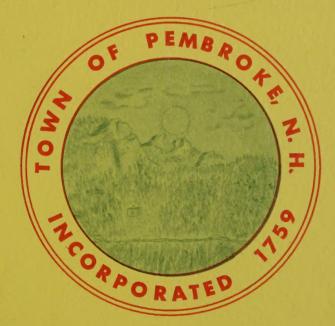




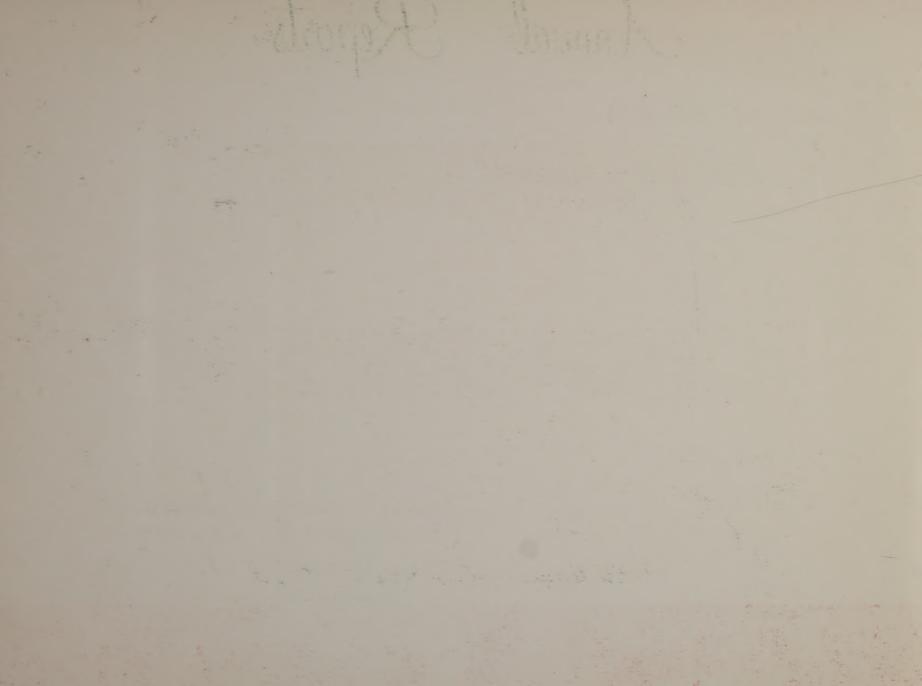

# Town Warrant

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

# TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1957, on all unpaid poll taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of nonpayment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.

 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano in this Town.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to install parking meters in the business district of the Town and to establish reasonable charges for parking to be paid through such meters, and to authorize the Selectmen to use the revenue derived from the use of meters for the purchase, maintenance and policing of such meters.

8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following roads as open highways and make said roads subject to gates and bars, as provided in Chapter 238, Section 2, of the Revised Statutes Annotated.

 (a) Road leading from old Route #28 to and across Bombay Bridge, so called, including Bombay Bridge.

(b) North Chichester Road, so called, leading from the Eighth Range Road to Chichester.

9. To see if the Town will vote to enact zoning regulations as provided in Chapter 31, Sections 60 to 89 inclusive, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, and as contained in the Zoning Ordinance attached to this warrant and made a part thereof.

10. If the Zoning Ordinance contained in Article 9 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to divide the Town into districts as provided in said Ordinance, said districts to be bounded as follows:

(a) Residential District.

On the south by the northerly side of Buck Street and Glass Street to Turnpike Street; by the easterly side of Turnpike Street from Glass Street to Main Street; by the northerly side of Main Street from Turnpike Street to Union Street; by the northerly side of Union Street from Main Street to High Street; by the westerly side of High Street from Union Street to Front Street; by the northerly side of Front Street from High Street to Exchange Street;

On the west by the easterly side of Exchange Street to the end of the street; thence in a straight line from the end of Exchange Street to a point where an extension of Pine Street would intersect the 300 foot contour line as shown on the Suncook quadrangle of the U.S. Geological Survey Map; thence in a general northerly direction following said 300 foot contour line to a point where an extension of Beacon Road would intersect said 300 foot contour line.

