SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year the Board has moved past fire fighting with the past and has been able to concentrate on putting "our house" in order, the daily management of the Town, and looking toward the future. Departmental inventories have been completed for the second year in a row, and department heads have provided monthly status and financial reports for the Board. Each department head has attended a Board meeting once a month to review current status and finances, and spend plans have been established and enforced.

The recommendations presented to the Board by the Budget Committee have been considered and implemented where appropriate. For example, The Budget Committee had recommended implementation of a purchase order system. Upon review, the Board determined that the implementation of such a system was cost prohibitive for the quantity of purchases involved. The Board has implemented an informal purchase request policy for all purchases over \$500.

The Board has looked into the structure and organization of the Deering Rescue Squad, and it's relationship with the Deering Fire Department. It has been determined that the Deering Rescue Squad is a private organization that works in close association with the Deering Fire Department, a municipal organization. The Board has reviewed this organizational structure and operation with the New Hampshire Municipal Association's legal department and liability insurance department.

It has been determined that the ambulance is a Town vehicle and that it is covered under the Town's liability insurance. The members of the Deering Rescue Squad act as unpaid volunteers when performing rescue duties, and as such are indemnified from all actions performed during their rescue duties. Members of the Deering Fire Department are paid on-call municipal employees, who receive pay each time they are called to duty. Under this structure, the Town does not assume an undo risk. Therefore, the Board does not recommend altering the organizational structure of the Deering Fire Department or the Deering Rescue Squad at this time.

The Board has been responsive to land, road use, and other issues raised by residents. The Board has pursued all written complaints received. These issues can require significant effort and time. In most cases, issues raised have been cooperatively resolved. In other cases, litigation was required. In all cases, the Board has been able to reach satisfactory resolution.

It has been a pleasure to serve as your Selectmen this past year.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Deering Conservation Commission (DCC) was active in its role of advising and fostering the proper utilization and protection of the natural and watershed resources of the Town of Deering. The activities of the DCC are broken into several broad categories.

The DCC reviews dredge and fill and dock permit applications. This review generally consists of a site visit and a review of the contents of the application. The DCC has taken an active role in providing information and guidance to the residents of the Town who are undertaking viable projects, which require permits. Hopefully by providing this assistance, the citizens of Deering will file for and obtain the necessary permits to successfully complete their projects in a legal and environmentally acceptable manner.

Our continuing projects consist of the Wooduck Restoration Program, Surface Water Monitoring Program, attendance and participation on the Contoocook River and Piscataquog River Committees, Town Cleanup Day, Conservation Camper Program, yearly monitoring of the various conservation easements in the Town, and yearly maintenance of the Town of Deering Recreation Area at Deering Lake. As you can image, to maintain this level of activity with just four (4) full time members and one (1) alternate is very difficult. Thankfully, we have a network of citizen supporters who provide us with assistance on several of these ongoing programs. However, it certainly would be nice to have a full compliment of members to share the load.

The DCC has also been working very hard to assist citizens who wish to permanently protect their land. We have provided assistance and information to numerous landowners in the Town of Deering, which has resulted in the permanent protection of many acres in the Town. Currently, the DCC is working on one (1) conservation easement donation and has applied to the new Land Conservation and Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) and various federal programs to obtain a conservation easement on another large and unique parcel of land in the Town.

