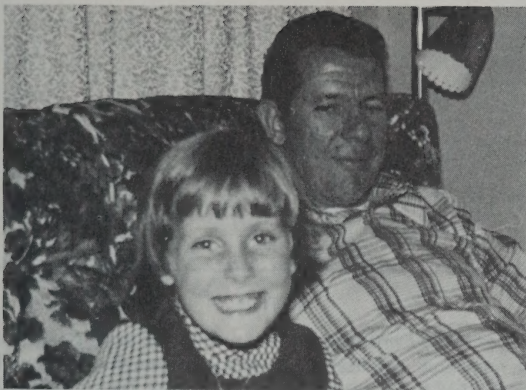

NOTICE

By State of N.H. Statutes. Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually cause it to be registered, numbered, and licensed for one year from the first day of June.

**RABIES CERTIFICATES ARE REQUIRED PRIOR TO LICENSING.**

DOG WARRANT

*To: Animal Control Officer,*

You are hereby directed to proceed starting 1 July with the seizure of any unlicensed dog. Complaints received on unrestrained dogs running at large are also subject to seizure.

The pickup fee for unlicensed or unrestrained dogs will be \$15.00. Dogs will be held in Town holding facilities for a period of up to 7 days at a fee of \$3.00 per day for each day dog is held. Veterinary fees, where necessary will be at owners expense.

The Town of Troy will assume full title to dogs not claimed after 7 days.

Licenses may be obtained from the Town clerk and are requested to be obtained prior to or upon payment of Town Resident Tax.

The above was sent to every resident of the Town of Troy in May 1982.

At the **present time** only 1/4 of the dogs in town are registered. This results in an unfairburden to the the persons who do register their dogs, and also results in lost income to the Town.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said state, qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th of March, next at 10:00 in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Article 1, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 9th of March next at 7:30 P.M. to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

**Article 1:** To bring in your votes for one Selectman for three years, and for all other Town Officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting, or State Statutes for the specified number of years.

**Article 2:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town Expenditures as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. Town Officers' Salaries - \$18,500.00
- b. Town Officers' Expenses - \$11,000.00
- c. Election & Registration - \$600.00
- d. Town Hall - \$8,500.00
- e. Vital Statistics - \$111.00
- f. Insurance - \$30,000.00
- g. Social Security - \$10,000.00
- h. Interest - Temporary Loans - \$9,000.00
- i. Memorial Day - \$700.00
- j. Town Landfill - \$10,000.00
- k. Street Lighting - \$14,500.00
- l. Legal Fees - \$3,500.00
- m. Planning Board & Board of Adjustment - \$650.00
- n. Civil Defense - \$1,100.00
- o. Conservation Committee - \$100.00
- p. Health Officer - \$500.00
- q. Parks & Playgrounds (Common) - \$1,000.00

**Article 3:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to support public services as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. Home Health Care - \$5,250.00
- b. War Memorial Program - \$8,867.00
- c. Monadnock Regional Association - \$150.00
- d. Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service - 1,064.00
- e. Meadowood County Area Fire Department - Membership Fund - \$500.00
- f. Friendly Meals/Meals on Wheels - \$1,000.00
- g. Southwestern N. H. Regional Planning Association - \$2,068.00
- h. Grand Monadnock Arts Council - \$150.00
- i. Arts Festival - \$500.00

**Article 4.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as necessary to support Town Departments as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. Highway - Summer & Winter - \$60,000.00
- b. Police - \$42,500.00
- c. Fire - \$19,200.00
- d. Overseer of the Poor - \$21,000.00
- e. Dogs - \$1,500.00

**Article 5.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for the care of the cemeteries. \$4,000 to come from the Trust Funds.

**Article 6.** To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$444.44 to which the State will contribute \$2,962.92, if voted and accepted, for the construction of Class V roads.

**Article 7.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,027.69 to be withdrawn from the payment made by the State of New Hampshire from the special Highway Subsidy Fund for the purpose of construction and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways within the Town or take any action relating thereto.

