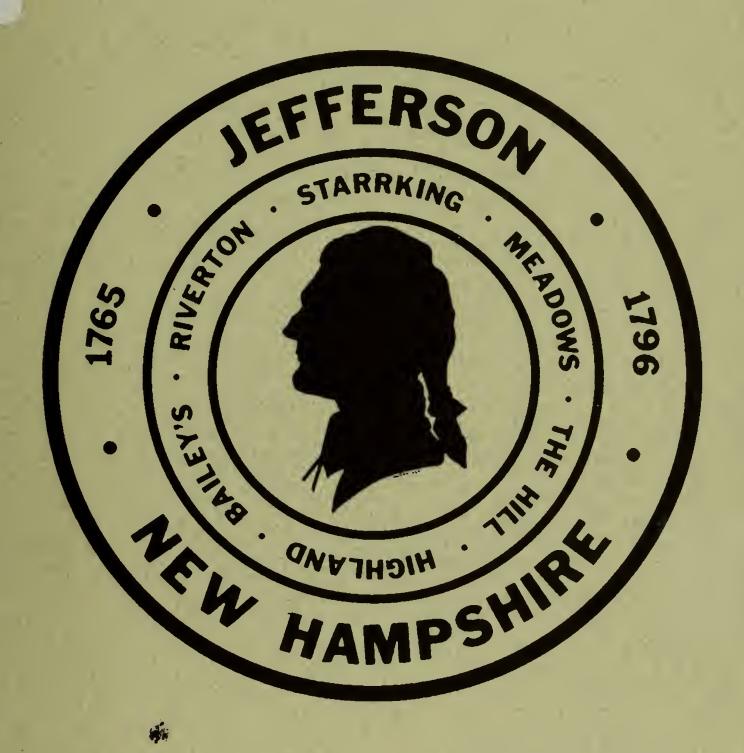

#### HELEN "MARSHALL" MERRILL

Helen "Marshall" Merrill, born February 15, 1914, married Lee Merrill June 1, 1939, came to Jefferson to live at "Pondicherry Lodge & Farm" on Route 115. Helen held a very strong devotion for Jefferson, and did much town research about it in many categories. She was instrumental in forming the Jefferson Historical Society, acquiring the Original St. John's Methodist Church for the Society's Museum, also receiving possession of the portrait of Jefferson's founding father, Col. Joseph Whipple.

She was an active 10 year member to Mt. Prospect Grange #42, a 70 year member of Starr King Grange #124, plus member to Northern NH Pomona Grange #5, the New Hampshire State Grange and National Grange. Other organization memberships were Pliny Rebekah Lodge #92, Jefferson Historical Society, NH Genealogical Society and a life long parishioner to St. John's Methodist Church.

#### WARRANT 2009 TOWN MEETING

#### THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM NOON TO 8:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jefferson in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Jefferson on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next, at 7:30 of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year\*\*

# \*\*ARTICLE 1 TO BE VOTED ON BY OFFICIAL BALLOT WHILE THE POLLS ARE OPEN.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$576,730 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. Selectmen recommend.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Funds as listed. Selectmen recommend.

\$10,000 Dump Closure CRF

\$10,000 Fire Truck CRF

\$30,000 Highway Vehicle CRF

\$20,000 Building CRF

\$20,000 Rt. 115B Reconstruction CRF

\$5,000 Highway Maintenance & Repair CRF

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,500 to be added to the Expendable Trust Funds as listed. Selectmen recommend.

\$25,000 Town Library Fund

\$2,500 Athletic Association Fund

\$ 2,000 Cemetery Maintenance Fund

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$40,000 for the purchase of a used Fire Truck engine and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$40,000 from the Fire Truck CRF for this purchase. **NO** funds to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of replacing the roof on the Fire Station and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$15,000 from the Building CRF for this purpose. **NO** funds to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purpose of road maintenance of Israel River Road/Route 115B and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$30,000 from the Route 115B Maintenance CRF for this purpose. **NO** funds to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of purchasing forestry fire fighting equipment. These appropriations to come from the fund balance (surplus), these funds were received as a grant from USF&W for this purpose. **NO** funds to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$483 for the purpose of supporting the American Red Cross/Granite Chapter.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the existing Town Library Fund to include "or new construction for the Jefferson Public Library". (2/3 vote required)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of such property of the Town as the Selectmen in their sole discretion deem equitable, just and subject to existing laws.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes in accordance to RSA 80:52-a.

ARTICLE 13: To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

#### TRANSFER STATION REPORT

It has been a strange year in the recycling business. The first three-quarters of the year recycling prices were high. By the end of the year the market had dropped to the point of just covering costs.

