WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 11th of March at one o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article 1, 2, and 3.

You are also hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Wednesday, March 12 at seven-thirty in the evening to act on Article 4 and subsequent articles.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.
- 3. Shall the Town adopt the following changes to the South Hampton Zoning and Subdivision Regulations in order to comply with changes in State statutes and clarify existing regulations as recommended by the Rockingham Planning Commission and the South Hampton Planning Board:

III. General Provisions

- (Subsection 1, paragraph 2) A fee of \$.10 cents a square foot or not less than \$10 dollars based on the total living and non-living area shall accompany each application submitted, with the exception of barns and large buildings which shall be costed on the first floor footage at \$.10 cents per square foot.
- 2) (Subsection 2) Delete paragraphs a and b.
 - (Subsection 2, paragraph C) New buildings or structures shall conform to the full edition of the B.O.C.A. code. The Zoning Board of Adjustment shall act as the Building Code Board of Appeals.
- 3) (Subsection 2, paragraph F) All dwellings and buildings in private or public use shall be equipped with a sewage system which meets or exceeds the specifications of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. All sewage systems must be ap-

- 3) cont.
 - proved by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. A separate permit for said sewage system must also be obtained from the Town Health Officer. A fee of \$15 shall accompany each application for permit.
- 4) (Subsection 9, second sentence) Every building lot shall have a frontage of not less than 200 continuous feet on an existing town road and shall not be less than two acres in area.
- 5) (Subsection 15, paragraph b) Lot dimensions shall be at least three acres per lot with 250 continuous feet of frontage when 25% or more of the property falls within the steep slope district.
- 6) (Subsection 16) The extraction for export and sale of the natural water resources of the Town of South Hampton is not permitted. The extraction of other natural resources may be permitted by special exception of the Board of Adjustment and/or the Public Utility Commission provided that: (the remainder of this article will not change).
- 7) (Subsection 17) Addition b. Prior to the issuance of an occupancy permit, the building inspector may require at his/her discretion, an inspection by a licensed plumber, electrician, or engineer, who will provide a written report of the inspection, prior to issuing the permit. Payment for each required inspection will be the burden of the owner of the inspected property.

VII. Wetland Conservation District

- 8) (Section B) To be added to the end of the paragraph: ... or Wetland overlay map for the Town of South Hampton. An updated Soil Sample Map (July 1983) and legend (1-19-85) from the Rockingham County Conservation Commission will also be used in determining wetland areas.
- All articles shall be renumbered to reflect any changes in the zoning ordinance.

Do You Vote To Accept The Following Changes in the South Hampton Land Subdivision Control Regulations?

- 10) (Section V. General Requirements for the Subdivision of Land)
 Add under street section:
 Streets shall not be designed in such a manner as to provide frontage to land in a neighboring municipality. The Board may, at its discretion, disapprove proposed streets within 200 feet of any municipal border in order to control the following:
 - Creation of a town road or private drive which predominately serves properties external to the Town of South Hampton.
 - Creation of undesirable traffic patterns from outside South Hampton.
- 11) (Section V, Sub-section L.) The last sentence shall
 read:

Lots for commercial and industrial purposes shall include adequate area for off-street service and parking for the anticipated use, to accommodate both employees and customers so that no parking is forced onto public streets.

- 12) (Section V, Utilities) Add: Sewage systems shall be set back at least 100 feet from surface water.
- 13) (Section X) Replace: "The selectmen" with "the Selectmen and land use boards."
- 14) (Section XI, Variances) Replace the word "Board" with "Zoning Board of Adjustment."
- 15) Change numbering to reflect added amendments to the South Hampton land subdivision regulations.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would be of benefit to the town.

- To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to previous owner, or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any or all bids.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept and expend the Highway Block Grant in the amount of \$9,668.65 for the maintenance and upgrading of Town Roads.
- 9. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Town Hall improvements.
- 10. To see if the Town wi N. appropriate and authorize the withdrawl from the Revenue sharing Fund the sum of \$9,000.00 to replace the Town Hall roof.
- 11. To see if the Town will join the Rockingham Planning Commission and appropriate the sum of \$458.50 for this purpose.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$69.00 for the support of the Rockingham Community Action Program.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of Rockingham Child & Family Services.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4500.00 to do drainage improvements at the intersection of Jewell Street and West Whitehall Road. The sum of \$1500.00 to be raised by the Town and \$3000.00 by the State of New Hampshire.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to retain the services of Robert Backus, Attorney at Law, to represent the Town with regard to the adequacy of off-site emergency planning (Radiological Emergency Response Plan)

