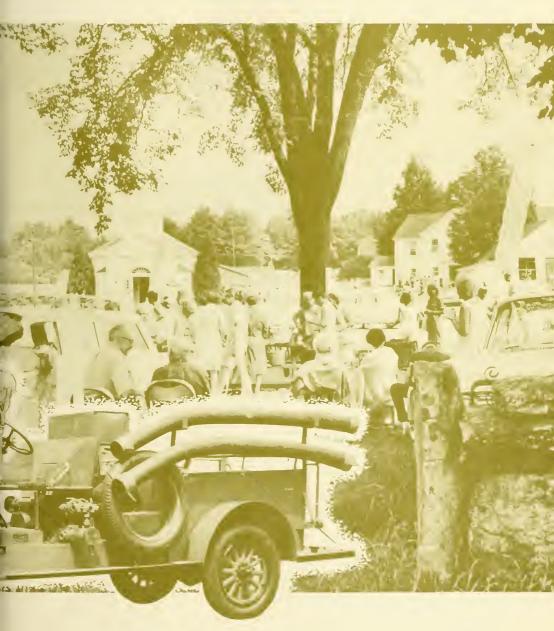

# WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING State of New Hampshire

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Canterbury on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at Twelve of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

(Polls open from 12:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Meet at eight of the clock in the evening to act on the rest of the articles in the Warrant.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, lease or otherwise transfer real estate property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed in a manner for the best interest of the town.
- 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new truck for the Highway Department.
- 6. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to use a portion of anticipated income of the

Sam W. Lake Trust Fund, as may be acceptable to the Trustees, to build a new Town Garage; also authorizing the Selectmen to issue notes in the name of the Town, said notes not to exceed \$40,000.00 to be paid from income of the Sam W. Lake Fund.

- 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a study committee to investigate the possibilities of combining certain town offices to improve the general administration of the town.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to accept Federal funds to be used in the Library renovation project. By petition.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the amount of \$100.00 for the expenses for the zoning board of adjustment. By petition.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase and planting of shade trees.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to become a member of a Central regional planning agency. This agency will have membership of at least two of the municipalities in the Capital area. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town.

The agency will have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the regional planning agency shall be from the town, to be appointed by the Selectmen.

8. To see if the town will vote to release the Capital Reserve Fund established under Article 6 in the Warrant of 1961 Town Meeting to be used in the purchase of a new loader for the Highway Department and also authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to release \$6,000.00 of the special bridge fund to be used in the purchase of the new loader.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

### **ANNUAL MEETING MARCH 12, 1968**

Meeting called to order at 10 o'clock A. M. Reading of the Warrant and certification of the check list followed. The meeting then worked under Article One until 6:30 P. M. with the following results:

Article One. Election of Officers:

Selectman — Arthur Brown

Town Clerk — Charles H. Dean

Treasurer — Richard A. Dickson

Tax Collector — Beverly M. Hugron

Auditor - Frank Hallin, 2 years

Library Trustees — Charles A. Dodge, 3 years Ann Fifield, 3 years

Trustee of trust funds — Virginia Dudley, 3 years Cemetery Commission — Virginia Dudley, 3 years

"Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows?"

#### Amendment No. 1:

Amend Article XII—by adding the following Section 9:

Building means a structure with floor area of more than one hundred (100) square feet to be used for the garaging or storing of vehicles or machinery or tools or for the shelter of domestic animals or any structure, of any size, to be used for human habitation or for commercial, industrial, agricultural or social use."

### Amendment No. 2

### ARTICLE 1, SECTION 2

"no building or mobile home shall be erected or moved to a new location, and no such existing structure shall be enlarged without first obtaining a permit conforming to the terms of this ordinance, duly granted by the administrative authority, to whom adequate information and plans of the proposed building structure or alteration shall be submitted."

### Amendment No. 3

### ARTICLE XII

"Natural Resources means loam, gravel, quarried stone or other materials removed from the ground but not including timber or other agricultural products."

"Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows?"

### Amendment No. 4

Article V, Section 1—Natural Resources

"Natural resources shall not be removed from the Town of Canterbury unless a permit for such removal shall have first been issued by the Administrative Authority and such permit shall not be issued unless a majority of the Board of Selectmen, after a public hearing notice of which shall have been posted in two public places within the town and sent by mail to all known abutting property

owners, agree that such removal will not be injurious to nearby property nor leave an appearance injurious to the natural beauty of the area."

Meeting reopened at 8:05 P. M.

Warrant read.

Article Two. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. It was voted to take up the budget item by item. The amount of money appropriated for the Planning Board was raised from \$50.00 to \$100.00. The amount of money appropriated for dog damage was raised from \$50.00 to \$100.00. Total approved budget for the ensuing year of \$53,035.22.

Article Three. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Accepted as read.

Article Four. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, lease or otherwise transfer real estate property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed in a manner for the best interest of the town. Accepted as read.

Article Five. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new highway department equipment. Accepted as read.

Article Six. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be placed in the Capital Fund for the purchase of a new truck for the Fire Department. Accepted as read.

Article Seven. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken on Article 7 relative to the CanterburyBoscawen bridge in the Warrant of the 1966 town meeting. Accepted as read.

Article Eight. To see if the town will vote to release the Capital Reserve Fund established under Article 7 in the Warrant of the 1960 town meeting. These funds to be held by the Trustees of the Trust Funds to be used by the Selectmen for repair or replacement of town bridges. A motion was made and seconded to delete certain words in the second sentence of this article so that it would read: These funds to be held by the Trustees of the Trust Funds to be used for replacement of town bridges. Amendment defeated. Article accepted as read.

Article Nine. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or dispose of the Canterbury half of the Canterbury-Boscawen Bridge over the Merrimack River on West Road. Accepted as read.

Article Ten. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of installing one culvert and gravel two tenths of a mile on the Gilmanton Road, leading to the entrance to Sherwood Forest Shores. By petition. Article defeated.

Article Eleven. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to use a portion of anticipated income of the Sam Lake Trust Fund, as may be acceptable to the Trustees, to build a new Fire Station. Also authorizing the Selectmen to issue notes in the name of the town, said notes not to exceed \$25,000 to be paid from income of the Sam W. Lake Fund. Accepted as read.

Article Twelve. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 this year and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$2,000.00, to be repaid at the rate of \$1,000.00 a year for the next succeeding two years for the purpose of renovating the

basement at the Elkins Library, and to authorize the Library Trustees to make such renovations. Accepted as read.

Article Thirteen. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase and planting of shade trees. Article defeated.

Article Fourteen. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of a Central regional planning agency. This agency will have membership of at least two of the muncipalities in the Capital area. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town.

The agency will have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the regional planning agency shall be from (the town) to be appointed by the Selectmen. Article defeated.

Article Fifteen. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Charles Dean offered the following resolution:

Whereas for the first time since 1949 the name of Sabin N. Guertin does not appear on the Town ballot for the office of Town Clerk, his having served the Town faithfully for a total of 18 years and 7 months, this being the longest single term as Town Clerk in Canterbury,

And whereas Sabin N. Guertin first ran for the office of Town Clerk in 1929, and after serving a year's term moved to Penacook, returning in 1938,

And whereas he was appointed Town Clerk in Jan. 1949 by the Selectmen to complete the unfinished term of Louis D. Morrill, and has run for this office every year thereafter, always receiving the highest plurality of any candidate on the ballot.

And whereas, the duties of Town Clerk having increased 8 fold, the receipts from 1929 bring \$924.34, and in 1967 bring \$8,537.55, Sabin N. Guertin was at all time available and always willing to accommodate everyone who required his services,

Be it therefore resolved that the Town of Canterbury show its appreciation for the service Sabin N. Guertin has given during his term as Town Clerk, by causing a copy of these resolutions to be printed in the Town Report of 1967, and by directing the Selectmen to present this hand lettered copy of these resolutions to him.

and moved the adoption of this resolution. Duly seconded. Motion unanimously accepted.

