HANCOCK 1978

At town meeting 49 warrant articles, totaling some \$49,000, were approved. The budget was \$225,792, up 5.8%. Two more town meetings were held, one in August to approve replacement of the Link Rd. bridge, and one in December, at which it was voted to join a new Workmen's Compensation plan. The landfill schedule was decreased, and stickers issued to residents. The Dump Study Committee made a number of recommendations, including the establishment of a Refuse Disposal Committee. The Community Chorus, active from 1939 to 1950, was revived under Eleanor Amidon's direction. The selectmen hired the Keene appraisal firm of Edward F. Greene. Old Home Day featured a variety show this year, won by the barbershop sextet of Mary and Marty Robinson, Allison and Charles Kerwin, Doug Herman, and Mike Ozenich. "Doin' What Comes Naturally" was the theme of the parade, in which the Women's Club float took first prize. Doug Herman won the first annual road race, and Bob Fogg and Mark Hamilton, the canoe race. Hearings were held on proposed changes to the zoning regulations and building code.

A Hancock Bicentennial Committee was formed, with Eleanor Amidon, chairman; Richard Kerwin, cochairman; Charlotte Sobe, secretary; Sarah Hutchins, treasurer; and Virginia Merrion. Nancy Adams and Nancy Hill submitted the winning designs for the Bicentennial medal. The celebration began on New Year's Eve with a dinner at the Inn, followed by a dance at the town hall.

The town underwent some physical changes. Under the sponsorship of the Conservation Commission, a group of boys planted about a dozen trees on Main St. The Fish & Game Dept. completed a road to Carpenter's Bog, and construction of an 80-ft. dam was begun, at a projected cost of about \$55,000. The town hall was painted, its floors refinished, and storm windows installed. The Historic District Commission voted to allow 53 extra feet of parking space on Main St. Bud Adams, under contract to the Conservation Commission, opened an inlet from Moose Brook to Norway Pond to improve the pond's circulation.

In early February the Fire Dept. was called on to fight two fires simultaneously at opposite ends of town: one in Louis Hugron's barn and the other at the Florens' home. In April the Ladies' Auxiliary conducted a town census for the selectmen. Rebecca Lohmiller was elected the first woman member of the department, and its third EMT.

In April about 25 members of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Assoc., Guelph, Ontario, visited the Mathewsons' Brooks Side Farm during a visit to the Guernsey Cattle Club. Sue and Philip Mathewson's cows won top honors at the N.H. Guernsey Parish Show at the Hopkinton and Cheshire fairs, and Sue was chosen to represent the Guernsey breed with her calf "Sue" at the Eastern States Exposition.

TV cameras came to town again. In May Ellena Weston was shown at the New Boston 4-H Sheep & Wool Festival on Channel 4's "Evening Magazine." In October Polaroid Corp. executives were filmed at Sargent Camp, and the Anheuser-Busch Clydesdales were shown on the covered bridge and on Main St., attracting a crowd of 150.

Achievements and Honors: Simon Sheldon was awarded the Sportsman's Club's Perley Dunbar Award. Meade Cadot and Paul Doscher were elected to serve on the Environmental Coalition steering committee, and Mr. Doscher and Richard de La Chapelle were appointed delegates to the New England Energy Congress. Scott Manning was named to the dean's list at Colgate. Kenneth Moller was elected to the Monadnock Region Association's board of directors. Lewis Feldstein was

appointed to direct evaluation of the National Education Strategy Center in Hartford. Jared Jenisch, finalist in the EPA ecology poster contest, received a plaque from Sen. McIntyre. Earle Otis, oldest member of the Waverly Lodge IOOF, received a 75-year membership pin. Thomas Pond was appointed editor of the Bulletin of the Grand Lodge of N.H. In July Ellena Weston spent a week at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C., in the "Citizenship '78" program, and in November she represented N.H. at the National 4-H Congress in Chicago. Capt. Ray E. Pierce was named commander of the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard. Paul Garcia took first place in rifle marksmanship at Camp Fatima. Bud Adams received the Hancock Ale & Quail Society's trophy for hitting 25 out of 25 shots, and Tony Brown took first place at the Sportsmen's Club's annual game day. The Rev. Barry Cass was named minister of the United Church of Penacook. Richard de la Chapelle was elected vice-president of the Business and Industry Assoc. of N.H. James Burt was given the Outstanding Alumnus Award from Norwich University. David Sobe became director of marketing at the Nashua Federal Savings and Loan Assoc.

