

TO THE VOTERS OF STRATHAM

On the previous page you will find a proposed plan of office space to be built on the rear of the Town Hall. After careful consideration of many alternative plans, we have chosen this as the most feasible for our town.

As you probably know we are being required more and more by State and Federal laws to keep more records and reports and we find our present facilities are not adequate for present day work.

This plan will give our clerk and Tax Collector the opportunity to do the town business in the manner which we would like; also, this will give ample room for the Selectmen's business and allow plenty of area for their conferences with the various agencies of the Town.

We propose that this appropriation of \$18,000 Dollars which will build and equip this office to be financed over a five year period so as not to disrupt our tax structure and make undue hardship on the taxpayer. We hope you will give this your serious consideration on March 9th. This article will be on the ballot to be voted on between 10:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M.

WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Town of Stratham

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Lower Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of having the office of town clerk combined with the office of tax collector, thereby creating a new office of town clerk - tax collector to be held by one individual?

ARTICLE 4. 1. The first item will be a new definition of the area to be considered a Mobile Homes' District. In place of that presently set forth on Page 22 of the Stratham, New Hampshire land Subdivision Control Regulations, the new definition would be as follows: "Mobile Homes' District" - The new Mobile Homes' District shall be bounded by Willowbrook Avenue on the East, a line parallel to Route 101 and 400 feet to the South of the centerline of Route 101 on the North, Lovell Road on the Southwest, and the Greenland Town Line on the Northeast. This District shall still include the 400-foot depth on the Southwest side of Lovell Road running from the center line of Lovell Road.

"This District shall also include that area located to a 400-foot

depth from the centerline on the Easterly side of Willowbrook Avenue running from the corner of Willowbrook Avenue and Lovell Road and the Greenland Town Line.”

ARTICLE 5. 2. To consider an amendment to Article IV of the Stratham, New Hampshire Zoning and Land Use Ordinance, which relates to Residential-Agricultural District, which shall be entitled: “Section 3 of Article IV of the Stratham, New Hampshire zoning and Land Use Ordinance”, and to read as follows: “J. There shall be permitted within this District the incidental use of buildings and land for the storage of equipment utilized by the owner or owners of land in this District, provided that the business operation is customarily operated from the home without a purpose or business operation catering to the general public, or having a business primarily engaging public traffic to the land and subject to the following limitations: no use shall be permitted which is included in Article IV-A, parts B through H inclusive as permitted uses in a Commercial District, unless specifically permitted in Article IV, parts A through I inclusive in the Residential-Agricultural District. It shall be a condition precedent to the use of any land in this District, pursuant to this particular provision that the owner or owners shall first have erected and occupied upon the subject land, a residential home, and it shall be a requirement that the home remain occupied as a residence during the period which the land is used as authorized herein.”

ARTICLE 6. 3. Relative to the addition of a new District for the Town of Stratham, New Hampshire, to be entitled: “Commercial-Light Industrial District”, which would be entitled: “Article IV-B” in the Stratham, New Hampshire Zoning and Land Use Ordinance, and which shall read as follows: “Article IV-B”, Commercial-Light Industrial District: A building may be erected, altered, or used, and a lot may be used and occupied only for the following provisions:

A. Any use permitted in the Agricultural-Residential District and the Commercial District.

B. Manufacturing and Industrial Operations which conform in

all particulars to all general provisions under Article III.

C. LAND REQUIREMENTS:

1. Frontage. Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of 250 feet.

2. Front Yard. Between the nearest right of way and the extreme front of any building, there shall be a minimum depth of 60 feet.

3. Side and Back Yard. A building shall not be located nearer than 25 feet of the property lines of any abutter, and not nearer than 50 feet from any structure on an abutter's property.

4. Minimum Land Area. A lot shall not be less than 2 acres.

D. OFF-STREET PARK FACILITIES:

1. Requirements shall be the same as in the Commercial District.

E. SEWAGE DISPOSAL REQUIREMENT:

1. Requirements shall be the same as in the Commercial District.

The Commercial-Light Industrial District shall be described, and shall be placed, on Page 22 of the Stratham, New Hampshire Zoning and Land Subdivision Control Regulations, and shall be as follows: It shall include the land bounded on the East by Route 101, on the South by the Exeter By-Pass, and the gas transmission line on the Northwest.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand (\$18,000.00) to erect and equip a new building on the rear of the Town Hall. All notes, bonds, and rates of interest to be left to the discretion of the selectmen.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) for it's share of support in the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the

purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town:

