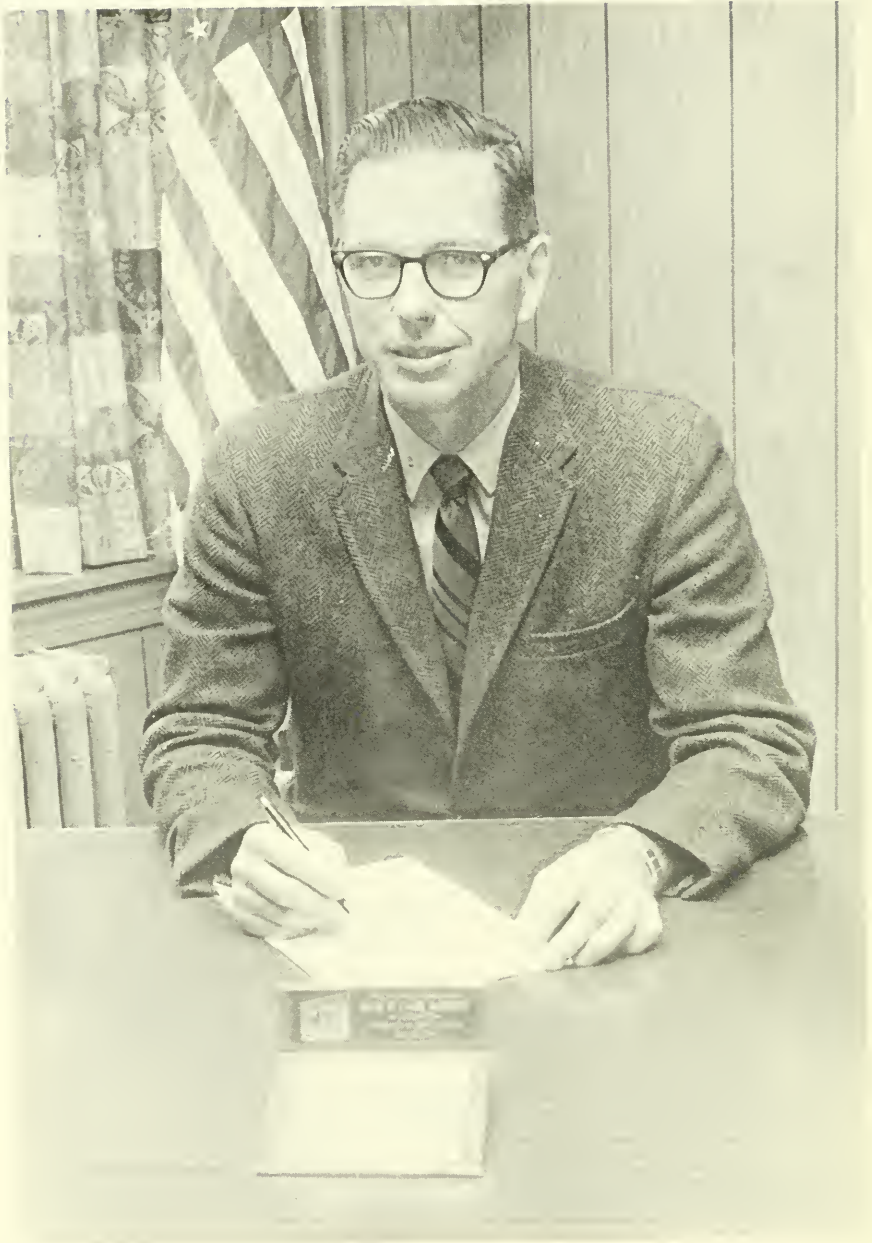

Gentlemen of the Council:

Tonight we welcome a new decade and with it face the responsibility and honor of serving our friends and neighbors.

Many of our citizens are reluctant to witness changes but, if we are to survive in this competitive atmosphere, some transition is necessary. I believe in Rochester and the people. They have proven themselves many times over to me. Our department heads are dedicated people working for the community interest. They produce more at less cost than any other city in New Hampshire. We must help them ameliorate their departments and maintain current trends.

The big question to be faced is planning. How will we plan? How far ahead will we plan? Who will plan? Our planning boards have had many fine minds present sound suggestions that were often ignored. We have spent tax dollars for professional planners who offered long range projects which were cast aside. Surely we are capable of realizing the need for serious planning. Many of our current problems would have been resolved if these plans had been carried out. Delaying needed projects is not economy. A successful business must make plans and follow them. Rochester is a big business, so let us organize now for the future. Sound planning will be the nucleus of our city. All departments and functions must evolve from this amoebic stage. So let us nurture it.

We must remember that not everyone is in a position to be a candidate for public office but are eager to offer assistance. Regardless of my stature in your eyes you may be certain that no one in Rochester has or will work harder to construct a successful community. It has always been my policy to speak well of Rochester and to endeavor to correct faults with the least publicity.

During the next two years, I will welcome suggestions and assistance from the council and voters. If you are interested in Rochester and believe you can make a contribution to the city tell me. I assure you it will be well received and appreciated. It is my sincere wish to work closely with all councilmen and citizens of our fair city. Let us prosper together.

IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS

Passed by the City Council 1969

RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:

That the Finance Committee be and is hereby authorized to hire in anticipation of taxes a sum not exceeding One Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,300,000.00), said sum to be hired on notes of the City in such amounts and at such times as it deems the best interest of the City requires.

RESOLUTION TO VALIDATE ORDERS

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:

That pending the passage of the annual appropriation measure for the fiscal year 1969, the Mayor be and is hereby authorized and empowered to validate orders on the City Treasurer for all duly approved and properly classified claims in operating expenses of the City of Rochester or any of its municipal subdivisions.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO SEWER AND WATER EXTENSIONS

Be it ordained by the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Rochester that Section 9 of c. XIII of the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester, as amended, be amended by striking out said section and substituting the following therefore:

Section 9: No proposed new street or highway or new public sewer, water, street surfacing or other public improvements, or any combination of the above, shall be laid out, accepted or constructed on behalf of the City by the City Council until the following requirements have been complied with:

A. The person or persons offering said street or highway layout or requesting new public sewer, water, street surfacing or other public improvements, or any combination of the above, shall proceed as follows:

1. Make written Petition to the Planning Board, which shall provide the following:

(a) A description of or reference to a map or plan, showing the starting points, courses, and termini of the street or highway, and requested sewer, water, street surfacing and other public improvements, as may be necessary.

