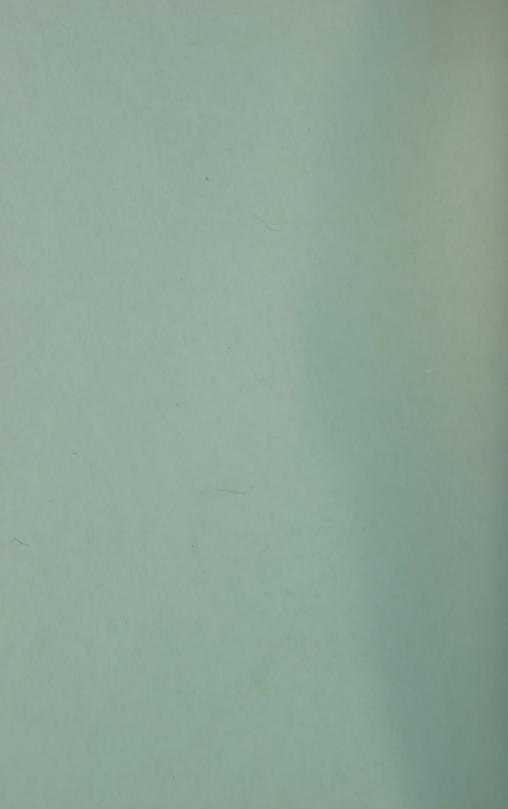

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TO THE CITIZENS OF STRATHAM

The Board of Selectmen for the last few years have recognized the need for some drastic changes in our highway, parks and cemetery conditions.

There have been however, several reasons why we have not recommended any changes in the past; one of which has been the need to purchase equipment to make these changes feasible.

This year with the start of Revenue Sharing by the federal government and the conditions attached to it, such as not to be used for schools, we feel that the Town should start to make the needed change from part time to full time help.

We, therefore, are recommending to the town this year, that they vote to put the road agent on a full time basis at a salary of \$200.00 per week and that he take charge of maintenance of parks and cemeteries owned by the town.

We are recommending in 1975 when a change in our dump becomes mandatory that this position be taken over by the highway agent.

To facilitate these changes you will find in the Town Warrant special articles to purchase equipment. These will include a truck and a loader to be purchased with monies from Revenue Sharing. Also, we are asking for a riding lawn mower for the parks and cemetery.

This year we are asking for more Police protection with the majority of the money increase to come from Revenue Sharing.

We hope this is a start to making your and our town a better place to live with the least amount of tax increase possible.

MINUTES TOWN MEETING 1972 March 14, 1972

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Mr. Walter Thyng.

W. Douglas Scamman, moderator, called the meeting to order at 8 p.m. with the reading of the warrant.

The results of the March 7, 1972 ballots were read with the results as follows:

Selectman, 3 years, Richard G. Scamman *, 414; Treasurer, 3 years, Kenneth F. Lanzillo *, 462; Town Clerk-Tax Collector, 3 years, Joyce A. Rowe *, 479; Highway Agent, 1 year, Ferdinand D Ekelund *, 470; Auditors, 1 year, Richard Paul *, 425; Arthur Weeks *, 405; Library Trustee, 3 years, Adelle M. Raymond, 183, Lucy Smith *, 262; Trustee Trust Funds, 3 years, George R. Brown *, 288, Arthur L. French, 94, Thomas L. Harvey, Jr., 82.

* Denotes those elected.

Article II. Do you approve of having two sessions for the annual town meeting in this town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen for transaction of other business? Yes, 342 - No, 87.

Article III. The budget was read by Laurence Foss, Chairman of the Budget Committee. Rudolph Bume asked comparisons to last years budget. Nelson Barker made a motion to amend item No. 8 to read \$1,175.00. Rudolph Bume seconded motion. The increase to be used for an engineer if necessary. Amendment passed. James Scamman made motion to increase item No. 11 by \$500.00 making it \$1,830.00. Ruth Nelson seconded. The added \$500.00 to be for the support of the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic in Portsmouth. Amendment passed. The motion to accept the total budget of \$90,554.42, with the county tax subject to change was so moved.

Article IV. James Scamman made motion to accept Article 4,

Charles Scamman seconded. Mr. Ted Seabrooke explained the function of a recreation committee. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article V. James Scamman made motion and John Hutton seconded. Pros and cons were heard from the floor. It was a negative vote.

