WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING March 8, 1938

Two Hundredth and Seventh Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the eighth day of March, A. D., 1938 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk (Charles Wentworth), one delegate to the Constitutional Convention (William Chamberlin), one Selectman for a term of three years (Perley I. Fitts), a Town Treasurer (George D. Stevens), a Collector of Taxes (Arthur P. Stewart), two Auditors (Clement Moran and Harry C. Woodworth), four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years (K. E. Barraclough, A. W. Johnson, T. B. Charles, and L. V. Tirrell), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years (F. W. Taylor) and one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of two years (John H. Simpson).
- 3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-eight hundred and twenty-six dollars (\$2826.00) to obtain State Aid on the following: State Aid Construction of Durham Point Road. Voted.
- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget) \$4000.00.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (See approved items in the budget.)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter call-

ing attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$146.83. (See budget.) Voted.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to install street lights between Durham and the Newmarket line, the number of lights to be decided by the Light Company and the Selectmen. Rejected.

Petitioned by Clarina Boucher and nine other legal voters. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to continue the hydrant line up Madbury Road a reasonable distance. (See budget.) Voted.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the federal constitution by the state June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen. (See budget.) Voted.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue street lights on the Dover Road from Coes Corner to the Madbury town line. (Inserted by vote of the Budget Committee.) Rejected.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the appointing of three men to be known as the Sewer Commission of Durham, said board to have full control of laying out, constructing and administering the sewer system of Durham. One commissioner to be appointed by the board of selectmen for a term of three years; one commissioner to be appointed by the budget committee for a term of two years; and they to appoint one member for a term of one year. Hereafter, one member to be elected in Town meeting for a term of three years. Voted.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be used by the sewer commission to pay for surveying the Town and

laying out a complete sewer system and other necessary expense connected with their office. Voted.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the offer of the Durham School District, and hold future meetings of the Town at the New School Auditorium.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. Voted.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. Voted.
- 16. To see if the Town will allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows: one per cent (1%) if paid on or before August 1, 1938. Voted.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING March 14th, 1939

Two Hundredth and eighth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March, A. D., 1939 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee, for a term of three years and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
- 3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-nine hundred and four dollars (\$2904.00) to obtain State Aid on the following: State Aid Construction on Durham Point Road. (See approved item in the budget.)
- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.)
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (See approved items in the budget.)
- 6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). (See budget.)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Woodman Avenue and vote to raise and appropriate a

sum of money to pay for the same. (See budget.)

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to improve and tar a section of Woodman Avenue from Madbury Road to the Bowler-Smith property line, and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the same. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the upper end of Emerson Road from Madbury Road by the property of Henry Clapp and Phillip Wilcox and to open said road to Madbury Road by a road near the line of the Wesley Davis property and parallel to said line. The distance is short and the land in question apparently is town property.
- 10. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 96, Articles 3 through 18 of the Public Laws as amended.
- 11. To see if the Town of Durham will elect by ballot, three sewer commissioners as prescribed by Chapter 96 of the Public Laws.
- 12. To see if the Town of Durham will authorize its Sewer Commission to negotiate with the University of New Hampshire the terms and conditions under which the town sewerage system may enter the University sewerage system.
- 13. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to pay all costs of construction of Town sewer mains and require all property owners to pay all costs of construction of the connecting lines from the properties served to the Town sewer mains.
- 14. To see if the Town of Durham will appropriate the sum of \$5300 (as estimated by Weston and Sampson) for construction of a sewer line in Mill Road from the College Brook sewer to a point on Mill Road near the house of Harry C. Woodworth as outlined on pages 3 and 4 Mill Road of Weston and Sampson's report of January 30, 1939 and as indicated on the plan. (See budget Art. 14 and Art. 15 below.)
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$4,000 to complete the project of Art. 14 said sum

to be repaid by \$2,000 in 1940 and the balance of \$2,000 in 1941.

- 16. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used by the Sewer Commission to defray expenses connected with the Commission in the performance of its official duties. (Not approved by Budget Committee because of the expected balance from 1938 appropriation.)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken on Article 6 in the Warrant for the Town Meeting of March 1936 which related to the adoption of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept the extensions of Woodman Avenue, now in process of construction, with the understanding that previous regulations as to width and subgrade are to be compiled with before such acceptance will be granted.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase the property of the Durham Water Company and specify the amount to be paid.
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds to cover the purchase of the property of the Durham Water Company.
- 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer the affairs of the Water system and to appoint such agent or agents as may be necessary to carry on the business.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money inanticipation of taxes.
- 24. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1939.
- 25 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

February 1, 1939

To the Town of Durham:

During the past year a total of 5,413 volumes were added to the library collection. This number includes 132 volumes purchased from funds of the Durham Library Association and 170 volumes from funds provided by the Town of Durham. A total of 54,147 volumes were circulated during the year for use outside the building, including town and university use. The total combined book collection is now 99,148 volumes.