(b) A description of the lands affected and likely to be affected by said street and said public improvements.

(c) The names of the owners of such lands.

(d) The estimated cost for the construction of said streets or highways and other necessary public improvements.

(e) A separate form of sewer or water agreement, providing that a person shall pay for the total cost of any sewer or water extensions which said costs shall be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works, and each agreement shall further provide for the payment of the total cost of said sewer or water extensions plus full payment of

interest on account of any debt to be incurred by the City in the construction of said sewer or water extensions. Each agreement shall further provide that the total cost of said sewer or water extensions and payment in full of the interest on any debt to be incurred by the City in the construction of said sewer or water extensions shall be paid by the person desiring such construction by means of a special sewer or water assessment, and shall constitute a lien on all land of said person. Said Lien shall be transferable upon the conveyance of said improved land, provided that all prior installments thereon have been paid. Each agreement shall further provide that said special sewer or water assessment shall be based upon the total cost of construction plus the payment of interest on any debt incurred by the City, and may further provide that said cost and interest may be prorated over a period not exceeding ten (10) years. Each agreement shall further provide that in the event of a transfer or sale by the original Petitioner of the property serviced by said extension, the balance then owing to the City for said extension shall be paid in full. Said agreement shall be recorded in the Strafford County Registry of Deeds, and said lien shall have the full force and effect of a tax lien and collectable as such as provided by s. 9-18 inclusive, Chapter 252, New Hampshire RSA (1955). Said agreement shall also be signed and shall be duly witnessed and acknowledged. Any agreement for sewer or water shall be limited to individual owners of residential homes only, who shall be reimbursed for any payment made as above provided in the event that Phase II of the water pollution abatement program of the City of Rochester is adopted. Any commercial, industrial or real estate development owner shall pay their prorata share of such sewer and water improvements in cash prior to construction.

2. Said street or highway shall be a minimum of fifty (50) feet in width.
 3. Give a warranty or other satisfactory fiduciary deed of conveyance describing said property.
- B. The said Planning Board shall review said Petition and Agreement, and shall report in writing to the City Council and to the Commissioner of Public Works, the following:
1. The need of such street or highway and any necessary public improvements.
 2. The character of the proposed street layout and necessary public improvements and their relationship to the future development of the City as a whole.
 3. The necessity, if any, for sewer, water, street surfacing and other public improvements.
- C. The Commissioner of Public Works shall report in writing to the City Council the following:
1. The estimated cost of final surfacing for any of said street or highway by the City.
 2. The estimated cost for any necessary sewer, water or other public improvements.
 3. The estimated period of time required to complete said street or highway surfacing and to construct said sewer, water and other necessary public improvements.
- D. The City Council shall proceed as follows:
1. Review the Petition and Agreement of the person or persons offering said street or highway and each person desiring necessary sewer, water or other public improvements; review the action and recommendations of the Planning Board; and examine the report of the Commissioner of Public Works. The Petition of the person or persons; the action and recommendations of the Planning Board, if any; and the report of the Commissioner of Public Works shall be first accepted by the City Council by a majority vote of the entire membership of the Council.

2. If the above Petition, action and report are all accepted by a majority vote of the City Council, the City Council shall require each person to provide the City with a written agreement, signed and duly witnessed and acknowledged, in which each person agrees to pay his prorata share of the special assessment herein above provided. No agreement and no deed shall be accepted by the City without a two-thirds roll call vote of the Council. Said two-thirds roll call vote shall be based upon the entire membership of the City Council.

E. Any person who refuses to sign an agreement to pay his prorata share of the special assessment for new construction of said sewer or water extension prior to said construction or any other person who shall refuse to sign such an agreement at a later date to pay his pro-rata share of the special assessment, shall be prohibited from joining in any new sewer or water extensions in the City of Rochester without paying his or their prorata share of the special assessment, as the case may be, for the construction of said sewer or water extensions in the City of Rochester.

F. The prorata share of each person shall be determined by dividing the total cost of construction of said sewer or water extensions plus any necessary interest to be incurred in financing of said sewer or water construction by the number of lots as laid out on said plan or map in order to determine each person's prorata share of the special assessment.

G. The funds received from the collection of such special sewer or water assessments shall be kept as separate and distinct funds and shall be known by their respective names as "The Sewer", or "Water Funds," as the case may be. Any surplus in any such fund or funds may be used for the enlargement or replacement of said sewer or water extensions but shall not be used for the extension of said sewer or water to serve unsewered or unwatered areas or for any purpose other than for cost of construction, payment of interest on any debt incurred, maintenance, operation, and repairs to any said newly constructed sewer or water extensions.

H. A copy of this amendment to said Ordinances shall be recorded in the Strafford County Registry of Deeds under the Title of "City of Rochester Sewer or Water Liens" and any other indexing as the Register of Deeds may deem appropriate.

I. Any lien created by this amendment or by said original Ordinance or other prior amendment thereto shall also be deemed to be in the form of a tax lien, and any default thereon shall also be collectable by an action in debt, or other appropriate action, and said lien shall also have the full force and effect of a real estate attachment, as well as a tax lien.

J. This amendment shall take effect upon its passage and no Petition shall be considered without complete compliance with said chapter and all amendments thereto.

AMENDMENT TO TRAFFIC ORDINANCES RELATING TO TEMPORARY PARKING AND UNNECESSARY NOISE

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that Chapter XVI of the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester, as amended, be further amended as follows:

Section 39 as presently numbered and rewritten shall be renumbered as Section 40 without change thereto and the following substituted therefore:

Section 39 (new) No person shall either stop or park any vehicle as defined by Section 38 (a) of this Chapter in any commercial, industrial or other private parking lot after business hours on any week day, nor on Sunday or any holiday, without the consent of the owner, provided, however, that such lot shall be posted by said owner.

