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#### IN REMEMBRANCE

We would like to remember two men, both native sons, who served Barnstead in various capacities during their long lives.

The first is Leighton E. Tasker. At the age of 24 he took over the job of road agent, which was during the snowy winter of 1935-36 and the subsequent flood in March.' After a distinguished career in the United States Army, Leighton returned to Barnstead where he later served two terms on the Budget Committee.

The second individual is William (Bill) H. Jenisch. In 1947 he was elected to the School Board where he served continuously for 33 years. In 1947 he single handedly did the census in Barnstead, and knew every adult by a first name. Bill sat on the Budget Committee many years where he presented the school budget.

His final service to the Town was as a charter member of the Conservation Commission where he acted as secretary.

Both men knew much of the history of Barnstead and could relate that history to anyone who would sit and listen. Their passing represents the end of an age; they were both in their 90's.

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Eighth (8th) day of March, next at 7:00 a.m. of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2 Selectmen	3 year terms
1 Trustee of Trust Funds	3 year term
2 Planning Board Members	3 year terms
1 Planning Board Member	1 year term
1 Library Trustee	3 year term
1 Overseer of Public Welfare	1 year term
2 Budget Committee Members	3 year terms
1 Road Agent	3 year term

- 2. To vote by official ballot on amendments to the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance and to the Barnstead Code of Building Regulations, as proposed by the Barnstead Planning Board, as follows:
  - Are you in favor of the adoption of question #1, amending the Building Code, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To add Section 2-1.1.6 Foundations. Applicants for new houses or other permanent structures built on nonconforming lots shall present a plat prepared and certified by a New Hampshire licensed surveyor locating and monumenting all corners of the lot.

 Are you in favor of the adoption of question #2, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To amend Section 14-7.02 of the Zoning Ordinance to reduce the front setback from seventy five (75) feet to fifty (50) feet, and reduce the side and rear setback from fifty (50) feet to thirty (30) feet.

 Are you in favor of the adoption of question #3, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To amend Article 13 of the Zoning Ordinance, to allow impact fees to be assessed at the time of a building permit and to clarify other procedural language.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #4, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, submitted by petition, as follows:

Amend Article 14 Section 4.05.1B to read: "Free Standing Ground Signs. A maximum of one sign per business property shall be permitted. Where two or more business occupancies exist within on business property, all such properties shall be limited to one free standing sign with a maximum display area of sixty (60) square feet. The maximum height above the ground of such sign shall not exceed twenty (20) feet; the bottom of such sign shall be no less than five (5) feet above grade." (Not Recommended by Planning Board).

The second session for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the remaining articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2005, at 9:00 a.m. at the Barnstead Elementary School.

- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,754 for the fifth year and final payment for the fully equipped 10-wheel dump truck for the Highway Department. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,828 for the third years payment of the lease for the Road Rescue Ambulance for the Town. (Recommended by the Selectmen).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Public Safety Building Capital Reserve for the purpose of building, constructing and site preparation work for a public safety building and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 to be placed in this fund. (Recommended by the Selectmen).
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,000 (gross budget) to purchase and outfit a 2005 Crown Victoria (Police Package) to replace the 1997 Ford Explorer and to authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000 from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve created for this purpose, with the balance of \$16,000 to be raised by taxation. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Parks & Recreation Building Capital Reserve for the purpose of saving monies for the renovation of an existing building or construction of a new building for the Parks & Recreation Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in this fund. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of treating milfoil in active areas of the Suncook River, Webster Stream and Pineo Stream. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in the Historical Society Building Capital Reserve. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen).

