## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of current year taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be set aside as a Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of a Fire Truck. (By request of the Fire Dept.)
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$352.00 for support of the Concord Hospital. (At request of the Hospital)
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be merged with funds appropriated by the Town of Epsom, the N. H. Fish and Game Dept., and the N. H. Water Resources Board for the purpose of erecting a permanent dam at Deer Meadow Pond at an estimated cost of \$4800.00. This sum is to be non-lapsing during the 1961-1962 Bien-nium.
7. To see if the Town will vote to re-open a portion of the Locke Road.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Trustees of Trust Funds to accept or reject a gift of a tract or tracts of land for cemetery or other purposes.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls will be open until 6:00 P.M.

All articles except No. 1 above will be taken up at 7:00 P.M.

## **TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY CHICHESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT**

On January 29, 1936 some of the citizens of Chichester, interested in forming a Fire Department, met at the Town Hall and organized the Chichester Volunteer Fire Department. Officers were elected and John Langmaid became the first Chief and Leon A. Sanborn was elected Clerk, which position he still holds after twenty-five years. It was voted to adjourn until February 3rd when they met again and approved the Constitution and By-laws. There were 33 Charter members, of which 13 are still members.

At the regular meeting in February one of the first orders of business was to instruct the Central Telephone office to authorize the operator to ring the fire alarm for all fires in Chichester.

At the March meeting action was taken to purchase a truck from Huckins Garage in Epsom. With an option to buy a new Chevrolet truck chassis for \$625.00 or a used one for \$325.00. The members voted two for the new truck and thirteen for the used one.

It is interesting to note the prices. At the June meeting the members voted to buy a new 150 GPM pump for \$55.00; a water tank for \$12.00 and at a later meeting a 30 ft. extension ladder for \$10.80.

In August, several individuals feeling the urgent need for a permanent home for the fire truck and a suitable place to work on it, agreed to advance an equal sum of money toward the purchase of the garage or stone shed owned by Alfred Jenkins. The price of \$400.00 was contributed by Leon A. Sanborn, Winifred J. Pickard, Edward S. Edmunds and Melvin D. Sanborn, a loan of \$100.00 each.

At the next March Town Meeting, the town bought the firehouse from the above men.

During the early years of the Department's activities many minstrel shows, dances and whist parties were



held to raise money. From 1935 to 1941 Chichester and Epsom jointly held winter carnivals which were two day affairs held alternately in the two towns, climaxed with a Carnival Ball held Saturday night. This was one of the major social affairs held at that time and quite a sum of money was realized from them.

In August of 1939 Chief Langmaid passed away and Deputy Chief Edward Edmunds assumed the office until 1940 when Charles Call was elected Chief.

During these years many improvements were made on the fire house and equipment. In 1940 an oil heater was bought and it was voted to pay a janitor 25 cents a day, only for the season when a fire was needed. Leon Sanborn was to act as janitor.

As an improvement on the building, a small room was added on the back of the station and a cook stove and sink were installed. This room was then used for the meetings and an occasional oyster stew.

The annual meeting in January of 1942 was the last meeting recorded until November, 1945 due to the unsettled conditions of World War II. During the war years a telephone was installed in the meeting room at the fire station and manned twenty-four hours a day for air raid alerts.

In 1947 a committee of firemen went to Camp Devens, Mass., to look at an army surplus fire truck. This was a 1942 Chevrolet 500 GPM pumper all equipped. Papers were signed and the town bought the truck which is our newest piece of equipment in use today. At about this same time a 500 GPM trailer pumper was also purchased through Government surplus property.

Later that year the front doors on the fire house were widened to accommodate the new equipment.

In September of 1948 a water hole was started beside the fire station and completed the following year giving the Center added water for fire protection.

In February of 1949 the department proposed the



matter of buying the Center School for a new station house, but at the March meeting the members voted against changing the location of the fire house, and relinquished their option on the School to the School District.

In March the siren atop the fire station was bought and later that year a wire was run in the Central telephone office and an alarm box installed so the operator could sound the alarm from the telephone exchange.

In May of 1950 two committees were appointed, one to study the future building of a larger fire house and one to look into the purchase of a newer truck to replace the old 1934 truck. The following month a used 1942 Chevrolet chassis was bought. During the following year an 800 gallon tank was built and the pump installed on the new chassis and put in operation during the summer of 1951.

In 1952 a two way radio was purchased for each truck and a base station was added in 1955 operating on the State Forestry frequency.

At the annual meeting in January, 1953, Shirley Marden was elected Chief of the department. Also action was taken to start work on a new fire house.

The committee reported that a two story building would cost approximately \$1600.00 and require about 127 man days of labor. In February of 1953 work was started on cutting lumber for the building and in July of that year the last meeting was held in the Old fire house and the first meeting held in the New station in August. During this time the members of the Department cut, hauled and sawed approximately 18,800 feet of lumber, all of which was donated by interested individuals. In addition, \$931.26 had been spent for building materials, wholly from donations and fireman's funds. At the next Town Meeting the town voted an additional \$500.00 to complete the building.

During the middle 1950's several Fireman's Field

Days were held jointly with Epsom at Webster Park.

In 1957 the driveway in front of the fire station was hot-topped, improving the front of the building and providing better drainage.

In November of 1958 Chief Marden resigned his office and Walter Sanborn was elected Chief at the next annual meeting. Also that year the Fire Department voted to sponsor the Boy Scouts.