During the past few months further work in the building has resulted in the completion of alterations to the children's room, the newspaper room, and the entire second floor. The entire second floor is to be devoted entirely to promoting art appreciation and includes a reading room, an exhibition gallery, and music listening rooms. The children's room is to be furnished entirely in maple and when so equipped will be one of the most attractive rooms in the building. Alterations and equipment for this room were made possible through generous contributions of university alumnae and a P. W. A. grant. This room is to be named the Charlotte Thompson Room in perpetual recognition of the years of faithful and inspiring service given by Miss Thompson to the library and town.

By using the major portion of funds appropriated by the town for books for young people, the library is gradually building up a very good book collection for the youngsters. However, although as much rebinding as possible has been done with funds available, at best the majority of this collection is shabby in appearance. On one side of the ledger this is a very good sign as it indicates active use by the children, but it is also discouraging as children, even more than grown-ups, like brightly bound books.

Although the town is annually exceeding the allotment required by law and by agreement with the college, it might well consider a generous increase in annual appropriations, particularly since it has access to the services and book collection of a library equivalent to that of many cities of fifty to one hundred thousand population. In reporting on the consolidation of libraries in 1905, Mr. Lucien Thompson wrote, "At the present time our expenses are over five hundred dollars per year, which would probably have been doubled if the town had a large library of its own." By this the people of the town may see the saving in the present arrangement over a period of more than thirty years. There is a considerable demand for light reading and for sufficient copies of the more popular material to meet reasonable demands. This demand cannot be met with the funds now available. College funds may not be used for this purpose. It is to be hoped that the town can find means for more adequate support of its share in the library.

DURHAM'S PART IN THE CONSTITU-TIONAL SESQUICENTENNIAL

The Town Meeting of 1937 voted that the History department of the Woman's Club serve as the Town's committee to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the adoption of the Federal Constitution. Mrs. O. V. Henderson was elected chairman by the Committee.

The committee met numerous times and twice called a meeting of the representatives of the community organizations. The sentiment of the group meeting was that each organization carry on any program which they so desired within their respective groups. Literature on the Sesquicentennial was made available to each group.

Attempts were made to have a larger union meeting but the crowded community calendar prevented the committee from carrying out such a program.

Many town folks assisted in the Sesquicentennial Pageant given by the University in May, 1937. Other University programs in recognition of the anniversary were open to the community. All townspeople were welcome.


Listed below are some of the town's activities:

The Village school presented "The Four Absentees", a play by Francis H. Buffum, chairman of the State committee. Several grades carried out special room projects.

The Lion's Club presented the Village school with a Shrine especially made for schools. Displayed in this Shrine are facsimiles of the four sheets of the Constitution and of the Declaration of Independence and a sheet with photographs of the portraits of the signers of the Constitution with their signatures in facsimile, covered for protection.

Rev. Emerson G. Hangen, local pastor, on Sunday, July 3, spoke on "The Constitution and Liberty". This was a very fine sermon on Christian liberty based on the four types of freedom listed in the Bill of Rights.

The Scouts of Durham had active participation in the



State Pageant Parade in Concord, June 21. David Page, Harold Woodworth, Forbes Getchell, Solan Barraclough and Karl Woodward were assigned to special duty on Governor Murphy's reviewing stand.

The chairman of the committee made a large scrap-book of programs, pictures, music, posters, leaflets, etc., pertaining to the subject. There were book lists, addresses and reports of current celebrations included that anyone might find material on the Constitution. The scrapbook was exhibited at the Village school and the University Library.

The committee presented to the Village school library and library at the University, copies of "The Story of the Constitution" by Bloom, also, a copy of "New Hampshire Constitution Sesquicentennial Celebration, 1788-1938" was presented to the Village school library.

The Woman's club held an open meeting the evening of October 22, 1937. The address was given by Gaylord W. Douglas. Several departments of the club held appropriate programs. The history department has discussed such topics as colonial homes, old roads of Durham, doctors of early Durham. They made a tour of the historic spots of Durham, including Town Pound, Darby Field, site of the First Church and of the Indian Massacres. An address "The Life of General John Sullivan, Patriot, Soldier, and Statesman", by Oren V. Henderson and, three tableaux arranged by Mrs. Barron Shirley on the Sullivan family, was presented before the club. The history department, under the supervision of Mrs. Loveren, chairman '37 and Mrs. Potter, chairman '38, has carried out a special project of restoring the foundation and hearth stone of the Woodman Garrison, located on the school property.

Durham participated in the State Pageant Parade on June 21, the anniversary of New Hampshire's signing of the Federal Constitution in 1788. After numerous meetings and several attempts to fit Durham History into the Pageant Parade, we decided to have a Gundalow equipped to repre-

sent the raid on Fort William and Mary, December 1774. The raid led by General John Sullivan was made by patriots of Durham.

We were fortunate in securing two carpenters who knew about the Gundalow type of boat. While our float was not beautiful, it was historically correct in theme. We wish to thank our generous townsman, Fred Knight, for the loan of the car on which the gundalow was built, also, Prof. C. F. Jackson, for the use of his barn where work was accomplished. Among those responsible were—Carpenters, Cass Adams, and Arthur King; Painting, Dorinda Hinckley; Equipment, Mrs. H. Loveren, chairman, Mr. Loveren, Mr. Henderson, and Mr. Knight; Driver of float, John Knight; Characters portrayed—General John Sullivan, Arthur Johnson; Patriots, Cass Adams, Alvin Akerman, Forest Smart, and Harry Mathes. Active in planning were Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Smart, O. V. Henderson, Mrs. Eldredge, Mr. John MacLellan, Mr. E. Getchell, and others.

