REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY AGENT

The following is a summarized report of this Department's activities during 1971:

Winter Maintenance - \$55,209.01

The Winter Maintenance program covers all the Highway Department work from about December first to the middle of March, all road clearing due to snow and ice storms is charged to this account. We have approximately 100 miles of roads to care for with 6 hired trucks with plows, 1 Town tractor, 2 Town trucks and 1 grader. We have tried to give School Bus routes and areas where children walk in the streets to school or to meet the buses special attention. We also have to clear snow from sidewalks in the village as well as snow removal from both the Wilkins and Clark Schools, the Fire Station, Library, Old Brick School and Town Hall.

The other main work load in the Winter consists of cuting trees and brush. Areas where future construction is contemplated are more economically cleared in the winter as it is possible to burn all brush at the site and eliminate costly hauling to the dump. During the winter of 70-71 brush and trees were cut at the two bridge projects (Boston Post Road North and Thornton Ferry No. 1). Also the Pond Parish Road, Corduroy Road, Old Milford Road and the Dodge Road were brushed. As the cost of Winter Maintenance varies each year, I hope that the average taxpayer takes the time to analyze some of the reasons why: The cost of labor \$1.50 per hour in 1960 to \$2.60 in 1971; A truck rental from \$4.80 in 1960 to \$10.70 in 1971; 118 tons of salt used in 1960 to approximately 800 tons used in 1971 and finally approximately 40 miles of road have been added to our system since 1960. These all contribute to large expenditures. Also because Amherst is a so-called bedroom town your Highway Department has an added responsibility each winter in that every day the great majority of working people have been able to leave Amherst for their jobs and return at night. School buses have to pick up and return children from their home each day. We have areas where winter maintenance is very costly and I would like to list a few: Chestnut Hill, Walnut Hill Road, Mack Hill, Rocky Hill, Ponemah Hill, Christian Hill, Brimstone Hill, Ravine Road, Highland Drive, Deerwood Drive and Baboosic Lake just to name a few.

Sand is being used in larger amounts so we may cut the use of rock salt, in the name of ecology, but this does not save money and it takes longer to make the roads fit for travel. In order to expand this program we will need more power sanders and some type of larger loader in the future.

Summer Maintenance — \$24,062.98

All general maintenance from the middle of March to December 1 is covered under this account. Included is the grading, use of the York Rake on 38 gravel roads several times, cutting banks and ditches, spot graveling, the maintenance and replacement of culverts, setting posts, signs etc. on all roads. Also the maintenance of shoulders throughout the black road system and the machine and hand cutting of brush in the summer.

In 1971 several roads were improved, they were included in spot gravel and shoulder work as well: Lynch Farm Road, Austin Road, Thornton Ferry No. 2, Stearns Road, Pine Top Road, Dodge Road, New South Road, Boston Post Road North, Juniper Lane. Culverts were replaced on Old Coach Lane, Dodge Road, Boston Post Road North; Old Manchester Road (3), Lake Road, Col. Wilkins Road, Christian Hill (2), Walnut Hill (2). Four weeks were spent hand cutting brush and limbs on the Boston Post Road North, New Boston Road, Lake Road, Dodge Road, Border Street Thornton Ferry No. 2 and Chestnut Hill Road. Brush was cut by machine on approximately 90 miles of road and in some areas this was done several times. Many hours were spent on regular projects such as cleaning out culverts, replacing street and traffic signs etc. The painting of yellow lines on some of our heavy traveled roads was finally accomplished, this amount will however, not be paid until 1972.

Oiling - \$27,380.60

Under this account 23.1 miles of road was resurfaced including Lake Road, Thornton Ferry 1 & 2, part of Lyndeboro Road, Border Street, Souhegan Ave., Ponemah Hill, Old Nashua Road, North Hollis Road, Boston Post Road South; part of the Spring Road, Beaver Brook Circle; Southfield Road, Veterans Road, Stearns Road, Crocket Hill, Town Crier, Meadow Lane, Hodgson Lane, Bloody Brook, Brimstone Hill, North Meadow, Northfield, Windsor Park, Cross Road, Warren Way, Martingale and Melendy Hollows, Mack Hill, Brookwood Drive, Pine Acres, Lord Jeffrey, Old Coach Lane, Flanders Road, Upper Flanders Road, Roberge Drive, Merrimack Road east end. The cost of patching all black roads and sweeping of all roads to be re-oiled is covered under this oiling appropriation. 8,000 gal. of waste oil was applied to gravel roads where dust is a problem.

Town Road Aid - \$6,876.88

TRA is a program started in 1947 by the state to help Towns improve their roads. Money for this account raised on a 15% town cost and 85% State aid. Supervision is jointly held by the State and the Road Agent. Under this account money was spent on the following roads: Chestnut Hill Road, Walnut Hill Road; Christian Hill Road.

