WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th of March at one o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article 1.

You are also hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Wednesday, March 13th at seven-thirty in the evening to act on Article 2 and subsequent articles.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would be of benefit to the town.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to previous owner, or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any or all bids.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept and expend the Highway Block Grant in the amount of \$10,243.56 for the maintenance and upgrading of Town Roads.
7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Town Hall improvements.
8. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund the sum of \$4,500 to replace the Town Hall Roof.
9. To see if the Town will join the Rockingham Planning Commission and appropriate the sum of \$447.30 for this purpose.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$188.00 for the support of the Rockingham Community Action Program.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of Rockingham Child & Family Services.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$710.97 for the dump closure plan of the Town of Kingston.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to retain the services of Mr. Robert Backus, Attorney at Law, to represent the Town with regard to the adequacy of off-site emergency planning.
14. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to allow the Library Trustees to renovate the existing fire Station into a library.
15. To see if the Town will vote to release the William N. Crosby Library Building Fund, The Public Library Building Fund, and the Mary J. Currier Library Trust Fund to the Library Trustees for Designated purposes.
16. To see if the Town, out of concern for the health and safety of its citizens, will instruct its selectmen and other appropriate public officials to work cooperatively with the New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency and other involved State agencies to help improve the Town's draft Emergency Response Plan which has been prepared in order to protect the public in the event of an accident at Seabrook Station or any emergency such as a major fire, flood, storm or toxic spill and, in so doing, to participate in the exercise conducted in cooperation with State and Federal officials to test the plan. This article is not intended to constitute final approval by the Town of the draft Emergency Response Plan. Upon petition of Edward Condon and twelve other registered voters.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to support the

Hazardous Waste Collection Day organized by the Rockingham Planning Commission.

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to dispose of surplus Town property.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
SOUTH HAMPTON, N.H.
March 13th & 14th, 1984

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held on March 13th, 1984 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator Horace Cressy. John Santosuosso moved that the polls be opened, seconded by Audrey Miller and so voted. Ballot clerks for the election day were Herbert Dodge, Francis Smith, Calvin Eaton, Helen Smith and Annette Krafton. A total of 216 votes were cast out of 499 registered voters.

ARTICLE 1 - Town Officers were elected as follows:

Town Clerk, Carol A. Baker, 3 yrs, 206 votes, elected
Selectman, 3 yrs., Anne W. Verge, 176 votes, elected
Treasurer, 1 yr., Theodore Morse, Jr., 189 votes, elected
Auditor, 1 yr., Lutz Wallem, 19 write-in votes
Auditor, 1 yr., Jewell Currier, 12 write-in votes
Auditor, 1 yr., Robert Fraser, 24 write-in votes
Auditor, 1 yr., Vincent Early, 6 write-in votes
Auditor, 1 yr., Peter Bryant, 11 write-in votes
Highway Agent, 1 yr., Scott Dixon, 70 votes
Highway Agent, 1 yr., John Santosuosso, 142 votes, elected
Trustee of the Trust Fund, 3 yrs., Charles N. Dennett, 197 votes, elect.
Trustee of the Library, 3 yrs., Madeliene Burrill, 194 votes, elected
Constable, 1 yr., Stephen F. Jordan, 166 votes, elected

Sworn in at open meeting by the Moderator were: Anne Verge, Selectman; Stephen Jordan, Constable; Gary Crosby, Supervisor of the Checklist; John Santosuosso, Highway Agent; Carol Baker, Town Clerk; Margaret Miller, School Board Member. Horace Cressy, Moderator, was sworn in by the Town Clerk.

The following evening on March 14th, 1984, Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. Constable Stephen Jordan led the townspeople in the Salute to the Flag. The remaining articles were voted on as follows:

walter Shivik, Selectman, made a motion that non-voters, such as Police Chief Query, be allowed to speak if called upon, seconded by Brian Turbity and voted in the affirmative.

Anne Verge, Selectman, moved that Marise Fraser, Library Trustee, be permitted to withdraw Article X as donations of materials and labor had been supplied.

It was noted that in accordance with the Budget Law Act the total amount that can be passed at this meeting is \$114,712.53.