The float was used at the Barrington Sesquicentennial Parade and Pageant on September 3 and 4. It was again used August 24 in the Hampton tercentenary parade. Unless ruled out because of poor background, the float will appear in the film "The Ninth State" and will be shown not only in New Hampshire but at the New York World's Fair and throughout the country. We hope the people of Durham will have the opportunity of seeing this film.

It is impossible to go into detail and describe the many activities of every organization, neither can we list all the names of those on committees or the many who helped with the State Pageant. As chairman, I wish to thank each and every one. Fifty years from now I hope our grand-children, and our great-grandchildren may celebrate the 200th anniversary of the Federal Constitution.

REPORT OF THE SEWER COMMISSION

On March 8, 1938, at the Town Meeting it was voted to adopt the following article:

"To see if the Town will authorize the appointing of three men to be known as the Sewer Commission of Durham, said board to have full control of laying out, constructing, and administering the sewer system of Durham. One commissioner to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen for a term of three years; one commissioner to be appointed by the budget committee for a term of two years; and they to appoint one member for a term of one year. Hereafter, one member to be elected in Town Meeting for a term of three years.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be used by the sewer commission to pay for surveying the town and laying out a complete sewer system and other necessary expenses connected with their office."

In compliance with the provisions of this article the Board of Selectmen, in a letter dated Nov. 3, 1938, notified Harold W. Loveren of his appointment to serve as a member of this commission for a period of three years. Mr. Loveren accepted the appointment and notified the Selectmen by letter dated Nov. 17, 1938; the Budget Committee notified Guy H. Clark on or about Dec. 1, 1938, of his appointment to serve as a member of the commission for a period of two years. Mr. Clark accepted the appointment.

Mr. Loveren and Mr. Clark met on Dec. 5, 1938 and discussed the sewage problem in general, agreeing to elect Edmond W. Bowler to serve as a member of this commission for a period of one year. On Dec. 9, 1938, Edmond W. Bowler accepted his appointment and the sewer commission of Durham was thus formed.

The first meeting of the commission was held on Dec. 15, 1938. Mr. Loveren was elected Chairman and Mr.

Clark was elected Secretary of the commission. At this meeting the commission discussed at considerable length several methods of sewage disposal for the Town of Durham, including the following:

- 1. A Town sewerage system and sewage disposal works with the necessary collecting sewers and treatment plant, complete in itself and making use of no part of the present University system.
- 2. A Town sewerage system with disposal of raw sewage into nearby brooks and the Oyster River.
- 3. A Town system of sewers which would collect sewage in the present unsewered districts, conveying it to the present University system for collection, treatment and final disposal.

It was decided that Plan No. 1 was impractical because, in addition to laying the necessary new town sewers it would be also necessary to duplicate in general the present University collecting system and treatment works.

It was decided to reject Plan No. 2. It is not sound practice, would not eliminate unsanitary conditions and would not be approved by the State Board of Health.

The commission adopted Plan No. 3. This plan is the only feasible plan of sewage disposal that the Town of Durham could reasonably finance.

Having adopted Plan No. 3 the Commission employed the firm of Weston and Sampson, Enginers, of 14 Beacon St., Boston, Mass., to make a study, report and plans for a Town system of sewers in unsewered areas. After consulting with Weston and Sampson, it was decided to proceed on the following basis:

- 1. Necessary survey.
- Studies to determine the proper method to provide sewers.
- 3. A general plan showing a comprehensive system of sewers.

4. Report to include recommendations and estimates of cost by streets so that the town may be sewered progressively by districts.

Weston and Sampson began field work immediately and met with the Sewer Commission several times to discuss Durham conditions.

On the basis of their investigations, Weston and Sampson presented a preliminary report for the Commission's consideration. After studying this report and discussing it with Mr. Sampson, the Engineers were instructed to complete their investigation and make a final report with plans and estimates which were received and approved by the commission on Feb. 11, 1939.

In conference with the University officials, the Sewer Commission was informed that immediate permission to connect town sewer lines with the University sewerage system could not be granted without the approval of the Board of Trustees of the University. However, in view of a letter (copy attached) received from the University, it is assumed by the Sewer Commission that the town will be allowed to connect the proposed Mill Road sewer line with the University sewer system. Therefore the commission recommends the following articles be included in the town warrant.

- 1. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 96, Articles 3 through 18, of the Public Laws as amended.
- 2. To see if the Town of Durham will elect by ballot, three sewer commissioners as prescribed by Chapter 96 of the Public Laws.
- 3. To see if the Town of Durham will authorize its Sewer Commission to negotiate with the University of New Hampshire the terms and conditions under which the town sewerage system may enter the University sewerage system.
- 4. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to pay all costs of construction of Town sewer mains and require all property owners to pay all costs of construction of the con-

necting lines from the properties served to the Town sewer mains.