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be placed in the Library Computer Support Expendable Trust Fund. (Recommended by the Selectmen).
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to be placed in the Highway Garage Capital Reserve. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to change the Road Agent's position from an elected position to an appointed position. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the Welfare Officer's position from an elected position to an appointed position. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to convey the property at Tax Map 050, Lot 91A, 51 Meredith Lane back to the prior owner, Allen Lane. Prior owner has paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in April 2004. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to convey the property at Tax Map 046 Lot 044 Indian Ledge Road, to Tracy Bisson, to be merged with Bisson's property at Map 046 Lot 045. Tracy Bisson has paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in August, 1998. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to convey the property at Tax Map 041 Lot 241, 189 Varney Road, back to Louis M. and Lawrence E. Roberts, heirs of the prior owners (Louis W. & Mercedes M. Roberts). The heirs have paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in November, 2002. (Recommended by Selectmen).

- 21. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to accept Megans Way in Barnstead, NH as a class (5) roadway. (Submitted by petition).
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a policy recognizing that groundwater and surface waters are a critical, finite, integrated natural resource that is becoming increasingly scarce and subject to heavy contamination as our human population grows. Having clean, potable water is a basic human right, not the privilege of those who can afford it. Water is essential to the public health and for all life. Our community's wildlife and plant life depend on sufficient amounts of pure water to sustain them. In this regard, the Town of Barnstead should seek assistance from local and federal sources, including the Conservation Commission, Regional Planning Commission, the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, the U. S. Geological Survey, private conservation groups and neighboring communities to protect these resources through developing ordinances that place strict limits on commercial and other large scale water withdrawals not directly related to providing potable water for residential. commercial and industrial uses within the Town. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 23. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for th operating budget. The Selectmen recommends \$2,579,232. This article does not include special or individual warrant articles.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### ASSESSOR'S REPORT

Sale prices for property in Barnstead have continued to increase in 2004. The equalization ratio for sales occurring in the 2004 equalization year is 77.8% down from 92.1% for 2003. To maintain assessment equity the Town is anticipating having to do an update of property assessments for the 2005 tax year. These new assessments will be reflected on the fall tax bill.

In keeping with the State's requirements that towns review their property record data once every five years the Town has contracted the firm of Nyberg, Purvis & Associates to perform this review 20% of the Town on an annual basis. Their employee Kevin Johnson reviewed tax maps one through eight in the fall of 2004.

The State has changed the deadline for filing all exemptions and tax credit applications to April 15 for the tax year applied. These include elderly and blind exemptions and veteran's tax credits. If you feel you qualify for any of these as of April 1, 2005, stop by the Selectmen's office to fill out an application.

# Barnstead Fire-Rescue, Inc. Report

The members and officers of the Fire-Rescue had a very busy year and completed many projects to better serve the Town of Barnstead. Training, maintenance, fire prevention, and emergencies continue to require dedication from the members and their families. We wish to express our sincere appreciation for the support of all the other departments and employees working in our Town.

The projects that have been completed include:

- Well system at Station 2 to provide an automatic fill for the cistern also provides an additional water source for the Town Hall
- Electrical upgrade to Station 2
- Smoke Exhaust System for both Station 1 and Station 2
- New Ambulance, 6A1 placed in service
- New mobile radio's in all vehicles (Homeland Security Grant, no cost to town)
- Updated Town road map info to allow dispatch to provide cross streets

The Town continues to see growth, which has required Fire-Rescue to provide new services and continue with the responsibilities we have historically done. We have seen an increase in Life Safety inspections and new home purchasers are requesting fire safety inspections for wood stoves, chimneys, and smoke detector installations. To accomplish this, our Fire Prevention Deputy is attending training seminars to become better prepared to provide the highest level service. The Kid's Safety House continues to be a valuable tool to send the safety messages to our children. Barnstead Fire-Rescue, Inc. was recognized for its' commitment to children by being awarded our 16<sup>th</sup> Gold Circle Partnership Achievement Award with the Barnstead Elementary School.

The Town is preparing for a new public safety building. This facility will bring together the Fire, Police and Town Departments into a combined facility that will offer better service for the Town's residents, a location for an Emergency Operation Center during times

of town-wide emergencies, and adequate facilities to support full time police and fire operations.

