

GEORGE K. RIPLEY

1893-1983

Now is the appropriate time to pay tribute to George K. Ripley for his tremendous contributions to the Town of Troy. He devoted his energies to the economy of Troy through the continuity of the Troy Mills operation and to the politics of the town through many years of public service as town moderator, chairman of the budget committee, and member of the fire and water boards. In addition, he served many years on the Troy school board as did his father before him, who, in 1894, was a member of the building committee for constructing the first brick school building, still in use at the end of School Street. His outstanding community service also included strong support of the Congregational Church in Troy and, in later years, with his wife, Marguerite, the Immaculate Conception Church of Troy. He was instrumental in the expansion of the Gay-Kimball library, in particular through his family donation to construct the Ripley reading room.

George Ripley was born in Troy in 1893 and graduated from Keene High School, Amherst College and Lowell Textile School before serving in the armed forces. He joined Troy (Blanket) Mills in 1919, serving as President from 1932 to 1962. This was a period of major growth and the institution of revolutionary changes in products and markets in order to survive in a declining industry.

George Ripley was a past president of the N.H. Manufacturers Association, Nature Conservancy of N.H., and received a doctor of laws degree from St. Anselm College. He was a director of the Keene National Bank, a trustee of the Cheshire County Savings Bank and an honorary member of the Keene Rotary Club.

He was a 55-year member of the directors of the Cheshire County YMCA and served 30 years as president. He was a director of the Monadnock Humane Society and in 1968 donated the ambulance to the organization.

Whereas, the above accomplishments have exerted a major beneficial influence on the well-being and development of the town of Troy and the Monadnock Region, the Selectmen of the town of Troy hereby dedicate this 1983 Town Report to the memory of George K. Ripley.

# RECOGNITION OF VOLUNTEER FIRE SERVICE

Volunteerism plays a big part in getting things done in the Departments and Committees of a small New Hampshire Town.

We are pleased to be able to recognize Victor Magnani, a long-time Troy resident, a volunteer Fireman and Deputy Forest Fire Warden.

Victor began his fire service as a volunteer in his home town of Fitzwilliam in 1926. He served on their Fire Department until he moved to Troy in the fall of 1942. Applying to the Troy Volunteer Fire Department, he was made a member in March of 1943 and is still a very active member.



# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

# **TOWN WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 13th of March, next at 10:00 in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles 1 and 2, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 14th of March next at 7:30 P.M. to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

Article 1: To bring in your votes for one Selectman for three years, and for all other Town Officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting or State Statutes for the specified number of years.

## PROPOSED ZONING REGULATIONS

# INDUSTRIAL ZONE Troy, New Hampshire

### INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT

An Industrial District is located close to the developed core of the Town, with access to its major highways, to create an area where a limited amount of industrial activity can be accommodated to provide a complete balance of development potential for the community. Permitted uses in the Industrial District are as follows:

- 1. Any industrial use or process which is not obnoxious or offensive or deleterious to health by reason of gas, odor, smoke, vibration, liquid discharge, illumination, noise or appearance, and which does not constitute a public hazard whether by fire, explosion, or otherwise.
- 2. Plants for the processing and distribution of milk, dairy, and food products for human consumption, and for bottling or packaging beverages, pharmaceuticals, and toilet preparations, perfumes, and similar products. No operation involving the rendering of fats, oils, viscera, or which does not meet the standards of paragraph #1 is permitted.
- Research and experimental laboratories, excluding live animal experimentation.
- 4. Publishing, printing, bookbinding, or informational services.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance and Map in order to establish an Industrial Zone in the vicinity of the sewage treatment plant and to establish the regulations for the use of land in said Industrial Zone. (to be voted on by ballot)

