#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ALLENSTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fire Station in said Allenstown, on Tuesday the Twelfth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee.
- To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to give a one percent (1%) discount on all 1963 taxes paid within thirty (30) days after the tax rate is approved.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the budget.)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to elect the members of the Budget Committee by means of the official ballot in the same manner that Town Officers are elected. This article to become effective at the next annual election.
- 8. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a catch basin at the intersection of Sunset and Main Streets; and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for that purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.)

- 9. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to extend the 8" sewer line on Ridge Road from the Langford property in an easterly direction a distance of two hundred feet (200') and construct a man-hole at the end thereof, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.)
- 10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light in front of the George Fleury property on River Road; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to rennovate the old school building, transferred to the Town at the 1962 School Meeting, and convert it into Town offices and such other space as shall be necessary for Town functions, and to provide the necessary sanitary and heating facilities for the same, and to purchase such equipment and furnishings as shall be required therefor; and to authorize its Selectmen to borrow a sum of money, not to exceed Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) on the credit of the Town by the issuance of serial notes payable at the rate of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) per year; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) in the 1963 Budget, making a total appropriation of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the sum of \$2,000.00 is included in the Budget.)
- 12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to remove the street light presently located on Pole #4 in front of the William Thibeault property on Valley Street and relocate it on Pole #4/16/4 on said street, on which is located a Fire Alarm Box; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35.00) for that purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.)
- 13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light at the intersection of Al's Avenue and Main Street; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35.00) for that purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.)

- 14. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to enlarge the present sewer line between Suncook Hardware and the Rod & Gun Club from its present size to a ten inch (10") line; and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the budget.)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Planning Board to study the mobile home and mobile home park situation in the Town; and to report its findings and recommendations for a more orderly mobile home and trailer development in the Town at the next annual or special Town Meeting.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Planning Board to make a comprehensive Plan of the Town, and for this purpose to engage such assistance as shall be necessary; and to authorize its Selectmen to borrow the sum of Seventeen Hundred Dollars (\$1,700.00) on the credit of the Town for the period of one year; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Hundred Dollars (\$1,700.00) in the 1963 Budget to make a total appropriation of Thirty-four Hundred Dollars (\$3,400.00) to pay one third of the cost of said plan, the remaining two-thirds of the cost to be borne by the Federal Government under the Federal Urban Planning Assistance Program. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the sum of \$1,700.00 is included in the budget.)
- 17. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to grade, gravel and road-mix Ferry Street from Reynolds Avenue westerly to the end of the street and to repair the side-walks on said street; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the budget.)
- 18. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Ridge Road on the third light pole westerly from the inersection of Notre Dame Avenue and Ridge Road; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the budget committee and the funds therefor are included in the budget.)
- 19. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Pole #1 on Dianne Avenue; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the budget.)

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to make changes and improvements in the street lighting on Main and School Streets in accordance with the following schedule:

And to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Twenty-eight Dollars and forty-eight cents (\$528.48) in addition to the sum of Five Hundred Twenty-three Dollars and Sixty-eight cents (\$523.68) heretofore paid, making a total appropriation for the lights herein listed of One Thousand Fifty-two Dollars and Sixteen cents (\$1,052.16.) (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the budget.)

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to serve as a Committee to meet with the Selectmen of the Town of Pembroke to investigate the feasibility of combining the operation of some phases of the government of the two towns, in order to provide better services on a more economical basis, and to report their findings and recommendations at the next Town Meeting.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the street running between Whitten and Webster Streets over land now belonging to Edgar Baron.
- 23. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to re-open Bombay Bridge Road from the Pembroke Town line to the State property line at the Bear Brook Park, this section of road having been discontinued as an open highway and made subject to gates and bars under Article 10 of the 1958 Town Warrant.
- 24. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to grade, gravel and road-mix Ridge Road for a distance of Two Hundred feet (200') easterly from the intersection of said road with Notre Dame Avenue; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for this purpose. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)
- 25. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Pole No. 7 on Pine Acre Road; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35.00) for this purpose. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)
- 26. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to road-mix Pine Acre Road for a distance of Five hundred feet (500') from the end of the existing surface on said street; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for this purpose. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)
- 27. To hear the reports of auditors, agents, committees or officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