- 5. To see if the Town of Durham will appropriate the sum of \$5300.00 (as estimated by Weston and Sampson) for construction of a sewer line in Mill Road from the College Brook sewer to a point on Mill Road near the house of Harry C. Woodworth as outlined on pages 3 and 4, Mill Road of Weston and Sampson's report of Jan. 30, 1939, and as indicated on the plan.
- 6. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used by the Sewer Commission to defray expenses connected with the Commission in the performance of its official duties.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with your verbal instructions on December 21, 1938, as confirmed by our letter of December 23, we have completed the surveys and studies for additional sewers for the Town of Durham, and present the following report.

In General

The purpose of this report is to recommend the proper method of providing sewers for certain areas in the town that are now unsewered. It is anticipated that the construction of such sewers may be undertaken progressively year by year as the necessity arises and funds are available. For this reason, the areas have been divided into districts that are self-contained, so that one or more districts may be selected for any year.

This report is based on information obtained from the Engineering Department of the University—on previous and recent surveys by this office—on the knowledge gained during the construction of the sewage treatment plant installed in 1931-1932—on a special report to the University on the sewerage of Mill Road, dated July 7, 1932—on a report of the same date to the University on ground water leakage into the sewer along Pettee Brook—and on a report to the

University, dated June 28, 1933, on improvements to the sewerage system including the extension of existing sewers.

The present report is a summary of previous studies, extended and revised to include areas developed since 1933.

Present Sewerage System

The present sewerage system was first established in 1910 to serve the University buildings, the business section of the town, and a considerable number of dwellings. This system was designed for a gravity flow with a 10" sewer extending down Pettee Brook with an outlet into the brook about 1000 ft. east of Madbury Road.

In 1931-1932 a sewage treatment plant was constructed on the northerly side of the Oyster River about two-thirds, of a mile below Dover Road, and a 12-inch cast iron outfall sewer, 5750 ft. in length, laid to connect the end of the Pettee Brook sewer with the treatment plant. A dosing tank equipped with an automatic sewage siphon was provided at the upper end of the outfall sewer to keep the line free from deposits. The treatment plant consists of two Imhoff tanks, a storage basin for retaining the settled effluent from the tanks until automatically discharged into the river at each outgoing tide, sludge drying beds, and appurtenances.

With the completion of the treatment plant in June 1932, a serious nuisance that had existed in Pettee Brook was eliminated. The capacity of this plant is ample for any probable future growth of the University and Town, provided that excessive ground water leakage and all surface water runoff be excluded from the sewers.

A low-level sewerage system was installed by the University in 1936 consisting of a sewer from near the power house, down College Brook, along the north shore of the mill pond, across Newmarket Road and along Landing Road to a sewage pumping station and a force main connecting with the outfall sewer on Dover Road just north of the bridge.

Numerous dwellings and other buildings have been con-

nected to the sewerage system from time to time but without any definite plan for future extensions. At the present time there are more than one hundred houses in closely built-up areas that are not provided with sewers. Sewage disposal for these areas is by means of private cesspools and septic tanks located on the premises. Because the soil is a clay hardpan, overlying ledge, there is slight opportunity for absorption, and as a result the sewage often appears at the surface and in many instances flows over the ground and along the gutters of the streets. In some cases, the sewage is conveyed away from the houses thru pipes or ditches and discharged upon private property. These conditions are not only obnoxious but constitute a real menace to health, especially to children playing in the vicinity.

Proposed Improvements

The most immediate need is for extensions to the present sewerage system to serve the houses that are not connected with the sewers.

The accompanying plan shows the existing sewerage system in black lines and the proposed sewers in red lines. The full red lines represent those sewers that are most urgent, and the dotted red lines those that may be needed in future years. The sewers on Newmarket Road south of the Oyster River and on Durham Point Road will not be useful until after a public water supply is provided for these streets. The plan has been compiled from other plans furnished by the University, from previous and recent surveys made by this office, and from information obtained thru various sources.

We wish to advise your committee that this plan merely represents a general layout of the sewerage system, and is not drawn to exact scale.

An accurate map of the portion of the town to be sewered, showing the streets, houses, property lines as far as practicable, present sewers and other controlling features, would be very helpful in the study and design of future sewers as well as in the maintenance of the present system. The cost of complete surveys, plotting the field notes, preparing a general plan on a scale of 300' to an inch, and six detail sectional plans on a scale of 100' to an inch, would be about \$3500. These plans would also serve for purposes other than the sewerage system.

The proposed additions to the present sewers may be divided into the following districts, possibly in the order of the need for their installation:

Mill Road

On Mill Road from College Brook to Oyster River, there are 21 houses that depend on the natural soil for the disposal of sewage. The ground is not favorable for subsurface disposal and the sanitary conditions are very objectionable.

Fortunately, the University has recently constructed a gravity sewer down College Brook, and a sewer on Mill Road could readily enter the College Brook sewer at a manhole on the west side of the brook. Of the 21 houses, 18 could be served, but the Wm. Daniels house on the south side and the two houses on the north side near the river are at too low an elevation to enter this sewer by gravity.

