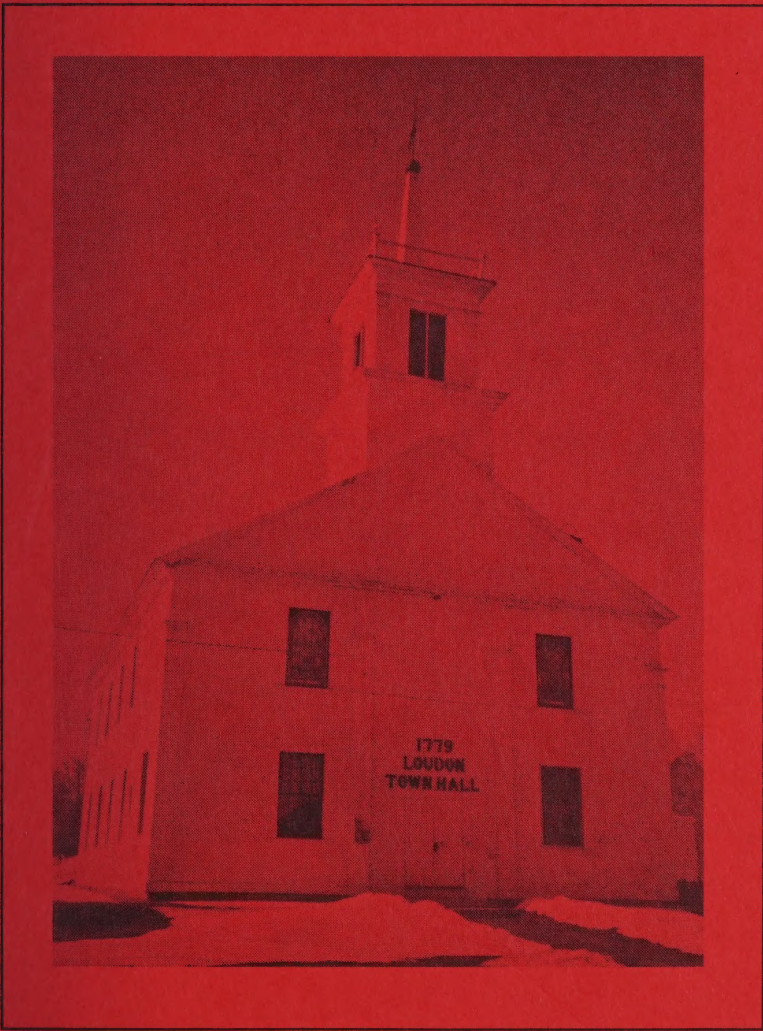

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

The Polls will be open from 9 A.M. to 7 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said State on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at Nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of the tax bill.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes thereof, said notes to be paid in 1980 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund as set up in the 1963 Town Meeting.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as set off against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amount indicated.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$807.00 to be used in conjunction with Revenue Sharing Fund for preparation of a "Master Plan of the Town of Loudon" as directed by RSA 36:13.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,450.00 for the services to all the townspeople, including skilled nursing care, home health aid and homemaker service, well-baby clinics, and other services from the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to amend the building code with specific requirements relating to multiple-family dwelling units and more-than-one single family units per lot as follows:

For each dwelling unit in excess of one (1), the minimum frontage requirement shall be increased by fifty (50) feet per unit and the minimum area requirement shall be increased by one (1) acre per unit over and above the existing frontage and area requirement.

11. To see if the Town will vote to amend the building code paragraph 2 to permit building on a lot having less than the designated minimum road frontage requirement provided that the area of the lot is at least twice the designated minimum area requirement and that any building be located a minimum of one-hundred (100) feet from any lot line.

Creation of such lots by subdivision is limited to one (1) lot per tract of land shown on the April 1, 1979 Loudon Tax Map.