In accordance with the vote of the 1958 Town Meeting a motion will be in order at 10:00 A.M. to adjourn the reading of the Warrant to 7:00 P.M. Saturday, March 16th, at the St. Jean Baptiste Gymnasium.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Allenstown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds and Municipal Court.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1961 - December 31, 1962: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961, and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$3,720.34 in 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows: Increase of Surplus

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$2,443.49, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$927.54, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,515.95.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$1,720.34, from \$12,002.83 to \$13,723.17, in 1962, as shown herewith:

## History of Allenstown, N. H.

HISTORY OF ALLENSTOWN, N.H.

1790----1800

1789-

Petition for authority to tax land for repairing highways and bridges.

State of New Hampshr. - To the Honble General Assembly in said State-convened at Exeter January 7th, 1789.

Humbly Show the inhabitants thereof (who are very few in number not exceeding forty ratable polls) have been at the sole expense of maintaining all public roads in the same-that from the roughness of the land the many streams running through said Town, and the small number of Inhabitants they find it exceedingly burdensome to keep the roads and bridges (some of which are long and very often carried away by freshets) in barely passable repair-that unless said inhabitants can have some assistance from the Non-Residents Proprietors or owners of lands in said Town (who are by far the greatest part of the Propriety) they cannot possibly keep said roads and bridges in proper repair, they therefore pray your Honour to take this their petition under your wise consideration, and alleviate their distress by granting them liberty to assess one penny per acre on all lands in said Allenstown improved and unimproved for the term of three years for the purpose of repairing and making passable and convenient the roads and bridges in said town and as in duty bound. John Leonard, Josiah Allen, Nathaniel Smith - Select Men for and in behalf of the inhabitants of Allenstown. The foregoing petition was before the legislature January 7 and a hearing ordered for their next session June 18, 1789, an act passed granting the request. 1790-

Josiah Allen, Israel Marden and George Evans were Selectmen that year.
1790-

The census taken this year gave the town of Allenstown a population of 254 as follows:

This was the first census taken by the United States Government.

1791-

Josiah Allen, George Evans and Samuel Webster were Selectmen that year.

January 7, 1791, Jacob Green and Enoch Noyes sent in a petition to the legislature asking for the exclusive right to build and maintain a toll-bridge across the Merrimack, "somewhere between the Right of Ferriage, lately belonging to Samuel Butters, and one mile below the Isle-Hooksett, so called, in the same River.

The same month a second petition was sent in by William Duncan and Daniel Livermore, asking also the exclusive right of building a toll-bridge across the Merrimack below Concord, "at any place within ten miles below Butters privilege of ferry.

Accordingly an act was passed, February 17, 1791, granting to the signers of the two petitions the exclusive right to erect a toll-bridge over Merrimack river, "between one mile below Isle-Hooksett Falls and one mile above said falls. Town Papers Vol. II, Page 218-219.

1791-

Post Office established in Concord and for more than 30 years afforded postal facilities for a wide circuit of towns including Allenstown, Bow, Canterbury. See History of Concord Page 319.

New Hampshire was divided into five Counties, Rockingham, Strafford, Hillsborough, Cheshire and Grafton.

October 1, public notice was given of a weekly line of stages from Concord to Boston, running through Pembroke, Allenstown, Chester now Hooksett, and Haverhill. The schedule time was two days for carrying the mail between the two places. In November, this line made connection at Haverhill with stages for Exeter and Portsmouth. Fourteen pounds of baggage were allowed each passenger.

October 20, 1794, was an article in the town of Pembrook, to see if the town will vote to repair the bridge for the future. The town however took no action. Such results seems to indicate that they were inclined to leave the care of the bridge to Allenstown, regarding them as not within the limits of Pembroke.

