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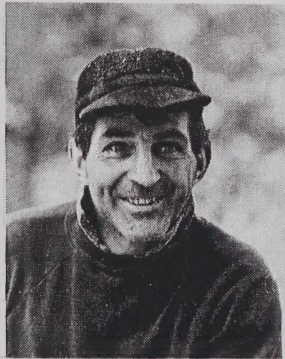

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By Ballot)
2. Are you in favor of amending Article I to insert language on the Title and Authority, as well as amending the purpose of the Zoning Ordinance? (By Ballot)
3. Are you in favor of amending Article IX to insert language on the creation and appointment of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, as outlined in the State Statutes? (By Ballot)
4. Are you in favor of amending Article XII to insert language about how Zoning Ordinance amendments are made, as per RSA requirements? (By Ballot)

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the appointment of not more than five (5) alternate members to the Zoning Board of Adjustment as allowed under RSA 673:6. The Selectmen recommend this article.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the appointment of not more than five (5) alternate members to the Planning Board as allowed under RSA 673:6. The Selectmen recommend this article.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to pave all the present graveled areas around the Town Hall (By Petition) **The Selectmen do not recommend this article.**

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Webster
Webster, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Town of Webster, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2004 as shown on pages 3 through 7. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Webster's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

Management has chosen not to implement Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments*. Therefore these financial statements are presented following the principles that were in effect prior to GASB Statement No. 34. Management has not presented government-wide financial statements to display the financial position and changes in financial position of its governmental activities and business-type activities. The financial statements presented do not contain separate statements for governmental, proprietary, if applicable and fiduciary fund types, nor are major and non-major funds separately identified and classified. The financial statements presented report expendable and nonexpendable trust funds, some of which should be reported as special revenue and permanent funds under the new reporting model. The financial statements also present a general long-term debt account group which should not be reported as such, but the information contained therein should be included in the government-wide financial statements were they presented. Also, the financial statements do not contain any information on capital assets because the government has not maintained historical cost records of such assets. Management has not presented a management's discussion and analysis as required. The amounts that would be reported in the missing statements and required supplementary information, and the effects of reclassifying and properly reporting the information presented are not reasonably determined.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the Town of Webster as of December 31, 2004, or the changes in its financial position or its cash flows, where applicable, for the year then ended.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Webster basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. For reasons stated in the third paragraph of this report, we expressed an opinion that the financial statements of the Town of Webster do not fairly present financial position, results of operations, and cash flows in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Therefore, we do not express an opinion on the accompanying combining and individual fund statements.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF REPORTABLE CONDITIONS AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Webster
Webster, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the Town of Webster for the year ended December 31, 2004, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities caused by error or fraud, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

During the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the Town's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to applicable individuals during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the board of selectmen, and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

All debt is general obligation debt of the Town, which is backed by its full faith and credit and will be repaid from general governmental revenues.

Both lease-purchase agreements contain non-appropriation funding clauses whereby, in the event no funds or insufficient funds are appropriated by the Town, the lease shall terminate without penalty or expense to the Town.

Landfill Closure and Postclosure Care Costs

The Town of Webster has an agreement with the Town of Hopkinton for the sanitary landfill located in the Town of Hopkinton.

Federal and State laws and regulations require that the Town of Hopkinton place a final cover on its landfill when closed and perform certain maintenance and monitoring functions at the landfill site after closure. A liability is being recognized in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group for the Town of Webster's share of these costs based on an amortization schedule obtained from the Town of Hopkinton dated January 7, 1998, which covers annual payments for closure and postclosure care costs.

Based on the terms of the agreement, \$949,751 represents the Town of Webster's share of the accrual for landfill closure and postclosure care costs which is 20% of the total. The Town expects to finance the closure and postclosure care costs by annual appropriation and an estimated 20% subsidy from the State of New Hampshire.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Knowledge will forever govern ignorance; and a people who mean to be their own governors must arm themselves with the power which knowledge gives.

When a town resident reflects back on the manner in which the town was administered, how will the year 2004 be remembered? The year started as most years do, with budget preparations and a town meeting. The town's budget for 2004 came in at \$1,303,714. The town portion of the budget was increased by 17.5% percent over the previous year. The increase was related to among other things, a new fire truck that was purchased and arrived at the end of October and insurance premium increases over previous years. The year also focused on the revaluation process that was started in 2003.

The Town engaged Avitar Associates to conduct the Town-wide revaluation in order to appraise each property in Webster for its current market value as of the 1st of April 2004. The process involved sending the proposed revaluation to each property owner in the town and then having informal reviews with property owners who questioned the assessment. Once the new values were found to be appropriate a final assessment was completed. This assessment was then made appealable through the abatement process where the Selectmen received 38 requests to abate taxes. Arguments ranged from those involving equity issues to those involving issues of features and quality of the home. The Board of Selectmen granted approximately \$12,272 in abatements for the year, with only three being further appealed to the Board of Tax and Land Appeals

The process of tax equalization has not ended and will continue into the upcoming years. The goal, mandated by state statute, is to bring all values of property in the town to 100% of the current market value. This may include, however, only bringing a certain class of property, such as vacant land or waterfront property – which tends to appreciate/depreciate at different rates than normal residential property, back in line with the overall municipality. In fact we are already noticing that prices of homes being sold in 2004 are well above the tax assessments, which will likely require future revaluations for the town.

