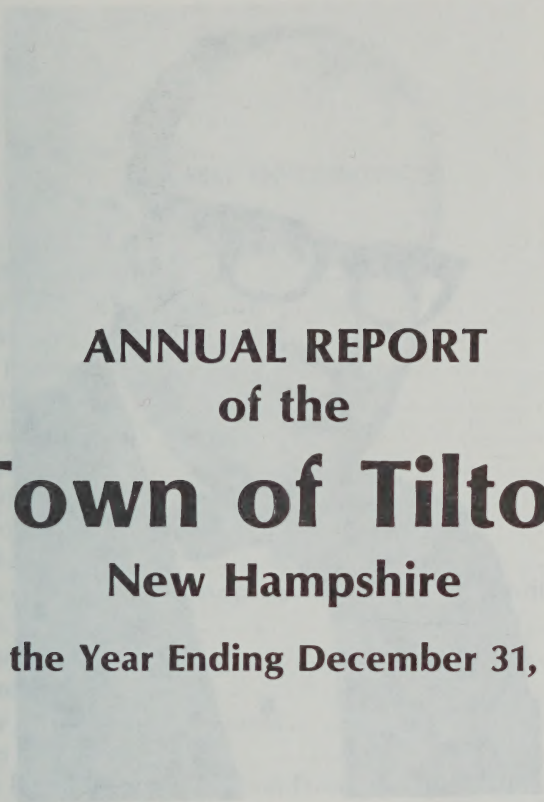

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REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The year 1985 could be characterized as a year of orderly progression for the Town of Tilton.

The tax base was improved by the Construction of "McDonalds" and the rebuilding of Clement Dam plus other businesses and homes and many rebuilding projects.

The tax rate this year was reduced (\$3.21 per \$1,000 valuation) which could be attributed to the increased tax base plus the diligent efforts of department supervisors and every Town employee.

The Highway Department had a problem with too many trees that needed attention and we took care of the most urgent but had to spend more than anticipated. Pine Street was completed this year but no other major projects were started.

The Downtown Revitalization Committee is planning to apply for a grant to do a feasibility study of Tilton and the Selectmen have voted to assist in this undertaking. This Committee purchased new Christmas Lights and arranged to have them installed which greatly enhanced Downtown Tilton during the Holiday Season. They deserve a big "Thank You" from Tilton residents.

Many beautification projects were done by private enterprise. Tilton School re-designed and re-worked their entrance plus their students assisted the Town in clean up. Northern Pine Furniture did landscaping along the river and Bob Beaulieu and others did many beautification projects. They all deserve our thanks. The Conservation Commission has been active this year and has brought in a "Wetlands Ordinance" to be added to the existing ordinance to be voted on at Town Meeting.

A special thank you to all the persons who gave so freely of their time and energy to serve on the Planning Board-Zoning Board of Adjustment-Budget Committee and all the other Commissions and Committees.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of funding a feasibility study for the expansion of sewer service into unserved areas of the Town. (By Petition - Recommended by the Budget Committee)

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire an Administrative Assistant and a part-time Secretary and abolish the position of full time Secretary. (By Petition - Recommended by the Budget Committee)
6. To see if the Town will provide winter maintenance (snowplowing, sanding and salting) of the road called Dunlop Drive located off Lancaster Hill Road. (By Petition)
7. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00.
8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance waiving the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who was captured and incarcerated for 30 days or more while serving in a qualifying war or armed conflict as defined in RSA 72:28, IV, and who was honorably discharged, provided the person has provided the town clerk with satisfactory proof of these circumstances.
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or another Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations, gifts or property that might become available prior to next Town Meeting.
11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey to Zoes J. Dimos and James C. Katsekas for one dollar those lands and/or associated rights in which the Town holds interest to, and which are located within the project boundary of the Clement Dam Hydroelectric project for the purpose of satisfying requirements as stipulated by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.
12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee, and pass any vote in relation hereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to oppose burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Tilton and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town, by Tax Collector's Deed, by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the reports of its officers and agents.

17. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

**SECOND SESSION, 1985 TOWN MEETING, MAR. 16
Winnisquam Regional High School**

The business portion of the 1985 Town Meeting was called to order by Kenneth Randall, acting moderator. The rules of the meeting were gone over and the visitors section and press section were identified. It was noted that Chief of Police, George Prescott, had requested and been granted permission to speak if necessary.

The Rev. William Broughton of the N-I Congregational Church was called upon to give the invocation.

Deputy moderator for the meeting was James Shepherd. The selectmen, budget committee and town clerk were introduced.

Mr. Randall stated that unless requested the reading of Tuesday's election results would be dispensed with. Also, since the warrant was read in its entirety at the Tuesday session the reading was dispensed with.

