Commissioner Mann announced that Grafton County is eligible to receive \$60,000 in Federal Funds (no match required) to deal with child abuse throughout the entire county. The County will receive 5% to cover administrative costs.

Representative Snell moved, Eaton seconded, that Grafton County sponsor the child abuse program, that the Commissioners be authorized to accept the \$60,000 grant, provided that the County accept no liability for continuing the program after the expiration of the funds. It is the intent of the Executive Committee that the funds be used to train existing caseworkers. Motion passed unanimously.

Logan moved that the Travel & Expense Item 71 be increased to \$3,000. Seconded by Taffe. LaMott amended Item 71 to read \$2,000. Seconded by Snell. Amendment passed. Motion passed as amended.

LaMott called the meeting to order at 9:15 A.M. LaMott explained his meeting with the Insurance Commissioner. Snell moved that the chairman of the Delegation be instructed to contact Welfare Director Lacombe to express the opinion that the Grafton County Executive Committee feels that in the event sufficient funds are not available they should not use the alternative of reducing the number of recipients but reduce the overall amount proportionately. Seconded by McAvoy. Motion passed.

Rounds moved that we reconsider our action on the 6% pay increase May 21, 1977.

Seconded by Taffe. Motion passed.

Rounds moved that the County Attorney's pay increase of 6% take effect January 1, 1978. Seconded by Snell. Withdrawn.

Rounds moved that 6% pay increase for all elected officials take effect January 1,

1979. Seconded by Snell.

LaMott moved to amend the Rounds motion by striking out the effective date of January 1, 1979 and inserting in place the following: 6% salary increase shall be granted to all elected officials except the County Attorney on July 1, 1977. The County Attorney increase of 6% effective January 1, 1978. Seconded by Logan. Not passed. The amendment failed and Rounds original motion passed, 6 Yes, Rounds voted in favor, LaMott voting against. Copenhaver in the chair wished to be recorded against.

Copenhaver moved that the Register of Probate be given permission to hire a new

clerk at a rate higher than normal. Seconded by Logan. Motion passed.

LaMott moved that the Commissioners recommendation of one Secretary and one additional Deputy Sheriff in Line Items 01 and 03 in the Sheriff's budget be reconsidered. Seconded by Buckman. LaMott moved that the appropriation for the position be contingent upon the Deputy living in the Lebanon area. Seconded by Taffe. Roll call: Yes — Copenhaver, LaMott, Logan, Buckman. No — Snell, McAvoy, Rounds, Taffe. Motion lost. Taffe moved that a Secretary be added to the Sheriff's Dept.

Seconded by LaMott. Motion passed 7-1, Rounds voting No.

LaMott moved that we reinstate the travel cost of the Clerk of Court at \$2,000 and the Bailiff at \$1,500 in the Superior Court under Line Items 70 and 71. Seconded by Logan. Motion passed 7-1, Rounds voting No. Superior Court budget — LaMott moved that Line Item 97 be \$1,440 for two filing cabinets and a typewriter. Seconded by Logan. Motion passed. LaMott moved that Meals on Wheels and Transportation be handled by the Upper Valley Senior Citizens to total \$39,480. Seconded by Buckman. Logan moved that we delay action on the motion until we get a report from the Investigating Committee, Monday, August 15. Seconded by Taffe. Motion passed.

LaMott moved that Social Services be tabled. Seconded by Rounds. Motion pass-

ed.

LaMott moved that \$1,000 be deleted from the Line Item 9900. Seconded by McAvoy. Motion passed.

LaMott moved that \$800 be added to Line Item 9200, Landscaping. Logan seconded.

Defeated.

LaMott moved that the Executive Committee shall meet Monday, August 15 at 9:00 A.M. and the Delegation meeting be held Monday, August 29 at 10:00 A.M. Seconded by Snell. Adopted.

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF

SOCIAL SERVICES STUDY COMMITTEE

As of last Monday afternoon we on this committee were notified to have a report ready for the Executive Committee before Monday, August 15. This despite assurances from Chairman LaMott on July 19 that without a state budget there was no point for our committee to attempt any action.