A sign posted by such owner in or upon such parking lot shall read as follows "No Parking after business hours without the consent of the owner. Police take notice."

The posting of such sign shall be such notice.

Section 40 as presently numbered shall be renumbered Section 40 and is hereby revoked and the following new Section 41 is hereby substituted therefore:

Section 41 (new) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Chapter, shall be fined not more than \$100.00 or imprisoned for not more than 6 months or both.

AMENDMENT TO DOG ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that c. XV of the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester be amended by adding at the end of Section 4-B a new section as follows:

Section 4-C: Fees. Pursuant to the authority of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 466, ss. 4,6,39, the fees for every dog license for a year shall be as follows:

- a. For a male or spayed female dog – three (\$3.) dollars; and
- b. For a female dog – six (\$6.) dollars; and
- c. For a kennel or breeder where the number of dogs does not exceed five – thirteen (\$13.) dollars; and
- d. For a kennel or breeder where the number of dogs does exceed five dogs but does not exceed ten dogs – twenty-one (\$21.) dollars; and
- e. For a kennel or breeder where the number of dogs does exceed ten dogs – twenty-five (\$25.) dollars; and
- f. For a kennel or breeder where the number of dogs does exceed twenty-five dogs – two (\$2.) dollars per dog in excess of twenty-five dogs in addition to said twenty-five (\$25.) dollar fee for a kennel or breeder as provided for in paragraph e of this section 4-B of these Ordinances; and
- g. In addition to the above license fees for dogs as hereinabove provided in paragraphs a through f inclusive of this section 4-B, there shall also be an additional charge of one dollar if the fees above enumerated are not paid before June first in any calendar year as provided for by New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 466, s. 7.

AMENDMENT TO SALARY ORDINANCES RELATING TO THE PRESIDING JUSTICE, THE SPECIAL JUSTICE AND THE CLERK OF THE ROCHESTER DISTRICT COURT.

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that Chapter XXV, Section 3, sub-section E as amended be further amended by deleting said Section and renumbering Section F as Section E.

Passed March 4, 1969

AMENDMENTS TO ORDINANCES RELATING TO SALARIES

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that Chapter XXV Section 2, sub-sections A, and B, and C, and D, of the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester by amended by striking out all of sub-section

A, and all of sub-section B, and all of sub-section C, and items of sub-section D, numbered 1, 2, and 3, ONLY, and substituting the following, therefore:

- A. Payable from the Salary Department:
 - 1. City Clerk, \$5,720.00 payable weekly.
 - 2. City Accountant, \$8,320.00 payable weekly.
 - 3. Collector of Taxes, \$5,970.00 payable weekly, plus the additional sum of \$200.00 per year for travel expenses.
 - 4. The full time Assessor of Taxes, \$8,270.00 payable weekly, plus the additional sum of \$600.00 per year for travel expenses.
 - 5. The full time Building Inspector, \$6,720.00 payable weekly, plus the additional sum of \$600.00 per year for travel expenses.
- B. Payable from the Public Buildings Department:
 - 1. Janitor at City Hall, \$4,750.00 payable weekly.
 - 2. Assistant Janitor at City Hall, \$4,536.00 payable weekly.
- C. Payable from the Fire Department:
 - 1. Chief of the Fire Department, \$8,757.07 payable weekly.
 - 2. The permanent First Deputy Chief at the Central Fire Station, \$123.00 weekly.
 - 3. The permanent Second Deputy Chief at the Central Fire Station, \$119.00 weekly.
 - 4. The two permanent Captains at the Central Fire Station, \$115.00 weekly.
 - 5. The Permanent Firemen at the Central Station with over one (1) year of appointed regular service shall be classified as Firemen First Class and shall receive as basic pay \$112.00 per week. Permanent Firemen with less than one (1) year of appointed regular service shall be classified as regular Firemen and receive a basic pay \$111.00 per week. The permanent Clerk shall receive \$5.00 per week in addition to his base pay.

Provided, however, that all Firemen in this sub-paragraph (C) (1) to (5) inclusive, above, shall be entitled to an additional allowance of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) a year for the purchase of uniforms and equipment. The Chief shall supervise said expenditures and shall maintain a record of all uniforms and equipment. Said uniforms and equipment shall remain the Property of the City of Rochester upon termination of employment of any Fireman as a regular Fireman in this sub-paragraph (C) (1) to (5) inclusive. At the end of each fiscal year, any unexpended portion of said allowance shall be returned to the City Clerk by the Chief.
- D. Payable from the Department of Public Works and Rochester Water Works:
 - 1. The Commissioner shall be paid weekly, \$4,667.25 to be charged to the Department of Public Works and \$4,667.25 to be charged to the Rochester Water Works.
 - 2. City Engineer, \$7,000.00 payable weekly and chargeable to the Water Division of said Public Works Department.
 - 3. Other Public Works Employees to be classified by the responsibility and general type of work as follows:

Group

- (1) \$2.67 to \$3.15 per hour
- (2) \$2.41 to \$2.60 per hour
- (3) \$2.26 to \$2.40 per hour
- (4) \$2.12 to \$2.24 per hour

The Public Works Committee is empowered to change the hourly rate of individual employees within a group, or classifications of individual employees from group to group.

RESOLUTION TO HIRE ENGINEERING SERVICE
FOR EXPLORATION OF ADDITIONAL WATER LINE
FROM NEAR ROUND POND TO CITY:

That a sum not to exceed (\$5,000.00) five thousand dollars be and is hereby

appropriated for engineering fees for exploration of providing an additional water line into the city.

Be it further resolved that the Finance Committee be authorized to raise said sum by means most advantageous to the City of Rochester.