Article #2 Motion by Heber Feener, seconded by Gerry Slagle that the town vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund to include principal and interest, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a setoff against appropriations for the purpose of Administration in the amount of \$100,000. Motion passed.

Article #3 Motion by George Hast that the town vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a street light, pole PSNH 65-69, located on School Street at an annual cost of \$107., motion seconded. After discussion as to whether this light was on private property or not and who had paid for this in the past the motion was defeated.

Article #4 Motion by Mr. Bowler, seconded by Mr. Rutherford that the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b. No discussion, motion carried.

Article #5 Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Joscelyn that the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations, gifts or property that might become available prior to next Town Meeting. No discussion. Motion carried.

Article #6 Motion by Mr. Joscelyn to adopt article as read, seconded by Mr. Dodge. After discussion as to portion of road to be accepted and when it would be accepted as well as discussion regarding type of buildings and trailers that are located on road the motion passed. It was noted that Town is only asking for acceptance when road is properly prepared and the Selectmen have authority to accept the road, this is a custom that has been done in the past to bring a road acceptance before body at Town Meeting.

Article #7 Motion by Mr. Joscelyn, seconded by Mr. Rutherford that Town vote to waive interest charges amounting to less than \$1.00 on property tax accounts. Motion passed.

Article #8 Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Bowler to accept article #8 as printed in warrant. After brief explanation, motion carried.

Article #9 Motion by Mr. Feener that Town vote to accept the Budget of \$988,905 as submitted by the Budget Committee and pass any vote in relation thereto. Mr. Gerry Slagle presented the police department budget in the amount of \$182,519, an increase of 2% over last year. Mr. Bill Lawrence presented the highway department budget in the amount of \$127,026, an increase of 7% over last year, and Mr. Feener presented the administrative budget at \$625,600 and the sewer department budget at \$53,760. It was noted that the selectmen's budget as printed in the town report had a transposed figure and the correct figure should have been \$986,635. Motion by James Dodge to amend budget under the administrative portion by changing the position of selectmen's secretary to administrative assistant with minimum qualifications to be a degree in business administration. Adjustments in pay scale would be adjusted

accordingly. Motion seconded. After discussion Mr. Dodge indicated that adjustments would be included for part time worker in selectmen's office. The vote on the amendment was yes 14, no 30. Various items were questioned and the budget was passed at \$988,905.

Article #10 Motion by Mr. Bowler, seconded by Mr. Rutherford to accept article as printed in Town Report. After discussion and explanation of project the motion was passed.

Article #11 Motion by Mr. Joscelyn, seconded by Mr. Rutherford to adopt article as printed. Discussion held, motion not passed.

Article #12 Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded that Town vote to authorize Board of Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collectors deed, by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Motion by Mr. Dodge to amend article by adding "and that no real estate owned by the town shall be conveyed to another unless advertised or published according to RSA 21:32.", seconded by Mr. Boulanger. Discussion followed as to why this amendment was proposed. Motion to amend passed. Motion on article as amended passed.

Article #13 Motion by Mr. Bowler, seconded by Mr. Montembault to authorize Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. No discussion, motion passed.

Article #14 Motion by Mr. Joscelyn that reports of officers and agents as printed in town report with corrected figure on page 13 under selectmen's budget of \$986,635 be accepted, motion seconded. No discussion, motion passed.

Article #15 Motion by Mr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Bowler that article be passed over. Motion passed.

Article #16 Mr. Bowler was recognized so that a presentation could be made to Mr. Donald Cyr for his 25 years of service to the Town as a member of the Highway Department. A standing ovation was given to Mr. Cyr and he was presented with a plaque as a token of thanks.

Mr. Rutherford was recognized so that he could thank Mr. Bowler for his many years of service to the Town, most recently his six years as Selectmen. A rising vote of thanks was given to Mr. Bowler and he was also presented with a plaque as a small symbol of the Town's appreciation.

Mr. Lawrence made a motion that the town go on record as favoring the modified spring fill-up and fall draw-down schedule proposal described in the recent Army Corps of Engineers Flood Control Proposal in preference to the costly alternative recommended by the N.H. Water Resources and the Army Corps of Engineers. Motion seconded by Mrs. Gengras. After some discussion and explanation by Mrs. Gengras this motion was passed.

Motion by Mr. Lawrence, seconded by Mr. Dodge that the Town appoint a committee to study the feasibility of a town administrative assistant, appointed at today's meeting if possible. Mr. Randall explained that the moderator Mr. Baker had already asked Messrs. Dodge, Rutherford and Lawrence to serve on this committee and they have accepted. He asked for at least four volunteers to serve on this committee if motion passed. Motion passed.

Mr. Feener asked that practice be reinstated of posting sample ballots in Town Hall window before elections rather inside the Town Hall so that people would be more aware of happenings.