The Fire-Rescue needs new members and invites those interested in joining to stop at the station or call to discuss joining this dedicated group.

In closing, I offer my sincere appreciation to each member and their families for the dedication and commitment to our organization and the Town of Barnstead.

It has been 4 years now since we moved into the new and expanded library. We have been delighted with the reaction from the town and library patrons. We have been able to add many new items for circulation and now have 3 public access computers that are constantly in use.

The library continues to change and grow as we try to meet all the needs of the public. We have an extensive audiobook collection as so many people have requested them, mainly for their rides to and from work. We originally only carried audios on cassette but are slowly working toward a collection on CD. Remember, if you have an audiobook that you no longer want, the library would be happy to accept your donations.

This year Bonnie Brannigan retired from the Library and we all wish her well. What a terrific job she did during the 10 years at the OFML – she will be missed in her position behind the circulation desk! This is my 20<sup>th</sup> year at the OFML. Pamela Welch continues on as Library Assistant and we are pleased to welcome Megan Ebba and Katrina Blackwood to the library staff. We have a very diversified and knowledgeable staff to help assist you in your searches, whether it is for research or pleasure reading.

Story hours continue to be extremely successful under the able guidance of Dawn McCartney. There were many special programs offered to the preschoolers this year, including a Complete Story Hour Fair, Halloween Parade, Apple Picking, a Christmas party (including a visit from Santa Claus), Fire Safety Program, KidCare Program (a service of photo identification, fingerprints, etc.), which was cosponsored by a grant from the Lakes Region Community Services Council and much, much more. Every Wednesday (except when school is not in session) lots of preschoolers gather in the meeting room to hear stories, do a craft or two, have a snack and socialize. We are VERY grateful to Dawn and all her volunteers for making this such a special program. We also were very pleased to have Jennifer Harper volunteer for a Beginner Bookworm story hour throughout the summer and Megan Ebba planned a festive and special Christmas Holiday Program. Thanks to EVERYONE!!!

Our new employee, Megan Ebba, organized the summer reading program this year. Megan was very enthusiastic and put a completely new spin on the idea of summer reading. This year's program was titled "Check out a Hero" and was co-sponsored by CHILIS (The Children's Librarians of New Hampshire) and NHLA (New Hampshire Library Association). We had many young people eagerly adding to the paper-chain draped around the library, a representation of each of the 180+ books read! We also had a "Wall of Stars" with Polaroid pictures of each of the readers. The summer reading program ended with a special awards presentation and a Puppet Show by Diane Kordas of Romper Rhythm & Puppets. The puppet show was sponsored by the library and through a grant received by the Kids, Books & the Arts, supported by the N.H. State Council of the Arts & the N.H. State Library.

A few statistics to end the Library report for the year: The library collection consists of 14,558 items. Circulation for 2004 was 18,931. We added 1,562 new acquisitions. Patrons logged in 968 hours on the public computers and the meeting room was used a total of 278 times.

# REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR

During 2004 the Town of Barnstead adopted the 2003 International Residence Code and the 2003 International Building Code for all new and remodeling construction. The impact of the resultant changes was communicated through distribution of the "Barnstead Building Inspection Checklist". During 2005, we expect electrical work to be guided by the 2005 National Electrical Code.

The 2004 quota limit of 33 added new dwellings associated with the "INTERIM GROWTH ORDINANCE" was again implemented per plan.

Building permit fees for all construction during 2004 were \$37,095.00 for a total of 197 permits (1 per project). During 2004, 599 building inspections were performed

# BARNSTEAD PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

During calendar year 2004, the Planning Board approved the following:

- 2 Major Subdivisions
- 4 Minor Subdivisions
- 3 Lot Line Adjustments
- 8 Site Plan Reviews for new businesses

The growth control ordinance that was adopted at the 2003 Town Meeting has succeeded in controlling the number of building permits issued in each calendar year. In the 2003 Town Meeting, the voters responded to a request from the Planning Board and enacted a growth control ordinance that was designed to maintain the growth rate in the population of the town at a level that town and school services could support. This growth control ordinance was needed because, over the previous two years, the town's population had been growing at a rate that greatly exceeded the town's ability to provide town services. This growth ordinance has succeeded in controlling the rate of growth during calendar years 2003 & 2004 to a level that the town and schools can support. And, it is anticipated that the ordinance will continue to hold growth rates in subsequent years to sustainable levels.