Article 11 Road Improvement - \$8,320.43

Money under this account was spent on the following roads — Walnut Hill Road, Christian Hill Road, Old Manchester Road, Pond Parish Road, Pavilion Road at the Lake. 1800' of Walnut Hill was completely rebuilt with funds from this account and some TRA money. 300' of Pavilion Road was reconstructed near the new public beach. 1750 feet of Christian Hill is being rebuilt with funds from this account and TRA. An 8 inch coat of gravel was applied to part of the Old Manchester Road and Pond Parish Road to make them passable in the mud season. At the close of the fiscal year there is a \$5,163.71 balance in the TRA account which

will be used to complete the Christian Hill project in the spring of '72.

Parks and Playgrounds - \$2,300.00

Money under this account is spent to maintain eight Town Commons, Two Playgrounds the Old Brick School yard, Wilkins and Clark School grounds. Some of the work at the Library comes under this account. This work consists of raking and picking up leaves, mowing and trimming the grass, care of the park fences and the constant picking up of papers etc. from the lawns. Town trash barrels are placed in these areas during the summer and have helped keep our village picked up. Also, the mowing of the little league ball field outside the regular playgrounds comes under this account.

In 1972 some maintenance of Baboosic Lake and the care of a basketball field on 122 South of the village will be charged to this account.

Cemeteries - \$7,411.28

Money for this account was spent to maintain the four Cemeteries: Meadowview, The Old Cemetery by the Town Hall; Cricket Corner and the Chestnut Hill Cemetery. Some of the work accomplished this year other than the regular raking, mowing and trimming of all cemeteries was the rebuilding of lots, resetting stones, resetting granite crub, grading depressions and trimming of trees at Meadowview. The fence at Meadowview required repair as did the fence at Cricket Corner. Special attention was given 19 perpetual care lots and funds for this work was received from the Perpetual Care Fund. Finally the avenue in the new section of Meadowview was graveled.

Bridges Art. 13 - \$9,564.27; Art. 14 - \$11,385.48These articles allowed for the replacing of 2 bridges one on the Boston Post Road North and the other on Thornton Ferry No. 1. This work was completed with a minimum of inconvenience to travel and at a substantial savings over the state bridge aid program based on a 50-50 contribution.

In closing I would like to state that being aware of the interest in scenic roads, all roads on which articles have been presented have been viewed by us. We see no problem arising over these roads. It is the practice of the Highway Agent to view with the Road Commission all sections of the Town and together to arrive at a long range rebuilding program to be presented to the Board of Selectmen. This was done in 1970 in preparation for the projects outlined above. We have spent our money with a view at meeting the most pressing needs for our own Town and have outlined additional projects for the upcoming year.

activities and expenditures during the past year.

Salaries: \$2245.00 — forty men at \$25.00 per year. This is payment for men attending regularly scheduled meetings and twelve practices with their respective engine companies. Three captains at \$25.00 per year; three lieutenants at \$15.00 per year; two assistant chiefs at \$250.00 per year; one chief at \$500.00 per year and one custodian at \$125.00 per year.

Fires: \$3,138.91. Your department responded to 80 calls in 1971, as compared with 84 calls in 1970. The types

of calls were as follows:

We were called out of town for Mutual Aid 8 times and received mutual aid 6 times.

Engine No. I — Captain: Marshall Strickland, Lieutenant: Joe Luongo. This engine responded to 33 calls in 1971.

Engine No. 2 — Captain: Edward Houck, Lieutenant: David Herlihy. This engine responded to 59 calls in 1971.

Engine No. 3 — Captain: Robert Hall, Lieutenant: Michael Riccitelli. This engine responded to 45 calls in 1971.

Engine No. 4 — This is the 1960 International four-wheeled truck that was purchased and put into mechanical condition as a forest fire truck by the men of the department. This engine responded to 20 calls in 1971.

When reporting a fire in Amherst, dial 673-3131. This is

the phone listing for the communications center which handles all fire calls for Amherst, Milford, and Mont Vernon, 24 hours a day. Please be sure to give the property owners' name, the street name and the town when reporting a fire.

The State of New Hampshire required that a written permit be issued to any person kindling an outside fire from April 1st through November 1st. To obtain these permits, the chief or either of the two assistant chiefs may be contacted.

In closing my final report, I want to express my sincere thanks to the officers and members of the three engine companies, the Communications Center and to the citizens of Amherst for all the support given the department, not only for the current year, but for the past ten years that I have served as the chief.

TREE COMMITTEE REPORT - 1971

In 1971 the Tree Committee concentrated on spraying trees for disease control, pruning, and the removal of dead and dving trees.

The trees in the Common, selected trees in the village, and a number of trees on Mack Hill Road were pruned to

remove dead and broken branches.

All of the trees and shrubs in the area of the small commons were trimmed and shaped at no cost to the town.

A ton of fertilizer was used to feed trees on the Common, and two tons of fertilizer were applied to the grass area.

The Committee wishes to extend its thanks and appreciation to members of the Garden Club, and also to those citizens who cared for trees adjacent to their property at their own expense.