Motion to adjourn, seconded. Meeting adjourned at 12:27 p.m.

The Committee to study the feasibility of establishing a position of Administrative Assistant met on November 19, 1985 to finalize their opinions. The following information is the Committee's recommendation.

The Committee unanimously agreed that the Town of Tilton hire an Administrative Assistant, include a position for a part-time secretary and abolish the position of full time secretary if and when the Town votes and hires an Administrative Assistant.

The Committee also has included some minimum qualifications which include, a degree in Business Administration and some work experience. The Administrative Assistant should become a resident of the Town of Tilton within one year of hiring and receive the same fringe benefits as the other Town employees. We have suggested a salary range between \$20,000 - to \$25,000.

The Committee reasons for hiring an Administrative Assistant include more effective administration of Town affairs. Coordination of various boards and committees. Continuity of Town affairs, and administrative help to the Selectmen and residents of the community.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Tilton, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1984, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Tilton, New Hampshire at December 31, 1984, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Tilton, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

Each year it seems we increase our work load and it seems to be directly related to our inability to retain experienced Officers. This year \$44,668.00 in fines were paid to the Laconia District Court which is about \$4,000 more than last year. We almost doubled the Burglary rate from 22 in 1984 to 40 in 1985.

You may recall that we hired four replacement Officers in 1984, they were James Curran, Robert Terhune, Adam Roy and Richard Paulhus. Of the four, only Richard Paulhus remains. Jim Curran went to Laconia Police Department, the reason, more money. Robert Terhune went to the New Hampshire State Police, the reason, more money and Adam Roy went to the Concord Group Insurance Company as an adjuster, his reason more money. Not one Officer left because he wasn't happy with the working conditions and two of the three would have stayed if we could have matched the pay. The third left for a career change and more money.

As a consequence, we are still training police officers and continually remain understrength. This results in a less effective Police Department and translates directly to the increase in the criminal activity in this Town which in turn results in a financial loss to its Victim Citizens. In other words the Citizens in this Town ultimately pay for the lack of better Police protection just as they would have to pay for an increase to improve the Police service. Its frustrating to me as a Chief not to be able to provide a better service to a deserving public simply because we can't maintain our experienced Officers.

We've replaced the three Officers who left with two inexperienced Officers and one experienced Officer, they are:

KENT CHAPMAN of Winter Street, Tilton, a home town boy who has considerable police experience in three other Police Departments who pay less than we do. Kent was hired to fill the investigators position but hasn't been able to do investigation because he's filling the patrol gap. He has been trained in Police Prosecution, Crime Scene handling, Fingerprinting, Search and Arrest Warrants, Interviews and Interrogations, Firearms, Self-defense and First Line Supervision. We hope to keep him.

PETER J. MERKES JR. of Salisbury, N.H. Pete graduated from Franklin High School and then entered the United States Army where he completed his basic training and then went on to Airborne Training (Paratrooper), then to the U.S. Army John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center where he became a member of the U.S. Army Special Forces, (Green Beret). He also completed Ranger Training, Sniper Training, Counter Terrorism Training, Demolitions and Reconnaissance Diving. Pete served with the 5th Special Forces Group in Chad, Sudan, Morocco, Saudi Arabia, Munich, Germany and the Granada invasion. He was honorably discharged in May of 1985 as a Sergeant. He will attend the Police Academy in March for ten weeks.

SELDON E. (Don) NASON of Webster, N.H. graduated from Merrimack Valley High School and attended Bentley College before joining the Franklin Police Department where he worked for nine months. Don has also dispatched for the Merrimack County Sheriff's Office and has received in-service training on Domestic Violence, Crime Scene First Responder and is a certified Radar Operator. He is presently in his third week of the ten week Police Academy.

Hopefully we will be able to retain these men for more than a year. I'm sure they'll give their best as the rest of us do.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

The parking lot for the Middle School was the main project for the Highway Department. Working with the Highway Departments of Sanbornton and Northfield, approximately 3 ft. of material was removed and replaced with 2 ft. of sand and 1 ft. of gravel. A drainage system was installed along the outside of the lot. This was a trench approximately 2 ft. deeper, lined with fabric and filled with stone. A pipe of increasing size was layed at the bottom of the trench. The filter fabric was placed before the stone to prevent contamination of the stone with sand creating voids under the pavement.

A 30' x 32' salt shed was constructed from old telephone poles and lumber cut from Town property. The outside of the shed will be completed this spring. The shed has been a big help and much appreciated by the crew.

Pine Street was stabilized and paved, the box culvert is partially undermined and will need work this summer. State Engineers have inspected the culvert and determined it worthy of repair.

Philbrick Road was widened and reshaped and will be paved this summer. The Town realized a great savings from machinery and labor donated by Frank Dalton.

Some work was done for the Sewer district and general maintenance was done around town.