On the north by a straight line from said intersection to Beacon Road; by the southeasterly side of Route 106 from Beacon Road to Burrough Road; by the southerly side of Burrough Road for a distance of 500 feet;

On the east by a straight line from said point on Burrough Road to Beacon Road, at a point where a northerly extension of the Third Range Road would intersect said road; thence in a straight line to the Third Range Road and continuing along the westerly line of the Third Range Road to Dearborn Road; thence by the southerly side of Dearborn Road to Buck Street. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase and/or construct for the Town the following land, buildings and new equipment and to expend for each item an amount not to exceed the sum set opposite the item, and to execute any agreements or contracts that are necessary for this purpose.

(a)	Memorial Field, and the land adjacent thereto	\$ 3,900.00
(b)	Landfor a Town dump, including the develop-	
	ment of the land	1,500.00
(c)	Storage shed for Town equipment and supplies	3,000.00
(d)	Sidewalk plow and equipment	2,460.00
(e)	Rubbish truck	1,200.00
(f)	Road grader and equipment	7,940.00
		\$20,000.00

And to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars in 1957; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow, on the credit of the Town, a sum not to exceed Eighteen Thousand (\$18,000.00) Dollars by the issue of serial notes, payable Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars in each of the years 1958 to 1966 inclusive, and to determine the rate of interest on said notes and provide for the sale thereof. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the sum of \$2,000.00 is included in the budget.)

14. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

On the south by the northerly side of Glass Street and Front Street from Turnpike Street to High Street;

On the west by the westerly side of High Street from Front Street to Union Street;

On the north by the northerly side of Union Street from High Street to Main Street; by the northerly side of Main Street from Union Street to Turnpike Street;

On the east by the easterly side of Turnpike Street from Main Street to Glass Street.

(c) Industrial District.

Includes all of the area between the northerly side of Buck Street, Glass Street and Front Street and the Suncook River from Hartford Brook on the east to Exchange Street on the west; and all of the area between the residential district and the Merrimack River from the Suncook River to the Soucook River; and all the area between the residential district and a line 500 feet easterly of Route 106 and the Soucook River.

> (d) Agricultural District. All of the rest of the area in the Town.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to replace the present 12" wood stave main on Buck Street with an 8" cast iron main, from the end of the present cast iron main on that street to the end of the line; and to renew such services, hydrants and fittings as shall be necessary to provide an efficient and adequate water line; and to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to execute any and all contracts and agreements, hire engineers and other personnel, and make any and all purchases of supplies and materials as shall be necessary in connection with said pipe line.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow a sum of money not to exceed Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars on the credit of the Town by the issue of serial bonds, as provided in Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated and Chapter 306 of the Laws of 1913 as amended, for the purposes specified in Article 11; and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and the form of said bonds, and the rate of interest thereon, and to provide for the sale thereof. (This article has been approved by the Budget Committee.)

ZONING ORDINANCE FOR TOWN OF PEMBROKE, N.H.

# ARTICLE I. Preamble

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 31, Revised Statutes Annotated, Sections 60-88, for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity, convenience or general welfare as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development of the incorporated Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire, by securing safety from fire, panic and other dangers, providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights of way, by preserving the rural charm now attached to our town, the promotion of good civic design and arrangements, wise and efficient expenditure of public funds and the adequate provision of public utilities and other public requirements, and by other means, now therefore the following ordinance is enacted by the voters of Pembroke, New Hampshire in official meeting convened.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### Districts

For the purpose of the ordinance the Town of Pembroke is divided into districts as shown on the Zoning Map filed with the Town Clerk and dated March 12, 1957 and including the following: (1) Residential District; (2) Residential and Agricultural District; (3) Agricultural District; (4) Commercial District; (5) Industrial District.

#### ARTICLE III.

### Definitions

For the purpose of this ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section:

A. Home produce and products means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned, or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property.

**B.** Right of way means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the width of rights of way.

**C.** Frontage shall mean the length of the lot bordering on the public right of way.

**D.** Tourist home shall mean any residence including a room or group of rooms where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes for not more than six persons are provided for a price.