, A sewage ejector could be provided for these houses, discharging into the end of the Mill Road sewer. The alternate method would be to construct a gravity sewer down the Oyster River to connect with the College Brook sewer at a manhole near the laundry.

The cost of the Oyster River sewer, including a connecting sewer on Mill Road, would be about \$10,500, which is excessive. To install a sewage ejector near the river with a gravity sewer leading to the Wm. Daniels house and a 4-inch cast iron force main discharging into the end of the Mill Road sewer would cost about \$5,650. The 8-inch gravity sewer on Mill Road connecting with the College Brook sewer, about 1600 ft. in length, without house connections, is estimated to cost \$4600.

If it is proposed for the town to provide the house connections from the sewers to the property lines, the additional cost would be about \$2.00 per lin. ft.

Madbury Road

On Madbury Road, between Bagdad Road and the old railroad right-of-way, there are 24 houses without sewer connections. The solution of this problem is somewhat difficult because ledge is prevalent and the location of the house drains is not well adapted to a sewer in the street. The drains on the east side of Madbury Road are at the rear of the houses and the natural drainage is easterly toward a brook. It is possible, however, to construct a gravity sewer running behind the houses and sloping toward the south, crossing Madbury Road at the low point about 850 ft. north of Bagdad Road, and connect with the existing sewer at the upper end of Faculty Road. This sewer would also serve two houses on the west side of Madbury Road, the drain from one of which now crosses the road.

The maximum cut would be about 10 feet for a distance of 100 feet where the ledge is near the surface, with a cut of 8 feet at Madbury Road.

The last house on the west side of the road could be better served by a sewer in the old railroad location and joining the present Pettee Brook sewer. There are three other houses on the west side of the road that would be connected to a sewer located at the rear of the houses, as shown on the plan.

The alternative would be to lay a sewer in Madbury Road for the houses on both sides of the road. This method would cost slightly less to the town but would result in a considerable additional cost to the property owners for changes in the plumbing and for installing sewer connections.

The cost of an 8-inch sewer on the east side of Madbury Road, across Madbury Road and down a valley to connect with the present sewer on Faculty Road, having a length of 2410 ft., is estimated at \$7,650, without house connections.

The sewer for the three houses on the west side of Madbury Road, 270 ft. in length, would cost \$650. The six houses on the east side of Madbury Road on the side streets would be connected with the above sewer at a cost of \$1325 for a distance of 600 feet. The first three houses on Madbury Road beyond the old railroad right-of-way could be sewered by extending the sewer running to the rear of the east side houses, but it would be more economical if they entered the sewer on the railroad location. The fourth house (near the brook) and any houses in that neighborhood would require a sewage ejector or a gravity sewer extending down the brook to finally connect with the 12-inch cast iron outfall sewer between the dosing tank and the sewage treatment plant, as indicated on the plan. This sewer would also serve any houses on the east side of the old railroad, three houses farther down the brook and any other future houses that are likely to be built in this valley. This sewer would require an automatic sewage dosing tank located at about elevation 30 and a cast iron siphon line connecting with the 12-inch cast iron outfall sewer.

The length of the 8-inch tile gravity sewer from Madbury Road to the dosing tank would be 3050 feet, and the 6-inch cast iron siphon 2210 feet. About 1260 feet of this siphon also serves the houses on Bagdad Road. The cost of the 8-inch tile sewer is estimated at \$5975. The 6-inch cast iron siphon to the connection with the Bagdad Road siphon would cost \$2450. The total estimated cost of \$8425 seems excessive for the six houses to be sewered.

There are 12 houses on newly-laid-out streets west of Madbury Road that are without sewers and should be considered as soon as practicable. Six of these houses would enter the proposed Madbury Road sewer leading to Faculty Road.

The cost of sewers for these houses, having a length of 515 feet, is estimated at \$1050. The remaining six houses would be served by a gravity sewer extending down the old railroad right-of-way to the Pettee Brook sewer at the rear

of the Faculty Club, as shown on the plan. The cost of this sewer, 2960 feet in length, which also serves the three houses on Madbury Road north of the old railroad, is estimated at \$7750.

Bagdad Road

There are 18 houses on Bagdad Road that are not connected by sewers and where the sanitary conditions are objectionable. The sewage from a few houses on the south side now enters a common drain at the rear of the houses, discharging into a ditch in a field. This sewer, together with the remaining houses, can be connected to a main sewer leading to a dosing tank and thru a 6-inch cast iron siphon to the 12-inch outfall sewer, as shown.

The houses on the north side of Bagdad Road could be intercepted by a sewer to the rear of the houses, crossing Bagdad Road at the low point near the curve, and connect with the present sewer, as shown. The two houses on the north side nearest to Madbury Road could be served by a sewer on Bagdad Road connection with an existing sewer on Madbury Road, or could be connected to an extension of the sewer at the rear of the other houses.

The estimated cost for the tile sewers serving Bagdad Road, 1920 feet in length, would be \$4950.