ARTICLE II - Anne Verge, Selectman, made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$92,859. to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, seconded by Walter Shivik. Anne then went over the Town budget line-by-line. Margaret Kiely asked that a Budget Committee member speak on the amount not recommended for the Police Department budget. Ernest Bonah, speaking for the committee, felt the Town could do with just two additional officers rather than the four planned. Peter Oldak moved that the controversial items be voted on first in order listed in the Warrant on Article II, seconded by Tim Corbett and so voted. Walter Shivik asked Chief Query to explain the increase in the Police Department Budget. Mr. Query estimated expenses - \$7,800 for salaries, \$5,200 for supplies and maintenance of the cruiser. Fred Lindahl moved to amend the sum for the Police Department Budget to \$6,500, seconded by Fred Kozacka. The amendment was defeated. Peter Oldak moved to amend the Police Department Budget to \$11,000, seconded by William Brunet. The amendment passed. Ed Condon, Fire Chief, briefly explained the Fire Department Budget. Robert Fraser moved to accept the Fire Department Budget of \$6,000, seconded by William Carey and so voted. John Santosuosso moved to accept the General Highway Budget of \$12,000, seconded by Paul Morris. Paulette Morse amended the motion to the sum of \$10,000 seconded by Ed Condon. The amendment was voted and passed. Marise Fraser, Library Trustee, made a motion to accept the Library Budget of \$5,039, seconded by Cary Mason and so voted. Michael Santosuosso amended the Town Budget sum to \$90,859, including \$2,000 increase in Winter Maintenance, seconded by Peter Bryant. Peter Oldak moved that the change in Budget be voted on as a line item, seconded by William Courtney. The motion and second were withdrawn. Michael Santosuosso moved to amend the Highway Department Winter Maintenance Budget to the sum of \$12,000, seconded by Peter Bryant and so voted. Michael Santosuosso made a motion to accept the Town Budget of \$90,859. as amended, seconded by William Courtney. The amended article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE III - Walter Shivik, Selectman, made a motion to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500. for Town Hall improvements, seconded by Anne Verge and so voted.

ARTICLE IV - Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for

and receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would benefit the Town." Anne Verge, Selectman, moved to accept the article as read, seconded by Fred Kozacka and so voted.

ARTICLE V - Michael Santosuosso, Selectman, made a motion to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes, seconded by Brian Turbity and so voted.

ARTICLE VI - Anne Verge, Selectman, moved to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to previous owner, or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any or all bids, seconded by William Courtney and so voted.

ARTICLE VII - John Santosuosso made a motion to see if the Town will vote to accept and expend the Highway Block Grant-in Aid in the amount of \$9,041.41 for the maintenance and upgrading of Town Roads. This grant replaces the TRA and Highway Subsidy funds. The motion was seconded by Ed Condon and so voted.

ARTICLE VIII - Walter Shivik, Selectman, moved that the article be adopted as written "To see if the Town will vote to close the Police Cruiser Replacement Fund and return the amount of \$810.49 to the General Fund." The motion was seconded by Anne Verge. John Gamble questioned why it should be closed. Walter replied that Chief Query felt the fund was set up illegally and it would be best to return it to the Town. Edward Condon amended the article to transfer the \$810.49 to the Police Department for work on the cruiser engine, seconded by Tim Corbett and so voted. The amended article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE IX - Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless for loss or damage occurring after said vote any person employed by it and any member or officer of its governing board, administrative staff or agencies including but not limited to selectmen, school board members, from personal financial loss and expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit, or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was acting in the scope of his employment or office as set forth in RSA 31:105, Laws of New Hampshire." Anne Verge moved that the article be accepted as written, seconded by Bob Pearson. Anne explained briefly this covers property damage only and would be a small increase in cost. The motion was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE X - Marise Fraser, Library Trustee, made a motion to withdraw Article X as the materials for the Library shelving had been donated by C. P. Building Supply and John Gamble installed them. Brian Turbity seconded and it was so voted.