E. Junk means any old metals, old bottles, cotton or woolen mill waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen mill yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, two or more unregisterable motor vehicles, discarded machinery, vehicles or other scrap materials and other second hand articles the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

F. The term neighborhood shall be defined as an area, 1000 feet in radius.

G. Lots shall have a frontage of at least 100 feet, unless such lot is on record at the time of passage of this Ordinance.

# ARTICLE IV.

## **General Provisions**

A. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent the conunuance of any existing use of land or buildings, or the replacement thereof, but when any non-conforming use is discontinued for at least one year the land or building must thereafter be used in conformity to this Ordinance, except that the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing may grant the continuance of said use.

**B.** Junk yards, or place for the storage of junk, vehicles, or other scrap materials shall be maintained in the areas designated by the Board of Adjustment.

**C.** No owner in any District shall permit the outside of any building or other structure to be left unfinished or incompleted, but shall finish or complete the same within five years, regardless of any change in ownership.

**D.** Every new building shall be set back 30 feet from the right of way or such distance as shall conform to the line of existing buildings on adjacent property, or at no time on the right of way. No building shall be located within 10 feet of the side property line.

E. No residence or other dwelling shall occupy the same lot with another residence or dwelling unless such condition existed prior to the enactment of this Ordinance, or unless the minimum lot requirements are met for each dwelling.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### **Residential District**

1. It shall be mainly a District of residences. No other uses than those specified here will be permitted.

2. Home produce and products may be sold and exposed for sale in this District.

3. Tourist homes may be maintained and operated in this District.

4. Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenant as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance, or other recognized trade or profession, or such home occupation as hairdresser, dress-making, manufacture of craft products for sale, or manufacture of food products, except that the number of persons employed at any one location shall not number more than four persons at any one time in addition to the owner or tenant.

5. Churches and schools are permitted in this District.

6. Property owners or owners of enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs not to total over eight square feet in area each sign. Also not more than two signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, which shall not exceed a total area of five square feet each sign.

# ARTICLE VI.

# **Residential and Agricultural District**

1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that District.

2. General farming including horticulture, dairying, livestock and poultry raising and other agricultural enterprises or uses, or the raising of animals for other purposes are permitted in this District, excluding any use offensive or detrimental to the neighborhood.

## ARTICLE VII-

### **Agricultural District**

1. Any use permitted in the Residential Agricultural District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that District.

2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, tourist courts or cabins.

3. General farming, including horticulture, dairying, livestock and poultry raising, and other agricultural enterprises or uses.

4. Processing the natural resources of the agricultural District.

5. Orchard warehouse.

6. Creamery or cannery.

7. Aircraft landing field, hangar and equipment, only by permit of

# Selectmen.

8. Forestry.

9. Organized recreational camps.

10. Golf courses, public or private, park or playground.

11. One or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of the premises on which placed.

12. Accessory use customarily incident to any of the above uses.

13. Farm operated for the disposal of garbage, sewage, rubbish or offal or rendering plant and commercialized slaughter house, provided the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such use under such conditions and in such a building as it may prescribe will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

## ARTICLE VIII.

# **Commercial District**

1. Any use permitted in the Residential-Agricultural District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that district.

2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, motels, tourist courts or cabins, including such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests.

- 3. Shops, restaurants and other retail or wholesale business.
- 4. Garages, parking lots and filling stations.
- 5. Business offices and banks.
- 6. Theaters, halls and clubs.
- 7. Storage for retail and wholesale business.

#### ARTICLE IX

#### **Industrial District**

1. Any uses permitted in the Agricultural District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that District.

2. Manufacturing of all kinds, the storage of and facilities for the distribution of petroleum and coal products and the processing of wood, lumber fertilizer, grains, etc., provided the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such use under such conditions and in such a building as will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

# ARTICLE X.

#### Enforcement

1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

2. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal action.

# ARTICLE XII.

# Amendment

This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting, and when such amendment has received a public hearing, which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fifteen day notice.

## ARTICLE XIII.

#### Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

### When Effective

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

## ARTICLE XI.

# **Board of Adjustment**

The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment, consisting of residents of the Town, one member to be appointed from each block as designated on the town map, and not holding an elective office, conforming in membership and duties to the provisions of Chapter 31, Sec. 66-73 inclusive of the Revised Statutes: Annotated of New Hampshire, said Board to serve without compensation. This citizen Board shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this Ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.