Article VI. John Hutton moved article as read, Richard Scamman seconded. Highway Agent, Fred Ekelund explained the condition of the present plow. Affirmative vote.

Article VII. It was voted to change the wording to "and premises" under Purpose.

Section 1, Littering. Motion made by Richard Scamman to accept as read, Donald Barker seconded. Richard Scamman explained the reasons for putting regulations in warrant. Vote in the affirmative.

Section 2, Plant Life. Motion made by Richard Scamman to accept as read, John Hutton seconded. An amendment was offered and accepted to allow for the development prunning of trees with permission of the selectmen. Section two was then voted with amendment in the affirmative.

Section 3, Fires. Richard Scamman made motion to accept as read, John Hutton seconded. Dwight Crow offered the following amendment: Except with the permission of the selectmen or duly authorized forest fire warden. Donald Scamman seconded. The amendment was accepted. Section three was then voted with amendment in the affirmative.

Section 4, Camping, Tenting, etc. James Scamman offered the following amendment: This section shall not permit the use of Stratham Hill Park for recreational camping by responsible organizations upon securing a permit from the selectmen. John Hutton seconded. Negative vote.

Dwight Crow offered an amendment to read: Except with written permission of the selectmen. Nelson Barker seconded.

Affirmative vote on amendment. Nelson Barker made motion to table section 4 until next annual meeting: Richard Scamman seconded. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Section 5, Snow Machine and Motor Vehicles. Richard Scamman made motion to accept as read, Donald Scamman seconded. Vote in the affirmative.

Section 6, Horses. Richard Scamman made motion to accept as read, James Scamman seconded. Robert Corbin offered an amendment to add, common and town cemeteries. Seconded. Yes vote on the amendment. The amendment and section vote in the affirmative.

Section 7, Organized Groups. Richard Scamman made motion to accept as read, John Hutton seconded. Vote in the affirmative.

Section 8, Enforcement. Richard Scamman made motion to accept as read, John Hutton seconded, Vote in the affirmative.

Section 9, Penalty. Christopher Rowe made motion to accept as read, Robert Wiggin seconded. Vote in the affirmative.

Section 10, Severability Clause. Richard Scamman made motion to accept as read, James Scamman seconded. Vote in the affirmative.

Nelson Barker made motion that moderator appoint a committee of 5 people to study section 4 of this article. Richard Scamman seconded. Affirmative vote.

WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE Town of Stratham

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lower Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the sixth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance as follows: 5. To Substitute for Article IV A, Section A: "Any use permitted in the Agricultural-Residential District except dwelling units unless said dwelling units are physically attached to a building used for commercial purposes."

6. To Add to Article XIV: "M. Dwelling: A structure or portion thereof providing living quarters for one or more families but not including hotels, motels, rooms in a boarding house, or structures solely for transient or over night occupancy.

Section N, Dwelling Unit: A dwelling or portion thereof providing complete living facilities for one family including cooking facilities."

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance as follows: To Add to Article IV A, D:" - gasoline filling stations" and to Add "The following requirements shall apply to gasoline filling stations:

1) No more than one motor vehicle gasoline filling station shall be allowed per each three-hundred (300) vehicle registrations as recorded within the previous twelve-month yearly period by the Town Clerk.

2) All pump islands shall be set back at least thirty (30) feet from the front property line.

3) There shall be no more than two (2) thirty (30) foot wide curb cuts or access or egress points on any street.

For purposes of this article the following definitions shall apply:

a) Vehicle registration: Vehicle registration shall include each vehicle registered with the Town Clerk for which some amount of revenue or taxation remains with the Town of Stratham.

b) Gasoline filling station: Gasoline filling station shall include any pump or system of pumps dispensing gasoline to the public as it's primary purpose.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Ordinance as follows:

1. To Add to Article I: "Title and Construction, This Ordinance, and building regulations it contains, shall be known and may be cited as 'the Building Code of Stratham, New Hampshire' and for short form may be referred to as the 'Code'''.

2. To Substitute in Article I, Section I for "no building or structure shall be erected "the words" No building or structure shall be erected or demolished; no mobile or modular home shall be placed on a lot or foundation."