The 6-inch cast iron siphon is 1620 feet in length. The cost of the first 360 feet, to its junction with the siphon on the sewer down the brook, would be \$1165, and that of the remaining 1260 feet, \$2450.

Dover Road

There are 15 buildings on Dover Road, between Newmarket Road and Landing Road, and 3 houses on Landing Road, without a sewerage system. These buildings can be served by an 8-inch tile sewer running down Dover Road and along Landing Road to a manhole in the low level sewer near the sewage pumping station. The length of this 8-inch sewer would be 1605 feet, and the estimated cost \$4050.

The three houses on the street running north from Dover Road could enter the Dover Road sewer at a manhole by filling the street about five-and-one-half feet at the low point.

The cost of this sewer, about 500 feet in length, is estimated at \$750. This estimate does not include the grading for the street which would probably amount to 1000 cubic yards.

The house on the north side of Dover Road near Pettee Brook and any other houses beyond Landing Road could be served by a gravity sewer following the northerly shore of Oyster River to the low level sewage pumping station. The cost of this possible future connection has not been estimated.

Main St. and Newmarket Rd.

There are 13 buildings on Main Street and Newmarket Road, from the high point on Main Street near the church to the bridge over the Oyster River, that are not sewered. These buildings could connect with an 8-inch gravity sewer on Main Street and Newmarket Road, entering the low level sewer at a manhole near the bridge.

The side street leading off Newmarket Road to the east could enter the Newmarket Road sewer at a manhole.

The cost of the Main Street and Newmarket Road sewer, 1365 ft. in length, is estimated at \$3825. The 8-inch sewer on the side street, 380 ft. in length, would cost \$750.

Miscellaneous

There are also some buildings at various locations within the areas covered by the proposed sewers that may be in need of a sewer connection. With the present system extended, as described, and with other extensions installed as required, the Town and University would be reasonably well provided with sewers.

Any additional sewers connected to the present system should be of 8-inch No. 1 vitrified tile pipe,, carefully laid with asphaltic-compound poured joints to be watertight

against infiltration, and the slopes should be at least 4' in 1000 to provide a self-cleaning velocity.

Summary

A summary of the estimated costs of the various sewer extensions for prior construction is as follows—

The cost estimates assume that the sewers are constructed by a contractor in accordance with contract drawings and specifications. The prices also assume that the work will be completed in sections year by year in amounts of about \$5,000.

The above costs include 15% for engineering and contingencies. The estimates on pages 4 to 7 are contract construction costs only.

Rights-of-way or easements for sewers across private property have not been included in the estimated costs.

The house connections, which may be either 5-inch or 6-inch tile pipe, are not included in the estimates, but if installed by the town may be estimated at an average price of \$1.75 per lineal foot.

UNIVERSITY OF NEW HAMPSHIRE LETTER

Mr. Guy H. Clark, Secretary Sewer Commission Durham, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Clark:

The request of the Sewer Commission of the Town of Durham for conditions under which sewer mains constructed by the Town of Durham might be connected to the university sewerage System leads to the following suggestions.

The university desires to cooperate with the Town of Durham in whatever manner is to the mutual advantage of the town and the university. It is our belief that a properly-developed and soundly-constructed sewerage system is a public necessity and its maintenance and operation meets that condition.

The university must first consider the adequacy of its sewage disposal plant to handle properly additional sewage from the Town of Durham with sufficient reserve capacity for further extension and development of the university. The infiltration of water into the older part of the sewerage lines and the possible drainage of residential property now connected to the main with connections that appear to violate the terms and conditions of entry will require correction both by the university on its main lines and by residential property owners on branch lines leading to the university mains. This question is tied up directly with a long-term program of extension of sewerage mains either by the university or the town. Any decision concerning a long-term policy must be reserved until a determination can be made of the ultimate demands on sewerage facilities and the corrections needed both by the university and owners of property connected to the present system.

The college brook sewer main which crosses Mill Road, built by the university in 1935-36, has been so constructed and properly protected that the sewage from a branch main built by the town of Durham for the Mill Road Section may enter that line, which is the section your commission states it proposes to recommend for construction this coming year.

Subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees of the university, the town may enter the university main previously mentioned with its sewer line under the following conditions:

- 1.The sewer line may be connected to the university main provided there are proper engineering service in preparing plans, supervision of construction, and construction using the most recent material developed for the proper protection of sewer mains and branch lines leading to the several properties to be serviced. Plans and specifications must be acceptable to the university before construction is undertaken.
- 2. Assuming that the charge for each entry will correspond to the rates charged to property owners who have previously connected to the university mains, the university will accept \$85 out of each \$100 charged for each tenement, apartment, or single-family residence connected to the town branch main.
- 3. A form of agreement with each property owner including all the conditions required by the university and such other conditions as the town may desire to incorporate in the agreement shall be prepared in triplicate by the sewer commission or whatever agency of the town acts for and in behalf of the town; the original when properly executed to be given to the property owner, the duplicate to be forwarded to the university, and the triplicate to be retained for town or commission records.
- 4. The town or sewer commission shall collect all entry charges and shall pay to the university the proportion of the sewer entry fee due to the university upon application by any property owner for entrance to the sewerage system.