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town Expenditures and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to support public services as recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as necessary to support Town Departments as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. Highway Summer & Winter \$60,000.00
- b. Police \$45,500.00
- c. Fire \$19,325,00
- d. Overseer of the Poor \$21,000.00
- e. Dogs \$1,000.00
- **Article 6:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 for the care of the cemeteries. \$9,000.00 to come from the Trust Funds, as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- Article 7: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$24,016.55 that the Town received from the State for the calendar year 1984 for maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and Class V highways.
- **Article 8:** To see if the Town will vote to raise \$95,000.00 for the Water/Sewer Department as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- **Article 9:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 for the Gay-Kimball Library as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- **Article 10:** To see if the Town will vote a sum of money (\$139,994.48) for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of N. H. will be \$119,994.48. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- **Article 11:** To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Forest Fire Supervision as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Department to remove the present fire alarm system, leaving two "pull" fire alarm boxes in service. One to remain on the outside of the Town Hall and the other outside the Fire Station.
- Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to recondition and repair the fire alarm system with this reconditioning and repairs to be done in 1984. The Telephone Company is replacing all the poles that the alarm wiring and pull boxes are on. Not ecompany and by the Budget Committee.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereof:

a. Reassessment of Town - (1986) - \$1,500.00 b. Fire Department - \$5,000.00 c. Highway Department - \$5,000.00 d. Police Department - \$2,000.00

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon: as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. Gay-Kimball Library Operations \$1,000.00
- b. Senior Citizens Elderly Activities \$1,000.00
- c. Town Hall General Repairs \$2,000.00

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$20,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Highway Department for the purchase of a new 1 ton dump truck with plow. This is to replace the present 1977 1 ton truck. The proceeds resulting from the sale of the 1977 truck to go into the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$10,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Highway Department so that they may negotiate for the purchase of a used diesel powered loader. The present loader to be either traded or sold. If sold the proceeds to go into the Capital Reserve Fund of the Highway Department. The balance to be paid by a short term note over the next two years. \$30,000.00 recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$6,000.00 from the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund to purchase a used vehicle to be used as a Police Cruiser, when in the opinion of the Selectmen, the present cruiser is no longer economical to maintain. Also to allow the proceeds from the sale of the present cruiser to be placed in the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund. The transfer of equipment from the present cruiser to the newer one will be included in the \$6,000.00. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$20,000.00 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a 1 ton cab & chassie and equipment needed to replace the 1956 Dodge Fire Truck. The proceeds of the sale of the 1956 Dodge Fire Truck to go into the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

- Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to establish a Capital Reserve Fund as provided in RSA 35:1 (supp) and RSA 149-1:10 (supp), said Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the financing of all or part of the cost of (a) the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of a specific capital improvement pertaining to the sewer system of the town, or the acquisition of a specific item or specific items of equipment pertaining to the sewer system of the town, or (b) the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of a type of capital improvement or the acquisition of a type of equipment pertaining to the sewer system of the town, expenditures from said fund shall be made only by a majority vote of the legal voters present and voting at an annual meeting of the town under a proper article in the warrant.
- Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water/Sewer Commissioners to transfer any unencumbered surplus funds from the operation of the sewer system to the capital reserve fund created under Article 20 of the 1984 annual meeting of the Town of Troy to provide for capital improvements and capital equipment pertaining to the sewer system or the sewage treatment facilities.
- Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to change the position of Police Chief from a Part Time Position to a Full Time Position. (By Petition)
- Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to reduce the number of Street Lights by twenty-four (24). (By Petition)
- Article 24: To see if the Town will vote that a Selectperson shall not serve the Town of Troy in any paying capacity but that of Selectperson, and at the current rate of pay for Selectpersons. (By Petition)
- Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to change the manner in which the police chief is selected from appointed by the Selectmen to elected by the town meeting annually. (By Petition)
- Article 26: If the Town votes affirmatively on Article 25 (above) then to see if the Town will vote to elect a police chief until the next annual meeting. (By Petition)
- **Article 27:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant a cable television franchise in accordance with RSA 53-C: 1-5.
- Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee of 6 to study and come up with a recommendation for a Memorial, Memorials, or a plaque for recognition of the Town of Troy Veterans of World War II, the Korean War and the Viet Nam Conflict to be placed on the Troy Common. At present there is one for World War I. The Committee to consist of the Commander of Edward Boufford Post #56 Troy, one Troy Member of VFW Post and the remaining four to be appointed by the Town Moderator. If passed a report or an article will be brought forward at the 1985 Town Meeting.