3. To Substitute for Article I, Section 2: "All matters concerning the construction, alteration, equipping, use or occupancy, location and main-

tanance, moving and demolition of buildings and structures shall be governed by the appropriate section of the latest edition of the National Building Code, as promulgated by the American Insurance Association, successor to the National Board of Fire Underwriters, 85 John Street, New York, New York, which is hereby adopted by reference as though set forth herein."

4. To Substitute for Article II, Exceptions, the following: "Section I, Validity of other laws. Nothing in this Code shall be construed to prevent the enforcement of other portions of this Code or state law which prescribe more restrictive limitations. The invalidity of any section or provision of this Code or these building regulations hereby adopted shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof. "Section 2, Materials and Methods of Construction. Nothing in this Code shall be construed to prevent the use of any material or method of construction whether or not specifically provided for in these building regulations if upon presentation of plans, methods of analysis, test data, or other necessary information to the Building Inspector by the interested person or persons the construction complies with specific provisions of or conforms to the intent of this Code."

5. To Add to Article III. Town Building Inspector, the following:

"Section 4. Right of Entry. The Building Inspector shall have the right in the performance of his duties, and at reasonable time, to enter, examine and inspect any premises or building within the town for the purposes of this or of the Zoning Ordinance. Where such entry is regused the Building Inspector may, for reasonable or probable cause shown, obtain such entry by search warrant on order of Court. The Planning Board, its members, officers, and employees, in the performance of its functions pursuant to this Code or of the Zoning Ordinance shall likewise have such right of entry to the extent and for all purposes set forth by RSA Chapter 36, Section 10, as amended.

"Section 5. Relief from Personal Responsibility. The Building Inspector charged with the enforcement of this Code shall not be personally liable while acting for the town in the discharge of his official duties. No oversight or neglect of duty on the part of the Building Inspector, however, shall legalize the erection, construction, alteration, repair or moving or any building or structure in a manner not conforming with the provisions of this Code. These same provisions as to relief from personal responsibility shall apply to the Planning Board, its members, officers and employees, acting in the performance of their functions, as set forth in Section 4 of this Code."

ARTICLE 5, Ordinance for the Fencing of Swimming Pools.

Purpose. To insure the health and safety of the people of the Town of Stratham more particularly to help prevent accidental drownings in swimming pools.

Section 1. All outdoor Articial pools which have a maximum depth of more than three feet when filled to capacity with water shall be surrounded by a substantial wall, fence, or other enclosure have a minimum height of 42 inches. In the event an articial pool has elevated sides higher than 42 inches and it is so constructed that a child cannot easily climb the pool sides or otherwise gain access to the pool, no fencing is required.

Section 2. The wall, fence or other enclosure shall be constructed so that a child will be unable to crawl under or through, or easily climb over it so that, in fact, the only easy access to the pool is a gate or door. All such gates or doors

shall be closed when the pool is not attended.

Section 3. All pools hereafter constructed must comply with this Ordinance, and all existing pools must comply by July 1, 1973.

Section 4. These requirements shall not apply to natural bodies of water such as ponds and streams, nor shall it apply to ponds constructed primarily for agricultural or conservation purposed.

Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be liable to pay a penalty of not more than \$10.00 for each day that the violation is in existence.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to exercise the power of Site Plan Review over non-residential development as authorized by RSA 36:19a.

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters for this town: To rezone to commercial use a parcel of land owned by Harold Piper situated on the Northerly side of Portsmouth Avenue, commencing at Stratham Lane and running Easterly toward Greenland for approximately 1600 feet? By petition of Harold Piper and thirty-five others.

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters for this town: To extend the commercial district from the boundary of Cadieux, and Elaine Pease, to the junction of Route 108, leading from Newfields? By petition of Elaine Pease and twenty-five others.

ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters for this town: To see if the Town will amend the First Sentence Only of the discription of Commercial District in the Zoning Ordinance to read as follows: Beginning at the Exeter Town Line of Portsmouth Ave; thence running northerly along the center line of Portsmouth Ave, to the northerly boundary of Land now or formerly of James Seavey and to carry a depth easterly and westerly of the center line of Portsmouth Ave. of four hundred (400) feet, and the easterly and westerly bound of this district to be parallel with the center line of Route 101 at all points." By petition of Richard Wiggin and twenty-four others.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a full time highway agent at a weekly salary of \$200.00 whose duties shall be as defined in RSA 245:6 and 7.

