

Warrant for Town Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fremont Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday the Eleventh day of day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. On Petition of 10 Legal Voters:

To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question, "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? (This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00).

3. On Petition of 10 Legal Voters:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand nine hundred thirty-five dollars and seventy cents (\$1,935.70) to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private non-profit organization, to continue to provide counseling services for individuals and families of Fremont. This \$1,935.70 represents the prorated uncollected amount for services already rendered last year to 19 residents for a total of 127 hour sessions.

4. On Petition of 17 Legal Voters:

To see if the Town will vote to erect a mercury (white) flood light from the top of a telephone pole opposite the 1800 Meeting House for the purpose of illuminating the exterior of the building to help safeguard it from potential vandalism.

(Budget item 21 - \$120.00)

5. On Petition of 10 Legal Voters:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for Seacoast Mental Health Center.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand seven hundred ten dollars (\$1,710.00) for the support of The Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham

County Community Action Program, Inc., a private non-profit, anti-poverty agency.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,600.00) for the support of the Newmarket Health Center.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate th sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the support of The Exeter Mediation Program.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand nine hundred sixty-three dollars (\$1,963.00) for the support of the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand fifty-six dollars (\$1,056.00) for the support of the Rockingham Planning Commission. This is a Voluntary Association of Communities in Rockingham County and used as a source of information for the Planning Board.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for use by the Planning Board for additional professional planning and supplies raised in Article 7, 1985.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the sealing of roads.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) as their share of the budgeted 1986 cost associated with the Southeastern Rockingham County Sanitary/Solid Waste Management District (SERCSSMD) as required under NH RSA 149M.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Police Cruiser.

Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund
(Article 6, 1984 and Article 10, 1985) \$2,500.00

15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the STate and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

Riverside Drive Area Fire Station
Added to Capital Reserve Fund (Article 7, 1982) . . \$5,000.00
General Government Buildings 828.00
\$5,828.00

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the Police Cruiser (Article 6, 1984) the amount of \$7,106.00 to be used to purchase a Police Cruiser.

17A. To see if they will vote to amend the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund established for the Scribner Road Bridge railing at Turner's Pond under Article 17, 1985 to include guard railings at Bogs Bridge, Sandown Road.

(2/3 Vote Required)

17B. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the Scribner Road Bridge Railing at Turner's Pond under Article 17, 1985, as amended by Article 17A, 1986, the amount of Nine thousand five hundred dollars (\$9,500.00) for the purpose of repair of guard railings on the Scribner Road and Bogs Bridge.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the Library (Article 6, 1979 and as amended by Article 3, 1982) the amount of Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be used for alterations of the present Library.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to number the houses in the Town.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

20. To see if the Town will vote to establish in accordance with the provision of RSA 35 a Capital Reserve Fund for Town Hall Improvements and to raise and appropriate for this fund the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00)

21. To see if the Town will vote to establish in accordance with RSA 35 a Capital Reserve Fund for complete re-valuation of all property in the Town; and to raise and appropriate for this fund the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00); and to authorize the Selectmen to expend the principal and accrued interest from this fund to pay all or a portion of the expense of such re-valuation.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) to purchase a Sander for the Town of Fremont Highway Department.

23. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the Town deems necessary.

24. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the

25. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the paved section of a certain street named Midnight Sun Drive located in the Shannon Estates II Development from Applevale, Inc. the present owner. The requested road to be accepted is approximately 2,223 feet in length.

26. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the paved section of a certain street named Pulaski Drive located in the Shannon Estates II Development from Applevale, Inc. the present owner. The requested street to be accepted is approximately 680 feet in length.

27. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the paved sections of certain streets named Barrell Run Road, Vetter Drive, Wildwood Drive and Cooperage Court as shown on a plan entitled "A Survey and Plat of a Re-Subdivision to be known as Leavitt Road Estates - Section One; Section Two; Section Three; Section Four; Section Five; and Section Six; owned by StoneyBrook Development Corp. and situated in Fremont, N.H. "dated January 26, 1979 and revised: July 6, 1979 and recorded in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds as Plan #D-8922.

28. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the paved section of a certain street named, "Poplin Drive", located in Poplin Acres Development from Charles K. and Louise M. Rowe, the present owners. The requested road to be accepted is approximately 2400 feet in length.

29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the "Green Area" in the Leavitt Road Estates Sub-division known as Lot 6-11-1-45 containing 7.536 acres; Lot 6-11-1-46 containing 1.057 acres; Lot 6-11-1-61 containing 5.224 acres and Lot 6-11-1-62 containing 6.928 acres.

30. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Fremont and the State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan.

31. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to adopt written guidelines relative to general assistance for the Town as required by RSA 165:1 II.

32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board, pursuant to RSA 674:43 I, to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses or for multi-family dwelling units. It shall be the duty of the Town Clerk, pursuant to RSA certificate of notice in the Rockingham County Register of Deeds authorized and giving the date of such authorization the Planning Board has been so authorized and giving the date of such authorization.

33. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless any employee, Board Member or Officer of the Town for loss or damage to him while acting within the scope of his employment, all as provided in RSA 31:105.

34. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds at Public Auction.

35. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to RSA 31:95-b.

37. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

NOTE: In accordance with RSA 39:2A adopted at the March Town Meeting of 1972 the FIRST Session of the Town Meeting for the choice of Town Officers for the ensuing year will open on March 11, 1986 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 7:00 in the evening.

Selectmen's Report

To the Residents of Fremont:

Considering the dramatic increase in Fremont's growth rate and the many problems that are associated with rapid growth, the Selectmen feel that Fremont really has been quite fortunate.

The basic reason Fremont is weathering stormy growth so well is the existence of the many volunteer groups in town which are made up of very dedicated, well meaning individuals. Some groups such as the Planning Board have had to deal with a great increase in the work load.

One of our newer organizations, the Fremont Volunteer Rescue Squad has provided residents with a wonderful, much needed service and they have done this with such a tiny budget. What a bargain!

The Fire Department, of course, continues to provide a protective service to Fremont that cannot be measured in dollars. The many others that are not specifically mentioned are not forgotten and the Selectmen are indeed grateful for all they do to make Fremont a better place to live.

As residents of the Town, you may have noted that legal expenses have risen sharply primarily because of litigation pending against the Town. The Selectmen feel that an explanation of the majority of the legal expenditures is appropriate at this time. The following is a brief summary of the **Johnson v Fremont** litigation submitted by David R. Connell, Town Attorney:

Much time and expense has been devoted to the lawsuit started by Police Chief Johnson in Superior Court against the Town and the Selectmen in January 1985. In this case, Chief Johnson requests the court to order the Selectmen not to interfere with the Police Department. In June, after a hearing requested by Chief Johnson, which covered several hours, the court denied a temporary injunction against the Town and Selectmen. The Selectmen, in response, have requested the court to rule that the Board of Selectmen is entitled to require that the Police Chief at least discuss police matters with the Selectmen once a month; provide a summary of department activities periodically; provide enough payroll information to allow the Selectmen to meet statutory duties as to payment of wages; provide an inventory of Town property in the possession of officers; and provide written procedures for operation of the department. The Selectmen believe that this represents the minimum cooperation necessary

to allow them to perform their duties. No final decision has been reached, and the case is still pending on the court docket.

Fire Department Report

To the Residents of Fremont:

The fiscal year 1985 has shown a marked increase in the amount of structure fires of a serious nature, a tentative loss value in excess of \$100,000.00. For a small Town that is a lot of valuation. To say nothing of the inconvenience we all feel in the loss of Vining's Market. We hope he will soon be back in business.

The Department has benefited by several members and we will still welcome more people who can give a few hours a week for this cause.

Training is still a problem. We just can't find a night that is convenient for everybody or the weather does not cooperate or there is a good ball game on television. However, we are still working on this problem and hope to have a solution soon.

Our new Engine had serious mechanical problems last February due to an improper control system on the transmission causing a very expensive repair. The equipment manufacturer blamed the truck manufacturer, the truck manufacturer blamed the transmission company and back and forth. However, after many hours of letter writing and telephone calls, the transmission company did come up with a check for part of the cost of the repairs. We are thankful for this even though it was the fault of the apparatus manufacturer who failed to follow instruction put out by the transmission company. (We got back \$2,700.00 towards the cost of repairs and the modification to correct the problem).