August 3, 1795 Frederick Foster was chosen to attend court "to answer to the complaint against the bridges." It would appear from

this part, that the town of Pembroke had been indicted for not repairing the bridges. In March 1796 the same matter came before the Town but no action was taken. Another meeting was called in June 1796, regarding this matter and no action was taken. In August 1797, at a special meeting Major Samuel McConnell and Ensign Aaron Whittemore were chosen to defend the Town against this presentment. From the foregoing action and the circumstances following, it would seem that the town of Pembroke had been successful in warding off the support of the bridges over the Suncook river, a decision giving them the right in point of law.

The result of such action of the town, and the decision of the court, led the inhabitants of Allenstown, in June, 1798, to present to the General Court the following petition;

To the Honble The Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened at Hopkinton on the first Wednesday of June A.D. 1798.

Humbly shows The inhabitants of Allenstown in the County of Rockingham. That in the year 1759 a township was incorporated in said county by the name of Pembroke bounded westerly by the Merrimack and Suncook river, Northerly upon Chicester and Epsom, Easterly and Southerly by the Suncook river that when said Pembroke was incorporated about one mile was taken off from the westerly part of Allenstown and included in Pembroke.

That the inhabitants of Pembroke have unreasonably refused and still neglect and refuse to build or keep in repair any part of the bridges over the Suncook river under pretense of their not being liable by law to built said bridges, nor any part of the same, said town being bounded by the Suncook river in the act of incorporation, by reason whereof your petitioners are in danger of being compelled to build and keep in repair all bridges across said Suncook river, a burden which your petitioners in their present situation are wholly unable to bear on account of the fewness of their number, and expense of maintaining and keeping in repair the other roads and bridges through their own town, that the public have a long time suffered such inconvenience and danger for want of good bridges over the Suncook river and that said bridges are now in ruinous condition the lives of passengers being daily endangered in passing same.

Your petitioners further show that if that part of Pembroke which was taken off from Allenstown with the inhabitants, was to be reannexed to said Allenstown it would not be more than their just proportion of the Highway tax of said town to build and keep in repair the bridges over the Suncook river.

Whereas your petitioners humbly pray that, that part of Allenstown with the inhabitants thereof which is included within Pembroke by said act of incorporation may be disannexed from Pembroke and joined again to that tract of land known and called by the name of Allenstown; That they may be thereby be enabled to built and keep in repair the roads and bridges aforesaid or that such other relief in

the premises may be afforded to your petitioners as your Honors shall think just and proper. And they as in duty bound will ever pray.

Allenstown June 6, 1798.

At the same time another petition from sundry inhabitants of Pembroke was presented to the General Court, as follows:

Humbly Shews, Certain of the inhabitants of that part of Pembroke which was taken off from Allenstown in the County of Rockingham, that they and the public have long laboured and still labour under many and great inconveniences by reason of the badness of bridges over the Suncook river. That the town of Pembroke have refused and still refuse to render any assistance towards building and repairing said bridges, thereby in effect endearing to compel the town of Allenstown to built and keep in repair all the bridges across Suncook river which we conceive to be very unreasonable and unjust considering the fewness of the inhabitants and the expense of making and repairing their other roads and bridges. And being informed that the inhabitants of Allenstown are about petitioning your honors to have that part of Pembroke aforesaid which was formerly Allenstown reannexed to Allenstown for the purpose of enabling them to built and repair the bridges over said river your petitioners therefor humbly pray your honors that the aforesaid petition of the inhabitants of Allenstown may be granted that they and the public may no longer suffer for the want of safe and convenient bridges over said river. And as in duty bound they will pray.

John Cochran, James Cochran Jr., Thomas Robinson, Daniel Cochran, Samuel Martin.

The next November, John and James Cochran Jr., signed and presented a petition of recantation in which they say, "they would not have signed said petition had they rightly comprehended its meaning when presented them, they supposing the petition had nothing further in view than only to request some assistance towards rebuilding and keeping in repair the bridge over Suncook river and for that intent only your petitioners put their names to said petition without considering with what attention they would have done had they had any suspicion of the true meaning of said petition; so they pray to be considered as never having signed it with an intent so injurious to themselves and the town of Pembroke at large"; They were both prominent men in town. They were Doctor John Cochran and Major James Cochran.