ARTICLE 11. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7000.00) to purchase a dump truck and authorize the withdrawal of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000,00) to purchase a John Deere Front end loader, and authorize the withdrawal of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000,00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to purchase a riding tractor mower and authorize the withdrawal of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to have the Noyes lot, so-called, adjacent to Stratham Hill Park administered by the Selectmen and Stratham Hill Park Association and dedicate the said Noyes lot to the same uses as the Park.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

Appropriation

Amount \$9000.00

Highways Town Maint., Summer & Winter

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.00) for a tax map of the Town of Stratham as required by the State of New Hampshire RSA 31:95-a, this money to be raised over a three year period.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as the official Town Seal, the basic seal used for the 250th Anniversary of the Town.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to regulate town lands or premises as follows: No person shall maintain, use or occupy overnight any tent, trailer, motor vehicle, or other mobile or temporary shelter on any town lands or premises, nor shall any person camp, tent, dwell or sleep overnight on any town lands or premises without specific permission from the board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 1% discount on such property taxes as are paid in full within 30 days from the day the Tax Warrant is committed to the Tax Collector, the date to be printed on the tax bill.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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WIGGIN MEMORIAL LIBRARY Yearly Report for 1972

1972 was a year of expansion for the Wiggin Memorial Library - we moved into the remodelled Children's Room downstairs. A round table was bought and set up in the Children's Room. Thanks are due to Mrs. Olive Calef who donated small chairs for the table which were painted bright colors by the Friends of the Library. We have had to delay carpeting this room because of water leaks from the roof. But the Friends have been busy raising money for this worthwhile project and when the floor is dry, we can proceed with the carpeting.

What was once the Children's area upstairs is now a browsing and study section. The reference books and current issues of magazines are in this section as is the physical relief globe which was donated to the library by the Civic Association.

A legal size filing cabinet was bought and the expanded pamphlet file placed in it. This pamphlet file contains pictures, articles and booklets on special subjects which might not be contained in books.

The display case has been moved back upstairs and we have had a series of monthly exhibits ranging from antique bottles to toys, thanks to the many collectors in town. This case is open to all local organizations or individuals who would like to set up an exhibit. Book displays in both the Children's Room and the browsing area are changed monthly.

Our services to the community have increased over the year, thanks to the continued financial support from the town. In May, the library hours were changed so that we are now open on Friday from 2 to 5 instead of Thursday and on Saturday from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. instead of 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. As our page of statistics shows: more books are being borrowed, more people are using the library and our record collection is very popular.

Children's services have included the monthly Family Film

Nights and the summer reading program which included film programs for the young and middle readers and ended with a trip to Hampton Playhouse for a matinee this year. A series of story and film programs for pre-schoolers was held during March through April and October to November. Films were shown to the Stratham Cooperative Kindergarten as well.

Members of our staff are available to assist local organizations in program planning, showing films and in finding special material.

We would like to express our thanks to the Friends of the Library, the Unity Club and all other townspeople who have given both time and money to our library. Our special gratitude to all the groups and individuals who donated magazine subscriptions to the library.

REPORT OF THE STRATHAM VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1972

The department in the year of 1972 has on its rolls 85 members. This makes the department one of the largest in the state. The department at this size consists of three teams. Each team is headed by two company officers. The teams operate as training units but on the fire scene all teams operate as a department. The forming of three team units has enabled more individual training to take place.

The department responded to 29 calls this year. The following is a summary of those calls:

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association provides skilled nursing and physical therapy services under the direction of the patient's physician. This may include home visits to administer injections, change surgical dressings, supervise medications and diet, record vital signs, draw blood, irrigate catheters, administer enemas, assist or teach the patient's family in regard to personal care, skin care, and cast care. Many visits are made to newborns and mothers for health and diet teaching and care of mother and infant. Patient's physically able to leave the home may receive injections at the VNA office. The physical therapist is available to patient's in establishing a home exercise program, teaching family exercise pattern and daily routine and evaluating need for any equipment necessary to rehabilitate a patient to his fullest potential as a contributing member of society.

