Town Warrant

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, New Hampshire, in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not earlier than 6:00 P.M.

The remainder of the warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 15, 1980 at 10:00 A.M.

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be put into the Capital Reserve Fund for a new Fire Truck and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,650.00 for the purchase of two fireproof four drawer legal size Code C file cabinets to be used by the Town Clerk and the Tax Collector and authorize the withdrawal of the appropriation from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,700.00 for an additional full time Police Officer.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for a 1980 Volkswagen Rabbit and to sell the present 1979 Buick Cruiser for a sum no less than \$4,500.00.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of the Dana Hill Railroad Bridge from the New Hampshire Transportation Authority with provision that Article 7 is approved for the reconstruction thereof.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of

\$80,000.00 for the construction of the Dana Hill Railroad Bridge, and to further authorize and empower the Selectmen to issue serial notes or bonds in the name and on the credit of the Town and to fix the time and place of payment, the rate of interest terms and maturities and provide for the sale thereof for a period not exceeding ten years and to further authorize and empower the Selectmen to perform all other acts necessary to accomplish the raising of the sum not to exceed \$80,000.00, all in accordance with N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955 Chapter 33, known as the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments applied thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of two Town bridges (1) on Blake Hill Road over Prescott Brook No. 031-032 (2) on Blake Hill Road over Blake Brook No. 66-061 and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (By Request)

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission in accordance with RSA 36:a to apply for, receive and expend land and water Conservation Funds for the acquisition of 5 acres more or less of land with 2,000' of water frontage on Pemigewasset Lake outlet for Conservation purposes at no cost to the Town.

10. To see if the Town will vote to support the Conservation Commission's effort to determine and map wetlands of the Town as mandated by RSA 36A:2, to report at a future Town Meeting a wetlands ordinance which will provide for maintenance of ground water tables, protecting from flooding, wildlife habitat, recreation and other purposes.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and repair of Highway and Bridges.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000.00 for the purchase of a one ton dump truck with plow and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (By Request)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,194.39 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$7,962.61 making a total of \$9,157.00 in joint funds.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,691.45 for Regional Associations: N.A.N.A. \$4,000.00; Bristol Community

Center \$817.00; Community Action Program \$827.45; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$872.00; Lakes Region Family Service \$175.00.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Lakes Region Hospital, The Franklin Regional Hospital, The Sceva Speare Hospital, and the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for patriotic purposes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure for improvements to West Shore Road, Winona Lake and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as its share of the cost provided the Winona Improvement Association contributes \$1,000.00 as its share of the cost. Said improvements to be made by private contractors under the supervision of the Selectmen. (By Petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditures for improvements and maintenance necessary to provide year round access to Seminole Avenue, Waukewan and raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 as its share of the cost provided the Seminole Avenue Association contributes \$800.00 as its share of the cost. Said improvements to be made by private contractors under the supervision of the Selectmen. (By Petition)

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State funds which may be made available during 1980. Further, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal or State regulations.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds as justice may be.

23. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a section of Blake Hill Road, beginning at the Sanbornton town line and proceeding northerly a distance of 400 feet with the stipulation that it could be used for any

emergency traffic.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the establishment of water holes for fire protection.

25. To see if the Town will hear reports of the Committees: (1) to review space needs of the New Hampton Town office; (2) the study committee on schools, and to continue with the present committees in their investigation.

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the tax collector to accept the prepayment of property taxes.

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

New Hampton Police Department

1979 Annual Report

The Police Department has experienced many new problems this past year and expects even greater difficulties as we enter the Eighties. The number one budget inflater is energy costs; both direct costs and hidden costs. The new '79 Buick cruiser operates at a higher per mile efficiency than any of the other vehicles the department has operated. With costs of operation continually rising, we will have to go to a more efficient vehicle when this one is replaced. Another phase in the total operation of the department with many changes is the Laconia District Court. The Court now has a full-time judge and now schedules cases throughout the day. Complaints are now required to be entered with the court prior to the court date which all means more time and travel spent going to court. Also the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council is working on new requirements and training for part-time officers. As a result many part-time officers may drop out of police work because of the great amount of time involved in training for the small amount of time they work for a department.

Burglary increased with 14 burglaries to seasonal homes, 5 burglaries to year round homes and 6 burglaries to businesses. There were 25 thefts reported. Motor vehicle violations increased over past years with the Laconia District Court levying \$7,600.00 in fines from New Hampton police cases. The dispatch center recorded 1830 telephone calls and complaints to the department. There was one motor vehicle accident fatality in 1979 on the highways of New Hampton.

The work load for the police department was the heaviest ever this past year and this is the reason for the addition of a second full-time officer which the department is requesting in its 1980 budget.