The implementation of the growth control ordinance has faced some tests. In November of 2004, the ordinance was challenged in the courts. The lawsuit questioned the validity of the ordinance and whether the Town of Barnstead could legally adopt a growth control ordinance. At the time of this report (the end of January, 2005) we still have not had a decision from the court whether the town can control the number of building permits it issues during a calendar year.

Also, at the 2003 Town Meeting, the voters gave the Planning Board the authority to assess impact fees. Impact fees are fees paid by the recipient of a building permit as their contribution to long-term fiscal planning activities for the town. The Town of Barnstead has wisely established a number of capital improvement funds for anticipated future expenses. Each year at Town Meeting, the voters elect to contribute a reasonable amount to each of these long-term planning funds so that when the individual project is needed, the money exists to fund the project, with little impact on the property tax rate. This is sound fiscal planning. Impact fees allow each individual applying

for a permit for new construction to contribute an appropriate amount to the existing capital improvement funds that would impact their new construction, hence the name impact fees.

In this year's Warrant, the Planning Board is, also, proposing to require payment of the fees at the time that a building permit is issued for new construction. This change is consistent with the requirements of the State of New Hampshire for impact fees.

The Planning Board has several other questions in this year's warrant for the voters to consider. As has been our practice, the Planning Board has prepared a Ballot Book to provide the voters with the questions they are proposing, with a summary of the reasons for the proposed question. Copies of the Ballot Book are available in the Suncook Valley Sun and area retail stores. Please consider these questions carefully and provide us your input.

# REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Barnstead Conservation Commission spent 2004 carrying out a variety of tasks related to the active management of existing properties under our care, as well as looking toward the future by beginning a new effort to secure additional easements and/or purchases for lands that can compliment our current easements and properties.

Once again our focus for hands-on activities continued to be the Harrison Property, which was logged in 2003. Projects ranged from brush-burning to landscaping. To improve the appearance of the entrance to the property on Gilmanton Road, Commission members with the assistance of Rob Tiede of RAT Enterprises placed stone monuments and built a new wall that nicely compliments the area. In addition, a new gate was installed near the entrance, the roadway to the cabin was graveled and graded, grass and clover were planted in the newly created field and the first fruit trees were planted in the field as a part of the overall wildlife enhancement program for the site. The projects planned for this site are numerous and we can expect them to continue for years to come.

To further support this work, the commission received a \$2000 grant from the NH Fish and Game, under the Habitat Enhancement Grant program. This grant was applied for in 2004 in connection with the logging project and clearing in the front of the cabin. We hope to utilize this grant program in the future for other projects on this property as well as other town lands.

Projects and activities occurring at other properties were undertaken or are in the planning stages for 2005. The White Oaks Road Beach property in particular is due for a spruce-up including trimming of brush, new beach sand and some safety measures as well. The Commission has been working with NH DES to obtain permission to undertake these items and we expect to complete whatever work is permittable in 2005.

The fall of 2004 saw the Commission take the next steps toward acquiring other easements and property rights that might compliment the Town's existing conservation lands. This program is intended to retain open space in town with the hope of maintaining the community's rural character. Specific target areas were identified and landowners of numerous lots in the Cilley Meadows region and around the Harrison land were contacted. Other portions of the community

are also of interest and we will identify these properties in the coming months. This search is very preliminary and we expect it will take some time to produce results. For members of the community who are interested in this project or may want to inquire about the possibility of including a specific parcel of land in the review process, all are welcome to attend commission meetings or call the Chairman to discuss it.