The Board of Selectmen also received 17 new current use applications and spent time reviewing all existing current use properties to ensure the assessments are in line with current state law. In addition to the sometimes-mundane administrative process involved with the issue of taxation, the Board of Selectmen took time to celebrate the 30 years of service to the town of our tax collector, Madeline Roberts. Maddie has continued to provide a tremendous benefit to the town with her knowledge of the state's tax laws and her ability to communicate with the town's taxpayers.

The year 2004 also saw much work done by volunteers on the Master Plan committee. The Town's Master Plan has not been updated since 1992 and many hard-working individuals spent countless hours attending meetings and writing sections to bring the plan into the 21st century. The work will likely culminate in 2005 with the adoption of a new Master Plan. Our Planning Board spearheaded

the effort, with the leadership of volunteer Sue Rauth and the support of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. The Planning Board also was involved with approving the largest subdivision application since 1990. A 12-lot subdivision was approved for residential houses to be erected on Call Road and Battle Street/Route 127. Some of those homes have already been started. Likewise, 2004 for the second year in a row saw the exhaustion of building permit applications. It is estimated that approximately 19 new homes were actually completed in 2004. The Town also put into place its septic review process for new homes, with the engagement of a certified soil scientist.

2004 also saw a push by developers to erect housing on Class VI and Private Roads. The Board of Selectmen have opposed such building and were even involved, with the Zoning and Planning Boards in litigation over the matter. A settlement to the litigation was worked out in November.

On a sadder note, 2004 and early 2005 saw the passing of four former town officials. James "Lukie" Roberts, Bob Mock, Ruth Stebbins, and Janice Dawe have left us but their memories will live on in the Town. Their service to the betterment of the community is certainly appreciated and will be carried on by the many hardworking town volunteers and employees that come after them.

Webster has also seen the changing of the guard in the Fire Department. The chief of 28 years, Bill Welcome, retired from the force and moved to Belmont in October. Dan St. Cyr retired and moved to Danbury after 25 years of service on the Fire Department. Shawn Mitchell, a full-time officer in the City of Concord's Fire Department, replaces him. Changes in personnel also occurred with our Road Agent. Adam Mock replaced Keith Barnard in December. Other changes occurred in the Town this past September with the loss of the local school-busing contract. Town resident, Bob Drown, provided services to the SAU for the transportation of Webster students for 50 years. School officials have now entered into a new contract.

The Town of Webster continues to be a wonderful place. It is only, however, with the work of dedicated people that the town can offer what it does. The Board of Selectmen are very thankful to the many volunteers and employees of the town, who provide selfless acts for the community. We appreciate the involvement of the town residents in our many activities. Whether it is a committee that meets once a month, or the volunteer fire fighters that are on-call, or the paid employees that go that extra step, our town says thanks.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Webster saw an increase again this year in the number of new residents with nearly thirty new homes. Due to this increase the demand for police services reached an all time high in 2004 with the department responding to over 2,400 calls. As a result, it became necessary to hire a qualified part-time office assistant to carry out the ever-increasing list of administrative duties. This new position allows our on-duty officers to carry out their duties in a timely manor and be more accessible to the public. In an effort to offset the initial cost of hiring the office assistant, I applied for and received a federal grant that will reimburse 75% of the first year's salary of this position. The federal grant is specifically

designed to re-deploy existing officers that are bogged down with secretarial duties.

Currently, the Department has two of its employees deployed to Iraq, one full-time officer and one part-time officer. We keep them in our thoughts for a safe return.

We are available 24 hours a day to respond to your needs, and strive to provide the most prompt professional service possible. Your continued help in promptly reporting any suspicious activity or concerns is greatly appreciated.

I would like to thank the town's people and the selectmen for their continued support. By working together we are making Webster a safer community.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

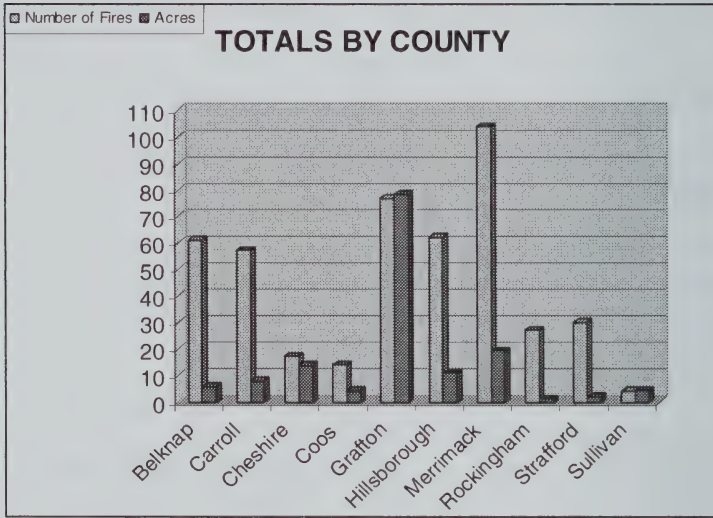

To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. A fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information contact the Division of Forests & Lands (603) 271-2217, or online at www.nhdf.org.