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the renovation of the fire station into a library, monies to be raised as follows: \$25,000.00 from the Library Construction and Services Act, \$14,000 from Trust Funds, \$11,000.00 from Friends of the Library building funds, donations and pledges. These monies will be raised at no cost to the Town.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to dispose of surplus Town property.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 as their share of the budgeted 1986 costs associated with the Southeastern Rockingham County Sanitary/Solid Waste Management District (SERCSSMD) as required under NH RSA 149-M.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the support of the Seacoast Visiting Nurses Association.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of South Hampton and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress, to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan.
- 21. Whereas the State of N.H. has at its convenience seen fit to in stall warning sirens in South Hampton with or without the consent of the Town, I am requesting a vote of the Town to see if South Hampton will rescind all past votes on stoppage of the work on the evacuation plan and let Town officials work with State Civil Defense to establish the best possible plan for us and accept all equipment necessary to carry out the plan. Be it understood that accepting equipment will not necessarily constitute approval of the evacuation plan. By petition of Edward Condon, Fire Chief and fourteen other registered voters.
- 22. To see if the Town will levy a fine of \$100 per siren per day against their owners for any sirens erected despite the ordinance passed at the Special Town Meeting in November, 1985, prohibiting such sirens until an evacuation plan calling for them is approved by the Town. Funds raised by said fine shall be deposited in the Evacuation Planning Legal Fund of the Town.

By petition of Fred Anderson and ten other registered voters.

- 23. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.
- 24. Whereas, certain areas of South Hampton are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers and lakes, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

Whereas, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

Whereas, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

Whereas, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156 and 156A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

- 1. Assures the NFIP that it will enact and maintain in force for those areas having flood hazards, as delineated by the Flood Hazard Boundary Map issued by the NFIP dated February 22, 1975 and any published revision to this map, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and
- Vests the Planning Board or other duly authorized Municipal Officer with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
 - a) Assist the Administrator, at his request, in his delineation of the limits of the area having special flood hazards.
 - b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain areas.

- c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas and cooperate with neighboring municipalities with respect to management of adjoining floodplain areas in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the town in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Board of Selectmen to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request, for the determination of applicable flood insurance risk premium rates within all areas having special flood hazards identified on a Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, any certification of Flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest habitable flood (including basement in habitable) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed.
- Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING SOUTH HAMPTON, N.H. March 12th & 13th, 1985

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held on March 12th, 1985 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator Horace Cressy. Mike Santosuosso moved that the polls be opened, seconded by Helen Smith and so voted. Ballot clerks for the election day were Herbert Dodge, Francis Smith and Annette Krafton. A total of 133 votes were cast out of 542 registered voters. Polls opened 1:07 - closed 8:00 p.m.

ARTICLE I - Town Officers were elected as follows:

Moderator, 2 yrs., Horace Cressy, 121 votes, elected Supervisor of Checklist, 1 yr., Herbert Dodge, 25 write-in votes, elected

Selectman, 3 yrs., Walter Shivik, 117 votes, elected
Selectman, 2 yrs., E. JoAnn Hill, 116 votes, elected
Treasurer, 1 yr., Theodore Morse, Jr., 125 votes, elected
Auditor, 1 yr., Lutz Wallem, 15 write-in votes
Auditor, 1 yr., Robert Fraser, 11 write-in votes
Auditor, 1 yr., Peter Bryant, 8 write-in votes
Highway Agent, 1 yr., John Santosuosso, 117 votes, elected
Trustee of Trust Funds, 3 yrs., Albert E. Gray, 127 votes, elected
Trustee of Cemeteries, 1 yr., Vincent H. Early, 122 votes, elected
Trustee of Cemeteries, 1 yr., Albert E. Gray, 125 votes, elected
Trustee of Library, 3 yrs., Linda G. Blair, 121 votes, elected

School District Officers were elected as follows:

Moderator, 1 yr., Horace Cressy, 124 votes, elected School Clerk, 1 yr., Audrey G. Brunet, 128 votes, elected School Board Member, 3 yrs., Judith L. Shivik, 117 votes, elected School Treasurer, 1 yr., Nancy F. Dixon, 127 votes, elected

Constable, 1 yr., John Santosuosso, 42 write-in votes, elected

Sworn in at open meeting by the Moderator were: Walter Shivik and E. John Hill, Selectmen; John Santosuosso as Highway Agent and Constable.