In 1972 the Committee plans to place emphasis on planting tree replacements, fertilizing trees and commons which have not had recent attention, and to continue the program to remove dead and dving trees.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE AMHERST TOWN LIBRARY

(In compliance with Revised Statutes Annotated 202-A:12) Financial Report — The report of the treasurer is appended.

Building and Grounds – In 1971, the expenditures were

for improvement and maintenance.

For the Amherst Town Library, 1971 has been a year of steady growth. With the opening of the E. Daniel Johnson Meeting Room, which has seen gratifying use, and the new wing, other additions and services have been offered the community, all of which indicate the Library's desire and concern in serving its patrons to the best of its ability.

With the money remaining in the Building Fund, a copying machine and a movie projector have been purchased for Library use and for community service, and the Friends of the Library have kindly contributed the movie screen and projector stand, as well as two clocks. A bulletin board and Community Calendar have been put up for Library and town notices and other items of interest. A privet hedge was put in in front of the Library, and landscaping which included a new lawn, shrubs and trees was done by Grella & Son. A bicycle rack was also added. Finally, plans for drapes for the Meeting Room are near completion.

Mrs. David Ramsay, Mrs. William Lyle and Betty Watson served on the Book Selection Committee with continued

dedication and discernment.

The Friends of the Library, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Nicholas Babich and her board members, held a second-hand book and bake sale in June, a successful fundraiser. They also provided the Boston Children's Theatre Stagemobile productions of "Cinderella" and "The Reluctant Dragon" on the village green in August, which, after three years, is becoming almost a tradition. The Friends also provide the popular weekly Story Hour under the able direction of Mrs. John Kenne, vice chairman, and assisted by Mrs. Richard Kitchen. Mrs. Harry Slade and her commit-

tee saw that flowers and special arrangements brightened the Library. A weekly book discussion group is headed by Mrs. Robert Alberts, and the book-mending committee, under Mrs. Leland Gray, provides a very necessary service. The display case offered some most interesting exhibits, generously contributed by Amherst collectors, and were arranged for by Mrs. G. D. Chandley. Other board members are Mrs. John Keefe, secretary; Mrs. James Enright, treasurer; Mrs. Charles Bacon, publicity; Mrs. Thomas O'Riordan, membership and hospitality; Mrs. John Reed, graphic arts; Mrs. Paul Dudley, Community Calendar; and Mrs. Eliot Ware. In October the Friends held a luncheon at the Library as a gesture of thanks to all those who so willingly and enthusiastically had helped on the various committees.

The trustees are extremely grateful for the interest and

contributions of the Friends.

Through the Wanless Fund, established in memory of Mr. James F. Wanless by Mrs. Wanless and friends, the Library was able to purchase the four tables and sixteen chairs needed for the addition. The trustees wish to express

their gratitude and appreciation.

With a year's total of 629 new patrons, the trustees are gratified and excited by the Library's growth and development, both of which could never have been possible without the devotion and plain hard work of our librarian, Betty Watson, and her staff of Mrs. Cecelia Clough, Mrs. Patricia Cannaday and Mrs. Marion Williston, and our page, Susan Osborn.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

January 1971 saw the official opening of our expanded and renovated library with an Open House on Sunday, January 10. Refreshments were served by the Friends of the Library in the new Meeting Room, at which time the plaque naming it the E. Daniel Johnson Meeting Room was unveiled, honoring our treasurer, "Johnny" Johnson.

During the course of the past year, the Meeting Room has been used by many Amherst organizations and for various library functions, filling a long-felt need in our community.

Service to library patrons, including children, teen-agers and adults, has continued to grow rapidly. We find ourselves continually faced with more and varied questions to be answered by our collection or through the resources of the State Library and the Inter-Library Loan System.

lation. 692 new patrons were registered.

Grand Total

During 1971, we added a total of 1,082 books, bringing our total collection to 11,792, exclusive of paperbacks. Many of our additions were Memorial Gift Books and individual gifts from patrons to whom we wish to express our special thanks.

We also had on loan from the State Bookmobile a total of 2,776 books to supplement our collection.

We conducted a six-week Summer Reading Program for Elementary School children this past summer in which over 680 books were read and reported on and 83 children participated. Sixty-four children completed the required six

books and were invited to a party in September.

A 16 mm sound projector was purchased for use in the Meeting Room, allowing us to make use of the films available through the State Library Film Co-op. Organizations may supplement a club program with an entertaining and beautiful film such as "Eighteenth Century Life in Williamsburg, Va.;" or an entire program for small children may be developed using films of popular picture books, nature and story films. A Holiday Film Program was held in late December for first through fifth graders and was well received.

The entire staff has continued to attend the Public Library Techniques Classes, sponsored by the State Library and the University of New Hampshire. Mrs. Cannaday and I took "Programs and Services for Children" in the Spring, which completed my courses. At the summer session, Mrs. Williston took "Introduction to the Public Library" and in the Fall, Mrs. Clough and Mrs. Williston took "Book Selection for

Adults and Young Adults."