Once again I thank you for your cooperation and support.

New Hampton Fire Department Report

1979

The New Hampton Fire Fighters would like to thank the New Hampton residents for their cooperation in fire control and prevention. The town of New Hampton has had relatively few fires caused by the residents and due to this, we have been able to replace some of our worn out gear and equipment which we thought was necessary; plus a substantial payment being made on two or more 110 watt four channel truck radios.

We are proud of our response time and our time of arrival at the scene. Some of our response times have been less than one minute and our on the scene time has been two minutes or less. I attribute this to the diligence of our members and the excellent alerting and communications system we have. However, traveling five to seven miles in the wrong direction on Route 93, to find that the scene is four to five miles in the other direction, due to inept reporting, makes our on the scene time average higher than it should be.

The Department had forty six calls, thirty five in New Hampton, and eleven Mutual Aid. The breakdown is: structural 5, brush 7, automobile 10, medical aid 3, chimney 8, town dump 2, mutual aid cover truck 4, false alarm 2, miscellaneous 4, with one permit to burn not reported to dispatch in time to prevent a call.

The average response time was 3.2 and the average on the scene time was 9.0.

The Fire Department has operated with the same operating budget and pay scale for the past three years. Due to the increase in operating cost, I feel justified in requesting an increase in the budget for the fire fighters hourly pay to help cover the increased expense of answering fire calls.

The men's and women's Muster teams had a very successful summer with the men's team entering 5 musters to come home with 6 trophies. The women's team entered 4 musters to win 10 trophies.

The New Hampton muster teams are planning to host a muster this summer on June 29th.

Forest Fire Report

Report Of Forest Fire Warden
And State Forest Fire Service
New Hampton

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town-city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town-city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municiple forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town-city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

The New Hampton Rescue Squad responded to several medical emergencies including two possible heart attacks, one child hit by a car, and several car accidents. Several emergencies were handled on a personal basis.

Kathy Webb received her National EMT-A Certification and Robert Twining and Chester Frame completed their requirements for recertification. Bob Twining, Chet Frame and Janyce Chase completed Instructor's training for Red Cross and AHA CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation). Two CPR courses were taught in the Fall. One more course is being planned for the Spring. Janyce Chase and Chet Frame completed the Red Cross Advanced and Standard First Aid Instructor course. More than 325 hours were spent in training this year.

We purchased one new Robert Shaw Oxygen System for heart attacks and other emergencies, and four trauma kits with bandaging and splinting materials.

Highway Department 1979

The 1979 TRA and Additional Highway Subsidy Funds were expended to complete the reconstruction of a third section of the Old Bristol Road, thus finishing approximately 6,000 feet of road. Plans are presently being formed to use these same funds for the reconstruction of Edgerly Hill on the Straits Road. The abutting land owners are being consulted for the easements and lands necessary to proceed with this reconstruction and relocation project.

The Highway Department's new Ford Diesel L-8000 arrived in October and seems to be functioning well. On an average day of trucking it consumes 15-18 gallons of fuel while the 1975 Ford burns 50-60 gallons of gas. The heavier GUV capacity also seems to be a plus in that the truck handles its load very easily.

During November the department received and installed its new radios and have found them to be extremely valuable. Often the crew is spread throughout the town and now it is a simple and time saving matter to relocate the men and assign additional tasks as they develop, or to coordinate work during a storm.

At the time of this writing, mother nature is still being kind to us all, except the skiers, and should winter continue to be mild the savings to the highway department will give us a much needed chance to catch up with some ditching, culvert work, brush removal, etc.

As we look to the future, we find more people resettling old homesteads and also many new constructions. Funds are going to be necessary to upgrade and maintain access to these areas. By next winter each and every town road will require year round maintenance with the exception of Jackson Pond Road, and this may possibly require year round care soon. Progress!

ANNUAL REPORT

First the good news. The Conservation Commission has not asked the town for its usual \$500 appropriation this year. Per Dr. Walsh's budget report below and anticipation of substantial revenues from the forest management program on the town conservation area, any request for additional town moneys was deemed unnecessary.

Aaron Jaffa has had numerous meetings and hiked miles with state and local foresters through the town park and reports the District Forester, Bud Nelson, is now marking trees for the first cutting. A more detailed report will be available at town meeting. The foresters are very enthusiastic about the property's potential as a text-book forest management program and will consider seminars for amateur and professional foresters on the site.

Three possible development programs for a beach are being explored by Lillian McCrelis and reports will also be available at town meeting. Lil reports it's amazing how warm one can feel while standing at Pemi Lake with wind chill factor at -40 and thinking "beach." A public meeting will be held in spring with representatives of town organizations to hear ideas for development of the recreation area.