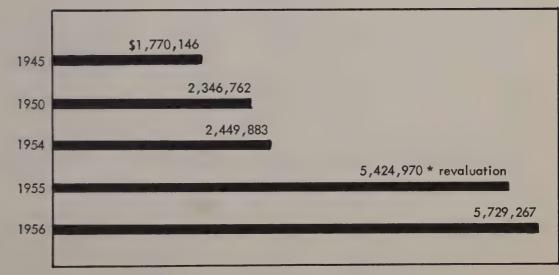

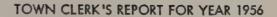

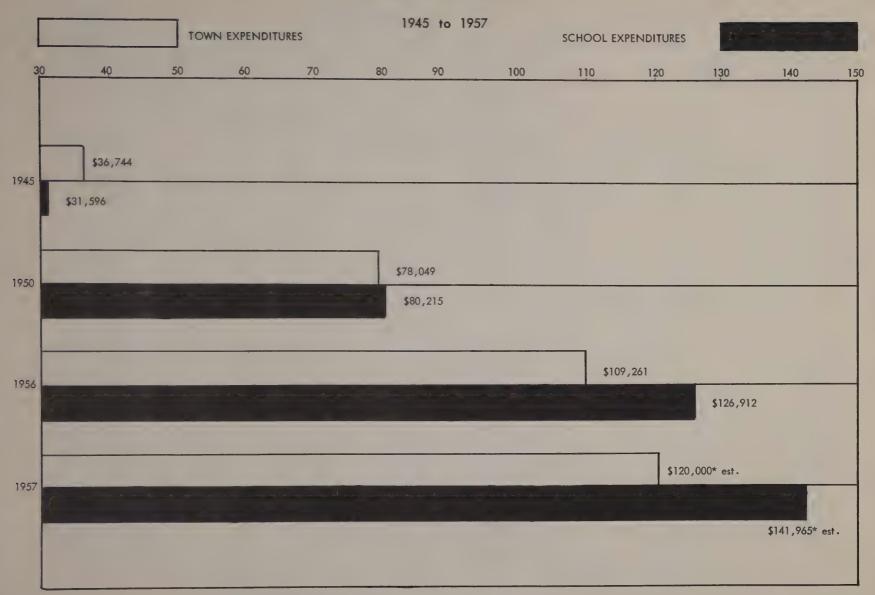

# COMPARATIVE CHART SHOWING EXPENDITURES OF TOWN AND SCHOOL

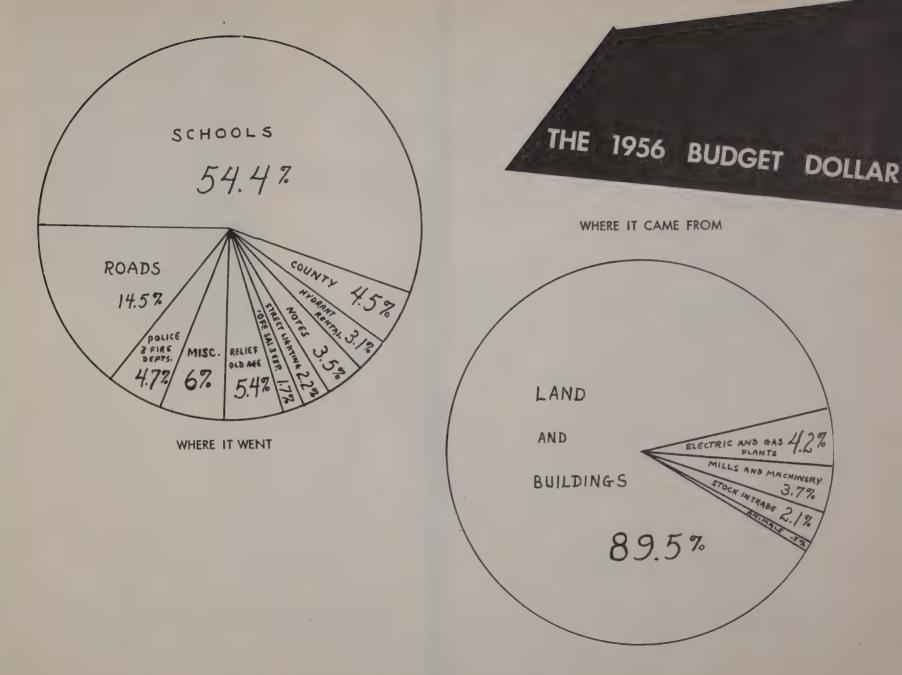

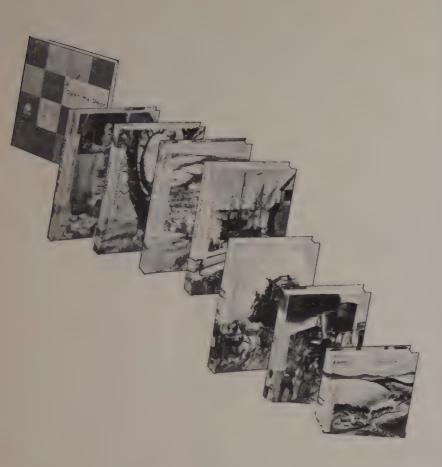

# FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

1 am proud to report the progress made in the department during the past year. Most important is the addition of the new Farrar, 750 gpm pumpertanker, which was delivered in September. Following is the letter of acceptance from the N. H. Board of Underwriters;

September 17, 1957

Dear Chief Metivier:

Enclosed please find the results of our three-hour acceptance tests on your new pumper. You will note that the results are entirely satisfactory and this will serve to inform you that the apparatus is hereby approved by this office.

We appreciate your excellent cooperation and assistance in completing the tests.

Later in the year, the new pumper underwent another test with the apparatus of the City of Manchester and it was found that the Pembroke pumper delivered some 905 gallons per minutes.

All the officers and men of the department served throughout the year without pay in order to be able to build a room in which the men could hold their meetings and also provide a place for their enjoyment. The room, 35 x 15, was erected adjacent to the engine room and is now completed. The new quarters encourages the men to come to the station more often, and as a result, you will note in the fire report that the number of bell alarms has been decreased substantially because enough firemen were present to take care of some calls without sounding the general alarm.

Before turning over to the Town Tanker No. 2, which was also purchased by the firemen in 1955, it was deemed advisable to install a more powerful engine. This was done during the past year with funds provided by the firemen. In all, more than \$2,000 in money was used from the firemen's fund to provide equipment and other needed supplies.

I desire to express my appreciation to the townspeople for their continued efforts toward fire prevention and on behalf of the department, thank everyone who support our fund raising drives.