In our budget this year, we are requesting funds to enable us to remain open an additional 5 hours per week. This will bring our total hours open to 35½. To remain a member of the Statewide Library Development Program, we should be open 40 hours per week by July of this year. We hope to receive permission to delay enactment of this requirement until next year, at which time we can add the necessary $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

In all our programs and endeavors during 1971, we were wholeheartedly supported by our Board of Trustees and the Friends of the Library Organization to which we wish to extend our sincere thanks.

It is the hope of the Planning Board to complete and have ready for your consideration at next town meeting a revised zoning map and associated changes to the zoning ordinance.

A significant change in the zoning map will be the reclassification on some land — where new subdivisions have

been completed – from rural to residential.

REPORT OF AMHERST CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1971, the Amherst Conservation Commission continued its efforts to acquire strategic areas in town for wildlife and conservation purposes. To date, about 190 acres have been permanently preserved for the enjoyment of present and future generations.

The degree of community support is evidenced by the fact that most of these acquisitions have come either through gifts or have been purchased largely through the use of

private funds.

During 1971, the Conservation Commission made the final payment of \$10,500 for the 80 acre Joe English Reservation. Of this amount, all but \$700 was raised from private sources. The Town's 1971 appropriation of \$3,500 is being retained for future land purchases.

All of these conservation areas belong to the Town of Amherst with deed restrictions to insure that they will be

maintained for conservation purposes.

Negotiations are currently underway to obtain additional land gifts or to make appropriate purchases. Citizens interested in donating land or otherwise assisting in preserving areas for conservation purposes are urged to contact the Conservation Commission.

The Commission is now working on plans to increase community use of conservation areas. A new parking lot and several new trails have been established at Joe English. The Amherst Junior Women's Club is co-operating on the development of a well marked nature trail — also at Joe English. The Boy Scouts continue to develop their camp site in the same area.

Plans are being developed to insure fuller use of the Great Meadows — the 50-acre wetland tract near the Wilkins School. That area, once a lush meadow, offers great promise as an outdoor laboratory for school children and as a wild-life and recreational site near the center of the community.

As in prior years, the Conservation Commission sponsor-

ed attendance at Conservation camps by two Amherst youths. In addition, an Amherst school teacher participated in a conservation camp designed to stimulate greater emphasis on ecology in the school curriculum.

In short, the Commission's efforts have been at least modestly successful largely due to the support of local

citizens.

Time is growing short with population burgeoning and land being gobbled up for future development. We ask for the active support of every citizen during 1972.

ROAD COMMISSION REPORT

In 1971, 10 new roads were accepted by the Town of Amherst, which added approximately 4.8 miles of roads to the town's system of roads. This added mileage, as well as increasing costs each year, result in a record highway budget.

This year the Road Agent and the Road Commission made a survey of the existing roads in town, listing the roads to be rebuilt. The purpose of this survey was to bring to light the roads that should be improved in the near future. The list of roads to be rebuilt was submitted to the Selectmen for their review and evaluation, as to which roads should be included in the budget for the coming year.

We think that the new road specifications, as adopted in 1971, will cut the cost of maintenance on roads built under the new specifications. Some of the newer roads built in the past several years have been costly for the town to maintain.

In closing, we would like to commend the Road Agent, Richard Crocker, for the excellent job that he is doing for

the Town of Amherst.

AMHERST RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Amherst Recreation Committee has completed a most productive year. The winter months began with programs of basketball and volleyball being held at the Wilkins School. Ice skating was again held at the rinks across from the Post Office, with special thanks to Eric Brown for his many hours spent in maintaining the ice.

Spring saw 225 boys participating in the Little League Program. The many men involved in this program voluntarily, made the Little League program very successful.

Volunteer mothers met twice a week with over sixty

The fall began with Flag Football being offered at the

Several sub-committees of the Recreation Committee have been formed this year. The first being the Recreational Development Committee for the purpose of studying futureland available for recreational purposes. This committee is comprised of Carl Cook, Ronald George, Donald Egar, and William Johnson.

The Junior Baseball Committee was formed to study our ever growing baseball needs. The members are: Raymond Desmarais, John Snow, Paul Goldsmith, Arnold Johnson and Gordon Bean.

The Baboosic Park Committee will make recommenda-

tions to the Amherst Recreation Committee on personnel, expenditures and activities to be held in the future. This committee is comprised of Alfred Simensen and Connie George as Co-Chairman; Maxwell MacPherson, Melio Riccitelli, Frank Gauthier, Barbara Maloney, Norman Marsh, Terry Sortevik, Molly Young, Mary Lou Houck. Two members of the Recreation Committee participating on this committee are; Nancy Cook and William Johnson.

Mr. John Walter ably directed a number of the programs this year, scheduling practices, obtaining volunteers and coaches and personally supervising some of the activities.

The Recreation Committee extends many thanks to all the people who have given of their time and support to the programs presented. Particular thanks go to School Officials for allowing the use of school facilities for Recreational purposes.