Doug Ruesswick gave a report on the Canterbury Fund and urged all people in town to donate their time and help.

#### CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

During the past year the Cemetery Commissioners were more successful in their search for manpower than they had been in previous years. The larger cemeteries were kept in comparatively good condition and the small family cemeteries were brought back from brush-filled tangles to areas in which a power-mower can be used. We purchased a new power-mower in mid-season and have been well pleased with the suitability of the machine to our needs.

Dead trees were removed from the Center Cemetery. This was a rather expensive procedure, but the risk of injury to passers-by or damage to markers in the area made their removal imperative.

The gates in the Center Cemetery were freshly painted. If the person or persons who removed the gate from the Pallett Cemetery in the Borough would replace it, we would paint that gate. The gates on the remote cemeteries help keep roaming cattle out of burying grounds and prevent much toppling of markers, thereby reducing expenses.

The newly graded area in Maple Grove has been mapped and lots may now be purchased by those wishing to take care of this inevitable need prior to a time of family sorrow.

It has been decided to plant a line of flowering shrubs on the south boundary line. Contributions of suitable shrubs are solicited for spring planting.

Copies of cemetery regulations as adopted at town meeting are available. Your cooperation in complying with these rules is requested. The rules regarding use of breakable containers and of doing work on lots without approval are the commonly violated ones. The first rule was adopted to provide more safety for cemetery

personnel whereas the other is to insure minimum care requirements.

Our cemeteries are Memorial Parks, and we encourage genealogical research or quiet contemplation. However, horseback riding, snow-mobiling and beer parties have no place in them — Please reserve these areas to honor our dead. There are many miles of roads and trails for the more venturesome pursuits.

#### Trustees' Report

This has been a year of changes at Elkins Public Library

First of all, Mrs. Andrew Fowler, our librarian of fifteen years resigned, due to increasing responsibility in her job at St. Paul's School. Our Board of Trustees reluctantly accepted her resignation, and signed on Louisa Jackman, who had served as librarian prior to Mrs. Fowler. Miss Jackman has just about worked back into her old job; some of you may find her comparison of the library and its patrons of twenty years ago with today's of some interest.

Changes have occurred within the library stacks themselves; Friends of the Library and librarians have spent many hours weeding, marking, shelving, cleaning, filing—and finally, manning the check out desk. Special thanks go to Mary Hutchins, who has shelved all the books since last spring, Janet Hutchinson, for her eternal card filing efforts, and Yvonne Handel, who has reorganized the entire school program. All Canterbury School children now have library borrower's cards, and come to the library once a week.

In weeding our collection, Mr. Parent, of the State Library, noted that several of our classics, particularly in the childrens' section, needed replacements. Therefore, a good part of our book purchases in recent months has been in this vein. Please come see some of our "new classics."

Renovation of the cellar has progressed slowly and thoughtfully. It became obvious fairly early that our board needed an architect to plan this room, and at the recommendation of the Selectmen, we chose Henry Newell, of Concord, who drew up some very complete plans and specifications for us, which our board approved, with some minor changes.

During the year we learned that federal funds are available for just the sort of project we are undertaking in our cellar — up to 40% of the total cost. Mr. Emil Allen, of the State Library, came out to look over our plans, cellar, make suggestions, and send us applications for this federal money for the coming year. Our board simply asks that you, the voters, allow us to accept this federal aid if granted.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

During the 1968-1969 year the Planning Board has met at the Selectmen's office at least monthly at 7:30 p.m. on the second Thursday of the month. These meetings are open to all and some have availed themselves of the invitation.

By request consideration has been given to certain amendments to the zoning and building ordinance and it was decided to offer proposals to do with mobile homes to test the will of the people in this connection.

The Board adopted a new town map and printed copies are being made available to all.