The following evening on March 13th, 1985 Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. Fire Chief Ed Condon led the townspeople in the Salute to the Flag. The remaining articles were voted on as follows:

Mike Santosuosso, Selectman, made a motion that non-voters, such as Folice Chief Query, be allowed to speak if called upon, seconded by Ed Condon and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE II - Walter Shivik, Selectman, made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$116,207 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, seconded by Mike Santosuosso. It was noted that in accordance with the Municipal Budget Law Act, the total

amount that can be passed at this meeting is \$141,431.51. Walter then went over the budget line-by-line. Police Chief Query estimated the \$11,000 Police Department Eudget would provide 25 hours of patrol rer week and outfit and maintain the new cruiser. Fire Chief Condon felt that he could run the Fire Department on \$6,500. Highway Agent John Santosuosso made a motion to go along with the Budget Committee's recommended figure of \$13,000 for winter maintenance seconded by Ed Condon, voted and carried. John explained the increase in summer maintenance. Lutz Wallem, speaking as a Budget Committee Member, asked if John could estimate his expenses in future years for the Budget Hearing. Cornelia Courtney asked if John could go along with the Budget Committee recommended figure of \$11,000. John moved that pll,000 be appropriated for summer maintenance, seconded by Lutz Wallem and so voted. Walter Shivik explained that a bookkeeping error was responsible for the increased cost of garbage removal. The last 1984 bill was actually paid in January of 1985.

Walter also explained the increase under Old Age Assistance. Health Officer, with the approval of the other Selectmen, the decision was made to have an individual from Town admitted to a private nursing home in Massachusetts as there was nothing available in Rockingham County. Because this individual owns property in Town, the Town has the right to recover the costs of the nursing home care. With the help of Town Counsel, a lien has been placed on the property to recover the cost from the estate. Another member of the family will have to be admitted to a nursing home shortly. Both of these individuals are on a waiting list for the Rockingham County Home. When they can be admitted there, Medicaid will eventually reduce the cost to the Town. With the lien on the property, the Town will at some future date recover a portion of this cost. Audrey Miller suggested forming a Health Committee to help older people plan for this kind of situation. Lutz Wallem asked if the Town could insure itself against this expense in the future. The Selectmen did not know and were asked to check into this.

Martha Anderson, Library Trustee, explained the increase in the library Budget - the Librarian was certified this past year and the Trustees felt she should get a raise; book budget was increased to keep up with the higher cost of books; also, requesting a Library Aide as it is difficult lately getting volunteers to help out. Peter Bryant asked for a Budget Committee Member to respond to this. Vincent Early said the Budget Committee felt this was too large an increase. Ted Morse. Recreation Commission Member, explained the need to seal the tennis court for protection. Because of neglect, it will need at least three coats at approximately \$500 per coat. The rest would be used for repairs to the fence. The \$1,750 would be used for supplies, labor will be donated. Audrey Brunet commented that the dugouts on the Ball Field are in need of repair as well. walter explained that unanticipated insurance costs and an error in paying a bill twice resulted in going over the budgeted amount for last year's insurance. However, we now have a credit of \$1,500 so this year's insurance costs should be covered by \$2,000.

Given the amendments to the Article, the total amount has been reduced by \$2,000 and Article II will now read \$114,207. Article II, as amended, was voted and passed.

ARTICLE III - Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to made application for and receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would benefit the Town." JoAnn Hill, Selectman, moved to accept the article as read, seconded by John Santosuosso and so voted.

ARTICLE IV - Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes." John Santosuosso moved that the Article be adopted as read, seconded by Feter Bryant and so voted.

ARTICLE V - Michael Santosuosso, Selectman, made a motion to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to previous owner, or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any or all bids, seconded by Audrey Brunet and so voted.

ARTICLE VI - John Santosuosso moved that the Town vote to accept and expend the Highway Block Grant in the amount of \$10,243.56 for the maintenance and upgrading of Town roads, seconded by Paul Morris and so voted.

ARTICLE VII - The Moderator read the article "to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for Town Hall improvements. Walter Shivik explained that this amount would be for improving the heating system and reinforcing the floor. Walter moved that this article be adopted as read by the Moderator, seconded by William Carey and it was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VIII - Moderator Horace Cressy read the article "to see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund the sum of \$4,500 to replace the Town Hall roof. Mike Santosuosse, Selectmen moved that the article be adopted, seconded by John Santosuosso and so voted.