SELECTMEN'S NARRATIVE

We respectfully submit to you our Report for 1971 on the progress of the Town, our concern in certain areas, and

recommendations for your consideration.

The population rose to over 5,000. The Town is unquestionably a desirable place in which to live. Real estate values remain at a high level. New building is very active, as evidenced by the 134 new building permits issued during the year. The quality of education in our school system attracts many families. Consequently, meaningful plan-

ning continues to be essential.

The Planning Board is charged primarily with the responsibility of making recommendations to the Town which will promote a healthy, controlled growth for our general welfare. The dedication of the members of this Board is evidenced by the continuing efforts to attain this objective through the media of education, review and evaluation. One of its current projects, which we hope will be presented to the Town in 1973, is a review and revision of land use. The Soil Survey recently prepared and delivered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture should serve as a most important tool for appropriate recommendation.

Changing times dictate consideration of the concept of permissive legislation setting aside areas for controlled development of multi-family homes. Proper planning now could prevent possible litigation against and deterioration of our current zoning regulations. Continued participation in the Nashua Regional Planning Commission is essential. We urge the approval of the Budget item for this

agency.

Recreational opportunities have been increased by the acquisition of facilities at Baboosic Lake. The Recreation Commission is charged with the management of this area, and the Commission is in the process of preparing appropriate plans for its use by the Townspeople and their guests.

One of the most important duties of the Board of Selectmen is to raise monies appropriated at the Town and School District Meetings. The method, of course, is taxation of

property. The Board strives to levy such taxes fairly and

equitably.

The 1971 tax rate was \$42.70 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation as compared with \$39.40 in 1970. For comparative purposes, the 1970 and 1971 rates are detailed as follows:

In 1971, the net Town Appropriations increased about \$68,293.60. The 1971 rate also reflects the increased cost of Veterans' Exemptions which amounted to \$22,850. The School Budget increased about \$206,649.20. The total assessed value of the Town in 1971 was approximately \$35,070,000.

Your Board has made a sincere effort to keep expenses within the amounts appropriated. In the overall, we were able to do that, aided materially by the cooperation of the Department Heads; however, unanticipated expenses such as highway equipment repair and welfare necessitated overexpenditures in some specific areas of the 1971 budget.

We salute our Road Agent, Richard Crocker, his loyal assistants and the snow removal team who work many long hours to make this town a safer place in which to live.

The year 1971 was the first full year of a full-time police force. Chief Tinker is to be commended for his organization of the Department. His professional experience, rapport with our citizens, particularly the younger people, as well as his loyalty and hours of labor merit our congratulations and support. His success, of course, has been materially aided by Officer John Bennett, who is an invaluable asset to our Town. Officer John Osborn, who joined the Department later in the year as a full time officer has proven himself to be a credit to the force and the Town.

We are indeed fortunate to have Mrs. Louise Simmons

and Mrs. Joann Osborn as School Traffic Aides. Their endeavors to help safeguard the lives of our children are

appreciated.

It is true that the maintenance of a police department is costly; however, your vote to establish a full-time force dictates adequate personnel, equipment and training. We are not recommending the expansion of the police force personnel this year. We believe that the present department, with the efficient use of our faithful part-time officers can and will provide adequate protection. In this regard, your cooperation is requested. Vandalism continues to be of concern. May we not give more thought to the concept of the family unit? Respect for law and consideration of the rights of others are basic ingredients of good character building.

In view of the growth and increased road mileage, the 1972 Highway Budget requests have been increased and merit your favorable consideration. The promise of receipt of additional state funds is primarily responsible for our not requesting additional funding through Warrant Articles for prudent improvements of road and bridge projects. Too, we have reduced our request for general road improvement. Thanks to the many hours of viewing and evaluation of our Road Commission, your Board now has a recommended five year program for the improvement of bridges and roads.

The Air Pollution Control Committee under the able leadership of Mr. Joseph Harrison III, submitted a comprehensive report reflecting the need to implement the State Laws, which require the cessation of open burning in Amherst no later than July 1, 1974. The utilization of sanitary landfill was unanimously recommended, and as this narrative goes to press, we are seeking land for this operation. Hopefully, by Town Meeting time, we shall have a specific recommendation for your consideration.

Mrs. Catherine Kruger, Town Treasurer since 1946, retires this March. Her attention to duty, invaluable counsel and being just "Kay" leaves an indelibile mark on our

community. We shall miss you dearly, Kay.

The chief of our Fire Department for the past ten years and member of the department for the past 25 years, Charles Duval, reluctantly resigned, effective January 1, 1972, due to pressures of business. Our Fire Department is one of the finest in the State. Much of the credit for its success must go to Chief Duval. Congratulations on a job well done, Chief. We are happy that you will continue to serve as a member of this group. We are glad to have a well qualified man to appoint as a replacement — David Hanlon. Our best wishes to Chief Hanlon.

We are concerned about the apparent discontinuance of privately operated ambulance service in the area after September 1, 1972. A study is being made as how best to

resolve the problem.

