# Warrant for Annual Meeting

---

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilton, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to appear at the town house in said Wilton, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To hear the reports of town officers, agents and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year, including maintenance of poor, repair of roads and bridges, Memorial day observance, street lighting, hydrants, flushing of sewers, maintenance of water works and sewers, State and County tax, interest on debt, board of health, printing, fire department, insect pests, sidewalks, cemeteries, police department, serial notes and Free Library.
4. To see if the town will grant the free use of the town hall on Memorial day and evening to Abiel A. Livermore Post 71, G. A. R.
5. To see if the town will grant the free use of the town hall for the public schools for memorial exercises and one evening to the graduating class of the High school.
6. To see if the town will grant the free use of the town house to the Fire Department for the annual party.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care and maintenance of permanent roads and raise and appropriate money for the same, constructed with state aid.

8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the completion of the grade near the Baptist church, Wilton Center.

9. To see what action the town will take in relation to construction of State Aid roads, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to oiling Main Street, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see what action the town will take in regard to the steam roller, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to allowing a discount on taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes as provided by the law of 1907.

14. To see what action the town will take in relation to straightening the highway near the Dale bridge, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see what action the town will take in regard to the compound water meters owned by the water works.

16. To see if the town will vote to install an electric light on Clark Street and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to dispense with the present Municipal Court, and will authorize the use of the Selectmen's room for such cases as may come before a qualified Justice of the Peace.

18. To see if the town will vote to straighten the highway between John Sheldon's and William Berry's and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to build an annex to the present High School and raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the same.

20. To see if the town will vote to employ a night watchman and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21. To see what action the town will take in relation to a suitable place for coasting.

22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## Report of Selectmen

---

To the Citizens of Wilton:

Your Selectmen submit the following report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1917:—

It is with regret we were called to chronicle the death of our foremost citizen, the Hon. George Edward Bales, the past year. In the death of Mr. Bales the town has lost a most valued citizen, one who brought honor to and was honored by his native town.

In the many years of service he had given his town, he had filled the office of tax collector, town treasurer, and member of the school board, trustee of the public library, town moderator for many years and judge of the municipal court; twice elected as representative to the general court and had served as a member of the state forestry and railroad commission. His was a life that was well and usefully lived. Upright in heart and true honesty, always approachable, a public official beyond reproach. His absence will ever be keenly felt. He has done the work of a true man.

### Permanent Improvements

By your vote, your board has caused to be built a substantial concrete, arch bridge over the river on the French Village road. We have every reason to believe it is well and honestly built. A good, strong railing is much needed at both ends of the bridge and recommend you take action thereon.

Some 2300 feet of permanent road has been built through that section commonly known as the island, making a much needed and desirable improvement at one of the main entrances to the town, and we recommend a continuance of the work the coming year.

Despite the fact that the flag pole was a gift from Mr. George G. Blanchard, we found the appropriation was inadequate to equip and erect the same. We think we were justified in exceeding the amount appropriated. July 4th the pole was dedicated with appropriate exer-

cises and "our flag of the free unfurled to the breeze."

### Highways

Unfinished repairs caused by heavy rains of 1915, the wet and unseasonable spring of the present year, combined with the unusual snow storms of the past winter caused a very large outlay of money. Our appropriation is greatly over-drawn as a result of these expenditures. The amount of money appropriated is not sufficient for ordinary repairs of the roads. While they are in much better shape than most country roads you should carefully consider this matter in making your appropriations for the ensuing year.

The money voted for lowering the grade, adjacent to the Baptist church at Middletown was insufficient. We recommend an appropriation to complete the work. The past year several citizens have made gifts of money to the highway department for road improvements, on condition the town expend an equal amount. Believing we were acting for the interest of the town we have accepted the gifts and conditions of same.

On account of the large amount of timber that is being cut, it is doubtful if we can hold our present valuation. A tax rate of over two dollars a hundred is a detriment to any town and a strong effort should be made to keep our rate within this limit.

Much money will be asked for at our annual meeting and every appropriation should be carefully considered.