Again the Board offers an article having to do with regional planning and recommends its adoption. Canterbury's population has increased 30 per cent in eight years which clearly foreshadows things to come. We feel that such planning is advisable if we are to continue to keep Canterbury a nice place in which to live.

# SCHOOL WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Canterbury qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1969, at 6:45 o'clock in the afternoon, with the moderator opening the meeting, declaring the polls open for voting from six forty-five o'clock to seven-thirty o'clock, and from eight forty-five to nine o'clock for school district officials, and declaring the business section of the meeting open at seven-thirty o'clock for action on articles 5-13 inclusive.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. To choose a member of the School Board for one year.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Commitees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To appropriate a sum of money for the enlargement of the elementary school including equipment and other related capital costs and to raise such sum by borrowing in the name of the school district under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to take any other action in relation thereto (requires ballot vote with checklist and ½ majority to adopt).
- 10. To appoint a building committee to work with the school board and architect in developing final plans for the enlargement of the elementary school and in supervising the construction of the same.
- 11. To raise and appropriate a sum of money to compensate the architect for preliminary plans and estimates on the proposed enlargement of the elementary school (to be acted upon only if article for borrowing is defeated).
- 12. To see if the district will create an authorized regional enrollment area planning committee and to elect the members thereof or determine that they shall be appointed by the moderator.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CANTERBURY SCHOOL DISTRICT

#### March 6, 1968

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by the Acting Moderator, Nancy Lilly. The warrant was read.

The Acting Moderator called for nominations from the floor for Temporary Moderator for this meeting and the regular school meeting to be held March 9th. Robert Lee was nominated by Robert Lockwood, and Catherine Dickson seconded. The nominations were closed and Robert Lee was unanimously voted in as Temporary Moderator by a voice vote.

The Moderator again read the article in the warrant. Robert Lockwood moved that the article be approved as read. Seconded by Everand Young. The article reads as follows:

"Shall the proposed agreement of annexation on file with the district clerk, joining Canterbury School District to the Winnisquam Regional Cooperative School District be approved?"

Various members of the School Study Committee reported their findings. Discussion followed, most of which dealt with the accreditation of the Winnisquam Regional Cooperative School by the State and by the New England Association of Accredited Schools.

A checklist vote was then taken and this article was passed by a vote of 97 to 32. However, Robert Lockwood then announced that the Winnisquam Regional Cooperative School District had voted down this article by a vote of 533 to 102.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:55 p. m.

## MINUTES OF THE CANTERBURY SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

#### March 9, 1968

Polls opened at 6:45 p. m., closed at 7:30 p. m., opened at 8:45 p. m. closed at 9:00 p. m.

The meeting was called to order by the Temporary Moderator, Robert Lee. The warrant was read and the checklist attested.

A total of 117 ballots was cast on a checklist of 387.

Article 1. Moderator elected, Robert Lee.

Article 2. Clerk elected, Nancy Lilly.

Article 3. School Board Member for three years, Walter Lewis.

Article 4. Treasurer elected, Beverly Hugron.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

Robert Lockwood moved that this article be passed over as it is included in the school budget. Everand Young seconded. Motion passed.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Robert Lockwood moved that this article be passed over as auditors' reports are included in the Town Report and there are no special committee reports. Richard Stevens seconded and motion passed.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

By mutual agreement between the School Board and the Moderator, this article is to be taken up at the end of the meeting.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Donald Chase moved that this article be taken up item by item. Duly seconded and motion passed.

Item 210.31 — Classroom teachers increased from \$35,900.00 to \$38,400.00 to cover the cost of a remedial reading teacher. This is a Title I federal program and the town will be reimbursed for this amount.

With the foregoing change, a budget of \$148,120.44 was unanimously accepted.

Article 9. To see if the District, in accordance with chapter 194:3 of New Hampshire School Laws, Codification of 1955, will authorize the School Board to purchase a school bus and enter into such contracts as necessary to finance the same, including issue of notes up to the purchase price of the vehicle, and using the vehicle as security.