A large-scale project that has promise in assisting with the identification of important areas and parcels in town is the Natural Resource mapping project which is being coordinated through the NH Fish and Game Department and the Friends of the Suncook River. Maps produced through this project will identify various natural resources in town and illustrate where various communities overlap, indicating areas of potentially higher values. This information will be useful for planning purposes as well as identifying specific areas which should be reviewed for protection. We expect these maps to be available in the spring of 2005 and anticipate providing an informational meeting for the public and town committees.

Any members of the community who are interested in learning more about the Commission's work, including its projects and activities, are encouraged to come to a meeting on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 at the Town hall. Please feel free to contact Jim Fougere, Chairman with your questions and concerns.


# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. A fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New forest resources. This last year was fairly wet throughout the spring and summer months, however we finished the season with an active fall fire season. In order to meet an increased demand for services, the Forest Protection Bureau was reorganized into three regions with smaller Forest Ranger Districts and over the last several years we have added two Forest Rangers. The fifteen state fire towers were the first to report on many fires throughout the state and they completed many other projects on the low fire danger days. The state implemented a program called Tower Quest to help citizens learn about fire towers and the need to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. The United States celebrated Smokey Bear's 60th birthday in 2004, and celebrations were held throughout the state. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being smart and fire safe!

# A Message from the District Committee

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the upcoming year, 2005. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. 2004 was an exceptional year for revenue. It should be noted that the District has been very fortunate to have had increasing revenues, which have held taxes in check, but it's unlikely to continue on a long term basis.

During 2004 the District constructed a new burn area and improved road access to the compost pile. Slopes were seeded and drainage was addressed to avoid any sediment runoff as required by the EPA storm water pollution prevention program. Funds for the work were drawn from recycling revenue and the Reserve Fund set up by the District for the purpose of closing the old landfill. We have now moved all operations away from the old landfill, which is the first step in closing (sloping & seeding) the site.

For 2005, the District is replacing the roll off truck with a new Kenworth and is also replacing the Bobcat with a new unit. The 2005 District Budget allows for these two purchases without increasing taxes and without incurring any debt or lease payments. We have the funds available to pay for the equipment when it arrives. During the summer of '05 the District will be doing some minor construction between the building and the canister wall, again related to EPA storm water pollution prevention. This may cause some inconvenience, so please bear with us.

Comments from the public are always welcome. The District Committee meets the last Thursday of each month (except Nov. & Dec.) at the District facility at 7:00 PM. The Public is invited.

# REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

I would like to pass on a portion of an article from the December issue of *Immunization*NEWS.

The 2004-2005 flu season has proven to be a challenge due to an unexpected shortage of flu vaccine. On October 5<sup>th</sup>, CDC announced that half of the nation's flu vaccine supply would not be available due to production problems with Chiron Corporation.

Several agencies responded quickly and changed their vaccination plans from walk-in public clinics to a prescreening, appointment-based model. This approach allowed a safe and orderly flow of people arriving at clinics and assured access for people most in need of vaccination.

Strategies for dealing with the challenge included development of state screening guidelines that were to be applied when a severe vaccine shortage existed locally. Redistribution of available flu vaccine was made possible by the leadership of local hospitals who worked with community partners to identify those most at risk for complications from the flu. The Department of Health & Human Services and the hospitals operated hotlines to inform callers about options for flu vaccinations.

There were three rounds of flu vaccine distribution. An analysis of private supply distribution determined the areas of the state with the greatest need. Fifty percent of NH's adult vaccine was redirected using this information. Flu vaccine was redistributed through the hospitals to local medical providers and to nursing homes. Additional doses were available through non-profit agencies and VNA's working with local partners to assure vaccination of high risk people. A second round was made available in November. Additional flu vaccine will be available in January.

Mary Ann Cooney, Director of DHHS Division of Public Health Services, stated "...We can be proud of our state's medical community for their strong commitment to public health."