ARTICLE XI - Walter Shivik, Selectman, moved that the Town join the Rockingham Planning Commission and authorize the Town's representation and appropriate the sum of \$478.80 for this purpose and explained the benefits to the Town. Ed Condon seconded the motion and it was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XII - The Moderator read the article "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$253. for the support of the Rockingham Community Action Program, Inc." Walter Shivik, Selectman, moved that the article be adopted as read and commented on the services provided - fuel assistance, weatherization, day-care, etc. William Carey seconded and it was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIII - Michael Santosuosso, Selectman, moved to withdraw the article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750. for the support of the Seacoast Mental Health Center, Inc. as the Town has had no reports from the service to justify the expense, seconded by William Brunet and so voted.

ARTICLE XIV - The Moderator read the article "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purpose of the acquisition and purchase of a Class A, 750 gallon per-minute Pumper Fire Truck and related equipment, such sum to be raised for the first payment of \$3,000. from the 1984 budget and the remainder of \$9,000. from the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated), with a payment schedule of \$3,000. per year plus interest. Interest to be set at the time of the loan!" Edward Condon, Fire Chief, moved to accept the article as read, seconded by Paul Morris. It was brought up that there was only \$11,580.32 left to be appropriated. Laurence Baker moved to amend the article to read the sum of \$11,580.32, including interest, be raised and appropriated, seconded by Burt Stackhouse. The amendment was voted and passed. William Carey moved to table Article XIV and move on to Article XV because of the limited funds, seconded by Peter Bryant. The motion lost. A secret ballot was taken on the amended motion and passed - 60 Yes, 22 No.

ARTICLE XV - Fred Anderson amended the article to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to spend at their discretion legal funds required to prevent the construction of high voltage power lines which threaten South Hampton's Historic Districts, seconded by William Carey. The amendment and second were withdrawn. Fred Anderson moved the article as written appropriating the sum of \$3000, seconded by William Carey. It was voted and defeated. Fred then amended the article to instruct the Selectmen to spend at their discretion legal funds required to prevent the construction of high voltage power lines which threaten South Hampton's Historic Districts, seconded by William Courtney and voted in the affirmative. The amended article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE XVI - The Moderator read the article "To see if the Town of South Hampton shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representatives and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of South Hampton, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire. (By petition of 10 or more voters.)" Brian Griset moved that the article be accepted as written, seconded by Cathy Silver and so voted.

ARTICLE XVII - The Moderator read the article "To see if the Town shall change the method of selection of police from appointment by Selectmen to election of the people. (By petition of 10 or more voters.)" Janice McDonough amended the article to have chief inserted after police, seconded by Fred Lindahl. The amendment was voted and passed. The amended motion was voted by secret ballot and lost - 9 Yes, 65 No.

ARTICLE XVIII - Transaction of Other Business:

Donald Helen made a motion to send a note of appreciation to C & P Building Supply, Inc. for donating the lumber for the Library shelves and John Gamble for the labor. Voted in the affirmative.

John Gamble moved to vote not to accept the Nuclear Power Plant Evacuation Plan until all emergency communication needs are met at no cost to the Town of South Hampton, N.H., seconded by Richard Verge and so voted.

Fred Anderson made a motion to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to notify Representative Quimby and the other members of the House Commerce, Housing & Consumer Affairs Committee that the Town fully supports Bill 439 which would protect its historic districts and those of other cities and towns. The motion was seconded by William Carey and voted in the affirmative.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:15.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

SOUTH HAMPTON, N.H.

September 18th, 1984

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of South Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs, held on September 18th, 1984 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. He then read the Warrant.

Article I - The Moderator read article "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000. for the purchase of a new police cruiser and to authorize the Selectmen to issue such note or notes and determine the rate of interest to be paid thereon and any other terms as may be necessary to accomplish the purchase of said police cruiser, all as shall be in the best interests of the Town of South Hampton."

Pam Martin moved that this motion be postponed for an indefinite time, seconded by Rita Martin.

Walter Shivik, Selectman, made a motion that Chief Query be allowed to speak on behalf of the Police Department, seconded by Vincent Early and so voted.

Vincent Early made an announcement for Mr. Wallem who is investigating the possibility of procuring a new Audi, 4-wheel drive, free to the Town for a police vehicle. Mr. Early also questioned Police Chief Query on statement appearing in "Newburyport News" after Budget Hearing. Mr. Query did not recall making the statement.

James Miller asked why Mrs. Martin wanted the article postponed. Pam Martin felt we should wait to hear from Mr. Wallem regarding a free car.