Celebrating their 50th wedding anniversaries were Mr. and Mrs. Julius Pickering (May) and Mr. and Mrs. C. Stewart Bradley (August). In June the Charles Johnsons and Jack Ropers observed their 25th.

Farewells: Mert Knowles and Bob Stewart retired as custodians of the skating and hockey rinks, a job they had performed tirelessly for many years. Taking over were Mark Hamilton, his father, Mark Sr., Rick Adams, Bob Fogg, Mark and Jeff Wilder, Charlie and Sean Kerwin, and Gary Johnson. And Mrs. Peabody held her last Easter prayer service for the schoolchildren in the Grange Hall.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Town of Hancock is a vital place. At age two hundred it is healthy, active and is cherished by its growing number of inhabitants. There have, of course, been changes in response to the times. Since these have been moderate and have been accomplished gracefully, they have caused no widespread concern.

This year, however, there is some evidence that the rate of change is quickening. It is also apparent that this is the cause of much concern among many of our citizens. The demand for public services has surged. Fire and rescue calls are up thirty-five percent over last year and Police calls have increased over sixty-five percent. Requests for improved road maintenance have increased dramatically in both number and urgency. At the same time more people have contacted the Selectmen than ever before to express their concerns about rising taxes and the erosion of the town's rural character.

This is not new. Public officials in growing communities everywhere have always had to struggle to keep changes moderate and to balance the demand for services with the available resources. What is significant is that this year, in Hancock, the intensity of that struggle has increased.

Accordingly the Selectmen, with some help from the Advisory Committee, have tried to determine an appropriate spending level for the town. Since the equalized assessed valuation is a measure of the town's current financial worth (and is data that is readily available), we feel that the annual total of all town appropriations should not exceed a fixed percentage of this value. We have suggested a similar approach to the School District.

In other areas we have revised the wage and benefit schedule for town employees, set up a new record-keeping system for the Highway Department, designed a bridge, completed the preliminary design of new buildings for the Highway and Fire Departments and presently are working on a capital budget for the future needs of the Town.

We extend our thanks to all town officials, appointees, volunteers and employees for their efforts on behalf of the town and commend all those citizens who, by taking an active interest in town affairs, provide the feedback necessary for effective local government.

HANCOCK ADVISORY COMMITTEE

In August of 1978 we were requested by the Selectmen to make a study of the question, "What can the people of Hancock afford to spend for public education?" After prolonged discussion it was decided to poll a cross section of the people of the Town. After interviewing a number of Parents, Teachers, Pupils and non-parents, papers giving their findings were submitted by four members of this committee. The results indicated a unanimous agreement that school costs should be held at their present level; that teaching methods and results obtained left a lot to be desired.

These papers were turned over intact to the Selectmen who informed the School Committee and administrators of the findings contained therein. Thus far, there has been no indication that these recommendations had any effect on the policies of either the School Committee or the School Administrators.

A review of all town salaries was made and agreement was reached by the Selectmen and this committee, the results of which will appear in the proposed budget for the ensuing year.

The line item budget as proposed by the selectmen was studied in detail and found to be very conservative. Any differences of opinion will be presented to the voters at Town Meeting for their consideration.

All the Warrant Articles have been studied in detail and they will be presented at Town Meeting together with the recommendations of this committee.

**SUMMARY OF MINUTES
OF
1978 TOWN MEETING**

Article 1: Parker Starratt and Ellis Jensen were unanimously elected, by voice vote, to be auditors for the year ensuing. Robert Mosher was unanimously elected, by voice vote, to be the sexton for the year ensuing.

Article 2: The Town accepted the budget in the amount of \$225,792.31 for estimated Town expenses, and the necessary sums for County Tax, deduct the revenues and credits, and raise the balance by taxation.

Article 3: Ballot vote: Yes 243, No 33.