12. To see if the Town will vote to open and maintain the road which lies between and connects Mudgett Hill Road so-called and Old State Route 106, also known as Hollow Route Road.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept the finished portion as determined by the Selectmen of Goshen Drive off Route 106. The finished portion is approximately 1000 feet in length running easterly from N. H. Route 106 and a 200' spur running northerly off the easterly section.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,581.00 as the Town's share of the studies and operations of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$870.52 for the continuation of services to low-income residents of Loudon through the Concord Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$74,000.00 for the purchase of a new National Fire Protection Association and Underwriters ap-

proved Fire Truck and to authorize the Selectmen to appropriate \$10,500.00 plus interest in 1980 and to issue notes in the sum of \$63,500.00 to be paid off at the rate of \$10,500.00 plus interest during the year of 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984 and 1985, and to authorize the selectmen to withdraw up to \$11,000.00 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund to apply toward the purchase.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,122.00 to fund a second full time police officer and full time police clerk.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,080.00 as directed by RSA 502-A:6 to fund the Loudon Municipal Court. Of the sum, \$2,400.00 is salary for the Justice, \$720.00 salary for the Special Justice, and \$960.00 salary for the Clerk.

19. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Loudon Municipal Court.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

With the town continuing to grow with more houses and people, we were pleased to see growth in the number of acres under current use. This State law compels assessing officials to greatly reduce the assessment of open space, fields, forests and wetlands of those who request it. The effect of this law is that it allows landowners who might otherwise have to sell their land because of high taxes, to retain it. This benefits virtually all residents of the Town by keeping land available for recreational uses, retaining the Town's rural atmosphere, and keeping everyone's taxes lower by slowing growth. It is an accepted fact that every time a house is built, the Town loses money due to the demands for increased services, fire, police, schools, etc.

With the resignation of Police Chief James O'Flynn in June the Selectmen accepted with great thanks the assistance of Melvin Gullage as Acting Chief. Mel works full time for the National Guard and additionally puts in many hours for the Town. We are in the process of searching for a permanent chief. To assist us in this task we have appointed a search committee, consisting of police officials, townspeople and town officials. The committee will review resumes, interview candidates and make a recommendation to us. We anticipate hiring a new chief in early summer.

The grader rearend has been breaking with alarming regularity. The manufacturer, Austin-Weston, the dealer Chadwick-Baross and the Town have entered into an agreement to install a heavier duty rearend. We anticipate this solving the problem once and for all. The Town will pay for one-third of the expense of parts and labor.

This year the Sewall Company updated our Tax Map to include all the changes made since 1977. This will be

done annually from now on to make the map useful to us as assessors and to all landowners. We anticipate assessing all real estate in Town from the Tax map beginning this coming year. We know there will be discrepancies and mistakes during this transition and request landowners assistance and understanding.

The Town owns a substantial woodlot, The Maxfield Lot, on our western boundary. In 1977 the State of New Hampshire provided at no cost to the Town a comprehensive management plan for 160 plus acre tract. This year we will implement the plan and remove between 400,000 and 500,000 bd. ft. of mostly softwood. The revenue generated by this timber harvest will be placed in a special account. The use of these funds will be determined by a vote of the Town at a subsequent Town Meeting.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

The beginning of 1979 brought us some heavy snow problems, but the end of the year gave us no snow at all which we appreciated. The most important change this year has been personnel. A complete turnover occurred in April with the exception of one man who is no longer with us. One former employee and two new ones were hired. Due to inflation and the ability of these men they are being paid higher wages. I think they are definitely worth it and good help can certainly make a Department.

We had three major road projects this year. The TRA project was a continuation of Clough Hill Road from the Gordon residence to the Center Cemetery. The intersection of Clough Hill, Youngs Hill and Pleasant Street Extension required considerable changes. This section of road will be paved early next summer. The Shakerbrook project, referred to as Soucook Lane and Lovering Avenue on the Town Map, was shaped up and asphalted. Three utility poles had to be reset and two new culverts put in.