Just a reminder the disposal of mercury-containing products at landfills, transfer stations and incinerators is prohibited. This means these items may not be disposed of as a solid waste with the "normal" garbage. The ban covers products including: thermometers, florescent lamps, thermostats, mercury button cell batteries, switches, and relays. The ban does not include the recycling of these items at solid waste facilities. At this point in time these items can be brought to the AVRRDD Transfer Station for recycling.

**CPU's are now being collected** along with the other video display devices (computer monitors, televisions, liquid crystal displays and plasma displays) greater than 4 inches in diagonal measure. These items are being collected at the Transfer Station for disposal. See the attendants for details.

To assist in the operation of the Transfer Station please pre-sort your garbage and recyclables before you get to the Transfer Station. With the **COOPERATION** of our residents we can continue to be successful cutting cost.

**Please** continue to keep the operation of the Transfer Station working smoothly by doing the following:

- 1. if you are not sure where something goes ask the Attendant
- 2. **please** sort your items **before** you get to the Transfer Station this will help keep traffic moving
- 3. corrugated cardboard flatten, No Pizza boxes
- 4. light cardboard (cereal, cracker boxes, etc) now go with the corrugated cardboard. This is a change from previous procedures
- 5. junk mail
- 6. newspapers and magazines together

Due to the fact that there is a very limited market for textiles we **NO LONGER except** textiles for recycling. There are collection boxes for good clothing in Lancaster, Littleton, and Berlin.

Hazardous Waste collection day is June 6, 2009. Check with the attendants for further details.

#### JEFFERSON FIRE DEPARTMENT AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE 2008

In 2008 our departments responded to a combined total of sixty-two calls. Thirty of these calls were for medical emergencies. We responded to two structure fires that resulted in the homes being heavily damaged. These fires were accidental and though property loss was devastating, no one was injured, and the smoke/fire alarms did their job. This past year we also have seen an increase of chimney fires. As the fuel prices rose we looked to alternate sources of heat. Please, as it is stated in our fire safety tips, if you are using alternate heat sources, please use them correctly. If you need advice, installations or usage on any alternate heating source, please contact us.

We also responded to various calls consisting of motor vehicle accidents, mutual aid calls to other towns, and a container fire at the transfer station. It has not been determined what may have started this fire, but everyone needs to make sure all the refuse goes into the proper places. If you are not sure, please check with the attendants.

We all must take fire safety seriously. Each year thousands of people are injured or killed, causing millions of dollars in personal and property damage throughout the country. The statistics are alarming and grim, though we do not have to be one, fire can strike at any time. If we all take a little time to ensure the safety of our homes we can lessen the chances.

#### 1. Fire Safety Is Fire Prevention.

How safe is your home? This can be simple things, such as not overloading extension cords and maintaining our heating systems by having them cleaned and inspected yearly. Burn wood? With the high price of fuel oil, more people are returning to alternate heating sources. Please have your wood stove installation approved and inspected. Keep check on creosote build-up in pipes and chimneys and disposing of wood ashes properly. Do not operate any unapproved, unvented heating system in the home. Never leave combustible items near any heating system. Make sure all vents for any heating system, dryer vents, doors leading to the outside are clear and clean, especially during the winter months. Always use open fire safely and responsibly. We should all have a check list and the entire family can get involved to help make us safer. Have an escape plan and practice it often, make sure everyone knows where the designated meeting place is. Never return into a building that has some type of problem. Knowing what to do during an emergency may have a better ending in a bad situation. For our residents, the fire department, free of charge, is willing to give your home a safety inspection, or contact us with any concerns you may have.

#### 2. Smoke And Carbon Monoxide Detectors.

I cannot stress this enough. Every home should have adequate **Smoke Alarms** and Carbon Monoxide Detectors. These are our first defense should something go wrong. These need to be in all living areas. Test all you may have once a month. Change your clocks, change your batteries. Have at least 2 working ABC fire extinguishers easily accessible and know how to use them. If you need help in

installing a detector, or should you need a detector, please contact any member of the department and we would be glad to assist.

# 3. The Only Number To Call For Fire, EMS, Police Is 911.

Keep this number and all Emergency Numbers posted near your phones. Teach your younger children the necessity of this number and only use when there is an emergency. Never let a small problem become a large one.

## 4. Make Sure Your House Number Is Visible.

The number issued to your home is <u>your responsibility</u>, please be sure your number is in good condition and visible from the road. This will help us and other agencies find you that much faster should you need that service.