5. The town or commission shall make out all agreements on forms mutually agreed upon between the town or commission and the university, and shall make or supervise the actual connection between the town main and the property to be connected.

The question of connection with the university mains in other sections of the town must be given consideration at such time as it can be clearly shown that the sewage disposal plant of the university and its main lines are adequate to handle properly such additional sewage as the Town of Durham may expect to dispose of through university mains. Nothing in this agreeement which, of course, is subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees, obligates the University of New Hampshire in any manner whatsoever to accept future town mains for connection to the university system and the disposal of sewage resulting therefrom.

PUBLIC LAWS OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Commission Report 1925 (This is a compilation, revision, codification, and amendment of many previous laws)

Снар. 96

3. Construction

The mayor and aldermen of any city may construct and maintain all main drains or common sewers which they adjudge necessary for the public convenience and health. Such drains and sewers shall be substantially constructed of brick, stone, cement or other material adapted to the purpose and shall be the property of the city.

4. Taking Land

Whenever it is necessary to construct main sewers, or common sewers across the land of any person, the mayor and aldermen may lay out a sufficient quantity of such land for the purpose, and assess the owner's damage in the same manner as in the case of taking lands for highways, and the owner shall have the same right of appeal, with same procedure.

5. Levying

The mayor and aldermen may assess upon the persons whose drains enter such main drains or common sewers, or whose lands receive special benefit therefrom in any way, their just share of the expense of construction and maintenance of same.

5A Amendment to this Levying 1933 N. H. P. S. Chap. 98

Sewer Rentals—For the defraying of the cost of construction, payment of the interest on any debt incurred, management, maintenance, operation and repair of newly constructed sewer systems, including newly constructed treatment and disposal works, the mayor and aldermen may establish a scale of rents to be called sewer rents, and to prescribe the manner in which and the time at which such sewer rents

are to be paid and to change such scale from time to time as may be deemed advisable. Such rents may be based upon either the metered consumption of water on premises connected with the sewer system, making due allowance for commercial use of water, the number and kind of plumbing fixtures connected with the sewer system or the number of persons served by said sewer system, or upon any other equitable basis.

5B (Another amendment to same section)

Sewer Funds—The funds received from collection of sewer rentals shall be kept as a separate and distinct fund and shall be known as the sewer fund. Any surplus in such fund may be used for the enlargement or replacement of the sewerage system or the sewage disposal works, but shall not be used for the extension of sewage system to serve unsewered areas or for any purpose other than those above specified.

Lien Amended in Chap. 98 of N.H.P.S. to read as follows:

All assessments under the Provisions of sections 5a and 5b shall create a lien upon the lands on account of which they are made, which shall continue for one year after notice of the assessment is given to the owner of the land, and in case an appeal has been taken and the assessment has been sustained in whole or in part upon such appeal, until the expiration of one year from such decision.

7. Collection

They shall be committeed to the collector of taxes, with a warrant under the hand and seal of the mayor and aldermen requiring him to collect them; and he shall have the same rights and remedies and be subject to the same liabilities in relation thereto as in the collection of resident taxes.

8. Abatement

For good cause shown, the mayor and aldermen may abate any such assessment made by them or by their predecessors.

9. Petition to Court

If they neglect or refuse to do so any person aggrieved may apply by petition to the superior court for relief at any time within ninety days after notice of the assessment, and not afterwards; and the court shall make such order thereon as justice may require.

10. Correction

If any error is made in any such assessment it may be corrected by the mayor and aldermen by making an abatement and a new assessment, or either, as the case may require; and the same lien, rights, liabilities and remedies shall attach to the new attachment as to the original.

11. Installments (as amended in 1933 now reads as follows:)

The mayor and aldermen of any city may, in their discretion, in making any assessment under this chapter, assess the same to be paid in annual installments extending over a period not exceeding twenty years, and in such case their assessment so made shall create a lien upon the land on account of which it is made, and the lien of each installment so assessed shall continue from one year from June first of the year such installment became due.

12. Assessment not Required

Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent any city from providing by ordinance or otherwise, that the whole or a part of the expense of constructing, maintaining and repairing of common sewers shall be paid by such city.

SEWER COMMISSION

13. Establishment, Duties

Any town or village district which adopts the provisions of this chapter may, at the time of such adoption or afterwards, vote to establish a board of sewer commissioners, consisting of three members, which board shall perform all the

duties and possess all the powers in the town or district otherwise hereby conferred upon the selectmen.

14. Election

At the annual town or district meeting when such board is established, there shall be chosen, by ballot and by major vote, three sewer commissioners, to hold office for three years, two years, and one year respectively, and thereafter at every annual meeting, one commissioner shall be chosen to hold office for three years; provided, that such election shall be by plurality vote in towns or districts which, under existing laws, elect officers in that manner.

15 Vacancies

Vacancies in the board, whether from failure to elect or otherwise shall be filled in towns by the selectmen of the town, and in village districts by the commissioners of the district. Any member of the board so chosen to fill a vacancy shall hold office until the next annual meeting.