**Article 8.** To see if the Town will vote to raise \$60,000 for the Water Department.

**Article 9.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$11,255.00 for the Gay-Kimball Library.

**Article 10.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 to be used by the Troy Industrial Development Committee. The expenditure of money to be used by the Committee with the approval of the majority of Selectmen for expenditures involved in promoting the development of the Troy Industrial Park.

**Article 11.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase an ambulance for an amount not to exceed \$40,000, and provided that the Troy Emergency Ambulance Service, Inc. donates an amount equal to the purchase price of the ambulance, less whatever money is provided by the sale or trade of the present ambulance. Said ambulance will continue to be operated by the Troy Emergency Ambulance Service, Inc. with title of said vehicle remaining in the Town of Troy.

**Article 12.** To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the payment of the sewerage bond and interest thereon.

**Article 13.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$34,500.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Fire Department for the purchase and rehabilitation of a used Class A or smaller Fire Truck. The persons responsible for the selection and rehabilitation of the fire truck will be the Fire Chief and Deputy Chiefs in office when the purchase is made. The purchase will be made by the Selectmen upon the recommendation of the Fire Chiefs. The Fire Chiefs will submit itemized statements to the Selectmen so that the money can be withdrawn as needed.

**Article 14.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereof:

- a. Reassessment of Town (1986) - \$1,500.00

**Article 15.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereon:

- a. Gay-Kimball Library - Operations - \$1,000.00
- b. Senior Citizens, Elderly Activities - \$1,000.00
- c. Town Hall - General Repairs - \$2,000.00
- d. Gay-Kimball Library - Maintenance - \$1,500.00

**Article 16.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

- a. Fire Department - \$6,000.00
- b. Police Department - \$6,000.00
- c. Highway Department - \$6,000.00

**Article 17.** To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen and the Health Officer to write an ordinance to establish a licensing program and a sanitary inspection procedure for all businesses within the Town that serve, handle or process food. Public hearings will be held and publicized before the ordinance is officially adopted and enacted if this article is passed.

**Article 18.** To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen and the Welfare Officer to write an ordinance establishing a work program. Public hearings will be held and publicized before the ordinance is officially adopted and enacted if this article is passed.

**Article 19.** To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to make the position of Police Chief a part-time position. If passed the change will be made no earlier than May 1, 1983.

**Article 20.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of from 3 to 5 persons to do a study and recommend to them a plan for wage scales and benefits for the full and part-time employees of the Town of Troy. Also to review and recommend job descriptions for all positions. This study to be completed by September 30, 1983.

**Article 21.** To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Troy and to the health and welfare of the people of Troy.

**Article 22.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15,000 for capital improvement projects at the Recreation Areas. \$7,500 to come from existing recreation fund and donations. \$7,500 matching funds to come from State and Federal money. The Town of Troy is authorized to apply for, accept and expend federal Land and Water Conservation Fund grant funds or other federal or state funds which may be available for this project to reduce the cost to the District.

**Article 23.** To see if the Town will vote for the following:

“Shall the citizens of Troy, New Hampshire ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both Countries.” By Petition.

**Article 24.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant television cable franchises in accordance with RSA 53-C, 1-5.

**Article 25.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal Funds (BOAR) with the assistance of the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development. These funds to be used to develop capital projects on the recreation land at the Sand Dam and at Farrar’s Field.

**Article 26.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of a certain tract of land identified as Map 14, Lot 19 on the tax maps and listed as “owner unknown” in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

**Article 27.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:05-b.

**Article 28.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

**Article 29.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector’s Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

**Article 30.** To hear reports or committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

Dear Selectmen:

I have examined the financial statements of the Town of Troy for the year ended December 31, 1981, and have issued my report thereon dated December 10, 1982. As a part of my examination I reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal control to the extent I considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

The objective of internal control is to provide reasonable but not absolute assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgements by those managing the Town's affairs.

These are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgement, carelessness or any other of several factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented intentionally by those managing the Town's affairs with respect to the estimates and judgements required in the preparation of financial statements.

Further projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

My study and evaluation of the Town of Troy's system of internal accounting control for the year ended December 31, 1981, which was made for the purpose set forth in the first paragraph above, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system. However, such study and evaluation disclosed the following condition that I believe to be areas which need updating and improvement.