RESOLUTION ON MUNICIPAL PRIMARY ELECTION RULES AND REGULATIONS

Whereas, the voters of the City of Rochester, at a regular and duly constitutional municipal election held in the City of Rochester on November 7, 1967, did adopt Municipal Primary Election in lieu of party caucuses.

Whereas, the Mandate of the voters should be executed,

Now Therefore, be it resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that the following rules and regulations with regard to the Municipal Primary Election for Municipal Officers of the City of Rochester be accepted and adopted effective on passage.

1. FILING FEES: Mayor \$50.00
City Council \$10.00
School Board \$2.00
Police Commission \$25.00
2. PRIMARY HOURS: Shall be from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.
3. PRIMARY DATE: Primary date should remain as stated in the City Charter. Section 12 page 4 of the City Charter stipulates election date shall be the first Tuesday in November. This year, 1969, the Primary date shall be the second Tuesday in September, therefore, abiding by custom.
4. FILING:
 1. Deadline shall be 5:00 p.m. 30 days prior to Primary.
 2. If a candidate has not filed by deadline, Ward Chairman and Committee will name a candidate. (Deadline will be extended 10 days.)
 3. Deadline for filing as an independent candidate shall be 5:00 p.m. the second Tuesday in September.
 4. Double filing on both tickets will not be allowed.
5. VACANCY: The Ward Chairman and his Ward Committee of the same party shall nominate a candidate, with his consent, to serve until the next election.
6. VOTING:
 1. Only registered members of each party shall be allowed to vote in their party's election.
 2. Plurality vote shall constitute the WINNER.
7. RECOUNT & FEES:
 1. Ward recount shall be \$10 - 2 tellers each party.
 2. City-wide recount shall be \$25 - 6 or more tellers.
 3. Deadline for recount 7 days.
8. REDISTRICTING: Wait for the next Federal census or guidelines from Concord.

RESOLUTION TO INCREASE ANNUAL SALARIES OF THE
ROCHESTER VOLUNTEER FIREMEN

Be it resolved, by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that the annual existing salaries of the volunteer firemen of the City of Rochester shall be increased by the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.) effective July 1, 1969.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCES RELATING TO
POLICE OFFENSES

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

1. That Section 1, Chapter XV of the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester be amended by striking out said Section and substituting the following therefore:

"Section 1. No person shall either be upon or remain upon any street, sidewalk, doorstep, portico, or other projection from any street, sidewalk, house, or other building to the annoyance or disturbance of any person, nor shall any person obstruct the free, convenient, and normal use of any public sidewalk, street, highway, bridge, alley, road, or other passageway nor the entrance, corridor, or passage of any public building by impeding, hindering, stifling, retarding, delaying, or otherwise restraining either pedestrian or motor vehicle traffic thereon or the passage thereof.

"The word *person* shall include either one person or more than one person whether as a pedestrian or while either the operator of or a passenger in a motor vehicle.

"The word *projection* shall include parking lots and recreation areas whether public or private either upon or adjacent to any public highway or sidewalk."; and

2. That Section 10, Chapter XV of the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester be amended by striking out said Section and substituting the following therefore:

"Section 10. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Chapter shall be fined not more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for the first offense; and not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars or imprisonment for ten (10) days, or both, for any subsequent offense."

Passed August 5, 1969

SUGGESTED AIRPORT ZONING REGULATIONS
TO AMEND AN EXISTING ZONING ORDINANCE

(These regulations have been prepared as a guide to municipal officials in protecting the aerial approaches to airports. Legal counsel of the municipality should prepare the document to be officially acted upon, with appropriate modification to satisfy particular local conditions. An Airport Approach Plan as approved by the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission on April 1, 1968, is enclosed. The airport elevation, airport reference point and the various dimensions, distances and slope ratios are taken from the Airport Approach Plan.)

AN AMENDMENT OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE REGULATING AND RESTRICTING THE HEIGHT OF STRUCTURES AND OBJECTS OF NATURAL GROWTH, AND OTHERWISE REGULATING THE USE OF PROPERTY IN THE VICINITY OF SKYHAVEN AIRPORT BY CREATING AIRPORT APPROACH ZONES AND OTHER RESTRICTED AREAS AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES THEREOF; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS USED HEREIN; (PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT); (ESTABLISHING A BOARD OF APPEALS); AND (IMPOSING PENALTIES). (THE LAST THREE ITEMS NOT NEEDED IF ALREADY PROVIDED FOR.)

In pursuance of the authority conferred by Chapter 424 of the Revised

Statutes Annotated and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of Rochester, N. H., by preventing the creation or establishment of airport hazards, thereby protecting the lives and property of users of the Skyhaven airport and of occupants of land in its vicinity and preventing destruction or impairment of the utility of the Airport and the public investment therein;

THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE IS HEREBY ADOPTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER, N. H., AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Definitions. As used in this ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (1) "Airport" means any area of land or water, whether constructed or not, which has been approved by the director as a site for the landing and taking off of aircraft or utilized or to be utilized by the public as a point of arrival or departure by air.
- (2) "Airport Approach Zone" means an area having dimensions of 500 feet in width at the end of the landing strip and 2500 feet in width at a distance of 10,200 feet. The center line of this area shall coincide with the centerline of the landing strip extended.
- (3) "Airport hazard" means any structure, tree, smoke, steam, dust or other substance which obstructs the aerial approaches of a publicly owned airport or impairs the reasonable visibility in the vicinity thereof, electrical impulses and disturbances which interfere with radio aids or communications and lights which might result in glare in the vision of pilots of aircraft or be confused with airport lights.
- (4) "Non-conforming Use" means any structure, tree, or use of land which does not conform to a regulation prescribed in this ordinance or an amendment thereto, as of the effective date of such regulations.
- (5) "Person" means any individual, firm, co-partnership, corporation, company, association, joint stock association or body politic, and includes any trustee, receiver, assignee, or other similar representative thereof.
- (6) "Structure" means any object constructed or installed by man, including such objects although regulated or licensed by other provisions of law.
- (7) "Tree" means any object of natural growth.