### 5. Permits For Outside Fires.

In accordance with the laws of New Hampshire Forests and Lands, any outdoor fire requires a written permit, when conditions allow. You must obtain a permit for campfires, and to burn brush. Permits are not required for charcoal and gas grills. Permits are only good for the time they are issued for. No exceptions.

Any type of fire to do with wood requires a permit. No written permit is needed when there is adequate snow on the ground, covering the area completely where you wish to burn in. If you are not sure of the snow requirements, please call a permit issuer first, it might save a lot of aggravation later and it is also a good idea to call a permit issuer and advise us so we can call it into our dispatch center. This lessens the possibility of a well meaning citizen making an unnecessary 911 call.

<u>It is Against The Law to Burn Any Type of Household Trash. This Act is Punishable By Fines.</u> The transfer station will accept all our separated trash. Please call me or a Deputy Warden for any questions you may have.

This past year we found that our 1975 pumper, known as engine one, our first attack engine, has developed a leak in the water tank portion of the truck. We have checked into various methods of repairing or replacing the tank. From all the quotes and ideas we have obtained, being the age (33 years) and material, the tank was constructed out of (steel) a quick, easy fix was not to be had. Total replacement of the tank is close to twenty-four thousand dollars, (\$24,000). We felt this was not truly a good investment for the department or the town, as in the end we would still have a 33 year old truck. With discussion with the board and the members of the department, it was agreed upon to search out the possibility of finding a newer engine. As with the Board of Selectmen, we are asking you, the residents to support warrant article number 5, that will allow the expenditure of \$40,000 from the fire department capital reserve fund to find a replacement engine.

This past year I have chosen to step down as Forest Fire Warden for the town of Jefferson. Being in a multi-position for the town can be very time consuming and I feel it is time to lighten the load. I will still be Chief of the departments, and stay on as a Deputy Forest Warden. Larry Wells, a fire department Lieutenant, and Deputy Forest Fire Warden will be the new Forest Fire Warden. This transition will go smoothly as Larry is well trained in forestry.

# Town of Jefferson, NH

Being a member of the departments is much more than just responding to incidents. Our members are residents first, but give up precious family time, which seems to be in short commodity these days, as other activities in our lives are more demanding. These people are dedicated and willing to attend required meetings, train, to accept the call of duty 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, no matter what the weather may be. Thank you members of the JFD and JEMS for your commitment. Be proud people, you serve your community well and strive to give the best possible emergency services we can. I am grateful to be the Chief of such a good group of people. We are grateful for the support we receive from our community and from our Board of Selectmen, and to the past members who helped make the department what it is today.

Thank you to NHDOT District 1 Lancaster, for our fire department dispatching and assistance, Weeks Hospital for our EMS dispatching, to the members of North Pac Mutual Aid, helping us when we need it, and Lancaster EMS for ambulance service.

May we be all safe and have a healthy 2009.

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <a href="www.des.state.nh.us">www.des.state.nh.us</a> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. 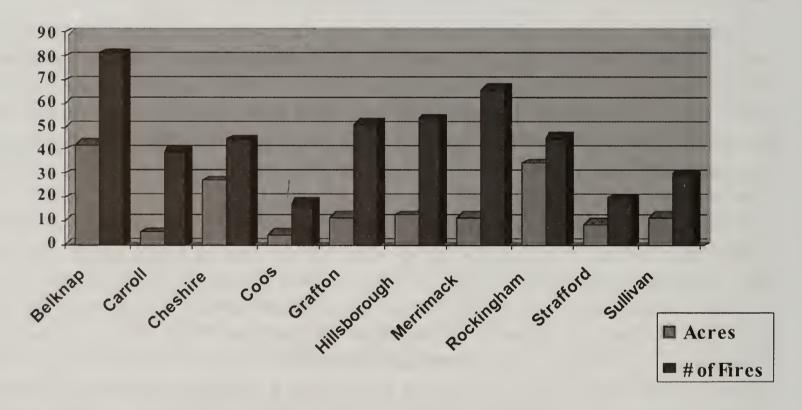
Spring fire season lasted unusually long this past year, with very high fire danger stretching into the first week of June. Once again, the rains started to fall during the summer and the fire activity was fairly light for the remainder of the year. The acreage burned was less than that of 2007. The largest forest fire during the 2008 season burned approximately 54 acres on Rattlesnake Mountain in Rumney on White Mountain National Forest property. Another 39 acre fire occurred on Mount Major in Alton during the month of April. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2008 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. # **JEFFERSON LIBRARY COMMITTEE**

During this past year The Jefferson Library Committee has continued to seek information and advice from several sources to help in making decisions concerning the site and design of a new library building.