Feb. 15, 1913 the net debt of the town was \$71,603.96. Feb. 15, 1916, net debt \$64,748.06. We expect the present year will show a further decrease. A large amount of interest money is paid annually to carry this debt. We suggest a committee be appointed to formulate a plan to properly care for this debt and devise means for payment of same.

The steam roller, through the State Highway Department, was hired for work in several towns. We have no money as yet in payment and have been unable to get a statement of amount due the town. At the adjourned town meeting you voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the town notes to pay for the new bridge. We thought it undesirable to borrow money

for this purpose and have succeeded in completing the work without increasing the town debt.

## REPORT OF COLLECTING AND BINDING TOWN REPORTS OF WILTON

---

At the annual town meeting of March 1916 it was voted to have the town reports collected, arranged and bound. This work was entrusted to my care. Through the assistance of several persons the following has been accomplished: The school reports have been collected for the years ending March 1, 1846 to February 15, 1916 inclusive, except for the year ending March 1, 1851, and for the year ending March 1, 1853. It is possible that no school reports were issued those years. The reports of the selectmen and other town officers have been collected for the years ending March 1, 1849 to February 15, 1916 inclusive, except for the year ending March 1, 1851. No report was found for that year and it is possible that none was printed.

The selectmen's reports for the year ending March 1, 1849 and for the year ending March 1, 1850 were not in shape to be put into a bound volume, therefore it was thought best to have them reprinted and put in pamphlet form so they could be bound with the other reports.

No reports of the selectmen for the years previous to the one of March 1, 1849 could be found although there is reason to think that there were earlier reports of the selectmen and that they may date back to March 1846, the date that the first school report has been found.

There has also been collected copies of the Centennial Celebration at Wilton, September 25, 1839, copies of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the town, September 12, 1889, copies of the address of Isaac S. Whiting at the dedication of the Town House, January 1, 1885, and a few other reports connected with the town.

These reports have been bound and there are two sets of these reports. One set has been left at the safe at the Town House; the other set at the Gregg Free Library.

The expense has been \$21.00 of which \$10.00 was for printing and \$11.00 for binding.

## Report of Fire Department

---

Citizens of Wilton:—

In submitting our annual report we wish to congratulate you on the care and preparedness which has kept the fire loss at a very nominal figure.

The principal losses were Oct 4 at Geo. G. Tolford's residence; fire confined to the ell, damage comparatively small.

Feb. 20th still alarm for fire at Dick place, on Milford-Mason road; outbuilding destroyed.

We have had the usual number of chimney fires, also three gasolene fires with slight loss.

Early in the year the members of the department were saddened by the death of Chief Engineer P. J. Abbott, a sincere and devoted public servant. Subsequently E. J. Hopkins was appointed to fill the vacancy on the board, and as mechanic for the department, D. M. Brennan assuming the duties of Chief.

The equipment of the department is the same as last year, with the addition of 500 feet of new hose. This new hose is kept in the basement of the town house as we deem it unwise to house all of our equipment in the wooden building used as a fire station. Our thanks are due the Wilton Telephone Co. for installing a free service at the central station, facilitating the work of the department.

We take this opportunity to thank the people in general for their manifest appreciation of the efforts of their firemen.

## Report of Water Commissioner

---

The Water Works System is on a good paying basis, returning a substantial net profit, over and above all expenses.

As will be seen by the financial report the water rentals collected during the year amount to \$2,580.92, and this does not include the town's appropriation for hydrant service, watering troughs and flushing sewers.

The expense during the year for care and maintenance, construction work, etc., is \$453.43, and the interest on the water bonds \$1,340., making total expense of \$1,793.43. As will be readily seen this leaves a satisfactory balance in favor of the water works.

Conditions at the reservoir the past year have been normal, with an ample quantity of water at all times, and analysis has shown the quality to be very satisfactory.

The same high water which necessitated making some repairs around the reservoir last year gullied out the road below the dam, and as this was not attended to at the time the Commissioners thought best to have it repaired this year, and the road has been put in excellent condition.