This last year was fairly wet throughout the spring and summer months, however we finished the season with an active fall fire season. In order to meet an increased demand for services, the Forest Protection Bureau was reorganized

into three regions with smaller Forest Ranger Districts and over the last several years we have added two Forest Rangers. The fifteen state fire towers were the first to report on many fires throughout the state and they completed many other projects on the low fire danger days. The state implemented a program called Tower Quest to help citizens learn about fire towers and the need to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. The United States celebrated Smokey Bear's 60th birthday in 2004, and celebrations were held throughout the state. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire smart and fire safe!

CAPITAL AREA MUTUAL AID FIRE COMPACT

We welcomed the Town of Deering Fire Department as a new member to the Capital Area Fire Compact in June. Deering provides fire and rescue service to its community under the direction of Fire Chief Arnold Anderson. Upon completion of communications equipment conversions, dispatch service began on October 5, 2004.

With the addition of Deering, the Compact now provides service to nineteen member communities encompassing 675 square miles of area with a resident population of 109,870. Mutual aid response is given to and received from several other communities and mutual aid districts. Delivery of emergency service varies daily by community, based on tourism, special events, weather, and commercial activity.

Fire and Emergency Medical dispatch service is provided by the City of Concord Fire Department's Communications Center with six full-time dispatchers under the direction of dispatch supervisor Captain Ernest Petrin. All dispatchers participate in telecommunications training courses. Dispatched incidents in 2004 increased to 16,107, approximately 6.5% above the previous year. A detailed report by community is attached.

Due to increased call volume and activity in dispatch, the Compact with the City of Concord have reviewed staffing requirements in Fire Alarm. Current authorized staffing in 2004 is one Dispatcher Supervisor and six shift schedule Dispatchers. We have recognized for some time that staffing would need to be addressed. The Board of Directors in October 2004 unanimously agreed to support the addition of two dispatchers in 2005 to provide two dispatchers on duty at all times.

A major improvement to the communications link between the Fire Alarm dispatch center and one of our main transmitters at Mt. Kearsarge was completed in the fall of 2004. We have been able to tie in to the State microwave link that provides a high quality and redundant communications channel. The quality and clarity of the signal is much improved with greater reliability.

The Chief Coordinator responded to 134 mutual aid incidents in 2004, and handles the administrative functions of the Compact. He continues to participate on several state and regional committees that affect mutual aid operations. AS an active member of the NH First Responder Radio Interoperability Committee, I can report that all Compact Departments have or will receive new digital mobile radios for their fire apparatus and emergency ambulances through the Homeland Security funding initiative, at little or no direct local cost. The second phase of the program will address portable communications. All communities in New Hampshire are receiving digital communications equipment for Fire and Emergency Medical Services that will provide radio interoperability capability with other public safety agencies.

The Compact 2004 operating budget was \$600,578. All Compact operations, including the Chief Coordinator's position, office, command vehicle, and dispatch services are provided through this budget. Funding by the member communities is based on a combination of property values and population. We actively pursue any grant funding.

The Compact Training Committee chaired by Assistant Chief Dick Pistey, with members Deputy Chief Mike Paveglio and Deputy Chief Shawn Mitchell assisted all departments in hosting at least one mutual aid training exercise during the year. Mutual aid drills involve several departments and test the system capabilities in fire suppression, emergency medical, mass casualty, hazardous materials, incident management, and personnel safety. We thank the Training Committee for their continuing support to the Compact.

The Central New Hampshire HazMat Team, comprised of all Capital Area and Lakes Region members continues to train bi-weekly and responds to 54 communities in our combined coverage area. The team operates with three response units and will welcome personnel interested in joining, training, and operating with the team. Funding has been approved through a Homeland Security grant for a "new" Hazmat response vehicle to replace a used 1989 unit and will be delivered in early 2005. We extend our thanks and appreciation to all team members for their willingness to respond to these emergencies. We also receive some grant funds for education, training, and to support data collection of hazardous materials inventories reported by facilities in our operating area.

We encourage all departments to send representatives and actively participate in all Compact meetings. Your input is needed on all issues and your members need to be informed of Compact activities and planning.

Thanks to all departments for your great cooperation.