Committee members have continued to visit libraries that have recently experienced new construction or are in the process of doing so. They viewed the buildings and talked with the librarians at Portsmouth, Barrington, Candia, Ossipee, Conway and Madison.

Public meetings have been held this past year with the following programs:

Terry Knowles of the State of NH Attorney General's office advising us of the legalities concerning monies gifted to the project and the administration of all library money and the role of the non-profit Friends Group as a 501c3 organization.

Dan White and Sarah Winn of the Rural Library Project provided information on how towns smaller than Jefferson have been able to build new libraries.

Joe Marshall presented a power point program covering the progress to date and the time frame going forward. We will use 2009 to complete a design to present to an architect and look to the following year to start a Capital Campaign to raise money.

The committee hired Patience Kenney Jackson, a Library Building Consultant, to evaluate our present building and do a needs assessment and projection for a new building based on a time frame of twenty years.

Watershed to Wildlife, Inc. was hired to do a Wetland Delineation on the town owned site and the results show that construction of a Library building there would require a wetland permit from DES Wetland Bureau and incur additional costs.

David Moulton has offered to give to the town the necessary land for a Library building to be located at the approximate location of the brick building which would be removed. This site is located on Rte. 2, just west of the Bailey Road. (Rte. 116)

Based on size, ease of access, the terrain and wetlands determination, the committee has decided to work with David Moulton and locate the library there.

Expenses to date are \$3,956.37 covering the survey, The Rural Library visit, the needs assessment, wetlands report and small miscellaneous costs.

The Library Committee members welcome questions, suggestions from all residents of the town.

# 2008 LIBRARY REPORT

Public support for the town's library has continued to be strong. Our gratitude and appreciation are extended to the members of the Friends for their continued efforts to support the library.

Sue Crafton, our librarian, organized a successful summer reading program for the children. It included a dog sniffing demonstration by DOT Officer Sharon Matson, Crack a Secret Code by Diane Williams, Beneath the Surface (a rock and mineral discussion) by Jim Holmes and a program on Collecting and Analyzing Evidence given by Sgt. Christopher St. Cyr. We wish to thank all of them for helping to make our summer reading program such a success. An Open House held at the Library during the Christmas Festival had Mrs. Santa Claus reading stories to children who stopped by. There is also a Creative Needles Club for knitting and crocheting that will begin meeting at the library in January of 2009. # REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Members of the Jefferson Planning Board throughout their deliberations in the past year have tried to keep to this purpose: to avoid scattered and premature subdivision of land and to provide for the harmonious development of the municipality and its environs in general, which will create conditions favorable to health, safety, convenience, and prosperity while avoiding an excessive expenditure of public funds for the supply of public services.

It was with regret that Planning Board Members accepted the resignation of Earl Brooks. The Board expresses its appreciation and thanks for the service he has given to the Town during his years as a member of the Planning Board.

In March, three new members were appointed to the Board, Charles Muller, Susan Griffin, and Vernon Matson. They joined Michael Meehan, Ronald Demers, and Jason Call. Mr. Meehan who had ably served as Chairman for the past year, turned over that responsibility to Mr. Demers who had been serving as Vice-Chairman. Mr. Call assumed the position of Vice-Chairman. Charlene Wheeler continues to serve as secretary to the Board. In November, Isaac Hicks was appointed to the Board as an alternate member. A representative from the Board of Selectmen, currently Kevin Meehan, also serves on the Planning Board. Bruce Hicks had filled that position for much of the year before Mr. Meehan taking over those duties.

During this past year the Planning Board has had six consultations regarding possible subdivision proposals. They have also accepted and considered applications for three additional subdivisions. Many hours have been spent by Board members who are trying to fairly and consistently follow the Land Use Ordinance and the Subdivision Procedures and Regulations in making their decisions.

In May, after a public hearing, the fee schedules for subdivision applications and boundary line adjustments, which had been in place for a number of years, were revised to reflect the increased costs of notices, postage, and clerical work time.

The Board has also worked many hours reviewing the Town's Master Plan and revising the Subdivision Regulations, Policy and Procedures. This is an ongoing process which, then completed, will be presented to the citizens of the Town in a public hearing. The Board has asked for input from Selectmen, the Town's engineer, the Town's road agent, the Town's fire chief, the Town's legal council, Public Service of New Hampshire, and the North Country Council during this process.

The NH Municipal Association, the town's Conservation Commission and the NH Department of Environmental Services were among the resources used by the Board in its decision making process.

The Planning Board meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month in the town office. All meetings are open to the public and the Board encourages anyone who is interested to attend.