Dogs: to leash or not to leash? Over 1,000 dogs live in this Town. There are two schools of thought — control through leashing, and in rebuttal, "this is one reason that we moved to the country . . . it is not fair to chain a dog." We have made attempts to enforce existing ordinances and respond to the majority in given areas with limited success. There is a State Statute pertaining to "nuisance" dogs. We appreciate the arguments of both schools. Perhaps the issue should be put before the Town. Expressions of reasonable opinions would be appreciated.

There is still much to be done to keep Amherst the type of Town that attracted us to it. There are many in town who by virtue of interest and background could be of assistance by serving on various committees or task forces. We should appreciate your calling us. This is your Town.

In conclusion, we wish to extend our sincere appreciation and thanks to fellow town officers and members of the several town departments and committees for their loyal and dedicated service to our citizenry. Due to their efforts and vour cooperation, Amherst shall be a better place in which to live.

In 1971 the District pumped over 20 million gallons of water. Currently there are 229 subscribers and 27 Hydrants.

In order to improve the reliability of the Automatic Pump controls, a modern tank level telemetering system that senses tank water level at the tank has been installed. The original control equipment, located at the Pump House, will serve as an emergency standby system.

The hydrants were repainted, routine inspection of Main Line valves was conducted, and pre-acceptance hydrostatic tests on the final section of the Oak Hill branch line were

made.

Repayment of \$5000 has reduced the District's indebtedness to \$45,000.

Again we appreciate Joe Luongo's efforts in keeping all of the hydrants plowed out throughout the many winter storms.

Our Superintendent Ed. Marchildon with the assistance of John Hanlon are doing their usual fine job in reading meters, monitoring the pump, inspecting main valves and handling the many tasks that are necessary to maintain the system.

Rufus Brown is available during the day while the other two commissioners are out of town on business and does a fine job of checking into the many happenings and areas of

District concern.

At this time we join with all of the residents of the District in thanking Mr. Creeley S. Buchanan who resigned last year having faithfully served the District as Commissioner for 12 years.

And last but not least we wish to extend our appreciation to Kav and Ray Kruger for their continued sincere interest

in maintaining accurate District records.

Article 16 — Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 to complete purchase of Joe English Brook Wildlife Reservation. In the event that private funds are available sum to be used towards acquisition of other tracts for conservation.

Article 17 — Voted \$1000.00 towards contribution to the Nashua Community Council of Mental Health Clinic.

Article 18 — Voted \$300.00 for public observance of Independence Day and Selectmen to appoint committee.

Article 19 — Voted not to raise and appropriate \$4,168.00 for a rescue unit to be used by Civil Defense — A substitute motion was accepted and \$480.00 was voted for labor and materials to accomodate fire truck for civil defense.

Article 20 — Voted to adopt new Road Specifications. An amendment concerning a ditch 5 ft. deep and 3 ft. wide was defeated.

Article 21 — Voted to authorize municipal officers Town Clerk and Treasurer, to dispose of municipal records in accordance with the law.

An amendment to study the hiring of certified public accountant for school, town and water accounts was defeated.

Mr. Hines expressed appreciation for the work of Ways and Means comm. and the two retiring selectmen, Meric G. Arnold and Hermon Anderson. Mr. Anderson was completing his fourth consecutive term. Town Counsel Charles Lincoln announced his retirement.

Mrs. S. Puddington, offered a resolution that the Planning Board be charged with revision of the town zoning map to be brought before the voters in 1972. Approved.

Meeting adjourned at 11:15 P.M.

SYNOPSIS SPECIAL TOWN MEETING September 7, 1971

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Wilkins School Auditorium on Sept. 7, 1971.

Moderator Wight instructed the voters and the supervisors of check list with Mrs. Boothroyd, Mrs. Landry, Senator Porter helped check them off. Counters were Meric Arnold and Hermon Anderson. The Vote was 218 — Yes 144 — No

A total of 362 votes were cast. Article was adopted.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Amherst qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wilkins Memorial School in said district on the third day of March 1972, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
- 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the district such advances, grants and aids, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any other state or private agency.

5. To see if the district will resolve:

"That the Amherst School District desires to amend the Milford/Amherst AREA agreement, if legally feasible, to withdraw the seventh and eighth grades and incorporate the same into the Amherst School District."

6. To see if the district will resolve:

"That the Amherst School District desires that an effort be made to engage the School District of Milford to join the School District of Amherst to form a Cooperative School District as an alternative to the AREA concept which presently exists and the Amherst School District should take whatever steps necessary to attempt to effectuate the foregoing."

- 7. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the purpose of a Milford-Amherst long range study; said study to be for a cooperative school district and to be jointly financed with Milford.
- 8. By Petition: To see if the School District will authorize and direct the Moderator to appoint a cooperative school district planning committee, said committee to consist of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the school board in accordance with the provisions of RSA 195:18.
- 9. By Petition: To see what sum of money the School District will appropriate to meet the anticipated expenses of the cooperative school district planning committee, said expenses to include the costs of publication and distribution of reports, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 195:18.
- 10: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000 and authorize the School Board to employ an architect to prepare a set of working drawings for competitive bid for the contemplative construction of a school and to employ and pay expenses for a clerk of the works to act as the representative of the School Board and Building Committee in planning and supervising the construction.