Section 2. Zones. In order to carry out the purposes of this amendment all of the land within the boundaries of the approach zones and all of the land within a distance of 12,000 feet from the airport reference point shown on the Rochester Airport Approach Plan dated April 1, 1968, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof is hereby declared subject to the restrictions of this amendment.

Section 3. Height Limits. No structure or tree shall be erected, altered or allowed to grow within the areas described in section 2 hereof, above a slope ratio of 40 feet to one foot measured from the end of the landing strip served by an approach zone or above a slope ratio of seven feet to one foot measured from the side of the landing strips and the approaches, or within a distance of 7,000 feet from the airport reference point above a height of 150 feet above the airport elevation, except that the Board of Appeals shall have the power to grant a variance of this regulation where literal application or enforcement of the same would result in practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship and the relief granted would not be contrary to the public interest but do substantial justice and be in accordance with the spirit of this regulation.

Section 4. Use Restrictions. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the zoning ordinance, no use may be made of the land described in section 2 hereof in such manner as to create electrical interference with radio aids or communications between airport and aircraft, make it difficult for flyers to distinguish between airport lights and others, result in glare in the eyes of flyers using the airport, impair visibility in the vicinity of the airport by the creation and discharge of smoke, steam, dust or other obstructions to visibility or otherwise endanger the landing, taking off, or maneuvering of aircraft.

Section 5. Non-conforming Uses. The regulations prescribed in Section 3 and 4 of this amendment shall not be construed to require the removal, lowering, or other change or alteration of any structure or tree not conforming to the regulations as of the effective date hereof, or otherwise interfere with the continuance of any non-conforming use. Nothing herein contained shall require any change in the construction, alteration, or intended use of any structure and the construction or alteration of which was begun prior to the effective date of this amendment, and is diligently prosecuted and completed within two years thereof.

Section 6. Variances. Any person desiring to erect any structure or increase the height of any structure, or permit the growth of any tree, or use his property, not in accordance with the regulations prescribed in this amendment, may apply for a variance therefrom. Such variance shall be allowed where a literal application of enforcement of the regulations would result in practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship and the relief granted would not be contrary to the public interest but do substantial justice and be in accordance with the spirit of this amendment.

Section 7. Permits.

- (1) Future Uses. No material change in violation of sections 3 and 4 hereof shall be made in the use of land, and no structure or tree shall be erected, altered, planted, or otherwise established in violation of sections 3 and 4 hereof in any of the areas of land described in section 2 hereof, unless a permit therefore shall have been applied for and granted. Each such application shall indicate the purpose for which the permit is desired, with sufficient particularity to permit it to be determined whether the resulting use, structure, or tree would conform to the regulations herein prescribed. If such determination is in the affirmative, the permit applied for shall be granted.
- (2) Existing Uses. Before any existing use, structure, or tree may be replaced, substantially altered or repaired, rebuilt, allowed to grow higher, or replanted, within any of the areas of land described in section 2 hereof, a permit must be secured authorizing such replacement, change or repair if it is in violation of sections 3 or 4 hereof. No such permit shall be granted that would allow the establishment or creation of an airport hazard or permit a non-conforming use, structure or tree to be made or become a greater hazard to air navigation, than it was on the effective date of this ordinance or than it is when the application for a permit is made. Except as indicated, all applications for a permit for replacement, change or repair of existing use, structure, or tree shall be granted.

Section 8. Hazard Marking and Lighting. Any permit of variance granted under Section 6 or 7 may, if such action is deemed advisable to effectuate the purposes of this amendment and reasonable in the circumstances, be so conditioned as to require the owner of the structure or tree in question to permit the airport owner at its own expense, to install, operate, and maintain thereon such markers and lights as may be necessary to indicate to flyers the presence of an airport hazard.

Section 9. Severability. If any of the provisions of this amendment or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this amendment which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this amendment are declared to be severable.

Section 10. Zone Map. A copy of said approach zone map shall become a part of the zoning map of the City of Rochester, N. H.

RESOLUTION FOR BOUNDARY LINES
FOR SOUTH MAIN STREET AND
THE ROCHESTER HILL ROAD

Be it resolved by the Honorable Mayor and the City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

That the Southerly terminus of South Main Street, in the City of Rochester, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire terminate at the intersection of said South Main Street with the Whitehall Road, so-called; and

That the geographical limits of the Rochester Hill Road originate at the intersection of South Main Street with said Whitehall Road and extend in a Southerly direction to the Rochester - Somersworth line in said County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire.

This Resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed October 7, 1969

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCES RELATING TO ELECTION OF CITY OFFICERS

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that Chapter XXVI, ss. 3 of the general Ordinances of the City of Rochester, as revised and amended on May 6, 1952, be further amended by deleting said section and substituting the following therefore:

Section 3. The City Council shall biennially on the first week day after January 1, effective January, 1960, elect by ballot and majority vote, for a term of two years, the following officers: City Clerk; City Solicitor; City Treasurer; City Tax Collector and Manager of the City Hall Auditorium; the City Accountant; the Commissioner of Public Works; the Chief of the Fire Department and five (5) Deputy Chiefs of the Fire Department, one of whom shall be from Gonic, one from East Rochester, two from the permanent firemen at the central station and one from the call firemen at the central station, who shall be elected for an indefinite term, but any one of said officers may be removed from office upon the filing of written charges against said officer with the Mayor and City Council. There shall be a public hearing upon said charges before either a regular or a special meeting of the City Council and there shall be at least five (5) days notice given to the accused officer.

Passed December 2, 1969

AMENDMENT TO TRAFFIC ORDINANCES

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that Chapter XVI, ss. 23, of the general Ordinances of the City of Rochester as revised and amended on May 6, 1952, and further amended since said date, be further amended by deleting therefrom the following: "And the Northerly side of Bridge Street from the bridge on Bridge Street to River Street" and substitute therefore the following: "The northerly side of Bridge Street as relocated November, 1969, between River Street and North Main Street." and that the remaining portions of this Section 23 remain as presently constituted.