The DCC is looking forward to another successful year in 2001. Hopefully, we will be able to maintain our current level of activity and perhaps to obtain additional citizen support. The natural resources of the Town of Deering are of vital importance to each and every citizen, it is what brought many of us to Deering and should be preserved for future generations to enjoy.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday the 13th day of March next, at 11:00 A.M. in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of changing the term of the town treasurer from one year to 3 years, beginning with the term of the town treasurer to be elected at next year's regular town meeting? This article is non-lapsing until it is rescinded by a vote of the Town. (Selectmen support equals 👍👍👍)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of amending Section 2 Paragraph J of the Deering Zoning Ordinance to clarify the requirements for manufactured housing and incorporate pertinent provisions of the Municipal Ordinance on the Regulation of Trailer and Mobile Home Parks relating to the conditions under which trailers and mobile homes may be used for temporary habitation or be stored in the residential/agricultural district?
(Planning Board support equals 👍)(Selectmen support equals 👍👍👍)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of amending Section 4D of the Deering Zoning Ordinance to place the authority to regulate excavations under the provisions of N.H. RSA 1 55-E, to which excavations in the Town are now subject, with the Planning Board, as provided in RSA 1 55-E? They would also limit the authority of the Board of Adjustment to the approval of certain new and long-abandoned excavations, mining and processing facilities, and clarify the enforcement role of the Board of Selectmen in regard to excavations.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) for payment of Deering's portion of the design, engineering, construction, and all other related costs for the purpose of final closure and capping of the Hillsborough Landfill in accordance with all state and federal regulations and to authorize the issuance of not more than One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. FIRE AND RESCUE REPORT

The Deering Department of Fire and Rescue responded to 53 calls in the year 2000. Of those calls 3 were Building Fires, 2 Chimney Fires, 9 Mutual Aid Responses, 13 Motor Vehicle Accidents, 2 Motor Vehicle Fires, 4 Alarm Activation's, 3 Electrical Emergencies, 7 Forestry Calls, 7 to assist the Rescue Squad and 3 miscellaneous service calls.

Several members completed their NH State Certification classes at the Firefighter 1A and B levels while one of our Firefighters attained his Firefighter 2. We continue to train in house at least once each month and attend classes at approved training facilities throughout the State in an ongoing effort to provide the best level of service possible to the Town of Deering. Presently our Department consists of twenty-two active members, seventeen of which are certified to at least the level of Firefighter 1.

In October we enjoyed participating in Fire Prevention Programs both at the Hillsboro-Deering schools and with Open House activities at all three of our Stations. We feel that these are important programs for our Department to provide that hopefully will keep everyone safe from a fire-related injury. However, visiting the Firehouse doesn't need to be limited to Fire Prevention Week: we are at the Stations each Tuesday night and anyone is welcome to come in for a tour of the apparatus and to get to know the men and women of the Department. Please stop by!

We are striving to bring our membership back to what we consider to be an optimum operational level of thirty-three members. We have not been at that point in several years. In an effort to generate interest and recruitment in our Department we are in the process of putting together an Information Night Program for anyone who would like to see what the job of Firefighter or EMT entails. The Program would run at least on one weeknight and one day on the weekend to give everyone a couple of opportunities to enjoy an overview of the Department. Those interested in joining would then come back on another scheduled day to actually work with the equipment and see if this is really something that they would like to do. Our hope is that this will generate some new candidates for our Department but everyone is invited to come and learn about the Deering Fire and Rescue.

One of our biggest concerns at this time is the condition of our ambulance. The 1984 Ford that was purchased as a "used" vehicle nine years ago has certainly given us our money's worth but its days as a dependable response vehicle are almost over. A detailed report is attached which will describe the condition of all Department apparatus including our expenses on each vehicle for the past year.

After over two years of research the Ambulance Committee has selected what we feel to be an excellent vehicle to replace our existing ambulance. We expect this ambulance to fill our needs for the next decade. I urge every resident to please vote in favor of this purchase so that we may continue to provide Emergency Medical Response to the townspeople of Deering.

Before closing I would like to thank Doug Connor for his efforts as Chief of Department. Although he chose to step down from that position we are fortunate that he has remained on the Department.

A parting reminder: please make sure that you have smoke detectors in your home and that they are functioning properly. Take the time to make an exit plan and practice it with your family. If you have any questions regarding fire safety contact a member of the Department and we'll be more than happy to assist you.

On behalf of the members of the Deering Fire and Rescue I thank you for your faith and support.

RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

The year of 2000 was a busy one for the Rescue Squad. We had 52 Medical Calls, 28 Trauma calls, 10 Mutual Aid, 9 Fire, and 4 other calls.

Our Rescue Company currently consists of three EMT Intermediates, four EMT Basic, and One First Responder. We also receive great support from the Firefighters.