Fred Anderson asked who would decide to postpone the meeting. Moderator answered that a majority vote was needed.

Neil Courtney suggested keeping options open in case Mr. Wallem is unable to get car.

Judy Shivik asked if motion postponed would we have to call another Special Town Meeting? Moderator answered there would have to be a vote on the money again. David Riecks stated we should leave options open. Walter Shivik said that if the sum is passed and not expended, money would stay in the general fund.

Herbert Dodge asked what it costs to hold a Special Town Meeting. Walter Shivik estimated \$50.

Calvin Eaton recommended we vote by Secret Ballot. Moderator said "Chair" would demand a secret ballot on controversial articles.

Michael Santosuosso, Selectman, commented he would not like to see meeting postponed. Would like to know feelings of the Town. Postponing would not resolve anything.

Vincent Early, Budget Committee Member, stated Budget Committee recommended \$5,500. based on a straw vote taken at Public Hearing.

James Miller asked - how desperately do we need a car? Any specific car in mind? Mr. Shivik answered Police Department has taken present cruiser off road because it is not functional or safe. Chief would begin process at Warehouse for Cruisers - send a mechanic down to evaluate car - probably take a couple of weeks.

Sally Bryant asked if we vote the money could we conceivably have two cruisers? Mr. Shivik stated Selectmen would clarify with Mr. Wallem before purchasing a cruiser.

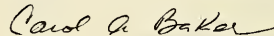
Vincent Early felt Mr. Wallem is quite sure of donation.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

1984 was a strange year for the South Hampton Police Department. Chief William Battles resigned on January 1, 1984, and I was asked by the Board of Selectmen to take the job of Chief of Police.

In March we hired four new Officers bringing our number of Officers to seven. Three of the new Officers were untrained, and the fourth was a highly trained, certified full-time Officer presently working for the Seabrook Police Department. She was appointed the field training officer for the Department, and introduced a program of in-service training.

In July the Department was selected by the State of New Hampshire to conduct the Part-time Officers' Certification Program. This was a one hundred hour course attended by officers from all over Rockingham County. This was a high honor that gave the Department some much needed, and well-deserved, recognition.

This training led to more training courses for our Department personnel at the New Hampshire Police Academy in Concord; still more courses will be available to our Officers in the future.

At this time the South Hampton Police Department is one of the best trained part-time departments in the state. The Department has two State-certified training officers, one State-certified Juvenile officer, an Intoximeter operator, two State-certified DWI Detection officers, a State-certified radar operator and a State-Certified firearms instructor. The Department also has the services of a full-time detective with the University of New Hampshire and a full-time Court prosecutor with the Seabrook Police Department.

This is a tremendous amount of talent for a small town Department. All of this training has cost the Town nothing; the Officers have sacrificed their own personal time to receive the training that enables them to serve this community with professionalism and skill. In the course of one year the Town went from almost nothing to a highly trained Department that any Town could be proud of. The sad part is that by this time next year we will perhaps have lost most of these officers to other departments, and we will have to start again. The Town will not retain good officers if we don't use them.

In August I was forced to take the 1979 Buick cruiser off the road. It was too dangerous to operate. A Special Town Meeting was held and it was decided that the Town would not purchase a new or used cruiser, and that the State Police could handle all the calls. Due to the legal ramifications, this effectively put the South Hampton Police Department in the position of "advisors" to any responding agency. There were delays in response that understandably dismayed citizens, but which this

Department was powerless to prevent.

The September Special Town Meeting did have one bright moment. Lutz Wallem sent word that he was trying to get a new Audi automobile donated to the Department. In mid-November Mr. Wallem did manage to get his company, with the Boston-area Audi dealers and Audi of America, to agree to donate a 1985 Audi Quattro to the Department.

In December, Mr. Wallem hand-carried our equipment to the factory in Germany and the South Hampton cruiser was custom-built. It is one-of-a-kind. Mr. Wallem had the car shipped to the United States and presented the car to the Town on February 2, 1985. The Department and the Town owe the Wallem family and Foreign Motors of Boston a vote of thanks and appreciation.

The Audi cruiser will appear in a nationwide advertising campaign by Audi, which will include automobile and police trade publications, newspapers and magazines, and possibly television.