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote for the adoption of RSA 654:34-a as follows: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 654:34-a permitting applications for changes in party affiliation to be made with the Town Clerk?"

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to authorize the Water/Sewer Board to hire a forester to selectively cut timber on the watershed of the Town resevoir, and to allow the proceeds from the sale of the timber to be placed in the Water Department Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 31: To see if the Town of Troy shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Troy, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire." (By Petition)

Article 32: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of a certain tract of land identified as Map 12, Lot 41A on the tax maps and listed as "Town of Troy" in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:05-b.

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 36: To hear reports or committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year was the first year of semi annual billing for tax bills. We feel that it went fairly smooth and that most of the errors and bugs are now out of the system. It is important that the people who own property, that they do not live in, keep the Selectmen informed of their current address. Also people who own rental property should insure that the Census Requirement on the Inventory of Taxable Property that you will receive in March of this year is properly filled out. This will assist in the computation of the Resident Tax list.

As most of you have noticed, we had to remove one of the gazbos from the Common this fall. It was almost completely destroyed by a few teenagers and some a little younger. This is too bad, as we have a good looking common and center of town which most people enjoy.

It is only a few who destroy the improvements to the town. They are known and stronger action will have to be taken in the near future. We ask that the parents of these few that hang out on the common at unreasonable hours for young people find out where their children are. Find out what is going on in the early hours of the morning and have them home. It is only a few, but they are headed for trouble in the future if this situation is not cleared up immediately.

Everyone seems to be well pleased with the flower gardens that were planted and cared for by the Senior Citizens last year and are encouraging them to continue their great volunteer work improving the center of town.

One of the most important things we did in 1983 was to establish the Industrial Development Committee. Its main purpose is to attract industry to the Town of Troy. Industry is desperately needed to expand the tax base of the town. We have the land, service, and location for small light business in town. In addition to added tax base to help reduce our tax rate, some jobs will become available to the residents.

In the past few years the few houses that were built couldn't even keep us on the same level. With the Federal Government cutting back on Revenue Sharing to the town (from \$25,000. in 1983 to \$17,000. in 1984) with the state cutting back 6% on Revenue to towns from the gas tax, and the state stopping the 5% per year increase in the Business Profits Tax and reducing it another 4%, you can see we need to have a better tax base.

The Industrial Development Committee and Selectmen feel

strongly that the work of this committee in attracting some kind of business or businesses is vital to the operation of the Town of Troy. When we add a mobile home or a house, and school age children are involved, we loose because of the cost of tuition.

We ask that everyone back the proposals of the Planning Board and the Industrial Development Committee. The committee can use some more members who are interested in seeing us attracting industry.

The selected spot for an Industrial Park is roughly between the end of Dort Street and the gate to the sewer plant.

With income from outside sources going down, and cost of services, mostly in the County, Welfare and Health related organizations going up, this should be a special priority for all residents of the town.

In closing, now that the sewer plant is 98% complete, we invite you to visit it so that you can see the magnitude of the finished construction.

### REPORT OF THE TOWN ROAD AGENT

In the last five months of 1983 the following improvements were made to the Town roads. All the dirt roads were ditched and regraded. On Quarry Road, South St. and Bigelow Hill Road ditches and culverts were cleaned. The roads were regraded, a pug mix was put down, then sealed with road oil. On the rest of the roads, pot holes were patched, some ditches were cleaned and brush was cut.

