THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bristol on the thirteenth (13th) day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, at which time the polls shall be opened and shall close not earlier than 5:30 in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose one Selectman for the Term of three years and choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to games of Beano be adopted in this town?

(This question appears on the printed ballot.)

- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will ask for Town Road Aid, and if so, raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Nine Dollars and Nineteen Cents. (\$409.19)

(Provided this amount is raised by the Town, the State will contribute the sum of One Thousand, Six Hundred and Thirty-six Dollars and Seventy-four Cents. (\$1,636.74)

- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Sidewalks for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Sewers for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) for the payment of the snow plowing contract.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and make appropriation of the same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) to the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Newfound Region.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to establish, maintain and conduct a system of public recreation, and in connection therewith, to equip and operate the Community Center Building, and to prepare, equip and maintain our public playground; and to employ a play leader, playground instructor or supervisor in connection with such system of public recreation and to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to delegate to the existing Community Center Council the power to administer and supervise the expenditure of said sum appropriated for a public recreation system, and the power to employ and supervise a play leader, playground instructor or supervisor.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for resurfacing the existing paved roads of the Town of Bristol as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to tar the one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ mile of road leading from Route 104 to the Public Service Company dam, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$260.00) which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes Region.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Franklin and Laconia Hospitals.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Forty-eight Dollars and Sixteen Cents (\$3,648.16) to pay for money borrowed to replank Central Street and Willow Street Bridges.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE BRISTOL WATER WORKS

Water Commissioners' Report

While it was hoped that with the completion of the new well and stand pipe, Bristol could begin to enjoy its new water system, the failure of the old mains not yet replaced prevented this in 1950. These lines had been left as a calculated risk to be replaced as funds became available. However the increased pressure of the new system proved them nearly worthless, and following severe breaks in the square it became evident that additional outlay must be made before utilizing the well and pump.

Accordingly it was asked at a special Town Meeting for funds sufficient to replace all the original pipe still in use and to further improve by connecting into the system all dead end lines. The affirmative vote on this measure resulted in the ordering of nearly four miles of pipe with necessary fittings and additional hydrants. It is planned that these will be installed as soon as possible in the spring.

Another less pleasant result of these improvements has been to materially increase the water rates. This has been necessary because it is the belief of the Commissioners that the expenses of the system should be borne by the users of the system; with expenditures of \$18,000, \$18,000 must be received. It is not felt that in view of rising water rates throughout the country, Bristol is being penalized; in fact many towns spend far more for merely adequate service. In this age of increased consumption, water tables are lowering rapidly, and we should count ourselves fortunate to be having a brand new system from well to faucet.

BRISTOL COMMUNITY CENTER AND SUMMER PLAYGROUND

Bristol's year round program of community recreation is designed to assist in giving to her young people the desire and the ability to lead the full, well-rounded lives of useful, happy citizens. It has become increasingly important, with the shortening of our working week, that we know how to use the resulting leisure hours.

The recreation program in this small New Hampshire town is truly a "year round" one with the playground program at Kelley Park, the water safety and swimming schedule at Wellington Beach, the camping and skiing events in our woods and on our hills, indoor activities within the Community Center, and skating on the new rink.

Attendance, which has increased each season, reached an all time high this year with an average daily attendance on the playground of 214, while at the Center young people are enjoying 856 hours of supervised activities each week.

Most people are ramiliar with the routine activities such as baseball, basketball, volleyball, tennis, horseshoes, croquet, pool and ping pong, but possibly some do not realize the following:

Seventeen Junior Rifle Club members are firing on the rifle range and three of them have reached the N.R.A. rating of expert. The class "C" team finished in the upper third in the 1950-51 National Postal Match where 158 teams from all over the United States participated. In the same match, the class "D" team was 15th out of 74 teams.

At Wellington Beach, 35 young people received swimming lessons with two boys and two girls passing the Junior Life Saving requirements.

The results of the summer cooking classes were clearly demonstrated when the fifteen girl members entertained parents and guests at an afternoon luncheon.

Much publicity was given the rural program sponsored on the playground for the nine New York Fresh Air guests.

Certificates were awarded five young people for completing duties required of them as junior playground leaders.

The rope skipping troupe has given seven out-oftown demonstrations with other engagements scheduled for the coming months.

Three days each week a schedule of physical education has been conducted for all grades in the elementary school.

In the photography course, lessons included respect for and care of the camera, good backgrounds, group pictures, landscapes, action shots, and night pictures.