- 11. To see if the district will vote to approve the expenditure of \$2,295 (bid price) to improve the acoustics in the auditorium; said funds to be expended from existing balances in the Wilkins School Building Accounts.
- 12. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district.
- 13. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

ADMINISTRATIVE SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Amherst:

For one to ask what is new in education today is to expose himself to a deluge of responses. Far removed from an era when the employment of a new teacher was a singular event in a community, the matter of providing educational opportunities for the youth of a community is now of such magnitude it is a topic of daily concern for all citizens. Although fully cognizant of the importance of education, the man on the street cannot but wonder about which avenue to take in the direction of providing optimum educational opportunities at a cost which a community can underwrite. Such expressions as the extended school year, performance contracting and open campus, to name a few, are based on the premise of "getting more for our money", either from the standpoint of greater utilization of our schools or a modification of teaching techniques for the purpose of expediting learning. Midst claims and counter-claims, there is little wonder that people oft times are confused as to which course to pursue. While each may have its place, no one thing can be regarded as a panacea; that which has worked well in one district may end in disaster if applied in another. The point to be emphasized here is that innovations must be studied in relation to many factors.

Amherst schools have consistently moved forward, not infrequently integrating successful practices with innovations to the end of improving learning conditions. Administrators and teachers alike are aware that to stand still is to retrogress. However, all staff members are mindful that change for the sake of change is not the criterion of positive educational outcomes.

The advent of the school year brought many new faces to the faculty of the Amherst Elementary Schools. The new school year presented many changes and challenges for the students and staff. It is with this note that I am pleased to

submit my first annual report for the Amherst School District.

The growth of Amherst has taken the two present buildings almost to capacity. Faced with the loss of a music room, we decided, with the help of Mrs. Markley and Mrs. Barry, to make the large Listening Viewing Center a double classroom for fifth graders. The study carrells and some audio visual equipment were transferred to the library with the hope that this room would become a media center for the Wilkins School. This adjustment also allowed Mr. Neilsen a regular classroom for music classes.

The curriculum offering of our Amherst youngsters is as varied and full as any elementary school found in New Hampshire.

Grades one through six have art classes one hour per week.

Grades one through six have music classes one hour per week.

Grades one through six have library classes thirty minutes per week.

Grades five and six have French one hour per week.

The only special area the Amherst children lack is in Physical Education. We hope that by September, 1972 to have this incorporated in our curriculum and hopefully fulfill the New Hampshire Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools.

Major academic areas of the elementary schools are Reading, Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, and Science.

We have introduced, this year, units on Health and a tremendous unit on Ecology which has involved the school as well as interested private groups.

Special programs started in the 1971-72 school year have been successful and are moving toward completion.

The Summer Reading Program was initiated in Amherst for the first time in July. The program was composed of three teachers and thirty-five students. This proved to be extremely successful in that 80% of the students showed growth in their reading skills.

Our Language Arts program is being reviewed by a Language Arts Committee. We feel a new program is necessary as our present Roberts Language Series has been in effect almost six years.

Other committees at work at this time are the School Philosophy and Report Card Committees. These groups are concerned with keeping our schools always looking forward and improving our ideas.

The Science Committee took on the task of reviewing the organization of subject matter taught and have restructured our curriculum for grades one through six. They have also catalogued our equipment to insure better utilization of material. We hope to review, in more detail, our Science and Social Studies curriculum with a small committee working on each subject.

Special programs of note continue to be a vital link in the effectiveness of the Amherst educational program. Due to the loss of state aid, we could not continue with the Nurse Clinicians of past years. The Learning Disabilities program was expanded by the addition of a part time staff member. This, coupled with a semi guidance program by Mrs. Sullivan, has allowed us to meet the needs of more children.

Remedial Reading continues to work with our children having reading problems. We find that through our growth we are servicing more children than before.

Parent Volunteers have again been of tremendous assistance, under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Maloney. These are people who give of themselves in a totally unselfish manner.

The Junior Great Books Program has returned to challenge those students that wish to be members. We have one entire class of Mrs. Treadwell's sixth graders in this program. All early indications show us that this is a most profitable experience for these students.

With the addition of a part time Art teacher, we have been able to lengthen the period of instruction for all children. We are pleased with the program, particularly in the Clark School as they now have the proper time period in the primary grades.

Music is perhaps our most varied special area. Instrumental Instruction and Vocal Instruction have given us a band, orchestra, glee club, and chorus. A child with a music interest of talent has every opportunity to develop this potential.

The 1971-72 school year found Amherst receiving four student teachers from Rivier College. These girls trained in grades three, four, five, and six. We feel they added youth and enthusiasm to our professional staff and served as resource people for our students.