In 1984 the Highway Dept. plans to reconstruct Gap Mt. Road from Route 12 to the top of the first hill, reconstruct the paved portion of Richmond Rd, reconstruct West Hill Road from Mackey Road to Verbergs. One third of the Town roads that were newly paved as the result of the installation of sewer lines in Town will be sealed this year.

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

This year the library trustees hired Mr. William Hurst to paint the exterior trim and the indoor ceilings of the building. The cellar renovation continued with Mr. Robert Condon hired to plaster the walls. Our chairman, Keith Kuningas, painted the walls when the plaster had dried sufficiently. The warped ceiling panels have been replaced with styrofoam; labor having been donated by Romain Whitcomb and Keith Kuningas. The children's area is now ready for flooring and furniture.

Our outdoor bulletin was painted by Ralph Eaton, and has been decorated for different months by Doralee Watkins and Kathy Marrotte. These people have made significant contributions both to the library and to our town.

The elementary grades each visited the library during the spring months. The children were introduced to library services, geared to their interest level, and enjoyed a brief storytime. Each child was given a book mark, library logo pin, and a family registration card as he left.

On June 25 we held a book sale, the success of which was due in large measure to Selectman William Matson who supplied us with many books culled from the Fort Devens library. Money from the sale will be used in furnishing the children's room.

The library also took part in the Troy Art Festival by sponsoring the collection of money toward the repair of the Statue of Liberty. We were able to send only \$35.00 from the town of Troy, but the day held many nice experiences, and those who donated seemed happy for the opportunity to do so.

Our summer reading program was designed in conjunction with the Reading Rainbow program on public television. Miss Lisa Lawrence, young library volunteer, managed the program for us. Upon joining each child was given a "raindrop" which climbed the colorful rainbow designed by Kathy Marrotte. Those whose "raindrops" completed the climb were given refreshments, certificates and a rainbow magnet at a small party.

In July the New Hampshire State Library felt compelled to end the van loan service. Our library had borrowed 800 volumes, and had hoped to increase that to 1,000 books each visit, but budget cuts at the state level forced the closing of the whole operation. This does not affect the regular interlibrary loan service, nor service to the handicapped. I have begun a block loan of relatively current material with the Frost Free Library in Marlborough. We have managed to exchange 12-15 books several times this past year,

thereby increasing the availability of material to readers in both towns. This can only be done on a limited basis, so the state service will be sorely missed.

In October we acquired a copier for use of library patrons through the good offices of the selectmen. This will be a welcome service to many.

Gifts to the library during the past year included a fund in memory of George K. Ripley, and a donation in memory of Mildred Stone. The latter was used as requested by the donor for the purchase of Junior reference works and books in large print. Mrs. Alice Morrison donated a Replogle globe. Many people donated books and paperbacks, for which we are grateful. Total circulation for the year was 10,307 volumes.

## REPORT OF THE TROY FIRE DEPT.

During 1983, Troy was spared any major fire loss.

Late in December we were able to purchase a used piece of apparatus after looking for two years. The truck was built by Farrar, a fire apparatus manufacturer which the town has done business with in the past. The truck was purchased from Mobile Maintenance Service of Easthampton, Mass., and is a 1973 Ford. The pump is a 1000 gallon per minute single stage Barton American and the truck carries 500 gallons of water.

As you read through the articles in the town warrant, you will see two articles dealing with the fire alarm system, one of which calls for the removal of the system except for two boxes, one at the town hall and the other at the fire station. The second article calls for expending \$3,500.00 to repair the system.

The alarm system today has eight pull boxes. They are box 55, Troy town hall; box 54, Monadnock and Nelson St.; box 52, South Main St. and Fitzwilliam Rd.; box 47, fire station; box 46, Central Square and High St.; box 41, North Main St.; box 53, end of School St; and box 21, Troy School. A nineth box 42 was located on High Street, but it was removed during the year because the outer case was damaged beyond repair.