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is an association of 20 communities in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties established under RSA 36. CNHRPC provides a variety of planning services to its members, including consultations on planning issues; planning research; sample ordinances, regulations, and planning documents; access to Census information and other data sources; grant information; review and comment on planning documents; development review; and educational programs. Membership also entitles a community to affordable planning services such as master planning assistance, geographic information systems (GIS) mapping, and other land use and transportation planning-related assistance.

In 2004, CNHRPC staff assisted the Town of Webster with the following:

- Assisted the Planning Board with the Transportation Chapter, Current Land Use Chapter and the Future Land Use Chapter of the Town Master Plan.
- Consulted with the Planning Board, Selectmen and other Town Officials to provide information on planning topics such as:
 - Planning Board membership
- Updated GIS Transportation layer.
- Staff collected accident data and speed limit data for the Town of Webster.
- Staff collected traffic count data.
- Assisted the Planning Board with updating the Town land use regulations by preparing a summary of recommended changes to the Zoning, Site Plan, and Subdivision Regulations and suggested changes for 2005 Town Meeting.
- Staff attended a Planning Board meeting to review suggestions.
- Prepared maps and met with the town regarding the forecast 2030 housing and employment figures for the Regional Master Plan.

In addition to the local services described above, in 2004 the CNHRPC provided the following services to Webster as part of regional activities:

- Held training sessions related to Planning Board process and development review procedures.
- Coordinated meetings of the CNHRPC Regional Resource Conservation Committee (R2C2). The R2C2 seeks to bring representatives of each of the region's communities together to work on conservation issues that affect the overall region.
- Hosted educational regional workshops on basic planning procedures.
- Conducted traffic counts throughout the region.
- Organized and hosted meetings of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC).

- Continued the update and expansion of the regional transportation model. The transportation model will be an integral component of the I-93 Bow to Concord Transportation Planning Study.
- Provided assistance to municipalities, groups and interested individuals regarding the Transportation Enhancements (TE) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) programs.
- Provided continuing technical assistance to the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee and the Contoocook North Branch Local Advisory Committee.
- Provided assistance to CNHRPC member towns regarding National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participation and compliance.
- Maintained and updated the www.nharpc.org website of statewide local census data and statistics.
- Assisted local housing and childcare advocacy groups through funding provided by the Community Development Finance Authority (CDFA).

PLANNING BOARD

Planning Board members for 2004 were Nancy Van Loan (Chairman), Cliff Broker, Jere Buckley (Secretary), Lynmarie Lehmann (Selectman Member), and Bill Inman. Alternate Members, in order of seniority, were Richard Cummings, John Nelson, Alan Hofmann, and Tom Mullins.

The Board conducted regularly scheduled public meetings on the third Thursday of each month, and additional special meetings when required. The regular meetings incorporated public hearings on subdivision and site plan review applications, as applicable.

In the course of the year, the Board accepted, considered, and ultimately approved applications for:

- A twelve-lot subdivision by the Nichols Trust on Call Road.
- A two-lot subdivision by Nathaneal and Carole Broker on Gerrish Road.
- A two-lot subdivision by George Chakas on Battle Street.
- A two-lot subdivision by Chuck and Joyce Rose on Little Hill Road.

The Nichols Trust subdivision was the largest presented to the Board in a long time, precipitated a number of citizen concerns regarding road upgrades and other issues, and is considered by the Board to be a precursor of additional similar subdivisions that development pressures seem sure to prompt.

A public hearing regarding a 3-lot subdivision on Lake Road proposed by the Nichols Estate was ongoing (under continuance) at year end.

The Board reviewed and approved a total of 18 voluntary merger requests, many of them in the Pillsbury Lake District. The Board generally welcomes these requests, especially in the Pillsbury Lake district where small lot sizes are often the source of problems.

The Board reviewed and approved 4 lot line adjustments, a site plan for an antique motorcycle repair and restoration business on Deer meadow Road, and a site plan for a home-based welding business on Pearson Hill Road. Those site plan reviews complemented ZBA granting of special exceptions for the indicated commercial enterprises.

The Board on a number of occasions was involved in a matter involving proposed development on Cashell Lane. That topic eventually became a matter of litigation between the Town and the applicant. Said litigation was eventually resolved without any formal action required of the Board.

Beginning in April, the Board convened most of their regularly scheduled meetings an hour earlier than normal in order to allow time for the preliminary review of draft chapters for an updated *Webster Master Plan*. These chapters were submitted to the Board by the Master Plan Committee, created by the Board in 2003 in response to the State mandate that each town's Planning Board create and periodically update a master plan that maps future Town development and serves as the basis for Town ordinances and other planning/control tools. At year end, the Board had completed preliminary review of all 8 *Master Plan* chapters and the Master Plan Committee was assembling a consolidated document, anticipating a final Board review and a public hearing in early 2005.

It is generally conceded that the *Zoning Ordinance* and the *Subdivision Regulations* are in need of updating. In order to start that process, the Board proposed several amendments to the *Zoning Ordinance* for consideration at the 2005 Town Meeting. At year-end, public hearings on those proposals were anticipated in January of 2005.