The South Hampton Police Department is hoping to get the funds it needs to go along with the training it has and the very fine cruiser it has, to really be a first-rate Department. Every Officer conceives of his or her duty as first to the people of South Hampton and the protection of their safety, property and way of life. The ultimate loss, without adequate Department funding, is to the citizens of South Hampton.

PLANNING BOARD, TOWN OF SOUTH HAMPTON

There have been numerous new developments in the area of town planning and growth throughout the State of New Hampshire. Recent court decisions in New Hampshire have shown that current zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations may no longer be adequate to control growth and land development in the community.

In order to keep abreast of the new changes in law, the planning board during the forthcoming year will direct much of its attention to the updating of our current zoning ordinances and subdivision articles in order to comply with the new state rulings.

Of the changes to be considered over the forthcoming year, the planning board will be looking into amendments dealing with variable growth rates for dwelling units, a capital improvement plan which will be compatible with the town's growth rate, and change which would allow for limited multi-family unit development.

In order for the planning board to develop reasonable solutions to these and other problems, it is imperative that we receive input from other members of the community so that we may develop solutions to the problems which are acceptable to the entire community.

Suggestions may be made to any member of the planning board or letters may be sent to the planning board which meets the first Tuesday of each month. Reasonable growth in our community can only continue with your input and support.

TO: THE CITIZENS OF SOUTH HAMPTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE

We submit this report on the management of your school during 1984. Each year we review with you some of the developments in education, legislation and management. We are following the same procedure this year.

We are mindful of the criticisms, both locally and nationally, of schools and schooling. We are not insensitive to shortcomings nor to the financial strain on the taxpayer of today's educational costs. Criticism must be evaluated to reduce or eliminate any shortcomings. This is an on-going part of the duty entrusted to the School Board. We earnestly strive to do this and believe that we have succeeded in carrying out the will of the majority.

Mindful of the responsibility that you have placed in us, that of educating your children, we wrestle with the same problems that you do: What is best for our children? How can it be done most efficiently? What are the consequences of failing to do so? and many other questions. Each year a significant portion of the Board's time is devoted to these questions, but as each of us knows, there are conflicting, confusing, and contradictory claims by proponents and opponents of every position. Out of all these conflicting claims and proposals we attempt to glean those portions best suited to our children and school.

HIGH SCHOOL EVALUATION

Over the past several years there has been much concern by several citizens of South Hampton over the quality of the High School education being given at Amesbury, Massachusetts. As a result of this concern, the School Board has appointed a School Needs Committee consisting of:

By the time you read this, you should have received a full report to study before you come to the School District Meeting on

March 5th. Anyone who has not received a copy should contact one of the committee members. We strongly urge everyone to attend the School District Meeting and voice their opinion on this important matter.

TEACHER CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS

This is a contract year and Margaret Miller has been designated as South Hampton's representative on the negotiations team. Many long hours have been spent meeting with the teachers at least weekly since last September. The contract was settled in late January after an all-night session. This contract will be of two years' duration for an average salary increase of 8.5% per year. For South Hampton the effect will be 9.1% in the first year and about 7.0% in the second year.

Some may feel this is too large an increase due to the low inflation rate and the low settlements that industry has been giving. However, a teacher's salary is very low when you consider the amount of education and dedication teaching demands, and, New Hampshire is well below the national average for teaching salaries. Therefore, your School Board feels that this increase was necessary if we expect to keep quality teachers. The only concern we had with this settlement was that the problem of the step-system for advancing a teacher up the salary scale was not addressed. This system is out-of-date and unfair to the new teacher. If the teachers who are at or near the top of the scale do not face this issue soon, the whole teaching profession will suffer because we will not be able to hire quality teachers for new positions.

S.A.U. #21 - JOINT BOARDS

As a result of Dr. Hamilton's resignation as Superintendent of Schools, a Search Committee was formed to find a new superintendent. We were successful in finding an excellent candidate in Dr. Norman Katner.

The Assistant Superintendent, Sue Bunting, is currently putting the finishing touches on a new curriculum manual which will serve as our teachers' guideline for many years. The South Hampton Teaching Staff spent many long hours and evenings helping to develop this manual.