# REPORT OF THE PEMBROKE PLANNING BOARD

During the past year, numerous meetings were held by the Planning Board. Many of the town's problems were discussed, some that could be taken cars of immediately and some that would require long range planning.

The steady growth of Pembroke presents many problems of new roads, sewers, drainage, water mains, schools, residential development, industrial development and recreational facilities. In order to cope with the continued expansion of the town it has been our objective to formulate policies and recommendations that will be of benefit to the town and economical to the taxpayer.

Some of the Committee's recommendations have already been put into effect. Other recommendations are contained in this year's Town Warrant. Many of the meetings dealt with a study of the needs of a zoning ordinance. After considerable research and thought, the zoning regulations were written and a master plan prepared. On January 15, 1957, a public meeting was held at which the proposed zoning regulations were read and the master plan explained. Following the meeting, a "Question and Answer" period was held, giving all interested persons a chance to voice their opinions.

The Planning Board has made an effort to guide the physical development of Pembroke so that we will live in the best possible environment.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Pembroke, N. H.

May I present my tenth annual report of the schools of Pembroke and at the same time express my gratitude and appreciation for your help and understanding in solving the problems of the school.

The 1956-57 school year saw the greatest turn-over in school personnel since 1948-49. This was due in part to circumstances beyond the control of any one person or group of persons. Conditions have been developing until it was inevitable that such a situation came about.

Seven new teachers were elected, six of them replacements and one for an added room to divide grade four. Miss Marion Stone replaced Mrs. Lorraine Thompson in Grade 1; Miss Anita Stokes replaced Miss Mabel Granger in Grade 2; Miss Phyllis Woodard replaced Mrs. Mary E. Normandin in Grade 3; Miss Constance Johnson replaced Mrs. Leila Thibault in Grade 4; Miss Margaret Guilmette was the added teacher in Grade 4; Mr. Edward Dufresne replaced Mr. Francis Larkin in Grade 7; and Mr. John Lyford was elected to replace Mr. Norman Morin in Grade 8.