# 2008 ANNUAL REPORT JEFFERSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Ten regular monthly meetings were held at the town office at 7:00 pm on the third Tuesday of each month. The December meeting was canceled due to holiday conflicts. A field trip to examine the development of a new trail from Route 116 to Mud Pond replaced the regular August meeting.

During the year, three changes in membership occurred. Charter member Marjorie Doan resigned after 18 years of remarkably productive service. She has been a much admired and valued colleague. In April Justin Preisendorfer announced his resignation as member and secretary because of his residence move from Jefferson. His enthusiastic commitment to Commission goals, his ready willingness to accept new responsibilities, and his boundless energy will be significant losses. Sarah Warren became a new member, and her fresh new attitude is a welcome addition.

An important new relationship with the Planning Board has been established. Charles Muller was accepted as a new member of the Planning Board while retaining his Conservation Commission membership. This link will certainly produce a new level of communication and coordination between these two town organizations.

Special presentations to the Commission included:

- Two members from the Bethlehem Conservation Commission spoke about HB 1429 which would establish additional guidelines for private landfills.
- DES representatives Ted Walsh and David Neils discussed recent research concerning the Israel River watershed. In addition Ted presented the annual report of data collected by the Israel River Volunteer Advisory Group.
- Bob Ball, representing DES, conducted a training program regarding water sampling protocols for 2008 Israel River sampling. In addition to Commission members, others from the Israel River Volunteer Advisory Group were included.
- Steve Walker, representing the state, presented a summary of current procedures for monitoring conservation easements.
- Justin Preisendorfer presented findings of the Stag Hollow Brook fluvial geomorphic study conducted by Field Geology Services. The issues identified in the study were high water temperatures, excessive sedimentation, fragmented habitat, low physical habitat complexity and risk of future avulsions on the brook.

The commission sponsored two well attended UNH workshops held at the town hall. A Volunteer Lake Monitoring Workshop was presented by DES and included lake ecology, monitoring procedures and shore line protection changes for 2008. A UNH workshop on Hayfields as Habitat included demonstrations using fields of two Commission members.

The Commission assisted DES permit evaluations of two roadway brook crossings.

# ANDROSCOGGIN VALLEY REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT 2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

The AVRRDD 2008 budget apportionment for our member municipalities totaled \$467,000. A surplus of \$354,510.56 from the 2007 budget was used to reduce apportionments with a net budget of \$112,489.44 being billed to the member municipalities. The proportionate share of the credit for the Town of Jefferson was \$8,967.34 reducing your gross apportionment of \$14,905.79 to \$5,938.45. Preliminary reconciliation of the 2008 budget shows a surplus of approximately \$271,152.28 being available to credit toward 2009 apportionments.

Our Materials Recycling Facility marketed a total of 1,674.40 tons of recyclables, for the period January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2008, representing \$142,132.63 of marketing income to the District.

For calendar year 2008, our Transfer Station received 2,605 deliveries from District residents for a total of 724.26 tons of bulky waste and construction and demolition debris. In addition, our 232 commercial accounts delivered 357.07 tons of bulky waste and construction and demolition debris and 1,130.18 tons of wood. Recycling at the Transfer Station consisted of 2,037.39 tons of wood that was processed through a grinder, 189.93 tons of scrap metal, 256.55 tons of leaf and yard waste and 121.20 tons of brush which was chipped with the District owned chipper. In addition, 363 refrigerators/air conditioners; 391 propane tanks; 4,534 tires; 16,294 feet of fluorescent bulbs; 362 pounds of ballasts and 42.81 tons of electronics were recycled. We also received 2,235 gallons of waste oil from our residents which was used in our waste oil furnace to heat the recycling center. Transfer Station recycling income totaled \$26,355.87. The Recycling Center and Transfer Station are operated, under contract with the District, by FERCO Recycling, Inc. of Berlin.

Election of officers was held at the District Annual Meeting in April 2008: Linda Cushman of Jefferson was re-elected Chairman; Yves Zornio of Gorham was re-elected Vice Chairman and Clara Grover of Errol was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer. Other District Representatives are: Raymond Holt of Dummer, David Tomlinson of Randolph, Richard Lafleur of Berlin, Paul Grenier for the Coos County Unincorporated Places, Erik Gagne of Milan, Winston Hawes of Northumberland and George Bennett of Stark.

In June, the District conducted its seventeenth annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. The collection was held at the District Transfer Station with 265 households participating. The project was funded through the District Household Hazardous Waste Fund with a \$15,000 payment from the Mt. Carberry Landfill Budget. No assessment was made to the District communities. In addition, a grant from the State of New Hampshire

reimbursed the District at fourteen cents (\$.14) per capita. The next Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be held Saturday, June 6, 2009 at the District Transfer Station.