Through our Well Child Clinic many children are receiving immunizations and physical examinations, vision and hearing screening, dental hygiene instruction, and diet teaching, who previously may not have because of financial problems or lack of follow-up in updating health care necessities.

Visits are also made to crippled children, tuberculosis patients, mental health and Veterans Administration referrals. Assistance is also given to patients in understanding Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross-Blue Shield, and eligibility for these benefits.

Through the VNA hospital based Home Health Coordinator, patients are now receiving continuity of care after hospital discharge to the home.

The above services are provided to everyone in the community - the young, old, aged, pregnant mothers, and all economic groups for the purpose of promoting, maintaining or restoring health, or minimizing the effects of illness and disability. Better health care knowledge prevents accidents, illness, and disease, and saves many health dollars.

There are many ways to get home health care: (1) The patient's physician may contact the VNA office, (2) The patient can contact the VNA office directly, (3) A spouse, relative, friend may contact the VNA office, or (4) Another agency or referral source may refer a patient for home health care.

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STRATHAM ANNUAL DISTRICT SCHOOL MEETING

March 13, 1972

The Annual District School Meeting, Union 16 was held at the Stratham Memorial School. The meeting was opened by Moderator William P. Roberts at 8:35 P.M.

Deacon Robert Corbin presented the Invocation. The Moderator read the School Warrant and proceeded to act on the Articles.

Article 1. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers hereto chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Robert Goodrich, chairman of the Building Committee recommended that this committee be kept another year. He stated that no construction was necessary at this point.

Fred Hutton made the motion that this committee be kept another year and Rod Herrick seconded. So voted.

Article 2. To see if the School District will vote to approve the operating responsibility for the Rockingham School for Special Children by School Supervisory Union 16 effective July 1, 1972, for the purpose of providing educational services for the handicapped students in each of the districts of School Supervisory Union 16.

The total operating costs of this school to be apportioned to the several sending towns on a per pupil basis formula as determined by the Joint Boards of the Union.

Douglas Scamman, Jr. motioned to adopt this Article and it was seconded by Robert Corbin. So voted.

Article 3. To see if the District will:

a. Approve the dual enrollment plan between the school district of Stratham and the St. Thomas Aquinas High School,

said plan to be (see description plan below) and which plan shall be administered by the school district of Dover, and further authorize the school board to sign necessary agreement to implement the program.

b. Authorize the school board of Stratham to assign certain students, who are residents of the district of Stratham to the dual enrollment classes administered by the district of Dover and further authorize the school board to make such contractual arrangements that may be necessary to implement said assignment of students.

c. Appropriate the sum of \$738.00 for the payment of the cost of tuition incurred by the assignment of said students to the dual enrollment program administered by the district of Dover at St. Thomas Aquinas High School and to authorize the school board to apply for any grants under RSA 198:21, which funds will be credited to the district.

(Description of Plan – Educational offerings will be provided approximately 5 students at St. Thomas Aquinas High School for the school year 1972-73: Algebra, Math 9, Geometry, Biology, Advanced Biology, Physics, Electronics, Art and Physical Education.

The faculty will consist of an administrative staff and 8 1/5 teachers.)

Robert Goodrich moved and Robert Corbin seconded that Article 3 be passed. Discussion and explanations followed. W. Douglas Scamman, Sr. moved that an Amendment be added that this dual enrollment plan be limited to these two students.

The Amendment passed and then Article 3 was voted and this also passed.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of stutery obligations of the District.

W. Douglas Scamman, Jr. moved that \$355,921.00 be appro-

priated for the school budget. Robert Corbin seconded. Chairman Scamman then read and explained the budget. Very few questions were asked. So voted.

Article 5. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

No action was necessary on this Article.

Article 6. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

No other business and meeting adjourned at 9:12 P.M.

ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT Stratham, N. H. 1972

Continuously increasing enrollment at Stratham Memorial School became more obvious during the past year. In fact, as the result of an enrollment of forty-three students in grade two in September, the School Board established a second class at that time.

Rising enrollment prompted the Board to establish a space needs committee to study the present and future enrollment needs of the community. As part of their tasks, the members of this committee conducted the annual school census. It appears that the present school situation will change very little during the next three years. However, space will continue to be at a premium.

Contributing to the complexity of the situation are the uncertainty of housing starts and future student in-migration.