Article 4: Ballot vote: Yes 236, No 32.

Article 5: Ballot vote: Yes 242, No 34.

Article 6: Ballot vote: Yes 229, No 35.

Article 7: Ballot vote: Yes 234, No 40.

Article 8: Ballot vote: Yes 201, No 81.

Article 9: Ballot vote: Yes 229, No 47.

Article 10: Ballot vote: Yes 236, No 46.

Article 11: The Town raised \$972.93 to be supplemented by \$6,486.22 from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for this year.

Article 12: The Town voted to accept \$7,958.34 in increased Municipal Highway Subsidy funds to be expended for road reconstruction on Norway Hill.

Article 13: The Town voted to raise \$11,000 for the purchase of a one-ton dump truck with plow for the Town Highway Department.

Article 14: The Town voted to discontinue the Town Highway Department Reserve Fund and apply those funds toward the one-ton dump truck.

Article 15: The Town voted to raise \$2,253 for the purchase and installation of five two-way radios for the Town Highway Department vehicles.

Article 16: The Town voted to raise \$450 for the purchase of a two-way radio for the Police Department.

Article 17: The Town voted to raise \$2,084 to purchase ten sets of protective clothing for the Fire Department.

Article 18: The Town voted to raise \$3,000 for the Conservation Commission to build a diversion dam on Moose Brook and dig a channel where the brook enters the pond for a better flow.

Article 19: The Town voted to raise \$1,000 for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund.

Article 20: The Town voted to raise \$1,500 to complete the excavation of the landfill.

Article 21: The Town voted to establish the position of Town Appraiser to be appointed annually by the selectmen and raised \$3,000 for 1978.

Article 22: The Town instructed the Selectmen to see that all Town Departments obtain competitive bids on all projects with anticipated expenditures over \$2,000.

Article 23: Amended and voted that \$7,349.31 of revenue sharing funds be used for maintenance and improvements on Town buildings and equipment and preliminary engineering work on new highway and fire department facilities. The balance of \$4,787 to be used to absorb the cost of Articles 15, 16 and 17.

Article 24: The Town voted NOT to join the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 25: The Town voted to raise \$1,379 for the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse.

Article 26: The Town voted to raise \$520 for the Mental Health Program of the Monadnock Mental Health Service.

Article 27: The Town voted to raise \$500 for the Town History Committee.

Article 28: The Town voted NOT to join Southwestern Regional Planning Commission.

Article 29: The Town voted NOT to raise money for the Town's share of the Planning Commission.

Article 30: The Town voted to discontinue the Fire Department Hose Reserve Fund and apply the money to the purchase of new hose.

Article 31: It was voted to TABLE this article.

Article 32: The Town voted to discontinue the Dock Fund and apply the money against the Town Recreation Department.

Article 33: The Town voted to establish a Police Department Equipment Replacement and Repair fund with income received by the department from January 1, 1977 on.

Article 34: The Town voted to establish a Highway Department Equipment Replacement and Repair fund with income received by the department from January 1, 1977 on.

Article 35: The Town voted to discontinue the Town Water Capital Reserve Fund and establish a Town Water Equipment Replacement and Repair Fund.

Article 36: It was voted to TABLE this article.

Article 37: The Town authorized the Selectmen to appoint one Deputy tax Collector and one Deputy Treasurer.

Article 38: The Town authorized the Moderator to appoint a Town Bicentennial Committee for 1979.

Article 39: The Town instructed the Selectmen to write to Governor Thomson, the State Highway Department and Judge Bownes, indicating the majority of Hancock voters at the 1978 Town Meeting are against construction of a 4-lane, limited access, east-west expressway passing through the Monadnock Region.

Article 40: The Town voted NOT to appoint a commission to oversee the Norway Pond Nature Preserve.

Article 41: The Town voted to open Brimstone Corner Road 300 feet beyond the residence of Edward Mulhall, Sr.

Article 42: It was voted to make all roads listed in the article subject to gates and bars.

Article 43: It was voted to make all roads listed in the article subject to gates and bars.

Article 44: It was voted to make all roads listed in the article subject to gates and bars.

