WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 14, 1939

Two Hundredth and Eighth Annual Meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March, A. D., 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose a Town Clerk, (Charles Wentworth), one Selectman for a term of three years (Albert D. Littlehale), a Town Treasurer (George D. Stevens), a Collector of Taxes (Arthur P. Stewart), two Auditors (Clement Moran and Harry C. Woodworth), four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years (L. J. Batchelder, G. S. Ham, J. Guy Smart, and R. R. Starke), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years. Mark Willey.

3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-nine hundred and four dollars (\$2904.00) to obtain State Aid on the following: State Aid Construction on Durham Point Road. (See approved item in the budget.) Passed.

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.) \$7,000.00.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (See approved items in the budget.) Voted.

6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional De-

velopment Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00) (See budget.) Voted.

7. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Woodman Avenue and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the same. (See budget.) Voted.

8. To see if the Town will vote to improve and tar a section of Woodman Avenue from Madbury Road to the Bowler-Smith property line, and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the same. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.) Postponed.

9. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the upper end of Emerson Road from Madbury Road by the property of Henry Clapp and Phillip Wilcox and to open said road to Madbury Road by a road near the line of the Wesley Davis property and parallel to said line. The distance is short and the land in question apparently is town property. Voted.

10. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 96, Articles 3 through 18 of the Public Laws as amended. Adopted.

11. To see if the Town of Durham will elect by ballot, three sewer commisioners as prescribed by Chapter 96 of the Public Laws. Passed.

12. To see if the Town of Durham will authorize its Sewer Commission to negotiate with the University of New Hampshire the terms and conditions under which the town sewerage system may enter the University sewerage system. Voted.

13. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to pay all costs of construction of Town sewer mains and require all property owners to pay all costs of construction of the connecting lines from the properties served to the Town sewer mains. Voted.

14. To see if the Town of Durham will appropriate the sum of \$5300 (as estimated by Weston and Sampson) for construction of a sewer line in Mill Road from the College Brook sewer to a point on Mill Road near the house of Harry C. Woodworth as outlined on pages 3 and 4 Mill

Road of Weston and Sampson's report of January 30, 1939, and as indicated on the plan. (See budget Art. 14 and Art. 15 below.) Voted.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$4,000 to complete the project of Art. 14 said sum to be repaid by \$2,000 in 1940 and the balance of \$2,000 in 1941. Voted.

16. To see if the Town of Durham will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used by the Sewer Commission to defray expenses connected with the Commission in the performance of its official duties. (Not approved by Budget Committee because of the expected balance from 1938 appropriation.) Postponed.

17. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken on Article 6 in the Warrant for the Town Meeting of March, 1936, which related to the adoption of the Municipal Budget Act. Rejected.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept the extensions of Woodman Avenue, now in process of construction, with the understanding that previous regulations as to width and subgrade are to be compiled with before such acceptance will be granted. Voted.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase the property of the Durham Water Company and specify the amount to be paid. Voted \$12,500.

20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds to cover the purchase of the property of the Durham Water Company. Voted notes.

21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer the affairs of the Water system and to appoint such agent or agents as may be necessary to carry on the business. Voted.

22. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. Adopted.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. Voted.

24. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1939. Voted.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

March 12, 1940

Two Hundredth and Ninth Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.

3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-nine hundred and sixty-one dollars (\$2,961.00) to obtain State aid on the following:

State Aid on Durham Point Road. (See budget).

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget).

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required. (See budget).

6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). (See budget).

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to be applied to the purchase of books for the Children's Room, at the Library, to be known as the Charlotte A. Thompson Memorial Collection. (See budget).

8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken on Article 6 in the Warrant for the Town Meeting of March, 1936, which related to the adoption of the Municipal Budget Act. Petitioned by John C. Tonkin, John S. Reardon, Lee L. Rice, Armene Bedard, Omer Bedard, Leo Bedard, Ora Bedard, Lea Bedard, Mrs. J. E. Reardon, Clarina Boucher.

9. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1940.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SEWER COMMISSION

The Sewer Commission was authorized at the Town Meeting held on March 14, 1939 to construct the Mill Road sewer line at a cost of \$5,300.00.

Plans and specifications were sent out. Bids were received by the Commission and opened in the presence of the Selectmen and the Commission's engineers at the Town Hall at 10:00 A.M., Wednesday, June 21, 1939.

The contract was awarded to J. J. Callahan of West Roxbury, Mass. Construction was started within 10 days under the supervision of the Commission's engineers, who maintained a resident engineer on the project during construction.

The Mill Road sewer line consists of 1610 feet of 8" pipe with the necessary manholes and connections; laid approximately in the center of the road in accordance with the Commission's plans and specifications.

During construction the Commission found that the estimated amount of ledge was being exceeded and that to complete the project as originally planned it would be necessary to exceed the appropriation. The Commission consulted with the Selectman and it was decided to complete the project. This resulted in an over-run of \$148.40, plus the cost of re-surfacing the road.

This balance can be used only for the maintenance of Town sewers. (Public Laws of New Hampshire, chapter 96—section 5B, adopted by the Town of Durham at the Town Meeting, March 14, 1939.)