And the bad...and let's hope it is just a misunderstanding of the term public property...it's been reported some townspeople have been removing stones, trees, etc. from the conservation area. We encourage usage of the area for walking, birding, recreation, but ask that you leave everything as you find it.

Meetings of the commission are open and we invite you to participate. Meetings are posted or announced in the local papers.

New Hampton Planning Board

1979 REPORT

The regular scheduled meeting of the New Hampton Planning Board is held on the third Monday of each month in the selectmen's office at the Gordon Nash Library. Board members are John Conkling, Walter Landry, Chester Butcher, Joyce Marinace, Aaron Jaffa, Herman Chase, and William Clement representing the selectmen. Alternates to the Board are Donald Morrill and Lucy Stephenson. Acting secretary is Karen Curtis.

It has been a very exciting year as the Board approved five lots which are a portion of a 175 acre tract of land being developed by Trapper Brown Corporation, Plymouth, N.H., for a proposed industrial park on Route 3B. The Board approved a total of 24 lots for subdivision involving 174 acres of land. The Board also approved a resubdivision of Smoke Rise Development which ironed out some discrepancies of the original plan.

The Board scheduled many special meetings to work on the final drafts of the proposed New Hampton Zoning ordinance which was voted on at the 1979 Town Meeting and was voted down by fewer than 25 votes. The Board reviewed the ordinance again in the fall and made a few changes. The first public hearing was held on December 10, 1979 and the second public hearing was held on January 21, 1980. The Planning Board has worked on a zoning ordinance for the past five years and believes that it has developed a good basic document and 1980 is the year to adopt this ordinance so come to the annual town meeting on March 11, 1980 and make your vote count.

All Planning Board meetings are open to the public and we cordially invite you to attend.

Lakes Region Planning Commission Report

In September of 1978 the Lakes Region Planning Commission adopted a policy listing the types of basic services or local community assistance which the Commission staff may respond to in a timely manner, involving normally not more than two work days.

Requests are generally made by telephone or letter and are handled on a time available basis. No formal procedure for scheduling local assistance activities is currently necessary. Basic services that can be provided to a community include, but are not necessarily limited to:

1. Telephone inquiries that can be answered over the phone.
2. Transmittal of copies of reports, statistics, population information or other readily available or attainable data.
3. Typing and printing of local ordinances and regulations (100 copies).
4. Preparation of maps or graphics for meetings or presentations.
5. Periodic update of municipal base maps.
6. Periodic update of municipal zoning maps.
7. Adaptation of model ordinances.
8. Provision of copies of base maps for municipal use, in reasonable quantities.
9. Preparation of minor amendments to zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations.
10. Preparation of model legal notices pertaining to public hearings, such as on zoning and subdivision amendments.
11. Evaluation of and preparation of recommendations for "problem" subdivisions or site plan proposals.
12. Periodic staff presentations of regional plan elements (land use, housing, transportation, solid waste) to municipal boards and officials.
13. Staff assistance at local municipal boards and officials meetings, on request and by appointment, to render service on a particular problem.
14. Meetings during Commission office hours with local officials.
15. Assistance regarding interpretation of National Flood Insurance Program regulations.
16. Distribution of announcements pertaining to law lectures and other municipal-type seminars.
17. Information pertaining to requirements of planning enabling legislation.
18. Notification of new and amended State and Federal regulations.
19. Announcements of new Federal grant-in-aid programs.
20. Staff consultation or Commission sponsored workshops on Federal application procedures.
21. Search of State and Federal aid programs.
22. Guest Speaker (service clubs, schools, private organizations, etc.).

Report Of Committee To Recommend Town Office Center

January 31, 1980

Since submitting its report last summer, the Committee has been inactive. However, it was recently requested to further investigate the possibility of using the old town barn and school house.

In our opinion, the two building complex could be adapted for use as town offices either together with a connecting annex or individually as funds became available.

There is ample room for parking, provided some excavation is done in the vicinity of the former site of the highway sand stock pile. With remodelling and proper landscaping, the building(s) could be quite attractive and an asset to the town.

The foundation seems sound, there is an existing cement slab in a portion of the garage building and also the beginnings of a heating system.

Mr. Jaffa has obtained a copy of the deed and there is no question about the town having unlimited use of that building. We have also been in contact with a builder and an architect for obtaining cost estimates for a proposed layout. That information will be provided as soon as it becomes available.

Community Action Program

Meredith Area C.A.P. Outreach Office

Annual Report

The Meredith Area Center has continued to provide comprehensive services to your Community during 1979. We have grown from an outreach office to an Area Center allowing for programs to be directed at the Meredith location with more full-time staff available to residents on a continuing basis. We are continually revising our programs to meet the needs of our low income and elderly families.