2008 was the sixth year of operations for the AVRRDD-Mt. Carberry Landfill. Since purchasing the landfill in December 2002, no assessments have been made to the District municipalities for Mt. Carberry Landfill operations, with income raised through landfill tipping fees covering operating expenses. The landfill is operated, under contract with the District, by Cianbro Corp.

# MOUNT WASHINGTON REGIONAL AIRPORT

Airport Road, Whitefield, NH 03598

January 2009 Dear North Country Neighbors,

As we endure difficult economic times, you should be proud of the work done by the all-volunteer crew that runs the Mount Washington Regional Airport. As a local taxpayer – and non-pilot, by the way – I know I am.

Factors that affected the nation affected airport users, as well. The continued rise of fuel prices in 2008 led to a modest decline in air traffic for the year. That said, our volunteer manager aggressively managed inventory and retail pricing to maximize our returns as prices increased. Fuel sales accounted for more than 78% of our operational revenue.

In 2008, we laid the groundwork for increased hangar development at the airport. Such development pays double benefits to our communities. First, the airport collects rental fees for the land private hangars occupy. This, combined with transient parking fees, represents 7% of our general operating budget income. In addition, airport property taxes account for more than \$13,000 in support of local and county governments, with little, if any, impact, and to pay for local schools, with no impact whatsoever.

Support from the state, which is based on and generated by fees paid by airplane owners, coupled with reimbursements, contributed nearly 2% of our operating budget. Donations and miscellaneous income represented more than 3%.

As local taxpayers, you honored commitments you made earlier this decade to provide a portion of support for the airport through town appropriations. Many of you recognize the important role our airport plays in the transportation infrastructure in the North Country infrastructure. It is a critical access point for tourism, real estate development, commerce and emergency response.

More than 27% of the amount contributed by towns went to cover debt incurred by the Town of Whitefield many years ago when it built a self-service fuel facility at the airport. The foresight shown by the town in making this capital improvement is paying off, as fuel sales are a strong contributor to the airport's bottom line.

Of the remaining town contributions, nearly 75% went to capital improvement projects that are part of the state's comprehensive transportation plan. This money – \$9,712.85 – represents what's called a sponsor share, which is matched dollar for dollar by the state and at a rate of 38 to one by FAA funds generated by commercial air travelers nationwide.

Over the past several years, our ability to get \$39 in capital improvement money for each dollar we raise has led to the infusion of millions of dollars into our economy. This represents jobs that went to New Hampshire residents—including those from our contributing towns, as well as products purchased from local businesses.

Weeks Medical Center-Home Health and Hospice is grateful for the opportunity to serve the residents of Jefferson and greatly appreciates your continued support and confidence. Town funding is critically important and is used to assist families and individuals who are unable to pay for Home Health and Hospice Services and to support care where funding does not cover direct costs.

Our Home Health and Hospice Services continue to provide Jefferson residents with a wide range of services. Weeks Home Health and Hospice provides continuity of health care from the hospital to patients' homes. Services include skilled nursing; physical, occupational and speech therapies; licensed home health aides; homemakers; medical social services; intravenous therapies and care to the terminally ill.

Our Medicare Certified Hospice program continues to provide excellent palliative care to the terminally ill. Weeks Hospice is a special kind of holistic care . . . focusing on the emotional and spiritual needs of the family, as well as the physical needs of the patient at the end of life. No one is refused care based on an inability to pay. Over the last year, an increasing number of hospice patients received care, support and love from our nurses, aides and volunteers. To celebrate their memory, a luminary service was held and many residents from area towns were in attendance.

# CALEB INTERFAITH VOLUNTEER CAREGIVERS

The Caleb Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers, a not-for-profit organization which was established in October of 1995, continues to provide services to older adults in 8 northern New Hampshire communities. Caleb's heartfelt mission is to enhance independent living for seniors (60+), by relieving isolation and assisting with friendly visits, care and supportive services through a network of volunteers and the fostering of caring communities.