Passed December 2, 1969

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved by the Honorable Mayor and the City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

That an amount not to exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty Five Thousand (\$185,000.00) Dollars be and is hereby appropriated for the following purposes:

1. To replace the sums taken from the Water Pollution Abatement Account totaling \$166,000.00 which was used in 1967 to reduce the tax rate of the City of Rochester; and
2. An additional sum of \$19,000.00 taken from the Water Pollution Abatement Account in 1967 and utilized for paving the public streets and highways of the City of Rochester in 1967; and
3. That said sum be raised by means most advantageous to the City of Rochester; and
4. That this sum be considered a temporary loan on the credit of the City of Rochester to be repaid to the borrower upon the issuance of either a needed bond

issue to complete the Water Pollution Abatement Program or other furnishing of necessary finances to complete the Water Pollution Abatement Program.

Passed December 15, 1969

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council:

I submit herewith my report of the activities of the Department of Public Works for the year ending December 31, 1969.

Snow removal, salting, and sanding required our attention for part of the first three months. However, we did considerable patching as weather allowed and started our regular patching program the middle of March. The two hydraulic sanders and two sidewalk plows received in November greatly assisted us in combating snow conditions.

In January it was necessary to make extensive repairs to the bridge on the England Road where an automobile pushed the railings off. We replaced these, as well as the decking.

The first of April we were able to start our street sweeping program and continued this until the first of December when cold weather set in.

Our surface drains were cleaned in the spring and fall, using our hydraulic Catch Basin Cleaning Machine. Drainage lines found that were not taking water were then rodded out.

Gravel was hauled to repair washouts and improve our unsurfaced roads, including Haven Hill Road, Betts Road, Old Milton Road, Pickering Road, Chestnut Hill Road, Bernard Road, Hansonville Road, Estes Road, Little Falls Road, Janet Street, and Sewell Street.

Oil was applied to lay dust on Estes Road, Berry Street, Betts Road, the road to the Dump, Chicken Farm Road, Lowell Street, State Street, Waverly Street, Jefferson Street, Little League Road, Carr Court, Bernard Road, Sheepsboro Road, Sewell Street, Roulk Drive, and Old Ten Rod Road.

Our shade trees were sprayed to combat disease, and nearly one hundred dead trees were removed. Stumps were removed where they were a hazard to our plows. Shade trees were set out this year and we hope to continue this practice so as to replace at least a part of the trees we have had to remove.

We constructed sidewalks for petitioners on North Main Street, and on Whitehall Road. Sidewalks were repaired on North Main Street, South Main Street and Wakefield Street.

We received two new hydraulic sand spreaders the latter part of the year which will greatly assist us in both sanding highways and back sanding after surface treatment. Two sidewalk tractors were traded for new ones of a different type which will help in keeping the sidewalks open.

We installed new culverts on Evans Road, Hansonville Road, and cleaned culverts on our country roads. We widened Evans Road, Hansonville Road, Four Rod Road and Sheepsboro Road, which will enable us to better take care of the snow.

Gates have been installed at our Public Works Yard and at the entrance to the Dump.

Water main extensions have been completed on Louise Street, Corson Street, Claire Street and Mill Street in Gonic, using 740 Ft. of 6" and 1520 Ft. of 8" Cement Lined Cast Iron Pipe.

Three new hydrants were installed, making 468 in the system. Sixty-five new services were installed and twelve services relaid.

We have received two new backhoes for the Water Department which replaced two machines that had several years on them and had considerable use, one purchased in 1948 and the small one in 1962.

Samples of our water have been sent to the laboratory regularly and they report the continued high quality of our water. Fifty-five new sewer connections were installed making 3420 services in the system.

I take this opportunity to thank Mayor Shaw, members of the City Council, and members of the Public Works Committee for their close cooperation and understanding of our problems, and the members of the Department for their loyalty and assistance.

It is through the efforts of all concerned that we are striving to make Rochester a progressive city and a desirable one in which to live.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the city of Rochester:

I hereby submit my annual report as City Solicitor for the year 1969.

A pending suit by Angus MacIver against the City of Rochester in the Strafford County Superior Court regarding the valuation of some of the MacIver real estate taken by the city for Water Pollution Abatement purposes was settled through the cooperation of Mayor Shaw and Attorney Fred Hall as special counsel for the city.

The pending suit against the City by Susan Lancey for support was dismissed.

There are a number of minor suits pending in which the City is named as either third party Trustee or Defendant.

There have been further revisions of the 1952 City of Rochester Ordinances.

Among such amended Ordinances were an increase in the penalties for unnecessary noise and a new Ordinance to cover loitering on the streets and in motor vehicles.

With regard to the Water Pollution Abatement Program, all differences between the Contractor, Consulting Engineers, State and Federal Governments have been resolved with all fees paid to date without resort to either arbitration or litigation. All invoices to all contractors have been paid to date, leaving small balances in each of the appropriate accounts.

The Rochester District Court calendar saw substantial increases in both the trial of criminal cases and civil matters. There was also a substantial increase of juvenile cases handled by this office.

These increases again reflected the expanding jurisdiction as a result of the District Court System which includes several adjoining towns in addition to criminal matters arising out of Rochester.

May I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to all departments for their continuing assistance and cooperation during the past year.

ROCHESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester, New Hampshire.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1969.

There were 402 alarms in the City of Rochester in 1969, which consisted of 115 box alarms and 287 still alarms. These included 35 car or truck fires, 9 engineer's calls (6-6), 24 brush fire calls, 19 false alarms in Rochester, 3 in Gonic and 5 in East Rochester. There were 11 chimney fires, 24 grass fires, 14 oil burner fires, 90 property fires, 58 miscellaneous calls, 31 smoke scares or honest mistakes, 35 first-aid, accident or emergency calls and 25 second alarms or calls for more help. There were 13 permanent men calls, in Rochester and 6 no-school signals transmitted this year.