The rest of the staff returned in September to a much larger school and a school which will continue to increase for 1957-58. These teachers were Mr. Manson Donaghey, principal; Mrs. Helen Desmarais, Grade 6; Mrs. Gertrude Chase, Grade 3; Mrs. Bertha Hickey, Grade 2; Mrs. Florence Stone, Grade 5, and Mrs. Rebecca Ricard, Grade 1. If conditions develop as we expect they will, we shall find it necessary to replace one teacher and add a new one because of the need to divide Grade 5. This leaves but three grades now with one teacher —there are now two teachers in each grade, 1-5. Within a period of three years we shall have a 16-room school with two teachers for every grade, 1-8, which means 16 rooms. There are now three rooms which are large enough only for very small classes, in fact, they are very much overcrowded at the present time. With the increase of children each year until the 16-room school is reached will mean at least three rooms in another year and the completion of the 16-room building by the following year. When this is completed we shall also have a health room and a room for a library. From that time on there will be between 50 and 60 children entering the school each year and about the same graduating. Other things being equal, the building should be adequate for quite a few years.

Since the controversy concerning the exclusion of tuition pupils from the Manchester schools affects the town of Hooksett, the problem of housing over 100 pupils within the next three or four years from that town becomes acute. Therefore, steps have been taken to get members of the three school boards—Hooksett, Pembroke, and Allenstown—together with the Trustees from Pembroke Academy to discuss the advisability and probability of a Cooperative School District. Such a district can be set up in at least four groups or four ways.

- 1. Grades 1-6 2. Grades 1-8
- 3. Grades 7-12

grades as well. Therefore, parents and citizens should be thinking about this situation.

Although nothing definite has been accomplished to date except to discuss the problems for and against this movement, the last meeting of representatives of the three boards and trustees did appoint a member from each board and trustees to a future meeting to act as a committee. At this future meeting the four members present will elect a fifth member from the boards involved. From then on, this committee is to explore all problems which a Cooperative School District would produce including enrollments, borrowing capacity, building site, equipment, transportation, water development, comparative costs (present and cooperative), tax rate, costs of incorporation, curricula, and a few other factors including the size and plans of a cooperative building.

This problem of education is wide-spread and not peculiar to this area. Parents and citizens must solve it and the more informed everyone is, the quicker and better it will become a reality.

Again, may I express my appreciation for the sincerity and faithfulness of the members of the board in handling the problems of the school. You have a good school by any standards and one in which you may very well be proud. May the good work continue.

## Pembroke Academy

To the Trustees of Pembroke Academy and the Superintendent of Schools:

Pembroke Academy opened in September with 217 students, of whom 23 have since left. Twelve have joined us, so, as of the 25th of January, we have 206 members in our register. Of these, 42 are from Allenstown, 22 from Epsom, 21 from Hooksett, and 121 from Pembroke. Attendance figures from the register show the following half year totals, as compared with the figures for the same period of last year:

52 students have been neither absent nor tardy during this time, but the extremely cold weather and snow have increased the incidence of tardiness since the start of the year.

New teachers added to the staff this year include: Mrs. Hazel Brainard Greene, from Keene Teachers College; teaching Home Economics; Mrs. Henriette Raymond Girard, teaching the commercial subjects, graduated from Mt. St. Mary; Mr. Paul Wilkinson, also from Keene, teaching the Sciences; and Mr. Conrad Fortin from St. Anselm's College, teaching French and English.

The completion of the beautiful and spacious gymnasium has resulted in a much broader physical education program. Only a few students, excused by their family physician, do not participate in the activities which keep the gym busy during almost the whole week. These activities stress physical fitness through participation in a wide variety of sports and games.