Principal David Michaud has emphasized in his annual report the importance of the volunteer aide program to the Stratham Memorial School. These volunteer aides have assisted in both the library and classrooms. He extended his thanks to the people in the community who have given so much of their time and effort.

One of the major educational developments affecting Stratham and the other towns making up Supervisory Union 16 was the approval of the S. U. 16 staff development plan by the State Board of Education. As the result of becoming the first supervisory union to participate in the new plan, S. U. 16 will serve as a pilot model for all other New Hampshire school districts.

In the past, educators went about the recertification process through the accumulation of course credits. Sometimes, these credits were part of a special program or degree. However, in many instances they were not geared to a special need of an individual. The staff development plan requires each educator to assess his needs every three years and then develop specific objectives for meeting the recognized needs. A staff development team, with a representative from each town, serves as a steering committee, and approves or disapproves individual programs.

A second development affecting all six S. U. 16 towns was the assumption of the operation and management of the Rockingham School in Exeter. This took on "added significance due to passage of legislation making education mandatory for all handicapped children. A Rockingham School Board, made up of a representative from each S. U. 16 town, meets bi-monthly with the school superinterident and the school principal.

The lack of state funds is most obvious in this situation. The operating funds for the school are raised entirely through tuition. The tuition rate for 1973-74 will remain at the current \$1400.00 figure. Hopefully, the school will enroll the sixty pupils needed to meet operating expenses of \$84,000.00 for the 1973-74 school year.

In previous reports, my predecessor has expressed his concern over the financial funding of education in New Hampshire. As stated last year, New Hampshire now ranks 50th in regard to state support of local education. Such decreased state support has led to further financial pressure for the property holder.

Despite pressing financial problems, the staff has continued to perform admirably and the community has supported educational programs. Five months of observation lead the writer to believe that there is an absence of frills in our school; rather, I am impressed by the quality and commitment of teachers and administrators.

Increased enrollment at the AREA Junior and Senior High Schools has been under study by both the Exeter School Board and the Space Needs Committee of Exeter. Stratham's representative to the AREA Advisory Committee is also aware of the present large class sizes at the AREA Junior High School and the lack of classroom spaces in certain subject areas at the Senior High School. If elementary enrollment continues to decline in Exeter, it will be possible to transfer some or all sixth grade classes currently attending the Junior High School to the elementary schools. This would open up needed space at the AREA Junior High School. At the High School, the alternative education plan gives some flexibility, though space is at a premium and a record enrollment is projected by 1975.

Tuition rates for 1973-74 at both the Junior High School and the Senior High School show little increase. At the Junior High School, the rate increased by just one dollar to \$795.00 while the High School rate went up by \$27.00 to \$1,027.00. The \$27.00 increase at the Senior High School represents the lowest increase in four years.

As the result of increased insurance valuation on both the AREA Junior High School and the AREA Senior High School, the rental rate was recalculated by the Exeter School Board and approved by the AREA school districts. The tuition rate for 1973-74 as announced by the Exeter School Board and approved by the State Department of Education:

In accord with the AREA contract, these estimates per pupil costs for 1972-73 are the basis for determining tuition rates for the 1973-74 school year. As mentioned above, the rental charge is added to complete the tuition cost. These tuition figures for 1973-74 compare most favorably with the state average per pupil costs of \$896.00 per high school pupil and \$799.00 per junior high school pupil, exclusive of rental charge. What makes the local rates more favorable is that the state average is for the

1971-72 school year. Thus the state costs are two years behind the AREA tuition figure.

Major priorities for the future include the introduction of a career education program for elementary students, increased emphasis on reading at all levels, and the utilization of better planning and management approaches.

1973 REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR Daniel C. Durgin

This past year has been a most significant one for Supervisory Union 16 in terms of changes in certain procedures and personnel.

I will not dwell on personnel changes except to say that we have had a change of personnel in no less than four positions, including the superintendency, since my last report. All of these changes occurred last summer during a very difficult time for our office because of the many year end reports, and it was only through the extreme dedication of our entire staff that we were able to accomplish our duties and meet our deadlines.