7 of the above calls were for out-of-town calls for assistance from Rochester. There were 23 fire calls in East Rochester and 18 fire calls in Gonic. These are all included in the above figures.

There were 387 ambulance calls in 1969. These consisted of 54 accident calls, 284 emergency calls, 19 transfer or convalescent cases, 29 calls to which the ambulance responded but was not needed, and 1 false call.

The total number of calls and alarms answered by the Rochester Fire Department was 789. There were 402 fire calls and 387 ambulance calls.

To the School Board and Citizens of Rochester:

I submit my seventh report as Superintendent of Schools of Union No. 54. The following list indicates the administrative activities for the period from January 1, 1969 to December 31, 1969:

Secondary classroom space is rapidly becoming acute. The AREA school project was completed and approved by the City of Rochester and the State Board of Education to become effective July 1, 1970. In September of 1969 we were able to house many of the students from Barrington, Strafford and Wakefield in grades 9-12; therefore, I again implore the City of Rochester to provide secondary facilities in grades 7 and 8 for the junior high level is reaching the point where it may be necessary to have double sessions or an addition to the building to provide the necessary space for these children. I would like to inform the citizens that this is created by our own students as we have not honored our contract with Barrington, Strafford and Wakefield at this time.

Even though a new 14 room school has been constructed in East Rochester, I foresee that it will be necessary in the very near future to look for space for the fast growing enrollment in Rochester. After much study with committees, the School Board, and City Council in the past four years, it is my recommendation that the City of Rochester seriously consider building a new high school naming it the Spaulding High School, and moving the present junior high students to the present Spaulding High thereby creating the necessary elementary space at the junior high school.

At first glance, the school budget which appears on another page of this report, might seem to be dull reading. Between the lines of figures, however, is an exciting human story of young people and their dreams of a high school education, of faculty and staff and their efforts to keep our school system strong during a challenging period of rapid growth.

The School Department is especially conscious of the budget, as it is in the midst of determining how much money it will take to operate the school system during 1969-70. Over and over, the budget requests which are submitted by the many department chairmen reflect the high caliber of our faculty members and their aspirations for further excellence. These requests also reflect the hard facts of growth and change which cannot be ignored in budget making realities, such as rising enrollments, rising costs and changing times.

If more young people are to be educated, more money will be required. Keeping up to date is expensive, yet imperative.

I wish to extend to the School Board and to the City Council my sincere appreciation for their fine cooperation and the many long hours that they devoted to the tasks of carrying through their responsibilities with foresight and conviction in what is good for the children, school personnel, and citizens of their community.

The PTA organizations have been most helpful, as have the numerous civic and social organizations, the fire department, police department and highway depart-

ment, also the cooperation of the Rochester Courier, Fosters Daily Democrat, Manchester Union Leader and radio stations WWNH and WTSN.

I wish to commend all school personnel for their cooperation, devotion to education and the assistance they have given me.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester, New Hampshire.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1969.

We had a very active swimming program this year, with a weekly attendance of between 250 and 300 swimmers. This figure includes several regularly scheduled groups such as St. Charles Orphanage and the Jr. High Special Class.

The winter hours of operation were as follows:

We were open all holidays except Christmas and New Years Days.

During the winter months we ran several programs of instruction during pool hours. The pool was open to the public while lessons and other organized activities were in progress. The following classes were in session October through November and February through March:

In addition we held two SCUBA classes; one in the Spring and one in the Fall, as well as a Water Safety Instructor Course in February. I now hold a Teacher Certificate which authorizes me to teach this course as well.

On Saturday mornings Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts came in groups for work on Swimming, Canoeing and Life Saving Merit Badges.

During the summer months the pool hours changed to the following:

The East Rochester and Gonic Pools were opened as well as the Wading Pool. On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays we held regular classes from Beginners to Life Saving from 9:00 to 12:00. Tuesdays and Thursdays the Girl Scouts came for morning lessons. Over 385 children received Red Cross certificates during the ten week program.

ANNUAL REPORT

1969

PURSUANT TO THE HOUSING AUTHORITY LAW OF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE CHAPTER 203 NEW HAMPSHIRE REVISED STATUTES ANNOTATED 1955 SECTION 203 - 27, I AM SUBMITTING THIS ANNUAL REPORT TO THE CITY CLERK OF ROCHESTER, NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the year 1969, much has transpired in the related Housing Program. Generally speaking, Rochester has made significant progress in its Housing Programs. The Elderly Program clearly indicated the need for this type of assistance to the people of this age bracket. I would like to note that the supply of housing units for the Elderly is nowhere near the market demand. I recommend strongly that a program reservation for an additional 100 units be submitted as soon as possible, offering justification to the large waiting list of applicants, which continues to grow as time progresses.

While this report deals primarily with the Housing Program at Wellsweep Acres, it is important to comment on the progress schedule relative to the NH 8-2 Project for General Occupancy, as indicated in this report. Statistics and program data are herewith noted.

The Housing Assistance Administration, Local Authority, and City Officials have joint responsibility in providing decent, safe, and sanitary housing to all citizens of the community, as well as adequate community facilities. The Authority, in recognition of these factors, has met this challenge by providing adequate community facilities and the establishment of certain space standards for each project, bearing in mind at all times the very important cost factors to construct this type of housing complex.

Social participation by the tenants of NH 8-1 has been significant in maintaining a well balanced program. There does not appear at this time any reluctance by the Elderly to participate in group activities.

With the assistance of the Director and Assistant Director, an association has been formed with a President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary, all elected by the tenants at their Annual Meeting. By a cautious and patient approach, people who had a tendency to be reserved and withdrawn are now some of the better members of the Wellsweep Association. This Authority is pleased with the Tenants Association for dedicating the recently installed illuminated Water Fountain to the Housing Authority. Their generosity and hard work is certainly appreciated by all of us.