Remarkable ability was shown by members of the dancing class at the spring recital last year. Another year of progress will be evident when thirty girls and boys demonstrate ballroom, tap, acrobatic, and ballet dancing at the recital in May.

Special celebrations throughout the year have included the Hallowe'en and Christmas parties, Winter Carnival, Spring Talent Show, Vehicle Parade, Wild West Day, Pet Show, Playground Carnival, Cracker Box Derby, and Community Center Days.

Probably the biggest improvement in Community Center facilities is the skating rink built cooperatively in back of the building and maintained by the young people. Lights and music for night skating are provided on this 85' x 36' area.

The addition of a beautiful new stage curtain, the recent purchase of a complete make up kit, and the installation of new light receptacles are definite improvements to our stage.

The gift to the Center of a complete camping outfit for a family of four people, which will be available to family groups in the Newfound Region, will make it possible for many more people to enjoy this popular summer sport.

Back in 1946 when Bristol people initiated and wholeheartedly supported this year-round program, little did they realize what a pioneer our town would become in the field of community recreation. Representatives from communities throughout New Hampshire have sought information on our plan and seven nearby towns have established part or full time programs because of Bristol's example.

MINOT-SLEEPER LIBRARY

Report of Trustees

The trustees of the Minot-Sleeper Library have no outstanding matters to report for the year just closing. Under the faithful and efficient supervision of Miss Mary A. Rogers, librarian, the customary work has been carried on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday afternoons and evenings.

The will of Martha Bartlett Conner, late of Malden, Mass., included a bequest to the Minot-Sleeper Library of \$1,000, the income thereof to keep the Timothy Chandler grandfather clock in perfect working order. On August 29, 1935, this clock was placed in the library by Mrs. Conner as a present from the Estate of Philip G. Bartlett, a great-great-grandson of the former owner, Col. Peter Sleeper of New Chester, Bristol, N. H. Colonel Sleeper was born May 27, 1746, and is said to be the first settler in Bristol.

Miss Rogers and Mrs. Lidstone attended the fall meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association at Plymouth.

Through the generosity of Mr. Charles L. Jackman of Concord, N. H., the Minnie Maria Day-Jackman fund continues to supply the reading room with the leading magazines and from time to time the purchase of new reference books, which are greatly appreciated. The list of magazines is as follows: Atlantic Monthly, American Magazine, Better Homes & Gardens, Coronet, Cosmopolitan, Field & Stream, Good Housekeeping, Harpers, Hobbies, Ladies' Home Journal, Life, National Geographic (2 copies), Nature, Popular Science, Readers Digest (2 copies). Saturday Evening Post, Time, Yankee,

American Girl, Boys' Life, Jack & Jill, Holiday, Horticulture, Liberty, and Junior Craft. Except for the current issue, these are loaned the same as books.

In these days of rising costs the income of the library is insufficient to gratify all requests for new books. However, an effort has been made to purchase as many as possible. Suggestions for improving the usefulness of the library facilities are solicited.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The month of November marked the close of five years of working together in Supervisory Union No. 4 under a new superintendent and it is a source of satisfaction to look back and count the achievements which have been made possible through the cooperation of teachers. school board members, taxpayers, the State Board of Education, and the pupils themselves. All rooms have been painted, many have new lights, nine buildings have been painted outside, seven roofs redone, new heating installed in several buildings, improved playground equipment in at least two instances, and last but not least are two new buildings underway. These are all material achievements. To improve much on these matters will involve very expensive spending, and with future uncertainties it is well these things have been done. Nonmaterial accomplishments have consisted in three teacher workshops, regrading of schools, extensive summer school attendance by the teachers, and the maintenance of a very competent teaching staff in spite of differences in ages, training, experience, and the lowest salaries in the state. How much longer this can be done is pure guess-work.

Our educational offerings in most towns are very limited and kept to the bare essentials. Only two towns offer music supervision, one offers handwriting supervision, none has art supervision, remedial reading, or physical education. High school offerings are almost equally limited but Bristol's will be quite modern on completion of the new school and proper staffing of the same. Yet the lake region section of Union No. 4 is, by any objective standard, one of the richest in the state and for this basic reason will never receive much, if any, state aid as long as a formula is based solely on need.

Solutions to our educational needs are not easy, and are expensive. Present state aid formulas are totally inadequate as to amount. A million dollars this year will probably not cover the new inflationary trend. The net result of this, both as to better educational opportunities for our children and for tax relief, will be close to zero. The basic purpose of any sound state aid program is to improve educational opportunities and not absorb inflationary trends over which we have absolutely no control.