Inventory No. 61 River Road 0 & 002 to 23 & 80 - 0.45 miles
Inventory No. 53 Union Road 36 & 10 to 65 & 65 - 0.56 miles

Such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Stratham.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for correction of drainage on Shirley Lane and Mark Avenue.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to relocate drain on to the Town easement off Robin Glen Road.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00); Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) to renovate the basement in the Wiggin Memorial Library for use as a Children's Room, and Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for equipment.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the pupose of new gates and improving entrance of dump.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to repeal the Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) appropriation for grader in 1969.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to allow a 1%

discount on such property taxes as are paid in full within 30 days from the day the Tax Warrant is committed to the Tax Collector, the date to be printed on the tax bill.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Lower Town Hall to elect Town Officers and to act upon Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6. The discussion and action of other Articles in the Warrant at 8:00 p.m. in the Upper Town Hall.

WIGGIN MEMORIAL LIBRARY - 1970

The increased financial support from the town has enabled the library to present a program of increased service to the

community this past year.

Services for children have included a summer reading program with 75 participants. This activity concluded with a visit to the Children's Theatre at the University of New Hampshire in August. A series of eight story and film programs was held during July and August with an average attendance of 35. Special collections of books have been loaned to classes at Stratham Memorial School. Kindergarten children have visited the Library twice for special programs, and the sixth grade spent a morning at the Library for instruction and practice in using the facilities more advantageously. A great effort has been made to work in conjunction with the School Library, which has proved to be of great benefit to both libraries.

During National Library Week an Arts & Crafts exhibit was sponsored for school children. Prizes of books were awarded for the three best creations. Scout groups and 4-H Clubs have used the Library for exhibits.

During the summer, use was made of the Library for tutoring purposes by two local teachers. It has also been used as a meeting place for the Historical Society and for the Friends of the Library.

The Librarian has attended many professional meetings during the past year, including State Library Meetings, four Advisory Council Meetings, four Book Meetings, Planning Committee Meetings, N. H. Library Association Meetings, N. H. Friends of Library Meetings, New England Library Association Meetings and several workshops.

Staff from the Library is available to help local organizations with programs - planning, finding information, book talks, showing of films. The staff includes Marion Crow, library aide; Barbara Senko, library clerk; and Elizabeth Batchelder, librarian.

Through generous donations from the Friends of the Library,

the Unity Club, individuals, and from the sale of paper back histories, the Library was able to purchase a Kodak Film Projector. To December 31, the projector has been used for 27 film programs and has been loaned, with an operator, to several organizations for programs. Other gifts received have been many magazine subscriptions and a total of 117 books. A state aid grant of \$100.00 for reference books was also received.

The Library is working with the State Library in services to the handicapped, and is also one of the many libraries in New Hampshire to honor the State-wide Borrowers Card.

For the many hours of labor contributed by individuals and by the Friends of the Library, we wish to extend our thanks.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

A spirit of cooperation characterizes the town of Stratham and improves its school. John Brooks Devoe graciously offered to work with the teachers so that an art program may benefit all our students. Mr. Ralph Batchelder kindly built learning center cubicles with materials provided by the PTA to permit good use of audio-visual learning aids. The many teacher's aides and library volunteers have given long valuable hours to allow the teachers to do more teaching and to increase the value of the library to the students. Their presence opens the school making it seem less isolated, more important, more part of the community.

Introducing the new science curriculum, individualization with math and reading kits for the boys and girls to work at their own speed is exciting and rewarding. With the help of their teachers the students can feel that they are in charge of their own education thus working with more incentive. This is possible because of thoughtful administration by Dr. Edward A. Adamo, the superintendent of schools; Mr. Frederick King, teaching consultant; and Mr. David Matthews, the school principal.

Although the board believes the students of the AREA schools have a good educational opportunity, the fact of no representation in the decision making process of these schools is increasingly regretted.

In noting the rising school enrollments, large current class size, and uncertainty of the future of St. Michael School the board would advise the town of increased space needs in the near future. The addition of another teacher was considered but not acted upon because of the exigencies of the budget and economic situation. Again this cannot be postponed for long.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The new school year began with a Union-wide faculty meeting at the AREA Junior High School on Tuesday, September 8, 1970. Classes opened for instruction on Wednesday, September 9, 1970.

