To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grade School Auditorium in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the oiling of streets.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for state aid construction, or town maintenance in cooperation with the state.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for expense of the District Nurse.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Plymouth Hospital.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Band Concerts during the summer of 1943 by the Plymouth Community Band.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of the Plymouth Common.
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for sidewalks.
14. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
15. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
17. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for additional fire and police protection due to the war emergency.
19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The two principal increases in 1942 expense over 1941 were power and light and insurance. Power costs were greater due to practice blackouts and numerous alarm fires, causing long operating periods of our air pump. Insurance expense was greater due to re-scheduling all policies to provide equal liability coverages on all equipment and of adequate amounts to protect the precinct from collision, fire and public liability losses.

Fire helmets ordered in 1942 for our firemen have arrived in February 1943 and expense for these is included in 1943 new equipment. Other essential replacements and additions to equipment will be made only if war conditions warrant.

In addition to 39 chimney fires and 6 still alarms, the Department responded to 5 box alarms during the year and 4 out-of-town calls for assistance as well as 2 out-of-precinct fires. January 1943 gave the Department one of the busiest months for years with the major conflagrations including the Kidder Building fire and the North Woodstock call for assistance.

Again we urge all property owners and town residents to keep a constant vigil against fire. Premises must be kept clear of rubbish and all must use good sense in operating heating and electrical equipment. Danger from fire is ever present.

FIRE PREVENTION PAYS.

Sidewalk Department

With a budget of \$500.00 for new construction in 1942, a sidewalk of good quality and width was laid from Langdon Street to Highland Avenue, on the north side of Highland Street.

The Commissioners feel that for the year of 1943, wartime labor and tax conditions warrant a budget of only \$100.00 for this department, to care for such repairs as may be needed on existing sidewalks.

Sewer Department

This Department is heavily burdened with debt and has no operating income other than from taxation. During the year of 1942 the department expended, as authorized by two Precinct meetings, a total of \$5,804.77 on new constructions, principal project being the new trunk line sewer from the junction of Rumney Road and Livermore Road to the Baker River along the south side of U. S. Route 3. Difficulties of this construction were many as cave-ins were frequent and rain was continuous during construction. The line was built to rigid specifications and will be an asset to that section for years to come.

The Treasurer's report on the page following is self explanatory, indicating a need for a budget of \$4,500.00 to be used as follows: \$2,500.00 to be used to retire 50% of bank loan, \$1,000.00 for payment of bonds, \$1,000.00 for repair of sewers and payments of interest on the debt for the year.

A test for hearing was given with the audiometer in December 1942. 280 children were tested and 8 were found to have a definite loss of hearing. These were taken to a doctor for examination, which bill will be paid by the Red Cross.

An accident case which had to have X-rays and treatment was taken care of financially by the American Legion, the Legion Auxiliary and the Woman's Club.

Milk is being furnished at a small cost per day and hot lunches are served in the High School which has helped greatly with the nutrition problem.

We expect to have the usual dental and tonsil clinics in the spring.

The interest of the parents, children, teachers and organizations is greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Plymouth School District:

The sixth annual report of the Superintendent of Schools is herewith submitted and the statistical tables follow.

The report of the Headmaster of the High School sets forth the activities of that school. Despite war conditions and loss of two teachers during the present year the academic work of the school is progressing well and there are considerable more valuable extra curricular activities than last year. The teachers have cooperated splendidly in the war movements particularly in various ration registrations and processing of oil. They have rendered a genuine patriotic service in many hours of tedious work, and it is recognized by the Administration of the schools. The Teachers College instructors likewise have cooperated in these registrations and it has been a great pleasure to work in such an atmosphere of patriotic service.

The New Grade School under the direction of the Plymouth Teachers College is operating in an efficient manner. In addition to the regular work the children of the district have the advantage of the facilities of the College. The teaching staff is strong and capable and the instruction very progressive but tempered with common sense. Since the first of the year, Penny Milk has been furnished to the children. The children pay a penny a half pint for delivery and the federal government pays most of the cost of the milk, the difference being paid by the district. Since the last report the children gave the operetta "Hansel and Gretel" in the Auditorium and made a substantial contribution to the Junior Red Cross Service Fund.

Last winter successful 8-week Courses of Metal Working and Electricity were given at the Model School Building for Out of School Youth in the Plymouth area. The teachers were Lawrence Hunt and Norman F. Wade. This winter another Course started Decem-

ber 14 and is being repeated now with advanced work for those ready to take it. All these Courses are financed by the federal government. There is considerable equipment which it has been intimated would be left here after the war if it is apparently being used to good purpose.