At the fall session for that year the following petition was presented. Humbly shows The Inhabitants of that part of Pembroke in the County of Rockingham known by the name of Buckstreet, that the granting of two petitions presented to your honors at the last session of the Honorable General Court held at Hopkinton on the first Wednesday of June last (the one by the Inhabitants of the town of Allenstown in the County aforesaid, humbly praying to have annexed to said Allenstown a tract of land with the inhabitants thereof which they in their petition pretend to say was taken off from the westerly part of Allenstown and included in Pembroke when said town was incorporated, it being about one mile and the same tract of land which is called Buckstreet; the other by a few of the inhabitants living on said tract of land, praying that the aforesaid petition of Allenstown might be granted) would be greatly injurious and oppressive to your petitioners: that your petitioners never understood that the above mentioned tract of land was ever at any time esteemed a part of Allenstown, or that the inhabitants thereof had ever at any period of time any claim upon the same, by any grant whatever, or that Allenstown has as yet ever been incorporated, that by annexing the above mentioned part of Pembroke to Allenstown. Pembroke would be greatly injured as the necessary town charges would fall more heavily on the remaining inhabitants and they would be necessitated to class with some other town for the purpose of choosing a representative, as the number of inhabitants that would remain would be insufficient according to the constitution for the purpose, That the inhabitants of Allenstown can with far less inconvenience support the bridges over Suncook river than your petitioners having already a considerable extent of highway to maintain and by reason of the fewness of their number, find it exceedingly difficult to maintain in proper repair for the accomodation of travellers and should the repairing and keeping in repair the bridges over Suncook river be added to what they already have to do in regard to the reparation of public roads they must inevitably sink under the burden and the public remain unaccomodated. That but two of the persons who signed the other petition said to be presented to your Honors by the inhabitants living on the before mentioned tract of land, were freeholders in said town of Pembroke, that in their petition they have stated that the inhabitants of Pembroke have refuse and still do refuse to render any assistance toward building and repairing the bridges over Suncook, which is altogether untrue; and it can evidently be made to appear, if necessary, by a number of respectful witnesses that the inhabitants of Pembroke, although obligated to do so, by no law whatever, the same being without the limits of their town, have invariably for the space of twenty years last past been at more than half the expense in keeping the aforesaid bridges in repair. That your petitioners together with the other inhabitants of Pembroke have ever heretofore approved themselves true friends and lovers of their Country in the most difficult times and have ever demeaned themselves as good citizens of

the State and borne with cheertuiness their proportion of all public expenses and are still ready to sustain their part in whatever may conduce to the public good. Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your honors not to do them so incomparable an injury as to annex the above mentioned tract of land or any part thereof to Allenstown by granting the prayers of the aforesaid petitioners, which can be of but little advantage to said parties or the public at large in comparison of the vast disadvantage it will be to your petitioners and the town of Pembroke. And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray. Pembroke November 21, 1798.

The foregoing petitions show so clearly the circumstances connected with the subject under consideration, the feeling and temper of all parties interested, for or against, the action which the General Court was asked to take, that further explanation is unnecessary. Although the General Court did not decide to grant the prayer of the petitioners directly, undouttedly knowing that the grounds taken by the petitioners in asserting that when Pembroke was incorporated a strip of land was taken from Allenstown to make up the town of Pembroke, was an erroneous statement, they did pass an act making the easterly and southerly bank of the Suncook river the easterly and southerly line of Pembroke as the following will show.

An act to extend the easterly and southerly line of the town of Pembroke in the county of Rockingham, adjoining upon Allenstown, to the easterly and southerly bank of Suncook river. (approved December 24, 1798.)

Whereas a petition has been preferred to the General Court by the inhabitants of Allenstown, setting forth, among other things, that the bridges across Suncook river adjoining said Allenstown are much out of repair and almost impassable. That the town of Pembroke did not conceive themselves under obligation by law to build and keep in repair any part of the same, and that the inhabitants of said Allenstown were few in number and by no means able to build and keep in repair the bridges aforesaid-

Wherefore they prayed relief in the premises, which, on a full hearing of all parties concerned, appearing reasonable-

Therefore be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representative in General Court convened, that the easterly and southerly line of said town of Pembroke, adjoining said Allenstown, shall hereafter be considered to extend, and shall extend, to the easterly and southerly bank of Suncook River- provided nevertheless that this act shall not be construed to effect, nor any way alter the private property, title, or privilege of any individual; but the same shall remain in the like situation, as if this act had not been passed.