We have continued to research the option of lease/purchasing a new ambulance. The 1984 Ford ambulance is currently running but we continue to have maintenance issues with it.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that the ambulance is an emergency transport unit and that our receiving hospitals are Concord and Monadnock. The State of NH EMS Guidelines tell us that we must transport to the closest, most appropriate hospital, which for most Deering residents would be the two named above.

I am sure that most of you have heard or read about the implementation of fees for Paramedic Intercept services that are provided from three of the Concord area towns. Eventually this may affect how we operate but at this time we continue to be a Volunteer Rescue Squad and do not charge for our services. We purchase all equipment and supplies for the ambulance through donations. We have formed a committee to explore all of our options and we will keep you updated, as information becomes available to us.

All of the Rescue members would like to thank you for your continued support.

We are happy to report to all member communities that 2000 marked the eleventh complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The 2001 budget reflects a tipping fee of \$37.00 per ton, an increase of \$.50 per ton. This is the first time in seven years that the Cooperative has found it necessary to raise the tipping fee. This year also marks the first time that the Co-op will charge a higher tipping fee for tons delivered over the Fee Formula Tonnage (FFT, 133,600 tons). The fee will be \$67.50 per ton.

Co-op waste delivered to the Wheelabrator facility this year totaled 138,920 tons. That represents an increase of 6,070 tons over 1999, or a 4.57% increase. The amount of trash delivered continues to rise at a faster rate than predicted.

A total of 67,021 tons of ash were delivered to the Franklin ash monofill for disposal. The Ashfill continues to operate very well. Phase III Stage III is being filled at this time. A standing generator was installed this past year to provide electricity during outages. The most recent expansion (1996) will provide disposal capacity for the next six years.

The air retrofit project at the plant has been completed. The project was completed on schedule and close to budget. The retrofit will enable the plant to meet the most recent EPA and DES regulations.

The Cooperative continues to look toward the future by planning for construction of phase IV at the Franklin site as well as expansion to a Phase V. It is also possible that there will be some negotiations with Wheelabrator concerning extension of the contract this coming year.

TECHNICAL COMMITTEE

The Technical Committee successfully selected new equipment for our Town administrative computer systems. The Committee was able to obtain significant discounts in the new equipment and software that has been purchased. This purchase included a new workstation, server, hub, printer, and scanner; all interconnected through an updated data network. The equipment was delivered last summer. Committee members devoted a couple of weekends to removing the old equipment, running the new cables, installing the new equipment, and bringing it up in its new environment.

A couple of weeks before the installation began; one of the existing systems crashed, and had to be replaced with the new workstation. This, combined with the unexpected, created some rough spots in integrating the old with the new. Committee members donated their time to resolve problems as they arose, until the new network was stabilized.

The Committee evaluated the Town's network and system management requirements and developed a Request for Quote seeking a reliable and inexpensive systems management. The responses received were evaluated and a recommendation was made to the Board of Selectmen for negotiating a contract with Data Evolution, LLC of Goffstown. A contract has been signed, and Data Evolution has assessed the Town's needs with the Board of Selectmen, Committee members, and the Town Administrators that use these systems daily. Maintenance and management plans have been established and is currently being implemented.

With all of this accomplished, the Technical Committee has met its goals of and has disbanded. I would like to thank all the members of the Committee for the time and effort they have devoted to making these improvements in the Town's administrative infrastructure. I know I'm speaking for every member of the committee when I say it has been a pleasure to serve our community again this past year.

SOLID WASTE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Town of Hillsboro is continuing its forward progress in closure of the landfill. Ground monitoring is showing good reports and gravel fill has been brought in to use in the closure. This has changed the landscape of the area and has halted our use of the landfill. Our construction and demolition material is now transferred to a facility off-site.

Recycling has increased by over 27 tons this year and is showing a cost reduction for all of the towns. There was a total of 475.12 tons of waste recycled at a rate of 35%. We were paid for some of the products plus saved the cost of tipping fees at the burn facility.

Total saved or received payment for \$26,560 for recycling waste.