The rough work has been completed on Lesmerises Road and the gravel should be in place this coming summer. Three new culverts were installed and one more remains to be done. This project required the relocation of the gas main in two places. We replaced a rock culvert with a three foot aluminum culvert on Currier Road where Piper Brook crosses. Also, replanked two bridges, Bennett bridge and Shakerbrook bridge. Again this year, some old culverts were replaced and many new ones added.

Our oiling program consisted of a number of roads. These roads were Chichester Road, Old 106 (Concord end), Clough Pond Road, Flagg Road and Hill Street. We also did some small sections on Staniels Road, Oak Hill Road, School Street, and Mudgett Hill.

Purchase of salt for the year were 200 tons in January and another 200 tons in December. These amounts helped span two winter seasons.

As proposed now, the next TRA project will be Pleasant Street. Any comments about this, please contact me or the selectmen.

We ended the year with a Christmas party with members of the Board of Selectmen, Canterbury, local state and Loudon Highway Departments in attendance. Everyone had a good time and enjoyed a short movie "Maintaining N. H. roads."

I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen for their cooperation this year.

LANDFILL DEPARTMENT

Beginning May 1st the operation and supervision of the Landfill was turned over to the Highway Department by the Board of Selectmen. Some changes were made immediately and the other changes had to be made to satisfy State regulatory agencies. Also, some new general landfill rules have been established and 95% of the townspeople have been very cooperative. The other 5% have been so-so for lack of a better word. Only residents of the Town of Loudon are to use the landfill and each vehicle should display a Loudon resident sticker on its windshield. These stickers are available from the Town Clerk.

Landfill hours at the present time are Tuesday 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. and Saturday 8 A.M. to 6 P.M. Besides the landfill area there are six specific dumping areas. These areas are to be used for the following items only.

1. Brush and items of wood.
2. Tin, Iron and metal appliances.
3. Tires
4. Sofas, stuffed chairs, mattresses, box springs and TV sets.
5. Septic disposal
6. Stump dump including rocks.

Any questions, please feel free to ask the attendant.

A new shed was built and is a great asset for storing equipment and other things.

To achieve the goal of a landfill, compaction is very important. To do this we have used the Highway Department Loader which has done the job, but not without causing some problems. Most of the problems have been solved, but the problem of flat tires still persists. The Board of Selectmen and myself decided the best solution to this problem was a used bulldozer to be used jointly by the Landfill and Highway Departments. This machine has been purchased.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

During the year 1979 the Loudon Police Department underwent another change. When the Police Chief's position was vacated in June of 1979, I was appointed as your Acting Police Chief. This again gave me the pleasure of serving the people of Loudon.

The Loudon Police Department is comprised of an Acting Police Chief and two full-time trained and certified police officers, supplemented by six special officers, two of which have graduated from the State sponsored law enforcement training program.

The town is fortunate to have two full-time officers working under the subgrant which was awarded to the town by the Governor's Crime Commission on Crime and Delinquency. Last year under this program the total cost to the town for the two officers was \$1,205 which was 5% of the total subgrant. This included their salaries, uniform and benefits. This gave the town the increased police services which have been needed for some time.

The coming year will require a larger portion of the subgrant to be paid by the town. As requested by the department, the Governor's Crime Commission has extended their subgrant, which was to end on 31 January 1980, until 30 April 1980. During the period 1 May 1980 through 31 December 1980, the town cost will be 50% of the subgrant for that period. Due to the growth of the town and the increased demand for police services the town will require a force as large as the presently structured department.

We are also fortunate to have a full time clerk whose salary has been provided under a C.E.T.A. grant. This clerk handles all administrative requirements of the department and acts in the capacity of dispatcher during the hours from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

The department received 1713 calls for service during 1979. Some of these calls for services are listed below:

I think the record speaks for itself. The need for the increased police services is apparent.