WATER DEPARTMENT

The system of accounting control in the Water Department was not adequate to meet current and future needs. Control over billing and cash receipts did not provide satisfactory control of the revenue earned by the Department.



The accounting system has been changed to correct some of the problems. However, I recommend that the Commissioners consider additional study and evaluation of the accounting controls to ensure that proper record keeping is in place. This will be of more importance when billings for sewer useage commences.

The Water Department should bill the Town for services that it provides to the Town Hall and for the water hydrants. The Town should also charge the Water Department for services that it provides, such as rent and utilities. These intergovernmental charges would assist in determining accurate rate structures for the Department.

Fixed asset additions should be capitalized and depreciated as required by generally accepted accounting principles. This would also assist in determining accurate rate structures.

#### LIBRARY

The bank account does not appear to be reconciled to the checkbook and to the cash journal. Such reconciliation is an essential control process and should be done on a timely basis each month.

I also recommend that the cash journal be expanded to cover all major account classifications.

#### TRUST FUNDS

The accounting records of the trust funds are incomplete. Supporting details do not reconcile to reported totals and a small number of certificates cannot be located. These problems have developed over many years and have compounded as time has passed.

I recommend that a detailed review of the trust funds be implemented and supporting details be reconciled to reported amounts. State law requires Trust Funds to be properly accounted for and accurately reported.

#### TAX COLLECTOR

In several instances interest and penalty charges were not charged on overdue tax accounts. State law stipulates that interest and penalties be charged and collected on late tax payments.

After you have had an opportunity to consider my findings and recommendations, I shall be pleased to discuss them further with you. The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A:21 require that this letter be published in the next annual report of the Town.

I would like to thank you for the cooperation and courtesy given to me during the course of the engagement.

REPORT OF TROY WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT

1982 was a busy and productive year for the water/sewer department. The sewer piping system and the School Street sewer pumping station were both completed and tested. Construction was begun at the Dort Street extension wastewater treatment plant and adjacent lagoon system (the target date for the completion of the treatment facility is June 1, 1983).

A sewer ordinance for the Town of Troy was drafted and accepted, a number of fire hydrants were repaired or replaced and the ongoing program of water meter repair, updates or replacement was continued.

Additionally, the department's record - keeping and accounting system were modernized and approximately \$10,000.00 in outstanding water revenue was collected.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

---

This year the selectmen are proud to report that for 1982 the tax rate in Troy remained the same as it was in 1981. To accomplish this in the present economy took a lot of hard work, re-adjustments of priorities, and tighter restraints on department operating policies.

In some departments we now use purchase orders to assist in more efficient operation. At the present time we purchase our fuel oil for all town buildings through the Southwest Planning Commission, who have put together a competitive bid system for different products, and have made these products available to the town at a great savings. As the service expands we hope to save on expenses.

As you know 1982 was the year that we changed to semiannual billing of property taxes. Also we have put the data necessary on the Southwest Planning Commissions computer to do the resident and property taxes. This calendar year we should see some savings in expenses because of this action.

The sewer project is well on the way to completion. Hopefully operation of the plant will start in about July of this year. Your five member board of Water Sewer Commissioners will keep you abreast of the progress and what will have to be done. The selectmen suggest that any questions you have on the sewer hook-ups and rate fees etc. be referred to the water sewer board.

You will see an article in this year's warrant to raise funds for the Industrial Development Committee. These funds are needed for the committee, which we hope will be able to attract a business or businesses to Troy. The area for industrial development is near the sewer plant at the end of Dort Street. We have for years relayed the need to increase our tax base and feel that the time to do it is now and the vehicle is the Industrial Development Committee.

We urge the participation of residents in various Committees and projects in the town. Good people are needed, and new faces.

"Skipper" Raymond Woods Jr. has made three flower gardens available around the common in three triangular plots of land and has made window boxes for the town hall. The senior citizens have agreed to plant the flowers in the window boxes and the gardens. We hope that this project will improve the beauty of the center of our town and we thank "Skipper", and the Senior Citizens.