The updated *Master Plan*, once adopted, will provide the basis for consideration of additional ordinance and regulation changes. That activity, in addition to the Board's normal agenda of subdivision review and other responsibilities, will assure that 2005 will be another very busy year.

I am grateful to my Board Members for their many volunteer hours and their dedication to the sensible development of our community.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

This year, the Commission turned thirty, having been established in 1974 under the chairmanship of Clarence Jeffrey. Our major work in 2004 was to

update the Natural Resources Chapter of the Webster Master Plan, and to add three new members and two alternates to the Commission, with expertise in needed areas. We are keeping a close eye on the Bio-Energy plant in West Hopkinton which seeks to incinerate demolition wood with a high lead content. A gift to the WCC, a bequest from Bertha Fisher, will be used for a guide to footpaths of Webster. On Call Road, the developer left 75-foot buffers around several excellent vernal pools, but we were unable to truly protect them. In the Paul P. Mock Forest, and the Riverdale Natural Area, trails were cleared. We made one new wetland study of a swamp above the Blackwater. In the Pillsbury Lake District, we responded to requests for help when developers clear-cut land within the Shoreland Protection Act, or destroyed wetlands. We voted in November to authorize Betsy Janeway, as chair of the commission, to automatically request a 30 day extension for dredge and fill permits in wetlands. This will not affect the timing of applicants for permit: it will not prolong their waiting time. It gives the WCC time to consider the application at a monthly meeting without calling a special meeting.

CEMETERY COMMISSION

We would like to remind folks about the rules and regulations concerning the use of our cemeteries. New lots are available at no charge to Webster residents and taxpayers, contact the Trustees to secure a lot as the Trustees lay out the lot with corner stones a requirement. Non-residents are admitted for burial in existing family lots where space is available.

We now are getting more requests for cremain openings without the services of a funeral home so payments must be paid in advance. All openings of the cemetery are the responsibility of the Trustees.

Shrubs and perennial plants are not allowed, only annual or cut flowers may be planted at one place on a lot.

Waterproof vaults are required for the interment of caskets.

All burials are discontinued once we have snow or the ground is frozen. Generally we don't start burials until after May 1st depending on ground conditions and the weather.

WEBSTER FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

If we were to use just one word to describe the events of the past year, that word would have to be "generosity." Local residents, NH libraries, and other nonprofit organizations donated half of the materials added to the library in

2004. It's hard to say no to good books, so our shelves are more crowded than ever. Girl Scout Cadets made two wooden "Super Readers" to help get us all in the reading spirit during the Summer Reading Program, which also benefited from the Women's Union donation for hiring a performer. Ox Pond Press donated our new sign. We received a generous monetary donation from one of our patrons. John Lyman Brooks donated an Optelec 20/20 magnifier for the vision impaired. The Children's Literacy Foundation approved the Library's second grant application (2003's grant gave the library over \$1,000 worth of new children's books) which enabled us to hire a children's writer to spend the day with the town's elementary school students. People have also been very generous with their time, from the parents who helped out during the Summer Reading program, to the crew of volunteers who keep the Library open Wednesday evenings.

The CliF grant author visit to the Webster Elementary School (despite the location, this was a free-of-charge event for all elementary-school aged children in town) was a success, with Bow author Jennifer Ericsson visiting in April. The children all enjoyed their time with Ericsson, and learned a lot about the process of getting a book published. Thank you to Webster Elementary School Reading Specialist Bruce Johnson for contributing his thoughts to the grant application and to the author selection.

The Summer Reading Program, *Check out a Hero*, was a "Super" success, thanks to the imaginative theme, generous volunteers, corny jokes and flamboyant tricks (not to mention the rubber chickens!) of Mr. Phil's magic show, Webster Fire Department's show-and-tell, and a great bunch of enthusiastic readers.

Our Book Group finished up its 8th year, and is looking forward to some more great reading in 2005.

As always, we appreciate your support of the Library, and we hope that you find the library also supports you – whether it's for finding that perfect beach read in the summer, borrowing books from other libraries for your college class, or job hunting via the internet.

HISTORY REPORT 2004

January started the year, cold with very little snow but lots of wind.

Webster is growing much faster than any of us can believe or want. A major subdivision known as the Nichol's Trust has been proposed for 12 build-

ing lots and a 23-acre "common area" on the northerly corner of the Call Road and Battle Street.

Daniel Webster Grange sponsored a Christmas decoration contest for homes and grounds. They had a very good response with several very pretty displays.

The Sports Committee is very busy with all the different sports and age groups for each. New members are always welcome.

The Webster Congregational Church held several suppers during the winter months on the second Saturday of each month.