The Fire Department is still bothered by people failing to get fire permits before burning on their property. Failing to obtain a permit can result in a fire. PLEASE CONTACT ANY OF THE FIRE WARDENS LISTED IN THE FRONT OF THIS TOWN REPORT FOR A PERMIT TO BURN.

It must also be noted that anyone installing a new oil fired heating system must **first** obtain a permit to install, listing the make, model and type of system with location of fuel tank given before the system is installed. Then and only when will an Inspection be made of the Installed unit before it is used. For any questions on Oil Fired Equipment call Captian Lloyd Metivier after 6:00 pm at 895-2942.

I would like to call your attention to the Building Code Article V-Section 4 regarding chimneys. It states Chimneys shall be construction of stone, brick or cement to the ground, shall be lined with tile and extend at least two (2) feet above the roof to which it belongs, and shall have clean-out openings at the base. No smoke-pipe shall be allowed to pass through

floors or partitions separating rooms, and all entrances to chimneys shall be fire proof construction. We see people using metal chimneys. You better check with your Insurance Companies to see if your Insurance Policy covers this type of chimney.

This year has been a banner year for new home construction. If you are a new home owner and have any problems or need advise, please feel free to call me at 895-2561 during working hours or the dispatch center at night and weekends.

The Fire Department started a new policy of duty officers on call from 6:00 a.m. Friday until 6:00 a.m. Monday to take some of the load off the Deputy's and the Chief. It seems to be working quite well.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Officers and men of the Department for their devotion to duty and the Department. When it is 3:00 a.m. in the morning or just sitting down to supper and the Tones and siren goes off they are on their way. Thanks again.

Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulations is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law

may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

Police Department Report - 1985

During the year 1985, the Fremont Police Department experienced many setbacks, beginning with the shortage of police officers. With the non appointments of three regular police officers in March, this Department was operating with only a skeleton force. The police cruiser was destroyed by fire in February 1985, which was not replaced until six months later. This condition created a hardship for the remaining officers who had to double their work load, which resulted in a frustrated and tired department. As of this date the police cruiser has been replaced, one officer reinstated, and a new officer hired. As this Town's population increases, the demands on the Department increase daily. The need for at least four additional part time officers is essential for the safety and protection of residents of Fremont.

All police officers completed the New Hampshire police standards certification with hand guns in 1985. The Department has schooling and training available this year in radar certification, domestic violence, accident, and DWI investigation.

In closing, I would like to thank first of all the residents of Fremont for their patience and assistance, the officers for an outstanding extra effort and dedication to the Town and this Department, and last but not most important, Deputy Police Chief, Gordon Copp for more than twenty years of dedicated and reliable service.

Report of the Newmarket Regional Health Center

The Newmarket Regional Health Center will complete its fifteenth year of service in the Spring of 1986. The Newmarket Regional Health Center operates two medical offices, one in Newmarket and the other in Raymond, the Lamprey River Clinic. Both facilities provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services and short-term counseling with referral to area mental health agencies.

In January the new facility of the Lamprey River Clinic opened on Route 27 in Raymond. The new 6,200 sq. ft. facility will allow the Health Center to provide more services in a spacious and modern facility to the residents of the Raymond area. The renovation and expansion of the Newmarket center is scheduled to begin in the Spring of 1986.

In 1985, Edward Benoit, M.D., a family practitioner, joined the staff as did Cynthia Rasmussen, M.D., an obstetrician/gynecologist. Other members of the medical staff include Sarah Oxanrd, M.D., Karen Brainard, M.D., Michael Lewis, PA-C., Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P. and Anne Fawcett, A.R.N.P. The medical team also includes registered nurses, medical assistants, and community health workers. The Health Center is affiliated with the Exeter Hospital where patients needing hospital care are admitted.

The Health Center offers a Prenatal Program under the direction of Dr. Rasmussen, which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care. In addition, the Health Center offers nutritional counseling and prenatal classes.

The community health workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaisons between medical providers and patients.