There is an article in the warrant to put a few courses of Vocational training into the Plymouth High School curriculum. This has long been recommended by the Headmaster and is more than ever in the trend of Modern education during and after the present war. A number of boys are struggling with indifferent success in academic work that would do well in some form of vocational training. Many of the pupils are from rural homes and would succeed in a course in Agriculture. The courses in Vocational training can well be conducted in the basement and first floor of the Model School where the federal adult schools previously mentioned are being conducted. Arrangements might be made to use this equipment. Experience shows that the building must be heated to preserve it. At present only the basement and first floor are occupied. The possibility of using the entire building with the Teachers College and sharing maintenance might well be explored. Such an arrangement would give the college an opportunity to offer courses in Practical Arts, Agriculture or other service needs of these unusual times.

The Budget is large, but necessary to keep up the two plants in good condition. The High School is an old building and requires considerable outlay on repairs every year. We are advised that major repairs must be made on the High School plant heating system and concrete walk to the New Grade School Auditorium. The frost raised it so that some of the doors in winter cannot be opened and makes a real danger in case of fire when exits are not available. It may be that if the concrete approach were abandoned and crush rock installed the frost heave would not effect the doors. The windows of the New Grade School should be caulked and be furnished with weatherstripping to save fuel.

The Budget provides for increases in salaries to meet the high cost of living. Many municipalities are doing this and this district cannot expect to retain its present competent staff unless it follows in the same course. Capable teachers in general cannot be expected to stay on here at less remuneration than other places. If good teachers go where their services are appreciated in salary it simply means in a short time the faculty will be composed of inexperienced teachers and those who have rendered their best service elsewhere. We must not let education deteriorate during the war. It is needed more than ever and especially during the post-war period. If good teachers are not granted adequate salaries they generally leave and the ones who lose are the children. Our boys and girls will have to compete with those children of municipalities who keep abreast of the times and steer a straight course of first class schools during the war. I have always had faith in this district when school matters were set fairly in this district before the general public.

I am firmly convinced that the majority of people desire to keep the educational standards high.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my fourteenth annual report as Headmaster of Plymouth High School.

First Honor	Jean E. Dole
Second Honor	Dorothy E. Libbey
Third Honor	Mary E. Avery

A class of sixty received diplomas at the graduation exercises which were held on Friday morning, June twelfth, at ten A. M., in the New Auditorium. The reception to the graduates was held in the evening at the same place.

Eleven of this class enrolled in the Plymouth Teachers College, two in the University of New Hampshire, nine in other post secondary institutions, while three did post graduate work at Plymouth High School. Eight members have enlisted in the armed forces.

Approval

The Plymouth High School enjoys the privilege of certifying of students to the University of New Hampshire and to the Plymouth and Keene Teachers Colleges. It is also approved by the New England College Entrance Examination Board which allows it to send students to other colleges on certification.

To be certified a student must show by his high school work that he is ready and capable of doing college work. Regular attendance and conscientious application to the work develops this ability.

New Teachers

There were four changes made in the teaching staff for the year 1942 to 1943 besides the addition of a special teacher in music.

Miss Mary Alyce McCushing, a graduate of Keene Teachers college and a student at Columbia Summer School, replaced Miss Mary M. Roche in the English Department. Miss Louise Pulsifer, Plymouth High School, '35, and University of New Hampshire, '40, was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Thelma Ricker, in the domestic science department. Miss Eleanor Stuart, a graduate of Colby College and a member of a summer school at Middlebury, took the place of Eloise Jenkins in the French and Spanish department. Miss Mary L. Watson, a graduate of Salem Teachers College, replaced Evelyn Nelson, in the commercial department. Miss Violet Nardone, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music and Radcliffe was added to the staff as a special teacher of Music. Miss Nardone has started a good sized chorus, an orchestra, and a course in the appreciation of music.

Mr. George H. Dawson became a member of the Army of the United States in December. Mr. Dawson has been a teacher in our school for several years and has been an inspirational leader and teacher. Due to the fine cooperation of the other members of the staff and the election of Mr. Richard A. Messer of Plymouth as basketball coach, Mr. Dawson's work has been continued in a very efficient manner.

Activities

A dramatic club under the supervision of Miss McCushing; a French and Spanish Club under Miss Stuart and a Latin Club under Miss Flint have been organized this year. These with the other activities have given the students a broader opportunity to participate in some phase of school life. The reference library under Miss Billings of the English Department has been renovated and rearranged to meet the needs of both the teacher and pupil.

Recommendation

To meet the needs of the community, I again recommend that manual training for boys be introduced this next September.

I wish to thank you, Superintendent McCurdy, the School Board, the Citizens, the Teachers and pupils for the fine support and cooperation which I have received during the past year.