Article 45: It was voted to discontinue all roads listed in the article.

Article 46: The Town authorized the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 47: The Town voted to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds: Lester and Elizabeth Snyder, Richard Higgins, Joseph McCormick and the Alexandra Toumanoff Memorial Fund for the Library.

Article 48: The Town voted to accept the reports of the auditors and committees as printed in the Town Report.

Article 49: Ronald Perry questioned what would be done about putting up gates and bars on the roads so voted. He was told signs would be put up on those roads.

Under the Special Town Meeting of August 31, 1978, the Town voted the sum not to exceed \$21,000 for the construction of a bridge on Link Road over Ferguson Brook. It was also voted the Selectmen would look into the cost of repairing the existing bridge.

Under the Special Town Meeting of December 7, 1978, it was voted the Town will provide workmen's compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-funded Workers Compensation Program, commencing after January 1, 1979.

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and, upon approval by the voters at that time, to postpone consideration of the balance of the budget and Warrant until Saturday, the seventeenth day of March next at 1:00 p.m. in the afternoon.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Delete paragraph 4 of Article XI, so that a building permit will be required for remodeling.

4. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by petition of voters of the town for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XI to allow buildings to be erected in the Floor Plain District subject to a building permit obtained from the Building Inspector. The Planning Board disapproves this proposed amendment.

5. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: In Article III delete the definitions of **Home Occupation** and **Home Products and Produce** and amend Article XIII allowing the Board of Adjustment to permit home occupations under certain conditions.

6. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town building ordinance as follows: Amend Section XIII to require the Board of Selectmen to establish the basis for fees for building permits.

7. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by petition of voters of the town for the town building ordinance as follows: Amend Section XVI-1 to require the Building Inspector to determine whether proposed building sites are reasonably safe from flooding and to define flood hazard areas as designated by the Federal Insurance Administration. The Planning Board disapproves this proposed amendment.

8. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident sixty-five years of age up to seventy-five, a five thousand dollar exemption; a resident seventy-five years of age up to eighty, a ten thousand dollar exemption; a resident eighty years of age or older, a twenty thousand dollar exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least five years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than seven thousand dollars or combined income with spouse of less than nine thousand dollars; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of fifty thousand dollars.

9. To see if the Town will accept and appropriate the sum of eight thousand four hundred ninety-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$8,498.80) in increased Municipal Highway Subsidy funds. This sum to be expended for reconstruction work on Longview Road, or take any other action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one thousand one hundred six dollars and five cents (\$1,106.05) to be supplemented by seven thousand three hundred seventy-three dollars and seventy cents (\$7,373.70) from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for this year, or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand five hundred dollars (\$6,500) for the purchase of a road grader, or take any other action related thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for the purchase of a new cruiser for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance to be raised by taxation, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of three thousand three hundred eighty-one dollars (\$3,381) for the Town's share of the repainting of the exterior of the Town Hall/Church and authorize the withdrawal of one thousand three hundred eighty-one dollars (\$1,381) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to be raised by taxation, or take any other action relating thereto.

14. The Bicentennial Committee requests the Town raise and appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000) this sum to fund bicentennial events with the full expectation of replacement. This sum to be expended by the Committee or to be added to by gifts of money; or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred forty-eight dollars (\$2,548) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This local request for financial support is based on a \$2.00 per capita formula; or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the purchase of and reconditioning of one used road sander for the highway department, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to initiate a pension plan for the Town employees and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for the first year's contribution by the Town; or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Library Trustees or to be added to by gifts of money, or take any other action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a five (5) member Building Committee to write final specifications and obtain firm price quotations for the construction of an addition to the Town Highway Department building and to appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for Committee expenses. This Committee will report to the Town at a special town meeting to be held on June 29, 1979; or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred sixty-six dollars and thirty-two cents (\$866.32) as the Town's share for the operation of said Commission. Two representatives from the Town will be appointed by the Selectmen; or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred and twenty dollars (\$520) to support the mental health program of the Monadnock Family Mental Health Service; or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty-four dollars (\$254) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto. This sum is based on the formula of twenty cents per town resident according to the latest available census figures.