Finally the selectmen want to thank the citizens of Troy

for their patience in putting up with the sewer construction over the past year. The end results will not only take care of our sewers but will leave us with much improved roads in many areas of town. Hopefully with careful planning we can continue to improve other sections of road, using the same process.

We will be asking for volunteers this year for advise and assistance on different projects. Hopefully when we do people will come forward to offer their time and assist in improving the town and new projects.

We also ask that metals, burnables, and non-burnables continue to be placed in their correct locations.

Please do not throw "hot coals" from wood or coal fires in the landfill.

If a person is remodeling, or has a special trash problem that occasionally arises, please call Mr. Hurst for assistance.

The selectmen thank Mr. Hurst for excellent work performed at the landfill, and hope that we will be the "Job Boss" for many more years.

## REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

---

This past year the highway department was hit with a very expensive snow removal operation in the first four months of the year. This used up over 50% of our highway appropriation. With the money left we had to do labor related jobs, ditches, brush cutting, and installing culverts. We cut back to 2 men in April to assist in the department having enough money for the rest of the year. Also no over time was worked and paid for.

Our big project was the purchase of culverts to replace existing culverts on roads that were being reconstructed because of sewer pipes. On these streets there were sections that would not have been done where they did not install sewer pipes. To make for a better job, and streets we used about \$7500.00 of Town Road Aid money from the state to do the job.

Some hours were spent at the landfill, the recreation facility, and time at town buildings improving the sites. We feel that we did pretty well in finishing the year within our budget.

Last year we voted to use Capital Reserve money to obtain a used truck. As of now a good used truck has not come on the market.

We have saved our special highway fund about 9,000+ accumulated from 1981 and 1982 to be used for road improvement. If we receive the amount from the state this year which we plan on we will try to do another stretch of road.

Our appropriation this year is the same as last year so that our jobs again will be mostly labor oriented.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

---

We appreciate the generous efforts of those who helped the library during the past year. There were many who donated books and magazines; who gave hours of work and clean-up time; who made the outdoor bulletin board both attractive and informative, and those who presented and assisted in the programs and demonstrations we offered. Our thanks to Mrs. Jean Whitcomb and Miss Amy Marrotte who managed the summer reading program for children.

Miss Kelly Highter resigned as library aid in August to take a full time job. Miss Janet Hazelton has been appointed to the position. Mrs. Darcy Doyle has served as back-up when necessary, and has been generous in volunteering her time for book mending.

The Ripley Room continues to serve as a reading and study room and as a meeting place for local organizations. The children's books are still housed there, but we hope to have the downstairs in condition to use once again. The movie and filmstrip projectors have been loaned frequently.

A most welcome addition to our collection is the new State Library van service which will visit twice a year bringing us a selection of books on loan. The library offers you many services, and many more which we can bring you. The latest cooperative service is a Community Health Collection, held in our area at the Keene Library. If a patron requires certain medical information an inter-library loan request goes to Keene; if necessary, they will contact the Cheshire Hospital. If the hospital cannot supply the information, they will relay the request to the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center in Hanover. This arrangement should bring all the required information. This is, of course, not a diagnostic service.

The library was under "siege" by the sewer project from June until November. During most of this time we were without water and telephone service. Twice we were forced to close for lack of electricity, and parking spaces were largely non-existent; nevertheless, we managed to weather it all and loaned 7,591 books and magazines.

## REPORT OF THE TROY FIRE DEPARTMENT

---

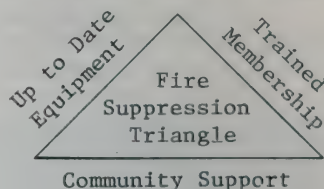
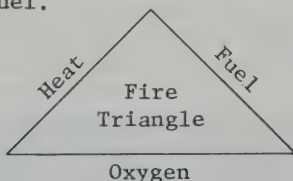
This past year has seen fewer fire emergency calls than in the past. Troy suffered no major fire loss during the year.

We credit this good fortune to the citizens of Troy, for their awareness to fire hazards at their homes and at their places of work and for seeing to it that the hazards are removed.