Douglas Ruesswick moved the adoption of this article. Duly seconded. Arthur Brown moved to amend this article to borrow up to \$2,000.00. Seconded by Oliver Fifield. The amendment was defeated by a voice vote and the original article was passed unanimously.

Article 10. To transact any business which may legally come before this meeting.

Robert Lockwood gave a report on the status of the Canterbury School District on the education of its pupils. A copy of this report is attached to these minutes and is made a part hereof. Robert Lockwood moved that this report and its recommendations be adopted. Duly seconded. Motion passed.

Under Article Seven, Robert Lockwood moved that we pass over this article and allow the Moderator time to receive volunteers and make decisions as to people to put on these study committees. Duly seconded and motion passed.

Robert Lockwood then gave a summary report on the educational situation of the Canterbury Elementary School and the improvements that have been made:

- 1. One grade per teacher no combined grades.
- 2. Departmentalized situation in the upper three grades.
- 3. French language program started in the sixth grade with the aid of educational television.
- 4. New art teacher as of December.
- 5. Instrumental and choral programs.
- 6. Most experienced teaching staff in recent years.
- 7. Summer school program in reading.
- 8. Repaired sewerage problem.
- 9. Installed water softener at the school.
- 10. Enlarged the black top playground area to keep down the mud problem in the spring.
- 11. Regular maintenance program with a regular maintenance man available at all times.
- 12. Remedial reading program which will start as soon as approved by the State Department of Education.
- 13. Providing children with junior high facilities.

Ruth Smith moved that this meeting go on record to thank the School Study Committee for all their effort on the town's behalf.

Miriam Hill moved a vote of thanks to Robert Lockwood for all the time and effort put into his work during his time in office.

Meeting adjourned at 9:45 p.m.

## MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CANTERBURY SCHOOL DISTRICT

July 8, 1968

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p. m. by the Moderator, Robert Lee. The warrant was read.

William Colburn moved the adoption of the article. Seconded by Richard Robinson.

Robert Lockwood offered an amendment to the article to the effect that the Moderator appoint a committee of three persons to work with the Canterbury School Board in this study and that the appointments by the Moderator be approved by the School Board.

The Moderator felt that this motion was unnecessary because the School Board is fully authorized to make this study and have the power to appoint anyone they need to help them.

Robert Lockwood felt that this amendment was necessary to relieve the pressure on the School Board so that they could devote their time to the running of the Board. Robert Hill seconded the motion. The question was raised as to whether or not the Board needed this additional help and the Board said they would definitely like to have the help of some of the people who had worked on the previous study. The amendment was passed by a voice vote.

Richard Stevens announced his resignation from the Canterbury School Board as of tonight.

The question was asked whether or not the School Board could give us some idea of the possible cost of the merger, whether or not we will have this information before any final action is taken and whether or not this will be brought back to the town before final action. The Board said there would have to be a final vote on annexation and there would have to be a public hearing in all of the towns involved before any vote comes up.

The article as amended was passed by a show of hands vote of 42 to 4.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:50 p. m.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the members of the School Board and Residents of Canterbury:

During the past school year a remedial reading and math program was developed and implemented under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. This program began during the spring months and culminated with a summer program.

The program will operate during all of the present school year but will have no classes during the summer of 1969.

During the year, interior painting was completed in still another classroom. New tile was installed in the hall and classrooms as needed. Other painting and repair work will continue during the coming year.

The pressing problem of the district continues to be placement of pupils in grades seven through twelve. Every effort is being made to provide for the needs of all pupils when they complete the work of the Canterbury school.

Grades two, four and six participated in a State-wide testing program during the year. This is an expanded testing program financed by State and Federal funds. Previously this program has applied only to grade eight in the elementary schools of the state.

As this program continues, valuable educational data will be accumulated and made available to the various districts for their use in evaluation and possible revision of the elementary school programs of New Hampshire.