16. Compensation

The compensation of such sewer commissioners shall be fixed in towns by selectmen, and in village districts by the commissioners of the district.

Miscellaneous Provisions

17. Entering without a Permit

Any person who digs or breaks up the ground in any street, highway lane or alley in any city, for the purpose of laying, altering, repairing or entering any main drain or common sewer therein without permission from the mayor and aldermen, shall forfeit \$5.00 for each offense.

18. Application of Chapter

The provisions of this chapter shall be in force in such towns, districts and villages as may adopt the same; and the selectmen shall perform all the duties and possess all powers in the town or the district as the case may be, conferred by this chapter upon the mayor and aldermen, and the rights of all parties interested shall be settled in the same way.

- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1937 - 1938

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I take pleasure in presenting my tenth annual report The statistics given are for the school year ending June 1938, with the enrollment added for 1938-39.

This year one change was made in our regular teaching staff. Miss Annie Hammond, after many years of faithful service, went to a larger field of effort in Laconia. Miss Beatrice Gerrish, who had served her apprenticeship and proved her worth in Madbury, was elected to succeed Miss Hammond. Mrs. Elsie Fisher, after a leave of absence, returned to Packer's Falls school. Miss Esther B. Coombs was selected as supervisor of music, succeeding Mr. George Wilson who went to a similar position in Dover. Mrs. Dorothy Kavanaugh Pratt, R. N., continues as school nurse and her report follows.

Last June the eighth grade pupils were given the Standard Graduation tests and the same type of test will probably be given this year. As stated before, these tests do not set a standard for graduation but are helpful in determining promotion. The Metropolitan Achievement tests are being given again and their results compared with similar tests of last year. These tests are being found to be reliable guides of pupil progress.

Eleven or twelve pupils will probably graduate from high school in June and thirty-four or five enter next year. At present there are 63 attending Dover High School and 4 attending Newmarket High School. Six pupils are attending the elementary grades in Newmarket with their tuition being paid by the Durham School District. The increased enrollment in high school will undoubtedly mean an increase in transportation costs, besides an increase of about

\$2500 in high school tuition. This increase will probably continue for the next few years.

Last June the Parent-Teacher Association furnished a picnic for the pupils. The Lion's Club presented the school with a Constitutional Shrine and this fall furnished saftey belts and hats for the school traffic patrol and will again finance a Dental Clinic. The American Association of University Women have given exhibition material for a museum and the Garden Club, through Mrs. Leon Batchelder, have contributed the Nature Magazine, several books and have also put on assembly programs.

It is pleasing to the authorities that these associations are so willing to help with time and money, as there are many things of value to a school which have to be denied by the authorities because of a budget which lacks elasticty.

One of the chemical toilets at Packer's Falls school has worn out and been replaced by a modern septic tank. The other toilet is likely to give way soon, but is still in good working order.

The grading at the new school has given us good lawns and a parking space but more grading is needed to make acceptable and safe playgrounds.

The teachers and superintendent felt a personal loss in the passing of Mr. Harold Ham, Chairman of the School Board. He always had on his heart and mind the best interests of the school and was constantly studying how things might be made better.

Our grateful acknowledgment is made for the support given to the teachers and superintendent by the school board.

WHY SCHOOLS COST MORE

The public schools belong to the people and they have a right to know what the schools are trying to do, how well the job is being done and what it costs. This last, because of the unusual economic conditions in recent years, has become an acute issue. There are always some people who think that school expenditures are excessive. This is written therefore to help them understand the reasons.

*The first year when national statistics were available was in 1870. In that year the cost of the public schools in this country was, in round numbers, 63 million dollars. In 1930 it was nearly 2317 million dollars, an increase of 2253 million dollars or almost 37 times as much. With the exception of four years from 1876 to 1880 and the same length of time from 1930 to 1934 the increase has been steady. Between 1930 and 1934 expenditures fell off 26 per cent. The trend is now again upward. About half the ground lost between 1930-1934 has now been recovered. It is expected that for some years to come that the costs will continue upward. What are the important factors that account for this trend.

- *F. W. Hubbard—Associate Director N. E. A. in Secondary Education.
- 1. The purchasing power of the school dollar has declined just as any individual's dollar has declined. Its ability to purchase goods and services has constantly changed and is changing. It is necessary in some years to spend a larger sum than in other years for the goods and services needed for the operation of the schools. A study made by the author already quoted shows that about 55 per cent of the increase between 1914 and 1930 was caused by the rising prices of goods and services, or to put it the other way, due to the decrease of the school dollar in purchasing power.
- 2. The number of children to be educated increased steadily between 1914 and 1930. Terms of school were consistently lengthened, attendance laws in all states were streng-

thened and better still, enforced. This period also witnessed the rapid growth of the public high school. New high schools established during this period averaged better than one a day.** In 1890 less than 4% of the children of high school age were in school. Now over 60% are in school.

3. Higher standards of education rapidly rose as we moved forward into the post war period of science and power. Statistics cannot measure these higher standards but they cannot be introduced or maintained without costing money.