First in the nation Presidential Primary was held January 27, 2004. We had 482 voters cast their vote with 1,022 on the checklist. Democrats received the following votes: John Kerry – 130, Howard Dean – 83, John Edwards – 56, Wesley Clark – 46, Joe Lieberman – 44, Dennis Kucinich – 7, and Al Sharpton – 3. George Bush received 77 on the Republican ticket; four others received nine votes combined.

The Town Warrant and Budget were discussed on February 17th at the Town Hall.

The Planning Board reviewed a revised "Nichol's Trust" subdivision eliminating the 23-acre "common area" and distributing that land among some of the 12 lots. The Planning Board has received another large subdivision of eight lots on 73 acres. The land, part of the Gerrish Farm at one time, goes between Gerrish Road and Deer Meadow Road and is owned by Nathanael Broker.

On March 2 we had 138 voters vote for a State Representative to Concord to fill a vacancy.

The Annual School Meeting was held on March 4 at MVHS. The budget of \$24.6 million dollars was approved, an increase of 1.68%.

A year-long project has started, Webster's Master Plan that has to be upgraded and brought up to date.

The Broker Subdivision has been approved for a revision of two lots, one being a 50 acre lot, between Gerrish and Deer Meadow Roads.

Town Election was held on March 9 from 10-7. We had three candidates for Selectman, David Batchelder received 118 votes, George Hashem 82 and David Buttrick 57. The rest of the officers ran unopposed. The business meeting was held on Saturday, March 13 at 10:00 a.m. We had a ballot vote for a lease-purchase agreement of \$260,000 for the purpose of leasing a custom pumping engine and related equipment for the Fire Department. The vote was 91 yes – 26 no, a 2/3 ballot vote required. Everything else passed with adjournment at 12:40 p.m.

The 21st Annual American Canoe Association New England Division Slalom Championships were held on April 24 and 25. The course goes from the bridge to behind the school. They have to traverse 25 gates.

The fifth grade spent a week at Ferry Beach Ecology School in Maine.

The Planning Board is meeting an hour earlier each month so they may discuss a chapter of the Master Plan each time.

A Memorial Day Celebration was held on Friday, May 28 at the Meeting House with the fifth graders reading essays they had written, a trip to the cemetery and back to the Meeting House for ice cream.

It should be noted that Grange, The Circle of Home and Family, Women's Union, 4-H club and several Girl Scout Troops are very active in town affairs.

The Summer Community Suppers that benefit the Church, Grange and Women's Union were held for seven weeks. These suppers require a lot of volunteers not only to work but to donate food.

The summer swim program was held in July on Lake Winnepocket across from the Austin Home.

Captain Daniel St. Cyr resigned after 23 years from the Webster Fire Department as he and his wife Janet are building a new home in Danbury.

Old Home Day was held August 21 even though it rained. The parade went as planned, starting at the Safety Building, with Janice and Fred Dawe as Grand Marshals riding in the back seat of the cruiser. There were floats, antique cars, oxen, bikers, walkers and a surprising number of spectators. Merrimack Valley High School Band played inside the Town Hall where the games, Strings 'N Things, picnic lunch and many more activities were held. A chicken barbeque was held, followed by a dance. A lot of volunteers turned a lousy day into a lot of fun.

The guest speaker at Church on Sunday was Rev. Johanne Dame whose parents were former pastors here.

A fire at 1377 Battle Street destroyed the barn claiming the lives of two (2) horses but the firefighters saved the ell and house. The property is owned by Judy Garland. A new barn was built to replace the other one. Cause was unknown.

A committee was formed to present ideas for the future use of the old Police Station. Committee members are Dana Reddish, Nancy Rideout and Jennifer Carleton with Jerry and Dottie Monz added later.

The State Primary was held on September 14.

The Webster Congregational Church wishes to "Thank" everyone that helped at the food booth at the Hopkinton State Fair and the Highland Games as both were a big success.

A successful Town Wide Yard Sale was held on September 8 from 8-3, in the rain, to support the Playground Project.

Daniel Webster Grange, with help from the Webster Girl Scouts, hosted the 9th Annual Halloween Party.

The Presidential Election was held on November 2. The State went Democratic statewide but Webster didn't except for Governor John Lynch 600 to 421 for Craig Benson. George Bush - "Dick" Cheney won nationwide. We had 1,032 citizens vote with 155 new voters added that day.

Fire Chief Bill Welcome retired after 28 years of service as he has moved out of Town. A reception was held to honor Bill and wife Pam on November 14 at the Town Hall. The new fire truck was on display.

The new appointed chief is Shawn Mitchell who works for the Concord Fire Department and has been a resident for about a year.

A fire on November 23 completely destroyed the home of Marty Bender and family on Little Hill. Their son Noah 18 was home from college and awoke as his room was full of smoke but escaped safely. They lost everything including

six puppies. The home was fully engulfed by the time the first firefighters got there. At least eight towns responded. The house was a former school house built in 1809 with many new additions added.

There are three homes being built in the "Nichol's Trust" subdivision as the year draws to a close.