23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the purchase of property for conservation by the Conservation Commission; or take any other action relating thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to have two sessions for the annual town meeting in this town; the first session on a date specified by the State for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session to be on the following Saturday, for transaction of other business; or take any other action relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five members to oversee the landfill, or take any other action relating thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to designate as a scenic road under the provisions of RSA 253:17, that part of Depot Road from the Kassarjian land to where it is closed subject to gates and bars, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway on Tax Map Lot R-11-12 that runs northwesterly to lot R-11-7, or take any other action relating thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action at the 1978 Annual Meeting under Article 44, Paragraph 9 wherein "The part of Buswell Road formerly located between Tax Map Lots R-8-3 and 88 and Lot R-8-89" was discontinued and made subject to gates and bars; or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution: Resolved: That the names of the streets and roads of Hancock as shown on the town tax maps shall be deemed to be the accepted and official names of the streets and roads; or take any other action relating thereto.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes; or take any other action relating thereto.

31. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

32. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen or take any other action relating thereto.

33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The above are just some of the major expenses associated with the Water Department.

Early in 1978 we received a directive from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission which required us to prepare a preliminary engineering study to determine the necessary requirements to insure that the water supply from Juggernaut Pond will meet the standards as set forth by the Safe Drinking Water Act.

The engineering firm of DuBois & King, Inc. from Concord, N.H. and Randolph, Vt. was hired. We were presented with a three-phase approach to our problem and we are now engaged in phase I which isn't to exceed \$1,800.00.

Phase I:

1. Identification of the treatment necessary to meet the requirements of the state with regard to the Safe Drinking Water Act.
2. Development of the costs for treatment of the surface source.
3. Development of costs for ground water supply.
4. Preparation of a brief summary report to identify the apparent cost effective approach.

Phase II: Surface Water Source

1. An evaluation of the yield of the existing source with regards to its capacity for meeting future needs of the community.
2. An analysis of the past, present, and possible future conditions surrounding the existing source with respect to pollution potential, exposure to spills of hazardous materials, potential for development and recreational activities.
3. An estimate of the cost for treatment of the source in order to meet the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act.
4. Estimated costs for additional distribution storage facilities.

Phase III:

1. Development of a ground water exploration program aimed at locating sources of water of suitable quality with estimates of yield and capacity.
2. Estimates of costs to develop one or more selected sources including connection to the system and additional storage facilities.
3. Recommendations for purchase of successfully tested future well sites.

The costs of Phase II is \$4,500.00 and Phase III is \$8,900.00. All this is so that our little town can comply with the Federal requirements and provisions of PL93-523. These costs are only the engineering fees, not the cost of implementation of the findings.

The Water Commissioners feel that the people of Hancock should very seriously analyze how far the Federal Government is allowed to tell us that we HAVE TO spend money on questionable projects.

HANCOCK FIRE DEPARTMENT

1978 was the busiest year the Department has ever seen. We had a total of 50 calls. This is an increase of 37% over 1977. A breakdown of the calls are as follows:

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

In 1978 the Planning Board met fourteen times. Public hearings were held for consideration of proposed amendments to the Hancock Zoning Ordinance and for action on several minor subdivisions. The annual town meeting in March voted in favor of eight amendments to the zoning ordinance, including one to increase the minimum lot size in the Agricultural and Rural District to four acres.

For action by ballot at the 1979 town meeting, the Board has prepared several proposed amendments to the Zoning and Building Ordinances, and will present one proposed amendment to each ordinance as offered by voter petition. These amendments relate to the provisions for building construction in the Flood Plain and Wetlands District.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During 1978, the Board held public hearings concerning six applications for Exceptions or Variances to the zoning ordinance. In one instance, the Board was unable to reach a decision due to insufficient information; four of the remaining applications were approved while one was denied. Four of the six applications dealt with building lots which would front on private roads; one application dealt with a home occupation while another requested approval for placement of a building in violation of side setback restrictions. Records of these decisions are available for public inspection in the Town Offices.

The following information is provided to make Board procedures more understandable to the general public and particularly to those who may make appeals. By law, the responsibility for correct preparation of the application and presentation at the public hearing rests with the applicant.