Therefore, little time or objective searching has been done. Never the less, we will attempt to make some realistic recommendations based on what may be a very sparse state budget (Plan C) and its' effects on the County Home and welfare. We have attempted to be consistent with respect to funding these requests by applying the following:

1. No funding of any new programs.

2. No funding by both cities/towns and the County.

3. No elimination of critical funds, that is, ones which will either terminate the

program or cause loss of a substantial amount of matching funds.

These recommendations are not meant to pass judgement on the necessity, the value, or the benefits of the programs involved. Rather they are based on an objective analysis of the financial information as presented to us. We would like to reiterate the absolute necessity of an oversight committee if you are to fund any of these areas. To do an adequate and equitable job there has got to be a great deal of time given to meeting with the requesting agencies and hammering out questions and compromises of requests. The need has been further addressed to us in the form of the transportation mess we had with Tri-County CAP. Constant oversight and accountability is necessary.

Unrecommended as we are not familiar with North Country Community Services and no reports available. We therefore withhold recommendations.

*VI. UPPER VALLEY TRAINING CENTER

Fund \$4,000. It is our understanding that they are not eligible for further funds from other sources; therefore, definitely need money for matching funds.

VII. YOUTH HOUSE ASSOCIATION

Willing to fund with 25% reduction, in the interest of economy. Requested \$6,000. Fund \$4,500.

VIII. MEALS ON WHEELS

Little opportunity to look into this area other than appearing before State Council on Aging concerning transportation grant/Tri-County CAP. As Executive Committee has already recommended funding we feel we are not in position to recommend funding either way.

*IX. FAMILY PLANNING

A. Littleton/Ammonoosuc

No other funds available for matching funds. Recommend same amount as last year — \$2,000.

Total recommended is \$77,746, which is approximately 62% of FY 1977 budget.

Logan moved to amend Study Committee's recommendations to award \$2,000 to LISTEN. Seconded by Copenhaver. Objection — Mr. Buckman — political reasons. Objection to Buckman objection. Roll call vote — Yes — Copenhaver, Logan. No — Rounds, McAvoy, Snell, Eaton, Buckman. Motion for amendment lost.

funding of Social Service programs.

Pepitone moved to amend motion to include "All three must supply on-site visits and follow-up for individuals from catchment areas at County Home, Farm, or Jail, averaging at least two visits per month (24 visits per year) if necessary." Seconded by Snell. Hand vote on amendment — Unanimous on favor.

Rep. Hough moved to amend motion to fund at \$1.00 per capita to Littleton Mental Health (\$17,532) and Lebanon/Hanover (\$25,006), and to fund only \$1,560 to Plymouth area for on-site visits due to surplus in that budget. Rep. Ward seconded. Hand vote on

amendment. 17-Yes, 7-No. Amendment carried.

3. Duplication of taxation — What if an agency gets only partial funding from towns? A denial of County funding could jeopardize that service, resulting in the necessity of total County support for certain individuals. (Not fully discussed.)

4. Ability of agencies to achieve funding through other sources — Not discussed.

5. Services/agencies rejected by municipal voters—Towns don't consider County funding when voting on funding social services; they only consider whether or not they want to fund the programs. It was felt that the County should not fund programs rejected by local taxpayers. On the other hand, some agencies go only to the County for funding, not to the towns; does this give them an unfair advantage? (Needs further discussion.)

It was decided to advertise in area newspapers regarding requests for funding applications. Upon receipt of requests for application, 6 page budget form will be sent out, along with a copy of the Delegation resolution of Aug. 29, 1977. A notice will also be included stating that applications must be in the Commissioners possession by April 3, 1978 and that all items on applications must be completed or application will be rejected.

REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

As required by Statutes, the Commissioners of Grafton County herewith submit the

reports of the various County officials for Fiscal Year 1978.

We are pleased to announce that the fiscal year ended with a sizeable surplus due to revenues greater than anticipated and to the conscientious efforts of all department heads to keep within budget allocations. Nursing Home revenues are up considerably because of the increased cost reimbursement allocations. Register of Deeds and the County Farm reflected higher than usual revenues, and additional revenue was gained by interest earned in a good money management system.