In 2008, Caleb Caregivers assisted more than 311 Bethlehem, Dalton, Groveton, Jefferson, Lancaster, Littleton, Twin Mountain and Whitefield seniors. Over \$52,013.66 worth of services were provided **FREE** to clients. Caleb's 84 active volunteers donated over 2,666 hours and drove over 37,295 miles to help their older neighbors remain independent! Without these dedicated volunteers, Caleb would not exist. These volunteers give their time, their talents and most of all their hearts. Transportation to medical appointments and running errands is one of the most requested services through Caleb. This year, Caleb volunteers drove an additional 11,113 miles compared to 2007. This was due to the fuel crisis scare. Seniors that were driving themselves could not afford the gas and turned to Caleb for assistance. Many of Caleb's trips were local, but some of our trips took us to DHMC, North Conway, Manchester, Concord, White River Junction, St. Johnsbury and Boston. It costs \$2.25 per mile to take a ride in a local taxicab, and Caleb's rides are provided **free of charge.** 

Transportation is only one of the services that Caleb volunteers provide. Caleb volunteers provide other services as well; friendly visiting, telephone reassurance, help with chores, paperwork, computer training and light housekeeping are to name a few. Caleb volunteers also assist with various community programs, such as the Commodity Supplemental Food Program. This state program is available, every other month, to New Hampshire seniors that are 60+, and that financially qualify. Caleb volunteers help distribute this food to seniors, who are totally homebound. Caleb volunteers also assist with the Pet Food Project, which has grown by leaps and bounds. Since this project began in October of 2002, Caleb has distributed over 27 tons of **FREE** pet food/litter to help seniors feed their pets! Caleb has added another service to its list. It is called Project Cool Air. With funding received from the Lancaster and Littleton Rotaries, Caleb purchased and distributed air conditioners/fans to seniors that needed the appliances during the summer months. Most of the seniors that received these appliances had COPD or some other health related condition. Without the various services that Caleb provides, many older adults who need just a little extra help to continue living independently, might have had to go into a nursing home. The average cost of nursing home care is \$185.00 per day.

There are <u>no fees</u> for the services that are provided by the Caleb Caregivers. The program is funded through grants, fundraisers, donations and generous appropriations of the towns in which the services are provided. We want to thank the residents of Jefferson for their support and for making it possible for us to continue our mission of serving seniors in need. The \$1,650 appropriated at last year's Town Meeting was greatly appreciated, and we ask for your continued support in 2009.

Volunteers are always in great demand, so if you would like to become a volunteer, request a volunteer, or know someone who would benefit from our services, please call the Caleb Office at 837-9179, or contact one of the Board Members.

One other note for 2008 - Caleb received funding from AARP which was to be used to enhance Caleb's visibility. Caleb decided to use that funding to create a new logo and brochure. The new logo represents Caleb's mission. The hands in the logo represent the volunteer lending a helping hand. The heart represents the volunteer giving from his heart and the house image represents keeping the client living in his own home. Caleb is excited to have a new image, a new look! Hands - Heart - Home

Neighbors helping neighbors is what Caleb is all about, and it is what North Country residents are all about, too!

# WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH AND COMMON GROUND

2008 Director's Report

Each year this report provides town residents with a summary of the services we offer in your community, as well as an overview of our accomplishments and challenges during the past year. But perhaps even more importantly, writing this report gives us a chance to publicly thank you for your confidence in our organization as demonstrated by your financial support. The money we receive from our towns is absolutely crucial in allowing White Mountain Mental Health to offer expert mental health services at a discounted rate based on our sliding fee scale. For our developmental services program, Common Ground, town funds assist us in offering the kinds of supports that are not funded by other sources; dental care is one good example. So, let me begin this year's report with an enormous "thank you" for recognizing the value of mental health and developmental services to the residents of your community.

It is impossible to read a newspaper or turn on the television without being reminded of the dismal state of our economy. During times like these, mental and emotional symptoms increase dramatically. Mentally healthy people develop anxiety and depression as they face job loss, dwindling savings and an uncertain future. It is common to "self medicate" with alcohol as a way of coping with these feelings. Children who live in a family under stress may begin to experience problems at school as they react to the changes they see in their parents. For families supporting a member with a significant developmental disability, the ability to deal with the special needs of that family member can be compromised when the family is under economic and emotional pressure. Our services offer assistance in facing these challenges.

This year we are especially proud and excited to be able to offer the first Child Telepsychiatry Program in the region. Children and their families meet face-to-face with Dr. Craig Donnelly, Director of Child Psychiatry at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, via a television connection at our Littleton office. With the flip of a switch, a service that had previously been unavailable to children in the North Country is now available. Thanks to your support, families have access to one of the finest Child Psychiatrists in the country. The initiation of this service was made possible by a large federal grant. Continuing to be able to offer this service on our sliding fee scale to low income families is made possible by town support.