ENROLLMENT

The projected enrollment at Barnard School for next year continues to drop and is expected to be 76 students. The projections also show this is the last year of decrease and enrollment will start climbing after next year. Because of this low enrollment, it has been suggested that the teaching staff be cut. On the surface this may look like a logical solution to the ever-increasing costs of running a school; however, we still have to educate eight grades of students and it is logistically not possible to do so with fewer full-time teachers. It is also very difficult to cut

the part-time staff because of Government regulations and the need to give a well-rounded education to all students.

In closing, your School Board thanks the Staff of the Barnard School, the Administration Staff, the Barnard Trustees for their continued support in keeping the building in good repair, and especially, the people of South Hampton for their continued support both financially and morally.

The Annual South Hampton, New Hampshire School District Meeting was called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Moderator Horace Cressy with 55 townspeople and 4 staff members in attendance. The warrant now attached to page 245 was read.

Mrs. Patricia Nelson made the motion "for the Superintendent and his staff as well as the Principal to speak on matters if called upon". Mr. Walter Hill seconded, voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE I - John Gamble spoke on this article, stating Mr. Gray who gave this land has been paying taxes on this land. After discussion, Mr. Gamble made the motion "that this land be given back to Mr. Gray and recind the action of the 1965 School District Meeting." Paul Morris seconded, voted in the affirmative - Motion carried.

ARTICLE II - Mr. Hill moved that the sum of \$364,047 be raised for the support of the school district, seconded by Mrs. Nelson. The board then explained the increases in the budget. The budget committee was asked to explain why they did not recommend \$15,000. Mr. Bonah explained that there was an increase of \$67,000 in the town and school budgets and there had to be some cuts. The committee also felt th high school transportation should be cut also. Mrs. Audrey Miller asked about the projected figures in enrollment for the school. Mr. Marinos, principal presented these figures and also gave the names of each teacher and their programs that they are responsible for. After more discussion, this article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE III - Mr. Baker moved that this article be accepted as read. Mr. Hill seconded. All in favor. This article voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV - Peter Bryant asked about a statement made about attending Exeter High School. Mrs. Nelson explained that it has been an on going concern for our pupils to get into a New Hampshire High School. The board feels they are fulfilling this concern. The board will hold a special meeting of the town after a package of information is put together. The South Hampton school board and the Exeter board will be meeting in April. The board will certainly abide by the wishes of the people if they desire to keep going to Amesbury High.

Mr. Baker presented Mr. Hill will a plaque for serving on the school board for the last 6 years.

Mr. Goldthwaite made the motion to adjourn the meeting at 9:00 p.m. seconded by Paul Morris.

ACCOUNTABILITY

During the school year 1984-85 all school districts within the School Administrative Unit #21 have been actively involved in the areas of academic accountability, curricula examination and staff development. In October of 1977, at the initiative of the Commissioner of Education, the New Hampshire Department of Education developed the Educational Accountability Plan in order to improve student performance by introducing the concept of accountability into educational planning at the local district level. Although guidelines do allow for flexibility, the State does require that six steps be addressed in the accountability program. Steps include (1) the identification of basic skills, (2) the development of test instruments, (3) test administration, (4) the analysis of test results, (5) a report to the community and State Department of Education, and (6) the development of a management plan based upon test results. The accountability program is cyclic and requires that steps (3) through (6) are to be repeated at the end of each management plan.

SAU #21 utilizes the results from the nationally normed achievement test, the Iowa Test of Basic Skills, and the Seacoast Educational Service Criterion Referenced Test. The Iowa Test of Basic Skills is given in grades 3 through 8 and the Criterion Referenced Test in grades 5, 8, and 11. As in the past, students in SAU #21 performed at or above the national norm in almost all areas on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills. Our greatest strengths are in the areas of reading, language arts, and reference skills. Areas designated for improvement in the academic management plans this year are map and globe skills, spelling, mathematics computation and problem solving.

The results of the 1984-85 writing samples for grades 8 and 11 from the Seacoast Educational Service Criterion Referenced Test are much improved over the past three years. Students are writing with greater detail and fluency. Mechanics, particularly sentence structure, capitalization, and

punctuation were markedly improved. Potentially strong papers were diminished in impact because they lacked focus and often conclusions tended to be weak.