If you think it's been wet this year, it has. We are over four inches above normal. Weather precipitation (Concord) total for the year 42.20", normal is 37.69", over by 4.51".

There were a total of 28 building permits issued this year. Two of these permits were for replacement homes.

Harold and Betsy Janeway lost their big barn built in 1861 early on December 29, 2004. The barn, along with three smaller buildings, was lost as well as some antique wagons and buggies, a pickup truck, tools and many other items. Their eight sheep escaped the blaze thought to have been started by an electrical water heater used to keep the sheeps' water from freezing. Luckily the 1789 farm house was saved.

It was 48° at 7:00 A.M. January 1, 2005.

Moderator Harold Janeway called the meeting to order at 10:00 AM. He stated that town meeting is a little bit like making maple syrup, "You let off a lot of steam but generally end up with a good product."

Clarence Jeffrey led the townspeople in the Pledge of Allegiance .

2. The Town authorized the Selectmen to enter into a three-year municipal lease-purchase agreement in the amount of two hundred and sixty thousand dollars (\$260,000) for the purpose of leasing a custom pumping engine with related equipment, for the Fire Department. Further to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000) to be used as the down-payment and authorize the withdrawal of one hundred forty thousand dollars (\$140,000) from the previously established Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund, with the balance of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be raised by taxation. The lease agreement will not contain a "non-appropriation clause." The first of three (3) annual installment payments of approximately thirty-three thousand dollars (\$33,000) will not be due until 2005. The Selectmen recommend this article. (2/3 Ballot Vote Required) Roy Fanjoy proposed an amendment to raise and appropriate the full amount of \$260,000 to purchase the fire truck out-

right. This amended article **FAILED BY VOICE VOTE**. The polls remained open for one hour. **Ballot Results on the original article were: YES – 91; NO – 26**

3. We adopted the provisions for the optional Veterans' credit, increasing the current credit from \$100 to \$500, pursuant to RSA 72:28, II" The Selectmen recommend this article. (By Petition) John Little proposed an amendment to raise the Veterans' credit from \$100 to \$200. This amended article **FAILED BY VOICE VOTE** The original article **PASSED BY VOICE VOTE**

4. We adopted the provisions for the optional Veterans' credit for a service connected total disability, increasing the current credit from \$1,400.00 to \$2,000.00, pursuant to RSA 72:35, I-a" The Selectmen recommend this article. (By Petition) **PASSED BY VOICE VOTE**

5. We modified the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Webster, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$62,500; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$75,000; for a person 80 years of age or older \$87,500. To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$23,400 or, if married, a combined net income of less that \$32,400; and own net assets not in excess of \$70,000 excluding the value of the person's residence." The Selectmen recommend this article. **PASSED BY VOICE VOTE**

6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty five thousand eight hundred dollars (\$65,800) for the repaving of a portion of Roby Road, repaving of Hollings Drive and paving of Christopher Roberts Road. This is a Special Warrant Article, which will not lapse until the work is completed, or by December 31, 2005, whichever is sooner. The Selectmen recommend this article. (Majority vote required). **PASSED BY VOICE VOTE**

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Bachelder at 7:04 p.m. She asked for nominations for the open Commissioner position. Treasurer Jackson presented a job description. Commissioner Plourde gave a special thank you to Phil Strittmatter for his work for the community. Moderator Bachelder introduced Board members: Commissioner Marilyn Plourde, Commissioner Julie Kenney, Commissioner Lisa Dugre, Treasurer Kern Jackson, and Clerk Bruce Johnson. A nomination for Thomas McWilliams for Commissioner for 3 years was made. Tom accepted.

Article 2. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for the purposes indicated: (Recommended by the Commissioners)

Treasurer Jackson presented Article 2. Dan Rooney questioned the cost of deweeding. Commissioner Plourde answered that \$4,000 goes to permits. Bert Chouinard questioned where the \$15,000 for employees go. Treasurer Jackson answered that the money includes taxes, ADP costs, and salaries. Laurie Methven asked for more information on the water superintendent. Treasurer Jackson answered that the water superintendent is Pump Systems. There was also some discussion on rental equipment. The arrangement for the backhoe is that it is delivered on the weekends, and if used, the District is charged, and if not used, the District is not charged. Shawn Mitchell questioned the employee costs and subcontractor costs. Treasurer Jackson answered that employees were paid \$18 to \$20 dollars per hour and that some subcontractors were paid \$25 per hour. Byron Shilansky asked if the State would pay for some of the deweeding. Commissioner Plourde answered that because the lake does not have invasive milfoil, the State will not pay for some of the deweeding. Steve Palmer asked for more information on maintenance and snow removal. Treasurer Jackson answered that maintenance includes lawn mowing and is minimal, and that snow removal is \$80 per storm for the heavy equipment that is needed to remove snow at the two pump houses. **Article 2 passed unanimously on a hand vote.**

Article 3. To see if the District will vote to rename the Water Supply Trust Fund as the Water System Trust Fund. The purpose of this fund is to repair or upgrade the water system as needed, including but not limited to drilling new wells, connecting wells to the system, testing and licensing new wells, upgrading storage and pressurization equipment, treating water to comply with State and Federal quality standards, or major improvements to the water lines, pumps, valves and other equipment on the distribution network. The Commissioners are given the authority to act as agents to expend from this fund. (A 2/3 vote is required to approve this article.)