The reason we are forced to make this decision is the telephone company has replaced telephone poles both north and south of the Troy Common along route 12 and our fire alarm wires must be removed if we want to keep the system as it is.

Because of the cost of up keep and lack of use over the past few years, the department is taking the position that the pull boxes should be removed.

The Board of Engineers wish to thank the many citizens who have helped the department during the year and also the members of the department for their professional response to alarms.

### TROY POLICE DEPARTMENT

The past year has been a difficult one for the Troy Police Department. Residents continue to appear to have an increased desire and need for services as evidenced by the case-load, which over the past three years has increased approximately 40%; yet over the last three years, the monies appropriated for the police department have decreased.

If this situation continues, residents can and should expect changes in the types of services and hours of coverage. The complexities of the law (state and federal), legislative changes in law enforcement, and the liabilities facing all towns all require a high level of skill and training for any police personnel. It is costly for the personnel to attempt to perform their responsibilities if they do not have the proper training. The approach of decreasing funding is not cost effective and results in a waste of tax-payer dollars.

Troy appears to want 24 hour protection and has made it clear that it wants it's problems handled by the Troy Police Department, which I totally support, but I feel individuals have forgotten that we need their backing and support if we are to accomplish this objective. Decreasing funds and positions can only result in a decrease in services.

When citizens are in need, they call upon the police department and they expect results. The police department is now in need of your support and only with this support can the police department continue to provide the level of services that residents expect.

Again, I would like to thank those individuals who have been supportive to the police department, and I especially want to express my appreciation to the members of the Troy Police Department who have continued to perform their jobs during this difficult period.

We hope, with the help of Troy Mills, the clarity of the water can be improved this year by lowering the water level and clearing out the beaver dams.

The biggest improvement for 1984 will be the addition of flush bathroom facilities at both the Sand Dam and Farrar Field due to matching funds from the government.

The Thursday night movies were very popular this past summer with an average attendance of 150 people. The committee would like to thank the businesses and organizations that provided financial assistance to pay for the movies. We hope that summer movies will be back in 1984.

The committee would like to extend a special "thank you" to everyone who has worked on the Farrar Field which is now one of the top fields in the Greater Keene Softball League.

### SUMMARY - AGENCY-WIDE SERVICES

In addition to the Keene District Office program, many other specialized services are provided by the agency and available to your residents. They include 24-hour emergency service, day treatment and inpatient services provided in cooperation with Cheshire Hospital, specialized services to patients returning from long-term hospitalization as well as consultation and education services. Case Management services, psychological/psychiatric testing, and housing services are also services provided by Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

These services are primarily supported with state monies, which combined with local support and fees, make it possible for the agency to provide comprehensive mental health services to southwestern New Hampshire.

### TROY ARTS FESTIVAL - 1983

The Arts Festival held 7/30/83 should be considered a successful event for the Town of Troy. Attendance was good, the crafts people and community groups did well and the weather held out for another year.

The group decided that the Committee should use the appropriated Town funds for the event and not depend upon generating revenue. No admission or percentage of gross profit was required from exhibitors in order to encourage participation by more local crafts people and to allow local groups to profit from participating in the event. This seemed to work out quite well.

The Committee felt the festival was a success in most respects. We should plan to meet once in January so we can prepare a proposal to be considered at the March Town meeting and then schedule planning meeting later.