The contract and performance bond for the Memorial High School have been signed and sooner or later the building will be completed. This is being written advisably all the while thinking of the uncertainties on the national level which make good planning largely a matter of guess work. A brief review of the past year will help. About a year ago prices began to drop in the construction field, and last spring paper was the cheapest it has been for several years. With the Korean war construction prices jumped 10% over night and various items have been in a continual state of flux, always upward. Paper right now is very high and going up every month, and in some cases by the week. In view of these and other known facts the final contract price for the new school is very reasonable both on cubic foot and square foot basis. We will have a school which will offer facilities difficult to match for the money involved. Equipment is even more a question mark as to price and efforts are being made now to buy and store the same at the best price it is possible to get. Prices are still competitive so that it is possible to obtain reasonable prices in many instances.

There are several items in the new budget which are "calculated guesses", such as fuel, electricity, supplies for the shop and home-making units, and maintenance supplies for the new school. Then too we hope to build some of the shop equipment such as benches which will

involve initial expenses for materials. Costs of comparable schools have been considered which may or may not be applicable to our own situation. We have estimated neither high nor low and hope we are close.

The new school should serve the needs well of the Newfound Area and with the existing plant does allow for some growth. With efforts being made by the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce to boost the area the new school should do its part. There is room for growth in this area and we all want to see it develop. A new industry or two would help pay for the new school in many ways direct and indirect. No attempt has been made to say that a new school can be built, operated, and staffed without very material increased costs. These costs will be shared, through increases in tuition rates, by those towns sending us tuition pupils. This is the procedure surrounding districts prefer rather than a cooperative area school and it is probably true that it still will cost them less this way. Tuition rates will jump greatly for '52-'53 in addition to the \$50 increase for '50-'51.

This is a good place to point out that under the new proposed state aid formula Bristol will receive no aid and will not until it has about a 60% increase in resident pupils (pupils are credited to the district of residence) or else a much smaller equalized evaluation which is not probable. Yet the new formula is fundamentally sound giving need to those towns with the greatest number of pupils and lowest evaluation. However, in view of the effort being made by Bristol people to improve its schools some reward ought to be made by the state, or some share of the burden assumed. This could be done in two ways: 1) By flat grants of aid per pupil; 2) By the revision of the Cooperative School Act permitting special aid to those towns either forming an area school or serving an area as Bristol is now doing. Either or

both are well worth considering and working for in Concord. Somehow a town making more than an 18 mill tax assessment but having an insufficient number of its own pupils but serving other towns should be given leeway in its budget. Aid to the needy district should come first but to others it should come eventually. Of the two methods the flat grant is probably more "politically expedient to legislate".

In closing, the "official family" of the Bristol School System wish to express their sincere thanks for the fine support given us and the past, present, and future school population for your continued votes of confidence and faith in the future. We hope the schools of Bristol will progress to ever better accomplishments through the material means we may provide for greater use by our most valuable assets, the pupils of today, the parents and leaders of tomorrow.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

All children had an annual inspection and parents were notified of defects found. All cases were followed up and most of the defects were corrected or improved. Some cases, where it seemed necessary, received financial assistance from such welfare sources as the Salvation Army, Red Cross, Sight Conservation Program of the State Public Welfare, Lindsey Fund, and the Bristol Rotary Club.

In February 1950 Miss Nellie Cough, R.N. and Miss Constance Martin, R.N., staff nurses for the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Society, assisted me in giving the

tuberculosis patch tests to the children in grades seven through twelve inclusive. In all of my towns 357 children had the test with 5 showing positive reactions. Twenty-one teachers had the test with seven having positive reactions. All of those having positive reactions, teachers and children, had chest x-rays and examinations at the Chest Clinic held in Bristol by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Society. No one showed any signs or symptoms of active tuberculosis.

Dental Clinics were held with Dr. Sargent in Bristol for the towns of Bristol, Bridgewater, Canaan, Danbury, and Hebron. Due to lack of time Alexandria and Grafton did not have a clinic but are being taken care of first this year and we will try to do as many of the other towns as possible. In all 85 children attended the clinics. Three of these were welfare cases. There are a number of children who need dental care whom I believe should have welfare dental work but due to the lack of available funds only the most urgent cases are cared for.

The amount of new dental decay could be greatly decreased by having fluoride added to the public water supply. Fluoride used this way would help everyone, young and old.

Seventeen children attended a Pre-school Clinic which was held June 2, 1950 for those entering the first grade in the fall. The children had their vision tested with the Massachusetts Vision Test and their hearing tested with an individual type audiometer loaned by the state. They also had an opportunity to visit the first grade room and become acquainted with their teacher.