ARTICLE IX - Walter Shivik, Selectman, moved that the Town join the Rockingham rlanning Commission and authorize the Town's representation and appropriate the sum of \$447.30 for this purpose and explained the benefits to the Town. Vincent Early seconded the motion and it was voted in the affirmative.

It was noted that we have approximately \$10,000 left for the remaining articles on the Warrant. Peter Coffin moved that we skip to Article XIV, seconded by Ed Condon and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIV - The Moderator read the article "to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to allow the Library Trustees to renovate the existing fire station into a library. Walter Shivik moved that the Article be adopted as read, seconded by Audrey Brunet. It was noted that the actual cost would be reflected in Article XV. William Courtney asked if the reason for a new Library was access for the handicapped. Martha Anderson, Trustee, answered yes and added also there is only one entrance to the present Library. Mike Santosuosso amended the article to read if Article XV is not passed then Article XIV is removed, seconded by Lizanne Lindahl. Sally Bryant asked if Library Trustees have investigated other

options than the fire station. Carole McCarthy, Librarian, felt that this is the most central location and close to the school. Peter Oldak spoke against the amendment, stating that renovations could be started if Article XV does not pass. The amendment was voted and passed. The amended article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE XV - The Moderator read the Article "to see if the Town will vote to release the William N. Crosby Library Building Fund, The Fublic Library Building Fund, and the Mary J. Currier Library Trust Fund to the Library Trustees for designated purposes." Martha Anderson amended the article by adding "the amount to be turned over would be \$12,000," seconded by Ed Condon. It was brought out that the amendment would not be in order as it would bring us over the amount we have left to spend. Vincent Early felt that the Mary J. Currier Trust Fund could not be used for the building fund as it was set up to support the Library. He also stated for the record that he supports building a new library but felt more thought should go into it. Carole McCarthy added that the Mary J. Currier Will states that \$200 is to be used by the discretion of the Library Trustees for the Library. Lutz Wallem asked for the amounts of the funds. Carole responded - William N. Crosby Fund - \$9,903.83; Public Library Building Fund - \$621.16; Mary J. Currier Trust Fund -\$2,615.36; also the Friends of the Library have a building fund. She added that a grant has been applied for. Peter Oldak amended the amount to read \$7,000 and Peter Bryant seconded. Ernest Bonah. suggested holding a Special Town Meeting for this article. Peter Oldak withdrew the amendment and moved that we table Article XV, seconded by Lutz Wallem and so voted.

ARTICLE X - The Moderator read article "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$188 for the support of the Rockingham Community Action Program." Walter Shivik commented that the Selectmen had received a letter stating that the program provided \$7,000 primarily for fuel assistance and moved that the article be adopted as read. John Santosuosso seconded the article and it was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XI - The Moderator read article "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the support of Rockingham Child & Family Services." Michael Santosuosso said the Selectmen had received a letter stating that \$136,370 was spent in Rockingham County for services but they did not specify if anyone from South Hampton benefitted from this. Mike moved that the article be adopted as read, seconded by John Santosuosso. It was voted and the article lost.

ARTICLE XII - The Moderator read article "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$710.97 for the dump closure plan of the Town of Kingston." Walter Shivik reported that the Town of Kingston was ordered by the State to prepare a hydrogeologic study and closure plan for the dump at a cost of \$30,000. The Kingston Selectmen have assessed the Towns that use the dump on a per capita basis. "If we want to use the dump we better vote for it." Walter moved that the article be adopted, seconded by Ed Condon and so voted.

ARTICLE XIII - Moderator read the article "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to retain the services of Mr. Robert Backus, Attorney-at-Law, to represent the Town with regard to the adequacy of off-site emergency planning." Walter Shivik commented that Mr. Backus has been involved in opposition to the N.R.C. at the hearings representing Towns and has appeared before the N.R.C. in terms of Licensing Hearings for the Seabrook Plant. He will be appearing on behalf of Towns with respect to the adequacy of the plan. The Town has the right to appear before the N.R.C. but often the N.R.C. makes a ruling that only a lawyer can speak. Walter moved the article, seconded by A.J. Harlow and so voted.