All tenants were admitted through a lease agreement between the Authority and themselves, after a complete review of all applications on an individual basis by the Commissioners. Length of time in the community, income, savings account, housing conditions, etc., were all deciding factors in awarding the units. It was and continues to be the endeavor of the Commissioners to assign these units based on need. It has been established and entered into the Occupancy Policy that all Elderly tenants shall be re-examined both for income and need every 24 months. This Authority, as of November 1969, has re-examined each tenant pursuant to Federal Regulations. The need to secure sufficient income from rent, to cover operating expenses, appears to have been achieved with the present rent schedule as recommended by the Commissioners and later approved by the NYRO. It is a pleasure to report that the financial feasibility of these Housing Programs seems to be well established and secure. The operation of housing for the Elderly is not routine by any stretch of the imagination. The multitude and variety of problems associated with our Senior Citizens will always require alert and attentive management.

One of the latest programs to come under the Housing Authority is the Surplus Food Program. We have thirty (30) recipients participating in this program. The Surplus Food is picked up in Dover and delivered to the individual tenants once a month by our maintenance men. The Authority is also participating in the

Neighborhood Youth Program by employing, on a part time basis, Junior High and Senior High school boys from low income families.

The Call Bell System was used 4 times.

Fifteen different civic groups are using the Hall.

The Executive Director has attended three workshops and six Director's Meetings.

We have various type of insurances to cover Project NH 8-1, Workmen's compensation, Liability, Fire, Office Contents, Theft and Vandalism. Also, Automobile Insurance to cover the Truck.

We now have 102 applications on the waiting list.

The year 1969 saw this Authority improve and up-date our existing Project by the acquisition of \$9,000.00 worth of betterment and additions. This includes the installation of aluminum storm windows, additional fencing, additional parking and clotheslines for the tenants.

As per the terms and conditions of the Cooperation Agreement, this Authority will be forwarding a check of \$3,922.11 to the City of Rochester as our payment in lieu of taxes. This is based upon 10% of the Shelter rent money received. I would like to point out that this same area of land now being used as a Housing Project was returning to the City approximately only \$122.56. Taxwise the City is receiving a net gain of \$3,799.55, along with our annual payment of \$1,200.00 on water used, which indicates this Authority is not a burden on the City or its taxpayers.

Facts being as they are, the Rochester Housing Authority has paid \$2,258.99 to the City in back taxes that were owed by the residents, extending years back. Also, this sum represents the back water bills owed by the former occupants, for a total gain to the City of \$5,868.63. In my judgment, this reflects that the interest of the City has been best served by this Authority. This reflects a new income to the City for the year 1969 of \$5,868.63 plus the amount of \$1,200.00 for water used at the Elderly Project, resulting in a total gain of \$7,068.63 to the City of Rochester.

Moderate progress has been made in the General Occupancy project located at Brock Street. The Development Program was submitted and approved, later to be revised due to the agreed upon so called major change. Schematic Design Documents were forwarded and revised by the Local Housing Authority and Regional Office at a conference held in New York.

It is anticipated that the Construction Contract could be awarded by May or June, pending early acknowledgement of documents forwarded to New York.

Approximately 9.5 acres have been acquired. Density figures total 10.2 units per acre. Square feet 405,170 and total area has been acquired. All site occupants have been relocated and paid moving expenses.

In summation, I would like to report that the Housing Program as established appears to be beneficial not only to the Community, but has also been of great assistance to our Senior Citizens.

As Executive Director, I would like to express my personal thanks to the Commissioners and City Officials for the assistance they have offered to me.

In accordance with the provisions of the City Ordinances, I have examined the financial accounts of the City of Rochester and the results of the budget operations for the year ended December 31, 1969.

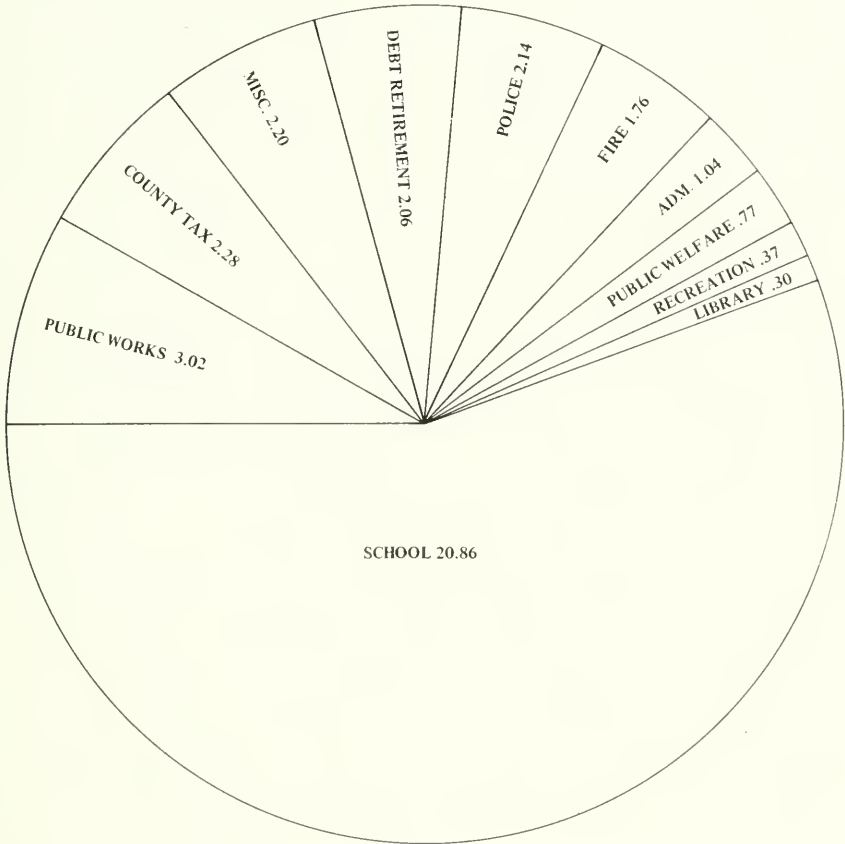