As the Department starts the year of 1961 we have twenty-five years behind us with a proud record of contributing our services to the community.

During these years we have answered approximately 220 calls for assistance, built up a department with modern equipment ready to serve the community and built a new building which is an asset to the Town, at very little cost. The Fire Department also acts as a social outlet to men of the Town.

I would also like to state that a Ladies Auxiliary to the Fire Department was organized in July, 1948 and since that time has donated to the Department sums of money with which to buy needed equipment and they entertain the Department annually at Christmas.

To the people who remember the organizing of our Department we have come a long way and hope to better serve the citizens of Chichester in years to come.

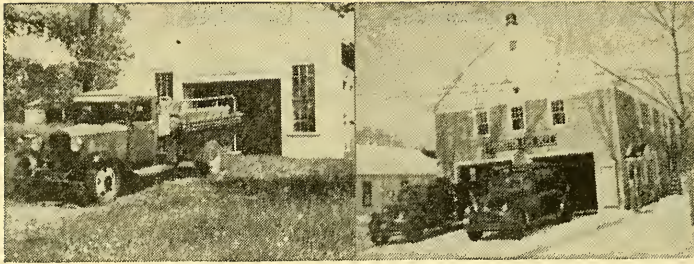

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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*To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Chichester, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 18th day of March 1961, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to construct an addition to the Chichester Central School, including any necessary alterations to the existing building, purchase needed equipment and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$30,000.00 therefor and raise the same by the issue of bonds or otherwise as provided in RSA 33 (Municipal Finance Act) and authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts relating thereto, including the employment of an architect and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable.

10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or from the State of New Hampshire.

11. To see if the School District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.

12. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

13. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

14. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the school district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire

to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the treasurer, Chichester School District, as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

15. To see if the district will raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$300 (three hundred dollars) for the purpose of improving the ball ground. (By request of Alvin Towle and Percy Batchelder)

16. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to execute a new transportation contract with the present carrier for a period of one year at an additional sum not to exceed \$600 (six hundred dollars) and appropriate a sum of money for the same. (By request of Kempton Ricker)

17. To conduct any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Chichester School Board and Citizens of Chichester:

In this brief report I am presenting to you once again the crucial problem of lack of classrooms to take care of the number of children enrolled in your school.

This issue was discussed at some length last year, a proposal was placed before the voters and the issue was turned down at the annual school meeting under the pretense that the need was not great enough to justify the addition of two rooms to your present building.

The problem is even more acute this year. The first grade has increased to the extent that it must be separated from the second grade next September. There must be also a single second grade next year. The elementary grades are the most important areas where overcrowding should be avoided. There should be no more than 25 children assigned to a single teacher in these beginning classes. Larger groups than this mean overworked teachers and neglected children. Under no circumstances should combination grades be forced upon teachers at this level of classroom construction.

The Study Committee which you appointed at the last annual meeting has worked diligently and has already reported to you of conditions which exist. It has rendered a great service to the community in the manner in which it has served you to date.

The School Board is now squarely behind the proposal to provide necessary additional classrooms for the coming year. There will be articles in the annual school meeting warrant asking you as citizens to support this proposal. In the effort to secure adequate school opportunities for your children you should give this question your most careful consideration; and, at the school

meeting in March, vote in accordance with your own thinking on the issue.

Personally, I have always had enough confidence in the public citizenry to believe that when it sees the need for moving forward in matters pertaining to its own welfare and that of its children it will take the proper action at the polls.

Subject: State Board of Education Policy Concerning the School Year and the School Day.

During the winter of 1959-1960 a statewide committee appointed by me studied the implications of the law passed by the 1959 General Court requiring that schools be in session 180 classroom days. As a result of the recommendations made by that committee, the State Board of Education at its March, 1960 meeting approved the following policy:

"For the purpose of fulfilling the intent of the 180-day school year law (RSA 189:1 as amended by 1959, 133:1) enacted by the 1959 General Court, the following provisions shall become effective beginning with the 1960-1961 school year:

**SCHOOL** A division of the school system consisting of a group of pupils composed of one or more grade groups, organized as one unit with one or more teachers to give instruction of a defined type, and housed in a school plant of one or more buildings. More than one school may be housed in one school plant, as is the case when the elementary and secondary programs are housed in the same school plant.

**SCHOOL YEAR** The school year shall consist of a minimum of 180 school days.

**SCHOOL DAY** A school day is a day when a school is operated for at least the minimum length of time prescribed below exclusive of the lunch period.

Grade one	4½ hours
Grades Two - Eight (Elementary)	5¼ hours
Grades Seven - Twelve (Secondary)	5½ hours

Recess periods may be counted as part of the elementary school day but not as part of the secondary school day. Organized activity periods and homeroom

periods are considered a part of the school's instructional program and may be counted.

**SHORTENED SCHOOL DAY** A shortened school day may be considered a "school day" when the safety, health or welfare of the pupils necessitates operation of the school for less than the minimum time specified above but for a period of not less than  $3\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

**SCHOOL HALF-DAY** A school half-day in the elementary school shall consist of either a regular morning session or a regular afternoon session or the major portion of either.

A school half-day in the secondary school shall consist of either one of the following:

(1) At least one-half of the regularly scheduled periods of a "school day"

or

(2) A minimum of three hours.

Two "school half-days" may be considered a "school day".