ARTICLE XVI - The Moderator read article "to see if the Town, out of concern for the health and safety of its citizens, will instruct its Selectmen and other appropriate public officials to work co-operatively with the New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency and other involved State agencies to help improve the Town's draft Emergency Response Plan which has been prepared in order to protect the public in the event of an accident at Seabrook Station or any emergency such as a major fire, flood, storm or toxic spill and, in so doing, to participate in the exercise conducted in cooperation with State and Federal officials to test the plan. This article is not intended to constitute final approval by the Town of the draft Emergency Response Plan. Upon Petition of Edward Condon and twelve other registered voters." Ed Condon explained that he was requested by the Seabrook Fire Chief to put this on the Warrant. Michael Santosuosso moved that the article be adopted, seconded by Ed Condon. The article was voted and lost.

ARTICLE AVII - Moderator read the article "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum. of \$500 to support the Hazardous Waste Collection Day organized by the Rockingham Flanning Commission." JoAnn Hill, Selectman, moved that the article be adopted as read by the Moderator, seconded by Walter Shivik and so voted.

ARTICLE XVIII - Moderator read article "to see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to dispose of surplus Town property."

Michael Santosuosso made a motion to adopt the article as read, seconded by Walter Shivik and so voted.

ARTICLE XIX - Transaction of Other Business.

Walter Shivik, Selectman, made a motion to see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift a 1985 Audi 4000S automobile to be used as the Town Folice Cruiser. Said gift is from Mr. Lutz Wallem, the Greater Eoston Audi Dealers and Volkswagen of America and its Audi Division, seconded by Peter Oldak and voted in the affirmative.

Walter Shivik, Selectman, moved that the appropriate officials of the State of New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (N.R.C.) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (F.E.M.A.) be notified that this Town believes that for many reasons a safe evacuation of the seacoast area is not possible and that therefore the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant should not be granted an operating license. The motion was seconded by William Carey and voted in the affirmative.

William Carey moved that the record of the meeting show the Town's appreciation to Lutz Wallem for the donation of the new Audi Police Cruiser, seconded by Fred Lindahl and so voted.

Lutz Wallem felt the Townspeople should thank the Selectmen for spending many hours working on a furnace to help a family in town.

Peter Bryant suggested a vote of thanks for Anne Verge's years of service to the Town as a Selectman.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:56 p.m.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held on June 28th, 1985 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. and read the Warrant.

ARTICLE I - JoAnne Morris moved to accept the Article as read "To see if the Town will authorize the Library Trustees to renovate the existing fire station into a library," seconded by Walter Goldthwaite.

Martha Anderson, Library Trustee, explained that the Library Trustees requested this meeting because they had applied for matching funds from the State and needed certification that they will have undisturbed use of the site for 20 years.

Charles Dennett did not feel the proposed building would be large enough for future growth of the Town.

Brud Weger, Architect, stated the building could serve the Town if the population doubled. He also made a diagram of the proposed building and site explaining how the area would be used.

Michael Clark asked the Selectmen what the setback requirements are.

Walter Shivik answered 25 feet. Michael Santosuosso added that the Fire Department has already been granted a variance and as it would still be a Town building, does not think it would need another appeal.

Several Townspeople commented that this site is the most convenient for the use of the school.

Vincent Early stated the article is out of order as it does not ask for the additional land. It was brought out that this Article does not mention a new building.

JoAnne Morris amended the article "to include the extra land the Library would need behind the Town Hall," seconded by Nancy Dennett. The amendment was voted and carried.

The amended article was voted in the affirmative.

Michael Santosuosso moved to adjourn the meeting a 8:16 p.m., seended by Paul Morris and so voted.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING SOUTH HAMPTON, N.H. DECEMBER 5th, 1985

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, cualified to vote in Town Affairs, held on December 5th, 1985 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

Moderator Horace Cressy read the Warrant. Lutz Wallem made a motion to open the meeting, seconded by Fred Anderson and so voted.

Michael Santosuosso moved that the Representatives from Civil Defense be given permission to speak, seconded by Walter Shivik and so voted.

ARTICLE I - The Moderator read the article "To see if the Town will prohibit New Hampshire Yankee or its agents from installing outdoor alerting systems (pole mounted sirens) within the Town of South Hampton until a Radiological Emergency Response Plan calling for such devices is approved by a Town Meeting." Fred Anderson moved Article I as read, seconded by Lutz Wallem.

Fred Anderson explained his reasons for requesting this meeting: The general public is not aware of many key elements of the plan, and the plan should not be approved until it has been publicly disclosed and debated. He discussed the proposed locations of the sirens - two would be located in Historic Districts. He felt that alternative notification systems should by studied.