Treasurer Jackson explained that money in three (3) separate trust fund accounts should be put into one (1) account. This will give the Commissioners more authority to expend funds in emergency situations. Byron Shilansky questioned where the money for the funds comes from. Treasurer Jackson answered that the money comes from Article 5. Dan Rooney questioned why the original funds were set up as three (3) separate funds. Treasurer Jackson answered that the funds were all set up at three (3) different times. Mike Andosca asked if

there was the need for a vote to expend funds. Treasurer Jackson answered that there is no need for such a vote. **Article 3 passed on a hand vote with 24 for the vote and 0 opposed.**

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to close the Water Main Improvement Trust Fund and the New Well Trust Fund into the General Fund and raise and appropriate \$29,115 from the General Fund into the Water Supply Trust Fund.

There were questions concerning the wording of the Article. Treasurer Jackson answered that the wording was the direct wording from the DRA. **Article 4 passed on a hand vote.**

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in the Water System Trust Fund.

There was a question about what constitutes an emergency. Commissioner Plourde answered that an emergency is whatever DES constitutes an emergency. **Article 5 passed on a hand vote.**

Article 6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$31,300 for the purchase and installation of water meters for each consumer hook-up to the water system. Funds will be raised through a one-time surcharge of \$272.25 billed to each water consumer.

Laurie Methven spoke to urge people to vote yes. She shared that in order to win grants, the District needs the meters. Tamara Bryant asked for more information about future billing. Treasurer Jackson answered that there is a budget of approximately \$105,000, the District will use present pump meters to estimate the overall water usage, then divide by the number of people using the water system, create a base average with a possible sliding rate meaning that the more water a consumer uses, the more the consumer pays. Alan Gauntt asked whether the meters would be internal or external, and shared a concern about people tampering with their meters. Commissioner Plourde answered that the meters were both internal and external, and added that there are antitheft features with the meters. Gary Plourde added that the meters will be installed mid-summer, will be activated, but that the Commissioners have until next March to figure out appropriate fees. He also added that gas companies check meters yearly, and that any tampering is considered stealing, and is treated as such. Lou Bowley shared opposition to paying now to upgrade the system. Sharon Hunt asked that if she already has an existing water meter does she need to purchase an additional water meter. Commissioner Plourde answered that her water meter needs to be compatible with the new system. Shawn Mitchell requested real dollar figures for grant money. Tamara Bryant answered that it is realistic to expect the District grants in the range of \$50,000 to 1.5 million dollars, and reiterated that in order to win the grants, the District needs to install the meters. Treasurer Jackson added that the water system was built in 1965, probably not meeting standards at the time, so far only a half mile of pipe has been replaced, that there are lots of problems at every junction, that the cost to fix all problems could reach 1.6 million dollars, that meaning \$10,000 per water household, and that the 75% grants would go a long way towards ensuring the money needed for

upgrades. He also added that there are two options: one option being that all residents disclose financial statements, and if the community is below a certain level, there may be grant approval; and the other option is the meters for the grants. There was also some discussion on other costly projects such as the change of acceptable arsenic levels which will be dropped by September 2005, and with which the District needs to expend money to be in compliance. Presently there is a demonstration grant that provides the equipment to do this, and the District only needs to build a building to do this. Treasurer Jackson added that the water supply is adequate, but that the problems are with distribution. Steve Palmer asked about people who refuse to pay for the meters. Commissioner Kenney answered that monthly payments are possible. Dan Rooney asked for more clarification on how meters lead to grant approval. Clerk Johnson answered that consultants advise that meters lead to conservation, and that grant readers look for communities making movement towards conservation as communities worthy of the grants.

Treasurer Jackson proposed that Article 6 be amended to: "To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$31,300 for the purchase and installation of water meters for each consumer hook-up to the water system. Funds will be raised through a one-time surcharge of up to \$272.25 billed to each water consumer." **Article 6 passed as amended.**

Article 7. To transact any other business, which may legally come before this meeting.

Commissioner Plourde presented a letter of resignation. New Commissioners to appoint a Commissioner for one year. Employee Bert Chouinard also resigned. New Commissioners needing to look into new employees. Lee Durgin welcomed new Commissioners and a willingness to work with the new Commissioners. Georgette Bachelder shared the need for all residents to work with Commissioners. Shawn Mitchell recognized the small meeting turnout and requested that attendees get the word out that help is needed. Residents requested that telephone calls be answered, or that the answering machine post messages about current problems and actions being taken to correct those problems. Meeting adjourned by Moderator at 9:10.