All houses on Mill Road between the College Brook and the house of William Daniels, including those now under construction have been connected with the new sewer line.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Sewer Commission recommends the construction of the Madbury Road sewer line at a cost of approximately \$13,000.00 as the next project to be undertaken by the Town. This project should be carried out in sections as funds are made available for this purpose.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

February 1, 1940

To the Town of Durham:

During the past year a total of 5,320 volumes were added to the general library collection. This number includes 95 titles purchased from funds of the Durham Library Association and 97 titles purchased from funds provided by the Town of Durham. Books added from town funds include 78 juvenile titles and 19 adult books. Twenty-five books were rebound from Durham Library Association funds and 27 from town funds. The combined book collection as of February 1 is 104,357 volumes. A total of 53,987 volumes were circulated during the year from the main building, including town and university use and a total of 4,450 volumes from the children's room. It is believed that the practice of spending most of town funds to keep up the children's collection is a sound policy as evidenced by ever increasing use by the children of the community. The development of sound reading habits on the part of the young people will in years to come form a basis for sound education. Leading popular adult books are provided from Durham Library Association funds by careful selection of recently published titles. The more solid material is readily available to all from the university collections. The Durham Library Association has found it a good policy to provide a number of duplicate copies of best sellers, which policy has made possible wider circulation of titles most in demand.

The newly remodeled and refurnished children's room was reopened last spring and is proving most attractive to the young people. This room served as headquarters in the summer of 1939 for a course in library work with children conducted by Miss Anne Carroll Moore, Supervisor of Work with Children, New York Public Library, as a part of the Summer Library Institute. Miss Moore has probably done

more to influence interest in libraries for children and to encourage publication of worthwhile, well printed and appropriately illustrated children's books than any other single person in America. It is gratifying to note here that Miss Moore found the library's arrangements for service to children very satisfactory and to note her keen interest in the collection and the community. It was through her courtesy that arrangements were made with a number of publishers to donate to the children's room 31 outstanding juvenile books, chiefly picture books; these books will form the nucleus of a reference collection of books of this type, books which may be read and enjoyed within the room. The November issue of the *Library Lantern* featured annotations of recent outstanding children's books as a part of the annual celebration of Book Week. In addition to the usual book displays for this week, a very successful series of story hours was initiated at that time; plans are being made for continuation of this series. The library has been fortunate in having available the volunteer services of Mrs. Carlton E. Wright for the children's room during the past few months. Mrs. Wright is a trained librarian and children and parents will find her services in reading guidance valuable; she is on duty in the room on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 3:00 to 5:00 P.M. During the year several collections of books were made available to the Durham School by temporary deposit. This service has meant a great deal to children who commute and have no other reasonable opportunity to come into contact with library books.

My report for last year called attention to the desirability of more funds from the town as a part of its share in the development of the library and its book collection. I wish to recommend that the town appropriate at its annual meeting this year the sum of \$300, an increase of \$100 over the amount budgeted for this purpose during the past few years. Such an increase is badly needed for purchase of public library material demanded by the community, which material cannot be purchased from university funds, and

for upkeep through binding and repair of town library books.

It is very fitting that this report should pay tribute to the memory of Miss Charlotte Thompson, whose death occurred on September 24, 1939. In her capacity as former librarian of the Durham Public Library, as assistant librarian of the Hamilton Smith Library, and as a book selecting committee of one for the Durham Library Association, "Aunt Lottie" served the library and community faithfully and well for more than thirty-five years. Her life was a long and useful one and her kindly presence will be keenly missed by the library and her many friends. Her name will be perpetuated in library history by the naming of the children's room as the *Charlotte Thompson Room*. No more fitting tribute can be paid to her than by the gift of books for this room, and it is with pleasure that we record here gifts of books inscribed to her memory by Mrs. Ralph D. Paine and Mrs. Daniel B. Ninde. Other such gifts will be very appropriate and will be greatly appreciated.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1938 - 1939

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I have the honor to present my eleventh annual report. As in previous issues the statistics are for the School Year 1938-1939 but the enrollment for this year is given for purposes of comparison. It takes good money to print statistical tables and so only those are given which are thought to be of interest to the public.

There has been only one change in teachers since the last report, Miss Emily Collins of Laconia, succeeding Miss Whytock who was married during the Spring term. Mrs. Dorothy Pratt continues as School Nurse and her report accompanies that of the superintendent.

We are again using the Standard Graduation Tests in June, to check our own judgement as to the preparation of the pupils to do high school work. In the middle of the year we use the Metropolitan Achievement Tests. As these have now been used several years we can check the individuals advancement from year to year. The superintendent can also use the results in comparing the work done in different schools.

There are 77 pupils attending Dover High School and seven attending Newmarket High School, whose tuition is paid by the District. Four pupils attend the elementary schools of Newmarket and their tuition is paid by Durham School District. As stated in the last report the number attending high school will increase a little each year for the next few years.

The school at Packer's Falls this year numbers only 12 pupils, 2 of those being from Lee. The number will probably remain about the same, no less, next year.

More grading has been done at the school the past summer but the playground is still far from satisfactory although ample in extent. The building now will begin to need paint both inside and out. It is also hoped that the District will be able to furnish money for a program clock this coming year.

The people of Durham take an interest in their schools as is witnessed by the following:

The Lion's Club paid for 56 treatments of teeth. They also aided the Knights of Pythias in work on the playground. The MacDowell Club presented two pictures by Paul Schramm. Mr. Clement Moran took pictures of the pupils each year for quite a number of years and recently presented copies of each class so taken to be preserved in the files of the school.

The Durham Garden Club has presented flowers, a terrarium, and sponsored an educational "movie."

The American Association of University Women has loaned a cabinet full of exhibits and Miss Mary Sanborn, a radio. Shrubbery for the school was bought by Mr. Hepler from the Parks Appropriation and Mr. Hepler, Mr. Grinnell, Mr. Wilcox, Mr. Cortez and Mr. Mundy set out the shrubs.

The splendid cooperation given by the Hamilton-Smith Library should not be allowed to go unmentioned. Its "reading hour" for young children has been particularly helpful. An active Parent Teachers' Association has also been helpful.

The School Board has worked consistently to help the superintendent and teachers and their support has been appreciated.