A very active Student Council, under the direction of Mr. Paul Drowne, helps to supervise activities of an extra-curricular nature. The recently formed Athletic Association will be set up to permit students to take an active part in the operation of our athletic program. The basis for membership in this organization is the winning of a letter in a sport. Mrs. Mabel Reed and Mrs. Elizabeth Morrill continue to direct the vocal music and the speech work in the Academy. Mrs. Greene supervises the Noon Lunch program, in which about 100 students daily obtain a nourishing and tasty lunch for 30 cents per day. Mrs. Flossie Robinson and Mrs. Adine Chase do the planning and cooking.

Several boys and girls have left school for personal reasons during the year, little realizing the value of the work which they are missing. We would urge every parent vigorously to help their sons and daughters to complete their high school education. A survey of last year's graudates indicates that 7 are in college, 4 are continuing their education in some other manner, and that 4 are in the armed forces. Of the 22 who are working, 17 are employed in areas for which they received training at the Academy. This information approximates that of the previous year, and serves only to emphasize the value of high school training.

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#### ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS FOR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1956

Requests for main extensions have reached a point whereby the cost of these new installations are all out of proportion to what the Water Works can afford to do within the present income.

Several different extension policies have been approved by the Public Utilities Commission and are now in effect. Details under "New Construction" will show how some of these extensions were taken care of. It is believed that these new policies will work out to the advantage of all concerned when fully understood.

Regulations regarding extensions to present mains are practically the same as before.

The most serious problem facing this Department at the present time is the 12" wood pipe line on Buck Street from Dudley Road to Letendre's camp (formerly) beyond Bombay Bridge.

Pursuant to advice given by the Public Utilities Commission some four years ago, namely that the Town of Epsom install its own Water System, the Town has formed a Water Precinct. After several conferences between the two Boards, Epsom and Pembroke, it was agreed that Pembroke Water Works would sell their interests in Epsom for the sum of \$5,000. This agreement was approved by the voters at a Special Town Meeting held in Pembroke on August 16, 1956.

The Epsom Precinct has voted to issue bonds in the amount of \$105,000. Work is already in progress. A gravel packed well is being constructed and a steel tank holding approximately 250,000 gallons has been ordered. Plans have been made to replace the 12" wood pipe on Black Hall Road with 8" transite pipe together with new hydrants and other appurtenances. About one-quarter of a mile of this pipe has been installed. Plans are being made by Epsom to take over and operate their own system, now operated by Pembroke Water Works, on July 1, 1957.

So much for the Epsom end.

Buck Street, Dudley Road to Letendre Camp

It will become necessary to furnish this location with water pumped from the wells at Soucook River. The distance of this line, referred to above, is 13,250 feet and is all of what remains of the old wood pipe in the Town of Pembroke.

After much thought and due consideration of what Epsom is doing, it was deemed advisable to make a start this year in replacing this line, so accordingly the following was done:-

1328' of 2" galvanized iron pipe was installed from Letendre's camp South-westerly to a point beyond where the road floods over during high water. This takes care of the camps etc. in the Bombay Bridge area.

1365' of 8" cast iron pipe was installed from the end of the above 2" galvanized iron pipe to a point opposite to Buck Street Cemetery. Construction had to be halted at this point due to weather conditions. This leaves a balance of 10,557 feet of wood stave pipe to be replaced with 8" cast iron pipe.

It is well known that this wood pipe is in very bad condition and should be replaced, together with new hydrants, services, etc.

Following are a few basic reasons why this work should be completed before it becomes necessary to furnish water for this section: -

1) Wood pipe is in very poor condition and leaks very bad. These leaks can be repaired one day and the next day they leak out again.

2) Water has flowed one way through these pipes for years and when the flow is reversed the joints will be subject to more leakage.

3) There are several places on the road, especially on top of knolls, where the grade of the road has been lowered and the top of the pipe is only one and one-half feet below the surface. Many leaks occur in these locations due to vibration from heavy trucks.

4) The amount of water required to furnish this section under existing conditions will be excessive, which requires operating two pumps and this means an added expense of at least \$200. per month in pumping costs.

5) During a dry spell in the summer it is a question whether the pumps could furnish enough water to meet all demands. This would necessitate the restricting of the use of hoses, which is not desirable.

6) This area is growing at a fast rate which, of course, means more water is being used and will, no doubt, reach the point where another well will have to be installed in the near future. This is especially true if the mills are again operating at full capacity.