The Newmarket Regional Health Center also operates a Self-Care Program for the Elderly in conjunction with the Occupational Therapy Department of the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this program is to enable the elderly to stay in their home setting as well as to maintain a quality of life and independent status within their community. The focus of the program is to provide self-care skills before disability occurs and to anticipate problems with functional activities. The Newmarket Regional Health Center continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. Three of the five buses are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. The transportation service enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the means to needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. To see if the District will vote, under the provisions of RSA 198:20-b to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the 1985-1986 school fiscal year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

Mr. Robert Waddell moved that the District vote under the provisions of RSA 198:20-b to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the 1985-1986 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

Mr. Robert Norris seconded the motion. Passed by voice vote.

Article III

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) for the purpose of financing special education, said amount to be a deficit appropriation.

Mr. Robert Wines moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000 for the purpose of financing special education, said amount to be a deficit appropriation.

Seconded by Mr. Norris. After Mr. Wines explained explained how a deficit appropriation came about, the motion was passed by voice vote.

Article IV

To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District official and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Mr. Robert Wines moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$880,724 for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

School Board's Budget - \$889,724.

Budget Committee's Budget - \$889,724.

(Both of the above figures include the \$18,000 deficit article.)

Seconded by Robert Waddell.

Mr. Ronald Scott moved to consider the budget line by line.

Seconded by Steven Menard.

The Moderator read the budget line by line and all items in question were explained by the School Board. It was noted that the increase in Regular Programs consisted of teachers salaries and tuitions, and it was pointed out that the total fixed items increased less than .7 of 1%.

Mrs. Mary Stiner gave names and phone numbers of members of the Legislature who could be contacted in reference to obtaining more money from the Government for Special Education to alleviate the burden placed on the individual Districts.

Discussion ended, the Moderator called for the vote. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article V

To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Robert Norris moved to adjourn. Seconded by Mr. Robert Waddell. Motion passed by voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 8:44 p.m.

Principal's Report

Many changes have taken place at Ellis School since last June. Not only is there a new principal, seven out of twelve full-time faculty members are also new to the school. This change in personnel has resulted in a healthy mix of skill and experience. There are first year teachers, teachers with several years of experience, and teachers with many years of experience. This situation has created an environment that enables the whole faculty to grow. New teachers learn skills from those who are more experienced, but new teachers also contribute the latest ideas from centers of learning.

Computer use has increased because of new hardware and more teacher involvement. While teachers are using computers more to create instructional materials, students are also using computers more to do learning activities. In fact, all academic programs have been strengthened with the help of recently adopted curricula for grades one through eight.

In grades six through eight, a very strong effort has been made to introduce middle school educational approaches. The teachers are free to manipulate the academic schedule in order to provide optimum learning conditions. An Enrichment Program has been introduced which frees

students from the more rigorous classroom atmosphere but which nevertheless results in social and intellectual growth. It also provides the students with some personal choice as to what their own educational programs will be. We also attempt to combine clearly defined academic and behavioral standards with a friendly, supportive attitude toward students and their individual needs.

The basketball teams have realized their greatest success in years. Both the girls' and boys' teams have excellent records. The boys had a perfect season and won their league championship.

Space allocations have also been altered in the building. The Chapter I teacher and the lower grades resource room teacher now have their own, albeit small, rooms. Unfortunately, all of the space changes have not been positive. The main office has been reduced to half of its former size, and the already limited library has been squeezed into the lost office space. The guidance counselor and the Director of Special Education work out of what was formerly a small corridor. Projected enrollment figures indicate the lack of space will become more acute.

However, this report does not end on a negative note. On the contrary, 1985-1986 has been an excellent year at Ellis School. Furthermore, we believe the town of Fremont possesses special attributes that guarantee things will be getting even better. The student body are decent children who respect adults and who really want to learn. The faculty are able, committed professionals. There is excellent communication between the school board and the faculty, a fact that is reflected in high staff morale. The school board is dedicated to promoting high quality education while exercising fiscal restraint. But most important, the community of Fremont support their school. Individuals are willing to give of their time to participate in school activities. The Playground Committee, with community help, is donating a terrific facility to the school, and the PTA gives generously of time and resources to help school programs. With these assets, an already good school can only get better.

In closing, we thank all of you who have done so much to help Ellis School this year.