I would like to thank all of the people who helped make the festival a success and hope that we can plan on a better festival next year, the last Saturday in July, July 28, 1984.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise \$60,000.00 for the Water Department. Fred Lawrence stated that due to an error in typing, there should have been another \$5,000.00 added for the Water Department to restore the supplemental well to original condition. Therefore Article 7 was amended to read: To see if the Town will vote to raise \$65,000.00 for the Water Department. Passed as amended.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$11,250.00 for the Gay-Kimball Library. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 to be used by the Troy Industrial Development Committee. The expenditure of money to be used by the Committee with the approval of the majority of Selectmen for expenditures involved in promoting the development of the Troy Industrial Park. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase an ambulance for an amount not to exceed \$40,000.00 and provided that the Troy Emergency Ambulance Service, Inc. donates an amount equal to the purchase price of the ambulance, less whatever money is provided by the sale or trade of the present ambulance. Said ambulance will continue to be operated by the Troy Emergency Ambulance Service, Inc. with title of said vehicle remaining in the Town of Troy. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the payment of the sewerage bond and interest thereon. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$34,500.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Fire Department for the purchase and rehabilitation of a used Class A or smaller Fire Truck. The persons responsible for the selection and rehabilitation of the fire truck will be the Fire Chief and Deputy Cheifs in office when the purchase is made. The purchase will be made by the Selectmen upon the recommendation of the Fire Chiefs. The Fire Chiefs will submit itemized statements to the Selectmen so that the money can be withdrawn as needed. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereof:

a. Reassessment of Town (1986) \$1,500.00 passed as read.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereon:

a. Gay-Kimball Library - Operations \$1,000.00
b. Senior Citizens, Elderly Activities 1,000.00
c. Town Hall - General Repairs 2,000.00
d. Gay-Kimball Library - Maintenance 1,500.00

Passed as read.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Reserve Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

a. Fire Department \$6,000.00
b. Police Department 6,000.00
c. Highway Department 6,000.00
Passed as read.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen and the Health Officer to write an ordinance to establish a licensing program and a sanitary inspection procedure for all businesses within the Town that serve, handle or process food. Public hearings will be held and publicized before the ordinance is officially adopted and enacted if this article is passed. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen and the Welfare Officer to write an ordinance establishing a work program. Public hearings will be held and publicized before the ordinance is officially adopted and enacted if this article is passed. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to make the position of Police Chief a part-time position. If passed the change will be made no earlier than May 1, 1983. After much discussion, this article was passed by secret ballot Yes 85 No 76.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as necessary to support Town Departments as recommended by the Budget Committee.

b. Police \$42,500.00
Passed as read.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of from 3 to 5 persons to do a study and

recommend to them a plan for wage scales and benefits for the full and part-time employees of the Town of Troy. Also a review and recommend job descriptions for all positions. This study to be complete by September 30, 1983. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Troy and to the health and welfare of the people of Troy. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15,000. for capital improvement projects at the Recreation Areas. \$7,500. to come from the existing recreation fund and donations. \$7,500. matching funds to come from State and Federal money. The Town of Troy is authorized to apply for, accept and expend federal Land and Water Conservation Fund grants funds or other federal or state funds which may be available for this project to reduce the cost to the District.

Peter Howe brought to our attention that the last word was a typographical error and should be Town not District.

Carl Patten Sr. stated that this was not brought up before the Budget Committee and therefore could not be voted on. He read from RSA 39-3B which states that since it was not brought up before the Budget Committee, it could not be approved or disapproved by the Town.

John Callahan Sr amended the Article to read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend \$15,000. for capital improvement projects at the Recreation Areas: \$7,500. to come from existing recreation fund and donations. \$7,500. matching funds to come from State and Federal money. The Town of Troy is authorized to apply for, accept and expend federal Land and Water Conservation Fund grant funds or other federal or state funds which may be available for this project to reduce the cost to the Town. Passed as amended.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote for the following:

"Shall the citizens of Troy, New Hampshire ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries." by petition. By a hand vote this article was defeated 43 Yes, 58 No.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant television cable franchises in accordance with RSA 53C, 1-5. Article defeated.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal Funds (BOAR) with the assistance of the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development. These funds to be used to develop capital projects on the recreation land at the Sand Dam and at Farrar's Field. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of a certain tract of land identified as Map 14, Lot 19 on the Tax maps and listed as "owner unknown" in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 30: To hear reports or committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

None to be reported, meeting was adjourned at 10:55 P.M.