We offer an array of high quality services that are available to everyone in the community. You may never need to access most of these services, but their availability is critical. Our core services include:

- 24 hour crisis intervention and assessment service for mental health emergencies
- Individual, marriage and family counseling, offered by highly trained mental health professionals with a variety of specialties

- Medication consultations to local physicians by Board certified psychiatrists
- "Full-life" supports for persons with serious and persistent mental illness, including housing, vocational and case management services
- Individualized home placements for more than fifty persons with developmental disabilities
- Substance abuse prevention and treatment by our staff of licensed alcohol and drug abuse counselors

### **Service Statistics:**

- In 2008, 25 residents of the town of Jefferson received 249 hours of outpatient mental health or substance abuse treatment services at a discounted rate on our sliding fee scale.
- 106 families in our area received extensive assistance in supporting a person with a developmental disability.

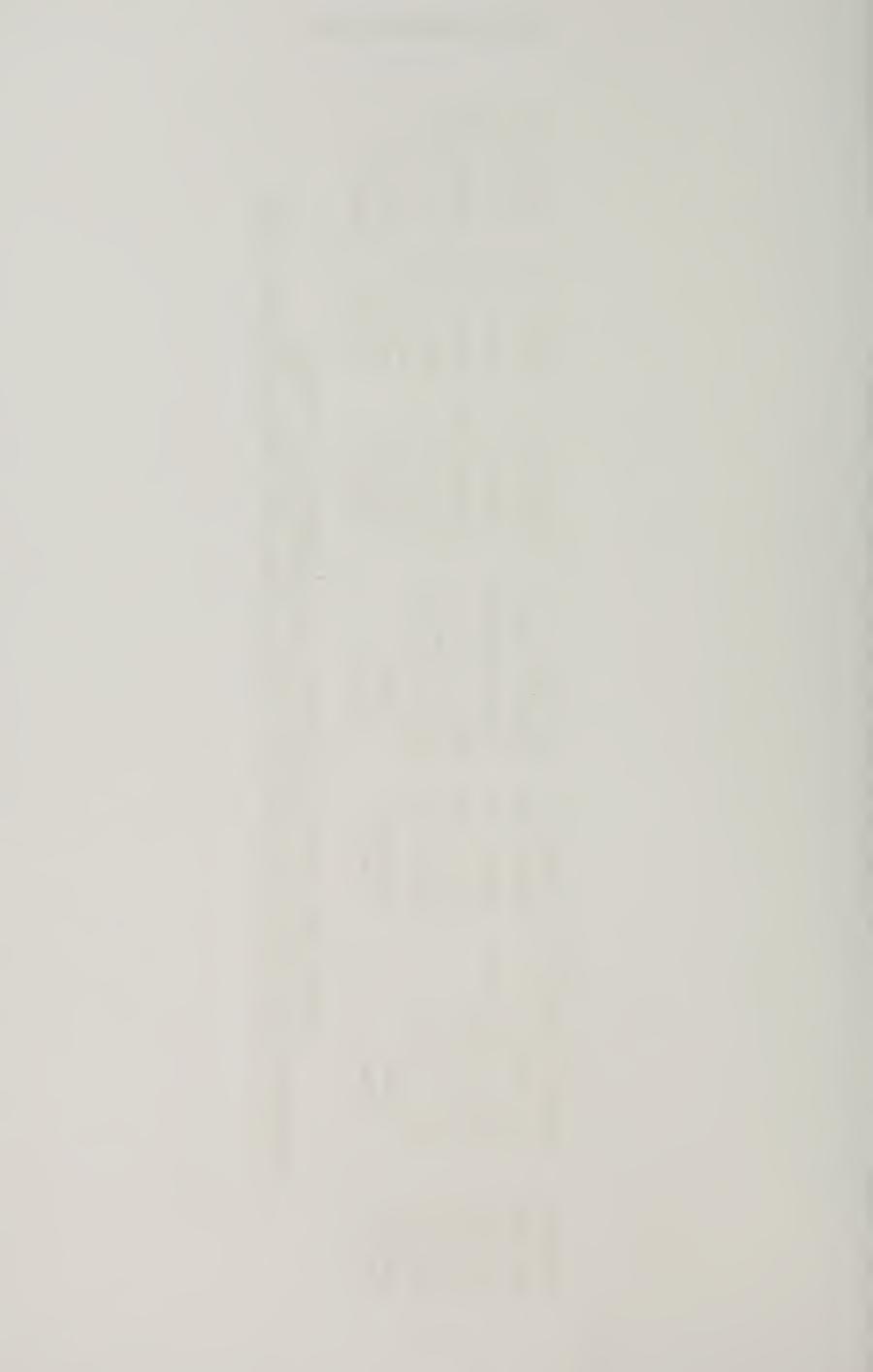