Lutz Wallem felt we should get a legal opinion on whether the Town has the right to approve this plan.

Ed Condon, Fire Chief, stated that he was in favor of the planthe Town needs the sirens for warning. He commented that Civil Defense has put time into this plan and we won't know if it will work until we try it.

After much discussion, the Article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE II - Moderator Horace Cressy read the article "To see if the Town will prohibit Town Officials from participating in any State-run exercise or test of a Radiological Emergency Response Plan, until such plan is approved by a Town Meeting."

Lutz Wallem made a motion to accept the article as read, seconded by Fred Anderson.

Fred Anderson felt that allowing Town Officials to participate in the plan might be enough to convince the State and Federal Governments that South Hampton has a workable evacuation plan. He discussed a number of problems which in his opinion should be cause for its rejection. He suggested that the Selectmen appoint a committee to review the plan prior to its consideration at a future Town Meeting. The article was voted in the affirmative.

Lutz Wallem moved that the meeting be adjourned, seconded by Ed Condon and so voted.

Trustees Report - 1985

1985 was a year of progress and change for the Library Trustees. We continued to work with the librarian, Mrs. Carole McCarthy, to update our handbook of policies and standards.

The major project was to consolidate plans for library renovation under the state Library Construction and Services Act. We hired Mr. Brud Weger of the firm Noldesign (Hampton, NH) to draft a schematic design for the proposed library. This is on display in the Town Hall. At a special Town Meeting in June, the Town voted to allow the Library Trustees to renovate the fire station annex into a library. With this affirmation of support, the Trustees in July submitted the application for matching funds. An award of \$25,000 was made in September, matched by monies held in trust funds, by the Friends of the Library, and various pledges and donations. We are pleased that the award will allow us to work on this project for the benefit of the community and we thank Mr. Weger for his guidance.

In September Mrs. McCarthy submitted her resignation. The Trustees thank her for her many years of service and wish her luck in her new position. Since that time the library has remained open, staffed by the Trustees and part-time workers. Thanks to Mrs. Annette Krafton and Miss Mary Jo Souther for their help.

The Library continues to publish the local monthly newspaper "Town Crier". We thank those who have contributed to its financial support.

In preparation for the future move, we have been "weeding" books and cleaning the shelves. We held an open house book and mini-craft fair in December, and hope to have another in 1986.

We are making an effort to recover many overdue or missing books. Fines are 5¢ per day and must be paid on all overdue books, even those in the bookdrop. The library is now open 4 days a week and the hours have been adjusted to coincide with times the Town Clerk is in her office: Monday 7-9; Wednesday 12:30-4 and 7-9; Thursday 1-3; and Friday 9:30-12.

We wish to thank the townspeople for their continued support.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State Government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1,000.00 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000.00 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire los record.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1985

The Conservation Commission protects the Natural resources and advises Selectmen and Planning Board in Maintaining the quality of life for South Hampton residents. Our Town in 1973 was the first and the model for the state in its adoption of its Wetland Conservation District Ordinance. A New updated soils map is on view at the Town Hall upon request. Local law enforcement may now prosecute in District Court any violation of wetland dredge and fill laws. State legislation is pending to add alternate members to conservation commissions, so interested citizens are urged to ask for assignment.

The N.H. Office of State Planning projects that for this decade and the next, Rockingham County will have the fastest growth of population. South Hampton is downstream from several towns on the Powow River Watershed and upstream from one on the rivers course to the sea. Residents in South Hampton seek and deserve a safe and healthy invironment.

WE SUBMIT THIS REPORT ON THE MANAGEMENT OF YOUR SCHOOL FOR THE YEAR 1985. EACH YEAR WE REVIEW WITH YOU SOME OF THE DEVELOPMENTS THAT WE AS A BOARD DEAL WITH IN THE AREA OF EDUCATION, LEGISLATION AND MANAGEMENT.

BUDGET

AS BOARD MEMBERS, WE ARE CONSTANTLY AWARE OF OUR RESPONSIBILITIES AS ELECTED OFFICIALS, TO BE SENSITIVE TO COSTS AND THE FINANCIAL STRAIN ON TAXPAYERS AND ALSO TO INSURE A QUALITY EDUCATION FOR ALL STUDENTS IN SOUTH HAMPTON. OVER THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS YOUR SCHOOL BOARD HAS SHOWN FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY IN CUTTING COSTS IN AREAS THAT WE HAVE CONTROL OVER. THERE ARE AREAS SUCH AS FIXED CHARGES, TUITION, CONTRACTED TRANSPORTATION, SALARIES, ETC., THAT CANNOT BE ARBITRARILY CUT.

