Although this project has not been abandoned, a major obstacle appears to be determination of the location of the land in question. It is hoped that some interested townspeople might be willing to serve on a committee to pursue the matter further.

A wetlands map of Plaistow was prepared for the Plaistow Conservation Commission by the Soil Conservation Service. A worth while project for the future will be to transcribe this information to a map which can be made available to the Planning Board or any other interested people.

The Commission presented two articles to the Board of Selectmen for inclusion in the 1973 Town Warrant. These two articles are aimed at restricting the use of pesticides and road salt by the town.

It should be pointed out that the Plaistow Conservation Commission is an advisory group, not a regulatory one. Its main goal is the preservation of Plaistow's natural resources.