Intramural sports for grades five and six have again

been popular for our children. Activities such as flag football, basketball, softball for the boys and soccer, basketball and softball for the girls have been well attended throughout the school year.

We have had several key staff workshops this year:

Mr. Ralph Granger, Farmington, Maine State College, presented a very successful program to us on using and making audio-visual materials.

Mrs. Chris Trudo and Mrs. Mary Trider presented varying viewpoints on the British Infant School.

Mr. John Cadel discussed Project Solve and the programs developed in the New Hampshire schools.

Mrs. Lois Markley presented two workshops on the use of cuisenaire rods for our math teachers.

Mrs. Marie Sigman arranged a Union No. 40 workshop on the use of achievement tests.

Mrs. Edwina Czajowski presented a fine workshop in September to the faculty and community leaders to successfully start our Ecology Unit.

The PTA has become an active organization under the leadership of Mrs. Joyce Kenne. They have had some very successful projects such as the Fall Fun Fair in October and the annual Book Fair, directed by Mrs. Eleanor McDowell. The monthly newsletter has been very well received and a successful venture. We wish to thank all who make this a key association.

Mrs. Shirley Copeland is the new Lunch Director and has cooperated in every way possible to aid in our shortened lunch periods.

FUTURE

Amherst finds itself in a period of exceptional growth. New school construction of either a middle school or another elementary school must be decided. Population projections show a large increase in students over the coming years.

These decisions will be most serious. We must strive

to keep class sizes reasonable and continue to provide an excellent educational program for our children.

Our immediate needs are for full implementation of the Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools. We must add a certified guidance counselor and a physical education director to achieve this goal. We remind you of the state's philosophy that the minimum is that level no school should fall below. Can we afford to do anything less?

Curriculum improvement and staff improvement are continuous programs. We will strive for excellence in education and desire the most beneficial programs and teachers for our students.

We wish to commend the staff in Amherst as one dedicated to education and the welfare of your children. They are truly professionals.

We also wish to commend the parents in the community for your support and the privilege of working with our town's most sacred possessions—its youth.

We commend our students whose enthusiasm and progress give us all a feeling of satisfaction.

We must also thank the Amherst School Board, Mr. Paul Dudley, Mr. Eric Hare, Mr. Herbert Stearns; Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Roland Schoepf; and Teacher Consultant, Mrs. Marion Jacques for their assistance throughout the school year.

Conclusion

Looking ahead, many changes loom on the horizon. While citizens will always be concerned in some measure with the quality of education being offered in the community, that which will not fail to attract attention will be the matter of financing the public schools. With a recent reduction in state aid to education, it is interesting to note that court decisions in several states have given expression to the concept that the state assume complete fiscal responsibility to assure an equality of educational opportunity. Thus, the children of a community poor in taxable property

would have some guarantee of receiving an education equivalent to that of their counterparts who, through some accident, live in a wealthier district. Obviously, even such a solution would not be without problems in its implementation, but it would appear that ultimately a greater issue will arise, that in the form of a challenge to the federal government. While there may be some legal obstacles, the logic of providing equality of educational opportunity within states cannot but assume some form on the national level. The time could be at hand when citizens, who have always cherished local control, may have to face squarely the issue of who will determine the grassroots structure of education in America.

SYNOPSIS OF AMHERST SCHOOL MEETING March 5, 1971

The annual meeting of the school district of Amherst at the Wilkins School was called to order at 8:10 p.m. by the Moderator, Mr. Creeley Buchanan. The pledge of allegiance was led by Mr. Louis Heaton and Mr. Buchanan offered a prayer.

Mr. Buchanan asked permission to dispense with the reading of the warrant, which was granted. He reminded everyone that the polls would be open March 9th from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Article 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.

Mr. Dudley moved that Article 1 be passed over and taken up under Article 6. Motion carried.

Article 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mr. Stearns moved that we accept all reports as printed in the School Report. Motion carried.

Article 3. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Mr. Hare moved that the Town Auditors serve as School Auditors. Motion carried.

Article 4. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the district such advances, grants and aids, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any other state or private agency.

Mr. Dudley moved that the District authorize the School Board make application for and receive in the name of the District such advances, grants and aids, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any other state or private agency. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 5. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,150.00 (bid price) to improve the acoustics in the auditorium.

Mr. Hatcher moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,150.00 (bid price) to improve the acoustics in the auditorium. Motion seconded. The Moderator was in doubt on a voice vote. A standing vote was taken: 68 yes, 80 no. The motion was lost.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

The members of the School Board explained the various series of the school budget. It was based on a projected 906 students. Mr. Blakeman moved that the sum of \$1,292,931.23 be raised and appropriated for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Motion carried.

Article 7. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Mr. Hare noted that the Study Committees of Milford and Amherst are studying the feasibility of withdrawing the 7th and 8th grade students from Milford. Both towns have agreed to ask for an adjournment of their School Meetings and to charge their study committees to bring back to the School Boards of each town a recommendation.

Mrs. Puddington of the League of Women Voters read a prepared statement.

Mr. Blakeman moved to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.