We also received \$107,712 for tipping fees paid to us by commercial haulers. This is a total cost reduction of \$134,272 off the budget for 2000. The total expenditures for the transfer facility for 2000 were \$402,372. This is a net operating budget for \$268,100 for the year.

There has not been mandatory separation of aluminum, and we are encouraging a strong effort to separate. We currently receive 40 cents a pound. In 2000 the 6.38 tons that were sold brought in \$5104 of income.

There will be more changes this year as the final closure and capping of the landfill start to become a reality. We all hope for a continued increase of recycling next year and for each year to come

BUDGET ADVISORY COMMITTEE

CHARGE:

To provide guidance and counsel to the heads of the police, fire and highway departments in the development of the annual budgets for their departments.

To recommend to the department heads budgeting and internal accounting procedures that will make the budget easily understood by the citizens of Deering at the town meeting.

To submit a budget to the Board of Selectmen taking in to account the requests and needs of the various departments.

To recognize that all, final budget submissions to the voters of Deering are the responsibility of the Board of Selectmen.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should continue to provide an aggressive regimen of training for the secretary to the Board of Selectmen. This training should also include all parties involved with the implementation of the New Hampshire Finance Officers Association Manual (revised 1999) and the computer programming necessary for its implementation. The secretary along with the department heads should develop and present to the Board of Selectmen a policy of purchase order use for their consideration and possible adoption.

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should institute a policy of requiring all departments to use purchase orders for all purchased materials or services in excess of \$100.00. This form should be developed so that the following minimum items are contained therein; a PO number, name of vendor, date requisitioned, Deering person requisitioning, full account number, quantity, item

description, unit and total cost, Board of Selectmen authorization to order and material or services received authorization.

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should continue to provide monthly expenditure reports for themselves, the department heads and the budget advisory committee outlining the current year's budget. This report should be delivered within one week following the end of the month. These monthly expenditure reports should include, for each line, an initial budgeted amount, adjustments (cut/adds), expenditures during the previous month, expended year to date, funds encumbered, funds remaining and percent of initial budget remaining.

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should request that all proposed department budgets for the following year be turned in to the Budget Advisory Committee or to the Board of Selectmen by **October first**. Such budget requests shall follow New Hampshire Finance Officers Association Manual (revised 1999), with specific function and object numbers clearly delineated and should be accompanied by a comprehensive backup with reasons and justification for the proposed expenditures.

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should develop a budget policy so that all one-time expenditures in excess of \$500.00 are listed separately in the department budgets. Further, that all items for all town committees and departments with costs in excess of \$10,000.00 shall be submitted to the Capital Improvement Program Committee for review.

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should develop a policy that would require documented quotes on all expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 and formal bids for all expenditures exceeding \$5000.00. Further, the Deering Board of Selectmen should put out to bid, annually, for the amounts of gasoline, diesel oil, and propane needed by the various departments for the next year. Consideration by the Board of Selectmen of increasing the storage capabilities for fuel in the Town Garage area. Consideration should also be given to the pre-purchase of seasonally sensitive commodities.

It is the recommendation of the Deering Budget Advisory Committee that the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Deering should continue the **Capital Improvements Planning Committee**. The Board of Selectmen should encourage participation of all town departments in order to provide coordination of major purchases and to ensure that the requests are evened out year by year so as to avoid any major tax spikes.

Established in accordance with state law, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 19 towns in Merrimack and Deering Counties and the City of Concord. The Town of Deering is a member in good standing of the Commission.

The Commission's mission is to improve, through education, training, and planning assistance, the ability of the municipalities of the region to prepare and implement municipal plans; to prepare a plan for effective and appropriate development and utilization of the resources of the region; and to assist municipalities in carrying out the regional plan.

The Commission provides a variety of planning services, including consultations on planning issues; planning research; sample ordinances, regulations, and planning documents; models; data and access to data sources; grant information; review and comment on planning documents; development review; and educational programs. Membership also entitles a community to affordable master planning assistance, geographic information systems (GIS) mapping, and grant preparation.