One of the single largest, unpredictable, ever-expanding expenses is in State programs for Old Age Assistance, Aid to Disabled, and Nursing Home Care under the Welfare account—a State mandated expense with little or no control at local level.

The sewage disposal system project is progressing slowly but surely (we hope) with construction anticipated within the next two years. Grafton County and Woodsville precinct have combined efforts in the sewage disposal project to have one treatment plant which will be owned and operated by Woodsville precinct. Grafton County will be responsible for pumping its' waste to the treatment plant.

be responsible for pumping its waste to the treatment plant.

Through Law Enforcement Assistance Administration grants the Court House security system was expanded to cover the front entrance and the court room as well as the back entrance. Grants have also provided a computerized docket management system for the County Attorneys office, additional equipment for the Jail and Dispatch Center and continued participation in the Dispatch Center operation, and staffing for the female correctional facility.

Two projects for land improvement under the capital outlay budget included building a ditch behind the Court House to alleviate the drainage problem and repairing road/dike connection between the island meadow and the mainland of County

Farm property.

Active steps have been taken to investigate the possibility of increasing the size of the kitchen at the County Nursing Home. Kitchen facilities were not expanded at the time of the addition to the building, but a definite need for positive action exists. Meetings have been held with the Administrator and interested architectural firms with the intention of including a request in next years budget proposal.

As is the trend, we have gratefully experienced growing public awareness in the affairs of county government, and encourage the increased interest of the citizens in their government. Better coverage by the news media and special efforts by reporters to understand government operation and report factually is to be commended. Commissioners meetings are held regularly every Monday morning at the Court House and are open to the public. Remember—it is your County and your tax dollars.

In closing we wish to express our appreciation to the staff, employees and the Employee Council, County Delegation and Executive Committee, town and city officials and State officials, and agencies for their continued support and cooperation. We especially appreciate the fine communication and rapport of all concerned.

AUDITORS' REPORT

Gentlemen:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds of Grafton County for the year ended June 30, 1978, listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, the aforementioned financial statements present fairly the financial position of the various funds of Grafton County at June 30, 1978, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding

year

The accompanying supplemental data consisting of cost statements for the nursing home and jail are unaudited, but are provided as additional information for county officials.

In connection with our examination, we also (1) made a study and evaluation of the County's system of internal accounting control, (2) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Acts and regulation as required by Sections II.C.3. and III.C.3. of the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients (Guide) issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury and (3) compared the data on Bureau of Census Form RS-900 to records of Grafton County as required by Section II.C.4. of the "Guide." Our findings are set forth in special fund pages of this report.

Based on these procedures, we noted no instance of noncompliance with the regulations and no difference between Census data on Form RS-900 and the records of Grafton County for the year ended June 30, 1978.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounts of the County are maintained on the modified accrual basis of accounting with revenue not received and expenditures not paid being accrued at year end, except accrued interest on outstanding indebtedness, which is paid together with matured indebtedness from appropriations of the following year. Inventories are recorded at cost. Expenditures for general fund fixed assets are expensed in the year of purchase.

2. Pension

The County provides for pension benefits to substantially all employees through a contributory retirement system under New Hampshire law. The law prescribes the formula for computing retirement allowances and presently does not permit advance funding of pension liabilities. Retirement allowances are paid from County funding and employee contributions. Employee contributions constitute an annuity savings fund from which a portion of the retirement allowance is paid. Pension expense for the year totaled \$30,718, determined on an actuarial basis.

3. Equipment Fund

Land, buildings and equipment are recorded at historical cost. Depreciation is com-

puted on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Ranges of annual depreciation rates are as follows:

When property units are retired, or otherwise disposed of, the applicable cost and accumulated depreciation thereon is removed from the property records and related asset and depreciation reserve accounts.

REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS

Honorable Board of Commissioners:

As usual, the past year has been busy and diversified.

At the nursing home, we continue to have a full census with a waiting list.

