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

Warrant for Annual Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways, or act anything thereon.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the J. A. Tarbell library in addition to that required by law.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes beside the highway, or act anything thereon.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of cooperating with the State in control of white pine blister rust.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate (providing favorable action is taken on House Joint Resolution No. 5 now before the General Court) \$2500.00 for the year 1933 and a like sum

for the year 1934 to be used in conjunction with \$5000.00 appropriated by the State for each of said two years, for the permanent improvement of two highway projects mentioned in House Joint Resolution No. 5.

9. To see what action the town will take relative to issuing serial notes in payment of permanent improvement of two highway projects. Project No. 1: from Stephenson's milk box so called towards Lyndeborough Center. Project No. 2 from Milford town line in east part of Lyndeborough towards Perham Corner so called, amounting to \$5000.00.

10. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act anything thereon.

11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at time of taking inventory April first.

13. To see if the town will vote to allow Sunday sports, or act anything thereon.

14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeboro:

I respectfully submit my tenth annual report as follows:

School Organization:

The teachers at the South and North Schools are the same as last year. With a somewhat decreased enrollment at the South School we have a better teaching situation than last year.

Mrs. Elizabeth Scully has abandoned teaching and in her place we engaged Miss Ruth Colcord of Plaistow, a graduate of Keene Normal School last June.

As an economy measure the services of a special music supervisor have been discontinued, the regular teachers taking over as much of this work as possible.

Supervision

In previous reports I have described the routine work of my office and have spoken frequently of the testing program. The work of the past year has followed similar lines and the results of the tests have been sent to the parents as was done last year.

Improvement in teaching through the use of standard tests is well illustrated by the experience we have had in oral reading, systematic records of which have been kept since the fall of 1927. The test used consists of a series of five stories of uniform length and difficulty, appropriate to the grade in which they are used, standardized for the number of seconds it takes pupils to read them, and also for the number of errors made. These five tests are given at equal intervals during the school year, spaced so that the final test comes the latter part of May. The tests are given to pupils individually by their own teacher, who thus has the results immediately available to guide her in adjusting her teaching to the difficulties of each pupil.

The following summary of results is for the Supervisory District as a whole, with from seventy to ninety children in each grade.

First Grade: Median number of seconds required in May, 1928, 70; in May, 1932, 50; standard score, 78. Median number of errors made in May, 1928, 9; in May, 1932, 3; standard score, 5.

Second Grade: Median number of seconds in May, 1928, 130; in May, 1932, 90; standard score, 112. Median number of errors in May, 1928, 10; in May, 1932, 4; standard score, 6.

Third Grade: Median number of seconds in May, 1928, 87; in May, 1932, 57; standard score, 63. Median number of errors in May, 1928, $4\frac{1}{2}$; in May, 1932, $2\frac{1}{2}$; standard score, 3.

Medical Inspection

The annual medical inspection has been made by Mrs. Gilbert; at the South School in September, at the North School in January and at the Perham Corner School in February. A detailed report of her findings was submitted to the School Board, a summary of which is as follows:

Mrs. Gilbert has arranged for a Clinic at the County Hospital this month, to include four Lyndeboro children.

Budget

I offer the following remarks regarding the budget for the school year 1933-1934 which has been prepared by the School Board. A real effort has been made to reduce the proportion of taxes required for school purposes. The total sum recommended to be raised is \$1300 less than the amount raised last year, a reduction of 14%. Approximately \$1000 of this reduction represents the saving during the current year on the budget presented a year ago. The remaining \$300 is the result of a scaling down of such items of the budget as can be reduced, the largest item being that of "Teachers' Salaries." A reduction of approximately 10% in the salaries now paid is contemplated. This is somewhat larger than the general trend of reduction in teachers' salaries throughout this state.

The reduction in cost this year has practically eliminated state aid, and the amounts recommended in the budget for next year (in the items subject to state aid) total an amount less than the amount of the \$5 tax, which will be \$3,905.88; consequently there will be no state aid next year.

School Economy

The Budget as presented and explained in the paragraph above represents a very thorough study on the part of the School Board and myself in an effort to discover all possible ways of economizing in the cost of maintaining schools without seriously injuring their efficiency. We believe that local as well as national efforts at economy must heed the warning voiced by President Hoover at the National Conference: "However the national economy may vary, or whatever fiscal adjustments may be made, the very first obligation upon the national resources is the undiminished financial support of the public schools. We cannot afford to lose any ground in education. That is neither economy nor good judgment."

In closing this, my tenth year of service in this Supervisory Union, I wish to express my belief that our schools have made progress and to acknowledge the interest and cooperation of the parents and citizens generally, as well as of the School Board and teachers, which has made possible whatever advancement there has been. I trust that these conditions will continue to prevail and that the standards may be maintained in spite of the effects of economic conditions.