In my last report to you I mentioned the impending conversion of our manual payroll procedures to a mechanized process effective July 1, 1972. The conversion was indeed accomplished and I am delighted to report that, with the exception of some minor start up difficulties, the transition was smooth and relatively uncomplicated. The success we have achieved with this new system can be attributed to the fine cooperation we have had from the staff of the Accounting and Data Processing sections of Phillips Exeter Academy whose services we purchase and the dedication of our secretarial and clerical staff, especially payroll clerk Nancy Kucharski.

The duties and responsibilities of the Supervisory Union Office continue to increase necessitating redistribution of work in some cases and creating additional staff needs. This summer the state mandated an entirely new accounting procedure for federal funds which required a considerable number of hours of workshop time on the part of two of our staff members and has added a great deal of time to our bookkeeping process. It is requirements such as the foregoing which, although necessary in most cases, exert constant and increasing pressures on central offices.

Space needs committees, building committees and school construction have become familiar fixtures in most school systems including S. U. 16. East Kingston opened their new

elementary school this past September (1972) and the staff and students are now enjoying the new facility.

Currently under construction is an addition to the Swasey Central School in Brentwood. Plans call for the new facility to contain six classrooms and a resource center. Demountable walls will be employed in certain areas allowing the flexible utilization of space. We are looking forward to occupancy prior to the close of the 1972-73 school year.

The School District of Kensington has a Building Study Committee which has been active for the past two years. The committees' proposal for an addition to the Kensington Elementary School was tabled at the 1972 Annual District Meeting and a similar plan will be offered to the voters at the 1973 meeting.

The School Districts of Exeter and Stratham also have study committees actively working in the area of space needs.

REPORT OF TEACHER CONSULTANT Frederick B. King

Last Spring I submitted to Concord under a Federal Application of Title I ESEA a program to aid children having learning disabilities with a special program. We have received this grant and are underway with the planning of a program.

A learning disability exists when the individual's actual performance or achievement in any given area of school work is found to be far below his capacity or potential. We have many of these pupils in our school. With a special team of three learning disability specialists on our staff we will identify with the classroom teachers the children who fit the above definition. The primary objectives in helping these children is the identification and the remediation of specific disabilities. We will concentrate on the first three years of the child's school life.

As I have worked in the elementary school of Union 16 I have been aiming toward a higher per cent of school success for all children at the primary level. We introduced transition education a few years back aimed at children of first grade entrance age who needed a different program for a year because of immaturity. These children could not have met success in the first year of school under the regular program. Has this been successful? Recent tests results show that children now in grade two that have had transition education are highly successful. 76% of the children who had transition education scored above the National norm in a recent reading test.

We have also been exploring new reading programs. Through a Federal Grant new materials have been tried in selected first and second grade rooms. We are currently analyzing the results of tests and children's performance and we expect to make some major decisions shortly on the kind of reading program that we feel will best suit the needs of our pupils starting school in the fall of 1973.

We will continue to explore and plan for new programs at the elementary level in order to have each child reach his maximum potential. It is my belief that getting children off to a good school start will pay dividends later as these children move into higher levels of education. It is exciting and rewarding to see education change in order to serve more children better. The objectives of the educational setting are clear. Much of my work is to find the means by which all of us together can reach the objectives of educating each child to his potential and making him a good citizen for this community.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES Stratham Memorial School

To the Superintendent of Schools:

For the past few months I have spent my time getting organized and oriented to the duties and responsibilities of my position as school nurse. During this year, routine health screening measures will be done as in past years. In fact, most of the routine annual measures, including physicals, has already been completed. Presently we are surveying parents to see if there is a need for a Booster Clinic. This will be held at Pre-school registration time, and will be open to children already in school as well as those about to enter.

With the cooperation of the Principal and staff, we have tried to incorporate health education into the over-all curriculum. Using speakers, films and filmstrips, such areas as dental care, personal hygiene, nutrition, and safety will be covered. With problems of drug abuse increasing, we will be doing some classroom presentations in this area - the emphasis being on awareness and prevention. While I don't feel that we presently have any problems within our elementary school, I do feel that we should prepare the children for the day when they may encounter such situations.

I would like to express thanks to those volunteers who have helped with the School Health program in the past. I hope that I will have their continued support. I would like to express my appreciation of the support of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal David Michaud, members of the staff, and Dr. John Tuthill, school pediatrician, for their help and cooperation this year.