During 2000, Commission staff provided the Town of Deering with assistance in the following areas:

Staff provided the Deering Conservation Commission with a copy of the Rivers Management statutes and information on Deering's natural and cultural resources was provided on disk to the Conservation Commission for use on their website.

A series of geographic information systems (GIS) maps were produced for display at Town Meeting.

In addition, in 2000 the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission undertook the following region-wide activities:

- Provided general local planning assistance to member municipalities and responded to inquiries regarding zoning ordinance, subdivision regulation, and site plan review regulation revisions. Prepared a calendar and narrative describing critical dates for Town Meeting.
- Provided assistance to CNHRPC member and non-member towns regarding National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participation and compliance.
- Facilitated four meetings of the CNHRPC Regional Resource Conservation Committee (R2C2).

- Attended meetings of and provided continuing technical assistance to the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMRLAC) and the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Committee (CNBRLAC).
- Developed new geographic information systems (GIS) map layers and continued to improve its GIS through staff training, improved methodologies, and the upgrade of key GIS equipment.
- Initiated the update of the FY 2003-2012 CNHRPC Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) by hosting the November 2000 CNHRPC Transportation Planning and Funding Summit and soliciting new transportation project proposals for inclusion in the updated TIP. Responded to inquiries related to the New Hampshire State Ten Year Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) update process.
- Conducted approximately 200 traffic counts throughout the region.
- Organized and hosted five meetings of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC).
- Provided assistance to municipalities, groups and interested individuals regarding the Transportation Enhancements (TE) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) programs.
- Initiated the update of the CNHRPC Regional Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan.
- Continued work on the update of the CNHRPC Regional Transportation Plan and development of the Regional Multi-Use Trail Plan and Regional Open Space Plan.

Article 2. It was voted to amend the Deering Zoning Ordinance by adding a new section entitled "Telecommunication Facilities Ordinance", establishing special procedures and requirements for site plan review and the granting of special exceptions for telecommunication towers and associated facilities. The provisions of this ordinance reflect the limited authority reserved to municipal governments by the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996, as clarified in Court decisions in the State of New Hampshire. This ordinance preserves the authority of the Town to place reasonable

conditions on the siting and configuration of facilities in order to minimize visual and other impacts, encourage co-location of antennae to minimize the number of towers, and assure the safety of air traffic, access by authorized Town personnel, continued maintenance and inspection, and removal of abandoned facilities at the owners' expense. Yes – 360, No - 108

On Saturday, March 18, 2000, at 9:00 A.M. Mr. Arthur E. Walmsley, Moderator, opened the meeting with a moment of silence, followed by a salute to the flag and singing of the first verse of America.

It was voted to accept the Moderator's rules under which the meeting would be run.

Article 3. It was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officials, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1999.

At this time Articles 12, 13, 14, and 15 were read and voted on out of order and the appropriations included in Article 4.

Article 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,141.35 for the purpose of participating in Hillsboro Park Services as defined in the Memorandum of Agreement.

Article 13. To see if the Town, if Article 12 is defeated, will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16, 141.35 for the purpose of developing Parks Services within the Town of Deering. This article was defeated.

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,008.21 for the purpose of participating in Hillsboro Youth Services as defined in the Memorandum of Agreement.

Article 15. To see if the Town, if Article 14 is defeated, will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,008.21 for the purpose of developing Youth Services within the Town of Deering. This article was defeated.

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$827,084.05 for general municipal operations.

Article 5. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for the purpose of funding activities of an Old Home Days Celebration in the year 2000.

Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums:

1. Crushed Gravel \$19,500
2. Road Reconstruction \$76,000

Peter Beard stated that the remainder of County Road and Dickey Hill Road would be reconstructed.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$56,236 for the purpose of a lease/purchase of a Highway Department Truck to be distributed in three (3) yearly installments of \$18,775.33.

Article 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,000 for the purpose of purchasing new tax maps to be distributed in three (3) yearly installments, two installments of \$18,000 and one of \$16,000.

Article 9. It was voted to deposit 50% of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (The Land Use Tax) in the Conservation Fund with an annual limit of \$20,000 in accordance with RSA 36-A: 5 III, as authorized by RSA 79-A: 25 II. This article will not lapse until it is rescinded by a vote of the Town.