Information and Referral

A service which is available to all, information and referral provides information on social services, employment, child care, consumer education, health, nutrition and housing. When appropriate, referrals are made to other agencies who can provide direct help in meeting specific needs. We have serviced 210 individual people this year with \$79,542.39 being received in New Hampton for all types of assistance.

Energy Crisis Assistance Program (ECAP)

This was a program designed to aid families who were unable to keep up with the high cost of energy during the winter of 1979-80. It provided up to \$400.00 per family for payment of fuel bills, obtaining fuel or providing food and clothing for those whose money was spent for the high cost of energy. We were able to assist 105 households through this program.

Weatherization

Our weatherization program this year provided aluminum storm windows and doors to eligible families. We also continued to provide plastic, insulation and weather stripping when needed. A close relationship continues with the New Hampshire Housing Commission providing access to benefit of Section 8 Housing Assistance.

Food Coop

The food coop enjoys continued success with the membership growing and a variety of foods available to suit the needs of the individual families. Volunteers play a major role in the success of this program which realized an average weekly gross of \$700.00.

Family Planning

Continued outreach and group education programs have proved successful in enrolling 51 women in the Family Planning Program. In addition to medical care, patients may request VD tests, pregnancy tests, counseling and educational services, all free of charge. Appointments are made at the

Family Planning Office at the Community Action Program Center in Laconia.

Operation Green Thumb

Vegetable seed, tomato plants, seed potatoes and fertilizer were distributed to eligible families in the spring. On donated land Community Action Program employees and volunteers planted gardens and distributed the produce among senior citizens and needy families.

Elderly Nutrition Program

Besides Meals-on-Wheels and Congregate Meals, the Elderly Nutrition Program also provides Senior Citizens with information and referral, counseling, escort service, shopping assistance, nutrition education and recreation. The staff is available for field trips and transportation of Congregate clients from their homes to the meal site.

Rural Transportation Service

The Belknap County Rural Transportation Service is designed to help Senior Citizens and low income persons in need of transportation to medical and dental appointments, shopping, senior citizen activities and various other errands. One day each week the Meredith C.A.P. bus provides round-trip service from Meredith to Laconia with stops wherever riders request.

Serving the four towns of Alexandria, Bristol, New Hampton and Bridgewater, the Newfound Area Nursing Association looks forward to its twentieth anniversary. Operating out of our headquarters on 61 Lake Street, Bristol, the association serves as the community health agency.

There were four free blood pressure screenings held during 1979. The plans for the future will continue to offer quarterly screenings to be held in February, May, August and November. Since it is such a simple, inexpensive test which saves a person from the life threatening illnesses (Heart Attack, Stroke), it will remain a high priority for the agency.

In addition, we held two screenings in conjunction with the Lions Club of Bristol. They supply us with more than \$16,000 in free testing equipment. Testing is done for glaucoma, sight, diabetes, anemia and hearing.

This year a new component was added to the home health aide program. The aides can now be contracted to do homemaker service. To date 1979 has seen 1,498 visits to the residents of the Newfound area.

Under a contract with Meredith Visiting Nurses Association, the agency made 235 Home Health Aide visits to clients covered by Meredith.

The association also hosts a W.I.C. program once a month on the fourth Thursday. It has grown in numbers since its inception and now serves over eighty women, infants and children. Through this program, which is hosted by N.A.N.A., nutritional counseling, anemia testing and supplementary food vouchers are available to pregnant mothers, infants and children under five years of age.

The immunization clinics were held at the high school and the elementary school through the cooperation of Ms. Phyllis Robertson and Ms. Marilyn Noyes. With this joint effort we have now reached an immunization level of 97 percent compared to the Grafton County Statistic of 72 percent.

Inservice Education and workshops were held monthly for the staff to keep abreast of the latest techniques and trends in health care. In December

the agency hosted a statewide seminar on Biofeedback. It was attended by other agencies as well as staff from H.E.W.

Two grants were awarded to the agency this year. They were negotiated through the efforts of the staff and board of directors. One grant will provide monies to plan a well child program funded by the state of New Hampshire. The second grant was awarded through the March of Dimes and will provide seed monies for a prenatal-childbirth program.

In October a new program was added, Maternal and Child Health. Under this new program 17 mothers and 15 infants were seen in this quarter. Cases were referred by local physicians and the five hospitals in our catchment area.

Skilled visits made in 1979 in number, were 2,118. Visits made by the part-time physical therapist in number, were 162.

In conclusion one must realize that growth of this dimension and expansion of this size could only be possible through the efforts of the entire community served.