The Board of Adjustment is one of four functions required in a system of zoning. The Planning Board has the primary responsibility for proposing the ordinance and any amendments. The Town Voters, at the annual Town Meeting, enact and amend the zoning ordinance. The Selectmen, through the Building Inspector, enforce the ordinance. The Board of Adjustment hears appeals and administers special provisions of the ordinance. Each of these components has its own functions and may not perform those of any other group. As an example, the Board of Adjustment may not do anything which would have the effect of changing or amending the ordinance.

Most of the work done by the Board of Adjustment consists of hearing two types of appeals. The first type is the Exception. When the ordinance specifically provides for Exceptions, the Board must decide if they apply in a particular situation and if so, assure that provisions made by the voters are applied. Only the voters can establish Exceptions and related conditions. As an example, the Town permits light industry in the rural and agricultural zone under special conditions.

The other type of appeal is a Variance which is a relaxation of the strict interpretation of the ordinance if certain conditions are present. These conditions are quite specific but do not allow for Board judgement. In exercising this judgement, however, the Board must be particularly careful not to violate the spirit and intent of the ordinance.

State law determines the manner in which appeals are to be handled and also provides guidelines for all Board action. Townspeople wishing to make either type of appeal should become acquainted with these rules and with the ordinance before applying. Board members are always willing to discuss these matters prior to any formal application and to supply relevant information. Once formal application is made, however, the Board must balance the request of the applicant with the wishes of the voters as expressed by the zoning ordinance.

REPORT OF THE HISTORY COMMITTEE

After Hancock's sesqui-centennial celebration in 1929 interested citizens started discussing the desirability of bringing the history of the town up to date. In 1938 the town meeting voted in favor of an article sponsored by the Hancock Historical Society which instructed the selectmen to appoint a history committee. They selected as chairman Maro S. Brooks. Reverend William Weston, Reverend Frank Pearson, Margaret Perry and Adella Eva comprised the rest of the group. With an expense appropriation of fifty dollars the committee's task was "to gather material toward bringing the Town History down to date." The committee went to work enthusiastically collecting, filing and researching. Maro Brooks prepared fifty-four years of the annals of the town starting where Hayward's history had left off and continuing through 1940.

In January, 1940, the minutes of the Historical Society record the appointment of a historian, Ruth Ledward, later Mrs. Willis Johnson, to keep some kind of historical town diary "collecting current events for a record preserved for future reference for our history." Thus began an involvement which became a lifetime hobby. A daughter of Reverend William Weston, she worked with the history committee during the years her father was a part of it and became a member of each subsequent committee until her death in 1972. During her thirty-two years as town historian she became a walking reference source of Hancock history, but she did not wish to compile and write the book. She amassed quantities of material and when she died left this as well as several scrapbooks filled with newspaper clippings related to townspeople and events.

From 1951 through 1973 Robert English wrote for the history committee a yearly summary of interesting town events which was printed in the annual town report. Others have carried on the custom and these articles have been useful to those who have written the story of Hancock's last quarter century.

The 1956 Hancock town report lists the history committee as the Hancock Historical Society. The following year that organization turned the responsibility back to the selectmen who appointed the following to history committee membership: the selectmen (ex officio), Ruth and Willis Johnson, M. Louise and Harold Stearns, Margaret and Thorn King, Cynthia and Warren Kinney and Elsie Upton. In 1958 Article Nine of the town warrant read, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Town History Committee." From 1958 through 1978 the town voted \$500.00 each year. The money accumulated and gathered interest. In 1979 when the history was ready for publication as a part of the town's bicentennial celebration, due to the foresight of the committee which inserted the article and the willingness of the townspeople to add this sum to their tax burden, the money was ready and waiting under the careful guardianship of the trustees of trust funds. In 1968, due to the loss of members by death or resignation, the selectmen appointed a new committee consisting of Ruth and Willis Johnson, Helen and Robert Stewart, Frances and James Burt and Virginia and Frederic Gleason. This group worked, planned and met with prospective publishers and authors. The committee finally concluded that, if possible, some Hancock person or persons should be found to write the story of the town's second century.