The drain for the Fire Station was replaced in cooperation with Northfield Highway Department, and the Fire District purchased the material.

To the Inhabitants of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District, qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Winnisquam Regional High School Cafeteria on Monday, March 17, 1986 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act on the following:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To choose a Fire Commissioner for the ensuing three (3) years.
5. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.
6. To hear the reports of the Treasurer and Fire Commissioners and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see if the voters of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District will vote to establish a capital reserve fund, hereinafter entitled the Land and Building Fund, pursuant to RSA 35:1 (effective July 31, 1983).

The purpose of this fund is to allow for the accumulation of funds to be used for the construction and renovation of fire station facilities for the Tilton-Northfield Fire District.

This article is intended to correct any and all warrant articles which have been previously acted upon by the voters of the Fire District at any time by complying with the requirements of RSA 35:1 (effective July 31, 1983) which authorizes the establishment of capital reserve funds. (By petition)

8. To see if the voters of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000.00), to be funded by in the following manner:
 1. \$88,102.63 to be raised by taxation; and
 2. \$36,897.37 to be withdrawn from the Land and Building Fund of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District.

These funds are to be used for the construction of a building to be erected upon Fire District property located on Park Street in Northfield, N.H. and for the renovation of the existing fire station located in Tilton, N.H. (By petition)

9. To see if the District will vote to renew the Water Contract and raise money for the same in the sum of Twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$29,000.00).

10. To see what action the District will vote to take in regard to payment of insurance, payroll, school training, alarm system, new equipment, truck maintenance, station maintenance, equipment maintenance, equipment replacement, supplies, office supplies, administration, truck fund, dry hydrants, building fund, elections and registrations and other incidental expenses in the sum of One hundred thirty-six thousand five hundred thirty-five dollars (\$136,535.00).

11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three thousand eight hundred twenty-seven dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$3,827.78) as a deficit appropriation.

12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of updating the Jaws of Life.

13. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of purchasing a rescue boat and trailer.

14. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) for the purpose of renovating Engine #3 (1970 International).

15. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000.00) for the support of the Winnisquam Fire Department.

16. To see if the District will vote to enter into an agreement with the towns of Belmont and Sanbornton. This agreement will provide full-time day coverage at the Winnisquam Fire Station of two men at a cost of Twelve thousand seven hundred eleven dollars (\$12,711.00). This article is contingent upon passage of a similar article in the Town Meetings of Belmont and Sanbornton.

17. To see if the District will vote to discontinue the Dry Hydrant Fund presently in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds, Town of Northfield, and authorize the transfer of these funds to the general fund.
18. To see if the voters of the District will vote to have the commissioners of the District elected by ballot at the annual town meeting day elections of the two towns in the same method the town officials are elected. (By petition)
19. To see if the District will vote to have the state of New Hampshire audit the records of the district annually. (By petition)
20. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Fire Commissioners to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source should any become available during the year.
21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

1985 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The purpose of the Conservation Commission is to insure protection and utilization of the community's natural resources and watershed resources. As such, we collect information about these resources and provide input regarding the same to citizens, town, and state agencies. In addition, by law, we are required to review Dredge and Fill applications, and if necessary, provide comments to the State Wetlands Board.

In 1985, the Commission reviewed and commented on an increased number of Dredge and Fill applications. In order to do this properly, we made a number of on site inspections, and if necessary sent a representative to a hearing at the Wetlands Board. When requested by citizens planning projects, we reviewed and discussed proposed site plans, before a Dredge and Fill application was filed for the project. We also responded to a number of citizen inquiries as to whether a Dredge and Fill application would be necessary for a proposed project. In addition, we responded to citizen complaints regarding fill polluting town waters, and were successful in having State Agencies move to have the violations corrected.

The Commission reviewed at length the plans for the proposed Winnepesaukee River Basin Flood Control project, attended all hearings, and submitted written comments on the project.

Commission members attended workshops providing information about groundwater and aquifers, groundwater pollution sources, and how communities can protect their groundwater from contamination.

The primary goal of the Commission in 1985 was to bring a Wetlands Protection Ordinance to the voters of Tilton for their approval. At this time, we have submitted to the Selectmen, a petition to include a Wetlands Protection provision as a part of the local zoning ordinance, to be voted on by the citizens at the 1986 Town Meeting.

In the past, we circulated a questionnaire to the community. Those who responded indicated strong support for acquiring public boat access to Lake Winnisquam and for acquiring lake frontage for public recreational use. Despite the fact that there is little land left available for this purpose, the Commission is committed to pursuing this community need as a priority for 1986.

All of the large amount of information that the Commission has regarding wetlands, water resources, land use regulations is available to the townspeople. The Commission is willing to assist anyone planning a project or who has questions about wetlands, water resources, or State Dredge and Fill applications.