Annual accreditation surveys were conducted by the New Hampshire Bureau of Health Care Facilities Administration, and the nursing home was granted continuing certification. These surveys are performed yearly to assure that the home is in compliance with all Medicaid laws and regulations. Under these regulations, we have a host of ancillary services to our patients, such as physical and recreational therapy; social services; dental and dietetic consultants; as well as mental health clinicians.

Very active this year, was the Grafton County Nursing Home Association which continues to provide funds and volunteers for bingo, field trips, movies, etc. It also serves as liason between the County and the Community.

The Kenneth Bell Memorial Park was dedicated in May 1973. This mini-park provides a barrier free outdoor garden for all patients, including those confined to wheelchairs.

During the year, Grafton County hosted seven workshops sponsored by the federally-funded Project Comet. These sessions were open to sister facilities and were well attended.

The Woodsville Water and Light Company installed an alarm in the Jail office so our staff can monitor the depth of the Route 112 Reservoir.

Maintenance Department personnel constructed a new entrance for the Jail building for better access to the dining room. They also replaced the waterline in the tunnel and wire-meshed the pipes. They replaced two major door locks and provided repairs to plumbing, etc. during the year.

The whole jail interior was painted by inmate labor.

An all-day workshop on "Hostages" was conducted in March by the New Hampshire State Police. Their S.W.A.T. team provided valuable information to our staff, as well as to other law enforcement agencies attending.

Reverend Alan McCain and Mrs. Susan Briggs provided tutoring for eight inmates, who went on to obtain high school equivalency diplomas while incarcerated.

The federal grant to provide female correctional officers for women prisoners was funded at 50% level.

With the impending federal regulations, Grafton County is well on its way to compliance already. All correctional officers have had a minimum of 80 hours of outside training; a Grievence Committee has been meeting with the Superintendent monthly for over a year (this consists of three inmates representing all inmates); a Disciplinary Board with community representation, has been in place for months. (This affords any reprimanded inmate the opportunity to have a hearing before being disciplined.) A television set; new mattresses, book shelves and a set of small individual personal property lockers were provided for inmates.

The Work Release Program has been used by 7 inmates in the past year and many inmates served their sentences on weekends only.

The farm has been producing well. During the year we slaughtered 20 steers and 16 utility cows for comsumption at the nursing home. We also sold 14 head at cattle sales, averaging \$1,100.00 per head, with the top sale bringing \$2,300.00. Milk production will hit 1,2000,000 pounds, while maintaining 3.9 butter fat average. Demand for piglets constantly exceeds our supply.

We had the barn yard cemented, using maintenance department personnel, and we purchased a John Deere tractor.

Our Staff is to be complimented. Their expertise, dedication and loyalty are what make the Complex work. We take this opportunity to also commend the Clergy and the

Community for their participation and concern. We have enjoyed working with your Board and your office staff and appreciate the many courtesies extended, as well as your continued understanding and support.

REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY ATTORNEY

July 1, 1977 to June 30, 1978

The past year has seen the innovation of two programs recommended by the Judicial Planning Committee. The first was the establishment of two assistant prosecutors for the purpose of prosecuting cases in the district courts. Thus, every district and municipal court with the exception of Plymouth, Bristol and Hanover (which has its own prosecutor), has had the services of a trained attorney to assist in the prosecution of cases which were formerly handled by police officers. This experimental one-year program was funded entirely by Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds. The program was initiated at the request of local departments which felt that the several weeks of training at the Police Academy was inadequate compared with the several years of law school training that the defendant's legal representative in the district court has obtained. This program has been generally well received by the public and the police departments handling cases in district and municipal courts.

The second innovation was the recalling of the Grand Jury towards the end of the Fall Term in an effort to reduce case processing time and court delay. Formaly, there was no Grand Jury between the second week of September and the first week of April. Under the new system, trail dates can be advanced as much as six months for those crimes brought into Superior Court after the first Fall sitting of the Grand Jury.