In the 1985-86 school year Winnacunnet High School is planning to implement a nationally normed achievement test in grades 9 and 10, a vocational aptitude battery in grade 11 and a career interest test in grade 12. Although much information about curriculum and student learning can be gleaned from test results, student daily performance and teacher observations are also necessary in constructing a goal oriented academic management plan.

CURRICULUM

Curriculum Guides were distributed to all classroom teachers in grades K-8 in SAU #21. These guides were the result of intensive work during the 1983-84 school year. Teachers in grades K-8, with the assistance of teachers in the English, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies Departments at Winnacunnet High School, coordinated and designed units of study which listed, by grade level, essential student outcomes with performance indicators in each of the above subject areas. Presently, teachers in grades K-8 are field-testing the essential student outcomes. These are to be refined during curriculum work in the summer of 1985.

During the summer of 1985 the Computer Curriculum Committee will also be working toward a unified curriculum for SAU #21 students K-12. The new High School Standards adopted by the State Board of Education in 1984, require that effective with the opening of the 1986-87 school year, the approved high school shall provide one-half unit of credit for all students in computer education. This mandate is sure to have an impact on the present computer curriculum in all schools in New Hampshire.

The addition of the 1984-85 Honors Algebra Program at Winnacunnet High School for qualified eighth graders has been very successful largely due to

the cooperation between the feeder schools and the Winnacunnet High School mathematics department. Also for the first time, a mathematics placement test will be administered in the spring to all eighth grade students entering Winnacunnet High School in the fall of 1985.

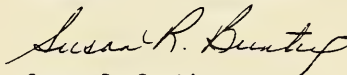
STAFF DEVELOPMENT

A revised, five year Staff Development Plan was approved by the Joint School Boards in 1984. Every employee who holds a position for which certification is required shall participate in the SAU #21 Staff Development Program. The purpose of Staff Development in SAU #21 is to improve the learning experiences of students. The professional educator sees education as a life-long process and recognizes his/her own obligation to plan for self-improvement, thereby enriching the learning experience of his/her students.

Many of the staff development activities offered in SAU #21 are coordinated with the individual district's academic management plans. Drug and alcohol abuse, student learning styles, mathematics in the intermediate grades, teaching language arts through literature, the writing process, advanced study skills, oceanography, and educational management through the use of computers are some of the workshops and courses offered during the 1984-85 school year.

With our dedicated staff of well trained teachers and specialists, and with the continued support of the many individuals who make up our school boards, PTO's, booster clubs, volunteers, and general citizenry, the schools in SAU #21 will continue to maintain an environment that is conducive to learning and one that demands high standards of academic performance from all of our students.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Board
South Hampton School District
South Hampton, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the South Hampton School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1984, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the South Hampton School District at June 30, 1984 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the South Hampton School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

I hereby submit my report as principal of Barnard School.

This past school year has been very active and productive for our staff and students.

A major effort has been in the area of curriculum. A great deal of time and energy was expended by the teaching staff. Some work was done at the local level and some in connection with other schools in S.A.U. #21. The result of this study was the formation of individual grade level curriculum guides for each classroom.

The release days built into the 1984-85 school calendar have been used so far for development of individual goals and building goals; review of the various scoring services connected with the Iowa Test of Basic Skills, and methods of reporting to parents; and the development of an academic management plan for the school, using the results of the testing program.

Federal Block Grants have been instrumental in the purchase of two computers for the Barnard School. A third was purchased by the School District of South Hampton, and a fourth unit is on loan to the school. The South Hampton Parent-Teachers Association has been very generous in contributing funds for the purchase of software. In order to make the best use of the computer hardware and software, a Computer Curriculum Committee is in the process of formulating a curriculum guide.

For students who have needs which cannot readily be met in the classroom, individual and small-group tutoring is available through our Chapter I program. For our special education students, Individual Education Plans are developed in compliance with Federal and State regulations.

The South Hampton Parent-Teachers Association has been a major support group in a variety of activities at Barnard School. The enthusiasm of this organization is very much appreciated by the students and staff.

I would like to thank the South Hampton School Board for its continuing concern for improving education in South Hampton.