Once again, this past year, wood stoves caused chimney and partition fires which threatened to cause many thousand of dollars worth of damage to Troy residents' homes.

People using wood as a heating fuel must plan for the timely checking of their equipment to see that it is operating in a safe manner. Once a month the chimney and stove pipe should be checked along with the walls around the stove for any sign of over-heating. Your hand is a good tool. If it's uncomfortable to leave it on the wall then something must be done to correct the problem.

In high school science class, and in fire service training programs, we learn about the fire triangle. The elements which must be present to support combustion or have a fire are: heat, oxygen and fuel.



Let's look at another triangle. This one we can call the fire suppression triangle, and its three sides are made up of the following elements; a well-trained fire department membership, well kept and updated equipment and community support. All three are required to have an effective fire department. We believe the Troy Fire Department demonstrates these elements and is an effective fire suppression service.

We wish to thank the membership for their quick and professional responses to alarms, for the help we have received from other town departments, and for the support received from the citizens of Troy.

The department invites any interested person to visit the fire station for Saturday morning breakfast from 6:30 A.M. til 10:00 A.M. or to the Sunday morning radio check at 10:00 A.M. til 11:00

Profit made on the weekly breakfast goes to buy equipment, improve the fire station, and to assist worthy projects and need in the Town of Troy.

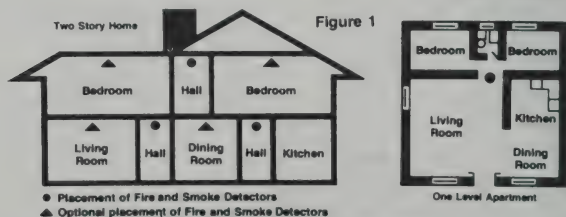
We can say that the fire department through these breakfasts have saved the town thousands of dollars in tax money.

In spirit of cooperation, the Fire Department and the breakfast committee offer the service of the Saturday morning breakfast to local organizations to assist them in their fund raising projects for the Community.

However, to provide the earliest possible warning, the detector should *not* be placed in "dead air spaces." These are areas where there is little or no air circulation.

To avoid dead air spaces, follow these simple guidelines: (See Figure 2)

- Place at least 12" from the wall, if ceiling-mounted.
- Place 6-12" from the ceiling, if wall-mounted.
- In mobile homes, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) recommends locating a wired-in smoke alarm on an inside wall in the hallway between living room and first bedroom. Battery-operated smoke alarms may be used for additional supplementary protection.

#### Where NOT to put it:

- Do *not* install detector in unheated areas or in locations where ambient temperatures exceed 100°F.
- Do *not* put the detector in or near kitchen or oil burner. Normal cooking activities will trigger the alarm.
- Do *not* install directly adjacent to heating or cooling vent, or where open windows or doors create high air flow.
- Do *not* install in garages where fumes would trigger the alarm.

TROY POLICE DEPARTMENT

---

On April 1, 1982, I reassumed my duties as Chief of the Troy Police Department after a lengthy absence. I would especially like to thank Elmer Gladding and the officers and staff of the Troy Police Department for their continued work and dedication.

Currently, the Town of Troy has one full-time officer (myself as Chief of Police) and five part-time officers, all of whom are certified part-time police officers registered with the State of New Hampshire. This certification is in compliance with the state law governing part-time police officers in the State of New Hampshire.

Just as the economy has affected each household, it has also had an effect on the police department budget. Unfortunately, as the economy worsens, the level of crime increases adversely. Therefore, I would like to thank everyone who has supported this department in the past year. It is greatly appreciated.