Whatever may be thought of the reasons for this action, it surely cannot be deemed strange that the people of Pembroke should be dissatisfied when they knew that the inhabitants of Allenstown were entirely reliefed from all support of the bridges over Suncook river, and the whole burden thrown upon Pembroke. Had the decision made the centre of Suncook river the southeasterly line of Pembroke, as in 1804 the centre of the Suncook river was made the dividing line between Pembroke and Concord, throwing the support of the bridge equally upon the adjoining towns, Pembroke undoubtedly would have been satisfied; but as it was, the people felt that a great wrong had been done to them, and they resolved not to submit to it, hoping that in the future they would be relieved. This hope, however, proved futile, and in the end, quite expensive. At the time Pembroke was supporting the whole of the four bridges over the Suncook river. while Allenstown was supporting only one bridge of any account, that being the one over Bear Brook. At the time of the passage of the act. there was but one mill on that side of the river, now there are two, and the money the town of Pembroke has collected up to now, on water rights and mill privileges, more than reimbursed the town of Pembroke. for the building and repairing of the bridges.

There is a well authenticated tradition that the representative of the General Court from Pembroke for 1798, Daniel Knox, was greatly alarmed on account of the petitions presented, fearing the prayers of the petitions would be granted and Pembroke would lose that part of town called Buckstreet, hence he voluntarily made the proposition that Pembroke would support the bridges over Suncook river, making the southerly bank the southerly bounding line of the town, if this tradition be true, less censure would attach to the General Court for its action; and little blame could fall on Allenstown for accepting favor thrust upon it thus.

It appears that the town of Pembroke was determined neither to repair the old bridges, nor build a new one, for between 1798 and 1813, nothing was done.

At the annual meeting of Pembroke in 1813, it was voted that the Selectmen be empowered and directed to settle the whole business and make conveyances and receive grants of land relative to the bridges and their report being recorded, to be final and conclusive. This would seem to be the most comprehensive and sensitive vote passed by the town during all this bitter bridge war, lasting more than fifteen years.

#### PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

ALIENSTOWN POLICE REPORT FOR 1962

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never to early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 4 fires. We burned 11 acres. 38 permits issued.

Our greatest need is a planned development of the site requiring first a goodly amount of "black-top" to save unnecessary wear and tear on the building while at the same time providing excellent play areas. In the course of time larger playground areas for baseball, etc. should be roughed out and gradually improved. We would hope that these things could be done this summer.

Another area needing attention is the kitchen were several pieces of equipment should be purchased and for which some money is budgeted. This is another instance where we need to plan over a period of several years because good equipment is expensive.

We hope we can keep our present staff of teachers. Although salaries are not the only consideration they are, as we all know, an important factor. We must remain competitive in this respect.

Tuition at the Academy will remain at \$445 next year. The interplay of increased costs and increased numbers of pupils will, in the long run, determine any changes in this figure. The most recent per pupil cost for the state is \$449, a decrease from the previous year, but probably temporary!

As you know, we have 9 days of school to make up. We will try to do this as "painlessly" as possible and hope the weather man will co-operate, since he may well have the answers.

One hundred eighty days of school with pupils in attendance is the minimum.

Your continued support and understanding of our problems is appreciated.

The investigation disclosed that the residents of the Allenstown community are presently served by the Suncook, New Hampshire post office, which is located approximately 100 yards north of the Allenstown town line. Approximately 80 per cent of the population of Allenstown receives city delivery service, the remainder rural delivery, both emanating from Suncook. No complaints of unsatisfactory service from the Suncook post office have been received.

As information, our field officials are endeavoring to select a site for the Suncook post office which will meet with the approval of both Allenstown and Suncook patrons.

In the circumstances the establishment of a postal facility in Allenstown is not warranted at this time. The present service afforded this area is considered adequate.