Article 10. It was voted to place in the Conservation Commission Fund, previously established, any unexpended balance of the current year appropriation. This article will not lapse until it is rescinded by a vote of the Town.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$100,000 for the purpose of lease-purchasing a Deering Fire and Rescue Department Ambulance, to be distributed in four (4) yearly installments of \$25,000 each, where the first payment of \$25,000 will be provided by the Deering Fire and Rescue Department. After much discussion as to the status of the Rescue Department being a Town Department, this article was voted down.

Articles 12, 13, 14, and 15. Please see Article 4.

Article 16. By amendment it was voted to participate in Hillsboro Solid Waste Services as defined in the contracts.

Article 17. To see if the Town, if Article 16 is defeated, will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88,800 for the purpose of securing on-Curb Solid Waste Pickup Services within the Town of Deering as defined in the quote received from Trash Pickup. Since Article 16 was voted, this was voted down.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to purchase a suitable property that is or becomes available, to be used for the construction of a solid waste transfer station if alternative arrangements for solid waste disposal acceptable to the Town cannot be negotiated or maintained. Unexpended money is to be used for engineering and construction costs. Since Article 16 was voted, this was voted down.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the portion of Gregg Hill road between Tom Rush's house and the intersection with Tubbs Hill Road to the north, currently Class VI road, as a Class A Trail with access limited to foot, bicycle, and horse, in order to promote the conservation of Gregg Hill and to enhance residents' enjoyment of the natural environment of Deering. Mr. Tom Rush was voted permission to address the meeting, and he informed us that the person who had intended to buy his property had defaulted, and this article was no longer needed. The Article was voted down.

Article 20. It was voted to amend the new compilation of the Town of Deering Municipal Ordinance and the modifications that have been recommended by the Town's Attorney, as listed below and described in the Town of Deering Municipal Ordinance handout document.

- Open Containers of Alcoholic Beverages
- Parking Restrictions
- Vehicular Traffic
- Building Permit
- Dogs
- Sign & Billboard

Regulation of Trailer or Mobile Home Parks
Regulation of Care and Maintenance of Cemeteries
Sunday Sports Law

Article 21. Under this Article the following recommendations were made with the consensus of the meeting:

1. Submitted by Beverly Yeaple. Re: article20, I propose the following amendments to the article, part B as follows: B. a: Overnight parking on any Public Road of the Town..Is prohibited. (Amends the present overnight parking ordinance). ADDITIONS TO THE PARKING RESTRICTIONS; B.b: Stopping, standing or parking of vehicles outside businesses or residences on a public road. Upon any public road outside of a business or residence no person shall stop, park or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, upon the paved or main traveled part of the way when it is practicable to stop, park or so leave such vehicle off such part of said road. B.c: No vehicle shall be parked at any time within 200 feet of any intersection of the Public Roads of the Town of Deering. B.d: this section shall not apply to the driver of any vehicle which is disabled while on any public road in Deering in such manner and to such extent that it is impossible to avoid stopping and temporarily leaving such disabled vehicle in such position.
2. Submitted by Larry Sunderland. To see if the Town will vote to request that the Selectmen resolve the issues of legal status and liability with respect to the Deering Rescue Department and call a special Town Meeting to discuss the purchase of a new ambulance, and take any other action related thereto.
3. Submitted by John Ramsey. Request that the Board of Selectmen consider and Act on the recommendations of the Budget and Capital Improvement Committees as printed on pages 42 and 43 of the Annual Report.
4. Submitted by Robert E. Gahringer. To see if the voters will request that the Selectmen either suspend the present one-way restriction on Farrell Hill Road or replace it with a restriction applicable to ONLY those vehicles that need to be restricted in the interest of safety or utility, said restriction to be in force ONLY as necessary to maintain roads and safe passage.
5. Submitted by Charles Gaides. To recommend that the Deering Board of Selectmen investigate the purchase of a suitable source of sand and gravel for the Town and report back at the 2001 Town Meeting or earlier, if possible.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:40 PM.