7) Last, but not least, - Pressure. In 1952 the pressure was 75 lbs., at Warren Foss' (end of line), in 1954 it was 48 lbs., in 1955 it was 38 lbs., and on December 31, 1956 it was down to 33 lbs. The Board of Underwriters has inquired about this pressure about a year ago but was informed that conditions would soon be remedied. Should it come in and make a test the insurance rates would go up as pressure is not anywhere near standard requirements. A residual pressure of 20 lbs. is required and they would find practically none. To explain more fully what residual pressure is - one hydrant must be wide open and the pressure.

It is expected there will be an article in the Warrant for the Town Meeting March 12, 1957 and if passed it will be possible to complete this project by July 1,1957, the tentative date Epsom expects to take over 1800' of 8" cast iron pipe was purchased with money from the sinking fund for this project and there is 1000' left on hand.

Samples of water were taken from well house and taps in the village periodically during the year and sent to the State Department of Health for analysis. All reports have been O.K. The last one was taken December 19, 1956.

Ernest A. Chapdelaine resigned as Treasurer the first of the year. Supt. Martin G. Ferry was appointed as temporary Treasurer for the balance of year.

Eleanor Kenney has been appointed Treasurer for P.W.W. effective January 1, 1957.

The Board wishes to extend its appreciation to Mr. Chapdelaine for the efficient services rendered over a long period of years.

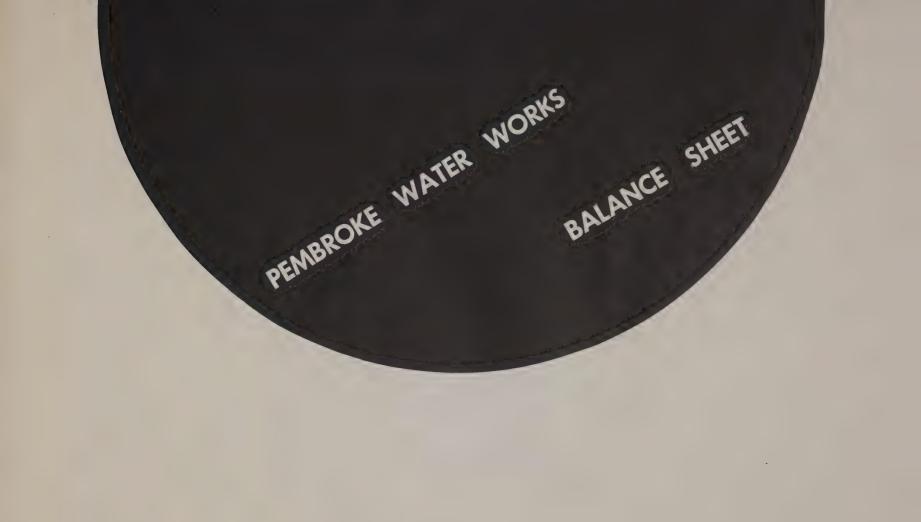

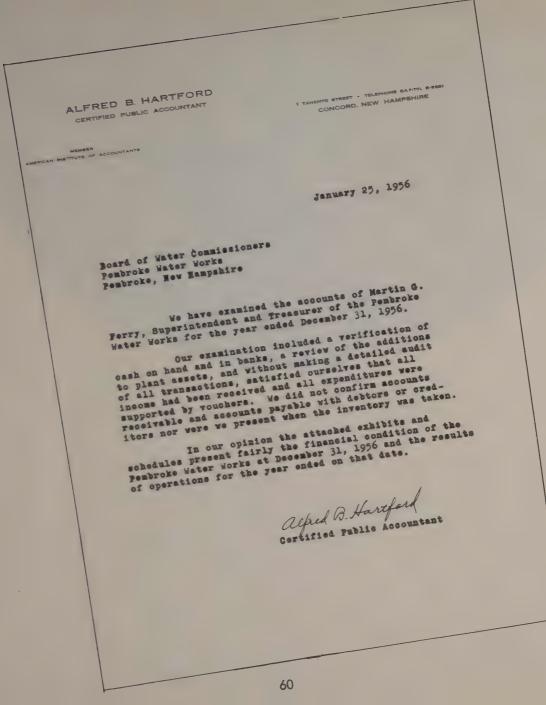