LOUDON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT OF 1979

Your Volunteer Fire Department has had a busy year. As more houses are built and more people move into town the fire related problems seem to grow at a very high rate. If this trend continues it will make a reorganization of the Volunteer Fire Department necessary.

During 1979 William Brown, a founder of the department and first Fire Chief, passed away. Chief Brown was a member of the department from 1941 until this year.

In the opinion of the members of the fire department it is time to replace Engine No. 1. This vehicle is 22 years old and it is very tired. In an attempt to look ahead we are planning a truck which we feel will serve the town for many years.

Working under the direction of Training Officer Captain John Payne and assistant Training Officer Captain Kevin Gullage the men in the department spent 830 hours on training.

The medical squad under the direction of Deputy Chief Edwin Morse continues to work very well. We need more volunteers for this squad.

The Fire Department urges caution with the installation and use of wood stoves. We also recommend the use of approved smoke detectors in the home.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Votes taken at the March Town Meeting increasing building lot size from one (1) acre to two (2) acres, and limiting lots created by subdivision of a single tract of land to five (5) per year indicate that residents are concerned with growth of the town and would like to exercise some influence upon its patterns. This sentiment is consistent with results of a survey conducted among residents in 1977 which included growth-related questions, and with the tone of discussions on the floor of the Town Meeting in recent years.

The Planning Board approved subdivision applications creating fifty-five (55) new lots in 1979 compared with thirty-three (33) created in 1978; clear evidence that growth continues at an increasing rate in spite of more restrictive standards. Building permits issued for forty (40) residential units were down from fifty-nine (59) in 1978, probably a result of present economics conditions.

In recent months there have been several Supreme Court rulings on cases elsewhere in the state where interests of developers have been opposed to stated desires of local residents in matters of growth regulation, generally in support of the developers. The working of these decisions leaves little doubt that towns attempting regulation of their future growth and development without benefit of a master plan in accordance with RSA 36:13 are on very thin ice.

With this unpleasant fact of life as inspiration, the Planning Board has continued to encourage the creation of this essential document through the efforts of citizens

committees comprised of a few dedicated volunteers. Much effort has been expended and a wealth of valuable and necessary background data has been accumulated, bringing us to a point where some professional or semi-professional assistance is going to be required to editorialize existing material into final result.

We hope that the citizens of Loudon will recognize the important role of the master plan in the concept of home rule which we all value highly and will support its completion during the coming year.

SUMMER RECREATION

We, the Loudon Recreation Committee are pleased to report on the success of our first years efforts. It has been our aim to provide a diversified and enjoyable summer program for the town's young people and yet stay within the budget.

The largest enrollment was seen in the morning when those entering first thru fifth grade attended. The afternoon program was conducted similar to a drop in Recreation Center.

Numerous special programs were planned for each of the four weeks. These were mainly conducted in the morning with all ages welcome. Some of the more popular ones included dog and pet shows, Christmas in July, Bike Rodeo, Kitchen Band Parade, a Magician, Soccer clinic, Watermelon feast and a scavenger hunt.

Prior to the program, contact was made with numerous commercial companies who provided free program materials including games, awards and trophies. We received nearly \$500.00 worth of free materials through these contacts and feel they were a great asset to the program.

In looking ahead to 1980, anyone who would like to assist the committee is welcome to contact the selectmen or one of the current members. We anticipate spending more money on arts and crafts as this was an extremely popular area. Donations of board games and other indoor games would also be appreciated.

The committee wishes to express its sincere thanks to the Merrimack Valley School District, the local merchants, parents and townspeople for their great support in making the first year of this program a success.

A special thanks to Brian Bendiks, director of the summer recreation program, for the tremendous job he did leading the young people. Thanks also to Donna Austin, a teen-age volunteer, who was an outstanding assistant in the craft program. These two endured a number of difficulties, including three weeks of 100 degree weather, and yet ran the program smoothly.

If you are not familiar with the summer recreation program, we welcome your questions and encourage you to look at the scrapbook on display at the town meeting.