Stratham schools opened this year with 193 pupils, a number identical with the beginning of school a year ago.

Normalcy born of progress would seem an appropriate description of Memorial Elementary School during the past year. Transition education has appeared to make a positive difference in the learning climate of the first grade as well as providing a more successful environment for Transition children themselves. Mr. Devoe has assisted the staff in planning for art instruction in the absence of an art teacher. Mr. Matthews, with the help of the P.T.A., introduced learning booths and individual materials to the library with good effect. The staff as a whole has attempted to do more with individualizing the reading program. Children were tested and sub-grouped by reading level with some children receiving emphasis in corrective reading due to special problems.

Mr. Matthews reports that assemblies will be held monthly for the remainder of the current year. Particular appreciation was expressed by Mr. Matthews for the gifts and work of the P.T.A. and for the teacher and library aides. The program of the library was cited by the principal for its effective learning activities. The inauguration of a glee club was a welcome experience for the children. Appearance of this choral group at the annual Christmas program gave a new dimension to the ever enjoyable entertainment.

Supervisory Union 16 offices were relocated in August of 1970, to its present address at 24 Front Street, third floor. The elevator at the parking lot in the rear of the building gives the visitor his most convenient and direct access to the Superintendent's office. With the addition of a seventh town, Brentwood,

to Supervisory Union 16, effective July 1, 1971, the workload of the office will undoubtedly increase significantly. Enrollment within the Union is likely to run in the neighborhood of 3700 pupils during 1971-72. Not many years past, the Union educated only half this number of pupils.

There were 2 teachers new to Stratham in September 1970. At mid year 1970-71, Mrs. Judy Michaud was replaced by Mrs. Joan Robinson as teacher of Grades 4-5. The present staff and their assignments are listed below:

These estimated per pupil costs for 1970-71 are the basis for setting tuition rates for 1971-72 in accord with the AREA

contract; a rental charge is added to make up the total tuition. The new tuition rates for 1971-72 compare with the state average per pupil costs of \$759 per High School pupil and \$728 per Junior High School pupil, exclusive of rental charges. One should note that the state average is based on operating expenditures for all New Hampshire schools for the year 1969-70. This places the State costs 2 years in arrears of tuition year costs while Exeter costs are one year in arrears of tuition year costs.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The School Health Service is designed to serve the physical and emotional needs of all children in the school system - collectively and individually; to promote an awareness among parents and educators of these needs and of available help through this department. The School Nurse offers leadership and guidance to the development and maintenance of the over all health program.

Specific health services were listed in detail in the 1969 report and have been carried out in much the same pattern during the past year. Parents are welcome and encouraged to visit the health office for conference when there is a health related concern to be discussed.

Through education only can we expect returns from our efforts to establish understanding and good practices of health, hygiene, and safety. We plan to have interesting speakers, new films, filmsrrips, publications and other aids to enrich the health education curriculum - ideally for use in connection with special class units at a time when material will be most interesting and useful to the students.

Phase II of the three part in-service training project developed last year in cooperation with the N. H. Department of Special Education, was directed by Dr. Clyde Shepard, Keene State College, and recently carried to a conclusion after a series of seven classes. This seven week course for tutors and aides was primarily to offer basic information and techniques on working with the learning handicapped child either in the classroom or on a one to one basis. It is hoped that all who attended will feel more confident and motivated in the time they so generously contributed toward rescuing a child who "cannot seem to learn".

The earlier our investment of time, talent, and funds the more realistically we may anticipate success in reaching these children

before it is too late. Utilization of all community resources is essential if we hope to fulfill our obligation toward meeting their learning needs.

Finally, plans are now being developed for a parent program of six weekly sessions through which parents may have an opportunity to hear outstanding professionals in the field of child psychology and special education, to join in discussion groups and thereby gain in their knowledge and understanding of children who may be educationally or socially handicapped. Indeed, many of these discouraged-through-failure children do present behavior problems in the home and any program intended to fully serve the needs of these children must, therefore, reach not only educators and para-professionals, but parents - parents whose role in understanding, management, and encouragement of this special child is vital. Dates and further details of meetings will soon be announced.

I should like to acknowledge with gratitude the many valuable hours contributed by Health Service Volunteers. Only their competent assistance has enabled us to carry out our far reaching Health Service program. My appreciation is also extended to the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board and teaching personnel with whom it has been a pleasure to work.