The Judicial Planning Committee in its comprehensive plan for the year 1979 has recommended that more counties follow the example of Rockingham County and establish the office of full-time prosecutor. I have generally opposed this suggestion feeling that the present system of a part-time prosecutor as is followed in Grafton County or a part-time prosecutor with a full-time assistant as is followed in many of the other counties should be sufficient to meet the needs of our citizens. The arguments of the Judicial Planning Committee in favor of a full-time prosecutor are, however, quite persuasive and should be studied in detail by the County Delegation, in view of the growing caseload and rapidly increasing population of the southern part of the County.

Although the Computerized docket management system is due to be terminated at the end of the year, it is being transferred to the Office of the Clerk where it is hoped it

can be expanded to ultimately handle civil as well as criminal cases.

During the past two years, the following improvements in the Grafton County Sheriff's Department, and the 24 Hour Dispatch-Communications System have been introduced:

1. An entirely new record system was designed and implemented, including cross references by victim, crime, and town, for better record retrieval.

2. In conjunction with the record system, Grafton Sheriff's Office began reporting crime statistics to the Uniform Crime Reporting section of the New Hampshire State Police, as part of the national crime reporting system. Logs and forms were designed to better log all activity of the Sheriff's Department for more accurate records and annual reports.

3. A new deputy position was created for the Lebanon-Canaan-Hanover area.

4. A cooperative agreement between the Sheriff's Department and the White Mountain National Forest was entered into, with the Sheriff's Department providing part-time mobile patrols of Federal Campgrounds, and a walking patrol of National Forest trails. Funds are provided by the White Mountain National Forest.

5. Several recorders were added to Dispatch, so that all phones and radio messages

are recorded on tape.

- All ambulances in the County were permitted to have the capability of the county
 police frequency for interface purposes, and to increase protection to the crews
 when on a run.
- 7. A cooperative agreement between the Sheriff's Department and the Twin State Fire Mutual Aid system was entered into, and the Sheriff's Department will provide dispatching services to seventeen fire departments for a yearly fee. Start up time will be in the near future.

8. A micro fische viewer was added to dispatch, to permit the rapid looking up of

motor vehicle listings, by plate, owners name, or VIN.

9. Additional closed circuit TV equipment was added, so that Dispatch may monitor the front and rear doors of the Court House after hours. Intercom, electric door locks and a unique motion detector device was installed on one TV camera, that alerts the dispatcher to look at the screen when someone moves on the screen.

10. A duress alarm is being installed in the Court room, plus other key points in the Court House, which will alert Dispatch to trouble in the Court rooms.

11. We have provided deputies each year to assist the State at the Seabrook nuclear plant confrontation.

I would like to take this opportunity to especially thank the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency and the United States Forestry Service. By virtue of their funding, this department was able to furnish the people of Grafton County additional services, which are so vital to the Criminal Justice System.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all the law enforcement agencies

for their cooperation and assistance during this past year.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

As, usual, Grafton County Nursing Home is operating at 100% capacity with 81 hospital and 61 resident patients. Present bed capacity is 142, an increase to two, due to

a conversion of a storage room.

Occupational Therapy, headed by Jerilyn Fortier, had been quite active. A new feature this year has been a Lawn Sale of patient crafts. Part of the proceeds of the sale going to patients themselves and the other part is kept for the improvement of the Occupational Therapy Department.

Carol Miller, registered Physical Therapist, has been with us two years. Currently she is scheduled at the Grafton County Home two mornings a week. Her program is

augmented by aides during the rest of the week.

Our Co-ordinator of Volunteers, Shirley McKean, is retiring in November. In the four years that she has held this position many activities have been added for the pleasure of the residents of the Home. Amy Emerson will be our new Co-ordinator of Volunteers and will carry on these activities and projects. These include car rides and shopping trips. In addition, R.S.V.P. provides projects such as Mini-bus activities, specifically fishing and shopping trips.

There have been changes in Federal and State drug regulations, stimulating us to use Uni-dose system, now under contract with Putnam's Pharmacy, Hanover, New Hampshire. This has just been initiated and it's benefits and difficulties are yet to be

assessed.

In general, I feel the patients are well cared for here and I take great pride in my association with the Grafton County Home.