AS YOU WILL SEE FROM THE PROPOSED BUDGET OF 1986-87. THE SCHOOL BOARD HAS CUT \$3,365.00 FROM THE PROPOSED BUDGET. THE TOTAL FIGURE OF \$399,816.00 REFLECTS A 5.8% INCREASE OVER THIS YEARS BUDGET. THE BUDGET COMMITTEE IS PROPOSING THE SAME FIGURE - WITH ALL ACCOUNTS RECOMMENDED AS PROPOSED. THE SCHOOL BOARD HOPES TO EXPLAIN ALL AREAS OF THE BUDGET AT THE ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING ON MARCH 4, 1986. THERE ARE SOME AREAS IN THE PROPOSED BUDGET THAT REFLECT AN INCREASE OVER THIS YEARS BUDGET. ONE OF THESE AREAS IS FOR SALARY FOR AIDES. THE BOARD AGREED THAT IT WAS NECESSARY TO INCREASE THE HOURS FOR THE FIRST AND SECOND GRADE AIDE AS THERE WILL BE APPROXIMATELY 27 STUDENTS IN THOSE GRADES NEXT YEAR, A LARGE INCREASE OVER THE PRESENT ENROLLMENT. EDUCATION IN THE FIRST AND SECOND GRADES IS PERHAPS THE MOST IMPORTANT IN TERMS OF THE INDIVIDUAL TIME A STUDENT SHOULD HAVE WITH THE TEACHER. THE TEACHER AIDE IN THIS AREA HAS PROVED TO BE A VALUABLE ASSET IN ENHANCING THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS SET FORTH BY THE TEACHER AND INSURING QUALITY TEACHER/STUDENT TIME.

ANOTHER AREA OF INCREASE IS IN THE INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES ACCOUNT. THE SCHOOL BOARD AND ADMINISTRATION IS PROPOSING A NEW PROGRAM CALLED AFFECTIVE EDUCATION FOR GRADES ONE THROUGH EIGHT. IT IS OUR OPINION THAT THIS IS A VERY IMPORTANT PROGRAM AS IT DEALS WITH THE STUDENTS FEELINGS AND HOW THEIR ACTIONS AFFECTS OTHERS. OVER THE PAST FEW YEARS WE HAVE SEEN A DEFINITE INCREASE IN SERIOUS STUDENT DISCIPLINE PROBLEMS. THESE DISRUPTIVE ACTIONS TEND TO SPILL OVER INTO THE CLASSROOM AND ADVERSELY AFFECT EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS. AS IN THE PAST, IT IS OUR INTENT THAT A POSITIVE PROGRAM SUCH AS THIS WILL ENABLE US TO DEAL WITH THESE PROBLEMS IN OUR OWN DISTRICT RATHER THAN HAVING TO PLACE STUDENTS IN OTHER OUT-OF-DISTRICT PROGRAMS FOR TRIPLE THE COST.

TEACHER NEGOTIATIONS

THIS YEAR IS A NON-CONTRACT YEAR FOR TEACHERS. NEXT YEAR, THE LAST YEAR OF THE PRESENT CONTRACT, SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER MARGARET MILLER WILL REPRESENT SOUTH HAMPTON ON THE NEGOTIATION TEAM. FOR THE PAST NINE MONTHS, BOARD MEMBER JUDY SHIVIK HAS REPRESENTED SOUTH HAMPTON IN NEGOTIATIONS FOR A NON-CERTIFIED PERSONNEL CONTRACT, SPENDING MANY HOURS MEETING WITH OTHER REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NEGOTIATION TEAM ON A WEEKLY BASIS.