In 1972 Eleanor Amidon, Mary Hibbard, Olive and Thomas Rhines and Doris Rogers agreed to attempt this task. In 1974 Mr. and Mrs. Rhines resigned from the committee but continued to help with research, writing and typing. Marjorie and Lewis Tuttle were asked to fill the vacancies.

The town owes a debt of thanks to all who have assisted the history committee in

its work. The cooperation of the staff of the Phoenix Publishing Company, whose interest, patience and advice have been limitless, has been invaluable. Special appreciation is due Eleanor Briggs for the lovely photographs of Hancock she has taken for the history. Townspeople will have an opportunity to view an exhibit of these at the library in June and July. The writing and researching has not been done by the five member committee alone. Some chapters were researched, written, or both, by Everett Adams, Thelma Babbitt, Elva Blacklock, Lesley Cass, L. Albert Daloz, John S. duMont, Fred C. Eaton*, Robert Fish, Marie Fogg, Frank Fowle*, Hazel Greene, Dorothy Grim, Cynthia Kinney, Marion Manning, Olive Rhines, Thomas Rhines, Heather Robinson, Frances Russ, Simon Sheldon, Dorothy Starratt, Karl Upton, Nancy West and Linda Wilson. In addition to these are Charles Gleason, Willis Johnson, Earle Otis and Joseph Quinn who were among the many advisors and consultants. Many more have helped with information, editing, pictures and memorabilia. The appendices of the history contains a complete listing of all who contributed to its completion. The history committee thanks everyone who so generously searched attics, albums and picture files to supply a wealth of photographs from which to choose.

After nearly a half century of work by many dedicated individuals, **The Second Hundred Years — A History of Hancock, New Hampshire, 1879-1979**, will be published in time for Hancock's bicentennial year.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMITTEE 1978

The re-direction of Moose Brook into Norway Pond was completed in the fall of 1978. A new channel was dug by Ernest Adams which should increase the flow of water into the pond and thereby improve the circulation of water toward the swimming beach. The effectiveness of this work will not be evident until the summer of 1979. Periodic maintenance of this water course will probably be necessary, but if it is watched carefully the job of keeping it open should not prove difficult. The Conservation Commission wishes to thank Mr. and Mrs. Kassarian for their kind cooperation in getting this work done by permitting us to go on their land.

Under the direction of George Lohmiller new trees were planted along Main Street by a group of the young people of the town. These will be watched for survival by the Commission and replacements made if necessary. A dead elm tree was removed from the bandstand area. Other elm trees will be watched for signs of disease and be removed and replaced as funds are available.

A picnic bench is maintained at Moose Brook park for the enjoyment of townspeople and travelers along Route 137.

The annual Hancock Clean-up Day was directed by Lewis Tuttle. The effort was considered a success although there were not as many participants as in former years. Cooperation of the townspeople for this once-a-year event is greatly appreciated. As is customary, the day was topped off with the participants sharing in the treat of ice cream bars served at the town dump, the terminus of the activity.

TOWN LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

1978 has been a busy year for the library trustees.

Among the accomplishments have been a completion of the basement stock room, improved lighting in the main stock room, the opening of a Young Adult section in the middle room and a general renovation of the whole plant with extensive cleaning and painting.

At the 1974 Town Meeting the Library Space Committee submitted a comprehensive report which proposed the future needs of the library both long and short range. At that time the Committee estimated the expenditure of approximately \$16,000. over a period of the next three to five years for the short range objective. We feel that the improvements now made during that period have accomplished the purpose of that short range objective by making all possible use of the present building without interference with long range expansion. Our total improvement cost from 1974 to date has been \$9,034.92.

The rapid growth in population is a constant reminder that the library will eventually need more floor space as explained in the 1974 report. To ease the cost when this time arrives and to attract private funding, which is essential, it is important that the Library Improvement Reserve Fund be maintained and strengthened.

As in every other phase of our economy, the vexations of inflation are a continuing concern of the library. Our principal business is books, the cost of which has skyrocketed enormously, and of course, the usual items of upkeep have also increased.

We are fortunate, indeed, that the same excellent staff continues to provide the helpful guidance and congenial atmosphere which is the keynote of our library.