The Barnstead Selectmen committed the old garage behind the Police Department over to the Parks and Recreation Volunteers. Now that the building has been cleaned out, we will continue to clean up that Park area to improve its appeal to the community. Our plan is to set up an office in this building and move out of the basement of Town Hall.

Look for some positive changes ahead. We would love to hire someone, on a part-time basis, and at least have him/her answer the telephone for us and return daily phone calls. There is so much that we could accomplish by having someone assist us during the day when we are busy at our regular jobs; many tasks or projects could be completed in a timely manner.

During the Year 2004, we actually lost valued Town services and had to hire out to achieve the same tasks as the year before. The first service to go was our trash pickup at both Recreation Areas: the beach off White Oak Road and the Park behind the Police Department. The second service to be terminated was snow plowing at the Park on Rt. 126. ### BARNSTEAD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Barnstead Historical Society started its meetings this year with a talk given by Bud Thompson on early Indian life in New Hampshire. Bud operates the Indian Museum in Warner and is well known for his knowledge of the early Indian tribes of the area. At the June meeting, in keeping with the Revolutionary War theme for Old Home Day, Dr. Jere Daniell from Dartmouth discussed the ratification of the Constitution and possible impacts that Barnstead could have had on that event. It was theorized that Jonathan Chesley, as a representative to the Constitutional Convention, could have had an impact on the outcome of the voting at those meetings. At a later meeting, Paul Oman discussed the role of several Barnstead citizens in the Civil War, primarily those in the 12<sup>th</sup> Regiment of the NH Volunteers.

Representative uniforms, old documents and information about Revolutionary soldiers were exhibited at Old Home Day. Many of our old pictures and maps were also displayed.

We were pleased to be included in the ceremony culminating the extensive work done by the Pittsfield Historical Society to provide a memorial to General Harrison Thyng. General Thyng, a noted World War II and Korean Conflict fighter ace, lived in Barnstead during his early years.

A trip was taken to Hampton to visit the extensive Tuck Historical Museum. Lamies Inn, which dates to colonial times, was the site for lunch.

We currently have several ongoing projects. A large display frame was purchased, mainly with funds provided as a memorial to Madeline Palmer by her family. This frame is currently located in the library and pages within the frame display many themes of Barnstead's past. Currently, some of the topics that are exhibited include: copies of old maps that show the early divisions of the Town; old schools, their locations and student pictures; pictures of some of the local families; and pictures of veterans of various military conflicts. We urge all who have family pictures (or copies), pictures of the town, documents relating to town affairs and anecdotal stories of events and/or relatives to share those with the Historical Society. These will be shared with the town in whatever way possible.

One of our members, Bill Walker, has been collecting extensive genealogical data and compiling it so that it can be readily used by anyone seeking information about past residents of Barnstead. Bill has spent countless hours in this endeavor, extracting information from censuses, town reports and historical publications. Hopefully, this coming summer, the information will be available to the public by using one of the computers at the Oscar Foss Memorial Library. The Society is very appreciative that he is making this information available to the community.

The Society is currently attempting to determine a facility for meetings, storage and display of our resources. Suggestions regarding possible facilities and/or funding would be appreciated. Donations to the Society are tax deductible.

I am very proud to have been a part of the Suncook Lake Pilot Project and the effort to eliminate milfoil in the lake. The Suncook Lake Association working with many of the state agencies, including the University of NH, presented their plan to eradicate milfoil. I believe that it is due to the association's hard work and diligence that they received funding to be a pilot project in NH. The early results look very promising. This is a project that could affect all of New Hampshire's lakes and to think that this all happened right in our backyard makes me very proud.

There are many issues on the horizon that will affect the residents of Barnstead and it is my hope that together we can be vigilant in our efforts to keep our taxes reasonable without sacrificing our services. - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,828 for the second years payment of the lease for the Road Rescue Ambulance for the Town. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee).