GOAL SETTING

IN LIGHT OF A RECENT STATE PROPOSED STANDARDS FOR' ELEMENTARY EDUCATION, THE SCHOOL BOARD HOPES, IN THE COMING YEAR, TO ESTABLISH A COMMITTEE OF INTERESTED CITIZENS AND BOARD MEMBERS TO STUDY THE EFFECTS OF THIS PROPOSAL IF ADOPTED BY THE STATE. IT IS ALSO OUR INTENT FOR THIS COMMITTEE TO HELP SET FUTURE EDUCATIONAL GOALS AND TO STUDY CURRENT AND FUTURE BUILDING NEEDS FOR OUR DISTRICT. THE SCHOOL BOARD HOPES TO ADDRESS THE IMPORTANCE OF GOAL SETTING AND THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE RECENT STATE PROPOSAL OF STANDARDS DURING THE OTHER BUSINESS PORTION OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING SET FOR MARCH 4, 1986.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON REPORT

AS MOST OF YOU KNOW, I AM NOT SEEKING REELECTION THIS YEAR. AFTER THREE TERMS I FEEL IT IS TIME TO STEP DOWN. I WOULD LIKE TO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO SHARE WITH YOU SOME PERSONAL THOUGHTS ON THE EDUCATION OF OUR STUDENTS. OVER THE YEARS IT HAS BEEN VERY EVIDENT TO ME, AS I STUDIED DATA COMPARING THE TESTING OF BARNARD STUDENTS AGAINST STUDENTS IN THE UNION AND ACROSS THE NATION. THAT WE PROVIDE AN EXCELLENT OVER-ALL EDUCATION FOR OUR CHILDREN. I FEEL THAT A LARGE PORTION OF THE CREDIT FOR THIS IS DUE, IN FACT, TO THE STAFF WE HAVE, IN THEIR DEDICATION TO THEIR PROFESSION ABOVE AND BEYOND WHAT IS EXPECTED OF THEM UNDER THEIR CONTRACT AND IN THE WAY THEY CONTINUE TO DEMONSTRATE A DEEP SENSE OF CARING FOR EACH INDIVIDUAL STUDENT. THE CITIZENS OF SOUTH HAMPTON, IN THEIR SUPPORT OF OUR SCHOOL AND IT'S BUDGET, CAN TAKE PRIDE IN ALL THAT HAS BEEN ATTAINED FOR ALL LEVELS OF OUR CHILDRENS EDUCATION. IN CLOSING, A SPECIAL THOUGHT GOES OUT TO ALL THE STUDENTS WHO HAVE GRADUATED, THOSE CURRENTLY ENROLLED AND THOSE WHO WILL ENROLL IN THE FUTURE: THEY ARE THIS TOWNS MOST PRECIOUS COMMODITY AND I HAVE ENJOYED WORKING WITH AND FOR THEM.

IN CONCLUSION, THE BOARD WOULD LIKE TO EXTEND OUR SPECIAL THANKS TO THE BARNARD SCHOOL TRUSTEES WHO CONTINUE TO HELP KEEP OUR BUILDING IN GOOD REPAIR AND TO THE ADMINISTRATION AND STAFF OF BARNARD SCHOOL FOR PROVIDING SOUTH HAMPTON STUDENTS WITH A VERY SUCCESSFUL ELEMENTARY EDUCATION.

To the Members of the School Board South Hampton School District South Hampton, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the South Hampton School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1985, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the South Hampton School District at June 30, 1985 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the South Hampton School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

The affective education program at the Barnard School includes all students and deals with the following goals.

A. Feelings and Actions

- Development of the child's ability to recognize and understand his/her feelings and the feelings of others.
- Development of the child's awareness of his/her behavior and the affect of his/her behavior on others.
- 3. Development of the child's understanding of how feelings relate to behavior.

B. Self-Awareness and Uniqueness

- 1. Enhancement of self-concept and development of self-esteem.
- Development of the child's awareness and acceptance of individual differences.
- C. Interpersonal Relationships and Problem Solving: Development of the child's ability to solve interpersonal problem situations through
 - 1. Defining the problem
 - 2. Formulating alternatives
 - 3. Considering the consequences of each alternative
 - 4. Accepting personal responsibility for actions

Again Federal Block Grants have been helpful to our computer program. The purchase of another computer has made our program more effective. The Computer Curriculum Committee has finished a curriculum guide which will be presented to the South Hampton School Board for review.

There is an increasing need for up-to-date reference materials for the students and staff at the Barnard School. Particularly required are encyclopedias, atlases, periodicals, and other materials related to a specific curriculum area.

In order to continue offering an excellent academic program there will need to be improvements to the physical plant. With the cooperation of the South Hampton School Board, the Barnard School Trustees, the residents of the town, the faculty, and the students, these improvements will come about.

In closing I would like to commend the staff at the Barnard School for continued excellence. This is exhibited in teaching ability and professional growth through courses, workshops, and individual study.