I would also like to take this opportunity to ask all residents of the Town of Troy who own dogs to be sure they are licensed for the coming year and to remember that we do have a leash law.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-

appropriate \$4,000. for the care of the cemeteries. \$3,000. to come from Trust Funds. Passed as read.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$446.59 to which the State will contribute \$2,977.27, if voted and accepted, for the construction of Class V roads. Passed as read.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,721.88 to be withdrawn from the payment made by the State of New Hampshire from the special Highway Subsidy Fund for the purpose of construction and reconstruction of Class IV and Class V highways within the town or take any action relating thereto. George Dubina questioned the difference between Class IV and Class V roads. Bill Matson stated that Class IV would be Mill Street and Class V would be Granite Street. Passed as read.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$31,550 for the Water Department. After a short discussion, article was passed as read.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,575.00 for the Gay-Kimball Library. Passed as read.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for the purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereof:

a. Reassessment of Town - (1986) - \$1,500. Passed as read.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

a. Gay-Kimball Library - \$2,000.

b. Senior Citizens, Elderly Activities - \$1,000.

c. Town Hall, Insulation and General Repairs - \$1,500.

After a short discussion, article was passed as read.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or to take any other action hereon:

a. Fire Department - \$7,000.

b. Police Department - \$7,000.

c. Highway Department - \$7,000.

After a short discussion, article passed as read.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$5,000. from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund to purchase and rehabilitate a used dump truck "when a good one becomes available" to replace the present 2 1/2 ton International Dump Truck we now have. After a short discussion, the Article was passed as read.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$30,000. from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund to purchase from H. Allen Drugg d/b/a/ Drugg Construction Co. the land and buildings located on Dustin Avenue, Map #18 Lot #161 and 162. Land and buildings to be used for Highway Department. After a short discussion, by a hand vote of 82 Yes and 40 No, the article was passed as read.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$3,500. from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund to purchase and rehabilitate a good used grader, if one becomes available. After a short discussion, the article was defeated.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$34,500. from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Fire Department for the purchase and rehabilitation of a used Class A Fire Truck. The persons responsible for the selection, purchase and rehabilitation of the Fire Truck will be the Fire Chief and two Deputy Chiefs in office when purchase is made. They will also be responsible for the submission of itemized statements to the Selectmen in order that the money can be withdrawn as needed.

Article was amended from the floor to read:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$34,500. from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Fire Department for the purchase and rehabilitation of a used Class A or smaller Fire Truck. The persons responsible for the selection, purchase and rehabilitation of the fire truck will be the Fire Chief and two deputy Chiefs in office when purchase is made. They will also be responsible for the submission of itemized statements to the Selectmen in order that the money can be withdrawn as needed. Article was passed by hand vote of 62 Yes and 50 No, as amended.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver a deed with quitclaim covenants conveying any and all rights the Town may have in and to a temporary and permanent easement situated southerly to Monadnock Street conveyed by Troy Mills, Inc. to the Town of Troy by deed dated February 25, 1981 and recorded in Vol. 1001, Page 622 of the Cheshire County Registry of Deeds, or take any action thereon. Passed as read.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the article that was voted to abolish the Board of Fire Wards and re-establish same. (by Petition) This article was originally voted in 1965. No Action.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish the Art Festival Committee as an official Town Function.

Motion was made to amend the Article to read: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Temporary Arts Festival Committee as an official Town Function. Amendment defeated. Article passed as read.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to reopen 350 feet of South Main Street from the Fitzwilliam/Troy Town line in a northerly direction. This portion of South Main St. is presently closed subject to gates and bars. The 350 feet to be reopened will remain a gravel road. Passed as read.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to withdraw \$2,632.75 from the Soil Map Capital Reserve Fund to pay for the Soil Map when completed and to allow the Selectmen to withdraw the remaining amount of principal and interest from the Soil Map Capital Reserve Fund, and deposit it in the Town General Fund. Passed as read.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen, in cooperation with the Planning Board, to write a sign ordinance for the Town of Troy. Public hearings will be held and publicized before the ordinance is officially adopted and enacted if this article is passed. Passed as read.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote for semiannual tax bills to save interest on borrowed money. Passed as read.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. Passed as read.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal Funds with the Assistance of the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development. Passed as read.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon. Passed as read.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Passed as read.

Article 30. To hear reports or committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

Clarence Abare made the suggestion that if the Planning Board was going to make changes in the zoning ordinance, in the future they should do it separately and not group all changes together. Mr. Abare felt that by grouping them together, it was confusing to the towns people, especially if they agreed with only part of the changes.
